negotiations.

"There's two reasons for making it difficult for them," says Bourton. "One is the fact that they didn't consult John before the film was made,

"And the second is that everyone who was associated with John, Public Image or The Sex Pistols, including Paul Cook who we went to see it with, thinks the film's a pile of shit."

But as it stands, didn't this mean Lydon and co were effectively acting as censors?

Bourton's response was:
"We don't care whether the
film comes out. All we want to
do is get it so that if it does

come out, then you know there are certain things that are corrected about it or that the film company compensate the parties involved; in other words they pay the money for exploiting the still living.

"So there's no censorship involved. It's just that as far as we're concerned, it's a straightforward case of saying, Well this doesn't smell right to us and we want people to know about it."

Zenith, the film company involved, stated at press time that they are aware of the objections Lydon has raised and are "waiting to see what he does, if anything".

Before Donington, Motorhead are due to play at the Lamport Stadium in Toronto as part of a special charity show in aid of the Liver Foundation Of Canada.

Says Lemmy: "It's a worthwhile cause and besides, I'm just investing in my future."

Following the release of their eagerly anticipated 'Orgasmatron' album this week (see page 24), the band have now established their plans for the rest of '86. They will tour the USA in September before returning to Britain for a full tour in October. More US dates then follow in November and early December and they'll be back in Britain again for some Christmas shows. Dates will be announced shortly.

Reaction have signed to Phonogram Records for what is reported to be a substantial, but at press time undisclosed, sum.

"Some product is expected early in September," say Phonogram, but for those who can't wait, Zodiac releases a six-track mini-album called 'High Priest Of Love' through his old indie label Food on July 25.

The signing to Phonogram was celebrated in style at the Cafe Pacifico in London's Covent Garden where a reported £1,500 was spent on food and drink for just 25 people.

But rumours that Zodiac is to become a tax

exile before he's even released a record are categorically denied by his new label. "This is just a normal signing," said a Phonogram spokesperson. "We gave them as good a deal as they could have got anywhere else – in fact we offered them less, in financial terms, than one of the other companies – so this is not a Sigue Sigue Sputnik type signing."

Rumours that Zodiac insisted on Phonogram supplying him with the first six copies of Silver Surfer comic and the original Spiderman comic were categorically confirmed, however.

"I think that's why they liked us," she added.

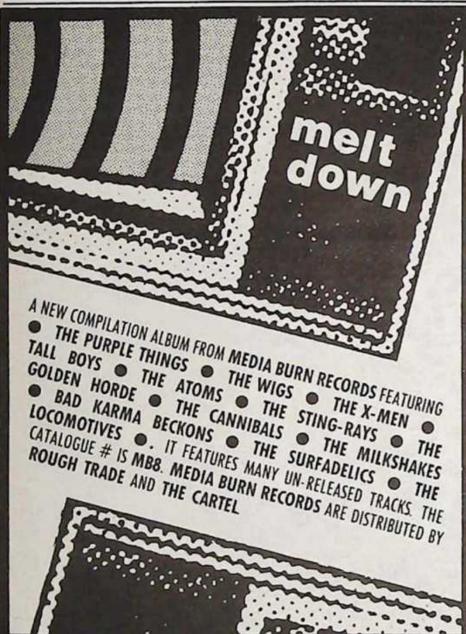

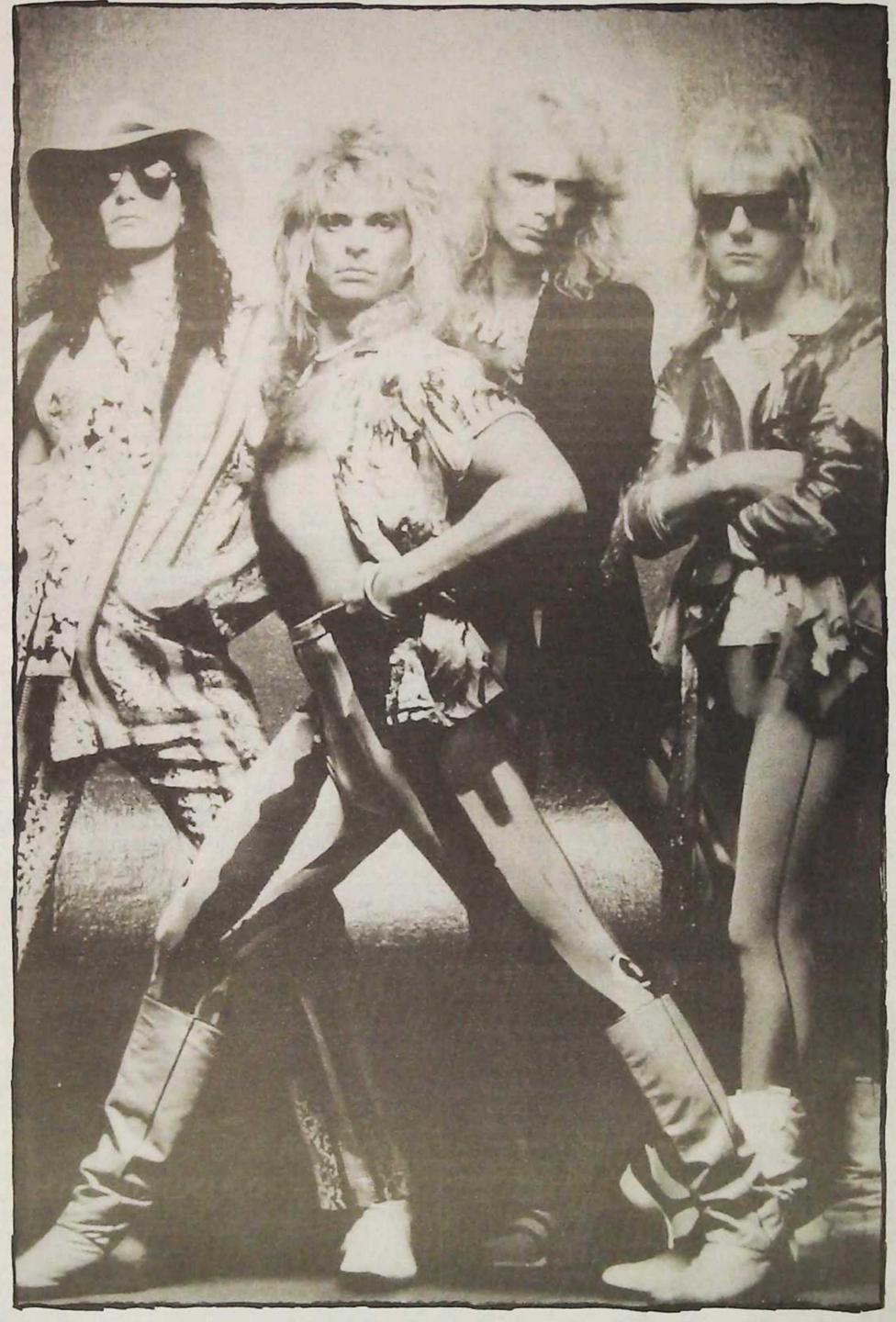

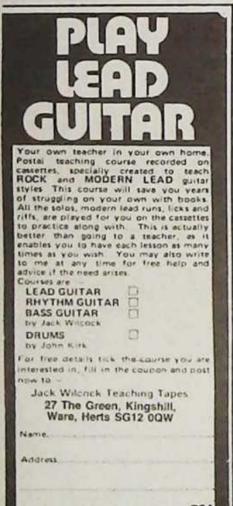

THE UK SUBS gather together a 16-track compilation called 'Raw Material' on Killerwatt. All the songs have been chosen by Charlie Harper and include 'Organised Crime', 'Bomb Factory', 'Rat Race' and 'Teenage' from their early recording years, a live version of 'CID' from a 1980 Rainbow concert, a previously unissued song called 'I Don't Need Your Love' and cover versions of 'Waiting For The Man', 'She's Not There' and 'Cocaine'.

TOMORROW, who were the UFO ('60s equivalent of Alice In Wonderland) house band in 1967 and came up with one of the two classic British underground anthems, 'My White Bicycle' (the other was 'Granny Takes A Trip' by the Purple Gang), have their only album resuscitated on Decal (through Charly). It includes such self-explanatory titles as 'The Incredible Journey Of Timothy Chase', 'Auntie Mary's Dress Shop', 'Three Jolly Little Dwarfs', 'Real Life Permanent Dream' and 'Revolution' together with 'My White Bicycle' and its flipside 'Claramont Lake' all performed by Keith West (of 'Teenage Opera' infamy), Junior, Twink and Steve Howe.

GBH have 14 tracks from their Clay years between 1981-84 compiled for an album called 'Charged' on Clay. Among the singles and album tracks are 'Necrophilia', 'Give Me Fire', 'Generals', 'Time Bomb' 'Womb With A View', 'City Babies Revenge', 'City Babies Attacked By Rats' and 'Four Men'.

HEAVEN 17, who promise a new album by the end of the summer, have a collection of their 12-inch mixes released as a 68-minute compact disc, or an 85-minute gold-embossed boxed cassette (but not on boring old vinyl) called 'Endless'. The white funk mixes run from 1981's '(We Don't Need This) Fascist Groove Thang', 'Play To Win' and 'Penthouse And Pavement' through to last year's 'Heaven 17 Megamix' and 'Sunset Now'. Some tracks have been remixed by John Potoker.

THROBBING GRISTLE's past starts to catch up with them on a six-track compilation called 'Sacrifice' on Dojo. The material appears to come from Illuminated Records although Genesis P Orridge's comments on it are brief and to the point: "We do not acknowledge the existence of this record. It is being released without our consent. All official Throbbing Gristle Records are through Mute."

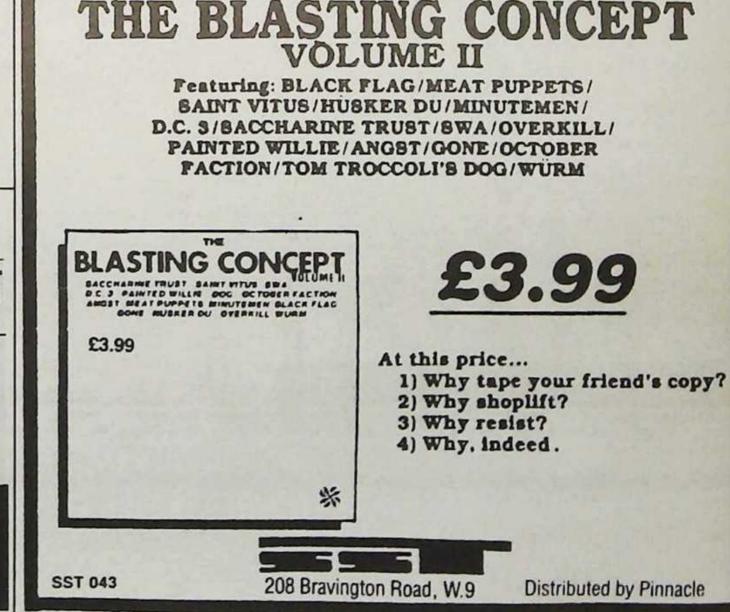
IAN GILLAN packages up 19 tracks from his solo career with Gillan onto a double album called 'What I Did On My Vacation' on 10 Records. Ian provides his own sleevenotes to each track which has been remastered and carefully positioned to provide a steady build up over the first three sides and a howlin' climax on the fourth.

THEM and Rod Stewart have rare '60s tracks brought to light on 'The R&B Scene Volume Two 1963-1969' released by See For Miles (through Pinnacle). The album rummages through the darker recesses of Decca's vaults and includes such unlikely combinations as John McLaughlin playing 'Hound Dog' in Duffy's Nucleus, Elton John in The Bread And Beer Band with Caleb Quaye and Roger Pope (who followed him into Hookfoot and beyond), the late lan Stewart with The Rail Roaders featuring Keith Richard, Bill Wyman and Tony Meeham, and a group called The High Numbers, who didn't become The Who, singing a song called 'Heart Of Stone' which wasn't written by Jagger and Richard.

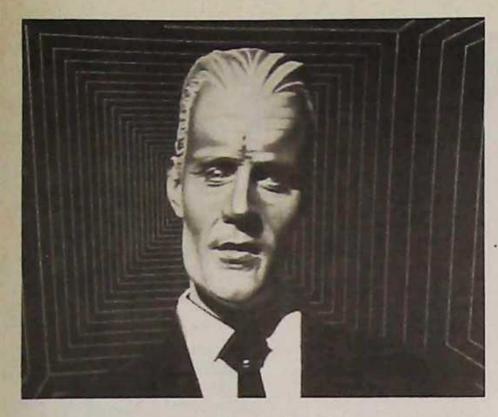

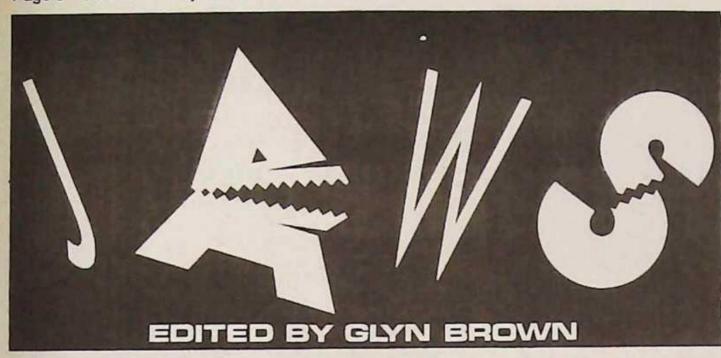

British Rail "unimpressed"



JOSEF PORTA: "Alright, so does it suit me or doesn't it?"

People, people who love trains, they're the freakiest people in the world - a truer word was never said, and Blyth Power should know. They're not content with whipping a train's name, either - they're still obsessed. Roger Holland finds his station in life by giving them gip; Steve Double loads his film and shrieks, "All aboard!"

As THE stagnant pop waters lie shallow, muddy and dull, rightly refusing to be dappled by the filmsy minnows of the Insular and unrepentant 'indie' ghetto, it is splendidly refreshing to stumble upon a band that is both exciting and interesting.

There are a thousand and one things to be said about Blyth Power. Here

are the first few: 1 When they poured the last bucket of water over the ashes of the Mob, Josef Porta (drums, mouth and new interviews) and his friend, bassist Curtis. decided to form a new band. They first obtained the services of the rawest of buzz guitarists, Nell, and then signed up a pair of young and willing flanking backing singers, Andy and Sarah by name. 2 Blyth Power Is named after a train - number 56076 to its friends. And this is no coincidence, for Josef Porta is a train lunatic who likes to conduct his interviews in railway buffet bars. 3 Blyth Power play urgent yet regal post punk rock. Rhythms which snap at the heels evolve into fascinating and often amusing, if rambling and elusive, songs. Songs shaped with precision and perception by Josef around imagery riddled with allusions to history and mythology, religion and cricket, and, of course, trains.

"This isn't a gimmick, it's something I've been doing for years. The railways and trains are probably the focal point of my life at the moment. And so, of

course, this comes out in the band. Some people are rabid socialists or anarchos or whatever, and they express that in their music. I get such powerful **Imagery from the railways** that my obsession, if you like, can't help but work its way out into my writing.

"And of course there is a whole wealth of history and industry and politics woven into the tapestry of the rallways."

