



"And why, dear doctor, do I keep buying the damn record every day and reciting the catchline as it it were the most original joke on earth?"


Record Mirror research into the effect on the mental health of the nation of the country's best selling single (well over three quarters of a million already and rising at about 50,000 a day) has finally revealed the answer to the first question at least.

Working itrelesally through the night (the only time people aren't shouting "Shaddup You Face" at each other) we discovered Joe Dolce belongs to that rare mixed ethnic outl of Italian American Australians. the Pastatarians, who are using the one off novelty hit technique perfected by fellow Cobber Rolf Harris with "Two Little Boys" in 1969.

Born in Ohio 34 years ago of Italian American parents, Joe formed his lirst rock band at the age of 19. He was a minor success as a songwriter in the early and mid seventies when he started his involvement with a poetry music fusion group. And as he doesn't seem able or willing to vary his singing style, he lays a patina of sameness over the whole album. He has a pronounced southern English way of singing "day" as "di"—a style that was used a lot in the sixties.

Fortunately, it's possible to enjoy most of the album without getting too lied up with the quality of the words. The title track 'Magnets' manages to pull out of the mould by beginning acoustically and leading into an echoey vocal. From there, they build the layers of bass and drums into a chunky platform of sound, almost but not quite getting to a heavy metal level. But the song is too tight and controlled to get that far and it turned out quite impressively. It marks a determined and successful push away from their usual style.

Throughout, the playing is snappy and efficient, which goes a long way to offset the indulgence elsewhere. The album is a big step forward from the last album 'Nuclear Days', but not really a big step for mankind. However, it was enjoyable and in places as clever as 'Japanese'. It can only mean they are capable of doing even better and the music points to a more productive future. 'Jimmie Jones', with its excellent catchline chorus should go a long way to establishing the band in their own country and giving them more of a Jam -type live following. There aren't that many really good pop bands that fly the flag: the Vapors have the opportunity and ability to corner their market. + + +

The answer could just be yes.

Mind you a quick spin of side one of 'Don't Point Your Finger' would send any true blues fan screaming for Clarence 'Gatemouth' Brown's 'San Antonio Ballbuster' or Little Johnny Taylor's 'I Shoulda Been A Preacher'.

Despite the occasional sound deficiencies these seminal collections from the lifties and middle sixties respectively chart the evolution of the music into jazz and osut with a frechnese and a vibrancy that make much of 9 Below Zero's reperioire seem a frenzied thrash. Luckly side two tells a different truth entirely and shows this guitar and harmonica led combo have something of their own identity and character. Stylistically the six songs are more adventurous, which helps a lot. SLADE: 'We'll Bring The House Down' (Cheapskate SKATE 1) By Mike Nicholls

THE SLADE revival has been something of an ongoing affair, stretching back at least as far as 73's commendable 'Return To Base' and a sprinkling of dynamic Music Machine dates around that time.

These conveyed a refreshing circa '72 all-avin' - fun - together atmosphere a million miles away from the current gang war attitude that dictates one must be a futurist rockabilly / skinhead / headbanger etc. So why are they continuing to gain ground now?

Well, whatever the escapist merits of rew Romanticism, there's still a fair bit to be said about the properties of getting down and getting with it, the kind of grass roots entertainment that Stade personity. Plus however loud and raucous they are, they can still write songs — y'know, those old -fashioned, well - rounded things with structures, story - lines and nest, irresisible hooks.

hooks.

Here the latter are represented by 'Wheels Ain't Coming Down' and 'Lemme Love Into Ya.' The first is about the relief of finding out that the aircraft you're on isn't so dodgy after all and thus is an honest evocation of that good to be alive feeling so befoved by

The second is a surprisingly progressive allad, slow, splintery and awash with more ynthesised effects. Yep, Slade can be experimental but since their ace card has lawys been to seduce with the most banal if lootball terrace chants, it's here that they really excel.

