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WHAM! will bow out with a six-hour spectacular at London's Wembley Stadium on June 28.

The band have promised a "celebration" of George and Andrew's four years together which will also include the world premier of the Foreign Skies video made during their Chinese adventures. There will also be support acts to be announced shortly.

Tickets are £13.50 from the Wembley box office, Edinburgh Playhouse, Newcastle City Hall, Manchester Apollo, Birmingham Odeon, Bristol Hippodrome, Newport Centre and Bournemouth BIC. They are limited to four per person.

The final WhamI single will be released on June 2 by Epic. It will be a two-record package featuring 'Edge Of Heaven' and a cover of the Was Not Was song 'Where Did Your Heart Go'.

EDEN KANE, Jet Harris, Heinz and The Tornadoes all come out of mothballs to play an Oh Boy special at Camden Dingwalls on May 29.

The show brings together a bunch of early '60s British artists who all appeared on Jack Good's legendary Oh Boy TV show.

Eden Kane (who spent 74 weeks in the charts over a three-year period), Jet Harris ("rebel" bassist who quit The Shadows to score his own hits and was one of the first pop stars ever to get busted), Heinz (who quit The Tornadoes for solo hits) and The Tornadoes (originally formed to back Billy Fury), will be joined by fellow veterans The Dallas Boys (6.5 Special regulars) and The

Vernon Girls (16-piece cover version specialists). Tickets are £7.50.

TOPPER HEADON has denied rumours that his band has split up, despite the fact that they've recently left Phonogram and most of the band are off doing other work.

"I'm writing stuff with Mickey Gallagher for the new album," he said this week. "The band are involved in other projects. That's how we're surviving at the moment without a record deal."

Topper has also announced his impending nuptials with Catherine Belben who works for Polydor.

THE SMITHS, whose 'Bigmouth Strikes Again' single comes out on Rough Trade this week, have tentatively agreed to headline the G-Mex gig at Manchester's Exhibition Centre on July 19, details of which were announced last week.

The band are trying to shift some European dates so that they can play the gig. If they are successful they'll also be playing Newcastle Mayfair on July 17 as well.

The Smiths are equally vague about their long-awaited new album which is now coming out in mid-June, although it does have a specific title – 'The Queen Is Dead'.

Ultra-shock ...



ULTRAVOX drummer Warren Cann has left the band – just as they have started work on their next album at Conny Plank's studios in Germany.

Warren was apparently asked to leave because of "irreconcilable musical differences". He will now pursue a project with Hans Zimmer.

It's the first change in the band's line-up since they broke through with 'Vienna'. But Midge Ure, Billy Currie and Chris Cross are continuing with the album which should be out in the autumn.

Midge Ure meanwhile releases a brand new solo single on Chrysalis this week called 'Call Of The Wild'. It's backed by a live version of 'When The Winds Blow'.

THE DAMNED have a 1977 vintage live version of 'I Am So Bored' unearthed from Stiff's vaults and added to their reissued 'New Rose' single as a little promotional tool.

MADNESS will be joined by Working Week, Potato 5, Tippa Irie and Pato Banton for their Artists Against Apartheid show at Brixton Academy on June 20. Tickets are £5.

MARC'S CHER OUT

Almond releases stage fave 45

MARC ALMOND has a

new single out on Some Bizzare on May 27. It's a cover of the Phil Spector/April Stevens/Nino Tempo song 'A Woman's Story' originally recorded by Cher, which has been an Almond stage favourite for some time.

The B-side is another cover, this time of Lee Hazlewood's 'For One Moment' while the 12-inch goes cover mad with versions of Procol Harum's 'Salty Dog', Scott Walker's 'The Plague', Peter Hammil's 'Just Good Friends', Johnny Ray's 'The Little White Cloud That Cried' and Eartha Kitt's 'The Heel'.

Marc has just completed an Italian and Spanish tour and is recording a new album which will be released early next year.

There are plans for a weeklong residency at Ronnie Scott's Club at the end of the summer and details will be announced nearer the time.

Go! Discs are losing their status in the *Music Weekl*Gallup indie chart after pressure from Umbrella, the newly-formed indie labels association.

Music Week now joins the MRIB chart in accepting Umbrella's criteria for an indie single which covers only records supplied through indie distributors.

This excludes Stiff, who are distributed by EMI, Beggars Banquet (WEA) and Go! Discs (Chrysalis/Phonogram). If they wish to register in the indie charts they will have to change their distribution to the Cartel,

Big blast off for '21st Century Boy' single and Trans-Former tour

sigue sigue sputnik begin their second coming with a new single on May 26, '21st Century Boy', and a British tour in July to coincide with their debut album, which currently has the working title of 'From Heels To Eternity'.

'21st Century Boy' is produced by Giorgio Moroder. The B-side is a touching homage to their record company called 'Buy EMI'.

The seven-inch sleeve unfolds into a crucifix of TV sets, the gimmick chosen to promote the band until the album comes along.

BRONSKI BEAT have cancelled their London Sadlers Wells shows – which were only announced a couple of week ago – because of "unforeseen technical production difficulties".

The shows, which had already nearly sold out, will be rescheduled later and refunds are available from the box office.

JOAN ARMATRADING, who's just released her 'Sleight Of Hand' album and is playing the Princes Trust show at Wembley next month, has announced a major British tour in October.

She plays Bournemouth Conference Centre October 2, Brighton Centre 3, St Austell Coliseum 5, Gloucester Leisure Centre 6, Leicester De Montfort Hall 7, Sheffield City Hall 8, Newcastle City Hall 9-10, Newport Leisure Centre 12, Birmingham Odeon 13-14, Manchester Apollo 17, Edinburgh Playhouse 18-19, Aberdeen Capitol 20, Dublin Simmons Court 23, Belfast Maysfield Hall 24, Nottingham Royal Centre 26, Oxford Apollo 27, Wembley Arena 29-30.

Tickets are £8.50, £7.50 and £6.50 except Wembley which is £9.50 and £8.50.

SIMPLE MINDS have added second shows at Milton Keynes Bowl and Glasgow Ibrox Park having sold them both out once.

The Ibrox's show is on June 6 and the Milton Keynes concert is on the 22nd. Both are expected to sell out again.

Ibrox tickets are £11.50 from the box office and record outlets around Scotland. The promoters are discouraging postal bookings as they've already got a hefty backlog from the first concert. But those who applied unsuccessfully for the first show will be sent tickets for the second.

The support bill for the 6th is In Tua Nua, Hipsway, The Waterboys and Lloyd Cole And The Commotions. For the 7th it's In Tua Nua, Hipsway, The Waterboys and The Cult.

The Waterboys and Dr And The Medics will be appearing with Simple Minds on the 22nd plus more names to be announced

soon.

DENNIS BROWN and The Wailers – making their first British appearance on their own – are headlining this year's Reggae Sunsplash at Wembley Arena on June 28 and 29.

Other bands so far confirmed are Aswad, Black Uhuru, King Sounds and Abba Cush. There will also be a string of PA's from other artists.

The festival has switched from last year's venue at Selhurst Park after objections from the police and local residents, not to mention the National Front.

DR JOHN, Herbie Hancock, Keith Jamett, Wayne Shorter and McCoy Tyner are all playing London's Royal Festival Hall in July as part of this year's Capital Music Festival.

Dr John is joined by Otis Rush and John Mayall for the first Capital Radio Jazz Parade show on July 14.

Lionel Hampton plays on the 15th, Herbie Hancock Quartet with Branford Marsalis and Ron Carter 16, McCoy Tyner Trio with Joe Henderson and Freddie Hubbard 17, Buddy Rich 18, Keith Jamett Trio and Wayne Shorter 19.

This year's Festival opens with a free party in the Covent Garden Piazza on June 20 with Harvey And The Wallbangers, The National Youth Jazz Orchestra, and The London Community Gospel Choir.

Pinnacle, Spartan or Making Waves

Not surprisingly Stiff boss
Dave Robinson was unhappy
with the news. "It's a put-up
job against any indie label that's
doing well for itself at the
moment," he shouted down
the telephone. "Most of those
labels couldn't get major
distributors if they tried.

"It's ridiculous. If we're not an indie label, who is? And the chart is about indie singles, not indie distributors. I object to somebody telling me I'm a major. I know I'm indie. It's just that I'm interested in selling records to anyone, regardless of race, creed or distributor.

"While EMI distribute our records to all the major stores I distribute to about 45 independent shops directly which is as many as most of the indie distributors."

Robinson claimed that he wasn't consulted about the change in the chart criteria which he says will damage his company, but he seems unlikely to switch his distribution arrangements as a result.

"There's no way I could trust an indie distributor with the prices they charge and the lousy service they offer," he snorted.

But a meeting of Umbrella members last week – which was not attended by anyone from Stiff, Beggars Banquet or Go! Discs – overwhelmingly backed the indie-only chart criteria.

Umbrella members were clearly against any fraternisation with the "Big Six" major record companies over the indie charts although they were more ambivalent over the use of major label strike forces to promote a particular album.

Both The Smiths, who used London Records' strike force for their last album, and The Cocteau Twins, who used Island, came under fire from militant indies who claimed they were contravening the indie spirit.

