# Cardi B topples Taylor

She's the first female rapper to nab a US Number One in 19 years, which is kind of a big deal

CARDI B - RAPPER. reality TV star, former stripper - has topped the US charts with the hip-hop hit of the summer, 'Bodak Yellow', knocking off Taylor Swift's 'Look What You Made Me Do'. She's the first female rapper to do so without the help of someone featuring on the song since Lauryn Hill with 'Doo-Wop (That Thing)' in 1998. To Brits, Cardi B is something of a mystery. For Americans, her story is hip-hop leaend. Here's the short version: at 19, Bronx native Cardi B was living with her abusive boyfriend and his mother after being fired from a job at her local supermarket. She left, got a job at a strip club and began documenting her life in online videos, ridina the Vine wave to internet fame before turning to music via a stint on reality TV show. Love & Hip Hop: New York. Her first mixtape, 'Gangsta Bitch Music Vol 1', got a lot of heat in 2016. and was followed by 'Bodak Yellow' in June this year. She's one of hip-hop's wittiest artists. and one of the most badass rappers in the US. Here's why:

# SHE'S PROUD TO BE AN UNDERDOG

During her time on Love & Hip Hop: New York, she said, "They always think I'm just gonna be the stripper that's never gonna make it nowhere. But you know what? It's cool, because I'm the underdog." Two years later, she's top of the charts.

# SHE'S NOT ASHAMED OF HER PAST

Cardi says her time on the pole was a life-saving experience. "You know it really saved me from a lot of things," she said in 2016, "When I started stripping I went back to school. I was living with my ex-boyfriend who was beating my ass." She's now nominated for 'Hustler of the Year' at the BET Hip Hop Awards 2017, the only woman in the category, against competition from Chance The Rapper, Kendrick Lamar and DJ Khaled, "I feel like I deserved that award even when I was stripping," she told radio show Breakfast Club Power, "I used to work seven days a week. Now sometimes I'm like, 'I'm so tired', but then I'm like, 'Would you rather be here, or would you rather be shaking your ass for eight hours in heels?""

# SHE'S SPEAKING UP FOR WOMEN

In an Instagram post, she said, "If you believe in equal rights between men and women - that makes you a feminist. I don't understand how you b\*\*\*hes feel like being a feminist is being a woman that has an education, that have a degree. That is not being a feminist. You discouraging a certain type of woman, that definitely doesn't make you one... There's only a definition for a simple word. The problem is that being a feminist is something so great and y'all don't want me to be great, but too bad. I'm gonna encourage any type of woman. You don't have to be a woman like me for me to encourage you and support you."

Five Foot Two is a deeply moving look at what it's like to be one of the most talked-about pop icons on the planet. Here's what we learned

# **EVEN IF YOU'RE LADY GAGA. YOU STILL HAVE TO BATTLE THE PATRIARCHY**

Whether it's the break-up of her relationship with Taylor Kinney or the sexism she faces in the music industry. Gaga is sick of your s\*\*t. "When producers say 'You'd be nothing without me', those men have so much power. they can have women in a way that no other men can," she explains. Mark Ronson, who produced her most recent album 'Joanne', was an exception. "So many men I worked with and dated have made me feel like I wasn't good enough on my own. I don't feel that with Mark."

### **SHE WANTS BABIES**

Several times in the doc she talks about having children. In a personal moment, she is seen at a christening, watching on with love as the priest wets the baby's head. Later she's seen asking to hold the baby. But fans can rest easy that Mama Gaga will be performing for decades. "I want to be doing this until I'm an old lady," she says.

# SHE WISHES MADONNA **WOULD JUST SAY IT TO** HER FACE

Comparisons between the two have been made since Gaga first appeared on the scene in 2008. Madge remained tightlipped on Gaga until 2011, when she deemed her single 'Born This Way' "reductive". In Five Foot Two, Gaga calls out Madonna for not speaking directly to her, saying, "Telling me you think I'm a piece of s\*\*t through the media is the same as a guy passing me a note saying, 'My buddy thinks you're hot'."

