The pub will sell limited-edition merchandise – including pint glasses, mugs, teacup-and-saucer sets and teapots – and serve Foo Fighters beer.

Is *Tin Star* a western with a contemporary twist?

"That was definitely a starting point."

It's a fish-out-of-water story about Brits in Canada. Where did that come from?

"There's an open-door policy for policemen who work in England to go and work there, and often they go and work in small towns. Mostly what they deal with is drunk drivers and breaking up fights. It's an easier option than what they've been through. My character Jim Worth is hiding out, because he's also a drunk. He's trying to stay sober. That's what his deal is."

What's the biggest challenge of playing an alcoholic?

"We talked quite hot and heavy about it. There's a point when you don't get drunk, but he will certainly lead people to believe that he is not functioning – it becomes useful. There's a Jekyll & Hyde kind of vibe to the situation as it progresses..."

Was it dangerous filming out in Calgary?

"There are various theories about how to deal with bears, but it's real. The other one they don't tell you about is the mountain lion situation. Tourists get killed in that area because the cats are up a tree. They drop on you. They come out of the air and they eat you."

WHEN LIGHT MEETS DARK



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Pascal as Peña: up against a cartel that's "seemingly impossible to take down"

Did you see *Narcos* Season Three?

Pedro Pascal, aka DEA agent Javier Peña, reckons it was the best yet, and (sort of) has news on Season Four

NARCOS IS THE HIT series that since 2015 has been telling the story of the rise (Season One) and fall (Season Two) of Colombian cocaine kingpin and hippo enthusiast Pablo Escobar. Anyone who knows their druglords will have realised that tale could only have one ending. Sure enough, Season Two ended with (historical spoiler alert) Escobar shot through the head on a Medellin rooftop. But the story

of the cocaine trade didn't end there. If it had, how would *Be Here Now* have gotten made? In fact, the Cali cartel rose to take over from Escobar, which meant the mission wasn't over for DEA agent Javier Peña.

Pedro Pascal, who plays Peña, argues the change of focus meant the most recent season was the most interesting. "When people say there can't be a *Narcos* without Escobar I'm like, 'Are you kidding? What world do you live in?'" he says. "The show isn't called 'Escobar'. Cocaine sales go up after he's dead. That alone tells you what we're up against in Season Three. It's an empire that's now

seemingly impossible to take down because it isn't one target in the way Escobar was."

The fact that Escobar's story was so well known became part of his undoing. "He built museums and schools, but he overplayed the Robin Hood card," explains Pascal. "That's where his ego exposed him and helped bring him down. The Cali people are much more hidden. They don't fuck up very much."

Having filmed the whole series on location in Colombia, Pascal does sympathise with locals who feel their country is always portrayed in a certain light. "I think Colombians have every the right to be tired of

being associated with violent crime," he says. "There's a whole other side to the country. I sliced my hand open – making a fucking salad, 'cos that's how wild shit is for me – and went to ER and saw a hand specialist in an hour. That's just the way the system works in Bogotá."

The show has already been commissioned for a fourth series, but Pascal says he couldn't reveal anything about it even if he wanted to. "I'm just a meaningless actor," he laughs. "God forbid they let me in on what their plan is for Season Four. I will say there's a completeness to Season Three, yet it's obvious that you can't stop the story from going on after that." **Kevin EG Perry**