4 Josef knows so much about the rallways, and is so enthusiastically consumed with his passion for the rallway as a living, evolving structure fighting hard for its survival against the policies of consecutive governments, that he makes it a vibrant and Important Issue. 5 Blyth Power, the train, is one of the 56 class freight engines working the merry-go-round service between the power stations and the

coal mines. "City Limits once accused us of poor taste in naming ourselves after a scab train which had crossed picket lines during the miners' strike, and they said we should have chosen to name ourselves after one of the illustrious Western Region diesel hydraulics. So we might bring the next single out under the name of The Royal Naval Reserve 1859-19591"

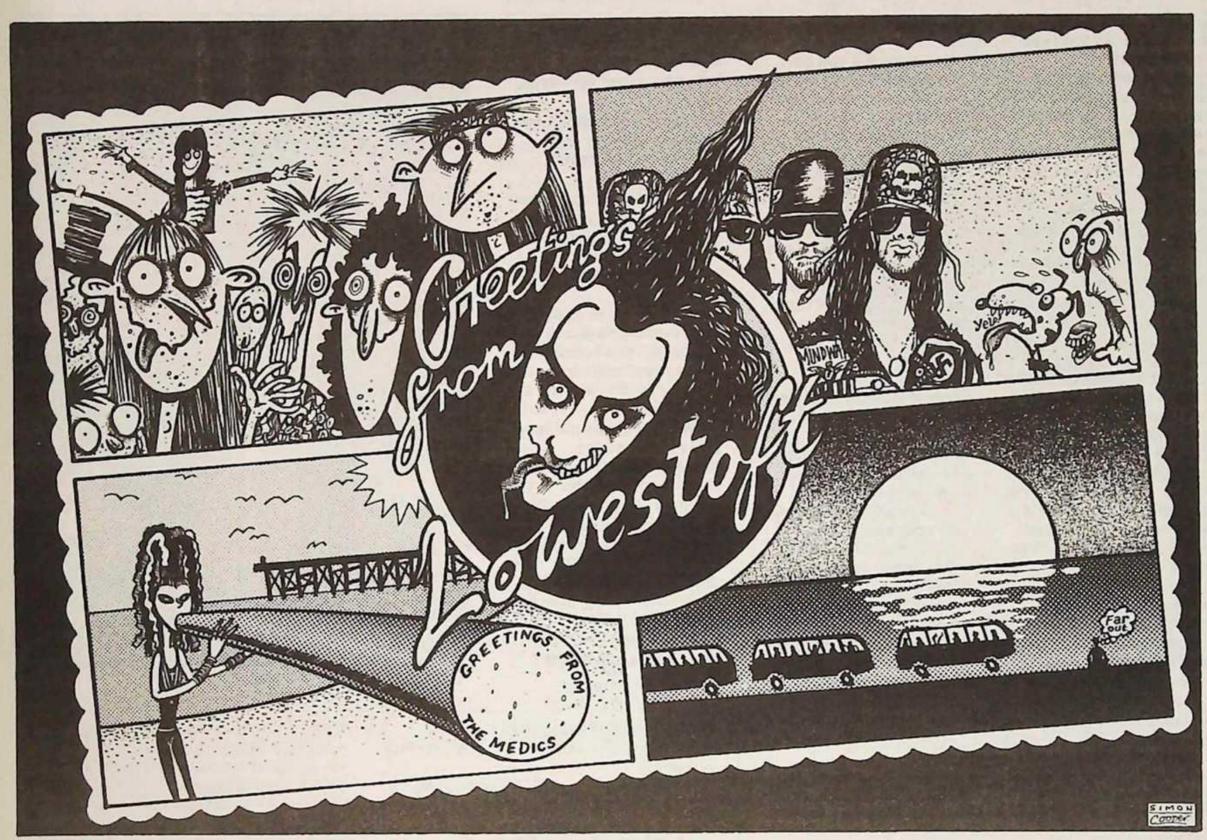

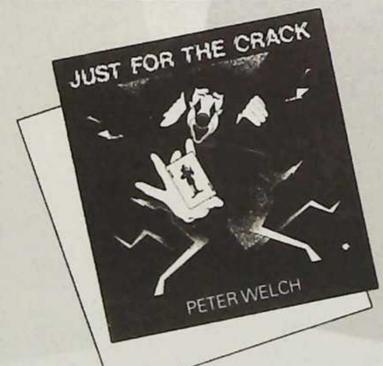

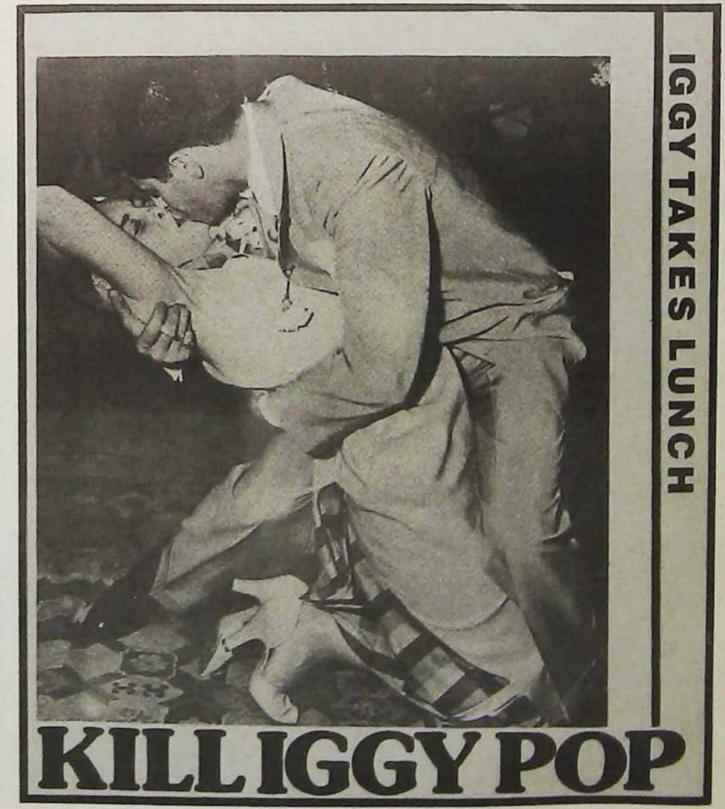

Another case of mistaken identity, a secret publicity ploy or just a ruse to send the urchin who once rolled in broken bottles for kicks into a state of temporary panic?

Seems that Pop's enforced sprint into

Rambo-style survivalism was a little premature, especially when you find out that the ageing rocker misunderstood the scam completely. See, London folk group Kill Ugly Pop had merely sent the man a postcard suggesting he might like to hear their new record, but Iggy wasn't taking any risks.

So anyone spotting a tubby Jerry Lewis lookalike sporting three days' growth and trying to keep out of the spotlight should immediately ignore him. Why confuse the

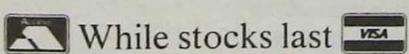

MOMUS: flower power



TTEMPTING TO solve the cursed independent label's severe inferiority complex and identity crisis is the slightly implausible but rarely impenetrable él records.

With a medieval line in hair-styles, a modern attention to mystification and no dumb show of self-gratification,
Mike Alway – full-time idealist and possessor of torrid imagination – is steadily bringing his quite improbable organisation close to prolonged pleasure, hauling it willingly into perspective.

"If él wasn't a label," he ponders, "it would be a restaurant or a bar, one of those old bars where there's no music at all, perhaps gentlemen only, loads of good conversation, where you have this special relationship with the barman – though not too pally – the idea of something private and delicately euphoric."

A dilettantish, enigmatic kind of pulse and outlet, young at 18 months old, él is currently enjoying its second deep breath, with plenty of charge left in the battery, at last plucked from the midsts of theory and brought to life.

Back in late '84, it was kid sister to the infant Blanco Y Negro, slipping singles like Shock Headed Peters' gorgeously ruptured, rambling 'I Bloodbrother Be' and Klaxon 5's fake funked 'Hothouse' into the cramped mainstream with encouraging greediness and unfuddled single-mindedness.

Then. . . a slow hiss and nothing. Forced into a laboured lull ("because of a mixture of financial considerations and the whole restrictive system") Alway's ideal suffered a brief marriage with the Belgian Les Disques Du Crepuscule organisation, then fluttered out of sight and mind for a whole year.

With perfumed and poisoned pleasure, él rallies back this month with a dramatic discharge of four chaste 12-inch singles and an

enhanced sense of purpose, its undaunted dalliance with possibilities now partially channelled through the Cherry Red waterways.

So what's so different and what are its lofty intentions this time around?

"LL RECORDS on él," Alway tells me with no trace of irony, "are aimed at teenage kids. I come into work on the bus every morning with all these screaming kids reading Smash Hits and No I. They're the kind of people I'm making records for, not bloody adults. What I want to do at the moment is, for once, something genuinely mysterious, something with suggestion that will fascinate people.

"It could be argued that we're working on a dangerously subtle level, which I can see the point in. They might always be a few vital inches from chart pop sensibility. If there's a chart period their virtues could parallel with, then it would have to be the '60s – a much more welcoming environment for this kind of music.

"él is attempting to dispose of all the superfluous weight that hangs around the pop record these days, bringing it back to the issue of a good tune, an attractive package and an attractive persona, acres of personality, even if it has little to do with the truth.

"Fantasy and lies could play their part, too. I'm completely bored with the idea of doing something marginal. If something hasn't got the potential to be a major influence then I wouldn't touch it with a barge-pole."

He's been talking quickly. He stops to breathe and continues.

"It would be wrong to assume that the aim is for él to put out a few good indie singles, do nothing commercially at first, gradually grow boringly into just another label, then license itself to some awful major outlet, make lots of money, go downhill all the way. Equally, I'm not interested in building things up, building some nebulous career out of seeing my bands playing endless gigs and inching their way into the indie chart. Awful! All that can be completely overrun by one brilliant record."

We could talk all night about the blankbrained indies, all the barren minds, spineless impacts and their grimy options. él is not yet nervy enough but its second cavalry charge hints at something slightly perilous for now.

Its first four releases of the year – Gol Gappas, Momus, Louis Philippe and the double-sided Anthony Adverse/King Of Luxembourg – are a discreet downpour of steady confirmation, with enough moist moments to say that él is going to be very special.

"We're more like a good '60s label," he presumes, "say like Verve, where you get Mothers Of Invention next to Ella Fitzgerald, next to The Righteous Brothers. All classy, all fitting in, where you can see that it's not run by some bloody hippies!"

Where él begins to take on different shapes and shades to its indie cousins is in conception. When the four 12-inch singles were ready for recording, Alway marched along to the studio with Frankie Howerd and Charlie Drake singles tucked under his arm. Finding the producer-to-be, he planted them on the mixing-desk with a proud, "This is the sound we're looking for".

"We're after this mix of comedy records, bubblegum pop, novelty songs and the manufactured idea," Alway tells me. "I listen to a lot of crap like Jonathan King and The Archies because those records sold millions and there's an element in there I want to use. There has to be some juxtaposition between all that and the high density of something like Wire."

So why is él different? What miracles are being worked here?

"An occasional indifference to reality, a certain morality, obsession with the entire idea, the value of innocence, spirit and personality, disposability, camp, collectability, the aesthetics and the idea of remarkable performance."

INNER WITH Nougat', four "eclectic, multi-faceted pop songs" by Gol Gappas was the most yearning and corrosive of the four él spring spasms, though Alway claims that this is the least remarkable so for

"We needed to put in something that was lightly psychedelic, something like early Manfred Mann. There's nothing real there at all, though Gol Gappas would totally disagree."

Which they did.

Colin (Taurus) and Nik (Gemini) tell me they're completely real, even if they're not "a proper pop group".

"We aim for as many barbs as we can. On the EP, it all seems very simple, frothy and light, but if you look at the colours, there's much more underneath.

"We want to create the kind of feeling you get on the Kellogg's Cornflakes packets, all that sunshine. Actually, we're sun-worshippers, that's what we do in our spare time! We're more coherent than neurotic, we're adult without being Paul Simon. We're black humour turning grey and our writing style could be described as 'observatory', a short story with a twist style."

Gol Gappas will make films and write theme tunes for television ("we want to give Ronnie Hazelhurst a run for his money"). They want to make film noir pop videos, not necessarily in sync.

About the EP.

"'Ice Cream' is the love song, almost Thomas Hardy, our r 'n' r number, the bitter-sweet look at the middle of a love affair.

"There's 'Albert Parker', which everyone tells us is an 'Arnold Layne' for the '80s. We've never heard of Syd Barrett though.

"'Saint Lucy' is about the reverence of lust – something to be worshipped, a golden thing – which attempts to blow the cobwebs from all that Catholic guilt, our most jangliest song ever.

"'Chickenpox' is about how everyone doesn't do what they want to do and how they all believe that what they do is so important, with the most overstated melody in the history of pop."

Finally. "The first person to write to Sounds telling us what our name means, including a complete recipe, we'll take out for a beer and curry."

Gol Gappas are less él than most.

ICHOLAS CURRY, under the mask of Momus, is more él than most. Not only is he the label's most resourceful, supple lyricist/performer (the LP 'Circus Maximus' and the current Brel EP already carved out), he also serves as él's sleevenote writer (the marvellously obtuse scrawl that decorates all output) and one third of the company's conceptual thinktank (along with the omnipresent Alway and Monochrome Set's Bid).

Momus has allegedly spent the last two years,

following his Machiavellian volley in 4AD's The Happy Family, coming to terms with his over-education. His torrential rain of images and ulcerated fables make Tim Buckley and most other rock bards look like legless limerick minstrels.

The idea of his three Brel covers, stripped of their afterglow orchestration, reduced to acoustic skeletons and slight whimsy, he acknowledges as "admittedly reactionary".

"Of course Brel's versions are better than mine," he grins wide. "For me, it was the sheer pleasure of getting into daddy's trousers, nothing much more."

He seems amused at all the impreciseness, more content to discuss the Momus past and its impending future, looking back at his criminally ignored album from the beginning of this year with lecherous fondness.

"There was so much midnight oil channelled into those songs," he recalls, "thousands of pounds of books and hours and hours of learning, so much insomnia, a year of living behind these yellow curtains in Streatham. I wanted to release something as unpalatable as possible, a way of reinventing ways of being dangerous."

Momus confides in his low, Scottish drawl that people underestimate his stature as a comic ("they all assume this is so deathly serious") and says that lies are most interesting.

For later in the year, he has a few dark pleasures plotted. él are giving him a free run in their A&R department for an entire month, allowing him four projects of his choice.

"I could drag some tramp in off the street and let him make a record."

There's also a new EP on the cards titled 'BBC1' – "maybe death would be like watching that channel all the time, I can't think of a worse hell".

Final thought.

"Momus is like the kind of thing you'd like to read in your birthday cards instead of all those sticky sentimental messages."

OUIS PHILIPPE is él's "classic voice", according to Alway, and his debut 'Red Roses & Red Noses' is a virgin hum of late night sobriety, él's version of 'Feelings'... "a magnificent snogging record".

Born in Normandy, 26-year-old Louis whispers in my ear something about "these melodramatic, sentimental, dark soundtracks" of his.

"The power of suggestion must be the aim, something barely grating with a shiny, shivery surface. I wanted these songs to sound pink. The most important things about them are obsessive melody, vigorous voice and independence of the instruments, of the sound.

"There's also a sense of morality about them, which fits in with the label's aversion to the vulgarity in pop."

Louis has hobbies, some of the unusual things

– French stamps, tennis, wine, whisky
(particularly Laphroaig Islay Single Malt),
hunting ("I only shoot woodcocks!"), cooking,
mushroom-picking, gambling and Orson Welles.

He tells me that él's methods and mythmaking are the utter antithesis to ZTT's artful uncouthness – the former's nature being aristocratic, the latter's capitalistic.

Louis Philippe, with his carefully distilled brimstone ballads (a new one softly stepping out as we speak), could be potentially sumptuous and, already, he's making Anne

AND EL

Pigalle sound like a hacking bout of colic. With his sticky white mists, él gives us the voice.

HEN THERE'S the sphinx-like Anthony
Adverse character — "our heatstroke of
sexuality", as Alway enthuses. "A crucial
element in the él make-up. It is so important
that people don't see us as a continuation of the
Cherry Red image of people sitting around in
painted skirts having a picnic somewhere in the
forest."

I speak to Anthony on a crackly telephone line from Budapest, where she now resides.

"Being a blood relation of Fyodor
Dostoyevsky does have its drawbacks," she
explains. "Everybody expects you to be literary,
to offer clever remarks all the time. Growing
up in Moscow — I'm now an exile — the only
pop music I ever heard as a child was a tape of
The Beatles. Since then, I always wanted to
make this music myself."

Occupying one side of her debut él 12-inch single, with the other by King Of Luxembourg, Anthony offers spirited renditions of Bid's 'Ruling Class' and Vic Godard's 'Trouble'.

"I met Alway at the Wimbledon tennis contest two years ago," she tells me. "We were waiting in line to buy strawberries and cream and just started talking.

"When I mentioned that I was Dostoyevsky's relative, he offered me a record deal. Only later, he found out that I taught chamber music in a Hungarian school. I could have had no talent at all for all he knew.

"I like él because it has a great Britishness about it, it seems very clean, very sophisticated. When I first met Mike Alway, I thought he was slightly mad – all he talked about was cricket, Ealing comedies, Ian Carmichael. I had no idea about these things. Now I'm learning all the time.