### SHE LIVES HER LIFE IN CHRONIC PAIN

This doc shows the bravery Gaga has shown for years while battling a hip injury and fibromyalgia – a muscular disorder that causes all over body pain - which affects her daily life. "If I couldn't afford all these people to help me every day, I don't know what I would do", Gaga says about the daily massage and physiotherapy she receives.

You've announced you're splitting up. Why now? 'bambino'. We were trying to think of what we could call the next album."


Ryan: "'Snake'."

# This is the most rock'n'roll reality

TV ever

HIDDEN DEEP WITHIN THE programming of Freeview television is a show that I've become mildly obsessed with of late, even though it changes channels and time slots so often that it's hard to keep track of when and where it's going to pop up next. Currently occupying the pre-work breakfast slot on Dave. American Pickers is basically Antiques Roadshow if all the guests were middle-aged bikers with severe hoarding habits. It shows us a USA populated by dudes in dungarees in possession of tumbledown sheds packed with rusty petrol station signage, 1950s leather jackets and old pinball machines. If you like Americana - and we're talking more diners, soda fountains and James Dean than the music of Fleet Foxes or the 1998 album by The Offspring - then this show will have you rubbing the thighs of vour vintage Levi's with glee.

Headed up by Mike Wolfe and Frank Fritz - "two ordinary guys looking for extraordinary things" - the show sees the duo travel the length and breadth of the United States in their truck. looking for houses to rummage through in order to buy up stock for their antiques store. It's not the collectables they gather that are of real interest here, though - it's that they encounter more characters than a keyboard. Mike and Frank end up meeting some pretty out-there folk, from Mole Man Ron - who's built himself an extremely precarious multiroom underground lair - and tin-can artist Professor Bobo, to the human time machine Hobo Jack and a quirky guy by the name of Jack White, who runs some kind of old-timey record label in the wilds of Nashville. Buying a huge taxidermic elephant head from Mike and Frank, the former

White Stripes man and record industry Willy Wonka isn't the only rock star who's made a cameo on the show. The Black Keys' Dan Auerbach has also popped up, salivating over old guitars, as has Rick Nielsen of US rockers Cheap Trick, letting the guys into his storage lock-up to plunder his old merch.

One of the most popular shows on the History network

in America - which is also home to the quite mad Forged In Fire, which sees blacksmiths competing against each other to make a whole array of sinister-looking weapons -American Pickers has a winning formula that the UK has tried to replicate with a homegrown version. Sadly, Salvage Hunters suffers from the fact that on these shores there just don't seem to be as many loveable oddballs hidden away with nowt for company but a house full of broken motorcycle parts and a despairing wife.



Paigey Cakey, 24, MC, singer and actress from Hackney, London

PAIGEY CAKEY IS THE quintessential modern artist. She's been in films (2011's Attack The Block) and TV shows (Waterloo Road, The Secret), and since 2012's debut mixtape 'The First Paige' has become one of the most wanted MCs on the grime scene. On 2014 mixtape 'The Right Paige' she collaborated with Stormzy, Chip, Yungen and Sneakbo, among others. And the most recent release, the 'Red Velvet Mixtape', is a masterclass in wit and braggadocio, "Stacking up all of these pound pound pounds / Tell the waiter he should bring another round round round," she raps on standout track 'Down'. Living the dream.

# "I used to wear the 1460 boot when I was in college...

I liked them because they were in fashion at the time and were quite edgy and gritty. They were something different, 'cos that's not how I usually dress. I just

thought, 'This boot is wicked' so saved up all my college money and bought a pair. I'm trying to get my friends to wear them."

### "I wear the boots for my live shows...

I feel it gives that edgy style. They're good for looking good, if that makes sense. I wear them with distressed denim shorts and a jersey. That's my usual, and then some long pop socks with two lines on them."