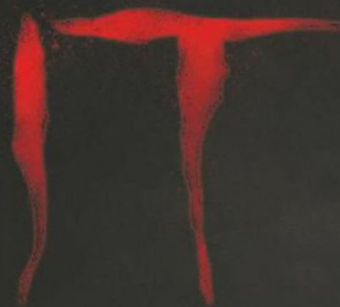

Warning: Jacob Rees-Mogg could be our Donald Trump

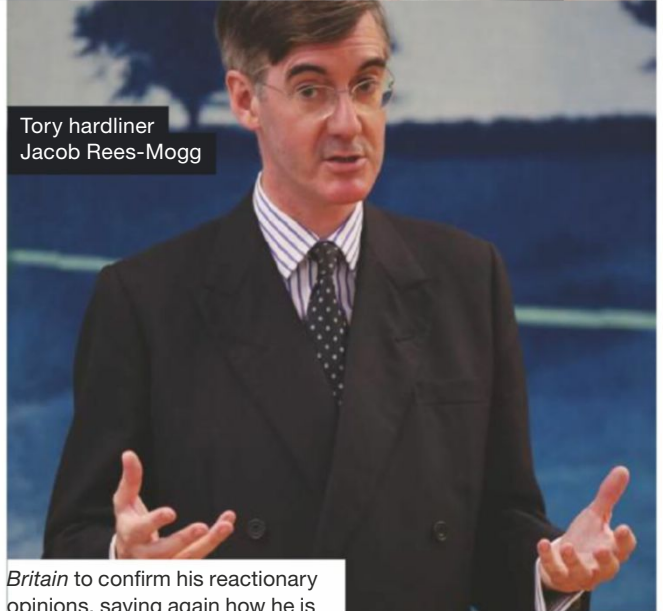
A SPECIAL KIND OF b*llend seems to be attracted to politics. Ones who aren't just happy with inflicting their d**kishness on close friends and family, but ones who want their bats**t ideas forced upon an entire nation. The latest in a long line of these homegrown buffoons is backbench Conservative MP Jacob Rees-Mogg, who's pulling up his vintage Bentley behind the icky likes of Boris Johnson, Nigel Farage and Paul Nuttall. A parody of an aristocrat, his eccentricity often distracts from his nasty, destructive views. He is privilege personified; even though he is a 48-year-old grown man, he admits he's never ever cooked dinner for himself, never washed his clothes or even changed a nappy on any one of his six children. Such lax behaviour saw Labour MP Harriet Harman

branding him a "deadbeat dad", which is not just hilarious but totally spot on. RED OR DEAD

A near-death experience and a move from their beloved Vegas hasn't stopped The Killers delivering a classic in 'Wonderful Wonderful'. Mark Beaumont meets a band still glowing

Presented with Jeffrey Dahmer's glasses, and the chance to see through the eyes of a real serial murderer, The Killers' true natures leap out. Brandon Flowers hovers back, intrigued but wary, as though the frames themselves are oozing evil. "One of the guys who escaped, his surname was Flowers," says the frontman in dread tones.

Guitarist Dave Keuning peers over shoulders at the stained, gold-rimmed spectacles, brought along to the Milwaukee Rave Club by a friend of the band who happened to have been Dahmer's defence lawyer, nodding coolly but not getting too involved. But drummer Ronnie Vannucci dives straight in, whips them onto his face and gets a picture taken. "Is this too cheeseballs?" he asks.

The Rave's backstage area might have been turned into a Bedouin tent of hanging patterned drapes – "we didn't request this," says a slightly embarrassed Brandon – but it masks a deadly history. A patch of gravel across the street is all that remains of the building where Dahmer killed and dismembered several of his 17 victims, and the broad ballroom of The Rave itself is reputedly haunted. The voices of dead children are said to echo around the underground swimming pool, an angry voice has told interlopers in the boiler room to "Get out!" and bands have claimed they've felt 'watched' from the upper balconies during soundchecks. Did you sense any unseen presence, Brandon?

"No," smiles Brandon. "But I always feel watched. I don't know if it's to do with being raised a believer, but I do feel like someone is watching me."

Because they are – in their millions. Flowers' supernova star quality draws gazes like an eclipse, and never more so than in the run-up to The Killers' fifth album 'Wonderful Wonderful', considering that it's a record of deep personal revelations made by a battle-worn band seemingly in disarray, with their bassist quitting tours and their gang mentality hanging by a thread. "A lot of eggshells are walked on," Brandon admits. "We've had some counselling sessions."

Counselling sessions? Like, a full-on Metallica balls-on-the-table deal?

"It was basically a communication session," says Ronnie. "We're four dudes that don't want to communicate, don't know how to communicate, how to lay it out. We needed some lessons. I think it's healthy. If you don't clear the air there's a lot of separation. Cracks start to feel like wedges then canyons, and then paranoia builds up and you misconstrue everything." Did it improve relations? "Yeah, it cut through the bullshit. On tour you don't wanna rock the boat too much, and it taught that, instead of letting something go an entire six week tour, if something happens f***ing deal with it right there."

How The Killers got from the therapist's couch to a record as inspired, exploratory and plain wonderful as 'Wonderful Wonderful' is a story of deep soul-searching, historic abuse, near-death

experiences and jam sessions with Prince Harry. And it starts 30,000 feet over Colombia, with a one-way ticket to the afterlife.

The Killers couldn't understand the pilot's panicked Spanish crackling over the intercom, but they knew it meant trouble. This wasn't just your standard turbulence, this was flying-through-the-gates-of-Hell-in-a-hang-glider turbulence, and whatever the pilot was saying it equated to 'kiss your asses goodbye'. "It was... ominous," Brandon says, recalling the worst private plane trip of the already strained tour for 2012's fourth album 'Battle Born'. "They were having trouble and we could feel it." What was going through your mind? "My initial thought was 'I wish I was just a busboy again because I'd rather be alive and grinding day-in-day-out than die like this'."