But Rough Trade boss Geoff Travis claimed that the Smiths were a fervently indie band and said that the use of major label strike forces was a "short-term strategic move" while an indie strike force was being set up. And he warned that the indie scene was in danger of becoming a ghetto unless bands were allowed to progress as far as they wanted within it.

The Smiths and The Cocteau Twins were given the benefit of the doubt but the position will be reviewed in six months time.

A GRUMH, "the world's most militant hardcore gay dance group", release their third album in eleven months this week on Scarface (through Red Rhino) titled 'No Way Out'.

THE REVENGE, an "agitated" rock band from Brussels, formed by ex-Digital Dance member Jerry WX, release their first album called 'Wartime' on Play It Again Sam! (through Red Rhino) this week. The label are also putting out the new Minimal Man Album, 'Slave Lullabyes' and a 12-inch single from Neon Judgement titled 'Voodoo Nipplefield'.

ANGEL WITCH return with new drummer Spencer Hollman and an album called 'Frontal Assault' released this month by Killerwatt (through Pinnacle), who are also releasing the first album by Birmingham band Surface called 'Race The Night'.

THE HOME SERVICE, who've kept faith with folk traditions rather than the folk scene, have a new album out on Making Waves this month titled 'Alright Jack'.

93 CURRENT 93 have a picture disc tastefully titled 'In Menstrual Night' out this week on United Dairies who are also releasing a Nurse With Wound retrospective called 'Automating' and the debut album from German teenybop avant garde-ists Hnas called 'Melchior'.

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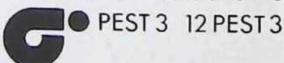
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BACKTRACKS

GARNET MIMMS, who recently had a 'Best Of' compilation out on Stateside, now has a companion volume called 'Roll With The Punches' released by Charly this month. The 16 tracks were recorded between 1963 and 1967 and include his Northern Soul favourites 'Prove It To Me' and 'Looking For You' as well as three previously unissued tracks. The first pressing also has a rough mix alternate take of 'One Woman Man' which will be replaced by the proper mix on subsequent pressings.

Charly are also putting out an album by little-known Southern soul man Charles Brimmer called 'Brimful Of Soul', consisting of '70s recordings. It doesn't include his 'Good Bless Our Love' hit though.

GENESIS have their 'From Genesis To Revelation' 1969 debut album reissued as 'Where The Sour Turns To Sweet' on Rock Machine this month. The album also includes the singles 'The Silent Sun' and 'A Winter's Tale' as well as some of the finest sleevenotes ever written.

SONNY BOY WILLIAMSON, Memphis Slim, Matt 'Guitar'
Murphy and Willie Dixon have a concert from their 1963
European tour released by Red Lightnin' this month as 'The
Unissued 1963 Blues Festival' to distinguish it from previously
issued albums. It should be pointed out that the sound quality
occasionally descends to bootleg quality.

Red Lightnin' are also putting out an album featuring a live side each from Mississippi Fred McDowell and Phil Guy called 'A Dose Of Double Dynamite'.

MOBY GRAPE have a true friend in Edsel. Having reissued their masterful 1967 debut album, Edsel gather up the best from their next three CBS albums for a compilation called 'Murder In My Heart'. There's five tracks from 'Wow' (but nothing from the 'Grape Jam' bonus album which was only ever released in the States), five from 'Moby Grape '69' made after Skip Spence skipped off in an acid haze, and a couple from 'Truly Fine Citizen' by which time they were down to a trio.

From the same mists of time, Edsel have also compiled an album from The Electric Prunes called 'Long Day's Flight' which features tracks from their 'I Had Too Much To Dream (Last Night)' and 'Underground' only ever available here on import albums and a couple of rare singles – 'Ain't It Hard' and 'You Never Had It Better'. But their two later concept albums, 'Mass In F Minor' and 'Release Of An Oath' have been passed over on the grounds that they didn't know what they were doing at the time.

ROBERT AND JOHNNY, a couple of Bronx teenage cruisers who had their moment of glory in 1958 with 'We Belong Together', are revived by Ace on an album called (of course) 'We Belong Together' which includes various attempts to repeat the formula as well as the odd rockabilly and blues number

ATLANTIC release a soulful '60s single this week to keep in touch with the nostalgia boom. It packs together Arthur Conley's 'Sweet Soul Music', Wilson Pickett's 'Land Of A Thousand Dances', Solomon Burke's 'Everybody Needs Somebody To Love', Aretha Franklin's 'Respect', Booker T's 'Green Onions' and King Curtis' 'Memphis Soul Stew'.