### "I used to only wear one style of shoe...

And I'm a big trainerhead. But now I've seen what Dr. Martens are capable of, and all the different styles they've got, I've got a few pairs. They produce loads of different styles to suit different people. I like the

black or white ones 'cos they go with anything. My favourites are the white eyelet ones. They just look so fresh. People comment on them and they say, 'Your foot game is strong."

### "I haven't customised mine

But if I did, I would get graffiti sprayed on the side. When I wear them, I don't wear the laces all the way to the top, I wear them halfway so the tongue is quite floppy. So that's kind of how I customise my shoes. It's a different look if you wear them all the way done up; I wear them quite loosely. When you wear them loosely, you're breaking boundaries. When you wear them tight, it's formal."

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# After everything you've done recently, putting out something a bit more 'normal' is just about the most subversive thing you could do. Is that the intention?

"Yes, actually. I wanted to be more straightforward... [I'm] saying, 'I want to sell records so this is how I'm going to be'. I feel like I have nothing to prove. I think little parts of everyone that I've been in my life are starting to come through in this one kind of era of the music that I'm doing, because I really can embrace what I've been before rather than trying to distance myself from it."

# You did recently say of the 'Wrecking Ball' video, "I'm never living that down"...

"You know, I should f\*\*king be grateful every f\*\*king day for that song, and I am. I think people look at things that they've done and there is this sense of shame, or 'I wish I wouldn't have done that' – not because I'm naked, by the way; it's because I feel like I'm in a deeper songwriting place... Lyrically I'm less impressed with that song for me right now. I feel like it doesn't reflect who I am now, but that's fine because it's not supposed to... I'm sure I'll say the same thing about this record at some point."

# What does this new album reflect about who you are now?

"[Singles] 'Malibu' and 'Younger Now' are obviously two f\*\*king very different visuals in a way, but what binds them together is that they are both me. For 'Bangerz' I was so one way, I was so 'This is who I am, there's nothing that's gonna change it', and you know, I did that on '[Miley Cyrus & Her] Dead Petz' too. Now, I think I have more of an open mind where I'm like, 'OK, I can be a bunch of different things every day',

I don't have to be so locked into myself because then I'm putting those walls and borders around myself that I tell everyone else not to give in to."

# You mentioned '...Dead Petz'. Those shows, the dildo... Did you see yourself as an art provocateur, or were you just having a laugh?

"It's more that it's funny, and I think that it's also normalising. [I wore] the unicorn dildo to normalise women with penises because there are women with penises and [normalising that is] a part of [my charity] Happy Hippie. And that's a part of allowing people to be sexually free and not having to hide from their sexuality, whether it's the way that they were born [or] the way that they transitioned. So that was, in a way, political rather than provocative."

# Have we seen the last of the tongue-out, topless Miley, or has she just gone away for a bit?

"I don't even know how to answer that. Because I've always had a tongue and I've always had tits."

# Did it become a bit of a burden, always having to be outrageous?

"Yeah. I still feel pressure from myself in a way. I still really want to be an entertainer and show up in my own way and I don't want to look like anybody else. With the short hair thing, it was an androgynous, sexy feeling, which is what I want people to feel like. I don't wanna be over-feminised, but I'm not masculine either - I'm just myself. [What] people don't really understand [about] gender fluidity is by feeling nothing, I feel everything. So I feel like this record is expressing that more than ever. I really can wake up one day and feel like 'Malibu', but then I can also feel like I want to be Roy Orbison."

# You really opened up the gender fluidity conversation, to the point where you can dress in 'male' clothes in the 'Younger Now' video and no one even comments. Is that success?

"I got to normalise it a little bit more. I did it in a less aggressive way where it was subliminally allowing all audiences to be a part of it and enjoy it. From the outside, like you said, '...Dead Petz' wasn't a record for everyone... I think it ended up shutting some doors in the way of people making themselves less mentally available to listen. They think, 'I'm already pissed off so I'm not listening to that, she's crazy'. In a way, 'Younger Now' is really about ageism and sexism too because I feel like as women get older it's so hard, and I'm watching Madonna do it with such grace and such style and people still attack her... People just want to talk about how she shouldn't do a f\*\*king cartwheel at the Super Bowl and it's like, why? Why can't you still wear a grill, why can't you still be a part of pop culture?"