For bassist Mark Stoermer it was another straw breaking his tour-ravaged back. From 15 years he'd struggled with vans and tour bus bunks too small to accommodate his 6ft 5in frame. His back issues were making it agonising to carry a bass for an entire gig. What's more, after a hotchpotch of recording sessions with the five different producers on 'Battle Born', Mark felt distanced from the album and increasingly keen to follow studies in art and philosophy. As the final round of Asian dates came in, he told his bandmates he wouldn't play them, or that many more future shows.

For most bands on the brink, that's game over. But to Mark's surprise, The Killers quickly worked out a way for him to remain an in-the-studio member. "Everybody accepted it and, you know, didn't fire him – which he was totally open for," Ronnie recalls. "I think he was expecting it. We were just like, 'Dude, we get it, you need a break, I think we can make this work'. And we did make it work. It's the best f***ing job in the world for me, but I get that it's not like that for everybody. It's frustrating, if somebody doesn't want to tour and you're making them tour or they're begrudgingly going on tour, I don't want to be around that."

"We are four different people," Brandon adds. "We've grown over the years, but we didn't all necessarily become the same man. We didn't grow together, we all pursued different things, but that's what being in a band is, the give and the take, the push and the pull. That's what makes The Killers The Killers."

"We've had the same conversation with Dave, where Dave might wanna

take some time off too," Ronnie says. "He wants to raise his kid and it's not always conducive for schooling and stuff to bring an 11-year-old out on the road for two years. Whatever keeps everybody in the car. I miss Mark but I'd much rather deal with it like an adult now rather than in 10-20 years hinking, 'We coulda still been a band'."

The Killers that reconvened at Battle Born Studios in Las Vegas to start writing their fifth album in October 2015 had undergone more upheavals than a Bey'n'Jay *Bake Off* special. There'd been group therapy to help heal their unspoken rifts, their bassist had gone part-time, Ronnie, Mark and Brandon had made celebrated offshoot albums, Ronnie had gone through a divorce and lost his father early in the sessions and, like a glittery raven leaving a fake Eiffel Tower, Brandon was planning to move out of Vegas to Utah, leaving Mark as the only Vegas resident. "Is this the beginning of the end for Las Vegas?" Brandon laughs. "It's all going downhill from here. They've legalised pot and The Killers are leaving town."

Though they pinned down a full-time producer in Jacknife Lee, the band themselves were semi-present for the sessions. Often they'd work individually or in pairs – Mark, rejuvenated in his studio role, forged many of the tracks with Brandon. As with the early 'Battle Born' sessions though, The Killers "were lost for a long time" and "circling the drain" for five or six months until a "keystone track" fell into place.

The keystone track for 'Wonderful Wonderful' was 'Rut', an amorphous soft rocker delving into the dark times engulfing Chez Flowers. "My wife has PTSD," Brandon explains. "She has a version called Complex PTSD. It's when a person has had multiple traumatic experiences. Her whole life, she's been covering it, pretending it isn't there. For whatever reason, in her 30s, it's decided to really manifest itself and that's what I'm going through with my family. Usually I feel protective of her but I decided to take it head on. So 'Rut' is about her submitting to it. She got severely depressed and it wasn't until she sought counselling and got a name for what was going on that it helped. Now she submits to it – that doesn't mean that she's gonna let it beat her, but rather that she's gonna finally acknowledge that it's there and promise to break this cycle."

It emerges that Tana's suicidal thoughts were the cause of Brandon cutting short his tour for 'The Desired Effect' and the root of the Flowers family's move to Utah, since Vegas holds bad memories for her. Tana's struggle became the driving force of 'Wonderful Wonderful' too. The title track, a psych afrofunk adventure that sets an experimental tone for the album, references Tana as a "motherless child" being rescued by God, the couple's Mormon faith acting as a safety net. Tana's reservations about having her private issues splashed across the new Killers album evaporated as the songs won her over. "It bonded me and Tana in a way that I never foresaw," Brandon says, "because it helped me to understand her better and be more compassionate."

Brandon's personal doubts also hang heavy. 'Have All The Songs Been Written' (featuring a guest solo from Mark Knopfler and a title suggested by Bono) tackles that early-sessions writer's block that had him questioning the whole point of the band ("Rolling Stone" ranked all 73 Smiths songs and I looked at them and I was humbled at how good every f***ing single one of them was – it just made me want to quit"). And album highlight 'Tyson Vs Douglas' recalls a boxing match from 1990 that the seemingly unbeatable Iron Mike lost, opening young Brandon's eyes to the fact that giants can fall. It suggests he's worried his own kids might one day see him culturally KO'd. "Yeah, it's me talking about how I don't want to let my family down. I'm not perfect and I have my temptations – sometimes I do question my strengths."