"No, I don't have a favourite book by Dos, actually I prefer Solzhenitsyn or Gogol... My favourite pop song is now 'Hullo My Darlings' by Charlie Drake, which Mike gave me for Christmas."

"WAKE up at four every morning, get out my release schedule and worry like hell," Alway is concluding. "I wonder if these are great ideas, or am I indulging myself. Of course I wonder..."

This month glimpses another trail of deviant intrigue. There's the stainless and thoroughly immoral 'Caravaggio' sound sketches, soaked with fairly untypical él debauch, there's The Monochrome Set's 'Fin', a scattering of live oddments caressing the last five years; then there's Bid's 'Reach For The Gun', an EP which witnesses the man's return to a fetching bedlam, the mad young wag.

If that's not enough to make your tongue cleave to the roof of your mouth, él's mid-July downpour gets caressed in this week's singles round-up (see page 18).

To follow? Theme music for television, corporate sponsorship, some ingenious rhymes, a Louis Philippe album, "plenty of sinister scandal", revival of the expression 'hit parade', schizophrenic words, "a more sensual él", more

enigma, much more rapt pop, more addiction. Staggeringly clever, can we let él pour their daft conceit down our throats?

"el will be an entire spectrum," says Alway.
"And it's going to keep me awake... for some time yet."

GERE wisely decides to chop his own head off

KING DAVID

(UIP)

IN THEORY, it makes sound sense for UIP to have cast an actor whose career is based on heaving his collection of nut-brown DNA from bed to boudoir as the uxorious King David.

In fact, almost none of this tedious religious epic deals with amorous goings-on, so Richard

Gere is left to perfect the English accent America so rightly feels vital for Kings, biblical figures and other nobility.

This being the case, the pivotal characters are all played by embarrassed-looking British actors: my heart went out to Edward Woodward, absolutely ludicrous in a curly wig, as the slavering King Saul; David De Keyser brought low as Bathsheba's interfering uncle; Denis Quilley as the rampant prophet Samuel and Cherie Lunghi valiantly attempting to play a young girl.

The editing has the look of an overlong piece hectically thrown together, and the cuts are so obvious and so erratic as to make the thing almost surreal; in consequence, I only understood much of the hoarsely whispered and frantic to-ing and fro-ing after reading the accompanying notes (which you don't get), and only really remember the scene where Richard Gere strips off to dance half-naked for some miles through a crowd plainly as surprised as me.

If there was a reason to make this film, it must lie in the brains of Richard Gere's sworn enemies. But then, as Ecclesiastes so succinctly puts it, "who knows the meaning of anything?".

plenty of gore, and a heart-rending little love story to match. Oh, my eyes water just to think of it. But wait! This is a serious epic, full of Christian morality

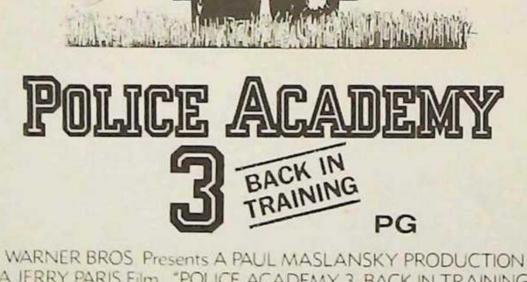
portrayed by the relationship between alien and human, taking place on a 'planet never seen before'.

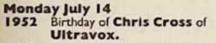

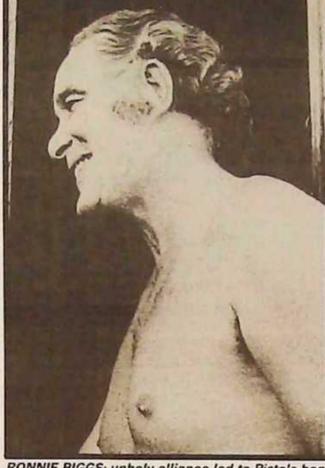

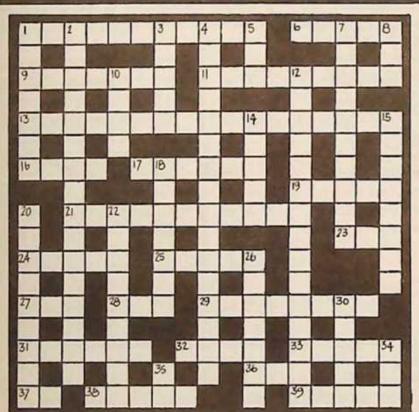

A MONTH or so ago, I promised a listing of solo and offshoot items by the members of Wire, a lot of info on which had been kindly supplied by S E Cross of Redhill, Surrey. There may be more material than this, but I haven't discovered anything to date to add to it, so I'll leave it to eagle-eyed readers. Firstly, the Bruce Gilbert and Graham Lewis material, recorded under a variety of solo, duet and band names, as detailed below. Singles first:

4AD BAD 9 'Like This For Ages'/'Kluba Cupol' (1980)

This was recorded under the name Cupol, and was a 12-inch only single on which the A-side played at 45rpm, and the B-side (which was 20 minutes long) was at 33rpm.

4AD AD 106 'Ends With The Sea'/ Hung Up To Dry While Building An Arch' (1981) Released by Gilbert & Lewis, on 7-inch only. Mute MUTE 025 'Or So It Seems'/'Heart Of Hearts (Or So It Seems)' (1982) Released under the name Duet Emmo; on 12-inch only.

Mute MUTE 41 'Only One 1'/'Only One 1-11' (1985) Released under the name He Said; also on 12-inch with the same tracks.

There was also a Gilbert & Lewis 12-inch EP (or mini-album, as it was marketed):

4AD CAD 16 '3R4' Tracks: 'Barge Calm'/'3.4'/'Barge Calm'/'R' (1980)

The albums also switch recording names quite profusely, the best-known identity for the duo being that of Dome, responsible for four albums:

Dome DOME 1 'Dome' (1980) Dome DOME 2 'Dome 2' (1980)

Dome DOME 3 'Dome 3' (1981)

Uniton U 011 'Will You Speak This Word: Dome IV' (1982) There was also an LP as Gilbert & Lewis released during the Dome period:

Other albums:

Mute STUMM 11 'Or So It Seems' (1983) (as Duet Emmo) Court COURT 1 'Whilst. Climbing, Thieves. Vie. For. Attention'

Mute STUMM 18 'This Way' (1984) (a B C Gilbert solo album) The track 'Twist Up' from the 'Dome 2' album also appeared on the cassette-only compilation 'From Brussels With Love' (Les Disques Du Crepuscule TWI 007), in 1981. Also on cassette, Touch Tapes' 'Meridians', volumes 1 and 2, feature Graham Lewis' 'He Said Argh' and B C Gilbert's 'Children' respectively. Neither of these tracks were

released elsewhere. And so on to Colin Newman, whose solo releases have not quite been as complex. Singles were:

Beggars Banquet BEG 48 'B'/'Classic Remains'/'Alone On Piano'

Beggars Banquet BEG 52 'Inventory'/'This Picture' (1981) 4AD AD 209 'Not To'/'We Means We Starts' (1982) And the albums:

Beggars Banquet BEGA 20 'A-Z' (1980)

4AD CAD 108 'Provisionally Entitled The Singing Fish' (1981) 4AD CAD 201 'Not To' (1982)

Worth noting is that 'Not Me', a song written by Colin Newman though not recorded elsewhere, is performed by members of Modern English, X Mai Deutschland and The Cocteau Twins on the album 'It'll End In Tears' by This Mortal Coil (4AD CAD 411). Newman also produced the first Virgin Prunes LP, and the recent album by Minimal Compact.

Final footnotes on Wire themselves, courtesy of a letter from our ace Danish correspondents Jesper Relsinger and Jan Poulsen which arrived too late to make the June 7 update.

The cassette version of 'Document And Eyewitness' was actually on Rough Tapes COPY 004; release dates for the singles 'A Question Of Degree' and 'Map Ref. 41°N 93°W' were July 1979 and November 1979 respectively; and the first single 'Mannequin' appeared in a limited-edition 12-incher, though with identical tracks and catalogue number to the 7-inch version.

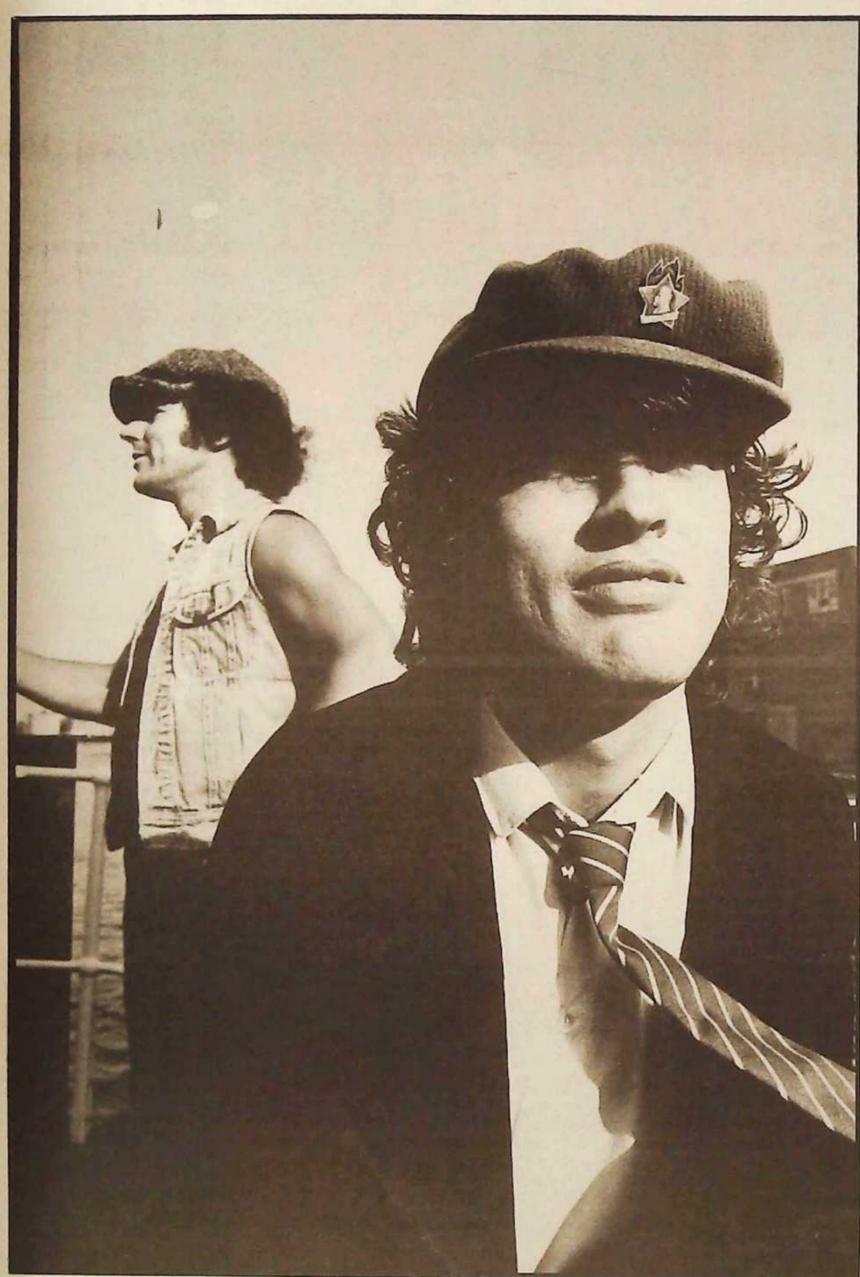

SK ANY rock and roll doctor, and they'll put you straight.

Music, from Wagner to The Waterboys, Sinatra to

Music, from Wagner to The Waterboys, Sinatra to Siouxsie, is the most important form of primal therapy the human race will ever have constant and easy access to.

Ask why, and you might as well be asking why the sun shines.

AC/DC are as important, if not more so, as any other musical ensemble who ever stood under the spotlights and performed.

A lot of people like them.

'Fly On The Wall', their last album, reached number six in the UK charts. The American tour to promote that album was extended by three weeks, while both the recent singles 'Shake Your Foundations' and 'Who Made Me' have forged their way into the

upper reaches of the Top 40, to much surprise and, in some areas, consternation.

Couple that with a soundtrack album for the horror-meister Stephen King's forthcoming film Maximum Overdrive (the reason for 'Who Made Who') and you begin to see why AC/DC is a force to be reckoned with.

Which is partly why I found myself at Jacob Street Studios, just a riff away from Tower Bridge, where AC/DC were shooting a new video for an old song – You Shook Me All Night Long' from the album 'Back In Black'.

I feel uneasy. There are lots of beautiful women wearing . . . not much.

After seven or eight hours of going through the song for the nth time, and squeezing in an interview for MTV, gravel-voiced singer Brian Johnson finds time for a rest and a talk.

"Stephen King had liked the band for a long time," he says proudly, in a thick Geordie accent.

"If you look in one of his books Skeleton Crew, he quotes 'Dirty Deeds Done Dirt Cheap'. I remember him saying at the time that he was sick of synthesisers and he wanted something different. He came straight to us.

"And," he laughs, "the man is not stupid. He got pissed off because his local radio station would not play rock and roll, so he f***** bought it. Now that's all it plays."

Brian Johnson's life changed when former AC/DC vocalist Bon Scott had one drink too many, and fate conspired to throw him into the big time and the history books.

Do you still wake up sometimes and think, Wowl?

"I haven't got time ... well, I'm just a lucky git. Once you're part of it, you don't stop to think because you've got so much work to do."

Do you miss your home town?

"Oh aye, yeah, I miss Newcastle a
lot. I live in Florida now, but I'm
lucky enough to have been brought
up in a town that's got so much
character, and that has brought up
so many characters. Eric Burden
and The Animals must have been
the earliest, Mark Knopfler, Sting. I
even heard that band The Pet Shop

Boys were Geordies, heh heh."

I ask him if people will talk of him in the same way. He grins slightly, looks around the room, and says nothing. He does, however, tell me of a studio he owns in Newcastle, which bands can use for a nominal fee. He declines to discuss it at length in case he ends up sounding like a flash megastar with more money than sense.

Yes, this man is modest. The expression 'salt of the earth' was probably invented for him.

NE OF the reasons I pigheadedly defend AC/DC is for their pure, unadulterated energy, largely due to guitarist Angus Young – five foot nothing of explosive device encased in flesh and bones. If you've seen this man perform you will not forget . . .

"Ah, Angus. He's just working that one per cent more than everyone else, absolute maximum. You can see it in his face, his eyes, he means it. It's a good f***** situation. They first came over here in 1977, people called them a punk band..."

He stops to think.

"One of my best mates Mond, from the Angelic Upstarts, was an electrician in a shipyard. They went on Top Of The Pops, and the next day all his mates were going, Ya f***** big poof, what you working here for, you must be a millionaire. You know, overnight. Poor little f**** had to leave work."

Have you suffered in the same way?

"Nah, a lot of people up at my
Dad's drinking club still look on me
with a bit of pity, they say Ee, poor
f*****, still hasn't got a decent job.
Years ago we used to have this old
Transit, one guy asked me how long
it took to get to America in it. That's
just the way they think, they don't
understand it."

Earlier Brian had described 'You Shook Me All Night Long' as "one of the dirtiest songs in the world", and of course the word 'sexist' has never been far from the critics' pens.

AC/DC sing about sex, sure. They sing about how much they like it, how they feel about it at any particular moment. And quite often they ask whether you would like to do it with them.

But this, along with the recent case of the Night Prowler (a murdering psychopath who had the idea that AC/DC stood for "Anti-Christ Devil Child") has caused problems in the States.

"We had all the mothers turning

up at gigs, holding hands to ring the place, but we went out and said hello, and they thought, well these guys are nice. It's a case of some very dangerous people in high places with a lot of money. People listen to them, but don't realise that all they are after is power, through religion or whatever.

"And you can think, I'll get this f**** and ask him what did Cain say to Abel when . . . and the guy can answer you. So the people listening go, Wow! He's from God.

"One city that was going to stop us playing was Springfield, Illinois. One of the reasons was that we were turning kids' teeth bad. They had a list, all written up. Turning butter rancid in the fridges . . ."

You have kids?

"Aye, two kids."

Would you like to see them follow their father's example?

"Oh aye, one of them's getting ready for it now, 13 she is. She loves it. It's the greatest thing in the world, I'd recommend it to anybody.