# Speaking of iconic women, your godmother, Dolly Parton, is on the album. She mentions Dollywood, which got me thinking: Rainbow Land theme park...

"That's actually a genius idea. I like to think that I already live at the Rainbow Land theme park. My house is completely rainbow."

# And 'Rainbowland' is also the name of the song you wrote together...

"Yep, and it's also very political. One line is such a Dolly lyric – it says, 'We are rainbows, me and you / Every colour, every hue'. And it's about all these different races and genders and religions, if we all did come together to create and said, 'Hey, we're different, that's awesome, let's not change to be the same, let's stay different but let's come together anyway.' Because a rainbow's not a rainbow without all the different colours."

# You've mentioned politics a few times, and you were a vocal supporter of Bernie Sanders and, later, Hillary Clinton. Where's the global politics on the album?

"Well, 'Inspired', I wrote that for Hillary Clinton [but] I'm not fighting fire with fire, hate with hate. I'm fighting hate with love. I'm doing this concert this week in Vegas and for 'Party In The USA' the screens will say 'education' and 'healthcare' and 'equality',





'justice', 'freedom', 'liberation', 'expression'. These things are what make up our country. It's not a party in the USA if it's filled with hate, discrimination, walls, violence, all these things."

# Do you regret saying that you would leave the USA if Trump won?

"I didn't leave the country."

### Exactly.

"I'm not f\*\*king leaving the country, that's some ignorant s\*\*t, that's dumb. Because that's me abandoning my country when I think I've got a good thing to say to my country. And trust me, I hear every day on my Instagram, 'Just leave already! When are you going to leave?' Well, that's not going to be any good. Does it really matter where I am? Because wherever I am, my f\*\*king voice is gonna be heard, and I'll make sure of it."

# Did you know there's a university course you can do called 'The Sociology of Miley Cyrus'?

"I've heard about that."

# Apparently it examines identity, entertainment, media and fame using you as a lens. What advice would you give to the students? "I would say that for what I do there isn't a divide between fame, music, socials, being who you are, identity.

The part of that I think is the most important would be identity and allowing your identity to inspire and to have your music and to have everything that you put out visually to coincide with your identity. And not have, for example, a Hannah Montana life... Not have the real you and the famous you. Because I think there are people living that... There are Hannah Montanas in this f\*\*king industry. 

# THEY LOVE BRITISH MUSIC

Throughout the writing of 'Antisocialites', songwriter and vocalist Molly Rankin would revisit great British music for inspiration. Foremost among these was an 📱 ultra-rare vinyl LP – 'Demonstration Tapes' by '70s pop-punks Dolly Mixture ("I'd been looking for it for years") - given to her by her brother, while others on heavy rotation were Brummie jangle-pop band Felt and The Smiths. Though it may not be totally obvious from their tunes, Alvvays are also big Oasis fans – the first song Molly learned to play on I guitar was 'Don't Look Back In Anger'. 'Those songs are so huge and 📕 anthemic and classic," Molly says. "It's hard to find a band who have done something like that." The band drove miles out of Toronto looking for a cinema where Supersonic, the 2016 documentary about the vertiginous rise of Oasis, wasn't sold out. "We got on the highway and went to the suburbs to watch it," Molly recalls. "It was so much fun - it's wild what they went through." Weirdly, she adds, "I feel like when I go over to the UK I really have to defend that band." Alright, hands up, who was it?

# THEY'RE FROM THE FROZEN NORTH

The core four of the band

– Molly, guitarist Alec, keyboardist
Kerri and bassist Brian – grew up on
the remote east coast of Canada, on
islands that stretched into the Atlantic,
and it's undoubtedly had an influence
on their music. Molly's description of it
makes it sound like the birthplace of
magic: "It's very Scottish – hilly, with
foliage that's very grown in and wild.
You can go somewhere in Cape Breton
and feel like no one has ever walked
where you're walking before."