He's been questioning the world around him too. 'Run For Cover' – originally written for 2008's 'Day & Age' – contains The Killers' first overt political references, full of cheating senators and "fake news". Have things got so bad that you couldn't stay apolitical anymore? Brandon nods. "My curiosity might be more piqued and I'm checking the news more often. You cannot say you're not affected by politics, it's seeped its way through. It seems inconceivable that Trump is gonna accomplish all of it and it's a bunch of bullshit for lack of a better

word. It sounds terrible that this person was elected but I got to believe that he's either gonna get impeached or in three years he'll be replaced by someone better. He's not going to build a wall in three years." But we could have a war with North Korea in three hours. "I know, and I hope not, but North Korea have been threatening that even since Obama was there, it's just now we have someone who's more aggressive than Obama would've been."

"On the surface the guy just seems like a crazy person," says Ronnie, "he seems totally unfit for the job, he's just going f***ing batshit crazy."

Despite doubts, drop-outs, depressions and Drumpf, The Killers remain unbowed. A month before the Milwaukee show, NME caught up with Brandon backstage at Bilbao BBK festival, on his customary on-the-road high. He enthused about breaking new territories at festivals in

Northern Spain, Greece and across Europe, about 'hubbing' out of the Cotswolds and hitting stages with a clutch of new songs he truly believes in rather than "just keeping the machine going" with 'Battle Born'. From side of stage, The Killers' murderous magic is in full force, daring to open with 'Mr Brightside' like their 22-year-old me-me-me-men were still alive and posing today.

In Milwaukee, with the news looming that Dave will also be sitting out the coming run of 'Wonderful Wonderful' shows, Brandon's just as upbeat, stressing that the new touring arrangements may mean there'll be a sixth Killers album before a third solo one. As our time wraps up, like the model interviewee handing in way overdue homework, Brandon brings up a question I asked him some years ago: what do The Killers stand for?

"I didn't have an answer," he says, "but I thought about it. I think that we're about belief. Our songs may not always be exclusively about a person but it sure as hell is for the people and that's what I think resonates with people about this band. That we are genuine and real, and we are not going anywhere anytime soon."

Truly wonderful news.

MUM'S THE WORD

Booed at Venice Film Festival yet considered an early frontrunner for Best Picture at next year's Oscars, the disturbing, surreal thriller *Mother!*, starring Jennifer Lawrence, is the year's most talked-about film. Alex Flood meets director Darren Aronofsky

MOTHER! IS the story of an isolated couple whose relationship

is tested when uninvited guests arrive at their home, turning their domestic Eden into a surrealist nightmare. You wrote it in just five days. Where did the inspiration come from?

"It just poured out of me in an unconscious fever. It was like when Paul McCartney wrote *Yesterday* out of a dream and in one afternoon. After it was finished, I showed it to my producers and they were like, 'Wow, there's something here.'"

Did you always have Jennifer Lawrence in mind?

"I actually wasn't thinking about Jennifer at all because I didn't think she'd be interested. I was focused on trying to capture the spirit and the energy of the character. After we did cast Jennifer, we started to think about who could play against her in this older, commanding male role. Then Javier [Bardem] became a possibility and that was really exciting."

What did Jennifer bring to the movie that no one else could?

"She's an autodidact, which means someone who is self-taught. No one ever taught her how to act and yet, not only is she an incredible emotional actress but she's a technical actor as well, which is very important in filmmaking



because you have to know where the lights are. In this film in particular she is dancing with the camera the whole time. So that's really impressive about her. She also puts an endless amount of energy and consideration into everything that she does. This film is two hours long and 66 minutes of it is a close-up of her face. Yet it's not boring. That's down to Jen's performance."

Why isn't there any music in the film?

"We worked really hard on the score for several months, but all it did was take away from people leaning into what Jennifer was feeling. She was giving us all the score we needed. I couldn't help her with music and I've never had that. Every actor can always use a little push in some way. But Jen didn't need it."

The movie was booed at Venice Film Festival. Does that upset you?

"MY FILM'S A GRENADE TOSSED INTO POP CULTURE"

"I don't care if they cheer or they freaking boo, as long as they react. This film is like tossing a hand grenade into pop culture. We're taking the biggest movie stars on the planet and seeing what they do in a surreal chamber piece. Surrealism is very rare nowadays and it's interesting how many people don't remember that all movies are dreams – living, waking dreams. That's one of the great things about cinema."

Is there a secret meaning only you know?

"It's completely out there now. It was secret but now there are journalists who have gotten it and they've gotten it deep. It's an allegory. Think about our home, where we are and then reduce that to a small house. She [Jennifer Lawrence] is

mother. Not our individual mothers, just our mother. That's what it's about."

We recently asked Bastille to pick their 10 best films of all time – they chose your film *Requiem For A Dream*. Does it feel good to be recognised by other artists?