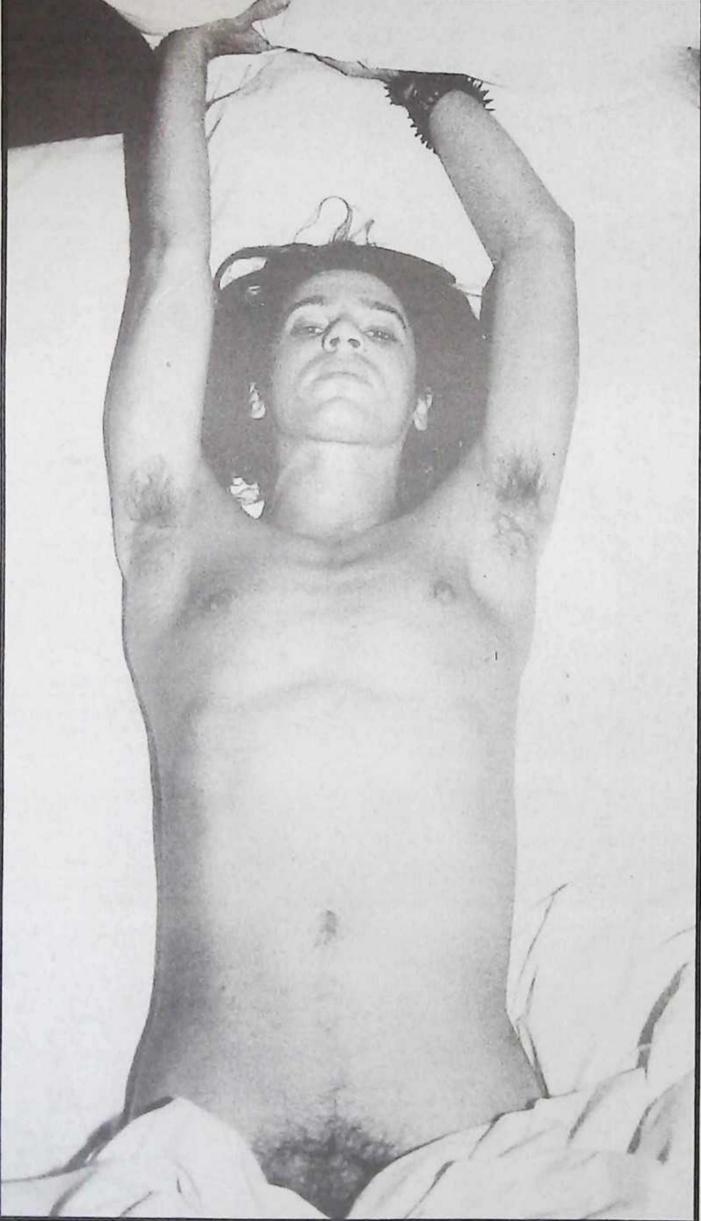

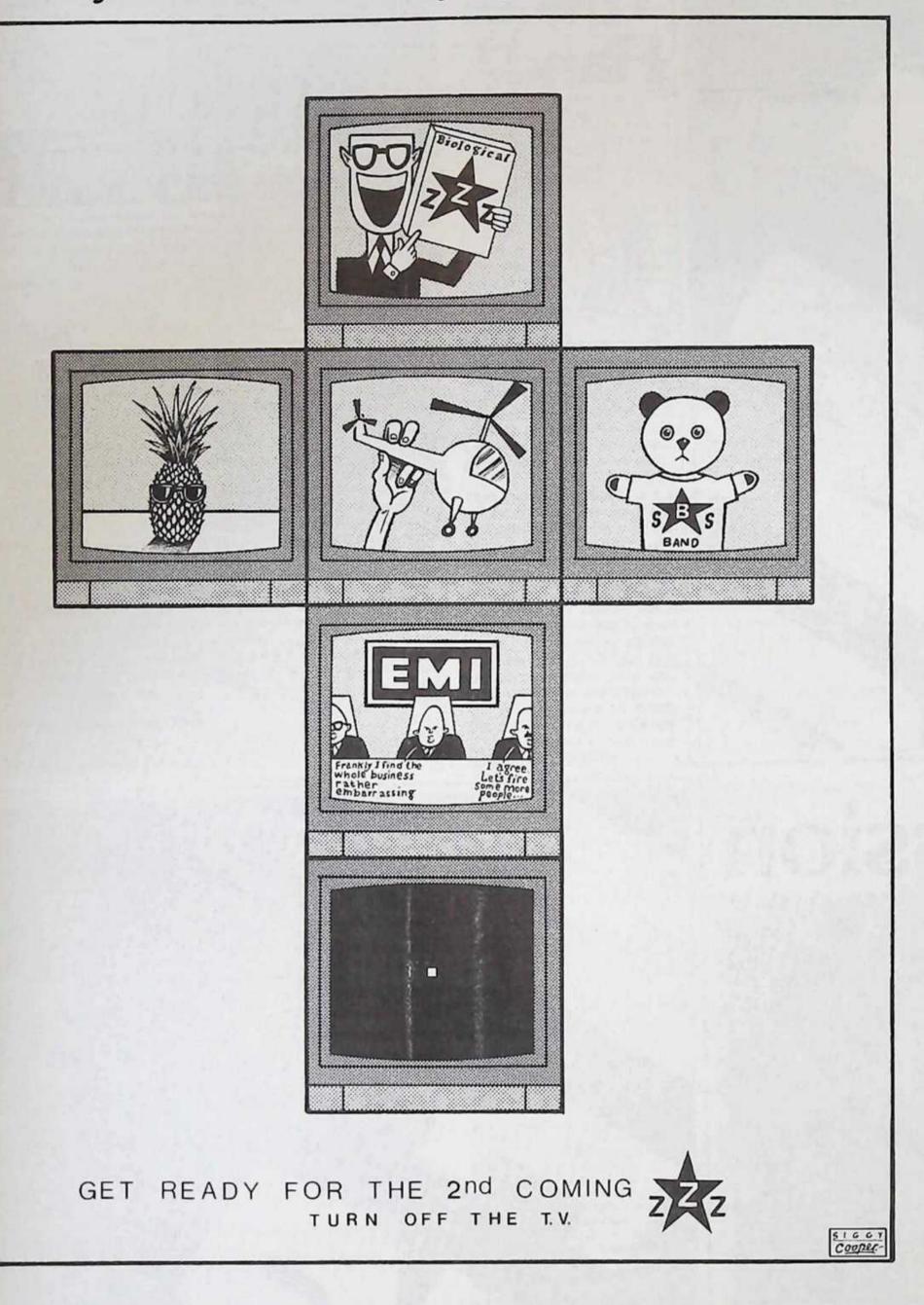

the five minutes the video lasts. Now, If It takes ten men three days to dlg through a sewer, how many rats does it take to leave a sinking ship?

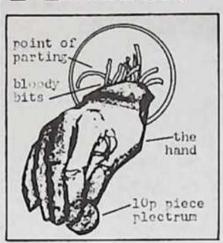

Then he decided to save up for a synthesiser and manage a band called The Drones. Instead of all that he went to London and wrote for New Mediocre Express.

Why should we be appalled and bewitched by Paul Morley? It's a bloody liberty. He spent the next few years watching television and upsetting everybody. He drank whiskey and ate chocolate and wondered why everyone said he was rude to them. Paul Weller shouted at him a lot and Meat Loaf nearly bit his head off (it was too big, ha ha. 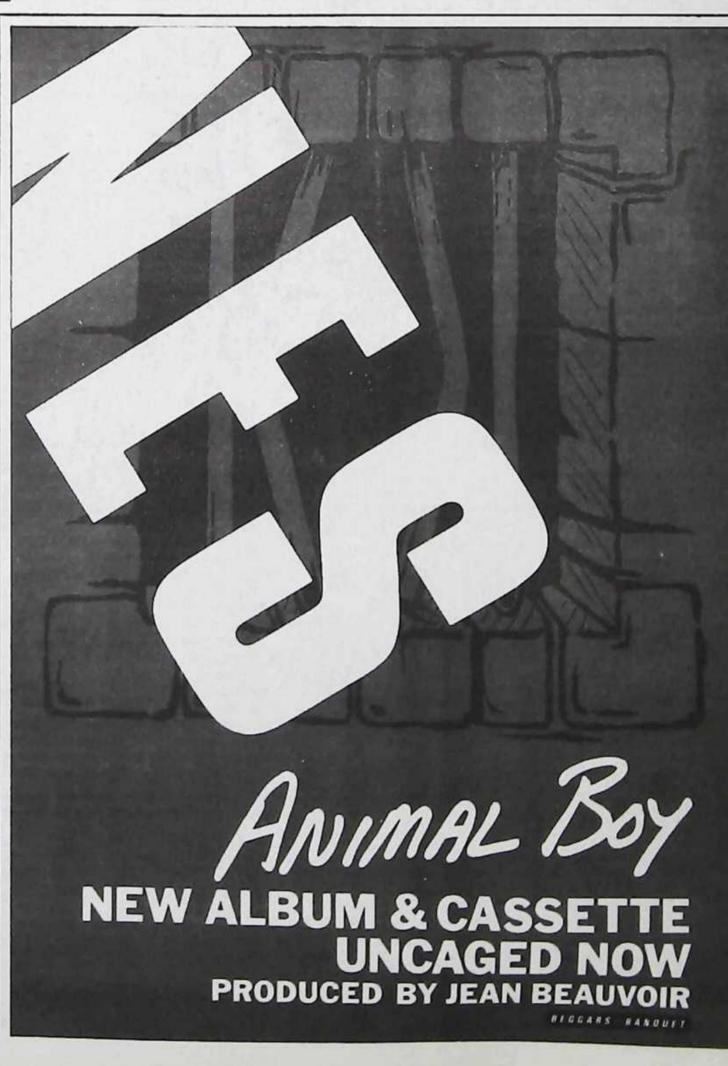

WHAT CAN you expect from the best director currently working in America? Only the best of course ... which is why Martin Scorcese's After Hours is such a let down. IF A tramp tried to commit suicide in your swimming pool, the chances are you'd be a little concerned and do your best to fish him out. But then, you're probably one of the 99% of the population who don't have swimming pools and even if you did, the odds-on that a tramp might want to snuff it therein must be a zillion to one.

This, nevertheless, is the plot of Down And Out In Beverly Hills, freely adapted, as director Paul Mazursky is happy to point out, from the Renoir classic Boudu Saved From Drowning.

Nick Nolte is the flea-ridden bundle of rags who loses his faithful mutt and decides to take a swim to eternity in the garden pool of millionaire couple, Richard Dreyfuss and Bette Midler.

Quick as a splash, Dreyfuss whips him out and brings him back to life, offering him the comforts of his luxurious Beverly Hills home in which to recover. Dreyfuss has a guilt complex about having made so much money from manufacturing wire coat hangers. Not so his screeching wife, who can't stand the sight of the hairy beast. Yet one by one Nolte wins over the entire family, including the cutesy little dog, Matisse, and the young college student, Jenny, played by the late Rick Nelson's daughter, Tracey.

Down And Out In Beverly Hills is a hilarious encounter between a man who has nothing and comes to realise it, and a family who have everything and don't know what to do with it. The entire cast are superb, and watch out for Little Richard in the cameo role of the next door neighbour, Orvis Goodnight.

BOB: hiiii-yah!

IS THAT IT? Bob Geldof

(Sidgwick & Jackson £10.95)

THE MOUTH that ate its way through the political and social niceties that allow the First World to watch the Third World dying of starvation hasn't stinted itself when it comes to telling its owner's story.

Twice on the jacket it states that "parents, and some other readers, may find parts of this book offensive". This is presumably a warning to those of a nervous disposition who might be upset by Geldof's frank approach to masturbation, sexual intercourse and related behaviour.

There are others who may squirm with embarrassment or worse when their names are mentioned in the book, Sounds included – our gratuitous insult to a pregnant Paula Yates was almost as shameful as our meagre coverage of Live Aid.

But then nobody's ego gets soothed in this book, least of all Bob's. Which is what makes it such a compulsive read. And even though Geldof was "helped" by Times journalist Paul Vallely, Geldof's characteristically blunt imprint is on every

The first 100 pages are about his Dublin childhood, a typically Irish tragi-comedy of life, death and wanking that even J P Donleavy might envy. And so much of it is derogatory to Bob himself, let alone his dad, it's unlikely he made it up.

The next 100 pages trace the rise and fall of The Boomtown Rats. Bob's brash confidence set them ahead of the crowd, which stuck in the gullet of the new wave snobbery emerging from the music press. But his failure to suck up to American hype and hypocrisy – the account of his CBS promo trip across the States is a must for all students of the music industry – ruled the band out of this one essential territory for superstardom. From then on their decline was inevitable.

The remaining 150 pages are the story of Band Aid, from the first stirrings (Paula's suggestion that they should charge £5 to everyone who came to their house until they'd raised £200) through the serendipity that produced the Band Aid single to the stupendous success of Live Aid.

Bob's disillusionment with his fading rock career allowed him to devote all his nagging and bullshit into rock music's proudest gesture. And what no one can take away from him is that without him it simply would not have happened.

Live Ald may well be "it" for Geldof – one of his biggest problems, as is This it? shows, is that he has trouble sustaining any venture for long – and it's hard to see how he could top it.

But "it" is more than enough, and certainly his life so far is worth a book. It's for Geldof Aid which is the least he deserves.

THE THREE JOHNS: animal crackers

HY ARE we here?
A good question. And the attendant of the cafe in London Zoo wants to know but says something else.

"I'm afraid you can't sit in those seats," he bristles behind a toothbrush moustache. "They're for a party of handicapped kids that are coming in soon.

"Oh, alright, that's OK, you can sit there," he demures, loosening his molars, and taking pity on us.

We're here because we're all crippled with fear and laughter at the antics of men like monkeys, politics as paralysis, the drying out process, Libya as a catalyst, the nature of clothes, the taste of despair, and to decide what sort of animals we'd like to be if we weren't monkeys like men.