NE DAY later, I meet Angus Young at London's Mayfair Hotel. And he tells me, in his nonchalant Aussie drawl, where all that rock-hard primal energy comes from.

"It's probably more nervous energy than anything. When I was young and paid to see famous bands I used to be left standing there yawning . . . you got so frustrated watching them.

"We only started making money after 'Back In Black', but if I never made any money I'd still enjoy it. You have to make it believable, you've always got to prove you're as good as the last show you did. There's no sitting back and saying, Hey, I'm going to wave to you all night and tell you a story. A lot of people believe their own PR."

Has there ever been much pressure on you to change your ways? The schoolboy outfit you wear on stage, for instance?

"We always know what we want. To be honest, I have no other enjoyment. I'd look pretty dull up there in anything else, anyway. It's always been with me..."

Angus is unruffled by AC/DC's recent success, because he believes their fans are among the most loyal in the world.

"I did most of my growing up within this band. I might not have learned much in my life, but as long as you can keep it youthful... Bon Scott joined us pretty late in his life, but that guy has more youth in him than people half his age. That was how he thought, and I learned from

him. Go out there and be a big kid."

He also has his own thoughts on
the moral majority.

"The biggest mistake these people make is that, by you coming in, you generate their income. The kids are happy, and they forget that kids can vote as soon as they are 18. I wouldn't vote for somebody who wouldn't let me have what I wanted to see.

"And it's the same with music, art, anything. If you tell somebody they can't paint a picture in a certain way it is an infringement of their freedom of choice.

"They had the Salem witch-hunts in America, where they'd weigh a woman down, throw her in the river, and if she floated she was a witch and if she drowned she was innocent. These sort of people are still there.

"The only decent thing that comes out of it is that if they're burning our records, they must be buying 'em," he adds wryly. "And I'm still trying to figure out how they can play a record backwards."

THE FALL 'Living Too Late' (Beggars Banquet)

Close but too obvious for a single of the week, now someone's squeezed concentrated sulphuric down the side of their face. Reclining with a growl not witnessed since 'Room To Live' (surely their most criminally ignored moment?), The Fall at their most heavenly clumsy and encouragingly unstable. While the accompanying 'Hot Aftershave Bop' finds them blood-rushing with more post-Brix apoplexy, Mark E bounces back to his barking, choking best. Sounding so casually devious here, I went to brush my teeth and thought someone was furtively gouging out my eyes while reciting Mailer; cancer and empathy.

ALTERNATIVE TV 'Love Sex' (Noiseville) Go on, you're prompting, be sarky about Perry, how he's committing necrophiliac assaults on 'The Image Is Cracked' reel, how his return is less than brazen, how they're still so grubby and full of harmless, impish mischief after all these years. But Mark and his troopers are making much more of a physical clatter these days, witness biceps of 'Victory' here, both spiteful and niggardly but a sardonic smile is plucked from the undergrowth, There's more convulsion than convalescence going on in this tensely strung strategy, Mark's snotty nose sniffing out some whiplashed thrills, clawlike.

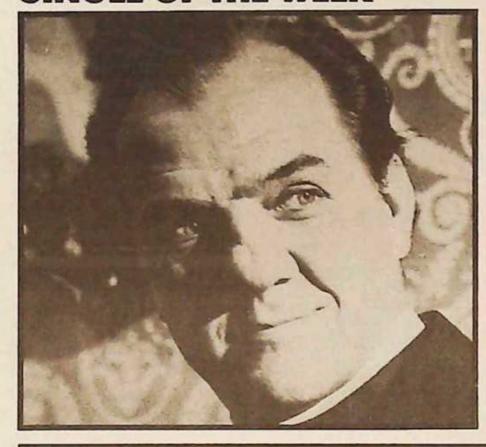

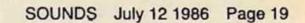

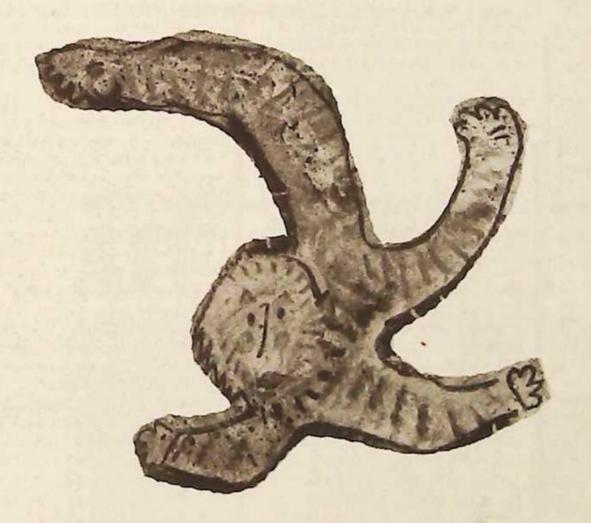

He's broken out again, armed with a dangerous new headful of ideas. GLYN BROWN corners NICK CAVE in his Berlin hideout to hear his true confessions. Photofit: PETER ANDERSON

HERE'S NOT one cloud when I walk up to the Berlin Wall and touch it to try and get the feeling.

A very few small forget-menots are mountaineering, and there's something sprayed along the top in green about "If you love somebody, set them free", but that's out of a song.

It's hard, at any rate, to choose just one colour from the kaleidoscope shouting in my face.

Checkpoint Charlie has a mess of uniforms – pretty French blue, American green, British khaki – dancing around its gates. At least, they're not arguing.

I can't reconcile this with all the facts as I've understood them. I came here thinking Nick Cave came here thinking it was a city on the edge. Because Nick Cave grins, "You know, I am the grand-daddy of doom", and because his impending album of covers — 'Kicking Against The Pricks' — shows he's still searching for pictures of the underworld, even when they're other people's.

Cave might like you to think he lives in squalor: but how can this be the case? There may be East German guards on the other side of a painted wall but, when they focus binoculars on you, they're probably just trying to see inside your soul.

And when you tumble down a hill that's rubble overgrown with daisies and big black letters on a white board say Hier befanden sich die folterzellen der Geheimen Staatspolizei, you only comprehend the translation in this stagey place if

someone tells you: You are standing on the grounds of the former torture chambers of the Gestapo.

So what is squalor?

T'S REAL hate. Thompson will go into a diner and he'll think, They've stuck this woman in a soiled pinafore with this smeared lipstick and that red muck on her claws because they saw me coming. And you think, Yeah, I'd knife her, I'd stick her head in a bowl of dirty washing-up water."

Nick Cave's talking about Jim Thompson, American pulp writer and – I think we can safely say – woman hater.

I'm not drawing any conclusion between the singer and the author — yet — I'm just setting words before you. Cave — an awkward man with awkwardly long legs who can't meet your eyes with ease — just becomes more animated than I ever guessed he'd be as he describes the author in whose work he's caught up.

The more he says, the more the obvious question must be asked. So I do

"What? A misogynist? Why – I don't know why someone hasn't asked me that before."

We have been speaking for hours now in the apartment Nick is vacating. We have been speaking at a tin table in an almost bare room, with – I think this is right – a naked light bulb suspended between us.

This at first makes me feel we'll never get comfortable, but we do, even though – I mean, because – our only means of entertainment is a clutch of Pils bottles.

Throughout our small talk, the man has smiled as often as I'd expected – about twice – but he conveys humour in other ways. More often, though, the thin white face seems to burst apart, the black eyebrows shooting around and the Italianate eyes rolling in circles, mock confusion hiding embarrassment.

So we're getting somewhere.
We begin to find Nick Cave is
often shy, lastingly patient, easily
hurt, seldom sarcastic and needs to
get several things off his chest,
though he won't supply a map
around the maze. I like him, but I
still think misogyny's as good a place
to start telling you the tale as any.

"It's so obvious. And yet it was only a short while ago that I realised all my songs had that kind of slant to them. Wait, though – just wait. Now, what does the word mean? Exactly? Let's look it up. Er. . . it means hating women, doesn't it? Well, I don't hate them. I want to do violence to them. I want to damage them."

Cave is uneasy about this (I am, too) so he's trying to make it throwaway, torn between admiring his anti-social trait and fearing it.

"Misogyny is... one of the few remaining possibilities that has the potential or capacity to shock me and for that reason excite me a little bit when I write about it."

Are you exorcising something?
"I don't know if that's the case, or whether I just nurture an intensified idea about it. Maybe I put it into an aesthetic or creative sense which I find to be reasonably separate from the way I live.

"I mean, Jim Thompson is someone who isn't able, in real life, to put into practice what he would really like to do, so he spent his life just writing about it, setting up situations where he could – from what I gather concerning his life – kill the one woman over and over again that has haunted him. But I – I don't have that same. . .

"I mean, I would say I kill the same woman over and over but, er, not for the same reasons. It is the same image I have in my head, though."

Nick is fidgeting in his un-Bauhaus chair now. You do realise this is some way into our conversation and that we have reached some level of understanding?

Do / realise it? I don't stop when Nick's uneasy though, do I?

This one woman – how does she

"It's usually the same kind of, er, pastiche of images making up this one person. . . fetishistic sorts of things, like. . . uh, maybe a red dress or whatever, I don't know."

Yes you do. Stilettos?

"No, oh no, not stilettos, but she's not a nun, either. I write about the same one in very affectionate sorts of ways as well, it's just that...oh, it probably relates to one particular person."

Still, that relationship is in the past, presumably?

Cave, sweating in a lacy shirt and fiddling with his ornate Presley medallion, gives the floor his customary resigned stare.

"I. . . it's hard to say. But I don't – well, I do, I have a basic image, or caricature, no, let's say a dead image, for want of a better word, of this girl in my mind. It wouldn't take long for a psychiatrist to find out where it was based, who it was based on. But there has always been a girl who's featured in my writing from the beginning and – yeah, she was a constant source of ideas about what she is."

She made you hate women? "No, no, I love women. But she, (bitterly), she is a constant source of inspiration. Of all kinds."

I'm sorry this is so hard to read, but we discoursed brokenly at the best of times. It picks up.

Do you understand people who kill for love?

"Yes. Killing through jealousy? Yes, I can understand that." Could you do it?

"Aah, I don't know. I mean, I don't know if I could kill anybody really, but there's always a first time, I suppose. I quite enjoy thinking about it. I'm a kind of closet killer." This is accompanied by a wonky smile. Short intermission.

"I'm working on a script for an Australian movie, based in a prison. There was gonna be just one woman in it, a nurse in the morgue. She was gonna cut out this guy's heart."

"HAT COVERS album wasn't supposed to require much work, but it was more difficult than any of the others to

The album brandishes bloodstreaked posies like 'Hey Joe', 'I'm Gonna Kill That Woman' (but, of course), the Velvet Underground's 'All Tomorrow's Parties' and a version of Gene Pitney's 'Something Got A Hold On My Heart' that makes me cry (not hard to do).

But why did you change the words at the end of 'Running Scared', on the single? Roy Orbison says the girl "walked away with me", whereas you.

"Oh, shit, I didn't realise anyone would know. . . "

But you say "walk right out on me". When I saw him do that at the Royal Albert Hall, Roy dragged an entire audience back from the pit of despair with those words.

"Yeah. I'm not so good at doin' that. I kinda like to leave 'em there! And it was a personal thing — or a joke — to make the 'I' come out the loser, not the winner. But with that song, I. . . didn't expect anyone to notice."

AN YOU still pick up any feel of Berlin's history in its streets? (I had this idea that Cave chose Berlin for a reason, remember.)

"Well, no, I mean, I don't know what went on here during the war."

This is a surprise to me, and Cave sees that and looks a bit and (as far as I'm really concerned) unnecessarily shamefaced.

"I just have a girlfriend here.
Occasionally some older Berliner
will point out a building that they
like, and it will be made of some
kind of concrete developed in the
war that wouldn't blow up."

So you don't find something here that Australia couldn't give you?

"Well, I still do go back home regularly, almost by accident. After two months I'm crawling the walls."

Why's that?

"Just the part I come from,
Melbourne, is in such a chronic –
the people from my generation all
tend to be in a state of not knowing
what to do with themselves. They're
killing themselves, in one way or
another and, ah, it seems that each
Christmas or so it always culminates
in certain horror. . . horrible things
happening."

Such as?

"Just... aah, I don't really wanna go into it but like last Christmas was just a black one as far as I'm concerned. A lot of very sad sorts of things happened with people that you know, and...

"And it's so far away from the rest of the world. It's the world's end.

"And some are married now and making a go of this – sometimes it's working, more often it's not. When I go there, the people that I know. ... when I see them, there's this nervous hystericalness about the place. I can't stay there. I can't answer these questions!"

O YOU see your mother when you go home?
"Yes, I stay with her."
You get on well?

"Extremely."

You miss her when you're away?
"Yes." Laughs shyly. (I think this is kept as close to his heart as a locket and it's proving as hard to spring open. Will it go on being so difficult or will I hit the catch?)

Maybe you can see qualities of hers coming out in you?

"Well, I can see a lot of points about her that aren't there, that aren't in me – like her complete, her tolerance of people and her openmindedness. Her optimism, and so on. I mean, I kind of look like her but I probably have a lot of similarities to my late father."

She doesn't get into a state thinking how depressed you get, or seem to say you are? She accepts

"She accepts me and, I think, goes

through a certain amount of private torment about the whole thing.

"Ahm... she reads religiously anything that's written about me and when L... when I think about some of the things that are said it must worry her, I'd say."

Is that why you get annoyed with journalists? (This man has written a song dedicated to the music press for his next LP. It's called 'Scum'.)

"No! (Laughs.) My kind of relationship with journalists — usually, anyway — has, um, gotten to such a state that I no longer even consider the reasons why I dream about gunning them down. I guess what irritates me most is their predictability. They don't seem concerned with the truth."

But someone takes it all to heart?

"Well, it may seem petty or insignificant but there is a reality about the whole thing and – I mean. . . tsk. . . look, this is since we are talking about my mother. . it's that she would find, she would find some of these things horrifying. Anyone who's read any of the things written about me would realise they're a kind of mother's nightmare And. . ."

You can, of course, imagine how tense the atmosphere in here is getting.

"And there was a case, a case in Australia where a 13-year-old boy hung himself. He was living alone in Saint Kilda, this particular area and uh. . . his room was covered in Nick Cave posters and he had Nick Cave records and he supposedly kind of imitated me in the way he dressed or whatever, and consequently I got kind of, uh - well, there was this business in the daily papers, these headlines screaming, y'know, '13-Year-Old Boy Has Obsession With Punk Star' or some bullshit, and it says, 'Nick Cave, the man who begins each concert with, Hands up who wants to die'."

This scene, these words make me want to laugh stupidly, and I nearly do; which would have been the most unfortunate move on my part. But anyway, Cave is finding a lot about his cigarette to interest him.

"And then there's, there's kind of, even in the more intelligent newspapers, a centre spread analysis of the lyrics of 'Six Inch Gold Blade' which – apart from it not referring at all to suicide – ah, says, Is this the sort of thing our youth should be listening to?"

It's an almost unendurable calumny to have laid at your door. Cave would talk about this in the third person if he could, I think.