# THEY'RE OBSESSED WITH WATER

Alvvays' discography contains tons of references to water. 'Forget About Life' has Molly thinking of "going in the lake and swallowing". On 'In Undertow' she reads love as a lethal riptide. 'Next Of Kin' has a lover drowning in a (hopefully metaphorical) river. "I left a place that is surrounded by water," says lyricist Molly, "and now I sometimes look back on where I came from and think about all of that accessible water and space. There is still so much to be discovered. That element of wonder is still there. But it's lethal too, right? "Oh yeah, it's dangerous. I'm a horrible swimmer."

# MOLLY USED TO TOUR ARENAS WITH HER FAMILY'S FOLK BAND

Having grown up in The Rankin Family band – which has received six of Canada's prestigious Juno Awards to date – Molly wrote a song called 'Sunset' for their 2007 album 'Reunion' and went on to tour arenas with them as a fiddle player. Speaking about the song now, she says, "I think it's got sort of a country vibe... I'm not entirely sure what I was going for. I hadn't heard really many rock bands and I didn't really know what my taste was. It's a strange synthesis of my childhood influences." In Cape Breton, families entertain one another with musical instruments "because there isn't a whole lot there," she says. It all sounds a bit von Trapp - was it? "You're not that far away," Molly replies.

# THEIR NEW ALBUM IS "A FANTASY BREAK-UP ARC"

Where album one tended to rail knowingly against conventional marriage ('Archie, Marry Me', 'Atop A Cake'), Molly says 'Antisocialites' is all about splits. "It's got scenes of separation and discovery. Even though the songs are all slightly different in their narrative, there is this underlying theme of escapism and separation – it takes you through all the stages of a break-up."

THEY LOVE PLAYING LIVE

"Playing shows is the most gratifying part of being in a band," Molly says – and she would know. In their time, the band has supported loads of great artists – Belle And Sebastian, Chvrches, Courtney Barnett and Real Estate among them – and across five UK visits since the release of their self-titled 2014 debut, Alvvays have played 50 shows here. They love the vibe. "It's such an old place," says Molly. "Like, going to Bristol and seeing Kirsty MacColl posters on the wall. That's pretty neat."

METHOD: "Get a motherf\*\*king octopus. You can leave the head on, take the head off – whatever you wanna do – but you must remember to remove the beak. The beak is extremely sharp and it will f\*\*k you up bad.

"Lay the octopus in a shallow circular Le Creuset pan. Add a s\*\*t-ton of olive oil, a couple of garlic cloves, some Calabrian chillies and the cork of a beautiful natural wine. Now you cover that up with tin foil and you bake that for two hours at 165°C."

**EGGS AND PEPPERS** 

**DIFFICULTY:** "It's easy but it's not that easy. You just have to practise for years and years and years."

METHOD: "You fry long hot peppers, turn the heat low, crack the eggs on top of them and break the yolks to cook on a low heat. Then you add the white truffle oil. It takes a lot of technique. Everyone's going to make it different, it takes a very light hand, judging how long the eggs need to cook – the egg needs to be a specific way."

**ACTION SAYS:** "This is a peasant meal that just transcends gastronomy for some reason. Peppers, when they're fried, they give off this flavour of home to me. They just taste like my grandmother's life, you know? So I have this unbelievable nostalgic feel, and then it transcends everything once you put white truffle oil over it. It's just a phenomenal taste."



# A bit about the book

Action, your book's called F\*\*k, That's Delicious. Who's it for?

"I would love everybody in the motherf\*\*king world to love it, that's really my goal. It's a universal-type thing – it has a bunch of different things that I feel everyone can relate to. It's nostalgia, it's got real-deal culinary aspects, it's an overall f\*\*king production. It's not targeted towards anyone, but you know what? I do feel like it could be the turning point of a new modern age – a new style of cookbook. It's not the same format as has been done millions of times – it's a totally new thing."