There is a rumour that you are in fact fish with legs.

"Axolotls, yeah." John Langford flashes his mature art school teeth as bright as a guitar chord he might pluck from a star.

"We keep axolotis. They're fish with legs.
Well they're not really fish, they look like fish
with legs but they're actually something
else," he explains very helpfully.

"They're half formed, basically, like

salamanders," John Brennon beams, as if he were plucking bass strings from his Irish beard.

"They, like, actually discover sex before puberty," butts in sometime Mekon Langford, "so they don't turn into what they're actually meant to be. That's why we identify with them so much. In fact, we're still waiting. They live in one lake in Mexico and have been tamed and domesticated."

The Three Johns aren't tame — sometimes lame, yes — nor are they overly domesticated, unless you include making your bed before you leave your hotel when touring or not throwing television sets out of the window.

"Axolotis are named after the god Xoloti," mumbles singer John Hyatt. "They are meant to turn into really boring, burrowing salamanders, but they don't make it unless you add iodine to their water or let the water evaporate," continues Langford.

"The Mexicans eat them as well, yet they're very unappetising. Having said all that, I'm not sure I'd like to be one. I think I'd rather be a chimp because they have so much fun and they're free in the mind."

How about you?

"I dunno, I've never really thought about it," admits Hyatt. "Dolphins look like fun though."

"EER SWILLING, big bellied, agit-prop musicians is how we're portrayed normally and then the press forget about us for another year," pinpoints Langford.

The Three Johns notice that motor cars

have wings like a fish and tails like a bird, and in the next gasp spurt "The political party we'd join doesn't yet exist."

On the road of existence things are never easy but some Stone Age sods make progress more difficult, like Reagan and Thatcher. This band point their fingers like daggers through their music, which isn't simple enough to be pretentious or pretentious enough to be simple.

In search of evolution and social iodine, we find tired cod and chips, plastic seats, rain, a gorilla named Salome, some bad jokes, good laughs, and eventually my carrier bag full of drink which somewhat undermines the idea of doing a sober Three Johns interview.

Casting aside the albatross of being dubbed jolly, drunken do-gooders is one of the motives for going ape in Regent's Park Zoo, albeit quietly.

So: why are we here? I mean, really, you know?

The studied informality of the setting of this interview has been colluded on by the writer, the band and publicist, to pour oil over the fact we are all cogs in the music machine which has just churned out The Three Johns' second album, 'The World By Storm'.

We have acted as if coming to the zoo will make this interview somehow more important. This is a mistake, for the only thing at stake here is the music. The Three Johns' meshing of slashed guitar beat noise to a carpet bag-full of topics rattles with the issues of now and yesterday: nukes, Liverpool, American cultural and physical imperialism: torch lights in the sewer of living.

Today we look at The Three Johns sporting the Ken market clothes they bought two hours ago with the £50 each they were given by Abstract, and realise it can't be much fun being a cult and for so long. And despite its occasional weak breeze, both they and I hope 'The World By Storm' will hurricane them out of the indie doldrums.

In other words we are here on serious business.

Do you tell jokes at all?

"Did you just fart?" asks Hyatt, looking at me and feeling the animal skin texture of his new black leather trousers.

"No," I laugh, truthfully.

"Oh."

It is obviously high time to break out my bottle of tequila.

"Hah-hah. You're a bad man," they grin upon sighting the liquid. We proceed to get drunk, not on alcohol – there isn't enough of it – but on ideas. The Three Johns are not dipso-idiots but worried men who combat confusion with pit-dark humour. Theirs is a music of disenchantment, late 20th Century British blues, and more.

"Do you collect jokes?" asks Brennon, badges of Lenin and a machine gun leering from his newly purchased shirt. "Bob Monkhouse does. He's got a word processor with about a million jokes on it."

"Why doesn't he use them, then?" retorts Hyatt.

"Why is it that when Ronnie and Nancy have sex Nancy is always on top?" continues

Brennon. "Because Ronnie can only f*** up."
"Don't put that in please," requests
Langford, his barrel chest heaving beneath
his new black suit jacket. "Our mothers
always read these things and get the
impression we swear all the time, which we
don't."

"We're more story people than joke people," reckons Hyatt.

The Dutch are apparently so inclined as well.

"We saw this guy once when we were over there whose act was to put dead batteries up his bum because there's still a bit of power left in them and they keep him warm during winter. This is completely true."

The Three Johns are bigger than a ball of Edam in Holland.

"Personally I like meaningless stories," adds Langford. "For example two women are looking in a dress shop. One says to the other, That's the one I'd get... and a cyclops comes out and thumps her!"

Seriously funny people, we're here to discover where The Three Johns — a trio of elder musicians — fit politically, socially, artistically, every which way . . . and to laugh.

The irony is they don't dovetail into any convenient pigeonholes, being too old to be

pin-ups, too left for the Red Wedge, too anarchic to tow the SWP line and too complex to be satisfied by vacuous pop. This is precisely why they are interesting.

T'S RAINING and Noah is nowhere.
'The World By Storm's title track, although not topically representative of an album which pulls Britain through a lyrical shredder, is a continuation of the fear and loathing the Johns feel when they perceive America's despotism and the simultaneous death of Europe's identity. The MacDonalds in your high street is merely the most visible example of this invasion.

"We toured over there last year and had some very peculiar encounters with the far right in the States," explains Langford. "In a bar we met this guy who claimed to be a member of the CIA. He had a cratered face twice the size of a normal one and was dressed in Ninja gear, a nuclear jet T-shirt and a black baseball cap.

"Just like the typical loony on the bus, he spotted me and started talking about how he was going to the local CIA school for languages. The irony was he was a second generation Russian who planned to go back there and fight for America.

"Do you like Margaret Thatcher? he asked us. Well, not really, we told him. But she's the only one who will stand by us against the Russians, he argued.

"For some reason I found that really frightening — that loonies like that are let loose on the streets and paid for their bigotry in America. And to think, Britain is a nation of slaves to the wishes of mad Yanks!"

From there to here, The Three Johns have always worn their consciences like radiation suits, either through doing benefits for the likes of the miners and CND or by reflecting their concerns in words and music.

And the nuclear nightmare and its attendant arms race rears its ugly head in 'Atom Drum Bop' which has now been transformed from the title of their first album into a song on their second.

"I wrote the lyrics to that eight years ago," broods Hyatt. "Not much has changed in the intervening years, has it?"

I think so. In the early '80s the nuclear issue was very prominent in the media and there were massive CND demos but now that whole thrust of agitation seems to be much weaker, I reply. Concern over leaky nuclear generators still leaves people nonplussed about the presence of nuclear arms.

"Well, when the Cruise missiles arrived that was the big kick in the face basically, wasn't it," sighs Langford. "It was always hoped that they wouldn't get here and that was the crucial blow.

"Even so I'm shit-scared now just because of this Libyan thing. I didn't know anything about it. I just turned on the telly and went, 'What the f***!?'

"I've always thought a nuclear war was bound to happen and I still think it's bound to happen," moans Langford. "The thing is the anti-nuke issue probably isn't fashionable now, and that fits in with us doing a song about it which will make it even less fashionable.

"I'd say CND are in a bit of a mess as well. They present a very bad image, sort of smug, wet and one issue."

The ability of mankind to become blasé about potential global destruction never ceases to amaze me. But, as Hyatt points out, the (imagined?) tailing off of vocal support for CND has coincided with this shift to localised issues, such as leaky old Sellafield and nuclear dumping.

"The thing is everybody is ultimately responsible for what is happening around them," he says. "No one is innocent in the world by storm. Unfortunately, I think the majority of people will discover this far too late in the day — like after World War III breaks out.

"The fact that kids are growing up without the chance of a decent education nowadays hardly helps either. If this government continues to make cuts in schools and facilities, especially in the working class areas like they're doing, then kids will be even less able to sift and filter the truth from the crap. After all, the TV certainly won't tell them the truth, will it?"

Return to the planet of the apes with JACK BARRON and meet those three wise monkeys THE THREE JOHNS who desperately want to step out of their indie-cult cage and into the spotlight. PETER ANDERSON beams down

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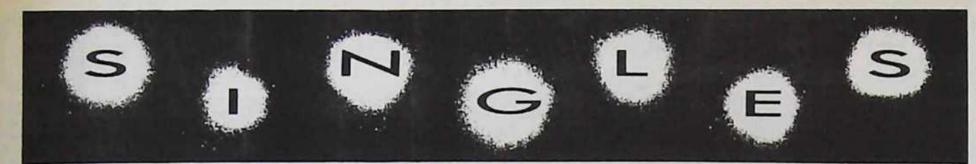
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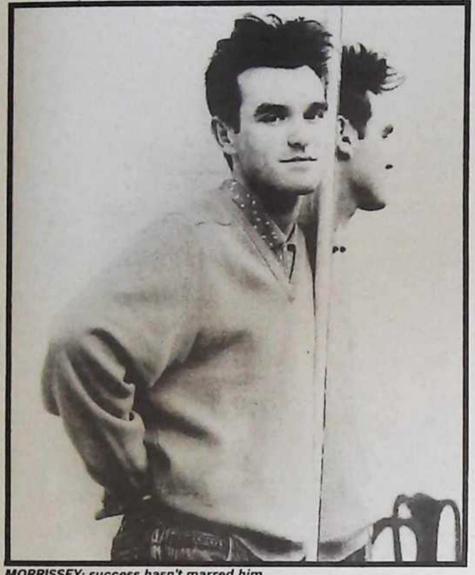

MORRISSEY: success hasn't marred him

THE SMITHS 'Bigmouth Strikes Again' (Rough Trade) Popular critical opinion would have it that Morrissey has lost all his endearing young charm. And that only Johnny 'Brian' Marr still cuts it in this camp.