Not even the remorseless repetition of "Nuts, botts and screws / I heard it on the News" grates foo badly though "When I'm Dancin' I Ain't Fighth" does truly become a bit of a pain. The concept of "It's so bad that it's good" also rears its head on 'Hold On To Your Hats' which with a bit of luck won't be released as their next 45.

released as their nart 45.

Elsewhere Noddy, Dave and the boys show a goodly capacity for variety, their manager's My Baby's Got it' a reasonable rockabilly rip off and Chuck Berry's 'I'm A Rocker's vindication of their pub rock roots.

At the same time this is something of a double - edged sword: Too untamed for parties and too undanceable for discos, it's difficult to justify a record like this on its own terms. Slade are essentially a live act and on vinyl the vital ingredient of spit beer is sorely missed. But all things considered the pros outweigh the cons, a point which is unlikely to escape the attention of the fans who've put them back in the singles chart.

#### MORE: 'Warhead' (Atlantic K50775) By Malcolm Dome



I WASN T quite sure, how to approach this record or the reviewing of it, rather. But knowing virtually nothing about Linx or "BritFunk" proved to be no hindrance to my erjoyment of a superb debut LP.

The impression I'd received from their press coverage was that Linx is a two-man operation, rung by singer David Grant and bass player Sketch, but I'm told that these days it is very much A Band. Their playing and production is so polished as to suggest that this must be the case; the musical impression given is of a very light unit indeed, rather than simply skifful individual players.

David Grant is possessed of a remarkable volce, with far more range (both in musical and emotional terms) than you might have expected, it, like me, you'd only heard their hit single. You're Lying' At times, for example on the opening 'Wonder What You're Doing Now', he sounded like a little young. Stevie Wonder, but more lithe and less frantic.

He handles a slow song beautifully, too, as on 'Their's Love', an intelligently written song about that most confusing of conditions. 'Intuition' itself the new single is a shuous delight but that hopefully will do better than its predecessor, a pleasant but unsatiting 'Rise And Skine', which is also included here.

Going back to the line-up for a moment, besides Grant and Sketch the Linx players are Ancy Duncan on drums. Canute Edwards on guitar and Bob Carter, one-time Hazel O'Connor sideman on keyboards. With no disrespect to Hazel intended, it seems extraordinary that someone capable of playing music like this could ever have wanted to be part of a standard rock band. You see after listening to Linx your average rock record sounds curiously bumpy and flat footed, so gracaful are Linx's songs and performance.

A COMPILATION from Decca which no doubt is intended to capitalise on the re-emergence of Marianne Faithfull as a rock force. The songs are all culled from the early to late sixties. The title track, "Come And Stay With Me' and "Is This What I Get For Loving You Baby", a number written by Phil Spector, have all previously been issued as singles. If you own the more recent Faithfull material, it'll be interesting to compare both the chole of songs and the actual presentation, with

There are a number of cover songs on the record, including a delightful version of Lennon-McCartney's "Yesterday' complete with brass band, and 'House Of The Rising Sun' which interprets the theme a little better than Burdon's classic but its basically unmoving series of blues shouting.

'Sister Morphine', the song Martanne composed along with Mick Jagger and Keith Richards, is a carbon of the Stones's version which appeared on 'Sticky Fingers'. The only obvious difference is the female vocals, and as with 'House Of The Rising Sun', these unfamiliar strains lend a new dimension to the recording.

For me the highlight of an album which contains many highlights is split between two utter gems. Firstly, "Tomorrow Calling", which if Decca decide to release any singles from this album would be the perfect choice. A plaintive melody

perfect choice. A plaintive melody over a light backing, one to make people stop and listen. And secondly, the Donovan composition 'Sunny Goodge Street' — complete with walling harmonica and an almost Kinks style acoustic backing. The sound quality of the album is authentically sixties, nine of the fourteen cuts being re-processed for stereo. It's a shame that the cover pic is taken from a recent selection, as the whole marvellous package would really be complete with a presentation to suit the period. But one doesn't mark for the cover and the music warrants both public interest and the highest order available to this miserable scribe.