Wow. So what would you tell students about these recipes if they're cooking for themselves for the first time?

"I feel like once you read this book you're an expert. It's so easy and approachable and allows you to not be nervous and worry about having people judge you, because f\*\*k it, you know things are just gonna taste good. I got you. Trust me."

Has it been hard balancing the book with your new album 'Blue Chips 7000'?

Chips 7000'?



Cyrus' sixth album sees her going all country and western



SHE MIGHT STILL BE ONLY 24, but Miley Cyrus's career has

already come full circle. The child of country royalty – her father is Billy Ray Cyrus of 'Achy Breaky Heart' fame, her godmother

Dolly Parton and Waylon
Jennings showed her how to
play guitar – she broke out over
a decade ago as tween idol
Hannah Montana. After
becoming a global sensation
she began releasing records
under her own name, pivoting
from straight-up pop to naked
wrecking-ball swinging and
experimental psychedelic weed
rock faster than it took Taylor
Swift to start morphing into

Lorde. But now Miley has put the bong back on the shelf, slipped her cowboy boots back on and returned to her Tennessee roots.

From the exceptional cover art - which sees her guiffed. rhinestoned and leathered up like the love child of Elvis and Lady Gaga - to the tight 11 tracks inside, this is a glossy mainstream version of the Nashville sound that has more in common with Shania Twain than the new school of cool country, like Third Man Records signing Margo Price. Miley's version of country music. however, retains the edge she's spent the past five vears cultivating: the jaunty 'Rainbowland' - which features backing vocals from Dolly hints at her LGBTQ activism. while the delicate, fiddle-laced

'Inspired' - which was debuted at the One Love Manchester benefit concert - was written with Hillary Clinton, for whom Miley vocally campaigned last vear, in mind. This is by no means a political album. however - more the sound of a voung woman having fun with her history. The title track is a meditative justification of her multiple personalities ("Change is a thing you can count on"), 'Malibu' an EDM Mumford & Sons, 'I Would Die For You' a soppy No-Doubt-by-wayof-Dixie-Chicks ballad, and 'Love Someone' lets her inner darkness show. Who knows which Miley Cyrus will emerge after the rootsy and real 'Younger Now', but we recommend enjoying Country Miley for as long as she lasts. **Leonie Cooper**

Wolf Alice's second album is bold, brave and magnificent

Visions Of A Life

BOLD ECLECTIC CINEMATIC

"IF WE HAD AN inkling of an idea, even if it seemed a bit silly, we'd try it out and see what happened," Ellie Rowsell said earlier this year about the

Rowsell said earlier this year about the making of Wolf Alice's second album. 'Visions Of A Life'.

Spoiler alert: what happened was the London band making a record so bold, brave and jaw-droppingly advanced it should sound out a secret "album of the year" message when played backwards.

In some ways, Wolf Alice's second album is an extension of their 2015 debut. 'My Love

Is Cool'. That excellent record was restless, too, flitting from hypnotic, electronic folk to teeth-baring rock. Some of the little ideas buried in its songs are

blown up life-size here – the thundering guitars of the

doom-y, shape-shifting title track are reminiscent of 'Giant Peach''s hefty finale, while the mid-air meltdown of 'Sky Musings' takes 'The Wonderwhy''s spoken word and laces it through the whole ominous track.

More than that, though, 'Visions Of A Life' is a vast improvement on an already supreme foundation. Bassist Theo Ellis and Joel Amey's rhythm section propels each song with just the right combination of intricacy and immediacy. 'Formidable Cool' is Wolf Al at their nastiest – guitarist Joff Oddie's riff is tumbling and sleazy, while its savage breaking point has Ellie howling, "That's all he f\*\*king

did when he f\*\*ked you on the floor!" Far softer, 'After The Zero Hour' is a choral beauty more fit for churches than the sticky-floored arenas the Londoners are headed for.