And as usual, popular critical opinion cannot tell its arse from its elbow. Morrissey's vocal whimsies are as enticing as ever, they paint a loving smile wide and bright across these customarily sneering lips. And when he announces that he knows now how Joan Of Arc felt then, his cry of understanding takes flight and soars high above Marr's one guitar town. And the whole world sees that it is in the presence of a thing of great beauty.

Frankly, Mr Shankly, if there is any sign of weakness here. then it is only that, as Shelagh Delaney once told Jeffrey Ingrams to say, the dream has gone but the baby is real. Too many fools flirted with the Grand Importance of The Smiths. And as it has become clear that they too are just another pop band - albeit one of the very best - the disappointment has scuffed a little of the sheen from Morrissey's grand design.

Meanwhile, Johnny Marr should never have been allowed to believe his own hype. For I am getting well fed-up of b-sides chocker with plodding instrumental dross when I could be marvelling at Morrissey. Popular critical opinion, in its preening self-righteousness, has convinced both itself and Johnny Marr that he is today's precious guitar guru. But in truth it is his lauded guitar patterns which are increasingly becoming restricted and blinkered. And if there is any threat at all to the future well-being of my favourite Mancunian act, then it lies in his inability to deal with his position in the frame of things.

Someone will have to take young 'Brian' in hand.

MIGHTY LEMON DROPS 'Like An Angel' (Dreamworld) 1,000 VIOLINS 'Halcyon Days' 'Like One Thousand Violins' (Dreamworld) The

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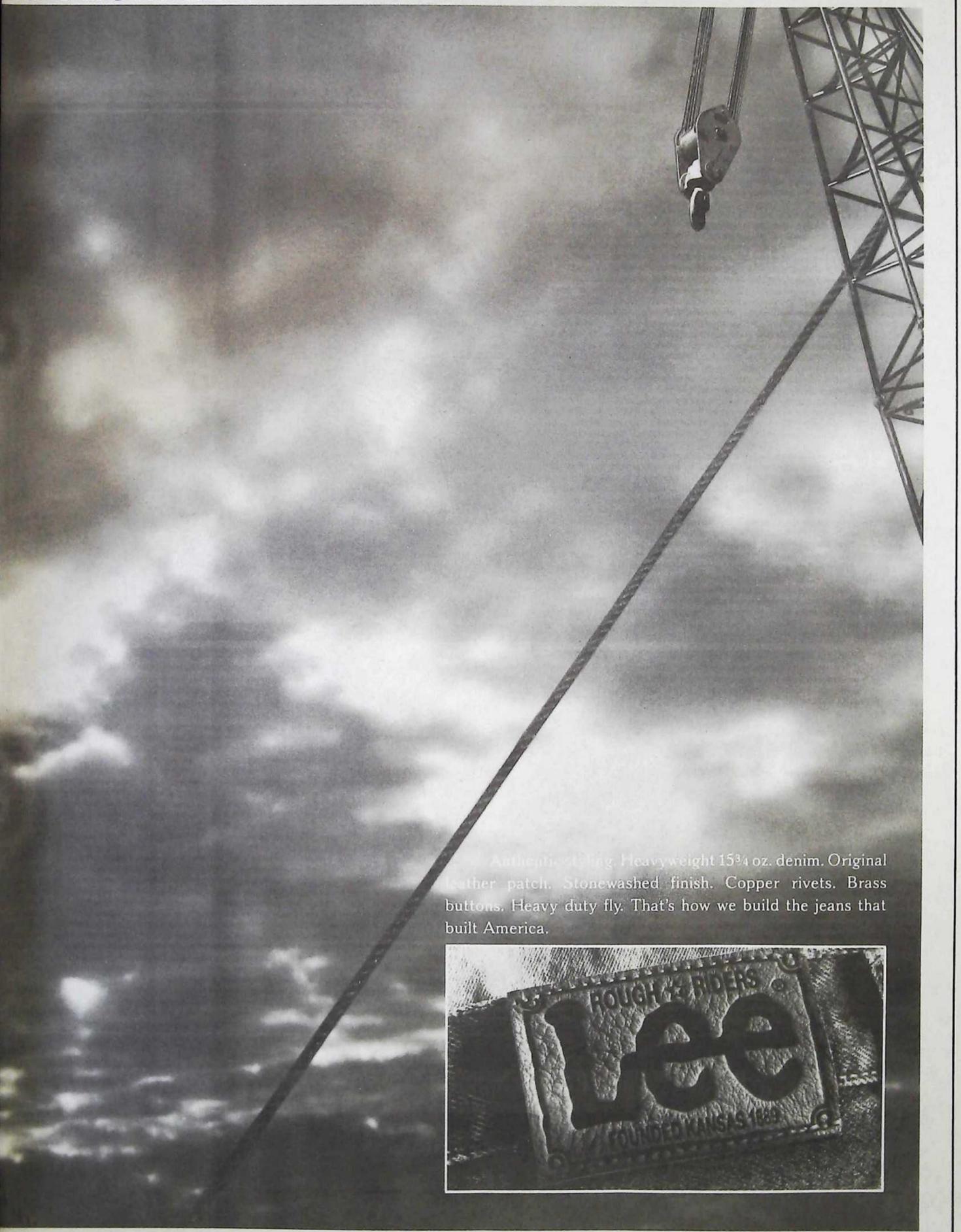

"Though I did read Titus Groan again recently and I'd forgotten she (Fuchsia) died, or it hit me harder, or it meant more this time. It was almost unbearable - she's there, then she's gone, lost, taken away from me."

DON'T know why I began that way, making it seem to you that Robert Smith is a sorrowful or sentimental man, but the fact is he is also not what they'd said.

In general, when they (you know who I mean) lead you (for artistic reasons) to expect one kind of person, you almost always meet another. So instead of a libidinous, drug-headed weasel I found someone funny, hesitant, shy, charming, guarded, clever and haunting.

Which is what the music had lead me to

It was only when I'd made this rash thing - a character analysis - that he said, "I'm like a sponge. I pick up my manner from whoever I'm with. So, this evening, because you speak quietly (I do? I speak quietly?) I am, too.

"I'm mirroring you."

I don't altogether believe this excuse because the tension is sustained, but, before I can blush, he's asked, "Do you have any brothers or sisters? Do you believe in God?"

Some of my questions are unfairly weighted,

OMEONE HAS told Robert Smith that I'm a man and that I'm quite a nasty-tempered man, and for this reason he is

understandably confused when we meet. He can see - I hope - that the first is all wrong, but the temper part could still be valid. As we wait for a taxi to the pub, he paces, tensely feline (he'd like that idea), around my chair and doesn't see the irony of using this moment to make clear he's not a drunk.

"Pooh, The Waterboys. You should've seen them with us at the Greenpeace show. They were just so out of it - what a state. Like, I would never never – allow anyone . . . or . . . or let myself, get like that. I mean, if I was to drink like that, we'd never be in this position. The band."

I'm not certain what I should say, and he takes this silence for censure on my part and asks to use the phone ("Just one more call, please?") to contact Mary, his girlfriend of nearly 13 years for reassurance, I think now. Just to hear her voice. His own mellows and warms . .

"But if we do that you'll get me to drive - no, you will, I bet you do

As the call goes on, he relaxes to the floor and lies on his back. Reassurance.

FTER ALL these Cure years, Robert Smith is still wilfully a misunderstood man. Perhaps because he hasn't mastered the machine, the Moby Dick music biz rumbles along and hears a ditty and hammers him into a compartment it can be happy with. It's really pretty funny, the way it all works - right down to this hackery. But even I can tell the difference between two sharp intakes of breath.

Still, even now that Robert's contract with Polydor ("How many people work in the Polydor office? About half.") has lapsed and he's thinking about options, he's not free. A compilation - a retrospective, really - has been launched on the world, about which he says, "There was nothing we could have done, apart from putting disclaimers everywhere saying, Don't buy this "

The album is accompanied by Staring At The Sea, a video documentary of surprising fascination and sustained power, about which he says, "It's the saving grace. The others kept rewinding it, they wouldn't believe the older stuff was them."

'In limbo' is probably a phrase Robert would like to investigate more.

Meanwhile, I've spent the taxi-ride telling the usual entertaining stories against myself, some of which are true, so he's loosened up, and we go to earth in a Maida Vale bar where, if people recognise this animal, they are too wealthy to say so. We can talk better now, and I see the things that make him happy and make him privately smile are the things he's never asked about.

Will you tell me about Mary?

"Yes, but I find it difficult. I try to keep that side of my life as normal as possible, so - there isn't much to say that would interest anyone else, although it is actually more fascinating than anything I do in public.