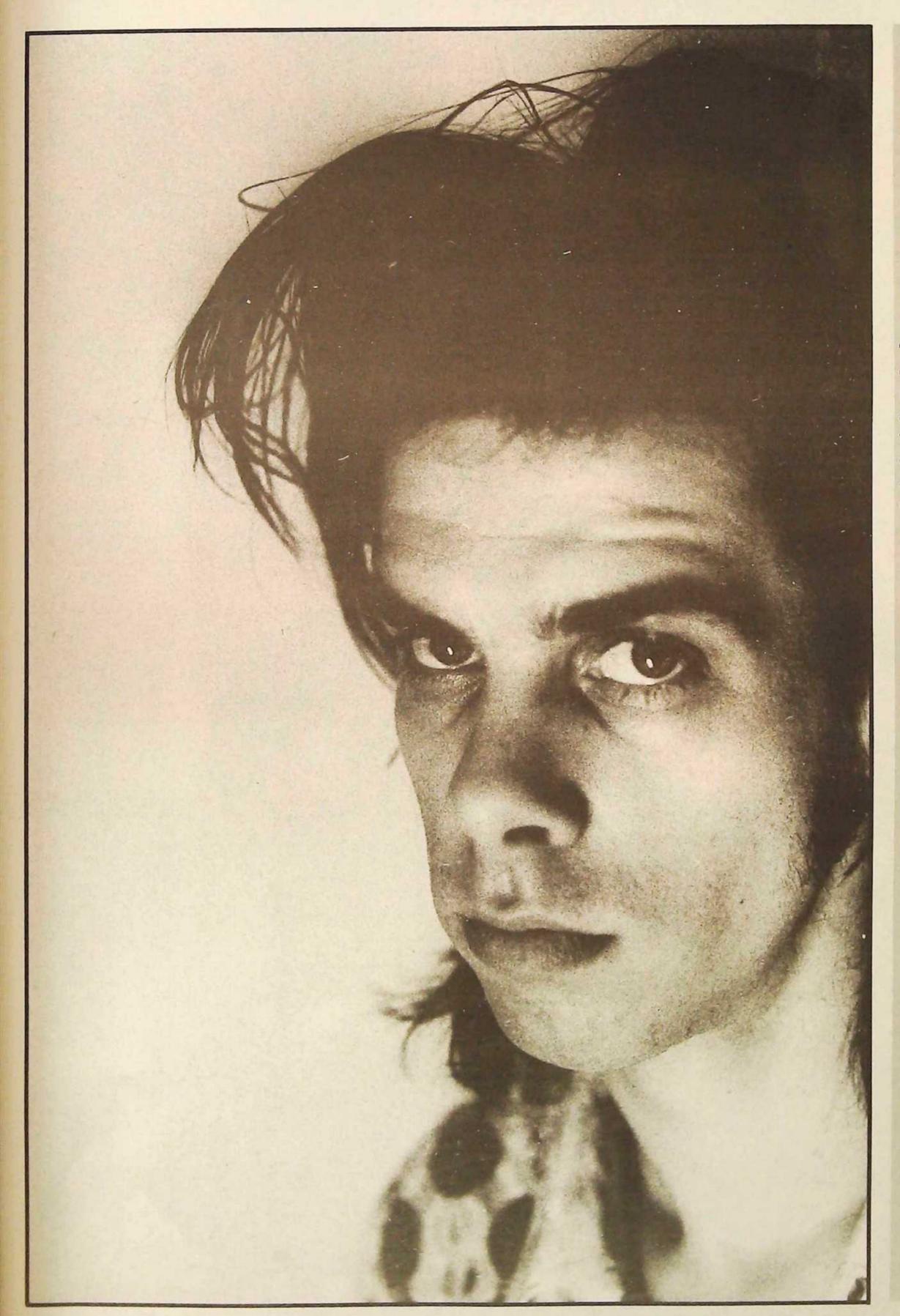
What did you feel when you heard about the boy?

"I felt that he, that at 13 years old, he must've been fairly precocious, to say the least, and advanced to kill himself so young. If he was making some sort of statement, I think he would've felt his entire death was rubbished and turned into a circus by saying he was imitating some f***** lead singer of a bloody rock group. The whole thing's turned into an utter circus.

"And if you wanna look at it in terms of who's responsible for this boy's death, then the question has to be raised about why a 13-year-old boy does kill himself. Y'know, why – why is he living alone in this area, and then decides to hang himself?

VIEW FROM THE HILL have brought British soul back into the sunlight with their summer slammer 'No Conversation'. CHRIS ROBERTS finds PATRICK PATTERSON only too happy to talk about it

HE KIND of day that writers write about, that Kevin Rowland's image of Bill Withers would sing about

The sun shines on green, the birds twitter intelligently, and View From The Hill and I go through the time-honoured ritual while all that really needs to be said is: what a lovely lovely record this is, with its dawn-gold ebbs and flows and conclusively visionary title.

'No Conversation', their first single on EMI, is a soul classic fit to meet God naked. Patrick Patterson, Trevor White and Angela Wynter have many more such sapphires in their boudoir.

Is music the most important thing in your life, Patrick?

"Oh there are lots of important things and I wouldn't like to say any one of them is the most important. Creating music is essential to me, but not at the exclusion of all else. You have to keep a balance."

What are the pros and cons of signing to EMI - an event which occurred after two

"The only difficulty is that the machine is so big. You have to try to make them appreciate your identity. As a 'black group' you're easily channelled into doing a particular type of music, and if you have one successful song, you're expected to 'reproduce that magic'. We have material that can cross the water, wide-ranging and free. Although it is soulful music, it's not in any one bag. We'll put out the best we have, irrespective of idiom.

"The pros also are down to the machine. Financial input, broader exposure. As I think I've told you before, if people have the opportunity to hear good music, I believe they'll appreciate it.

"Everybody's moved by a great ballad. Sometimes you say - Oh, that's my story ... y'know?"

And as key songwriter, Patrick is aware of the sensitive force of subtlety.

"I'm afraid of overstatement, it turns people off very easily. This is why lyrics are so important. One way of saying a thing can alienate, another can lead to understanding. There should be no hobby-horses, or telling people something they've heard 50 million times before. The tale might be slightly political, or slightly sentimental .. it's all just observation. And even just a melody without any lyric, can touch you, can mean something to you."

MAGE IS not a major concern for the South London-based trio, as long as it doesn't stray from "the essential nature, character, purpose, ideal", they say.

"We just want to nullify preconceptions, and misrepresent neither the music nor the individuals."

All three members sing; as more of the large body of the material comes out, the value of this will be transmitted. An LP and tour will happen when they're good and ready; songs like 'On The Corner' and 'Lover's Confession' will lick your lobes.

The video for 'No Conversation' is a relief and a joy.

"You thought that was very nice?" asks Patrick Patterson modestly. Indeed, I reply, it isn't glossy and over-polished, it's not a perfume advert. It's grainy and realistic and includes shots of red Streatham buses and seen-better-days council estates, but still shimmers with a delicate, effective ... ha.

"Hopefully it's not too literal an interpretation of the song. It works in the right dimension, one that leaves something to the imagination."

We try not to moan too much about racism in the music industry. Patrick allows that "that statement needs to be made every now and again. There are a lot of struggling

black musicians doing highly original things, and they deserve encouragement".

But if you're good enough, you're big enough, and View From The Hill -- whose vast experience in previous groups has not laded their instincts for what it is that tingles and trembles - are giants. Bear, they croon, the weight of the world with us.

Have you ever despaired?

"No no no. Each move forward is a bonus. No expectation, just hope. And work. Appreciation is a great incentive.

"But you have to have the courage of your convictions. If as an individual you're satisfied with what you've created, then if Joe tells you it's bad, it doesn't mean it is bad, it just means it's not to Joe's taste. That's all, Fred will tell you it's great Herbert will tell you it's alright

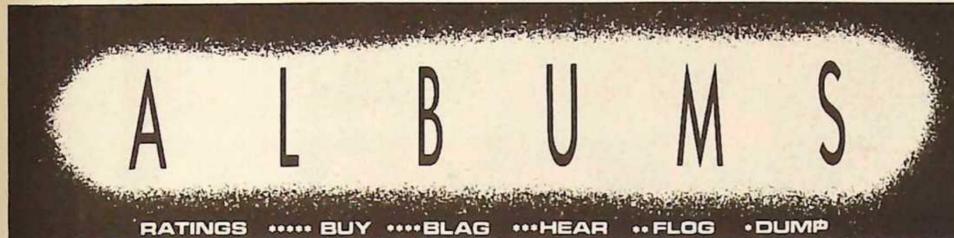
"But you mustn't short-change your own ideas. If it isn't right, you wait until it is right, not until it pleases other people."

IGHT NOW, right now, I can think of only 52 things in the whole world that would please me more than seeing View From The Hill become the most successful (they are already the best) let'scall-it-soul group in Britain. American mouthwash is a crime, and they're the cure.

'No Conversation' is the sort of record you slip into her bag (which is by the phone) when she's not looking and a day later she is this record? It's really, really lovely, and you think, Hmmm, I could get back into this game after all (fool!). And the B-side is gorgeous too.







THE GARDEN PATH '5 Reasons' (Greasy Pop GPR 119)****

THIS ARRIVED in the post marked "Fragile" which turned out to be an enormous understatement. All the way from the fertile musical plains of Adelaide, The Garden Path are the most extraordinary of all the unexpected megatalents I followed around last Christmas in an untypically awestruck way.

Vic Conrad, who writes most of the songs and plays guitar, is also possessed of one of the saddest voices in the whole world. Vulnerable and honest, it cracks and shudders in all the right places. "I could walk and I could crawl and I could take you far away from here," he murmurs, reminding me that I haven't fallen in love for nearly a week. And when he goes it alone with piano for the closing chapter, 'Little Pieces', you realise you've been shown a glimpse of hell and gently turned back from the brink at the last moment.

The rest of the GPs emotional athletes to a man paint a backdrop of everchanging colours, from manic to depressive and back again, that swirl just out of reach. Maybe these are love songs and maybe they're not, but they hover in the air long afterwards like unanswered questions, rather wistful and tinged with regret.

Many bands are capable of coaxing the odd sentimental tear or two, but The Garden Path have the power to induce great big choking sobs. In fact, if '5 Reasons' doesn't tug at you someplace where it hurts, you'd better check for a pulse. Magnificent. JANE SIMON

SLY FOX 'Let's Go All The Way' (Capitol St-12367)***

IT'S JUST all too perfect; like Stepford Wives, Sly Fox are literally too good to be true. I avoid 'pop' radio and TV so conscientiously I've yet to endure the delights of 'lt's 'Orrible Being In Love (When You're 81/2)' and the latest disc by someone musingly referred to by The Sun as Sam's Back. But I seem to be hearing 'Let's Go All The Way' everywhere my dainty feet care to take me.

The album of the single is equally convincingly unconvincing (or should that be unconvincingly convincing?) in its scope/ breadth/range etc. Every department of the record is sanitised and polished, from the reggae-fied McCartneyism of 'Merry-Go-Round', through the token ballad and the latino 'Como Tu Te Llama' ('Perry Como You Are An Andean Mammal And I Claim My Five Dollars'), to the precise reconstruction of the condensed greatest hits of Smokey Robinson on 'If Push Comes To Shove'

One name leaps Bob Beamon-like to mind in the comparison stakes, and that is Philip Bailey. This is a caucasian nose job, Capital Radio soul for beginners, a slick exercise in slick audience identification. marketing as music. Let's go all the way... to the bank? ANDY HURT

MOTORHEAD 'Orgasmatron' (GWR GWLP1)****

ONLY IN your wildest, most wanton dreams was it ever like this . . .

Make no mistake, when Lemmy found himself all alone in the world and the infernal machine called Motorhead spluttered to a halt, it wasn't just going to get patched up and given a fresh lick of paint, oh no. The thing had to be turned inside out, all or nothing, and when the right parts were found, boy was it gonna move.

'Orgasmatron', then, is unbridled, thoroughbred Motorhead, 1986 model - the transition is perfect. And as much as it pains me to say it, with Philthy Phil and Fast Eddie in the crew 'Orgasmatron' would probably have never happened. Wurzel, Pete Gill and Phil Campbell make it 101 per cent all the way and, after three years of frustrated waiting, it couldn't have been anything less.

There are nine good reasons why Motorhead must exist, nine burning, churning wedges of sound nurtured with a sledgehammer by Bill Laswell (and that was a smart move, too). Listen to 'Mean Machine' or 'Riding With The Driver' and taste the sweat,

feel the desperation, both titles out-gunning anything you'll find on 'Ace Of Spaces' or 'Overkill'.

And perhaps that's the sweetest thing. Motorhead are getting better, cutting deeper, biting harder, taking it further, when we all thought that maybe there was nowhere else to go. Brilliantly, dramatically answering all those silent prayers, Motorhead show why they'll outlast the lot of us. The time has never been more appropriate than now to set the kings of speed back on top of the rockpile. 'Nothing Up My Sleeve', 'Built For Speed', 'Dr Rock' and the single 'Deaf Forever' walk it like they talk it, with power, passion and finesse.

As for the nefarious title track, a rolling, skulking hulk of a song, well . . . this alone will show you how Motorhead have evolved. It's dirty, gritty, a grinding ranting all-purpose death march, and quite stunning.

But enough, I think you get the general idea. Motorhead are back and proud, and for Lemmy, the butt of a thousand journalists' feeble jokes, the ride just goes on and on. Never look back.

VARIOUS ARTISTS 'Purveyors Of Taste: A Creation Compilation'

(Creation CRE LP 010)**** THE WEATHER Prophets' Peter Astor wants to sing like Frankie Lymon. Frankie Lymon wants to know why he must be a teenager in love. I always wanted to know why people make compilation records.

Alan McGee's honed down roster achieves the impossible - a compilation without dull moments. All seven tracks mesh together to form a whole - a corporate compilation with a consistency that marks Creation out as one of the most talent-laden labels in the country.

It kicks off with The Bodines' 'Therese' and to say that none of the other tracks surpass this implies no criticism; after all, it is the single of the year. With its layered guitars alternately cascading and chiming a Cutteresque overlay, 'Therese' is simply a perfect pop single. Each component part is understood and the product releases several breaths of fresh air.

Primal Scream's 'Velocity Girl' is two minutes and 15 seconds of saccharine melody. "Here she comes with vodka in her veins." That's alliteration and it's absolutely brilliant. The Jasmine Minks' coasting 'Cold Heart' keeps up the standard as does The Weather Prophets' incantatory 'Like Frankie Lymon'. Biff Bang Pow's 'Love's Gone Out Of Fashion' helter-skelters on and, yes, quality is maintained.

A Creation compilation is a compelling compound.

QUEENSRYCHE 'Rage For Order' (EMI America AML 3105)****

LAST WINTER, my weary old record deck fell prey to a wriggling obscenity of an album by Mentors, a trio of psychotic porn metal pimps. Mentors are an insult to the paying public, and so unfortunately, is a large proportion of today's indie metal.

So the time couldn't be

more ripe for a band to bypass stock cock rock, show the guts and initiative to do things their own way, and give metal a fresh pair of legs on which to run into the '90s. Queensryche are the men for the job.

Those who were left disappointed by the quintet's iffy first album, 'The Warning', may have their doubts about such a claim, but 'Rage Of Order' is streets ahead of that and just about every other metal release since then. The seeds of brilliance sown on the 'Queen Of The Reich' EP have now reached full fruition.

Track one side two, 'Neue Regel', says it all, its thick, crackling base of guitars and drums given an extra lift by treated vocals, a staggered arrangement and the results of the boys going "sample crazy" in Seattle.

Surprise peppers the whole caboodle. Random background noises (shades of 23 Skidoo) bubble to the surface as a guitar cuts in and out on 'Screaming In Digital', while 'Gonna Get Close To You' heaves and sweats with an eerie compulsion.

Unlike the fashionably brainless Motorhead, Queensryche are going against the grain, making a genuine attempt to break the worn and cracked mould of orthodox metal. The least they deserve is a degree of recognition.

THE BEAT FARMERS 'Van Go' (MCA Records MCF 3326)*

DUNG! GO the geetars, cowpatter-cow-patter plop the drums, oink-snort gabbles Country Dick Montana, and The Beat Farmers are back in their musical element - swill.

If ever there was a reason for trad American rock to be subjected to a bolt between its astigmatic eyes, 'Van Go' is it.

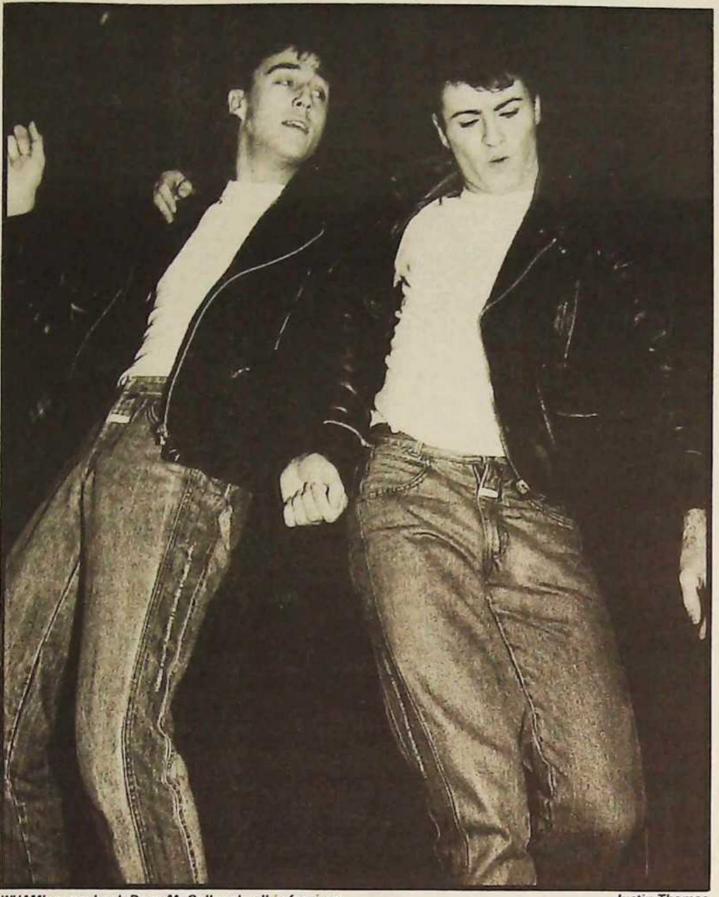
MADONNA 'True Blue' (WEA WX 54)***

LIVE FAST, die young, and leave a good looking corpse. Wasn't that what punk had always promised to do? And yet in the end, it was left to the pop pariahs to put their money where their mouths are.