#### **BILLY CONNOLLY: 'Live'** (Transatlantic TRS 103) By Mark Hinchliffe

WHAT'S great about Billy Connolly is the things he is not.
He is not pretentious, he's not a stand-up comic, he's not a rocker, he's not a punk, he's not a poet and he's not holler than thou. This album, recorded live in 1972, presents Connolly as an observer of all things great and small ... and still relevant to the 80s.
Connolly leaps around on subject matter, but comic licence veils a charge of having too many pies and not enough fingers. From a sensitive ballad about small people he moves into a political mood piece, which is in his own words, "a wee observation of the state of the country." It's called 'Donkey'.

And such pensive material co-exists with boozy, loose rollicking tracks like 'Stainless Steel Wellies'

tracks like 'Stainless Steel Wellies' sung to the tune of 'High Heeled Sneakers'. In one inter-song comic monologue Connolly jokes about his hippy past. 'Bringing out the old family album' humour works well with an audience that doesn't mind a personal jibe. But in retrospect the joke's on Connolly ... hippy past? He still is a hippy. IT HAD to happen! The image had to crack!! Yes, Elvis smiled!! It seems ceclining record sales and loss of "pop star" potential has necessitated a change in altitude. So 26 songs in 62 minutes and nary a frown throughout. Value for money or what?

Not only that but there's also acknowledgement of the fact that there's an audience out there. Hence witty asides like introducing "Clubland" as his (stiffed) Xmas single. And when the very mention of Trust' garnered a Crackerjack-style reception, he wryly prided himself that at least some people bought it.

But the main events were the smiles: big ones for happy songs, little smiles for sad songs and coy ones over the top of his shades to make sure the clever lines didn't go unnoticed. Yep, there was expressiveness in abundance and before gibbering any further let me tell you that this was the most faultless performance! 've ever seen—from Elvis at any rate. Having honed his songs and his band to excruciating lightness, there's now time to concentrate on the visuals. Essential with most acts anyway, but not him as a result of the extraordinary quality of the goods in every other department. Sure the tunes still come as thick and fast as machine gun shells but amongst them are pure pearl mini-epics one wouldn't have thought him capable of. Whereas: Big Tears' merely showed compassion. Clowntime Is Over' put Laurence Olivier's acting on a par with Tweetie Pie's. Head held in angst, palms clasped on prayer, it was melodrama itself, whilst 'Hand In Hand' literally choked on its own venom.

Perhaps more important, his voice was stronger than ever, reaching its crooning peak on that masterpiece of paranoia "Watch Your Step" and Merle Haggard's "I'll Take Good Care of You Other covers included a couple of Bobby Blue band songs and his hamesake's Little Sister', a stroke of grand farceny coming over like a fierce crossbreed of Motown's "Rockin" Robin' and Gene Vincent's Be Bop A Lu La'
Yet obviously it's the oldies that go down best and the opening volley of "Pump It Up" 'Radio Radio' / Chelsea' / Oliver's Army' was the most brutal imaginable. The magnificent "King Horse" was preambled with John Cooper Clarke's "I Don't Wanna Be Nice', then after providing the briefest of breathers with the downbeat "Strict Time', it was all systems go with "Possession". Steve Nieve's keyboards driving like a stolen Maserati.

The pacing was as effortlessly inspired throughout, the Jux-taposition of the soaring "From A Whisper To A Scream with the meandering, devious "Watching The Detectives" most breathtaking.

The Detectives most breathtaking.

The next two encores similarly wedded opposite styles. I Can't Stand Up For Falling Down' a neat forerunner to the first album's "Mystery Dance" But with superb judgement, the ultimate delicacy was left until the end. Big Sister's Clothes' boasts the most perceptive lyrics he's ever written, the word-play exemplary even by his standards: "She's got eyes like saucers' Oh you think she's a dish She's the Blue Chip that belongs to the big fish."

Sheer poetry, or as the man himself said on this most auspicious of Sunday nights, "better than going to church, innit?"