"But ask me something. Go on. Ask." Where did you meet, then? (I feel like a voyeur

"Well . . . when I was 13, at our new school , she and her friend thought I was funny. From that point on, I did everythin' I could to try and impress Mary that I was . . . ah hmm, an amusing human being.

"After that it took about two years - no, about 18 months - until she let me take her out. And then her friend came. She didn't trust me even in those days."

What about now?

"She still brings someone along when I take her out."

And is she like you, is that the secret? I could be forcing too hard, because Robert's delivery has got a bit clipped again, more rapid (but then he's mirroring me), at times with a touch of stutter. I like to think I never press until a bruise appears.

"Um, we have an identical sense of humour, but she's completely different to me in almost everything else. Um, anything you can think of that I'm like, she - she's different."

Maybe your closeness leads you to feel incomplete alone?

"No . . . no . . but, er. But if I go to the flat now and it's empty or I have an evening where I don't speak to Mary, my . . . I feel my whole being is turned around, but I'm glad I feel like that. It's like being in love when you're 13, and you really want to speak to somebody. Mary brings things out of me . . . I feel enhanced knowing her (an embarrassed-at-pretension smile), but I would never rely on anything outside of myself, anyway. Never."

Robert Smith's head goes down even more inches to scrutinise his cuff, and his voice sounds like it's smiling.

"Me being defensive. How not to get hurt." Do you still flirt when you're out without her? "But, you see, I never did."

Well, then, do you get criticised for your constancy, made to feel staid and boring?

"Ah, yes, because people think it's more daring and exciting to go out and pull people, but you spend so much time worrying about it, about what impression you'll create

"And then if you do flirt, you end up hating yourself, it's cack because . . . it just is. And I never had pretensions about being a star and sleeping with a thousand women. I mean, obviously I have slept with a thousand women . .

EMEMBER POPE Paul, the little wizened one with the bald head? I met him. My father had an audience with him."

We're well into the dry roasted peanuts - at least, I am - and have spent a mighty long time talking about In God's Name and Pontiff, the two books on popes past and present Mr Smith would have me believe he's been reading. (And I do believe him, I definitely do, he told me he wouldn't lie.)

Of his Catholicism, Mr Smith says: "I have no

Guilt (such a funny word, sounds more like 'quilt' with each drink) is, according to Catholics I know, the very worst thing about Catholicism - in fact, sometimes the only thing. But "My parents had an inkling that severe exposure can psychologically damage you for the rest of your life. I've spent whole nights trying to rationalise this with people I really cared for.

This is fascinating. (I mean it.) Being Catholic does seem to mark people quite .

"Yeah, and there's nothing you can do to erase that guilt, it's like stigmata. It's really cack. Right. But don't you find it all somehow

appealing in a dramatic way?

"Quite the opposite, because I've never accepted that you have to suffer, suffer for your afterlife. I think you should make a point of not suffering, of being happy."

A protracted silence can be imagined here as we both assess the possibility

"Like, I wouldn't go out and murder someone -I know I've said I would but I wouldn't - because the root of all religion is survival, and you just don't go about hacking people to pieces, because they'd do it to you.

"Like, the way we behave - it's not a natural thing, you don't get this wanton violence in the animal kingdom . . . unless it's to do with like, um, sex rituals or territorial rights. Or you've got a deliquent animal."

So how does religion come into all this? (I think I can see, but we're not here to interview me, are we? Surprise, surprise.)

"Well, because religion is such a strong cause of violence. And there's no way you can rationalise a belief in God - and no way to rationalise disbelief, either

"The . . . the point being that it reduces everything to such an absurd level if you don't ha . . . ha . . . have any kind of belief, because everything you do becomes immediately so pointless that you can actually decide to, to just . . I mean, my ambition at the age of 14 was to go and be . . . to sit on top of a mountain and just die. You can feel like that if you aren't able to have that strong sense of belief."

So what makes you do things?

"Sometimes I do things to pass the time."

"Yes, yes, but . . . but the point, the point being, it's only because you're taught to expect more that you do. Sometimes, sometimes you can feel like an . . . an aching emptiness inside of you."

Even after you've done something you're proud of, you never get ... ?

"Yeah, you never get an absolute sense of satisfaction. But if you're half-hearted about things, you don't even give yourself that chance of satisfaction. You can say, Well, it doesn't matter, but at some point you've got to decide that it does, even if only to someone else

"Same again?"

BLOOD ON THE SADDLE: pugilist fierceness

BLOOD ON THE SADDLE 'Poison Love' (Gates Of Heaven PETE I)****

BLOOD ON The Saddle are American, but don't go away just yet. There's none of the confused idealising of psychedelia here and very little trace of the geriatric, regurgitated rock and roll ideas which we have come to expect from most things Stateside. 'Poison Love' has a holster full of ideas which last year's American infiltration wouldn't even comprehend.

With a powered ferocity, Blood On The Saddle unleash their enigmatic secrets and vigorously blend rock's adrenalin with country's breezy romance, creating, when it digs deepest into its hardcore influence, a lustful whirl of inflammatory rock that squares up with a rare prowess.

'Poison Love' is (deep breath) a hardcore punk country rock album. That carnivorous hardcore element which revelled and dictated Blood On The Saddle's debut has, with 'Poison Love', ascended into a more controlled dimension. This has caused the suspicious chilling ambiguity of Blood On The Saddle's previous work — like 'Banks Of The Ohio' — to be lost in 'Poison Love's exhilarating restraint and composure.

It is, however, the tracks which remember that hardcore influence which are the strongest here. With 'Thunder', Blood On The Saddle coerce sensual, bluesy mystique — akin to the much missed Gun Club — with a varying display of emotions which are harshly textured through the pugilist fierceness of their delivery. 'Johnny At The Fair' is another good example where Blood On The Saddle enthrall us with their spaghettiwestern guitars, which whine like coyotes in a desert of brooding possessiveness.

An unrelenting Texan beat keeps the album always feverishly passionate but it's in the quieter moments, with 'Johnny At The Fair' and 'Abilene', where Saddle's alchemist qualities shine.

In 'Bed Of Roses' – for the deceased D Boon – and 'Colt 45', Blood On The Saddle traduce the glories of their earlier tracks as they work within the clichéd confines of country – y'know, sentimentality and a lad-ish love for drinking crap.

'Poison Love', for the most part, works because Blood On The Saddle's primal energy sets about castrating rock and country at the same time, before bringing the bastardised influence, back together.

The end result demonstrates enough good reasons for good, old traditional guitar rock without ever bowing down to the stagnant predictability which it usually produces.

WHEN YOU'RE billed as "the world's most militantly hardcore gay dance group" you've got a head start in the weirdo stakes. When people number your influences as straggling a thin line between SPK, Kiss and The Platters, then you're definitely banging your head on stony ground.

But, á; GRUMH seem to care little for routine. This is their third LP in a year and it's a classic. It sounds like it's been recorded in a supermarket, or better still in a DIY megastore. Chainsaws and electric sanders jockey for position as a barrage of cat-scratching guitars scream out in true metal/punk style. And all over there's a tumultuous thumping rhythm, the crunching sound of rocks being thrown at kettle drums.

'No Way Out' is a blistering lump on the back of your head. Scratch it and see.

JOAN ARMATRADING 'Sleight Of Hand' (A&M AMA 5130)****

ANYONE USED to savouring the nuances of Joan Armatrading's emotions while lying in a foetal position on the sofa might need primal therapy after listening to 'Sleight Of Hand'.

The production has all the subtlety of a sledgehammer as it weaves somewhere between Pat Benatar and Streets Of Fire. It's certainly a break from the predictability of the last few albums.

It's hard not to be suspicious of the motives of what sounds at first like a blatant attempt to break into the American market. I mean, is this selling out or selling out?

But after a second listen you realise that far from sounding uncomfortable in these surroundings as you might expect, she is fully committed. And there are times when she responds to the thunderous backing with heartfelt cries rather than the

whimpers we are used to.

Not all the tracks manage to break out of the strict airplay formula – which probably means she's got at least one American hit on her hands. But 'One More Chance' is the most stunning song I've heard from Joan since 'Love And Affection', a fierce, juddering cacophony . in which the silences are louder than the power chords and impassioned vocals.

A few plays later and I still can't make up my mind whether this album is good or bad for Joan. But I'm still listening.

SONIC YOUTH 'Evol' (Blast First BFFP 4)***

THERE'S NO pressing need for 'Evol'. In their instamatic moments, Sonic Youth make sensational things out of the garbage of rock — the 'Halloween'/'Flower' 45 was one, and maybe there are bits scattered through the roots of 'Evol'. But much of it is fatigued, spiritless in the attack.

Put down on a dime, the Sonics don't cut deep

enough. We've heard so many grim reapers for rock that it takes an iron motive and tireless insistence to make another bring-outyour-dead cry make waves. 'Evol' laps agreeably at the edges of your bad temper but hardly does enough to raise more than a fit of pique. They are good when they're deathly pretty. 'Marilyn Moore', which ends on a guitar chord as noble as St Augustine, is one such.

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LE MYSTÈRE DES VOIX **BULGARES** 'Le Mystère Des Voix Bulgares' (4AD CAD603)****

IT LOOKS like it should be feminine, doesn't it? La mystère. But it isn't. Great, another lesson.

She walked away from the grave so quickly she lost her scarf. It took a long long time to find it again.

