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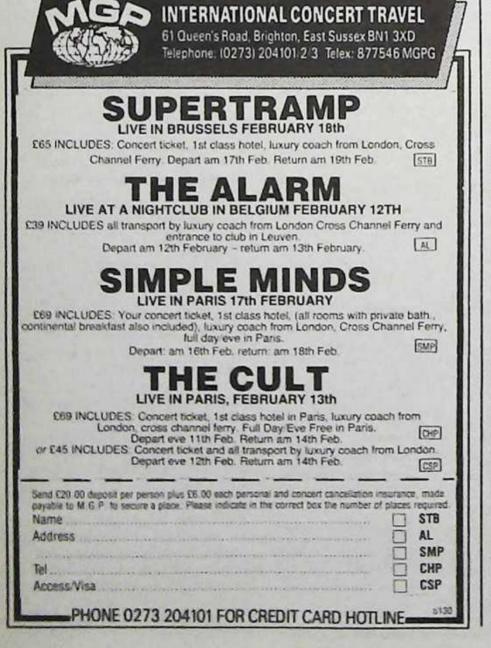
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BANGLES: shaking it in the UK next month

WRIST JOB

THE BANGLES, the LA all-girl band who had a sell-out tour in Britain last year, return to the UK next month for another series of dates.

They have a new single out on January 27 on CBS Records called 'Manic Monday' and their new LP is set for release in March.

The girls start their tour at Portsmouth Polytechnic February I, followed by Croydon Underground 2, Bristol Bierkeller 4, Wolverhampton Polytechnic 5, London University Union 7, Warwick University 8.

ELP'S comeback world tour could be delayed after a tractor crashed into Keith Emerson's home studio in Sussex last week damaging several custom-built keyboards.

Emerson, Lake and (Cozy) Powell's new album is expected to be released by Polydor in March but it's not yet known whether the damaged equipment can be repaired in time for the group's tour which is due to begin in April.

British dates on the tour have not yet been confirmed.

THE BLOW MONKEYS celebrate 1986 with a new single, a new album and a tour. 'Digging Your Scene', the new single, written by Dr Robert, was recorded at Arthur Baker's Shakedown Studios and mixed by the New York band Latin Rascals. The 12-inch features three versions of the title track and 'I Backed A Winner' from their forthcoming album 'Animal Magic'.

The Blow Monkeys will be digging other scenes at Leicester Princess Charlotte January 24, Liverpool Polytechnic 25, Huddersfield Polytechnic 28, Brighton ZAP Club 29, Oxford Polytechnic 30, London School of Economics 31, Bristol University February 1, with more dates to follow.

SOPHIA GEORGE, whose single 'Girlie Girlie' is her first chart success, releases her debut album this week and heads out on a tour next month.

Titled 'Fresh', the album is available on Winner Records (through Jetstar & EMI) from January 24.

Her tour begins at Folkestone Leas Cliff Hall on February 6, then moves on to Torquay 400 Ballroom 7, Tonbridge Wells Assembly Rooms 8, Hammersmith Palais 9, Southampton University 12, Worthing Assembly Hall 13, Manchester PSV Club 14, Liverpool Pavillion 15, Dunstable Queensway Hall 16, Huddersfield Polytechnic 17, Sheffield University 18, Manchester University 22.

GREGORY GRAY, who led Irish band Perfect Crime to modest success a couple of years ago, returns on his own this month with a single called 'Strawberries' on CBS and a batch of gigs with his new band.

Having spent a "fraught and deal-less summer" in Northern Ireland, Gray celebrates the upturn in his fortunes at Guildford Surrey University January 24, Hastings Crypt 27, Bath Moles Club 28, Brighton Savannah 29, Birmingham Polytechnic 31, Southampton University February 1.

GHAIN

Jesus And Mary Chain plan big UK tour but so far, no London dates have been fixed 'because of the band's reputation'

THE JESUS AND MARY CHAIN, who recently topped polls in Sounds and other papers, announce their biggest ever UK tour for February – but have no gigs lined up for London.

Publicist Mick Houghton alleges that certain venues in London were lined up, but the offers were later withdrawn "because of the band's reputation". The last time the band played in London at the Electric Ballroom, the gig

THE SMITHS, The Fall and New Order have announced details of their From Manchester With Love concert which takes place at The Royal Court Theatre in Liverpool on February 8. The concert is in support of the 49 members of the Liverpool Council faced with hefty fines and court costs for defying the Government's rate-capping policy.

Each band will play for 45 minutes, beginning with New Order at 7.30 pm, The Fall at 8.45 pm and The Smiths at 10.15 pm. John Cooper Clarke will provide relief entertainment in between.

And all three bands have announced concerts in their own right this week. The Fall will play Bangor University February 1, Woolwich Coronet 6 and Cambridge Guildhall 13.

Meanwhile The Smiths and New Order each have dates lined up for Ireland. Supported by Stockholm Monsters, New Order play Cork O'Connell Rooms January 22, Dublin SFX Centre 24/25, and Belfast Maisfield Centre 27.

And "in response to overwhelming public demand" The Smiths will perform at Dublin Stadium (tickets at 7.00, 6.50 and 5.50 Irish Punts) February 10 and Belfast Whitla Hall (tickets at £6, £6.50) 12.

MARILLION are giving a charity performance at the Hammersmith Odeon on February 6 in aid of Double O Charity, the organisation Pete Townshend set up to help drug addicts and alcoholics.

The concert, which climaxes Marillion's UK tour on February 6, will include 'several special guests'.

The proceeds will go towards funding existing treatment clinics and rehabilitation centres for people suffering from a range of addictions.

PISTOLS

Court gives Lydon and co the rights to The Sex Pistols' name and frozen royalties and McLaren agrees to settle. Hugh Fielder sees it all happen

THE SEX PISTOLS gained the rights to their name and control of royalties estimated at over £900,000 in an out-of-court settlement with their former manager Malcolm McLaren last week.

John Lydon was understandably pleased outside the court room. "It's nice to win," he told Sounds with relish. "The whole thing was absurd. It should never have

come to court."

However it was Lydon – together with Paul Cook, Steve Jones and Mrs Anne Beverley, mother of Sid Vicious – who started the High Court action against McLaren, who replied with a counter claim 'for services rendered', last Monday.

The money had been held 'in trust' since McLaren's companies Glitterbest and Matrixbest went into receivership in 1979, a year after the group disbanded.

Chief among the company's creditors were the Sex Pistols themselves who claimed that money 'set aside to pay taxes' had in fact been used to finance the film The Great Rock And Roll Swindle.

Lydon's counsel Mr John

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turned into a riot, with equipment and the hall fittings being smashed. Police had to be called in.

But their agency maintains that no dates have been arranged yet "because the band have chosen not to play in London". This is down to shortage of time, they say, and venues are prepared to put on The Jesus And Mary Chain,

when the band decide to play in mid-April.

Dates for the tour confirmed so far are Aberdeen The Venue January 31, Glasgow Barrowlands February 1, Sheffield University 3, Coventry Polytechnic 4, Blackburn King George's Hall 5, University of East Anglia 7, Liverpool Royal Court 10, Nottingham Rock City 11.

Tickets are on sale from the Odeon Box Office and usual ticket agencies priced £10.00, £8.00 and £6.00.

OZZY OSBOURNE has denied newspaper reports that he is being sued by the parents of a California boy who killed himself after listening to one of his songs.

John McCollum, aged 19, shot himself with his father's pistol.

And his father claims he had been listening to 'Suicide Solution',
a 1980 Ozzy number.

But although his parents have denounced Ozzy's lyrics as 'satanic-influenced', Ozzy has not so far received any legal communications over the incident.

He's currently more concerned over the fate of the poster bag on his 'Shot In The Dark' single which has been 'toned down' from the original design. The young damsel pictured at the gates of hell now has more clothes and fewer crucifixes about her person.

Meanwhile, more dates have been added to his tour. He plays Nottingham Royal Centre February 27, Newcastle Mayfair 28, Ipswich Gaumont March 2, Leicester De Montfort Hall 3, Bradford St Georges 4.

MOTORHEAD have finally won their freedom from Bronze and are setting up a new label called GWR Records.

They are now working on their first studio album since 'Another Perfect Day' three years ago, which should be out in April.

Meanwhile their back catalogue is among 94 albums acquired by Legacy this week from Bronze, whose future now looks bleak.

BOMBZ BLITZ BRITS

THE CHERRY BOMBZ have found a replacement for bassist Tim Caltio, who is joining Johnny Thunders' Band as a second guitarist on their forthcoming tour.

He is Dave Tregunna, former member of The Lords Of The New Church, who will join the band on their first major British tour which starts next week.

Tying in with the tour is the release of a Cherry Bombz EP, called 'Hot Girls In Love', which is released on February 7 on Lick (through Pinnacle).

It boasts the sultry-named tracks '100 Degrees In The Shade' and 'Feline Feeling' plus a version of the Hanoi Rocks number 'Oil And Gasoline'.

Joe's Big City Beat . . .

JOE JACKSON comes back the hard way in New York this week.

He plays a three night stint at the Roundabout Theatre which will be recorded directly onto a two-track master for a live album called 'Big World'.

Joe has been working up a set of new material at a series of club dates with his band, who include guitarist Vinnie Zummo and drummer Gary Burke (ex-Garland Jeffreys and Rolling Thunder Review) together with former Red Noise bassist Rick Ford.

'Big City' will be Joe's seventh album and will mark the end of a two-year recording gap during which time he has settled in New York.

WIN A MILLION

McDonnell opened the case by asking Mr Justice Mervyn Davis to rule that the name The Sex Pistols belonged to the group, not to McLaren, to set aside the Pistols' management agreement with McLaren in 1976, and for the group's accounts to be re-worked.

On Tuesday the judge ruled in favour of The Pistols on both counts and negotiations for a settlement started almost at once. But on Thursday morning, when the court was due to resume, the settlement was still incomplete.

Lydon, in a white overcoat and orange hair, and McLaren in a wing-collar and lace-up boots, sat at opposite ends of the sombre gothic hall outside the courtroom while bewigged barristers carrying bundles of documents and PIL album sleeves huddled in a variety of groups in between.

An hour and a half later, the court hearing finally got underway with Mr McDonnell telling the judge that a settlement was "within grasp". New contracts were now being signed and one more was being brought over from "another part of London" to complete the settlement.

Lydon was in court sitting next to Mrs Beverley but McLaren had gone. He wasn't there after lunch either, when Mr McDonnell was able to report that McLaren had handed over to the group the two companies, Glitterbest and Matrixbest "in return for which mutual releases have been entered into". McLaren

had also dropped his counter claim against the group.

Lydon and the other Pistols

immediately became the new directors of Glitterbest and Matrixbest and now have access to the frozen royalties. But the saga is likely to continue as the Glitterbest accounts are unravelled and Lydon attempts to locate unpaid royalties.

As the media began to crowd round Lydon after the hearing, he reacted by exclaiming "It's all mine – mine personally" and finally turned on a radio microphone with "that's a typically stupid BBC question."

Pausing only to add "Now go out and buy my new single, "Rise' – it's already been played on Capital!" he stalked away.

THE AGE OF CHANCE, the Leeds band who claim to be 'the most thrilling, primitive incarnation of raw-pop gut beauty in the world' (and they're on this week's cover and pages 8 and 9 to prove it), have a new single out this week on Riot Bible (through the Cartel).

NELSON'S NOSEDIVE

Cocaine free-basing may have started fire that caused 'plane deaths, say crash investigators

PICK NELSON may have contributed to the plane crash that killed him last month. Investigators trying to find out the cause of the crash believe the fire on board was started while Rick and his band were free-basing cocaine.

Propellants from aerosol cans which are used to help the free-basing process – in which ether or ammonia is mixed with cocaine to remove the impurities – were found in the wreckage.

A post mortem on Nelson revealed that he had taken a large quantity of cocaine before the crash. And his former wife claimed he was addicted to the drug during their divorce proceedings in 1982. Investigators also think that everyone on the plane might have survived if the fire had not started

plane might have survived if the fire had not starte in the passenger cabin.

SHALAMAR's Howard Hewett was arrested on drug charges last week in Miami.

Hewett, a born-again Christian, was charged along with his fiancée after allegedly trying to sell cocaine to plain clothes police officers in a Miami bar.

And lke Turner, former husband of Tina, found himself in similar trouble in Holywood when police reportedly found an once of cocaine in his car after they'd stopped him on a 'routine check'. They also found a loaded pistol on the back seat.

ANNIE LENNOX of The Eurythmics returns to live work after an absence of more than a year when she joins the line-up for the Colombian Volcano Appeal at London's Royal Festival Hall on February 9.

She joins a line-up that already includes Chrissie Hynde and Pretenders guitarist Robbie McIntosh, Pete Townshend and Dave Gilmour, Working Week and The Communards. And more names will be added shortly.

Tickets are priced at £20, £15, £10 and £6 from the box office.

The Eurythmics spent last year off the road while Annie underwent treatment for voice strain, although they made their presence felt in the chart with various hits from their 'Be Yourself Tonight' album.

Annie and Dave Stewart are expected to tour again this year although no plans have yet been confirmed.

CABARET VOLTAIRE head out on a rare tour – as opposed to their usual oneoff dates – next month.

The Cabs, who last year released a video Gasoline In Your Eye on Virgin Vision/ Doublevision plus an album 'The Covenant The Sword And The Arm Of The Lord' which did well in the indie charts, are hiring a drummer specially for the tour.

THE SPECIALS doing some hi-rise living

STEVEN HAMM of Corby writes: "I don't think I've ever seen a discography of the Specials/Special AKA, or a complete listing of their 2-Tone label. It's the group in its various incarnations that I'm particularly interested in, but I guess if you were to do a complete 2-Tone list, that would include all the Specials stuff as they haven't recorded for anyone

Well, you're right; I've never covered either in these pages, and it IS well overdue, etc etc.

The Specials' first release was, of course, the first 2-Tone record. The label was a small independent, owned and run by the band. It got national distribution through Spartan.