"Yeah it's great. Getting that kind of shout-out is great. Whether it's from a musician or any type of artist."

Why do all your characters undergo such cruelty and violence. Are you a bit sadistic?

"I believe that in looking at the darkest parts of ourselves, that is how we see the light. Tragedy is an art form and I find it very cathartic. I do it to all my characters. Both men and women. I'm not gender specific!"

What does your own mother think about the film?

"She hasn't seen it yet, but if this film was about my mother it would be the story of Mother Theresa. She is an exceptional lady, a great woman and they're not at all related."

We've heard that you love The Cure. What's your favourite song?

"I like *A Forest*. It's a great f***king song. They're a great band. I remember when everyone else was listening to disco and I was getting into The Cure. I guess I resist popular culture just a pinch and look for the edges."

It wasn't enough to Tweet about it or hashtag about it, we had to bring out the big guns and the big megaphone and have our say. We barnstormed across the country as an illegitimate political party injecting the mission into the moshpit, and what started as a knee-jerk response to a particular set of political circumstances became a great f***in' rock'n'roll band."

Is it the point of music to change the world for the better?

"No, the point of music is to be an accurate reflection of the artist's convictions. If those are limited to money and ass, that's what you should write about. But if you have convictions that go beyond that and you stifle them because you're afraid you won't enjoy the same commercial success, there's a very dark pit in hell for you, sir."

TRAVIS SHINN

Did the album come about so quickly because there was so much to address?

"It's an album that aims to reflect the times and also have our hands on the wheel of history. We're at a crucial juncture in the history of our planet, from impending environmental disaster to potential nuclear disaster to grotesque economic inequality and this rise in racism and anti-immigrant sentiment. What your readers do or fail to do now will have a direct impact on whether it'll be a more decent, just and humane planet or not."

You vow to 'Unf*** The World' – what most needs unf***ing?

"We can start with apathy. Post the Trump presidency you can see this real rise in activism and a movement standing up against the egregious injustices perpetrated by this regime. Across the globe, people feel fearful and anxious [but] you are not a bystander. The only way the world has ever changed in a progressive, radical or revolutionary way is people no different from you have stood up and torn down the Berlin Wall or ended apartheid or fought for women's suffrage or legalised weed."

What's your opinion of Trump?

"He's an unstable, clown-like man-baby who has the nuclear codes, so that's not great... My hope is that this administration is already so bad that it brings into existence a movement that is righteous enough not just to dethrone them but to fight for a more decent and humane United States."

How could the wealth inequality that separates the one per cent from the homeless ever be reversed?

"Poverty is not ordained by the heavens, poverty is created by man. Our song 'Living On The 110' is about the 110 freeway. Underneath it live thousands of homeless people and on top of it roll Bentleys and Rolls-Royces and Ferraris. It's a stark analogy for the times. The way that society is organised is so that it would be unjust. The changes we need to make go beyond one awful president, they're systemic. You have to aim for the world you really want. Let's stop being so defensive and go on the offence for a world of equality, freedom, justice and peace, where every kid gets an education and everyone has enough disposable income for a guitar, a microphone or a set of turntables."

Is it disheartening that people are waking up to politics but coming to right-wing solutions?

"There is a war of ideas and the reason is that economic anxiety – it's the same with Brexit there – is a fertile ground to demagogues to use racism for their own ends. Poverty is a crime, so there are criminals that created it. They're not Muslims and they're not Mexicans, they're the corporate whores who order the world so they get more yachts and you don't get a job. That's how it works. There's a lot of politicians out there pointing the finger at the wrong people, so we make finger-pointing music."

FINALLY, DAVE Grohl's inevitable transition into a flannel shirt-wearing Freddie Mercury-with-tats is complete. Kicking off the ninth Foo

Fighters album with one minute and 22 seconds of Queen-worthy bombast, the glistening sonic flare that is 'T-Shirt' sets the tone for a blistering, high-gloss 'Concrete and Gold', a record that features some of the band's most vital and impressive tracks in years.

Following up 2014's 'Sonic Highways' – a conceptual indulgence which saw the group travelling to some of the US's most legendary music studios – this is a return to a more simple way of doing things. Written in his pants in an Airbnb in the hippy enclave of Ojai, California, this back-to-basics, underwear-driven approach has served Grohl well. 'Run' is up there with some of the Foos' most impressive work, a throwback to the raw riffs of the self-titled 1995 debut and bare bones emotion of its follow-up 'The

Colour and the Shape'. The subtle force of funk is also a key factor in the sheer buoyancy of 'Concrete and Gold', with 'Make It Right' plugging into an almost Prince-ly groove. It's a move that gently echoes their pals Queens of the Stone Age, who recently worked with pop producer Mark Ronson. Taking a similar tack, the Foos have teamed up with Greg Kurstin – known for his work with the likes of Lily Allen, Adele and Sia – and his added gloss makes this album really glimmer.