"Do you. Enjoy what you do. If not. Just stop." And they did. In all the interviews leading up to The End, that was the general thrust. Wham! wasn't fun any more and it was time to get out. But faced suddenly with adulation 72,000 times over at Wembley, it can't not have crossed their minds that maybe being Wham! wasn't so bad after all, and maybe we could give it a few more weeks. . .

Inevitably, the press missed a few angles on The Final. Instead of focusing on the teenage tears (of which there were few because it's hard to cry when you're singing along), they should have noted the attitude behind placards like 'George Get Your Knob Out', which summed up Wham! with the same lack of self-consciousness as they did themselves when they conceded that 'Last Christmas' probably did sound better in December but what the hell, they'd do it anyway.

Wham! - God bless 'em - were like kissing with your eyes open; a fantasy that wasn't embarrassed by the contradictions of the real world. And if Andrew Ridgeley appeared to have all the musical aptitude of a fruit bat, that was a crucial part of the equation too.

Wham! were the kind of fantasy that allows albums to be released unsullied by any mention of the musicians who made them. So here it is - a career encapsulated in two LPs. Four years, 12 hits, four number ones and some B sides. The 12-inch mixes that may have escaped your attention, though the songs speak for themselves.

Wham! more than fulfilled George Michael's wish to become part of the fabric of society - a hook to hang the '80s on. If pop exists at all it should always be this immense, this fantastic, with catwalks and choreography and perfect pitch. At Wembley the saddest thought of all was, how long will it be before pop gets it right again?

OUT OF Scotland via the mock millionaires' paradise of Martin Fry's Xanadu and

Elton John's Watford-In-Eden, Love And Money have a very high opinion of their creativity. This unconcealed arrogance is not wholly justified. For although they do have their moments, Love And Money just do not have the wit and the imagination to fulfil their own ambitions.

'All You Need Is ... Love And Money' is such a calculated attempt to produce a perfect dance/rock/pop album for the mid-'80s that it could not help but fail. Listening to, say, 'Pain Is A Gun' (wow, heavy!), you can almost see Love And Money's market research people out on the streets of Milton Keynes asking the nuclear family's rebellious teenage daughter just what sort of pop band she'd like on her wall now that George Michael's a boring old pessimist, Duran Duran want to be taken seriously and Abloody-Ha make her throw up. In a neatly typed list, the answers might well amount to exactly what Love And Money are offering, but in practice?

In practice, 'Candybar Express' is an aspiring pop classic which just won't relax, 'Dear John' is a retrospective love song which could be brave enough to cause questions in the House, if I understand it properly (I probably don't, I expect it's about John Lennon or somebody dead famous like that). 'You're Beautiful' is just too NutraSweet grammar school romance for anybody's liking.

'Cheeseburger' might just be a very clever glance at the pop world, from Elvis to their own ambitions. And 'Love And Money' (also a song, of course) pushes at the walls of the 'Wham! Rap' except that the walls begin to close in.

The blueprint was there. This much is self-evident. But as so often happens when young men with cheekbones and Ray-Bans decide to make the pop album of the year, their intentions never quite translate onto vinyl. Love And Money have tried too hard. ROGER HOLLAND

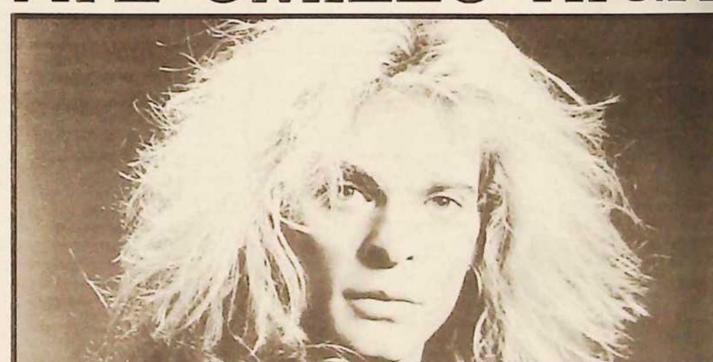

DAVE LEE ROTH 'Eat 'Em And Smile' (Warner Brothers WX56) ***

SO THERE he crouches on the back cover, a painted feral kid, howling mouth agape in some clumsy imitation of the oral sex that the title seems to hint at. There are the soulless, luminescent eyes, the chiselled features of a man who shows immense taste in cars, but whose ill-concealed misogyny disguises itself in a luscious epicurean lust for women that he would otherwise reserve for steak tartare.

Here, to match, comes the music, bloodied and primal. The lurch of the opening 'Yankee Rose' unashamedly picks its teeth with the leg of a chair, and spits out rock 'n' roll spinters like gunfire. The resolute gee-tar whines and strays, and ties silk barbed wire around its own dewlapped neck. Much of the album is like this; but we watch and smile, and mostly remain unmoved. We jot this down: Van Halen seems better off without

'Shyboy', let's take that as an example. It's an altogether rancid platter, where Roth places his order for hors d'oevres - one wild woman, please, and a bourbon chaser. But the burn wiggle and the hips that giggle are still thrust, like that dimpled chin, for us to

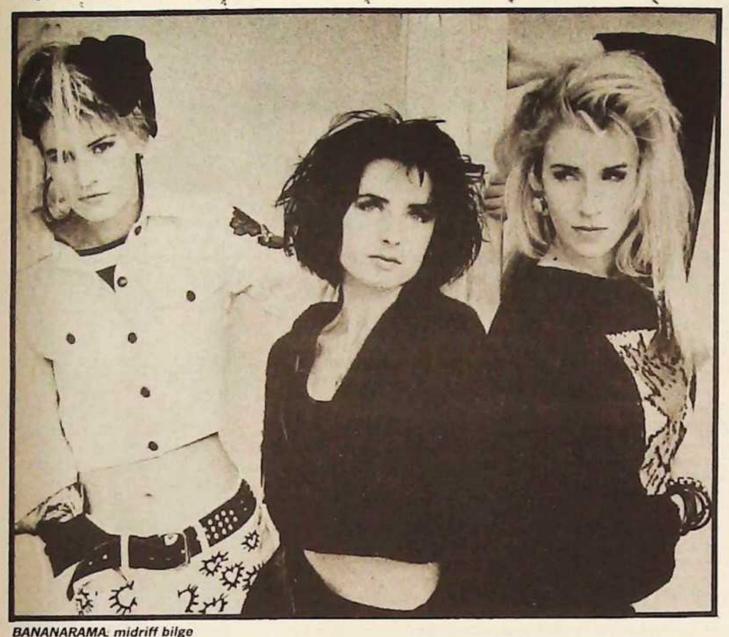

'Free Among The Dead' - she

describes a high-pitched phobia of life which scrapes the skin off your eyelids.

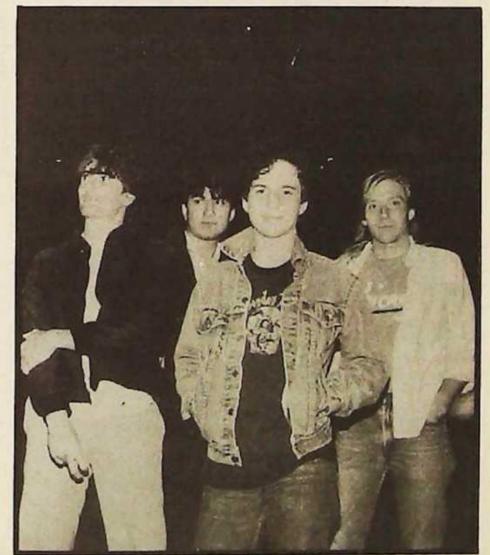

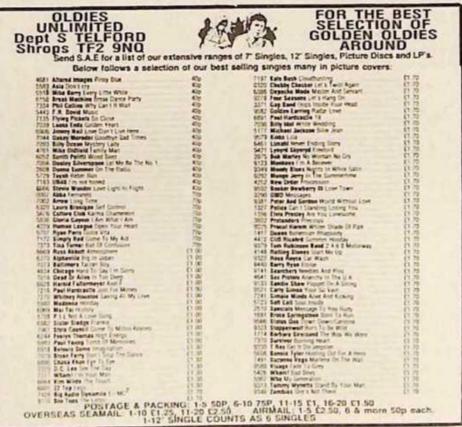

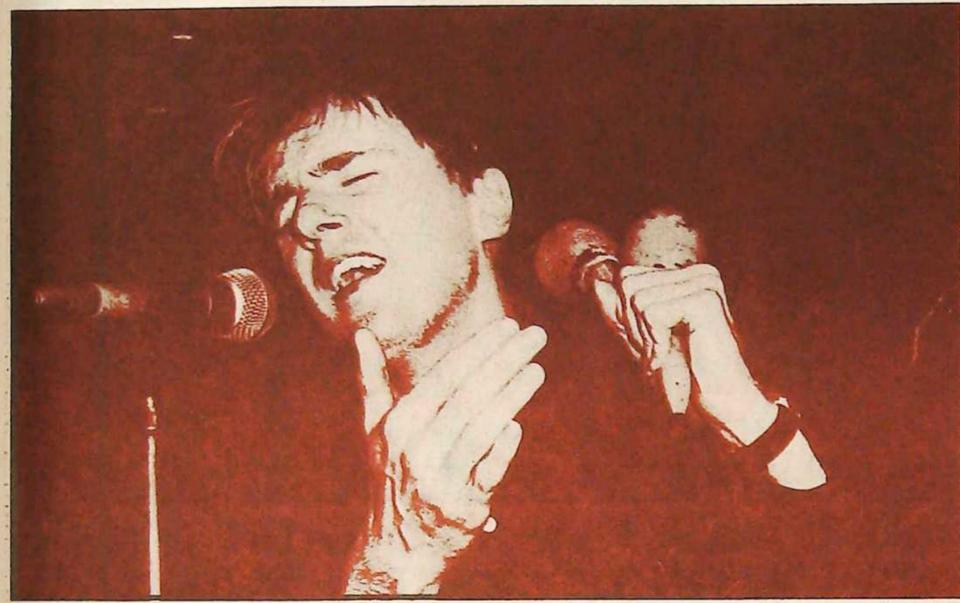

Jim thinks that, because they are number 29, people will expect them to live up to something. You point out that he has been working for this for years, and that tonight is a celebration. Jim refuses your offer of a drink because he has the shits.

Downstairs, it smells like salmon. Furniture grimace and blush, five nervous icons. Better than better could be, they start with 'Shake Like Judy Says' and 'Love Your Shoes'. It's like angst is basic and ecstasy is elementary. Fair enough, you think, as you and Lucy bounce up and down and push taller people out of the way. Lucy has a crush on drummer Hamilton because of his personality. You have a 20 minute crush on keyboardist Maya because of the way she flicks her cuffs back in between being an iceberg and being an iceberg.

Jim, eyes like a psycho, if you believe, grows in confidence to the point of touching his heart when he sings the word

'heart'. You hear them all like a virgin receptacle and revel in the apropos torch intensity of 'I Miss You', 'Make Believe I'm Him' (Motown for masochists) and 'Escape Into My Arms'.

THE CHESTERFIELDS Kentish Town Bull And Gate

A CURLING white smoke cloud of beautiful pop swirls out from the nostrils of The Chesterfields' mean, melodic guitars and hovers above the small crowd's heads. It's a dose of lung poisoning which everyone wants to catch.

The Chesterfields flirt with their eyelids at milky melodies and summer sunshine beats. Their fine uptempo stompers, like 'Sweet Revenge' – from their 'Guitar In Your Bath' EP on Subway – show The Chesterfields' creamy grace in producing instant pop jewels that have a humming similarity to The Housemartins.

Melancholic water lilies float on The Chesterfields' pond, partly due to the vocalist's vulnerable English boy angst. The better moments sometimes suffer through this and become as drippy as wet sponges but, on their way up, The Chesterfields climb their 'Love Mountain' with a determined ease and look down on their supposed

The Chesterfields are crafty, catchy and colourful. Yet more contenders striving for the vacant post of pop kings.

THE LEATHER NUN Croydon Underground

GIVE AN infinite number of monkeys an infinite amount of Lego and, in time, they will construct an accurate model of Croydon.

Thankfully, God discreetly stuck the ugliest town in the universe deep in the London suburbs, the main disadvantage being that the best club in town, The Underground, is also situated here. Hence the pilgrimage to cop a load of Sweden's kings of feedback, The Leather Nun.

Since their rare knot of UK gigs earlier this year they've gone some way towards whipping their collective image into something resembling Brit A&R man raw material. A close encounter with Sven Todd, the demon barber of Gothenburg, has replaced Jonas Almqvist's biker pony tail with a smartly

Aryan flat-top, while guitarists Aron and Nils have apparently swapped hair colourings.

No change for Anders the bass, with his fleece of tearaway curls, a hairstyle as unlikely as his Dachau physique and peculiar jutting jaw, like a pelican with a heavy catch of krill.

For starters a new song, 'Sex Is No Emergency', and immediately their sole failing, a tendency to indulge in overlong workouts, is exposed. But by the third selection, in which Jonas informs the female (I assume) element of the audience that "you can suck on my Lollipop", the Scandinavians have eased into gear. From then on it's a succession of old favourites: 'FFA', 'Son Of A Good Family', 'Prime Mover', 'Busted Kneecaps' and more, but strangely no room for 'Fly Angels Fly'

No matter, they do their job efficiently enough, even if Gert the drummer disagreed to the extent of briefly walking out on the others during their batch of encore tunes. The Mary Chain, huh!

ANDY HURT

GREENHOUSE OF TERROR Chalk Farm Enterprise

IN THE Greenhouse Of Terror you'll hear the pulsating sound of energetic guitars, walking the line between catchy pop and powerful rock thrash. Looking like rejects from Oxfam and playing like vagrants from the fires of hell, Greenhouse Of Terror brandish all the candyfloss backbeat of screaming guitars and driving rhythms, producing in turn exhilarating songs.

Their set is breathtakingly fast and often exciting, but it lacks changes in pace and diversity in mood. This doesn't allow us to gasp for oxygen between their feverishly apocalyptic swingers, as catchy as The Undertones' treacly pop and as abrasive as 'Damaged Goods' era Gang Of Four. The whole bestial set left me sweating, dancing, singing and leaving early as too much red meat isn't good for a weak heart like mine.

With a little bit of composure, GOT could climb to greater heights.

PETER MURPHY Piccadilly Theatre

A YEAR ago, there was a rumour going round that Murphy was dying of some nasty disease. Tonight, just to prove you can't keep an old ghoul down, he was reborn on the wings of Ubu's words, singing "Don't want a cure, want a final solution." The perfect pill in black, he was spectacular.

The slyest of stars, the light simply poured out from his cheek(y) bones which are to rock music what Monroe's shoulders were to celluloid, broadly speaking. Quite why certain sections of the press have lambasted the man since his Bauhaus days for being part Nosferatu, part Bowie clone I don't know.

His may not have been the cosiest of rides, and Dali's Car may have stalled, but in his current reincarnation Murphy flies to the beat of a very dark humour. The man is a near visionary.

Here's a real kick in the eye: during the encore a bouncer

comes onstage and hoicks
Peter up into the air, twirling
him like a human helicopter
blade. The audience take off
with appreciation. Such a
simple move, such a stroke of

genius.

And still the band play on, emanating swirling spheres of hard polished sound, metal bearings for this ball of the thin people, with the power and joy hardly hinted at by Murphy's latest recordings. Blue heart music for warm times, Peter pricks the parts others cannot reach with his sharp little teeth.