2-Tone TT 1/TT 2 'Gangsters'/The Selecter - 'The Selecter' Jul 1979 Note that the single had the unique feature of a different catalogue number for each side, something which was presumably thought fitting for a record with a song by a different group on the flip; these were, effectively, the label's first two releases, albeit sandwiched together.

'Gangsters', of course, became a major chart hit. One of the immediate results of the success was that Special AKA were offered a long-term deal with Chrysalis, which they agreed to only on their own unique terms - Chrysalis signed not only them, but took on the 2-Tone label and its roster of acts to be, as well. The only real changes were that the Chrysalis presence was indicated henceforth by the addition of the extra prefix CHS before the TT and catalogue number on all subsequent releases, and that PolyGram rather than Spartan now distributed 2-Tone, thus excluding its records from the indie charts.

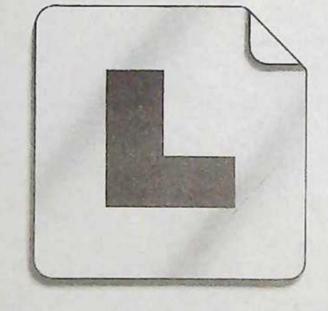

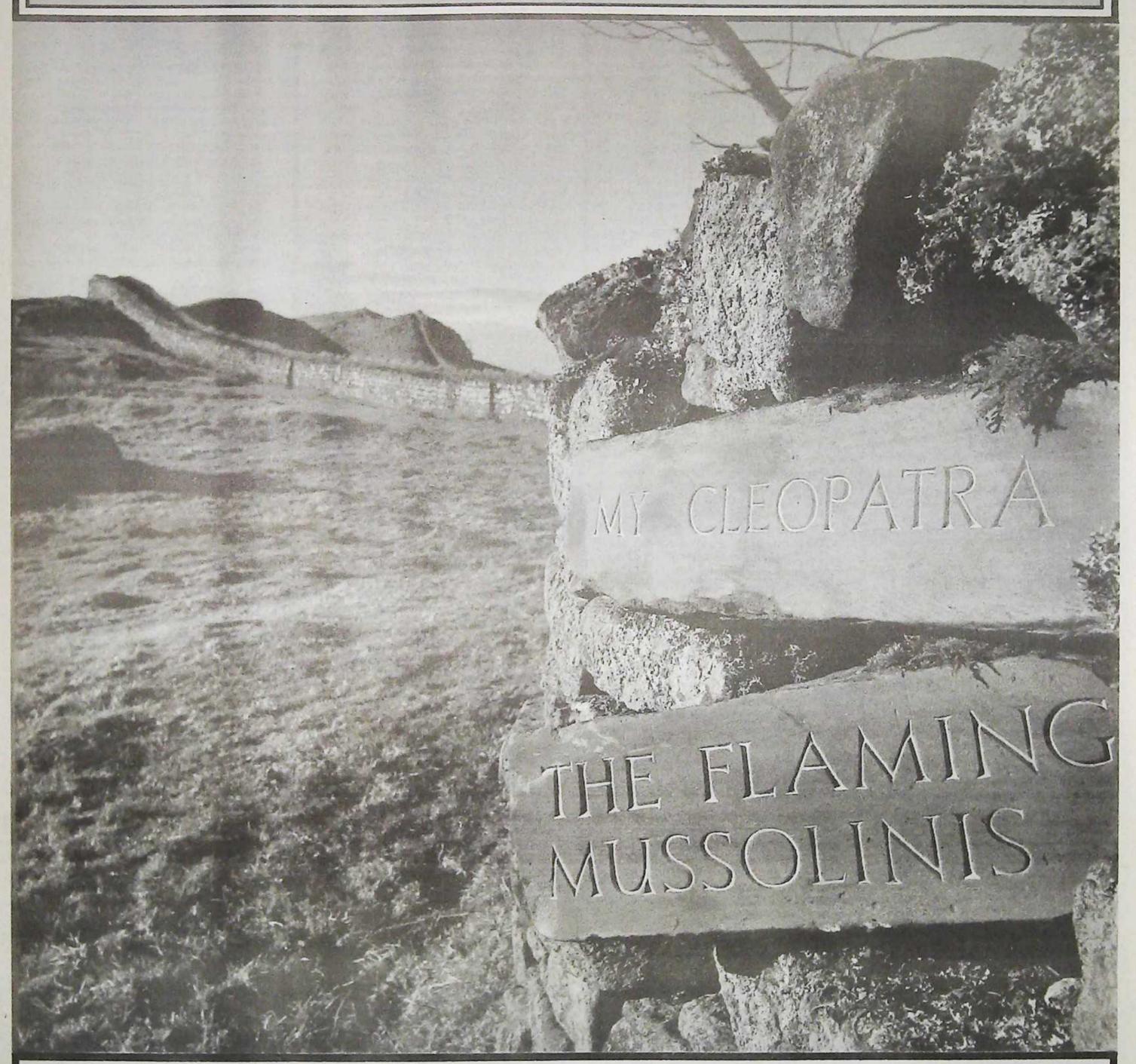

ROM NOW on this will be your God. Commandments: Be L-Louder. Be More Beautiful. Be Unreasonable.

When (in a hurry at last) I meet the new messiahs, thunderbolts are thin on the ground. We watch afternoon television. We're in Leeds.

Then we go to church. This should be something. It is. It's cold. I shiver and read a book called Jesus Goes Pop! while Age Of Chance shiver even more and pose for photographs. Their new (second) single bears the title 'Bible Of The Beats'. It's a row.

Their first, 'Motor City', would've been SOTW if 'You Trip Me Up' hadn't come out the same week. Despite this it made John Peel's festive 50 and remains a rampant

Age Of Chance are Steven E (mob orator), Geoff T (bass frequencies), Jan P (m-metronome), and Neil H (duelling cathedrals). They believe they are "the most thrilling, primitive incarnation of raw-POP gut beauty in the world", you see. I play their records almost as often as I pee. Extracts from the Riot Bible. One learns to pray.

We go to the shopping precinct. What makes you think you're too real to be real?

Jan: "We just are."

Geoff: "We're just vivid."

Neil: "We're beyond reality. We're romantic idealists."

Geoff: "In a militant fashion."

Steven: "And . . . er . . . aggressively ambient.'

Steven is the singer and was a child prodigy. He is propaganda for silence, nearly. He is eventually drawn. He says, "The religion of ignorance" when I ask him what 'Bible Of The Beats' is about.

"It's wanting to be something you can't be. People who glamourise things that are sordid, and make imaginary little worlds rather than inhabit the real big one. It's a very cliched thing to read a Kerouac book then think - God, I wish I'd been around in the '50s listening to all that cool jazz and driving those crazy cars."

But Age Of Chance are lickably selfconsciously hip ...

"Don't dwell on the beat poets," says Geoff, generously telling me how to do my job. "It's a vague analogy but it'd be underselling it."

"It works on about three levels," says Neil.

"But whenever you try and explain one line or whatever it sounds ridiculous," concludes the vocaliser.

So what it's like to be six feet of sex. "It's great."

Jan does the beats, as in bash bash bash, and Age Of Chance's delightful collection of half-truths informs me she once played Jason King's love-child in an episode of Department S.

"I hate the indie mentality where if you look like a bag of washing tied round the middle that's really OK."

Geoff: "As if there's some kind of

inherent honesty in that." Is it significant in terms of the group that you're female, Jan?

"No."

Not at all?

Not even "No".

Neil, multiple guitar screeches and ski-slopes, drives the car, wants to die in a car crash. Likes abstract art. Talks the most. Believes in this group like there's

"All we can offer is our unique view of life, our interpretation of how life in 1986 sounds. The riots of last summer were the most exciting thing that's happened in England for a long time. A lot of music seems to have ignored it for some reason. There's a massive feeling of unrest. Whether or not we're aware of it, we're caught up in it, and I genuinely think we reflect that turmoil."

Geoff: "Underneath there's an urge to unsettle, or agitate."

Neil: "There'll never be a pop group who have all the solutions, no matter how many statues they kick over. But we're . . . colourful."

Geoff says, "Style? It's a gift" and is a good organiser. Once I rang him up and he said, "Oh hi, man, I was just watching Rik Mayall on Jackanory." He has a (very useful) habit of nudging the conversation of the others into more vibrant channels.

"We're in a position now where practice meets theory. Top names will be threatened by what we're doing."

This is the Chance stance, taking themselves seriously and not; too sexy for television; calling their music "pure sonic metal disco" when it's nothing of the sort; drinking coffee; experimenting; not smoking; slowly improving at the interview game. Their music/noise always scores ones or sixes, and this is why it is Truly Great For The Time Being.

ERE ARE the names of the four tunes they presented for their last Peel session - 'The Going Going Gone Man', 'The Morning After The Sixties', 'I Don't Know And I Don't Care', and 'Mob! Hut!!'. Recently they played a gig in a clothes shop, and one in a youth club. They supported The June Brides in Manchester the night after this

What Age Of Chance think 'Bible Of The Beats' is really about:-

a) Riot police tactics in urban Britain and their Zulu roots.

b) The rhythms of the football terraces and early Blues records.

c) World domination – a career? "A bit of thought, wit, intelligence,

humour occasionally, and a lot of noise," says Neil. "Yeah, but good noise," adds Geoff.

"Not any old thing. It's no use without some kind of construction." "There's plenty of bands making

meandering trash," considers Jan. "We started basically because we hated everything else."

Do you respect pop's heritage? "We don't respect anything, actually."

In Leeds, they tell me, if you're not Goths you're automatically assumed to be a twee pop group or R&B revivalists. It doesn't worry them that my mum and dad wouldn't like their records. Again, they say they are trying to capture that moment, and again this interests me, so I say, "What moment?"

Geoff: "We're talking about euphoria, I think."

Neil: "Yeah . . . just a brief second when you feel really good, like when you're dancing, or out walking and you see somebody you like - it's that kind of intangible excitement that people experience say once or twice a year. We're trying to translate it into three minutes."

When did you last experience this feeling?

Jan: "Yesterday."

Time for this pilgrim to make lateral progress. Do you ever feel tragic and grandiose and melancholy, or do you go through life with a glib effective humour?

"What?"

Do you ever get suicidally depressed? "Never."

Really? Never?

Steven: "My wife died last week, and my mother got run over, but we just keep on smiling through, don't we?"

Geoff: "We're going to sound like four Dick Van Dykes or something here."

Neil: "I like nerve gas, riots, and civil

Steven: "And. . .er. . .Joy Division

albums,"

Geoff: "Actually. . . I do get suicidally depressed, I don't want to go along with these. . ."

Neil: "I'd like to be. . . what were the words?...Grandiose without being tragic, and sentimental without being grandiose."

Jan: "Pardon?"

Neil: "Well, he's lumping them together as if it's like one inherent feeling that sweeps over. . ."

Steven: "I think I'd like to write songs that were those things but I wouldn't like to be them."

Neil: "'Bible Of The Beats' is grandiose. In fact it's monumental."

What's the most stupid thing you've

done in the last week?

Steven: "We don't approve of eating."

HAT ABOUT brains? Neil: "We've got a positive brain policy. We discriminate." Geoff: "You must have one to be in this band. We really do stipulate that." Do you believe in youth?

Jan: "Yes, but all the virtues of youth don't necessarily inhabit a youthful body. There are some real ancient hippy toerags who are 16. It's the values, not so much years as attitude."

Neil: "Especially now, when the midteen record-buyers are so passive and accepting."

Steven: "Pop music should be young, should be intrinsically exciting. Very few of the records in the charts are pop music."

Neil: "We're trying to use our varied backgrounds with a single-minded attitude. Consequently there's a kind of controlled power. We're dynamic - big bashing beats and blocks of sound. It's pop as in getting cheap clothes on a Saturday afternoon. Like when you can smell people yearning to spend, to deposit cash."

Do you wish this was the '60s? Steven: "That's exactly what we're not about. We're about now."

Is now the Age Of Chance? "Yes."

Why?

Neil: "Everything's just right." Are you sexually conventional? Jan: "Only sometimes."

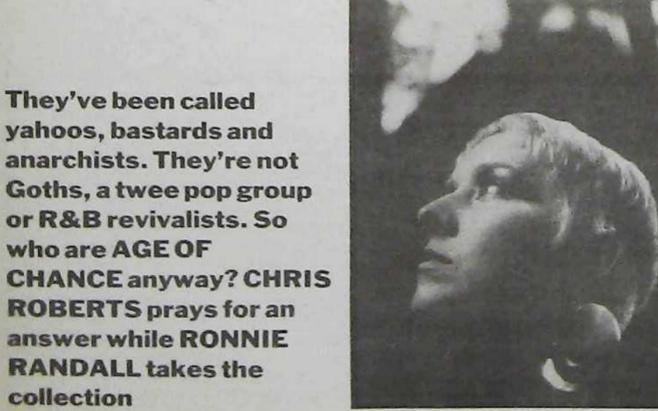
Steven: "One of us is." Neil: "I don't think I've ever been."

Geoff: "I can vouch for that. He lives next door to me."

Is Gulliver's Travels a major influence on the "four Godless Yahoos running wild in Hipster Heaven"?

Geoff: "It certainly isn't, no. Someone

been called bastards and anarchists."

Jan: "And vulgar, merciless, and inhumane. That's fine by us."

If you're too cool to try, how do you justify your doing anything?

Jan: "What we really mean is, we don't have to contrive."

Neil: "But nothing we do is an accident. There should be an element of intrigue. It's the things you don't know about us that might make you want to know more."

Onstage, do you incite? Steven: "I might wiggle a bit." Sorry, was that "wiggle" or

"wriggle"? "Niggle."

Oh. Neil: "We bring out the worst and the best in people. We tend to have a

polarising effect." How did you come together? Neil: "We were the four people plucked out of the fight at the party." Was it a good party?

"It was until we came."

ERHAPS THE (newsflash - this is absolutely fascinating actually: I left this overnight and the cat has typed a number three so it reads "perhaps the 3"...but anyway). . . . perhaps the crowning glory of Age Of Chance is their awareness of the material necessity of a certain aesthetic will o' the wisp.