Grohl said he wanted it to sound like "Motörhead's version of *Sgt Pepper*". Gracefully mixing the rough with the smooth throughout, he's not far off. The visceral 'La Dee Da' is a case in point, mixing up the slick Southern rock swing of the Allman Brothers with a screamo chorus and mega-riffs. This is an album where acoustic ballads like 'Happy Ever After' that recall the Beatles sit comfortably alongside moody ragers like 'The Line'. Proof that there's definitely still life in the old Grohl left.

SOME FANS struggled to accept it when members of Los Angeles rap-rock renegades Rage Against The Machine formed Audioslave with the late Chris Cornell, who swapped RATM vocalist Zach de la Rocha's politically-charged raps for classic rock crooning. Those fans may have an easier time with Prophets of Rage, which sees the same set of musicians team up with Public Enemy's Chuck D and Cypress

"We're not a supergroup. We're an elite task force of revolutionary musicians determined to confront this mountain of election year

bullshit, and confront it head-on with the Marshall stacks blazing."

That quote is a clue as to the unabashed vital righteousness of the band's self-titled debut album. Morello does what he did so brilliantly in Rage and Audioslave – looping riffs as thick as a hangman's noose, with occasional forays into squealing, semi-psychedelic guitar solos – while D and B-Real rail against the establishment. "No hatred / Fuck racists" they declare on 'Unfuck the World', which evokes of the sound of Rage's explosive 1999 track 'Guerilla Radio'. This is not a subtle record, but these are not subtle times. So grab a Marshall stack, put it through a fascist's window and let's start the revolution. Now.

WHEN ROSTAM Batmanglij shared an iPhone note in early 2016 saying that he'd left Vampire Weekend, it had been coming. For years he'd been active outside the New York band he co-founded – sharing the odd track, and producing for the likes of Charli XCX and Carly Rae Jepsen. "My identity as a songwriter and producer," he wrote, "needs to stand on its own."

So here it is: his debut solo album – a collection of songs that sees Rostam in complete control. Given he produced all three Vampire Weekend albums and was chief in forging their distinctive style, some of this feels instantly familiar, like the huge, romantic single 'Bike Dream' with its

tearaway rhythm and massive pop hook. But there's also plenty of experimentation: take the reggae-inflected 'Rudy' and the gorgeous strings of closer 'Gwan'. Occasionally, it goes too far – witness the distorted and mangled vocals on 'Hold You' and 'When', the latter sounding like an indecipherable message from an alien race.

These songs are rewarding – mostly because they give a much deeper insight into

Rostam's character. It's not an explicitly political album, he simply writes from his perspective as an American songwriter who just happens to be gay and the son of Iranian immigrant parents. It's honest, personal and wholly relatable. Rostam may have defined Vampire Weekend's sound, but with 'Half-Light' he begins to define himself.

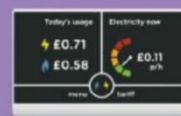

All-star cast, respected director, complete insanity

HORROR PSYCHO DRAMA

MAYBE PREPARE yourself somewhere dark and quiet to have a nice quiet sit down and cuppa after watching *Mother!* You'll appreciate the opportunity to decompress, even if you emerge with no better idea of what you've just watched. Darren Aronofsky's latest offering is an assault. Of ideas. Of religious metaphor. Of assorted human viscera. It is a whole lot of movie.

It's the most interesting choice Jennifer Lawrence has

made since her breakout in *Winter's Bone*. She gives her director blood, sweat and tears – gallons thereof.

Lawrence plays a nameless young woman who lives in a remote, huge, beautiful house with her husband (Javier Bardem), a blocked writer. A few minutes into the movie he invites in a stranger (Ed Harris), then his obnoxious wife (Michelle Pfeiffer). Rapidly, the young woman's house is taken over by people she doesn't know who keep wrecking her stuff then usher in violence. That's about the first 30 minutes. After that it escalates with rocket-like force. The woman's nightmare takes turns you couldn't possibly imagine, nor will necessarily

understand. By the end, so much has happened and the film's world has so completely changed that it's near impossible to believe you entered this place just two hours ago. You'll either be laughing hysterically or mute with shock.

Crucially, throughout the increasing insanity, Aronofsky is always in control. His world may be spinning off into utter chaos but it's clear he always knows exactly where he's going. He

moves around far too precisely for events to be completely random. We can follow Lawrence's journey as a careening psychological horror – even if we can't make sense of its detail. But trying to piece together its greater meaning is something that can only begin after you've got your breath back, a few hours later.