It's 'Don't Delete The Kisses' that lifts things to astronomical new heights, though. With whirring guitars straight from Blur's 'Essex Dogs' and a glittering, swirling melody, it's a cinematic glory that has the potential to become a modern classic. Ellie said she wanted to write "one of those head-out-the-window driving tunes", but it feels more like soaring light years above Earth with enough butterflies in your stomach to carry you all the way home.

# V for Victory

The Horrors are onto a winner with their bolshy fifth album

THE HORRORS

PSYCH ELECTRO GLOOM

IT'S TEMPTING to read the title of The Horrors' fifth album as a symbol of its sleek, solid contents, but frontman Faris

Badwan also wants you to read the 'V' as "a f\*\*k-you, in a British, two-fingers way." He

adds, "We thought it was funny."
But 'V' will raise more
eyebrows than smiles. Over the

eyebrows than smiles. Over the past 10 years, the Southendformed quintet have engorged their doomy garage-rock with

> psychedelia, shoegaze and electro, and they seem to be toasting their recent support slot with Depeche Mode with this 10-song, hour-long strut through dry ice and – somewhat

improbably – towards the arena. For the first time, the band are working with producer Paul Epworth, the man behind Madchester legends The Stone Roses. Newly signed to Epworth's label Wolf Tone, and following up 'Luminous' (an album they reckon "could have been better"), the band have responded by unleashing their ballsiest selves.

Almost all the songs here last longer than five minutes: we're a long way from their garage-punk debut 'Sheena Is A Parasite'. Stomping lead single 'Machine' epitomises The Horrors' newly assured swagger; baggy dawdler 'Press Enter To Exit' throws in a cheeky false ending: and on album opener 'Hologram' - shaved down from its original state as a 25-minute ambient house banger -Badwan channels his inner Brandon Flowers to ask. "Are we hologram? Are we vision?". Elsewhere the

bursts of emotion. Silky kiss-off 'Point Of No Reply' builds to a crackling climax as Faris mourns, "I'm fighting the fire and you're fanning the flames," while 'Weighed Down' finds him groaning, "Don't let love bring you down" over bassy squalls.

The real revelation, though. is the glittering seven-minute closer 'Something To Remember Me Bv', built around a pulsing synth line that nods unexpectedly to New Order. "In true Horrors self-destructive fashion," they revealed upon its rapturous reception, "we nearly left this off the record entirely." Thank God they didn't: it's a barriersmashing victory march, opening up an entirely new avenue for the band to explore. Larry Bartleet



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# Idles

Snarling punk that encapsulates the state of the nation

BRISTOL BAND IDLES' debut album 'Brutalism' is an expletive-laden punk triumph that tackles Tory rule, toxic masculinity and mental health. On the eve of their biggest ever gig, supporting Foo Fighters at London's O2, we find frontman Joe Talbot is still calling the shots as he sees them.

## The band has been going since 2009 – so it's been a long slog to get to this point, hasn't it?

"Yeah, but we were s\*\*t for about six years anyway. We had good songs but were not good as a unit or as a live act. We weren't ready to make an album or anything, so when we made it last year, it probably came at the right time. If it came earlier, we'd probably have pissed it up the wall."

You've said that Kanye West's 2013 album 'Yeezus' had a big influence on 'Brutalism'. Why so?

"Well, just its stark bravery. It's



like a f\*\*king jackhammer. There was nothing else that sounded like it at the time. It just made us realise that we don't have to write something to please anyone but ourselves, because if we don't please ourselves then we're just f\*\*king bulls\*\*tting."

There's a lot of dark humour

### in your lyrics. Does that help tackle the current s\*\*tshow?

"The humour's supposed to actually be the most caustic part of the album. It's funny but it's also tragic. But the stuff that I'm taking the piss out of is actually the stuff that I f\*\*king hate the most. I think people get angry about my lyrics – but they

all actually make complete sense to me. I'm not f\*\*king Leonard Cohen. Does it have to f\*\*king change your world? It's changed mine. F\*\*k off!"

### Do you feel like there's hope for Britain's next generation of youngsters?


"Yeah, there's gotta be hope.