POP WILL EAT ITSELF London School Of Economics

DENIM (RIPPED), a discomforting racket and dyslexic pop vision. Bubblegum with razors tucked neatly inside, nasty reality, snarling and gnarled.

Pop Will Eat Itself surprise me most because they exist; the well-intentioned man at the Rough Trade shop led me somewhere else. . "Nah, they're another lump of fiction my son, the figment of a warped NME imagination."

PWEI are the least streamlined concern I've suffered in years, urban magpies, tarred and feathered, de-sexed, ripped and torn and creased and crushed. Slightly cartoon-like, their lucid awkwardness is going to make hearts drip like burst water mains if they continue to hitch the entire hand-me-down hepchat to bruises as sleekly black as this. With a Sharkey quiver, the voice checks itself for chest rash, perforating the general noise irritant happening about him.

Pop Will Eat Itself are about to wage an extraordinary war on something. . . any second now. Their last song revives the ever popular idea of incorporating a message into a song, for instance, and asks, with some zeal: "What's so f***** good, what's so f***** good, what's so good about candy?" I'm shocked and gladdened that someone's wondering about the right things round here. In two lines, they set pop back a lifetime - The Ronettes wore hobnailed boots apparently.

Pop, dainty and maybe depraved, this is for me.

SANDIE SHAW Kentish Town Town And Country Club

"THOSE WHOM the gods love grow young," my Uncle Oscar used to muse, drawing back those olive satin curtains then settling back on the divan of Persian saddle-bags. Sandie looked vestal and left a heroine. Tonight, you think I'm merely jesting, pop was set forward a lavish number of years.

Two watertight moments in, Bacharach's 'Always Something There To Remind Me' astonishes me that such cobwebs can ring with such inner agony, pop's most haunted moment. From there on, Sandie was a long shiver.

Behind her, trooping like Butlins Redcoats, The Joboxers are putting their knuckles in the right places and sufficing . . . but it's alright, Sandie's licking the lolly round here, fresh as paint, making our tickers miss every other beat. She's sensual and scouring, flicking kisses and waving like sudden epilepsy, grooving (yep, grooving) past a scalding 'Girl Don't Come', a singeing 'Frederick', a hastily sexed 'Anyone Who Had A

THE THREE JOHNS/POISON GIRLS/BLYTH POWER Camden Electric Ballroom

HORRORS! SOMEONE has failed to supply the ripplingly endowed Blyth Power with a copy of *The Manner And Rules Of Rock Society* (a weighty but invaluable volume). Whoever the culprit is, they've a lot to answer for. Drums, for instance, are normally placed as far back as possible. Blyth Power, however, stick their drummer – the elfin-like Josef – right at the front, where he sings his heart out and bashes his kit with gusto.

The good thing about this lot is there's so much actually going on. The two backing vocalists are a law unto themselves – unselfconscious playing of invisible guitars and rhythmic rump-wiggling being among their top specialities – and the others are worth looking at simply for their startling musical dexterity.

It's worth explaining that this last observation incorporates Josef and his zany facial spasms... which means that Blyth Power are now a complete entertainment package, breezy punk fun for all the family.

Vi from the Poison Girls walks onstage to big cheers and affectionate smiles. A powerful figure, it seems she's become a surrogate aunt to lots of the crowd who appear to find her every move a revelation. But sadly, Vi's music is excruciating, a plodding mish-mash of toothless anarcho-funk, overlaid by her own grating voice, the 'messages' coming thick and fast – and lacking subtlety, it must be said.

Being popular, the band go down a storm. Each to his or her own, I suppose.

The Three Johns, on the other hand, make pop-in-politics bearable. It's there if you want it. They're too busy showing off their belly buttons to want to ram ideology down your throat.

John Brennan (lean, dark, smouldering bass player) exposes a nipple and stumbles into a mike stand, while frontman Hyatt simply mumbles gibberish. Perhaps they've been drinking, I think to myself.

Three pals, they have this unique understanding. You can sense their unbridled joy, they communicate without words, and it's . . . oh, I don't know . . . nice. A song climaxes, with loud guitars, shrieks and high drama. John Langford, driven into a mad frenzy, smashes up his Andrew Eldritch hat. Gasp.

FEARGAL SHARKEY/ THE BLOW MONKEYS Wembley Stadium REALISTICALLY, FROM the

REALISTICALLY, FROM the mid-to-late '70s, Rod was single-handedly revolutionising the French kiss and the hand up the blouse, with some of the most volcanic bursts of surrender since Motown's euphoric peaks.

While all you frigid lowbrows were supplementing your Clash with your Lurkers, the more intrepid amongst us were spending their evenings getting all ravenous in the backs of Capris, 'Rod Stewart's Greatest Hits' mingling with the consummation of inspired sighs. The sound of The Westway was strictly daytime, only squares stayed in studying Joy Division singles.

So Rod sweeps back, and all the cleverdicks are saying how this is like some wake next to last week's Wham! farewell wave, how the crowd is full of stretch marks and complete with squashy prole doom. When they all sneer at Doctor Robert's snug parody and lap up Feargal's vaudeville tricks, I'm starting to come over all apprehensive.

The Blow Monkeys were the only visible sign of fluctuation for the first three hours, 'Digging Your Scene' moving spear-like through the subsequent Feargal/ELO suave bluff. Sharkey should suffer much unchristian torment until his last breath for his ritual slaughter of Percy's 'When A Man Loves A Woman'; his entire set guillotined his last shred of persuasive gallantry.

The Wogan masses found his diminishing warbling touching and his shoddy showbiz hornswoggle boisterous... the bell-bottomed chin and the famous quiver are plummeting dramatically now.

With Rod, the amoral angel, we suffered all the grinding, hardboiled rock filth for his moments of panting palpitation. Predictably, the superstar bubble - his ego caught in the revolving doors dictated a cumbrous balance. Sadly, some of his most corrosive pieces were crippled accordingly - both 'Maggie May' and 'You Wear It Well' came off like battlescarred marches into Austria, their tutelary spirits dying in beer puddles.

Walls buckle. No air conditioning on the least nippy evening of the year so far. Through the hazy blur everything onstage seems to be swaying back and forth in an alluring, almost sensuous manner. Then it hits me, the bloke who sings with The

Golden Horde is just very tall.

"I feel like I've already lived forever," he smirks, doubtless impressed by his own wisdom. Next to this long-haired geek is a snarling, mega-talented guitarist, who succeeds in looking a dead ringer for Sid Vicious despite a lovable mop of curly brown

The Golden Horde are like a less staid and much less boring Ramones – I could say there's no comparison, but why lie? – with twice the fire and a knack of contrasting their hell-for-leather guitar storms with precise and glittering backing vocals.

After this sizzling madness, The Soup Dragons can only be a let-down and, following an initial bout of euphoric tummy trouble, they do indeed grow sluggish and familiar.

To go from 'Pigs On Purpose' to this is akin to stripping down a tank to build a nippy little

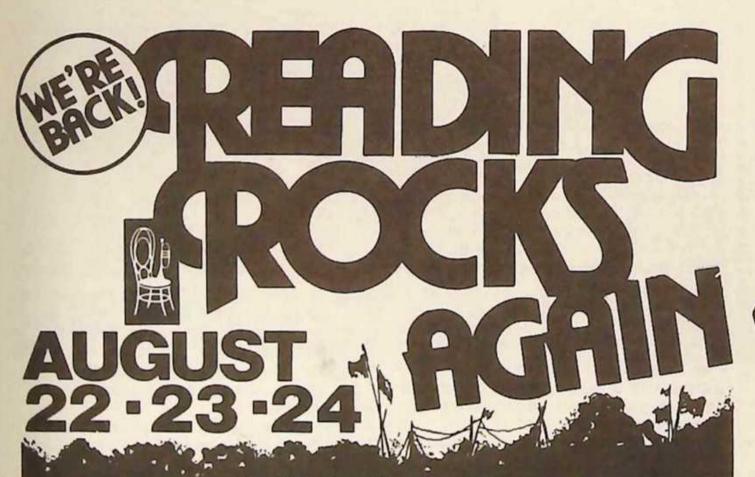
Mini Metro.

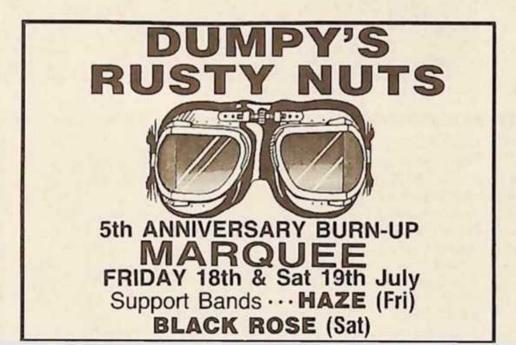

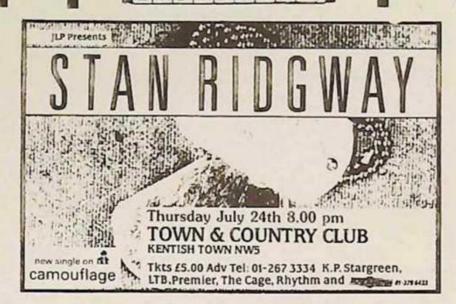

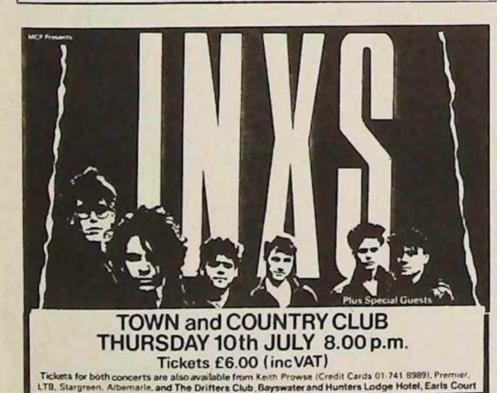

The crowd, wallowing in pissed oblivion, seemed to miss all the subtle deaths. Maybe, like me, they were gritting their teeth for the superior moments. When they came, clamouring renderings of 'You're In My Heart' and 'I Don't Want To Talk About It', I whined along (off-key) with another 65,000 nostalgics, all our memories copulating madly on the

cobblestones.

'D'ya Think I'm Sexy?', meanwhile, masquerades as a supreme slice of high comedy, with Rod – these days about as sexy as a motorway - teasing the last numb, dumb howl out of the gathering.

Disappearing, he swaggered back with The Faces in tow, and anti-climax and awkwardness splashed enthusiastically. Ronnie Lane was helped on, collapsing into a chair stage-centre, to

be patronised like a circus bear juggling milk bottles for a time that seemed endless. Just perched there, with the plucky Wyman filling in on bass, he merely tapped away while the rest systematically dealt fatal blows to 'Twisting The Night Away' and 'Stay With Me'.

Lane kept tapping and 65,000 faces looked miserably uncomfortable; it was the easiest two grand he'd ever made. If you don't see my sympathy

somewhere in there, then you can't look a cripple in the eve.

The Faces, on reflection, should have left history alone, tonight only reminding us that their raw street hymns - together with Mott, the most brilliantly bedraggled British rock from that time - later became an

extravagant parody of farcial order before the 74 implosion finished them. The day belonged to Rod's carnal shanties, their shimmering delight eclipsing the rock hams. The revival was lightning without thunder but our minds were on romance - it was too late to spoil that.

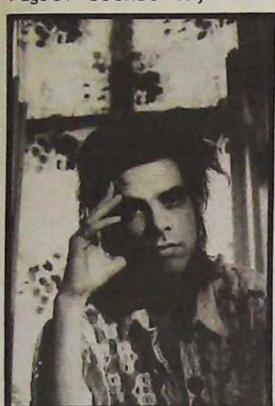

This sudden coherence indicates a great deal of time spent looking for an answer. I suddenly wish I could supply one. The whole situation, it strikes me, is something the man will not eradicate from his heart. Or his soul.

AVE IS WORKING on a book which is long overdue. Well, it's about a year and one month overdue.

But the publisher isn't putting any pressure on.

"I think he's perpetually worried that I'm not going to finish it."

This, to Cave, is cause for restrained humour.

"I mean, when I heard I had to do this interview I just thought, What the f*** am I gonna actually speak about because all I've been doing is this book."

That isn't strictly true. There's an LP, if I can remind you.

"Ah, I've made this record, yes, but one reason it's covers is that it's impossible to write song lyrics at the moment."

The book – And The Ass Saw The Angel ("that's from Numbers, in the Bible") – has become Cave's life. This much is clear from our discussion of religious faiths and the restrained urgency with which the Bible is considered.

Do you worry much?

"Yeah, I'm a big worrier." So I know this is the truth, he searches for another cigarette, finds one, fails to light it, cursingly tries again and again and then succeeds.

Anticipating the line of questioning to come, I guess, he draw deeply on it

How do you stop?

"I can only stop myself by. . . er, plunging into my work, which is the thing that I worry about most, anyway. So while I'm doing it and I'm productive I'm OK, but when – as soon as I'm not doing it, little beads of sweat start to form on my brow."

When Cave does smile, and I didn't want to say this, it still managed to be in an anguished fashion.

"Work is a cure-all for a lot of things. When I'm writing the book I find that days can go past and I've seen no one. And as soon as I become idle, that's when the blue devils start to make themselves known."

Cave grins again, but falls back on his nervous habit of sweeping the bluey-black hair from his face. Several times.

"But I. . . I often wonder about . . . I mean, increasingly wonder about why I'm actually writing this book. Uh, whether it's because I have something that I have to drag out of myself and like externalise or, uhm, whether it's just the fact that it's a license for me to be by myself."

Ruminates for a while.

"It's a book that's growing and growing, and it takes up an increasing number of hours per day, days per week. And I've discovered over the last six months or so that I probably have some problem in terms of cramming my schedule to absolute. . . like. . . well, look, I did this the other day. . ."

He pulls out a shabby personal diary and inside the back flap is taped a slim sheet that unfolds, concertina-like. On it, in cramped green and red ink, is scrawled a mass of detailed times, dates, appointments and work slots, with diagrams. We hunch over it and screw up our eyes.

"See, studio, interviews, book book book, that goes on to here... Not really consciously, but it's making sure there's no free time. I don't know why I do it. But I quite enjoy it that way."

That's OK. Isn't it?

"It's alright for me."

A bit of a chore for other people, I

suppose.

More smoke streamily obscures

the face on the other side of the light bulb.

"For the people who. . . love me. 'Cause they only get a grunt out of me. But I get irritable after about a day if I'm not working. I start to worry."

You get back to the book, then? "Everyone's usually pretty happy when I do."

Do you give affection easily?

"No, but it's not some secret supply I'm keeping stored up just for me.

"I need, I need to give it. But this is getting into fairly touchy areas of my personal life which could end up with me in the doghouse."

In that case, answer this. Is marriage a tribal thing?

"Ooh la la!"

Pretty strange to hear this phrase drawled out in Australian tenor.

"I've never thought of it like that, but you're probably right." (In fact, I only asked because of some vivid sleeve-notes inside 'From Her To Eternity', where bridal veils turn to bloody mourning veils. Why don't you read them? You probably have. It's not fair to drag that up now, though.)

"The last wedding I attended, I was asked in some weak moment . . . uh, whether I would care to sing a couple of songs at the reception. And I . . . said, Why yes. And they wanted me to sing two Elvis Presley numbers, and I thought in my state of mind at the time that that was a good idea."

He pauses with good comic timing for me to prepare a smile.

"I suddenly found myself on stage with this group who played very accurate, standards covers, er singing 'Kentucky Rain' in a funny suit and a bow tie."

Do you think people like you, Nick?

"I can't really allow myself to have the feeling that they don't." OW DO you want to be remembered, if I might ask? Scenting the end he relaxes, leans back to consider the picturerail, still looks dolorous.

"Aah. . . well, as a great, handsome, intelligent, god-like,

Genius?

"Genius. Yeah. Of unearthly influence. As a god. But I would settle for not being remembered as a new wave rock singer. I'd like to eradicate that stigma.

"I'd quite happily – although I'd like to remain involved in music – cross over and be involved with other activities where I wasn't first thought of as being in a group.

"In a way, one of the things I regret most is becoming a rock singer, because then it's impossible to make an artistic statement of your life without it being trivialised. It taints everything. It's such a low occupation."