They believe/know it is crucial to convince others of your own handsomeness/prettiness/elegance/ strength/beauty/sexual charisma, even if there is none there. This is the oldest of pop tricks and strangely, marvellously, the least ridiculed.

Geoff: "No band in the history of pop music has ever gone anywhere or done anything without looking good. Not one."

I immediately think of The Jam, The Cult, and many, many more but then remember we're talking about bands who've gone somewhere or done something.

Neil: "There's a lot of use you can put clothing to. We can look like we do and still frighten people. There's a juxtaposition . . . if a guy who looks neat and spruce comes out with music that rapes your daughter and takes the enamel off your teeth, then it's . . . something to be looking for."

Steven: "Er . . . not that we sit around eating toast discussing what to wear."

Would you really kill or die for anything?

Neil: "My beliefs."

Geoff: "A good haircut."

Why is it very important to be unreasonable?

Jan: "Oh, it's essential."

Neil: "The world's full of reasonable people who don't get anything or anywhere."

So if someone was unreasonable to you, you'd think "Wow, that's great"?

Neil: "We'd be unreasonable back and see who won. I think we would. We're gaining tenacity. We won't rest till we get what's duly ours."

How do you account for 'I Don't Know And I Don't Care'?

Steven: "Oh, that's another smashing romantic mythology type thing." Neil: "Don't go into it too deeply."

Shortly after this we stop for a bit and Neil says, "Do you think you've got enough of the spirit of Age Of Chance?"

Stroppy on principle, naively tough and determined, intellectually brash and bravado-fuelled, yes. But I'm puzzled by

this "don't go into it too deeply" lark, which I thought went out with the ark.

It's just not enough when there's words like "Metaphysical!" on the manifestos . . .

Geoff: "You're taking it too seriously again."

Steven: "There's very obvious humour in the conceit."

Neil: "Some people just need ordering about. We can do it without feeling guilty."

Neil: "Our general aura of confidence overflows into dogma. There's a lot of room in pop music for that. The words are used as an index of possibilities. To provoke people into loving or hating, not sitting languidly by. To make people dissatisfied and want to do something with themselves."

Steven: "All explanations and specifics and justifications are uninteresting."

Geoff: "It's just there. That's just us.

The basic premise."

Neil: "We don't need to apologise for anything we do. People can use us just as we use people. There is something there to grasp. Or to kick! We have a valuable currency to offer."

"My 'function' is to observe you. That's my function. You like my function? You like it? Your 'function' . . . is, learn the rocket, inch by inch. I have . . . to send in a daily log of your progress. And that's all I know." - Thomas Pynchon: Gravity's Rainbow.

GE OF CHANCE, learning the rocket inch by inch, are uncommercial to the point of consumption, which is a similar word to combustion. There is a precious and bountiful jackboot coruscation to their roaring jargon. They are huge and

refreshing and take great care over their record covers: what they will be, they will be.

Favourite words.

Neil: "Power."

Geoff: "Intense, I think."

Jan: "Sonic?"

Steven: "Bye, Spelt b-u-y." Four minutes till the train leaves. We all run run run like Batman and Robin through Leeds city centre. Somebody we nearly knock over says, "Gosh". This makes me very happy for about seven seconds because "Gosh" is an endangered expletive. Age Of Chance ask me if I could finish the piece with "Age Of Chance dig everything and are

shocked by nothing". I feign acquiescence. But the age of consent is history. The age of chance is upon us as if it's six pm on a Friday.

Age Of Chance will make you say "Gosh". The church is older and wiser than any of us. Poor church.

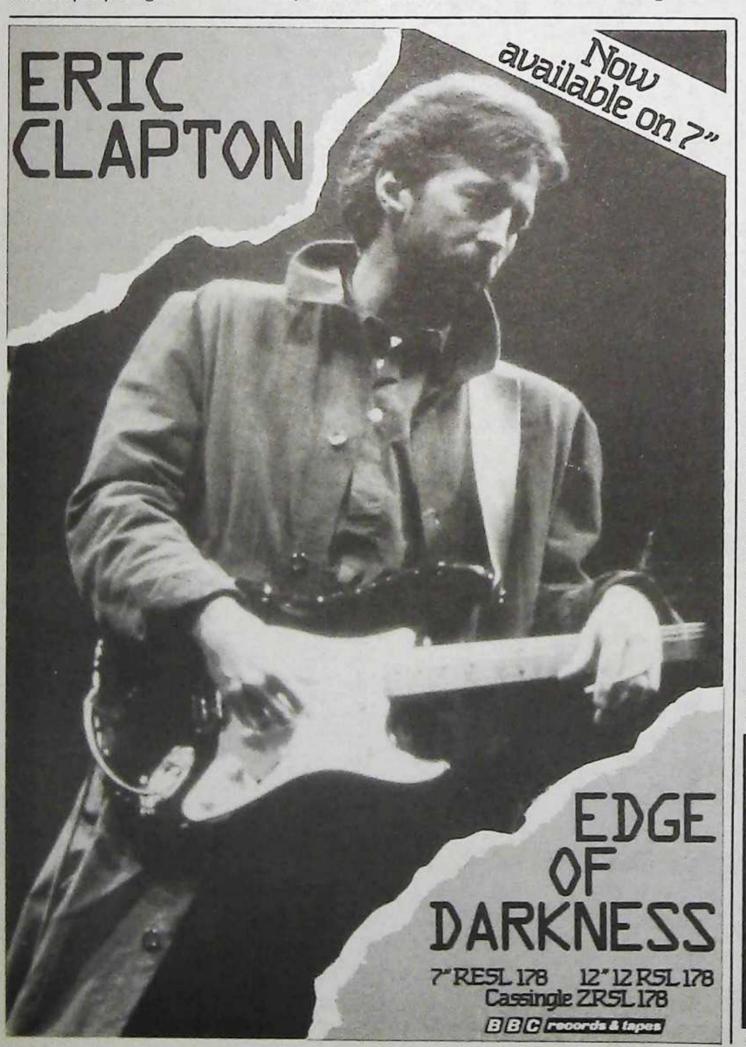

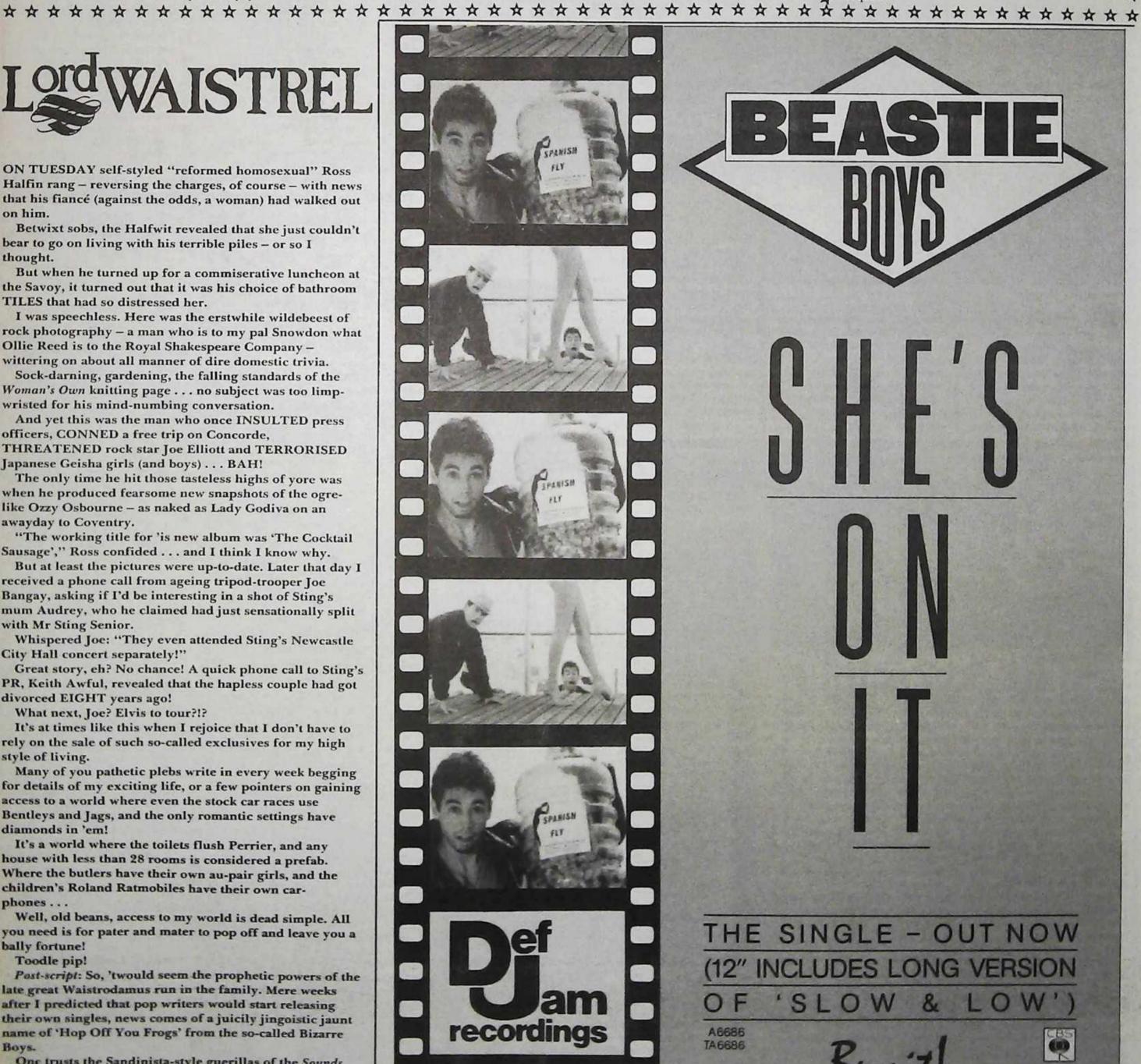

HIGH TIME - THE LIFE AND TIMES OF HOWARD MARKS David Leigh (Unwin)

FROM GARW Grammar School in the Welsh Valleys to Balliol College, Oxford and on, eventually, to Brixton nick.

And from sharing the odd joint with the offspring of the rich, the famous and the powerful (often themselves destined to become rich, famous and so on), to importing the stuff by the ton with the sometimes eccentric assistance of a grandly deluded, self-proclaimed terrorist, Howard Marks' life and times do indeed move quickly, enthrallingly and almost unbelievably.

Closely detailed and written at a stylish pace which itself helps to define the momentum and the mood of those times, David Leigh's absorbing and amusing narrative sweeps you along.

Simply put, this is the tale of one man's rise to become one of the most successful international drug smugglers of the '60s. And of the organised perjury and perversion of justice which served in the final analysis to deliver him from the hands of the various forces of law and order.

This alone makes for a rich and intricate tapestry of corruption and collusion, inspired innovation and supreme outrage. But throw in the absurdities of Marks' entanglement with the lunatic self-publicist and would-be saviour of Ireland, Jim McCann, the thorough ineptitude of MI6, the all too human shadow of truly organised crime and the wonderful details of the refined social spheres within which Howard Marks began to move as of right. And what you end up with is a hugely successful account which almost justifies the reputation of the '60s themselves.

(Cannon)

I CERTAINLY don't support censorship in any form, but watching a movie like Death Wish 3 gives me the uncomfortable feeling that the film industry that produces stuff like this is just giving the anti-violence lobby free ammunition.

We're forced to watch muggery'n'thuggery, gloating or squirming depending on our psyche, then invited to further revel in ('righteous' this time) sadism as vigilante hero Charles Bronson whips out his Wildey magnum for some revenge on the 'creeps' on the street. Gone are the days of the first of the series, when the British Censor hacked out the worst of the slashing; this time it's splashed all over.

The current climate of deification for Rambo and Bernard Goetz means the time is ripe for this 'un, suitably helmed by the policeman's fave, Michael Winner, and distributed by Cannon (geddit?). But while it certainly delivers the brutal thrills of the earlier films, it looks rather shabby.

The continuing cuts from real New York skylines to one little mock-up in East London are painfully obvious. Ed Lauter is competent as an oafish police chief, but Deborah Raffin is only there to shock us by being cut'n'killed. And Bronson . . . well, isn't he getting a bit old for all this stuff?

I'm all in favour of people sticking up for themselves, but the only trouble with the ethos of the *Death Wish* films as applied to real life is that of where to draw the line. There's a lotta folks out there who, given the firepower, might just decide that any non-plustriped person on the street is ripe for blowing away.

And the irony of Jimmy Page, symbol of youth weirdism to many, doing the music here should not be lost on you. I'm not sure if life imitates art, but I bet there'll be plenty plonkers out there praying that the morals of Death Wish 3 stay firmly inside the pleasure dome.

WHILE AUDIENCES in Britain
will associate baby-faced
Michael J Fox with Back To The
Future, it was actually Teen
Wolf which gave him his first
starring role, Stateside.

This tale of regular highschool kid Scott Howard, who longs to be somehow different enough to tempt classroom goddess Pamela, and finds his wish granted in somewhat unorthodox fashion as he develops the facility to change into a werewolf at will, is a delicious twist on the classic full-moon frolic formula, packed with sharp-witted dialogue and skilfully-crafted visual puns which keep the tear-ducts well lubricated.

The big joke, of course, is that Scott's weirdo alter ego is benevolent rather than malevolent, diplaying a lupine cunning and surefootedness on the basketball court which rockets his school team from oblivion to the championship finals. But fame has its price, and Scott finds himself yearning to be accepted for his ordinary self rather than his lycanthropic persona, despite being the coolest thing in school in his all over rug and basketball shorts.

High camp comedy with a moral in its madness, Teen Wolf deserves to be the ultimate word in teenage angst exposés. Forget the brat pack – here comes the wolf pack!

SO WHAT'S a Brazilian film, starring an American actor playing a homosexual windowdresser, imprisoned with a Castro style revolutionary in *Generals*-period Argentina, dreaming about a wartime France populated by Portugese-accented, Franglaise-speaking actors got to interest yer average *Sounds* reader?