And anyway where were all these voices coming from? Bulgaria, they said. But why? Oh. . . traditional songs. Female voices, the sparse, whimsically meandering accompaniments. Or without. Within. Fifteen years old but something harsh. Something painful. Something called "Pritouritze Planinata".

And weddings and evening gatherings and chants and dancing (I would very much care to see this dancing) and harvests and. . . the one we were waiting for. . . bleating lambs.

I read about a Hollywood film star, the other day, who receives injections of the blood of unborn lambs. This keeps him looking youthful. I read this in one of the newspapers which is not considered erudite. Oh - as well, he fasts for two days each week. Perhaps he listens to music like this. Except that there is no music like this.

Definitely, there is a smash hit single thing on here. Like Richenel's 'L'esclave Endormi' wasn't, I'm convinced. Also, I'm tired.

Makes the Cocteaus sound like Clannad, makes 'Song To The Siren' sound like a door slamming, makes Gheorghe Zamfir's 'Light Of Experience' shimmer and pulsate, as always. Makes nonsense of all the making that goes on, all the making and breaking and taking.

It's probably unique in that...in that half-world...in that it threatens to give. Can you remember the last time you were given anything?

If you play this record to somebody and they say, "It's beautiful" or, "God, that's sad", kill them fast. There should be an understanding. There should be no words. Listen to it alone, or naked. Then burst into flames and ascend to the heavens on wings of Caramac.

This is a re-run of a re-run, a tale told too many times, an essential but lazy release, quite the mode as the rock famine bites even deeper. Hey! Everybody's doing it. Don't bother with no fancy re-package job, no sleeve notes, new pics or additional info. Just sandwich it together, slap it out and hope the legend does the rest.

The Dolls were and still are a legend in their own lifetime. A unique act of outrage that poked out a pink tongue between glossy red lips and jutted a shiny groin right into the face of redneck America with a boil on its backside called Vietnam.

I wanna know . . . Are these guys fags or what? I mean lookit the sight of 'em! There they sit in a row, all dragged out, sleazier than Bowie dared to be. Trashed out whores just looking for a kiss. And what a noise they made, gloriously dangerous, poutingly sexy, looking and sounding like they would cream anything that moved . . . including your teenage daughter, Mister Suburbia.

Highlights, of which there are many, include Jerry Nolan's machine gun drum on 'Vietnamese Baby', the bullet in the back of 'Puss 'N' Boots', the chaos of 'Trash' and David Jo Hansen's final taunt on 'Frankenstein'.

"Do you think that you could make it with Frankenstein?" he leers, a thin trickle of drool escaping from the side of his mouth.

The Dolls turned on the electricity and created their own monster. One year on and they gave it a bride. Turn 'em up and hear them roar.

PETER GABRIEL 'So' (Charisma PG 5) ***1/2

HE TREADS awkward ground, somewhere between pomp and circumstance. Gabriel is the bridge between the creaking hulk of art-rock and today's lionised pop literati - no wonder Jim Kerr and Kate Bush are among the guest stars of 'So'.

But the music is studied to death, almost. Though he tries to cram the world into the record, with parts for the most illustrious African, American and European musicians, it sounds like a frozen ballet, like all Gabriel's things. And, as always, there are a few dazzling, inspired passages.

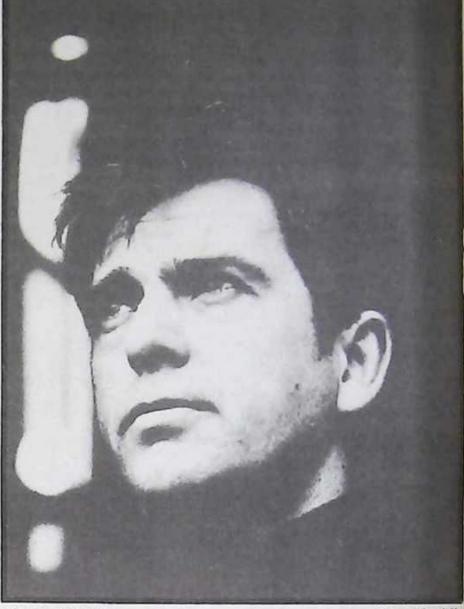
It even emerges that 'So' could be the best episode in a tragically muddled career. This time Gabriel has flushed out most of the baroque embroidery that had his other LPs boiling in 'atmosphere': the skeletal keys of 'Mercy Street' are plain and beautiful, a picture haunted by Gabriel's voices. His singing has begun to shed its rock history. The end of 'Red Rain', where he's exhausted by a dream, and the sinister rhymes of 'We Do What We're Told' hatch something newly disturbing out of old ideas.

Against these consummate miniatures leans a quota of rubbish. 'Sledgehammer' is a scientific experiment on Wilson Pickett, but so what? 'Don't Give Up', the worst song on the record, is a complicated analogue that winds up sounding like a James Taylor poem.

It's hard to muster much enthusiasm for the LP, even when it sometimes cuts deep. There's a chill of death about the material, as if he'd worked all the life out of it. What's left is a collection of spooks, not quite in or out of a rock world, some spotless and riveting, some not.

A nice fellow and his obsessions.

TOMMY KEENE: glorious introspection

TOMMY KEENE 'Songs From The Film' (Geffen 924 090-1)****

CURRENTLY SUPPORTING Lloyd Cole on his US tour (we all have to start somewhere), Mr Keene arrives with an enigmatic sparkle in his eye and all the songs Bryan Adams could never quite get together.

This is, in essence, great pop music, the difference from Brit-pop being that Tommy Keene has a guitar and he's going to use it. "Introspective lyrical sensibility" he may have, but what hits me are the damn good tunes (remember them?) and the relief that this is not just another beers in the back of the Cadillac goodtime rumble. No sirree.

From their debut with 'Killing An Arab' their path has weaved a strange route and 'Standing On A Beach' takes you on a chronological trip.

The revitalised 'Boys Don't Cry' could almost be culled from any chapter of Cure folklore, while Lol Tolhurst's steam train drums on 'Jumping Someone Else's Train' still send a shiver down my spine. By the time they get to 'A Forest' the line-up and mood had changed. Their first hit, it introduced a period of self-doubt before 'Let's Go To Bed' saw them regain their lust for life.

Since then they've mined such jewels as 'The Walk', 'The Lovecats', 'The Caterpillar', 'In Between Days' and 'Close To Me', all of which appear with the cassette version carrying a selection of B-sides that, strangely, doesn't include '10:15 Saturday Night'.

With Robert Smith's smile getting ever wider as his lipstick threatens to engulf his ears, this intoxicating exercise in nostalgia is to be cherished.

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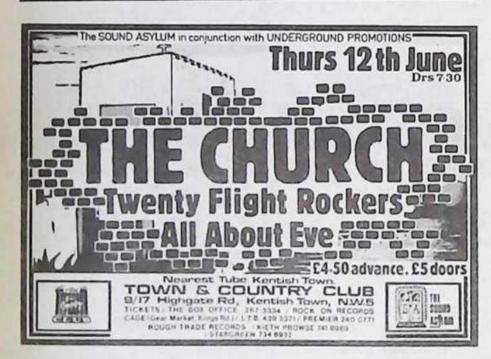
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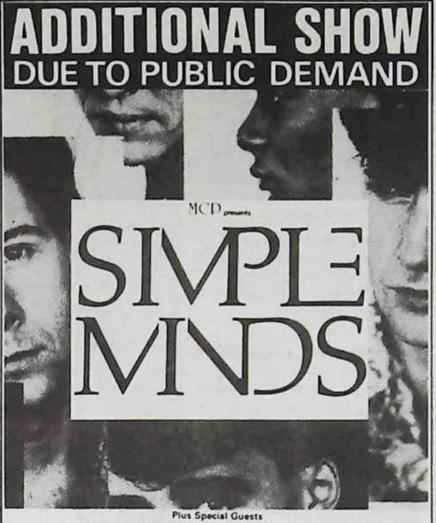

"I do dream about cats a lot.
I used to think, I mean I used
to dream I was a cat."



I feel exhausted and I've hardly said a word (for a change). Robert hasn't eaten since yesterday

You should eat, I tell him, like his mother might.

"No, really. If I have – if I have another drink I won't be hungry."

That's one I haven't tried.

O MY brother is just a complete dosser. I mean, he's supposed to be a farmer and he's got this little – homestead – in Wales. But the three kids are like, they're like wild animals. They haven't been to school yet, but he's qualified to teach them up 'til they're 13, anyway."

But that's wonderful.

"Not for them it's not, they can't speak. I worry. I worry that they'll be confronted with a normal teacher who won't be able to cope. I mean, they have no notion of the word 'don't'."

How disgusting.

"No. No, they're brilliant! Imagine it, we had these six and seven year olds at a party, and you'd think they'd be vying for attention, but they were just watching, then dancing, y'know, with each other, in a corner, really enjoying themselves. It's such a shame, it's really an age of innocence and people will erode it . . . because they break their legs rather than be told, Don't jump off the bridge into the river."

Something's happened and I don't realise what it is until it bats me in the face and I say, You really love children, don't you? I've never seen a face incandesce quite so swiftly and shyly.

"Yeah. I think they're gorgeous. But I'd never be a parent – I'd be required to send them to school."

School always alienates. (She says knowledgeably.)