Mother! may be remembered in years to come as a monumental mess or a masterpiece – but it will be remembered. It brings to mind films like *2001*, *The Shining* or *A Clockwork Orange*; films that blur your mind with baffling images and only come into focus over time. Love it or hate it, or somewhere in between, it's thrilling that artworks this ambitiously bonkers exist. **Olly Richards**

AMERICAN ASSASSIN HAS been dogged by more controversy than a Donald Trump tweet. Based on the novel series by the late US author Vince Flynn, the film was slammed earlier this year by families of the victims of the 2015 Tunisian tourist massacre for its opening scene – a brutal beach-based shoot-out in which Mitch Rapp's (Dylan O'Brien) fiancée is gunned down.

It's a harrowing opener, certainly, but it soon becomes clear that this film is less a comment on international terrorism and more of an action film in the traditional sense, with heavy hints of *Die Hard* spattered throughout.

A vengeful Rapp is soon recruited by the CIA to work as an undercover assassin, but not before he's been coached by Michael Keaton's Stan Hurley, a sassy, tough-as-balls Cold War veteran who lives in a cabin in the woods, where he trains recruits to become killing machines.

It's clear that the renegade Rapp, in spite of – or perhaps because of – his penchant for risk-taking is a favourite of Hurley's. Things get all the more silly when Hurley's former top boy steps back into their world. Cue lots of fighting, fast-paced stunts, explosions, some rather gory ultra-violence and the threat of all-out nuclear war.

If you're looking for insightful comment on the state of the world, however, *American Assassin* isn't it. **Leonie Cooper**

He's literally in this film

Is Cold War veteran Stan Hurley a good guy or a bad guy?

"There are good people who happen to have that horrible job, it doesn't mean they're bad people. He's a human being so he's got good and bad sides. I wouldn't wanna be on his bad side. Stan is about taking care of business."

How much combat training did you have?

"When this came up I was working on *Spider-Man* so I had to get in better shape than I was, very quickly. I never got to the degree that Taylor [Kitsch] and Dylan [O'Brien] did, because they probably had more time and they're, like, nine years old."

Were there any worries about using terrorism as a form of entertainment?

"There are versions of terrorism or big international movies with bad things happening in the world going way back. It's much more intense right now and when we shot this movie it was intense, and that's the sad part of all of this. But there wasn't any concern about it; that's what's going on in the world. This happens to be an action story that takes place in the world we live in. It's too bad, but that's the truth. This movie is a tad more intelligent than most in how it dealt with that. We avoided most if not every cliché in terms of how we depicted the people and ethnic groups and situations. It's complicated, there's a lot of grey areas."

Superorganism

Bonkers pop troupe set to be The Avalanches for a new generation

IN JANUARY 2017, A fully formed pop banger titled 'Something For Your M.I.N.D.' was uploaded to streaming services. In the space of a few days, the song landed in Spotify's esteemed New Music Friday playlist. Racking up millions of streams, it piqued the attention of Frank Ocean and Vampire Weekend's Ezra

Koenig. But Superorganism, the mysterious group behind it, were a complete unknown. A social media presence, or even a photo were nowhere to be seen. Rumours soon began circulating that it was a project of Damon Albarn or Tame Impala's Kevin Parker.

Such secrecy wasn't some savvy media hype masterplan concocted by the multinational eight-piece – it was a result of the band's chaotic, sprawling reach. The core of the collective

met on music forums years ago, when kiwi multi-instrumentalists Emily and Harry were members of a creative community that kicked around tracks across borders on email. In late 2016, 'Something For Your M.I.N.D.' ended up with friend and collaborator, Orono, a 17-year-old living in Maine, USA.

"We sent it over thinking, 'That'll be cool to hear whenever we get that back'," Harry explains. But within an hour of sending, Orono had cooked up lyrics and a melody. She recorded vocals and sent it back. "Well, I am a bored teenager," she admits.

The reaction to the song was immediate, but the track was taken down earlier this year due to an uncleared sample. "We are actually idiots" says Harry.

Happily, since then, two further cuts in the shape of 'Nobody Cares' (a cartoonish electro-pop zinger) and the quirky 'It's All Good' appeared.

Now, all eight members are living in a four-bedroom house in east London. Not that that will stop them working together in their own unusual way.

"Even when we live together, we do a lot of the work by sending electronic files between each other in our rooms," Harry explains. "It's a bit like a cult," adds Emily, only semi-jokingly.

But it's this idiosyncrasy and individuality that makes the group so intriguing – and that vibrancy couldn't be more important right now.

Harry: "Pop music has been so serious for the past few years. It feels like it needs a bit more fun injected."