Well, it's got a brilliantly camp, comic yet sad performance by William Hurt, a compelling story of frustration, fear, oppression, love, loyalty and betrayal, and some beautifully crafted imagery.

Molina (Hurt) the windowdresser, and Valentin (Raul Julia) are opposites isolated in a small cell. Molina has been planted to extract information from Valentin, held as a political prisoner, the reward for success being parole. It's a tribute to the script and performances that a film set in such a confined space

embraces a broad spectrum of emotion and life, never sinking into dour depression.

We do escape of course, occasionally through glimpses of past life, but mainly through the fantasies of the homosexual, who, each night, tells, in episodic instalments, of a World War II melodrama film he once saw, set in occupied Paris.

Valentin is at first appalled then fascinated by the story of fascist romance. He angrily browbeats Molina for the obsession, who retorts, "Find the keys to the door and I'll gladly follow. In the meantime I'll escape." So he does, to this glamorous otherworld of marbled halls, beautiful people and two-dimensional clichéd characters in a hammed up '40s B-movie style, with dialogue not far removed from 'Allo, 'Allo, and equally amusing. It's the complete antithesis of their decrepit, degrading reality.

Hmmm! . . . but what of the Spider Woman I hear you ask? Ah! well that's another story.

EARTH WORKS

Quicksilver fiddling, hi-NRG folk and cartloads of filthy fingernails: Gone To Earth embody all these things. How can you say no? asks Kev Sampson

GONE TO Earth have the most disgraceful fingernails I've ever seen.

Apart from Dave Thom, their bearded, potentially rowdy bassist, the group can boast a display of dirty, cracked, bitten-down fingernails second to none.

Still, it's not an inappropriate image for Lancashire's premier folk combo, suggesting a back-to-nature *Good Life* existence in an arable commune somewhere north of Pendle.

That's not so far from the truth, as it happens. It was the time-honoured rustic trade of busking that brought the Earth band together in 1983, and busking it was that allowed them to slum it round Europe for six months, earning a guilder here and a crust of black bread there.

"I think we're still on Interpol's files," reckons singer and main creative force Dave Robinson, referring to the various European establishments from which they had to abscond due to poverty and deep-seated dishonesty.

But the good life on the road had to end, and last year saw them back in Britain, playing the folk clubs and looking for a wider audience. Dave Clarke, whose quicksilver fiddling dominates and manipulates their contagious, crafty onslaught, takes up the story:

"It's a great laugh playing the folk clubs – those teachers go wild, you know – but we needed to make a bit more than beer money from it, and we thought a record would do us good. Get more younger people into what we're doing."

Cue the Liverpool connection. Geoff Davies, the entrepreneurial genius behind Probe Records, had heard a tape and thought this brand of fiddle-drunk bootstomping hi-energy folk was just what the doctor ordered to quicken the slow moving hearts of this nostalgic city.

"I knew they'd go down well in Liverpool with all this Duelling Banjoes and Bob Dylan being so popular, and the revival of an Irish consciousness in the city. . ."

The continuing popularity of acts like Groundpig and Drama, who pack 'em in week after week with covers of Lindisfarne, Don McClean, Peter Gabriel and Simon & Garfunkel hits, convinced Mr Davies that a wild local folk outfit with its own songs and enough hints of Liverpool's seafaring and Irish history to satisfy the new breed of retrospective urchins would be gratefully received.

They were. Thrust into the lions' den that is Houlihan's Bar, where Groundpig cut their teeth and wage cut each other, Gone To Earth had the tables rocking and the punters reeling.

"It's a scary place, isn't it?" confides Robinson. "But that's what we like, the challenge of a new place. You've got to suck them in with your. , ." The veins in his neck stiffen as he tries to explain his ecstatic stage presence.

Dave Clarke helps out: "The crowd feeds off your energy. If we got up there not caring then they'd just stand back and the whole thing'd go flat. We want them sweating like we do from the word go."

An impressive intro to Liverpool complete, Probe were eager to meet the demand for vinyl. Yet Geoff Davies and Sam Davies, their manager (can't we re-name some of these characters?) thought the taped version of the band sounded a little. . .accomplished.

They wanted a few more dirty fingernails on the disc before it could be unleashed on the germ-free adolescents of North West England, and Geoff had an inkling that a certain Tudor, one-time riffmaker for punk fables Public Disgrace, might do a more than adequate job of messing things up a bit.

"It took them three days to track me down, then they wanted me to go straight out and play for this band I'd never heard of," says shockheaded Tudor, hardly a CAMRA stereotype.

"So I went along and they started trying to teach me the songs. Dave was teaching me proper guitar y'know, and I couldn't really fathom it. So I said I'd just play along and see how it was."

The resulting buzzsaw expletives are a hairraising complement to the potentially overwhelming passion of Gone To Earth. It's exactly what Davies and Davies wanted.

"I didn't want to say anything," says Geoff. "I wanted them to make the decision themselves."

So Tudor was asked to stay for good, an offer he has taken up with missionary zest, slashing shards of noise everywhere, both on stage and on the forthcoming LP.

You must add the Gone To Earth LP to 'Live And Buried' to your shopping lists this instant. And if you haven't already purchased the 'Liverpool Hornpipe' EP, titled 'Dogs Went Out The Window', do so immediately.

How can you fail to dig deep for a group whose abiding ambition is to secure a residency on the Liverpool-Dublin ferry? If they make anything, they promise that nailbrushes will be bought and back-rent paid:

"I'm not sure that we want to get rich out of this, 'cos that would mean some sort of compromise with the music. At the same time we can't carry on being booted out of every flat we live in, 'cos we can't pay the rent.

"We just know that we can go ANYWHERE in Britain – London, Birmingham, Glasgow, Saffron Walden – and blow the place apart.

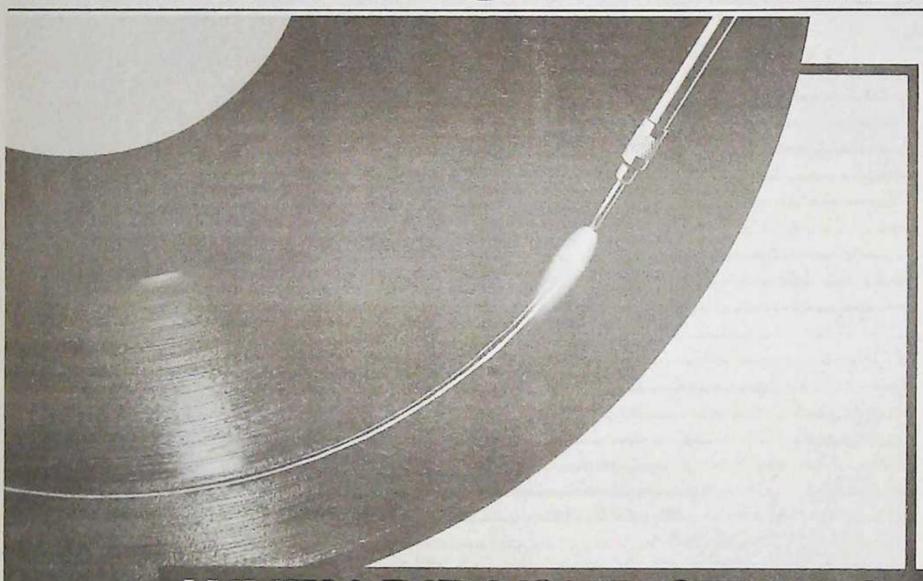

F YOU'RE purely an entertainer you don't have to worry about growth much. You just go out and drink a bottle of Jack Daniels, fall flat on your face and scream every night until your body gives out and you die."

Jeffrey Lee Pierce brushes a blond strand out of his eyes and re-adjusts a pair of Ray-Bans on top of his head. It's early afternoon in the Hotel Ruin. Outside, the inhabitants of Rotterdam do the shopping. The American seems a little uncomfortable.

The journalist pours himself another bourbon as the former leader of The Gun Club strafes the breeze with his M16 mouth. It's a large target, he doesn't miss.

"I think some rock musicians do grow old gracefully. John Cale does and so does Tom Verlaine.

"The ones that don't are those that try to constantly maintain their extremity over a long period: the Iggy Pop and Jim Morrison types, they suffer or die.

"You see, you simply can't continue in those extremes forever. First of all it's boring, secondly people start to detect a lack of enthusiasm when they realise that you're bored with it. That happened to The Gun Club towards the end, though there were a few good nights

"Like I've been pretty encouraged to see Nick Cave change so much in music from The Birthday Party. Everyone who is in the position knows that you reach a certain limit where the whole thing is going to blow up and take you with it. Or you simply walk away and go on to the next thing.

"So either you transform and come back with something new and strong or you go under. With The Gun Club I felt I was becoming a Broadway Danny Rose or something, constantly going through the same routine. We were all sick and a little insane, we needed out."

So you're saying you're disenchanted with the rock and roll lifestyle?

"Disenchanted?" laughs Jeffrey quizzically. "Oh yeah, I can't stand it."

But you have a reputation for fully indulging in it; for getting shit-faced every night.

"Yeah sure," he agrees. "That's about all there is to enjoy out of it: the indulgences. There's really nothing else

going for it on a human level, everything else about it is completely artificial.

"I still go to a bar sometimes. I'd say my reputation is no different than anyone else who goes to a bar and gets drunk. I don't do it every day, not anymore. You have to draw a line at some point and I think that happened after the final Gun Club tour.

"I'd have to drink that entire thing," – Jeffrey gestures towards the bottle of Jack Daniels – "before I could get onstage.

"Hangovers are too incapacitating for playing gigs. I control it a little better now, but there are still some wild nights though."

three fingers. He is drinking alone on a grey day. The musician fidgets, talks incessantly and knowledgeably about diverse topics, often returning to the suject of the long departed Gun Club.

The journalist finds this a little strange since Jeffrey has been involved with projects of his own for quite a while now.

Maybe these reminiscences were stimulated by the coincidence that Fur Bible appeared at the same festival, Pandora's, as Jeffrey's new Quartet. The Bible include his ex-cohorts Kid Congo and Patricia Morrison.

"We hated each other last year but we get along pretty well now.

"Hey look out there, my rhythm section are taking in the culture," orders the musician. I gaze out of the bedroom window down into the street. Pierce is referring to bassist Dean Dennis and drummer Nick Sanderson, formerly of Clock DVA.

Together with Jeffrey's Japanese girlfriend-guitarist, Hiromi Otani, they comprise the man's Quartet.

Oddly enough they hardly figure at all on the mini-album, 'Flamingo', most of which was culled from out-takes recorded during the sessions which led to the often excellent 'Wildweed' LP.

The journalist sets himself up with another bourbon and puts it to Jeffrey that 'Flamingo', with its messy free-form title track and mangled cover of Hendrix's 'Fire', sounds like it was slapped together.

"I'm sure it's slapped together," concurs the American, still looking out of the window.

"The one song that the band actually worked on was 'Getaway', the rest are left-over tracks. The thing is only meant to be a single anyway.

"I haven't been in the studio since 'Wildweed' so the record company decided to release everything of mine they had in the can. I've got a lot of objections to that but I was in America at the time. "As for 'Flamingo', I haven't even heard it, I don't even know what it is. I've heard it's part of a jazz-noise thing we were making up in the studio with the old Quartet.

"The record company were really impressed with it, but I can't really remember it at all."

Jeffrey grins painfully as he recalls a much-vilified avant-garde performance he organised in a London club some months ago.

"I think it was kinda really bad for me to do that kind of stuff," he admits, "because when people come to see me they expect some kind of rock thing and what we were doing was more like the Portsmouth Sinfonia."

Conducted by Brian Eno . . .

HAT MADE you decide to make that jump?

"I love that kind of music. I listen to it constantly." For the first time Jeffrey actually starts to sound interested in our conversation.

"The whole thing was a tribute to Albert Ayler and Archie Shepp or the more abstract moments of Sun Ra. It wasn't anything I was presenting as my next major project.

"I think that sort of jazz-noise improvisation had influence in The Gun Club's shows as far as making a great deal of noise is concerned.

"On the last tour, which ended up with us being totally f****-up through being overbooked, 'Preaching Blues' went on for a good 15 minutes and we did Coltrane's 'A Love Supreme' as an encore."

There's quite a big fracture between jazz and rock music isn't there?

"I don't think it can be bridged either," he says. "At least I've never heard a band that can bridge jazz and rock anywhere closely together that I can stand listening to."

Jimi Hendrix got pretty close . . .

"Yeah, well, so far as using the guitar with a jazz mentality," Pierce shrugs.
"But still some of that material I didn't care for too much. There was one good band in New York, The Lounge Lizards, they probably got closer to that sound than anybody I've ever heard.

"You know I find it embarrassing to hear Brandford Marsalis playing on a Sting record. It's embarrassing that Sting thinks that's jazz, or a jazz-pop fusion. It's just The Police with a horn, nothing different at all."

Are you saying there's a different attitude involved then?

"A completely different frame of mind and thinking. It's not even related to rock and roll so you can imagine how difficult it is

"You have to be in a completely different state of mind if total improvisation is going to work successfully.

"In rock music it's so easy to become redundant by using improvisation badly as all those John McLaughlin and Santana records will attest to – rock trained musicians using a jazz mentality and producing pure boredom.

"Certainly there has to be a middle ground somewhere and some band will do it. The Gun Club were shooting for it but they simply didn't make it to the next stage which would have been to bring in horns.

"In fact the next Gun Club record, if we hadn't split, would have been more an ensemble sort of thing with a horn, more piano, and some odd South American instruments.

"I've been planning to make that record for two years and I still haven't got to do it. 'Wildweed' was cautiously accessible, but American companies refused it telling Statik that it didn't sound like Dire Straits. Well f*** that.

"Now though I've got a new arrangement and I'm hoping I've got enough time and money to do the album I've been thinking about for the past two years.

"Robin of The Cocteau Twins will produce it up in the studio they work in in Edinburgh. I want to spend a long time doing it, filling it with idiosyncracies and being meticulous over details. With the meeting of Robin's frame of mind and my own, at the very least it'll be interesting."