"Yeah, it would be nice to bring them up in a treehouse, wouldn't it?"

S YOUR tunes get more effervescent, your words are getting sadder and more vulnerable. Is that what's happening to you?

"But I've always found it difficult to write 'up' songs. 'Love Cats' was just a phrase, like 'bananafish', just a fantasy idea of a cat having kittens and you put 'em all in a sack and you throw 'em all in a lake . . "

What?

"Yeah, an' it just got mutated. It was originally something I read in a Patrick White novel — The Cockatoos, do you know it? — and it said 'and he called them. . . ' — 'cos his cat had become

pregnant by an unknown tomcat — 'and so its kittens were known as the love cats'. And it said, as soon as they were born 'we put the love cats in a sack and threw them in the lake'. That line was originally the start of the song's chorus. But when we were doing it I thought, I can't really sing this.

"I mean, I could write more facile songs – like, the rest of the group have heard my 'singles' tape, most of which Nik Kershaw would die for – no, he's a serious artist now, say Aha – but they're dreadful, with really crass choruses. I've thought of releasing them under a pseudonym but, like, I don't want people . . . how can I put it? Like, you could write a shopping list, but you don't want to be known for your shopping lists."

It might be more evocative in the long run, I think of saying.

"'Shake Dog Shake' is about the most . . . the darkest song we've ever done. Lyrically, it's certainly the most awful thing I've ever written, apart from 'Sinking', and that's recent.

"The other night at the Albert Hall, we did 'Faith' for the first time in years, and I was crying through it – it was really ruined. It's like rereading a page of your diary, like Christmas Eve 1975 and all the hopes you had; it really cuts you up sometimes. When I hear it, I have to stop listening. I wish everything I did had such a strong effect on me, but it doesn't.

"Anyway, I'm not uniquely tortured. In fact, I lead a charmed existence. The songs I mentioned just get me because they're totally about me, and I write about me because I find it easier to emote – God, I sound like Billy Ocean – in the first person."

How about anger?

"Oh, I feel anger a lot of the time, and it comes with learning more, an awareness of the world. A nuclear thing. A kind of 'rage, rage against the dying of the light' anger."

You get the feeling we're sitting on a tinderbox. . . ?

"Hey! A bit of a contentious word to use in an interview with me, that, isn't it?"
(Banshees, new LP, get the scene?)

E ARE considerably more relaxed by now, and we are surrounded by considerably more people than before, but still only one has had the grace to say 'Hello, Robert' in what I'm told is his local. Nevertheless, their eyes are glued in our general (but quiet) direction, which may account for his continued fidgeting. I mean, even I stopped fidgeting at least an hour ago, though I still can't think where I heard 'bananafish' before.

Confused lines are filtering and jigging through my little head. "We slip through the streets/While everyone sleeps/Getting bigger and sleeker and SOUNDS May 24 1986 Page 33

"Um. . . I've never had a pet and I have no desire to have a pet but. . . er, I do dream about cats a lot – I mean, it's just because there's something wrong with me. But I used to think, I mean I used to dream I was a cat."

Because they can be freer?

"Nooo. But down in Crawley (the appallingly vacant newtown where the boy lived) I used to sleep with the windows open and there would always be the sound of cats f****** in the garden. It must've stuck – ha ha ha – in my mind.

"I like big cats as well, looking at pictures of panthers." (You may find this sounds almost indecent. It does to me.) "They just look great, that build, it's really wanton, sort of like an image of ... Yes, unfortunately I look nothing like a cat."

A nameless depression descends, dispelled all of a sudden by new hope

"I act like a cat, though. Because I can sometimes, I can really indulge myself in very, um, physical pleasures. Not pleasures of the flesh but a sense of like being in a perfect moment, and just sitting and thinking, Aah, and the whole world dissolves off your shoulder blades."

This is such an interesting idea that we deviate (we do what?) and spend a lot of time talking about the film Wolfen (shape-changing Indians), Neil Jordan's Dream Of A Beast ("suddenly, my fingers felt like pads") and, wildly pleasing to both of us, children's TV's The Singing, Ringing Tree (I can't quote because it was one of those Eastern European tales, but it stars a man who metamorphoses into a bear). God knows what my psychoanalyst would make of it all.

Thinking vaguely, as you do, about nuclear warfare again, I say, Is there anyone you care for more than yourself?

"That's not the sort of thing I could be glib about. If someone said, Alright, it's either you or Mary, I should imagine I'd say, Kill me. Other times, I'd sell Mary for a pint of cider. No, no I wouldn't. Six pints."

So what's important to you at this minute?

"Em. . . that Glen Hoddle performs well in the World Cup and that England at *least* make it to the semi-finals."

"I'll tell you what we'll do. We'll see if we can catch a bananafish."

"A what?"

"A bananafish," said Seymour.

The two started to walk down to the ocean.

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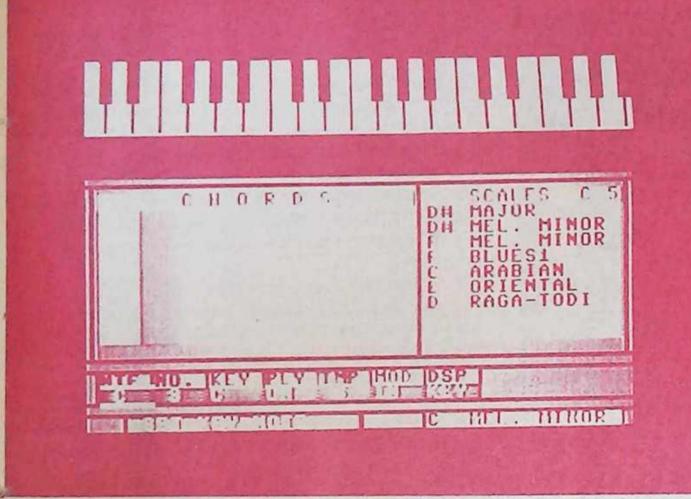
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COMPUTER MUSIC: from disks to discs...

STEINBERG EP2 EPROM **VERSION OF** SCOREWRITER AND PRO 16 SEQUENCER £285 **QQQ VVV**

SO MUCH software is a lot of hard work frankly; which is a shame for the few companies who are currently offering the computerate muso worthwhile packages, because computer-assisted music making in general still tends to be branded with a reputation for being pretty boring and hardly worth worrying about.

One company whose efforts have already gone a long way towards redressing the balance is Steinberg, a German outfit whose products are available in the UK through OSC - makers of the fabbo Oscar MIDI mono synth.

While most of Steinberg's

efforts have gone into soft and hardware for the Commodore, not only are they currently producing what may prove to be the pro package to date - for the MIDI-blessed Atari 520 ST computer - but they have recently released a version of their PRO 16 sequencer which goes a long way towards easing otherwise laborious aspects of Commodore use, by offering a complete package on EPROM. This saves a considerable amount of loading and waiting and faffing about which is inevitable on other (including Steinberg's) regular diskbased programs.

The EP2 comprises a MIDIcomputer interface that slots directly into the Commodore and contains software for both the PRO 16 and TNS (Track-Note-System) Scorewriter. Both in fact can be switched out so that you

can simply use the interface as run other pieces of software. If it's recording/ writing software you're after, you'll be unlikely to do so, though.

I don't recall any programs that were easier or more practical to operate. The only rival to this system, for professional outlook and ease of operation, is the UMI BBC B package, and indeed Steinberg's approach of using drum machine type terminology and recording operation is, well, similar, though far from identical.

But in addition to mere recording - albeit 16-track in step or real time - there is of course the Scorewriter. Now I've never seen too much point in being able to write and print music since most pop poseurs haven't got a clue about 'the dots' anyhow. However, I don't think anyone can fail to be impressed by

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the ability to record some music in real time and in a matter of seconds watch what you have played skidding across the screen looking like real music. At which point it can also be edited, transposed and all that stuff. Pretty impressive indeed.

As for recording, the PRO 16 is no more difficult to fathom out than a drum machine, and considerably less (and far more capable in many ways) than a regular multi-track tape system. Most of the tasks are undertaken using a single screen display - with the 16 tracks indicatable On/Off, tempo display, bar number, velocity data display, quantisation, memory remaining, time signature etc - and almost all commands from the QWERTY keyboard simply use the Function keys.

Of course you can determine recording and playback instruments by changing MIDI channels, with each of the 16 tracks capable of controlling a separate instrument. An individual track can also be solved or muted or quantised independently.

Your total amount of recording time is 64 bars per track - probably not more

than seven or eight minutes at a go - but sufficient for most, I'd imagine, and sequences can be looped to save memory.

Amongst several timesaving features is "copy

sequence parameter" whereby the various quantise values and time signatures can be instantly transferred onto your next recording track. Definitely the lazy man's dream software this.

In addition to this already extensive form of recording, the EP2's added bonus of multi-faced sync-ing hookups with MIDI Song Pointer implementation present and correct, filterable MIDI data,

and then the whole new area of scorewriting, all make this a most attractive proposition for anyone who wants relatively Total Control over their sequencing. And it is worth considering that the

total cost of this system is well below that of any current 'hot' dedicated sequencer. The time may have come for the hitherto non-computerate musician to jump aboard.

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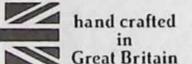