So with the mystery over, a deal with Domino Records inked and hotly anticipated UK live dates booked for next month, Superorganism will be making the world a more colourful and chaotic place for the foreseeable future.

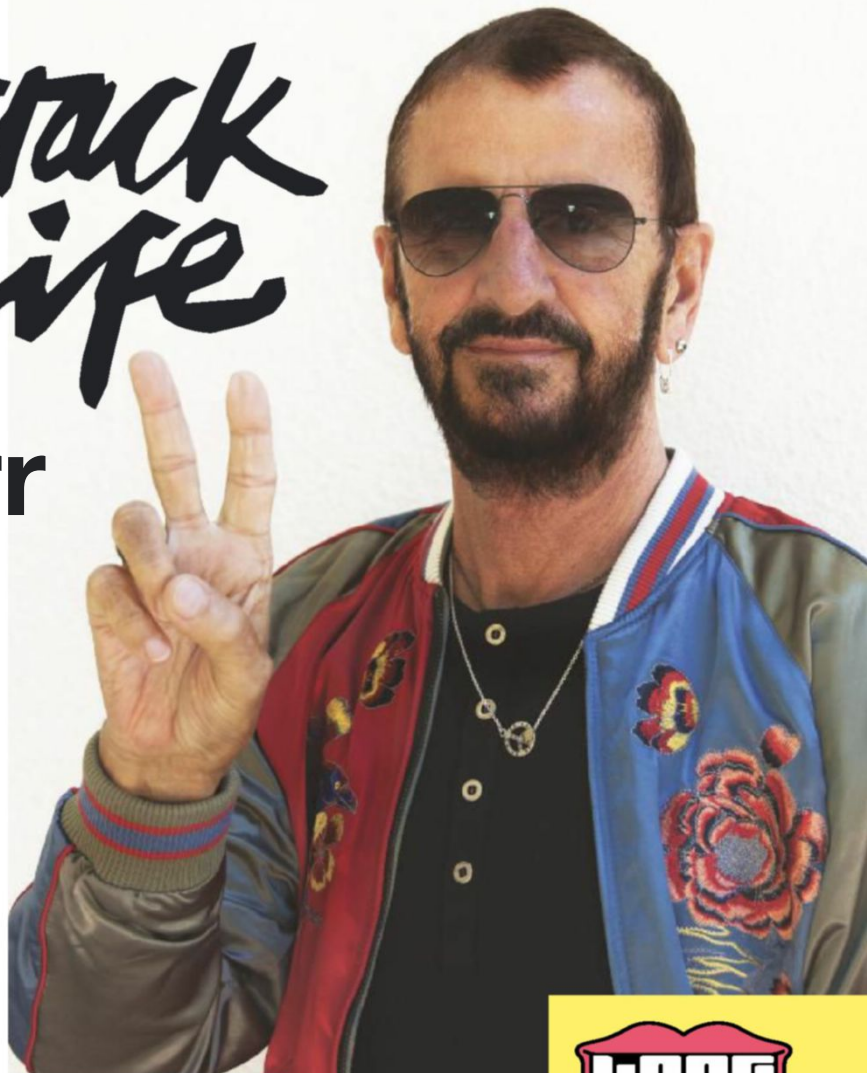

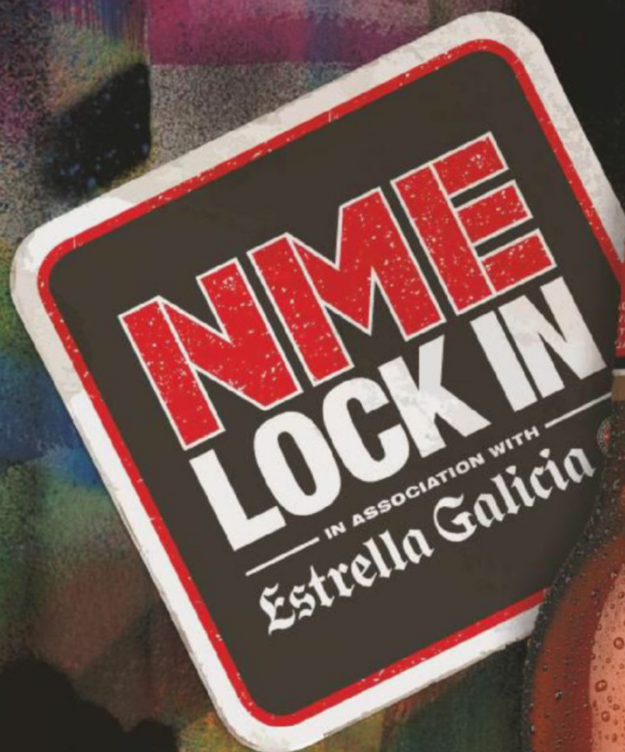