OW DOES the new material you're working on differ, say, lyrically from 'Wildweed'?
"'Wildweed' was a bit less of a personal record about myself. It's more

personal record about myself. It's more a record about other people, an observation record. I'd say the stuff I'm writing now is more internal again.

"You know, something just broke on the last Gun Club tour. I tried to break out of that completely self-centered selfish mood that always dominated The Gun Club's material. The songs were always about me. The whole point of 'Wildweed' was to get away from that.

"As for the new material I'm putting together it's drifting off more into dreamsville. That's another reason I've chosen to record with Robin because The Cocteau's songs are always in dreamsville.

"Even so I'm sure there'll be a couple of straightforward songs in the vein of 'Cleopatra' or 'Hey Juana'. I don't want to do anything completely at one level, I want everything to be broken up like at a Sun Ra concert.

"The amazing change of dynamics and range which goes into the average Sun Ra concert is a goal I've been after since well before 'Las Vegas Story', in fact since Kid Congo joined The Gun Club more than two years ago." You did a track called 'Portrait Of The Artist In Hell' a while back. What is your idea of hell?

Jeffrey looks nonplussed. "An eternal tour with no days off and an excruciating Jack Daniels hangover every day. Always sitting with that hangover alone at breakfast and looking out of a window. That's my idea of hell."

The at-the-moment subdued and loquacious American laughs at these thoughts. As you will have probably gathered I've caught him in a period of transition, not simply a musical but an intellectual one.

Last year he was fascinated by ancient Egyptian mythology. Now his hobby is medieval history, especially the secret sects like The Knights Templar which evolved out of The Priory Of Zion.

"Freemasons are the modern-day equivalent. All of those sects have been crucial in the political and social development of the world as we know it."

The Egyptians used to be buried with all sorts of objects, including boats, to travel with to the afterlife. What would you like to be buried with, Jeffrey?

"Well I certainly wouldn't like to be mummified," he stresses. "The destruction of the human body I consider to be the ultimate freedom. As for what I'd like to be buried with, I guess a plane ticket and a passport to make sure I get to the other side.

"But to be serious for a minute, I can't think of anything I'd like to be buried with. Nothing concrete really means that much to me.

"I suppose I should be like a member of Tex And The Horseheads and say bury me with a bottle of Jack Daniels. People would expect that.

"The thing is I don't want to be buried anyway. I want to be burnt and have the ashes thrown into the ocean. When the body is finished then good, it's used up like an old car. Into the breakers' yard with it and on to the next one."

S OUR chat begins to wind down Jeffrey allows himself a small bourbon diluted with puddles of water. In the evening the musical artist in him performs an enthused set with his new Quartet.

Come the wee hours though, the Jekyll in him is possessed by the monster Hyde. Full moon, bottle in hand, and flat on his face, he screams down the microphone during The Legendary Stardust Cowboy's spot. It isn't very entertaining.

The last I see of him, the sometimes quiet American is being supported backstage by his girlfriend Hiromi. The piss-artist in him is causing havoc.

Jeffrey Lee Pierce is a nice man when he's sober.

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BARRETT

syd-semi detached?



SYD BARRETT, the madcap who started Pink Floyd but freaked out before they achieved megastardom, has just turned 40. MIKE WATKINSON and PETER ANDERSON*, authors of Dawn Of The Piper, a forthcoming book on the man, investigate the cult surrounding this fractured hero. *No, not that Peter Anderson!

AN, MYTH or fruitcake? Syd Barrett, that perennial skeleton in the Pink Floyd cupboard, celebrated his 40th birthday on January 6.

The man whose sparkling, acid-drenched visions formed the hardcore of Brit psychedelia in 1967 is now holed up in a dead-end street in his home town of Cambridge.

People no longer pester the silent figure, whose only public appearances are on his bicycle to the supermarket. And this is he who invented the Floyd? A tab too far . . .

Barrett simply wants to be forgotten and spends his days growing cacti, chainsmoking and watching TV.

An old girlfriend who bumped into him a few months back told him he'd become Arnold Layne, the creepy twilight zone figure who gave Barrett's Pink Floyd that first hit in the spring of '67.

The madcap just laughed.
Actually, the one-time king of acidrock has reverted to his real name of
Roger and refuses to answer to his old
moniker. Old friends who occasionally
spot the gaunt, balding figure wandering
the Cambridge streets are either ignored
or cause him to take to his heels.

Turning his back on the mucky music biz after the Floyd binned him, he returned to Cambridge intent on pursuing a medical career, only to end up reported as growing mushrooms in a cellar, working in a hi-fi shop or tending the town's botanical gardens.

Then in 1977 his ex-fiancee Gayla Pinion was confronted by an overweight Syd in a South Kensington grocery store.

"He was a good two stone heavier," she recalls, "and in his white shirt and tie and pinstripe suit he looked just like he was a doctor!" Spooky, huh?

It transpired that our boy was, at that time, living off his royalties in an exclusive tower block off Kings Road, where years of watching a huge bubble-shaped TV set and a growing fondness for Guinness had piled the pounds onto his slender frame. And not surprisingly, when Barrett turned up at the Abbey Road studios where the latter-day Floyd were recording 'Wish You Were Here' it took over an hour for anyone to recognise the 180-pound figure.

"We were all there saying, 'Who the f***'s this funny geezer," remembers Dave Gilmour. And that was also the question being asked back in Chelsea Cloisters, a Dakota-type block where the madcap had now incarcerated himself.

Bemused staff there didn't mind Syd giving away his guitars and a seemingly unending stream of TV sets, but when he took to parading down Sloane Avenue in a dress they started to worry.

"He used to buy suits and shirts one day and throw them away the next," says one porter. "Money meant nothing to him – he gave one guy a £300 tip just for delivering a television."

Nevertheless, barmy Barrett's eccentric ramblings still provide inspiration for scores of today's lesser mortals who were in kindergarten when

he wowed the folks at the UFO (Underground Freak Out, maan) club in the heady days of the bummer of love.

Though he only appeared on the first couple of Floyd LPs and a pair of oddball solo platters, his legend has grown large in the minds of today's popsters.

"Syd had raw and undiluted talent which is probably why it ran out so quickly," says confirmed disciple Robyn Hitchcock. "The '60s have a lot to answer for. They were the equivalent of the Second World War for a whole generation, and the burnt-out remains are there for all to see. What made Syd also destroyed him."

That other living legend Captain
Sensible recalls how The Damned made
an unsuccessful bid to persuade Syd to
produce their second elpee in 1977. In
the end they had to settle for Floyd man
Nick Mason who "didn't have a clue",
according to the Cap.

"Like the punk thing Syd was purely English and his influence is far greater than people realised," quoth the mighty Captain. "Whenever musicians get together for a few beers his is the name which keeps cropping up. Even Lemmy likes him!"

ARRETT'S MYSTERIOUS disappearance after his two solo albums ('The Madcap Laughs' and 'Barrett') sparked off 15 years of Syd hunts, rumours and bizarre theories, leading TV Personality Dan Treacy to boast in song, 'I Know Where Syd Barrett Lives'.

Many of the great '60s bands suffered a death in the ranks, but Pink Floyd's wonderboy overdid it on the acid and lost his mind. Even at the time of the Floyd's debut album, 'Piper At The Gates Of Dawn', his behaviour was getting increasingly erratic much to the consternation of Roger Waters and the rest of the group.

On stage he would often play only a single note all night while gazing blankly at the audience. He once ran onto a Heathrow runway to try to flag down a jet. He gave his pink Cadillac to someone he met in the street.

A longtime Floyd buddy, Ian Moore, says: "Syd began to realise the rock machine was taking him over. His biggest dream was to be a star and when he got there it was worse than he ever imagined."

ACKED BY Floyd in early '68,
Barrett had the tour list for the
next six months and continued to
turn up uninvited.

"If he had stayed the Floyd would have died an ignominious death," claims Gilmour. "Sometimes you must carry out decisions which are tough for you to make and tougher for other people to take. We had no choice."

People like David Bowie felt Pink Floyd couldn't survive without Syd – instead they became millionaires while Syd went from Floyd to the void.

Robyn Hitchcock is the unlikely source of the only sane words on the subject of Syd: "The cult surrounding Barrett grew up because of his silence, and there are many people around who should've shut up years ago. The type of fanworship Syd attracts is unhealthy and people who go in for that kind of thing should take up something like gardening instead."

Like Syd?

~ HOUSE easterhouse~real estate?

LUNCHTIME drink with Easterhouse is something of an event. Always.

It's a no-holds barred affair where the rest of the pub inevitably ends up engrossed in the group's opinionated views on everything from the validity of Robert Elms – heard only last week expounding his knowledge on world politics and the rise of the Islam state (it was a short programme) – to the difference between a fool and a bastard.

It's loud, and so is their second single 'Whistling In The Dark', a colossal sound, beautifully manhandled into a commercial veneer, thinly disguising the hard hitting, controversial (call it what you will) vocal lines.

It's an awesome treat and one that finally sees Easterhouse coming good – and at a time when the general listenerati needs them most.

The five man crew are all equally outspoken but it's vocalist Andy Perry who articulates the ideas that form the foundation of the Easterhouse make-up.

The rest of the group – Andy's brother Ivor, James, new boy Mike, Peter and Gary – are content to add sly comments, quips and the odd, more detailed, outburst.

SUPPOSE, really, their break with London Records was inevitable. The label/group relationship was never harmonious and, with Easterhouse already pounding their solicitor's door to try and obtain an exit clause, it was something of a relief when London themselves requested a termination.

"It was a make or break situation but not in the sense that we needed a major label to survive. Once we had broken free it gave us a chance to really do things.

"When it came down to it, we wanted to be on an indie. We wanted to work on that basis and try to do the things that we should have been doing a year ago and build it up from there. I wouldn't say the time spent at London was wasted but we weren't really formulated enough."

The change in sound from their London EP to 'Whistling In The Dark' (out on Rough Trade) is pretty dramatic – a regular coming of age. But that's not even the half of it. And Ivor insists that the gap between the new single and their recently completed debut album is just as wide.

So what brought such a drastic change? What shifted Easterhouse into gear?

"I think when the miners' strike was on it really crystallised things and made us think. This is really important, there's things going on here. It gave us something to latch on to, something to relate our songs to."

But surely it was a particularly tricky area to cover? The miners' strike lasted a long time and lost a lot of its meaning. To a lot of people picking up 'Whistling In The Dark', the cover – portraying a frontline miners vs police scene – is going to be immediately off-putting.

"That was basically our point, though. The miners' strike was a very bitter, hard struggle and we wanted to use those things to try and bring those questions back up again. We don't want people to draw lessons from the record but we'd like them to understand a concrete framework of ideas."

But do you think they'll be able to do that? To a lot of people 'Whistling In The Dark' is just going to come across as a perfectly formed pop song with a great verse/chorus and a rousing line in vocals. . .

"In a way that's the big attraction of the



record. They're actually playing it at 8.30 in the morning on Manchester's Piccadilly Radio – with an estimated listener figure of around a million – and all sorts of people are hearing it. If they then go out and buy the record they'll be getting all the lyrics set out for them to read, as well as a load of information about it."

ASTERHOUSE ARE not simple students playing at politics. They are not easily thrust into a pre-designed box and, merely from the way they are, you know they could break out of any such stupid category.

So what is the Easterhouse plan?

"In the short term, one of our major objectives is that we want to be lethal to the Labour Party, like rat poison. We want to smash all that crap Red Wedge stuff, too. We'll show them that we're better musicians, we write better songs and we're portraying the true politics.

"The Labour Party are no use to the working class. The Red Wedge are no use to the working class."

But what about the people who hear 'Whistling In The Dark' and just think it's a great song and leave it at that?

"We don't expect this single to be seen as a classic for all time. It's there like a newspaper, to report on what's happening. It is, in that sense, just for now, time honoured and to a certain degree throwaway."

But there's so much more to Easterhouse which by now should be pretty obvious. The upcoming album has a stream of track titles that are enough to whet anyone's appetite. For a start there's 'Get Back To Russia'. Blatant? On the line enough?

"I think the album's the best thing to come out of Manchester since 'Unknown Pleasures'. Just listen to the titles. There's 'Lenin In Zurich', 'Cargo Of Souls', it ain't no soft-arsed

record.

Eight tracks – all new, it sounds essential.

"It's very hard, firm and there are plenty of tunes, and even harmonies. Mike's guitar has added weight to it. It's pretty ambitious stuff."

O WHAT kind of effect can

Easterhouse expect to have on the Red
Wedge and the Labour Party as they
begin to rally round for the next election —
whenever that may be.

"What we're going to have is the soft left with the Red Wedge and all that saying, Come on now, we know Labour have let you down before but we don't want the Torys back in, give us another chance. One of the keystones to what we're going to do is say you don't have to vote Labour.

"There's a sort of parallel in South Africa at the moment in that blacks have now started to burn collaborators instead of just attacking whites. The realisation is that you have to put your own house in order before you start on anyone else.

"There's a division between the working classes and the Labour Party but it isn't going to be filled by the Red Wedge. We'll be in there making it wider, emphasising it."

So, beneath the Easterhouse sparkle, what is there? Five well-versed Mancunians whose verbal swagger would leave Robin Day champing at the bit. . .

"The British left is like the Salvation Army,

it's time it got more like the Mafia."

But can people see the reason when you bring it down to something like the introduction of machine guns at Heathrow?

"That's just the start, the next thing they'll have machine guns and armed police in the tube and on the streets, then it'll be like Paris where it's really commonplace to see these fascist socialists with machine guns. All it is really is something that gets people used to seeing armed policemen."

So what's the breaking point? Who provides the soundtrack to the fight back?

"It's weird, because in America you get a black guy singing the blues, singing about a slave life, but the workers in England get 'Club Tropicana'. What has Barbados got to do with the average guy in Manchester?"

And there's the crux. Easterhouse play the music for your average bloke. The man in the street who still has some semblance of his dignity intact. You may not know one end of politics from the other, but people always know what they like. And if you can't grasp the idea, there's still the music.

"It's OK for us if the country goes down the chute because we can just sit down and write disco records and survive. But we've got friends, people who we know and like, so what's the point of us going in the pub after doing the new Club 18-30 theme tune and expecting to be the same? You've got to think about much more than just yourself."