But are you more comfortable

Cave shrugs, almost smiles.

"I seem so totally at odds with the modern world, sometimes I feel like I'm harping on about things and I wonder who's interested in that anyway, anymore. These days, I feel so alienated that I just see myself as some oddity or novelty that has ceased to be important."

"I pass a million houses but there is no place that I belong/ All I knew to give you was song after song after song/All the truths I tried to tell you were as distant to you as the moon/Born 200 years too late, and 200 years too soon."

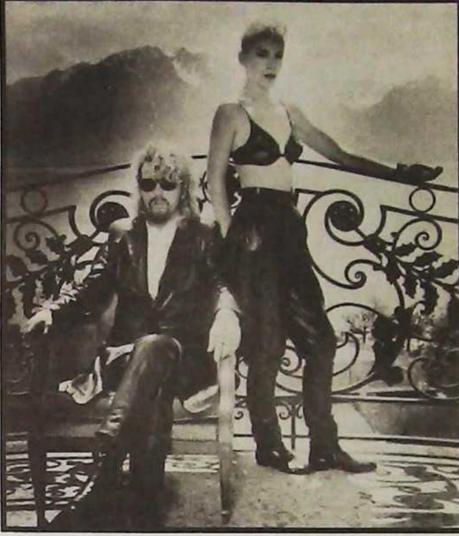

YAMAHA MTIX FOUR-TRACK RECORDER £449 QQQ VVV

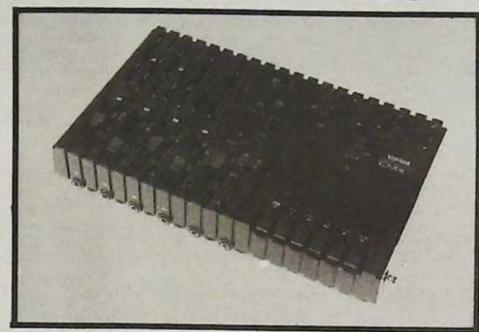
FOR SOME unfathomable reason, a lot of the multitrack cassette recorders l've tried are pigs to use. Maybe I'm just thick, but I've sometimes spent hours puzzling over how to do something apparently simple, and my eventual recourse to the handbook has usually made things worse! So, thank you, Yamaha, for making your new MT1X so straightforward. And thanks even more for producing such a comprehensive vet understandable handbook.

The MT1X is unlike any of Yamaha's previous multitrackers. To start with, it's portable, via an optional battery pack, and mains powered via a plug-in, stepdown adaptor. It's also light in weight and visually very attractive.

In terms of what you can do with it, the MT1X is both versatile and effective. Although it only runs tape at the standard' cassette speed (ie 11/8 ips) the quality of the circuitry and the effectiveness of the dbx noise reduction combine to give an extremely good sound quality - certainly as good as I've got from the Tascam Porta One, the machine which, evidently, the MT1X has been designed to compete with.

In some respects the two rivals measure up spec for

spec. Both offer four-channel mixing facilities (although the Yamaha has the advantage of being able to record all four tracks simultaneously), both use dbx noise reduction, both are 'standard speed' machines and both offer limited eq facilities.

However closely comparable the two machines are though, the Yamaha does provide two important extra features which are certainly worth having; one is the use of bar graph LED metering, the other the presence of a MIDI synch facility via an add-on (optional) MIDI box. MIDI may or may not be useful to you, but the extra ease of use with the LEDs is a definite bonus to everyone.

Operating the Yamaha is very straightforward. Six standard jack sockets line the front edge of the casing, four for inputs, one for the optional punch in/out footswitch and a final one for stereo cans. This provision of just a single headphone outlet is a definite mistake on Yamaha's part, however there really should have been two of them. Assuming twoperson use (one operating the machine, the other singing or playing), both need phones, and, just as importantly, they also need independent level controls.

The rear panel provides your output and aux send/ return linking connections (more than sufficient of them), leaving all the

operating controls well positioned and clearly labelled.

The MT1X will handle line level and mike level signals (a fader allows you to vary the input sensitivity) and the machine has three further faders, two for eq (low and high) and one for channel volume.

All the MT1X's master controls (such as record select, monitor switching, master faders and so on) are sensibly grouped together to the right of the machine, while the monitor pan and level rotaries sit together up above the cassette compartment.

In terms of tapes, any decent CR01 type should do but I standardised on TDK's SA donkey's years ago and definitely got the best results from the Yamaha when I ran it with this formulation.

In use, the Yamaha proved both effective and straightforward. The eq is a bit limited but, against that, the dbx application works better than any other dbx I've heard to date. I wonder why?

It isn't easy to choose between this new Yamaha and the Porta One. In some ways the Tascam feels sturdier and (maybe) a little easier to use but the simultaneous four-channel recording capability is definitely one up to Yamaha, as is the MIDI function particularly for drum machine and sequencer owners.

VESTA KOZO DIG-412 DIGITAL DELAY £513 **QQQ VVV**

SHIINO VESTA Fire have a solid reputation for well thought-out, decent quality, competitively priced signal processors, and their latest digital delay undoubtedly continues that tradition.

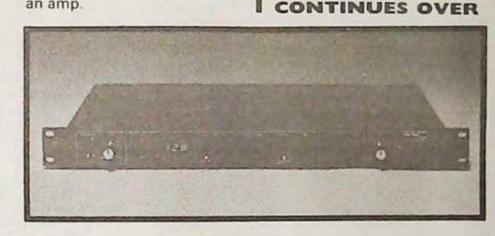
A MIDI-programmable unit with 1024 msec of very usable delay for just £513 certainly has to be worth investigating. And investigating this one is an extremely straightforward and rewarding operation.

Coming in a standard 1u rackmount black metal case, the DIG-412 uses a mixture of analogue and digital access control in a way that ensures virtually instant familiarisation. For a quick test, all you need do is plug an instrument into the single rear input jack and take an out from the 'mix' socket to an amp.

With mains power on, you then adjust the left hand instrument level knob until the four-segment bar LED indicator shows the best signal-to-noise ratio, set the other knob on the right hand side to a sensible output level, check that you're in 'manual' rather than 'program' mode (indicated by red and green LEDs above and below the manual/ program button) and away you go.

There are seven parameters to play with, each accessed by a clearly labelled and LED'd button. When first switched on, the unit defaults to the first parameter - delay time - and the time set will be indicated in the sevensegment LED window (which also acts as a 'power on' indicator).

Delay time can now be varied between 0 and 1024 msec using the up/down buttons to the left of the



YOU GOTTA SAY YES TO APRS

EEN NO doubt to emulate I The revitalised British Music Fair, this year's APRS show (dedicated to studio gear from £200,000 computer controlled mixing desks to 50p replacement bulbs for VU meters) was held, sweatily, at London's Olympia 2. With the said BMF to be held at this otherwise excellent venue in a month's time, I hope some form of air conditioning can be wheeled into action.

The APRS show is a funny old do. Some swear by it; many swear at it. But even if many stands featured equipment just too ridiculously specific and technical to merit a linger, invariably you bump into the odd microphone, speaker, signal processor or device that makes the schlepp worthwhile.

First stop inside the door was the HHB stand. This highprofile hire and sales company of course scored a notable success by convincing Messrs Sony that their PCM F1 and PCM 701 machines were eminently suitable for low cost digital mastering, and have gone on to sell the units (plus noteworthy additional items such as the CLUE computerbased editing package) to pretty well every selfrespecting studio in the land.

Although the system has been based around Betamax to date, HHB have modified Sony's EV-C8 portable Video 8 cassette recorder, allowing it to be used with the PCM F1 as well. With the current question mark hanging over continued availability of Betamax tapes in the UK, this seems a wise move. It should be said however that HHB are still totally confident of Betamax's profile over here and lost no time in thrusting a catalogue full of new Beta machines under my nose to prove it.

MIDI - already an almost standard implementation for all signal processors - is finally finding its way onto a number of mid-priced mixers: AHB showed the Keymix range - where MIDI is represented on a valuable additional control unit that can be hooked up to the system's rackmount mixing system - as well as their MIDI-able CMC desks. And Akai showed their new MPX820 eight-channel rackmount mixer.

Alongside the MPX820, Akai also previewed several new multitrack recorders: the MG1214 - very similar to the popular MG1212 aside from additional SMPTE possibilities; the MG14D, a rackmount recording module (for which you will still require a mixing desk) which once again employs Akai's own MK20 half inch tape; and finally a personal multitrack system using standard chrome cassettes, the MG614. This last item is priced a little above most of its ilk but seems way above the competition in terms of control - four-track playback plus six additional channel inputs, sync track, parametric EQ, XLR input options, and computer-aided channel/track selector.

Apart from appearances by Akai, Roland - with their MPS software, and new (I wanna get my hands on it now) sequencer MC500, and Yamaha - attempting to repel yet more orders for their runaway success of the year, the SPX90 multi effects processor - the APRS is brim full of British manufacturers who seem to lead the world in several pro audio

departments.

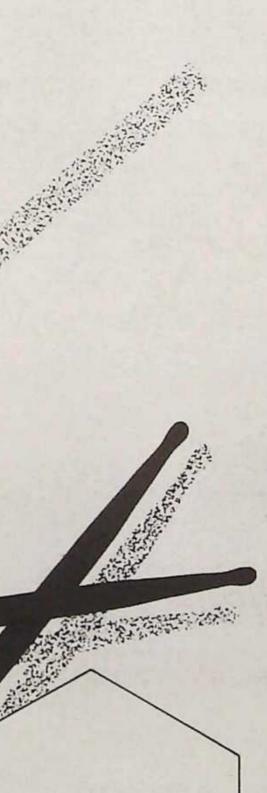
At or near the top, nowever you look at it, must be the Oxfordshire based Solid State Logic whose megapound computerised mixing desks are simply de rigeur for the world's leading studios. But there's also Trident, who launched their Di-An digitally controlled analog desk (beautifully hi-tech with strip screens running along the entire length of the console).

British companies have long been renowned for speaker manufacture and one of the Quested range even had the honour of being used in Yamaha's private and airconditioned (that's how to get 'em in) booth. Price and size differences notwithstanding, they saw the NS10Ms off without any problem.

And as for signal processors, well take your pick: AMS must surely be represented in every studio around the world. On show was the high, high class RMX 16 digital reverb, DMX 15-80S dual channel delay, which with the Loop Editing System (LES) in tow can be triggered by a keyboard. And coming down to earth a bit, Drawmer were showing their highly imaginative Midman - a-toocomplex-to-take-in-at-thetime MIDI management rackmount unit for assigning keyboard splits, data filtering, triggering, and all manner of MIDI goodies.

Although the APRS is a non-ticket, professionals-only show, the steady increase in reasonably quality home studio set-ups does mean that many more people are qualified to - and should take note of this chance to - gawp at the gadgetry. Make a date with it for next year if you missed it this time.

TECZON DUB 4 X 4 PERSONAL **MULTITRACKER £428** QQ1/2 VV1/2

THE CHUNKY little Teczon four-track cassette recorder is a neat, compact, clear, and unpretentious personal multitrack machine made by the Japanese Toyo Gakki Co, which is aimed, unashamedly, at the Tascam Porta One market. Certainly, it can do a few 'things that the competition can't' (record on four tracks simultaneously for starters) and yet there are some limitations which prevent me from pronouncing this a total winner.

While no one would deny that the arrival, some years ago, of low-cost multitrack recorders has been anything but a complete success (for manufacturers and public alike), it never ceases to amaze me that the procedure for operating most of these machines is considerably more complex than those of, say, a 16-track system based around the Fostex B-16.

However the Teczon has been designed quite straightforwardly and is as near as you'll get to foolproof.

The basics: this is a genuine four-track machine in that you can record on all tracks simultaneously. Each track sports a nicely angled VU meter, trim control, high/ low EQ, panpot, track selector, input switch, record punch-in button, and a rotary controlled fader. At the back you'll find four phono line in/outs (for effects or direct outputs to another mixer) as well as stereo master outputs - also phonos.

On the master side of things you have slider operated master faders, headphones level control, a master punch out button, cue/normal button, switchable Dolby C noise reduction and a ± 15 per cent pitch control.

Finally the tape controls include a three digit tape counter, auto zero button, and standard operational controls of fast forward, rewind, record, play, stop,

and pause.

In its (successful) attempt to save space, the Teczon uses rotary controls for track faders. While this may not be detrimental to any final results, I must say that, well, it just feels wrong. Having said that though, they work smoothly and evenly, which

is more than you can say for the master faders which manage to be both stiff and wobbly. Smooth fades are not going to be easy.

This is my only real gripe on the recording side though; the remainder of the controls are well placed, spaced, and most vitally comprehensible.

The angled VU meters give the Teczon a reasonably professional look (although they are not illuminated) and the dedicated track select switch eases the business of bouncing tracks considerably.

Another very useful inclusion is a big bright red punch-in button situated just above each track fader. OK, it isn't lightning quick (or maybe it's just that I wasn't), but being able to 'stab' a track into record, especially when you're on your own, is a feature definitely worth having. As for punch-out, this is via a master control - a similar big red push button beneath the master faders.

Line Ins for instruments or microphones are standard 1/4 inch jacks placed on the front edge of the machine. When it comes to patching external effects, this is strictly a track by track affair using the phonos at the back, and with no on-board provision for governing effects levels etc.

The cassette operations are straightforward, though the machine has no eject mechanism - which accompanying pictures make claim to. The auto zero is always a useful feature.

Although the technical specifications make impressive reading (30Hz to 15kHz frequency response etc), recording on any such machine is not going to produce master quality. Certainly I managed to record reasonably clean sounds with adequate separation. The general level of noise is not prohibitive but even so I found myself employing the Dolby C more often than not.

Whether the Teczon, or UK distributors John Hornby Skewes, have the muscle to make serious inroads into territory long established by the likes of Tascam, Fostex, and Yamaha is another matter, but this fairly priced multicracker deserves considerable praise for being simple to operate and well designed. The machine can be battery-operated with only the additional cost of batteries (no battery pack etc), and is sufficiently rugged to make it good for carting around on tour.

window. Incremental changes are effected simply by tapping the buttons, highspeed changes by holding either button down.

If you're running program material through the unit when you make changes, the output automatically reverts to the 'dry' signal as long as your finger is on the button. When you hold the button down, there's also about one second's delay before the numbers begin to change at speed, which gives you time to change your mind! There's a similar delay before the unit effects the new setting after

you've released the button.

You can skate through all the parameters like this. You have feedback, rate, depth, phase, delay volume and dry volume, all of which offer variations of 0-31 except phase, which is a simple 0-1 (plus-minus) option.

For guidance, at the back of the simple and well-written manual are a number of sample settings including, most importantly, those for modulation effects, ie doubling, chorus and flanging. You can set these up as suggested, play around with them if you want to, note other setting in the spaces provided and, every time you find one you like, write it into the unit's memory.

To do this, you simply switch from manual to program, hold down the 'write' button (which causes the LED window display to flash) and enter the required values. There are 128 programs to fill up - more than enough to match the program memories of most keyboards - and this is where MIDI comes in.

The DIG-412 has MIDI IN and THRU sockets at the back, and using these with a MIDI instrument, you can alter the programmes from the instrument. When the unit is in program mode, the delay time button also functions as a MIDI channel selector.

The Vesta Kozo also comes with a hold button which turns the unit into a simple sampler. Any delayed signal over 257msec can be captured and repeated ad infinitum while you continue to play over the top of it if you wish. An effect cancel button completes the array.

Round at the back, however, you'll find two footswitch sockets which

allow remote bypassing of the effects circuit and remote initiation of hold - a very useful facility since you don't generally have a third hand available to activate hold at precisely the right moment when playing live!

The rear panel array is completed by fuse holder and output level attenuator switch with +4 or -20dB options.

The DIG-412 is a high quality digital delay (20Hz-20Hz frequency response on dry, 20Hz-15kHz on delay, no perceptible noise) which offers various state-of-the-art functions in an easily

understandable, quickly masterable manner. Its MIDI facility makes it especially attractive to users of MIDI keyboards, drum machines and the like, but its range and quality of effects undoubtedly make it highly attractive for non-MIDI recording operations or simple instrument processing, eg chorus etc for guitar.

Since everything is progressing MIDI-wards, it certainly makes sense to consider the MIDIable Vesta Kozo DIG-412 if you're in the market for a DDL.

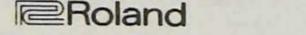
