

THE first thing that struck me about Nashville, Tennessee, was that, although it might be regarded throughout the world as the home of country music, both the city and its citizens just couldn't care less!

"So you're a British journalist, are you?" said one drugstore assistant, spotting my hot, un-

comfortable tweeds and un-accustomed whiskers. "Welt, one of the things your should write about is that we're sick of 'Grand Ole Opry' and hillbilly music . . ."

The radio stations, particularly WSM and WENO which feature hillibily records for a great deal of their time, are beamed over a large area of the South and South-West. They do not rely on local listeners for their support.

The travel guides to the city refer obliquely to the record industry located there, but nowhere is there a mention of Hank Williams, Hank Snow or Jim Reeves. Country music is the Cinderella of Nashville.

Nashville. I talked to the old policeman stationed at the door of Ryman Auditorium—he had been there since Hank Williams himself starred in Grand Ole Opry.

"The good old days are gone, now", he said ruefully. "There's too much pop stuff on the show these days. There was a time when every artist on these broadeasts would be a genuine country singer — and com-petition was really hot.

"The crowds would stretch right down the street then. You couldn't get a seat for love nor money. Thousands were turned

away on Saturday nights. Some-times there are empty seats now, with all this erooning and com-mercial singing. I can remember whee Hank would hold the whole theztre-full with one num-ber. They can't do it now."