Of music and miners, of Red Wedge and reverb, EASTERHOUSE have begun throwing bricks at the Labour Party's glass house. Could this be the road to somewhere? asks DAVE HENDERSON. Artistic construction: RONNIE RANDALL

THE PRIME MOVERS 'On The Trail' (Island) U2 have left their mark on this band also, it's something to do with those peculiarly nasal vocals. Otherwise the record is perfect: moody, life-enhancing and economical. One of the few major label releases in recent months to have avoided the evils of brain mangling over production.

SIMPLE MINDS 'Sanctify Yourself' (Virgin)

Whereupon Jim Kerr wades further still into the sludge of '80s pomp, triggering groans of ecstacy from the assembled billions. A free mud pie with every copy.

(Idol Rich) When spotted lying amidst a pile of MOR pretty boy dreck, a heavy metal 'waxing' such as this tends to shine out like a shaft of gold. At times like these, the blistering guitar solos and slobbering lyrics of Idol Rich are very nearly a dream come true. This worries me deeply.

MINIMAL COMPACT 'My Will' (Crammed Discs) It drifts by, barely ruffling a hair. Odd then, to find the man responsible for this record's production is Wire's Colin Newman.

THE DAMNED 'Eloise'
(MCA) A decade after their radical interpretation of 'Help', the group bravely tackle Paul and Barry Ryan's epic mini opera from the late '60s. The finished product, although satisfying, appears a trifle wobbly on its legs when placed in the shadow of the mighty original. Should be big, nevertheless.

Prince is involved in this strange affair, a song which appears to consist solely of a chorus, a bit in the middle and no verses. Perhaps this symbolises something naughty. Moronic giggles drift over the air waves from Peter Powell's Pop Panel.

(EMI America) Slightly seedy, lots of chunky guitar and a wonderfully sinister bass line. Surprising.

VICIOUS PINK 'Take Me
Now' (Parlophone) If this
lot were at one time faintly
hip, they're sure not now. The
duo's pulsating sex music
(hot stuff in 'Relax' days)
reeks of sterility, while the

BILLY OCEAN 'When The Going Gets Tough, The Tough Get Going' (live)

Peter Powell's Pop Panel say: "This is terrific, great dance record, such a super beat!" Pete responds: "You guys are just brilliant, so on the case, I love it!"

Freedom Curse (LiL) In a traditional sense, possibly the most rousing release of the week. A hard hitting tune in the new guitar orientated rebel pop mould. Will sell in respectable quantities.

400 BLOWS/23 SKIDOO ASSEMBLAGE 'GI' American Epilog' (Saderal)

The usual endless funk track, complete with Reagan's "We begin bombing in five minutes" speech (again) plus the barely audible voice of Charles Manson to lend it credibility.

TACKHEAD 'Mind At The End Of The Tether' (On-U Sound) Aeons harder than the above, employing cut ups and erratic pulses in order to annoy the listener rather than send him or her spinning

onto the dancefloor.

PSYCHIC TV 'Mouth Of The Night' (Temple Records TOPY 010)****1/2 'MOUTH OF The Night' is a ballet score commissioned by the Mantis Dance Company for a work with designs by Derek Jarman. Working alongside the nucleus of Genesis PO and Alex Fergusson is Hilmar Orn Hilmarsson, previously involved with Icelandic apocalypsists Peyr, and

It's an accessible and atmospheric record, revolving around the sounds of the body, clipped into the piece's rhythm, determining it or just fading in and out. Orgasmic sighs, the terse instructions of the karate instructor, a mouth noisily masticating . . . the body is the instrument, unpredictable but comforting, since it is what we are closest

Monte Cazazza.

Understandably, it loses somewhat as it is specifically designed for a visual piece. But the pictures that arise in the mind give something of the effect: bodies locked, bodies desperate, bodies losing, bodies failing and falling. Melancholy.

And every story has an exception. The one here is called 'Discopravity', a jerky, metallic and breathy piece with voodoo drums breakdancing for Damballah in the background. Alone, it would be powerful; in the context of the LP as a moodinducer or series of atmospheres, it breaks the continuity up.

Swan Lake it's not, Rudolf Nureyev might not like it at all. But it's an impressive pointer as to the direction that music and movement should take to progress.

MOMUS 'Circus Maximus' (EI/Cherry Red ACME 2)***

EMPTINESS IN a million mile long words. Nick Currie's debut album as Momus is probably the most pretentious record you will hear; even on Neptune they're mumbling "Huh?" (translation: "Huh?").

Words are powerful beasts: they can start wars, summon devils, order pineapple pizzas, tell the cat to stop pissing on the carpet, or describe pain ("Ouch!" or "John Walters!").

HULA '1,000 Hours' (Red Rhino REDLP63)**** THE COMPLEX new double album from the men who do smile sometimes is the anticipated whirling wodge of vicious experimentation, but stick with it for a couple of nights and be charmed by its underlying vulnerability.

Nearly a year ago, Hula played a long, harsh, grating set at The Milky Way in Amsterdam. The recording of this lasts 500 hours. At least, I admire its tenacity and pace, but the rhythm 'n' abuse gets morbidly repetitive...lips curl, eyes crease, but expressions are soon exhausted and the slide into nightmare via rapid eye movement is desperate, indulgent and plainly unpleasant

If the Dutch dabbling is dully decadent, the second half is tenderly inventive and mellifluously moody. A side to wind you up and a side to wind you down. The former - 'Big Heat', a grinding drizzle, 'Sour Eden', a percussive maelstrom etc - is tense but tactile, living on instinct rather than ostentatious cerebral cut-ups. They're approaching Chakk's soul/pop consciousness, gingerly but gamely.

The conclusion – a funny shade of white – goes beyond the pale of Hula's inherent hullabaloo. Taking its peace and tranquillity and cues from pathos-soaked Eno/Bowie/Sylvian, it reveals a gentle grasp of all things understatedly serene. They lighten up and sound heavily heavenly - an ether leak in the studio? Certainly 'Bribery And Winning Ways', 'Gelsomina', and 'Marnixstraat' exhilarate with their purposeful poise and bleak, buff beauty.

Hula darkness my old friend? The saving grace.

PETER FRAMPTON 'Premonition' (Virgin V 2365) *1/2

THE INDEFATIGABLE Frampers, the rockin' Rocky, comes back for yet another title shot with 'Premonition': acres of liquid fretwork screeches, aching vocals, packing case drums and titles like 'Move A Mountain' and 'Call Of The Wild'. So far, so predictable.

Trouble is, despite Frampers' claims to know what constitutes a good toon, what we get here is little more than a slickly-recorded batch of riffs that would've been outdated ten years ago. Even the celebrated Frampton voice seems to strain for the passionate warbles which formerly wetted a thousand pairs of panties, coming off as a sad croak hardly likely to tempt even the young American housewife breed into youth-memory nostalgia buying.

INXS 'Listen Like Thieves' (Mercury MERH 82)**

THE LATE, late Australian entry in this year's contest for the Americas Cup for boring, bland, transatlantic pop rock twaddle.

The prizes are, of course, immorally and allconsumingly important. If a team can get its video sequences cut just so, their hair styled as expensively as possible, and their marketing incentives synchronised, then they might just inherit the earth. Or at least a good slice.

Meek, INXS are not. Brashly, they totter, topheavy, through the long grass, while surrounding hedges cut into shapes which recall the twisted, misshapen capitalist features of numerous previous victors, cast the shadows of Jagger, Le Bon and Elton John (among others) across their own immaculately highlighted cheekbones.

Pure pretty boy balderdash, and possibly just sterile and anaesthetised enough for the Big Time, 'Listen Like Thieves' comes with a free gift - a copy of the band's last LP, 'The Swing'. Book early, and get twice as much rubbish for your money.

FULL FORCE 'Full Force' (CBS 26595) ***

TOP OF the disco singles charts and belting its way onto dancefloors, 'Alice I Want You Just For Me' bodes gloriously well for 1986. Naked and harsh, the drumbeat battleaxes its way to willing instincts - a promise of heavy-handed funk for a grim new world.

But compromises are all we're ever given. Each

remaining track falls short of the thudding abrasion of the chart single, and the six man outfit plod carefully into areas of mock-aggression where scratchy bass guitarwork apes the great Mark King and tangles into shreds.

The benign pleasure of Lisa Lisa And Cult Jam, whose recent hit single 'I Wonder If I Take You Home' Full Force wrote, threatens to overwhelm any incisiveness and, by the end of each side, you know that easy cop out soul-funk turgidity is quietly winning hands down.

The tributes to Martin Luther King and "The Man Upstairs" (God, I guess) are all very worthy, but God don't necessarily make a great album. Nor do thumping great biceps.

Tracks that hit close on target are the melodically painted heavies like 'Unselfish Lover' and 'Girl If You Take Me Home'. For a sweet undemanding lilt go for 'Please Stay'. But I doubt if Full Force will.

ARTHUR 'BIG BOY' **CRUDUP 'Crudup's** Rockin' Blues' (RCA NL89385) ****

LONG OVERDUE collection of well-preserved tracks from the '40s and '50s by the distinguished bluesman who gave Elvis Presley a leg up and got some of the credit but not much of the money. He didn't have a great deal of variety in his repertoire, but Elvis didn't need to do much to 'That's Alright' or 'My Baby Left Me' to make a million sellers apart from adding a white backbeat. And Crudup's lyrics frequently took a more imaginative turn than his music on songs like 'She's Got No Hair' and 'If I Get Lucky'.

AMERICAN MUSIC CLUB 'The Restless Stranger' (Grifter Records GR 001)****

CRITICISM IS like working in a bar where the customers are always wrong and try to shortchange you. 'The Restless Stranger' was no different, except he smelt of withered orchids, and the moment he whispered

"Second-hand clothes always tear", I fell into bed with him.

There was no pain when the stranger entered me. Inside an igloo made of the chord A minor, we were warm. Outside, the black sky spun like a garbage impacter on the prowl for victims.

When I opened my eyes again, I was lying in the ruins of a burned building. The stranger had gone without telling me his name. His aural footprints were similar to lan Curtis and Morrissey's among the ashes.

I didn't feel cheated. In my hand was a dollar note. It writhed and the head of Thomas Jefferson said to me: "'The Restless Stranger', the debut album by San Francisco's American Music Club, is like The Smiths kissing Joy Division with REM looking through the keyhole.

DIVINYLS 'What A Life!' (Chrysalis CHR 1511)**1/3 CHRISTINA AMPHLETT and the Divs are Australian. It's a pity they live so near to

Britain.

When Christina rises, she breakfasts on dried wombat droppings and the ring pulls from two dozen crates of Fosters. This is why her voice sounds like a female rhino in heat. After her repast, adenoidal Amphlett religiously kisses the two pictures next to her cage: idol Debbie Harry and mummy Bonnie Tyler. The photos get an instant rash.

Next comes the big decision of the day - what to wear. Christina opens her closet. It is full of uniforms. She likes uniforms because of what they "inspire and evoke", the Chrysalis press release informs us. Poetry.

The little schoolgirl number Christina models on the back cover of this album is a particular fave, and is based on a Japanese outfit. In it Ms Amphlett looks like Hiroshima the day after the bomb dropped.

'What A Life!' is the band's second LP. It's the dot above the 'I' in the word 'shit'.

BRIGADIER JERRY 'Jamaica Jamaica' (RAS Records 3012)****

LAST ISSUE I implied that beat poet John Giorno sang badly on his otherwise fine compilation, 'A Diamond Hidden In The Mouth Of A Corpse'. In fact he talks/raps it badly ... which is where Brigadier Jerry's toasting takes over.

The guiding lantern of JA's Jah Love Muzik sound system, since the days of the superbly purgatorial 'Pain' single Briggy has remained elusive while a whole gossip show of reggae deejays have come and gone in a blink of an eye. And that's cool, because being on the periphery for all of his career has strengthened Jerry's roots and culture attitude, which is etched splendidly into 'Jamaica Jamaica', the MC's debut album.

Though 'Pain' was one of the pivotal slates from which aspiring deejays like Phillip Levi and Smiley Culture took the energy to eventually develop the overdrive style, Briggy himself is very much an MC of the old school, with a silken if sullen delivery which recalls the great Lone Ranger.

Lyrically, Jerry's concerns are spiritual or island parochial. And while the rhythms he bubbles across are timbers from the Ark, the galaxies of imploding spaces created by mixologist Scientist more than compensate.

LAIBACH'S Ivan Novak: mad and mysterious'

LAIBACH 'Nova Akropola' (Cherry Red BRED 67) ****1/2

WHETHER OR not Laibach are intrinsically evil is at present a matter for conjecture. They would certainly appear to be bereft of any warmth or humanity, yet their chosen mode of subversion - the mimicry/mockery of totalitarianism in all its forms - itself demands a degree of wry humour.

Unless, of course, Laibach's 'image' is nothing of the sort ... meaning that the possibility exists that this Yugoslavian group may actually harbour ideas darker than those of the regimes they attack.

A mood dominates 'Nova Akropola'. It suggests Power, Toil and Valour. I see the revolution in progress: as a young man breaks his back for the sake of a new railway line, the music accentuates the rhythm of his movements, by its nature encouraging harder digging. There is a lot of sweat.

Bleak, hostile and deeply evocative (it rivals The Residents' 'Eskimo' in this respect), Laibach's debut LP is full of mystery and madness. Their message: "The ultimate aim is the coming of the son of God."

KARL BLAKE 'The Prehensile Tales' (NOR

Normal NOR 131)***** LEMON PETERS! A re-issue of one of the great ignored LPs of the '80s by one of the great ignored figures of the same period. A product of one half of the Lemon Kittens (with a cover by the other half) before he reached critical respectability and grew an even bigger beard with the Shock Headed Peters, this is an example of self-indulgence at its grossest and purest.

It's Karl's equivalent of 'The Basement Tapes', in which he shamelessly indulges his passion for Black Sabbath, totally out of order warpfuzz electric guitar and mysogynist acid fetishism.

Recorded and played completely on his own - with a solitary exception - it crosses some of the most inventive lyrics since Arthur Lee with music that (just) stays this side of listenable. Compromising it is not . . . for people who find the sprawling aural horror and humour of the Shock Headed Peters hard to take, this'll be Armageddon.

Now if all heavy metal was like this, it wouldn't be the (justly) reviled musical form that it is. Although I never could comprehend of Karl in spandex trousers. Or as Ozzy Osbourne would say/scream: "ALL RIGHT NOW!"

Buy this and watch your facial hair grow . . .

ZAZOU BIKAYE 'Mr Manager' (Crammed Discs

CRAM 039)***3/3 BREAKDANCING SKYSCRAPER slum dynamite kid meets of psychick industrialist. Well, if the cover of this strange fusion is to be believed, that's about three millimetres away from where these guys are at. Closer inspection (like listening) tells

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TOPPER HEADON 'Waking Up' (Mercury MERH 83)***5/8

WAY BACK then, Topper Headon very nearly didn't join The Clash because he thought they were dire, and anyway, he had a good gig holding the black backbeat for a soul review. Now, almost exactly a decade on - including a lost weekend of many years spent hooked on heroin - it seems natural that the drummer's solo debut should find him returning to the land of rhythmic testimony.

Let's be clear: the sharply named 'Waking Up' isn't late '80s experimentation in, say, the vein of Mick Jones' Big Audio Dynamite, but it will rub the big sleep from the feet of clubbers in months to come. For here is a rarity. A funk, soul and rock record totally devoid of electro-tack trappings that is also more than mere sweet meat for motion.

The only non-original, a somewhat redundant cover of Booker T's 'Time Is Tight' which chugs along on the organ lines of ex-Blockhead Mickey Gallagher, provides a stylistic pointer to the precincts where Topper and his trenchant band have decided to tread. 'Waking Up' runs from Stax-land, past Muscle Shoals and The Meters, and on into the dirty back alleys which spawned Shaft and Superfly and the junk sickness that hit the artery of black America in the early '70s.

Yet, despite its revivalistic ambiance, the keen enthusiasm of Topper's band, from the gliding gilt of the horn section to the quite staggering singing of Jimmy Helms, lifts this record out of the past and into the present.

Given Headon's long ride on the 'horse', it's hardly surprising that lyrically the album tracks the man's old addiction through several songs, including the rush of 'Just Another Hit' and the big band jazz of 'Monkey On My Back'. But far from self-pitying, the tone is one of optimism brilliantly projected by the tensile tonsils of Helms, who has the kind of deep soul Fine Young Cannibals would eat their mothers for.

'Waking Up' is the energy of musicians glad to be alive and still able to communicate.

SIMON FISHER TURNER 'The Bone Of Desire' (Papier Mache PULP 33) ****

TWO SIDES of the ever confusing Simon F Turner. Ex-teen idol, film maker, soundtrack supremo, pop star and stylist, Mr Turner is something of a Noel Coward among musical Philistines. Currently in the employ of Derek Jarman for his forthcoming flick Caraveggio, Turner lets little into the open with a suitably strange selection which transcends the outskirts of Madrid, Tunis, London and Manchester.

Hardly explicit, but 'The Bone Of Desire' is such a cross-reference of cultures. Take those castanets and echoed percussion, imagine A Certain Ratio with an orchestra instead of brass. In fact, take many things, new and old, throw them away and start again.

Simon T has the desire to be self-indulgent but he's too kind and thoughtful by half. Note the wary 'Pussycat Balance'. Now if that derivative dirge had made way for 'Pussycat Violence', then we might have been

sharpening the right claw. 'The Bone Of Desire' does (as no doubt is intended) stick

in the throat. Cloudy tracings are etched. Suggestions are given. Simon Fisher Turner is a talent in league with his own imagination. Close, and shaving still. .

WILKO JOHNSON 'Watch Out! Wilko Johnson Live In London'

(Waterfront WFO 24)**** CONFESSION TIME. I stand before you a Doctor Feelgood devotee of a great many years. That inimitable Oil City Sound - four gears biting perfectly together - still commands tremendous respect within my record collection.

Forget all that utter tosh about Peter Townshend, Wilko is perhaps the single most dangerous quitarist in town. Almost startlingly evil, malevolent somehow, his crisp, slanting action suggests that the man is threatening you with a sawnoff shotgun! And this live set reveals that Wilko - now teamed up with arch-bore Norman Watt-Roy and

drummer Sal Ramundo, who could so easily be the Big Figure of old and not a 'young Southend drummer' is even now a fierce rock

And frankly, Old Grey fans, numbers like 'Doctor Dupree,' 'Sneakin' Suspicion' and 'When I'm Gone' absolutely piss all over all those boring Yankee chappies.

ERIC MARTIN 'Eric Martin' (Music For Nations MFN 57)***1/2

MUCH TOUTED in wised-up melodic rock circles, Eric Martin whips standard AOR ingredients into an almost, ahem, fashionable hybrid of rock, funk and pop.

Eric reckons his 'prime influences' are James Brown, Sam Cooke and Wilson Pickett, but the evidence on this self-titled second LP suggests otherwise - it's Michael Bolton who regularly springs to mind, even before Eric's faithful cover of 'Can't Hold On, Can't Let Go' la track from Bolton's debut album) crops up on side two. Furthermore, his voice is closer to Fiona Flanagan than to James Brown etc.

However, when EM does get his teeth into some material with less of a strictly rock flavour, the results are both pleasing and promising. The flamboyance of 'Finders, Keepers', a powerful and rousing dance rock strut, makes for perfect Miami Vice fodder, and it's one of many good singles choices

Undoubtedly Eric Martin has the ingenuity to reap huge successes

CHERRELLE 'High Priority' (Tabu TBU 26699)*****

WHAT'S THE first thing I do when I get up these days? I put 'High Priority' on the turntable, of course. Then I go to the toilet. Actually, that's a lie, I don't have to place the record on the deck because it's inevitably still in position from the night before.

Question: how many good reasons do you need to buy an album? Answer: one, you need only one, unless it's already out on a single. In which case you need two. Cherrelle's album has eight.

suffered a nagging headache, 20 minutes of it seemed to last from here to eternity. I'm not sure what happened next. I remember flipping the disc and being confronted by the hypnotic 'Saturday Love' single, and since then I've been hooked. I can't get enough, I have to have a fix.

Initially, I was mixing the substance with a sprinkling of old Marvin Gaye and Kate Bush, but now I've got to have pure Cherrelle, morning, noon and night. I've even resorted to listening to side one again, and you know what? I love that too now. I'm losing all my friends, my health, I can't find the enthusiasm to go out to work. . .but I can control it. . .can't !?

4,000,000 TELEPHONES '4,000,000 Telephones' (Bunker BONK I) ****

TOTTING UP the plethora of numbers that have entered band names of late, I find myself with a provisional total of 4,012,445. By a strange coincidence, this was exactly the number of hairs found on the woolly

mammoth excavated from the Donetski glacier in Siberia in 1937. In this instance, however, all but 12,445 of the

listed objects are Telephones. The men on the telephones, angry, irritated, frustrated or panting with the exertion of it all, sing of worldly things from the point of view of another planet.

Off the hook and strangely engaging, 4,000,000 Telephones are the answer to all your hang ups.

'Jazz Juice' (Streetsounds SOUND 1)**** PILFERING FROM the jazz tradition has been the in thing with the chic and the stylish of late. This has caused jazz to be wrongly connected with the bohemian lifestyle of Wag Club goers, Face readers and Sade fans, while the real jazz scene remains a closeted movement. This compilation is not chic. It is, though, a perfect first lesson in latinfused jazz for absolute beginners like myself.

Allow Ausgang a spare moment and you may actually begin to like this past fancy.

They incorporate this tradition but also realise the importance of accessibility in an otherwise staid scene. Ausgang are also quite sexy in a perverse sort of way, using the pelvisthrusting beats that once made Adam's antics a bit of a knees-up a few years back.

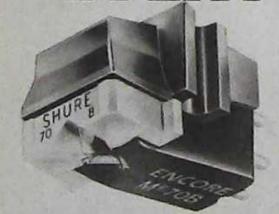

COVER STARS all the way from O'Toole's bar in Dublin's drunk city on the banks of the Liffey, The Four Paddy's Of The Arockalypse touched down in Harlesden and I thought...

These people won't be famous in a few months, no chance – they're ugly enough to work as models for gargoyles. On the other hand, having a murderous mug never hindered Jim Kerr or George O'Dowd, I meditated, as the music ripped out its heart and shouted "We are the beat of life and we sweat dustbins of blood for you to wash away your sins in"... figuratively speaking, of course.

Meanwhile, the noise was suffering from an identity problem, it couldn't remember whether its name was Simple Minds or U2 or Bert Bloggs. In fact, it was really called Big Bucks.

'Worlds Apart', 'The Promise', 'The Bridge' - the titles of

Cactus World News' songs fit them perfectly. Clean-limbed meta-rock laced with a pinch of innovation and double helpings of that elusive stuff termed, with a grimace, passion. And...

Fame is really an odd Midas who can make the baleful beautiful through continuous exposure. It's actually quite within the realms of possibility that, by next year, these four musicians with Play-dough faces will be pin-ups in *SHits*. Strange thing, existence.

Tonight, Cactus World News grounded their potentially soaring sound in a rhythmic quicksand, their drums and bass having as much subtlety as a whale passing wind. The guitarist, Frank Kearns, let trickle a farm of feedback at the end. He pretended he was about to destroy his instrument but somehow couldn't work up the necessary aggression. I nearly laughed. Another exciting night in Harlesden, and the news is the same as yesterday.

X/LONE JUSTICE/ PHRANC Los Angeles

"MY NAME is Phranc - just your average Jewish lesbian folk singer." With her black flat-top, denim and boots, Santa's elf goes westernstyle. Phranc avoids the standard annoying folkie squeak and exaggerated fingering changes and, despite slight stiffness, her delivery is far from mousy 'Parsley Sage', clear and powerful, although her witty lyrics bounce off the rowdy collegiates. Move over Billy Bragg!

A stout potential axe murderer paws my shoulder, drooling "I used to go to school with her", while pointing at Marie McKee of Lone Justice as she explodes on to the stage, maracas flailing. Earthen blonde curls brushing red lips give her the sensuality of Dolly Parton in almost every sense, yet McKee's flower-print dress suggests the milkfed image of Mary Ellen from The Waltons.

Their 'Home On The Range' rock percolates through the civic throng with songs like 'Wait Till We Get Home', 'East Of Eden' and 'Sweet Jane' (I saw that one coming - the longhair guitarist is wearing top hat and tails).

My legs are buckling as X hit the stage to feverishly belt out hits old and new, such as 'Nausea', 'I'm Lost' and 'New World', studs-and-leather John Doe taking requests from the stage squash. The flash of guitarist Billy Zoom has been replaced by the neanderthal (but talented!) Dave Alvin of The Blasters, but Exene remains, one hip locked, one hand glued to the mikestand.

The Bud flows like sewage from the Piccadilly toilets as 'Wild Thing' induces a frenzy of flying stage-bound knickers. From the grotty clubs of 1980 to the beerboosted blow-outs of 1986, X don't appear to have sold out on style.

MICHAEL NYMAN

AFTER HIS disastrous (if noble) experiment with Dagmar Krause and Evan Parker at the Bloomsbury last summer, it was back to the Nyman we all (?) know and love, with the live premiere of his soundtrack to the Peter Greenaway flick A Zed And Two Noughts.

That night in July, he tried to marry systems with free form and the result was an uncharacteristic mess.

Tonight's set was the complete opposite, with each note so absolutely in line, each phrase so logical in structure, the whole so serenely predictable.

A mite too predictable as it turned out. Despite a new compactness of composition (eleven tracks this time) I found it difficult to focus on any one piece, the subtle dynamic shifts lost without the film's bizarre imagery. Criticism for experimenting, criticism for playing safe. Sorry.

THE AGE OF CHANCE Manchester

SIX FEET tall, Woody Allan's face, a voice that's equally as ugly and a short back and sides as precise as the cut of his cloth, Stevie Elvidge is what his detractors frequently call an arrogant, sharp-suited piece of piss. Tell that to the rest of the band and they'll shrug, point out that he's got the vocal sound they want, and if you still don't understand they'll shove you in the direction of some nice pop bands.

Seven months ago, The Age Of Chance's first single, 'Motorcity', was one of three quality songs the band allowed themselves; now they've a new single out and the song total is seven. It's the repeated truncheoning of the snare drum throughout the one and a half minutes of 'Don't Know And I Don't Care' that is The Age Of Chance's mark. It's branded into every riff packed song, it's the

stamp that lines them alongside The Temptations, The Associates and The Spencer Davis Group rather than The Fall and the Postcard bands.

Clutching their riot bibles and waving the arrogance manual, The Age Of Chance are kicking their way in and it's exhilarating. The guitar slash that stained and remained on the stage wasn't a farewell, it was a warning.

THE RAILWAY CHILDREN Birmingham

THERE IS a council estate in Wolverhampton which keeps producing bands of quite remarkable quality. The Mighty Lemon Drops come from there. So do The Railway Children. The similarities between the two groups are too striking to be ignored. They both display a soft spot for wearing leather jackets with contrasting lighttoned jeans. They both try to create a sound that's disturbingly close to the darker side of your soul. Perhaps it's something they put in the water in the Black Country.

The differences are more important than the similarities, though. Where The Mighty Lemon Drops possess a stage presence that takes control of an audience with awesome ease, The Railway Children do not. It's as if they've forgotten how to communicate with the crowd. Maybe they never knew how to. But once they learn, they'll have a lot to say – and a lot of people will want to listen.

If this is how Billy acts when preaching to the converted, then give me a night when the chips are down. His fighting spirit is

this music. INXS can transform the steely coldness of their recorded work into a furnace of activity onstage. Watch a slab of downbeat funk climax aggressively into a thunderous beat on 'Melting In The Sun'. Feel the wave of energy ripple through your body when Hutchence's voice rises violently on 'Love Is What I Say'.

Pop meets funk meets rock equals power. Hutchence's eyes smoulder sexuality, his voice calls pleadingly, meltingly. The girls down the front begin to dissolve.

The singles should already be anthems in your mind, and that's how Billy sang them. His voice is strong, angry and young. OK, we've heard the tales already, but his grim savagery stamps each message anew. Britain has not changed, Bragg is equally essential, the anthems are renewed: "This one's for Margaret and Heseltine," he introduces 'Between The Wars'.

His modesty is touching. Bragg communicates like any geezer in the local: "I was listening to Capital Radio this afternoon. They don't want politics on their station, right? And good old roaring Tory Jonathan King was bleatin'

But Bragg could bury himself. Tonight's performance was charred by stupid bitchy jibes at The Redskins and the Socialist Workers' Party. Hardly an endearing tendency. And Bragg's constant affiliation with Kinnock as a mascot? He shouldn't clip on shackles with so much naive relish.

But human compassion is where his power springs. "Peace, bread, work and freedom is the best we can achieve/ Wearing badges is not enough in days like these." A Lenin badge shone a luminous red.

THE JUNE BRIDES Finsbury Park Sir George Robey

THE CONTENT sound of indie pop continues its slow but quaint drive down the small country lanes, purposefully avoiding the motorway route to major success in exchange for something a little more valuable. Of course, The June Brides won't consider it a bypass, just a preferred route that doesn't necessarily need a destination. But through this flexibility towards direction, something is suffering within the Brides' pure pop noise.

The bite - although never really there in the first place which should have made them the direct heirs to The Buzzcock tradition of pop, hasn't emerged. The Brides have moved from being a very pleasant distraction from the cold world of freezer music to being just a distraction. Nothing explodes, jilts or accelerates anymore; it shakily plods like a whistling country simpleton, pleased with his small harvest and knowing exactly what is going to happen tomorrow.

The June Brides are keen to revel in independence, which is fair enough. But they should always take time out to retune the engine or else they will end in a roadside ditch, no longer June Brides but sad winter widows. And that would be a shame.

THE MYSTERONS Sheffield

IN THE quest for cash for sacked miners and those made redundant at Sheffield's Forgemasters steelworks, The Mysterons respond to the call of duty and reform yet again for a Leadmill benefit.

16 persons invade the stage: male, female, black. white, the attractive, the downright repulsive and at least two certifiable nutcases mingle and mash in the mayhem.

Buried somewhere in the mass of bodies is an excellent core of superb instrumentation and vocals, but fear not; the rest of the mob aren't about to let that get in the way. The soul and reggae covers are dealt out with such enthusiastic spontaneity that it's often hard to believe that songs cower in the corners of some of these rowdy extravaganzas.

Each sample has 16 endings, 16 choreographers and several introductions. Soon after the first false start, the evening rapidly descends

into a pleasurable mess. Amazingly, in spite of the shoulder-to-shoulder jigs and bounces, The Mysterons survive through to the throaty roar of 600 encore calls without injury. Out step two of the mob, seven months pregnant Claudette Bonny and guitarist John Hanlon to dispel any doubts that some, at least, of The Mysterons are capable of producing a sweet soulful sound when required, but it doesn't last. The mob return, now swollen to 24 personnel, for a rendition of 'We Are Family' with no one seeming able to recall how it ends.

For all I know, they're still at it now.

COME THE annual winter full in the refrigerator business, the family Mustapha shut up shop, hitch up the customised caravan (spoiler, furry dice, race wheels, nodding dog) and hit the trail with their Albanian cultural roadshow (weddings and show trials a

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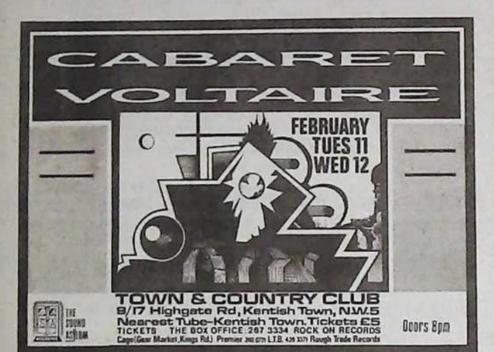
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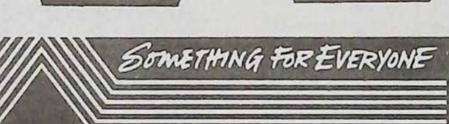
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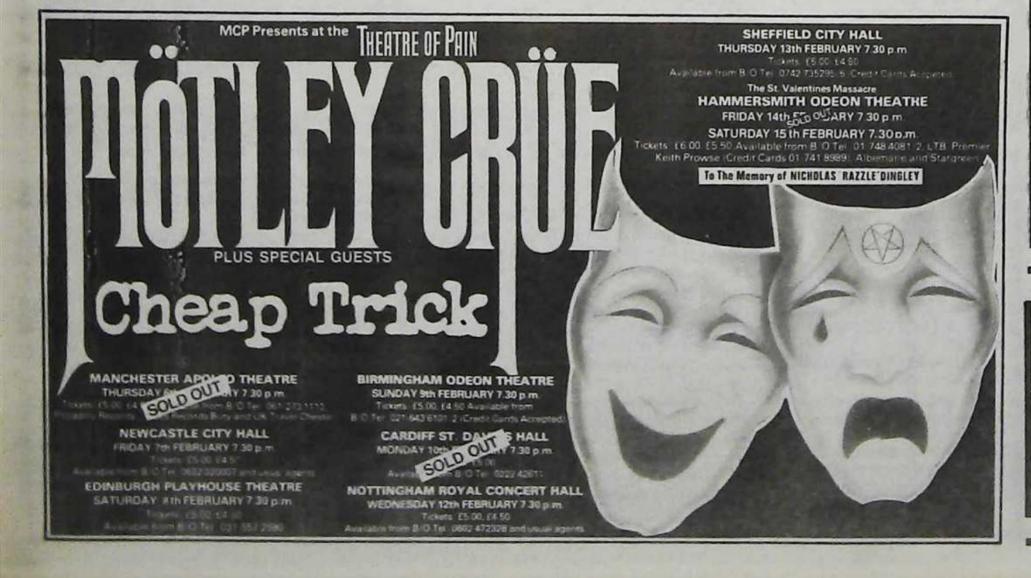


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WIM MERTENS/SOUTH OF THE BOUDOIR ICA

With him on this occasion were three stringed females, one sucking Tunes. By this time someone had finally asked the photographer to leave and we could all relax, at the same time concentrating on Mark's mellifluous music.

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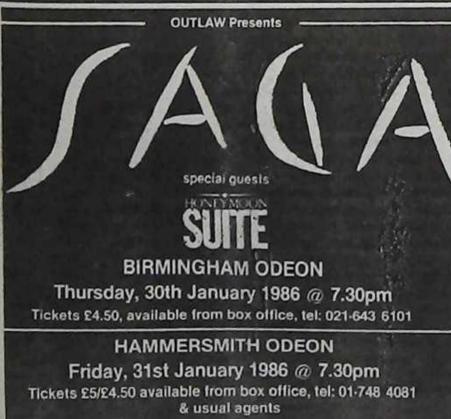

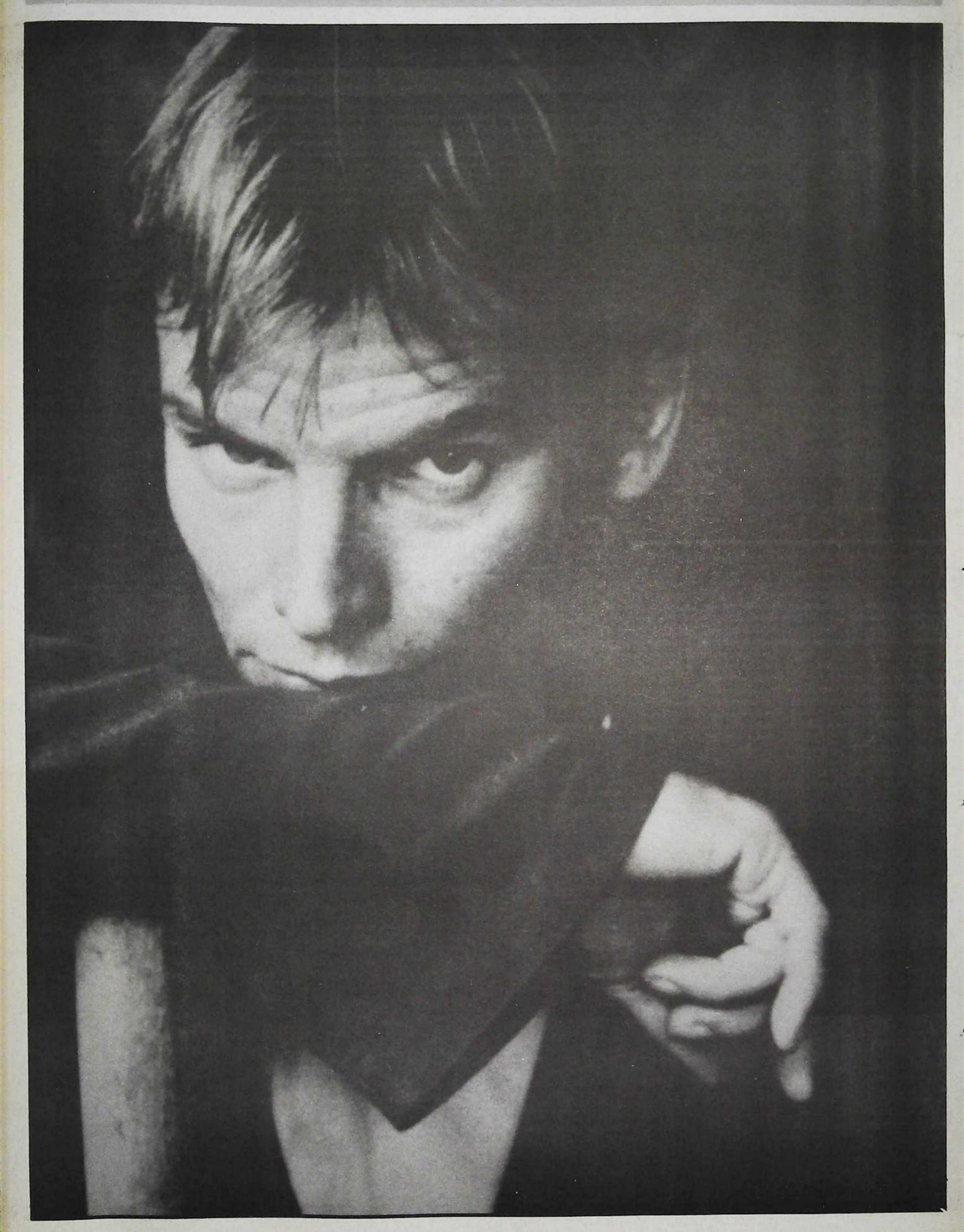

SXAPPEAL

WEST ONE SPECTRUM SERIES SX GUITAR €235.00 QQ V1/2

WESTONE HAVE always stood for economy and quality as opposed to severe originality of design, which may well be one of the reasons they offer such diversity of styles. Take their new platoon of Spectrums for instance. There's seven guitars and four bass guitars to choose from, so there's certainly no lack of choice.

Retailing at £235, the Spectrum SX seems a wee overpriced, and I say this because its sound does not do justice to its tremendous appearance. With a humbucker and two single coil Magna Flux pick-ups, you'd think it would at least have the range of an Ibanez Artist, not to mention the clout of one of those cheaper Yamaha models currently available.

Unfortunately it has neither; what it does have however, is that rather staunch, lukewarm Dave Edmunds sound with a fair bit of sustain. Quite nice really, very wholesome, very rich and very inviting, but after a while, very grating.

With a five way selector switch and a coil tap on the master volume control, some variations on the aforementioned sound are available. Moreover, for metallic Gang Of Four enthusiasts, this guitar will prove itself to be crucial in the dampened strings, lefthand thrash department. Andy 'I haven't slept in 37

years but I'm going to attempt playing 'Route 66' backwards anyway' Gill will be pleased.

The body itself is maple (as is the whole of the guitar) and it resembles a sharper. partially slimmer version of a Strat without a scratchplate. As a result of its contouring, the top and back edges have a large radius curve making the guitar very comfortable both to hold and play.

The bolt-on maple, almost Habitat neck is rather pleasant and I have to say, its action is rather akin to that of a good Fender. A good Westone move methinks, as their earlier necks were notoriously bulky. The finish is like glass, and because it's the same colour as the body, it looks futuristically ace. Only problem being that you can't see the dots or where you are that clearly. Still, I can't see this as being a major problem so let's talk headstock.

Again, the same colour as the body and neck and a

rather groovy shape too. Only one irritant - a locking top nut.

It does have its good points I suppose; when one plays with a locking top nut, one doesn't go out of tune as often as Jimi Hendrix. Anyway, so far as these devices go, this one's a good 'un. Smooth, accurate and perhaps slightly ahead of a lot of its rivals.

While on the subject of hardware, the locking top nut works very well in conjunction with its mate at the other end of the SX, the Bendmaster FT tremolo arm. FT for fine tuning, which is precisely what you get. A black plated tremolo arm does its job very well and ensures supreme tuning throughout Ritchie Blackmore romps, frolics and throw-ups. As good as a Strat tremolo any day.

Finally, we come to the bridge, which along with the quitar's overall appearance, has to be the instrument's

greatest attribute. It enables you to gauge the strings exactly where and how you want them without having to dither around with pesky little allen keys.

On a raised section of the assembly are the guitar's fine-tuners, which are very substantial and easy to operate. Terribly smooth, and terribly Steinberger. Someone obviously knows what they're doing.

So far as action and playability are concerned, the Westone SX is faultless, and if you're after relentless good looks, then look no further.

However, if you're after relentless good sounds that lend themselves to versatility, you may well be advised to have a look at the model FX which, at £299, is the flagship of the Spectrum range.

It may, therefore, have everything including a demon sound.

Still, each to his own.

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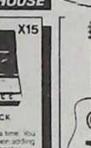
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
