SPECIAL PROVISION should be made near Stonehenge for a festival site to prevent a recurrence of 1985 and 1986 conflicts, says the National Council For Civil Liberties.

In a 40-page booklet published last week, which closely examines the abortive attempts to stage a Stonehenge Festival over the last couple of years, the Council calls on the Government to "resolve this clash of interests through peaceful means rather than characterising it as a law and order issue".

It criticises the authorities for leaving the police to deal with the problems that arose because of their refusal to provide a festival site.

The report details several instances of police blocking the road in front of convoys en route to Stonehenge, and then arresting the travellers for obstruction. Detentions of up to 18 hours preceded appearances before a magistrates court, where wide-ranging bail conditions were imposed. In most cases the charges were subsequently dropped.

The council points out that local authorities have a duty to provide adequate sites for "people having a nomadic lifestyle" under the 1968 Caravan Sites Act, but very few have done so.

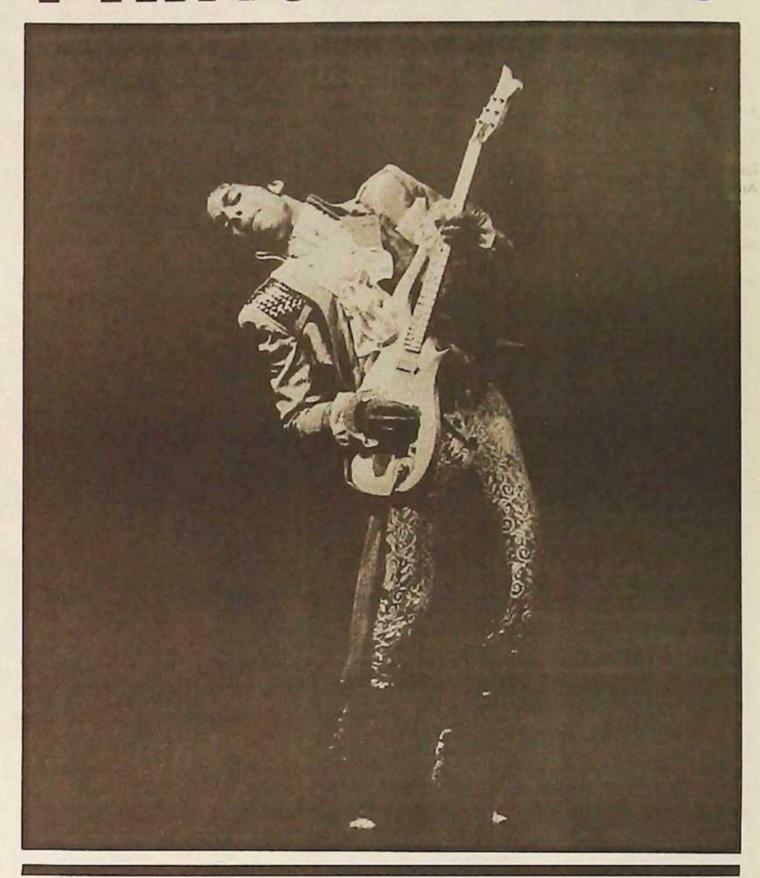
The NCCL also wants trespass actions made easier so that innocent people like Farmer Attwell, who suddenly found his farmland invaded by 300 travellers, are able to get them evicted.

And the police should be made fully accountable to elected representatives for their policing, priorities, policies and methods, recommends the report.

Two new record superstores open in London's West End. And, as record companies put the squeeze on shops nationwide, retailers retaliate by stocking chart singles only

AS THE major record stores hot up their commercial rivalry to attract customers, they are locked in battle with the big record companies over tighter

restrictions on discounts and returns.

CBS led the way in abolishing settlement discounts and lowering the sale-orreturn allowance last month. Polygram and EMI have already followed suit and the other major labels are expected to adopt the same terms shortly.

This has bitten into the chain stores' profit margins at a time when they can ill afford it. HMV have just unveiled plans to usurp the Virgin Megastore's "biggest record store in the world" claim with

an even bigger store only a hundred yards down the road in Oxford Walk, which will open in October.

And there's now an additional American challenge from Tower Records, who have just opened a massive store in Piccadilly Circus.

The first retaliation to the record companies' actions has come from the Our Price chain which is now only stocking Top 40 singles.

This could have serious implications on the charts if the retaliation spreads - and Our

Price is part of the WH Smith Music Mart chain - as it will become increasingly difficult for record companies to break new bands if shops only stock chart singles.

But the independent shops could benefit as a result of the record companies' actions, which remove an advantage that the major stores previously enjoyed over them. Now the indie shops will be able to compete on hit album prices and attract more customers while continuing to promote indie bands.

Reliable sources state that next month will see Prince And The Revolution play in Britain, but dates have not yet been confirmed

PRINCE is scheduled to play three nights at Wembley Arena in

The dates are those postponed from an earlier proposed European tour, which was cancelled because of threats against Americans by Libyan terrorists.

The diminutive Minneapolis wonderkid will kick off his latest round of shows with concerts in his home town and in New York. before moving on to Europe.

Unconfirmed dates for his British appearances are August 12, 13

The announcement of the shows is believed to have been delayed for as long as possible because of Prince's previous history of UK cancellations. At least three proposed British visits have been cancelled since his only previous UK appearance - at London's Lyceum in spring, 1981. This is reportedly why his record label Warner Brothers had still not released the story at press time.

The Wembley shows will serve as an appetiser for Prince's second movie, Under The Cherry Moon, which will probably reach British cinemas in the autumn - around seven months after the release of the soundtrack album 'Parade'.

The film has just opened in New York to mixed reviews, and there were rumours that Warners were less than confident about its chances of repeating the success of Purple Rain.

Filmed in black and white in the South of France, it can best be described as a light romantic comedy of the kind made by Hollywood in the 1930s. It stars Prince and ex-Time sidekick Jerome Benton as a couple of adventurers in the lovable rogue mould, and sees them both competing for the affections of a young English heiress, against the wishes of her villainous daddy.

Though not a musical in the traditional sense, the movie does feature a couple of performances by Prince in the role of Christopher Tracy - one at the piano and the other on top of it and a sort of heavenly finale-cum-promo-video with all of The Revolution, which takes place beneath the final credits after Chris has been shot and (presumably) gone to the big piano store in the sky.

Fans wanting tickets for Wembley should note that ticket details have not yet been announced. The Arena box office is not yet able to confirm the dates, but it has confirmed to Sounds that no other concerts have been arranged for the three nights in question.

TYNE TEES Television has broken ranks from the rest of the ITV companies and agreed to pay for videos used on its pop shows.

The BBC has already signed a £150,000 deal to screen videos over the next year, and Tyne Tees will be playing a proportional sum. But the rest of the ITV companies have so far refused to accept the principle of paying for rock videos previously supplied free by record companies.

It seems unlikely that they can ignore the principle for much longer, and several more companies are now thought to be in negotiation.

OWEN PAUL, who's found plenty of room in the Top Ten for his 'My Favourite Waste Of Time' single, has lined up his first British tour for November. By then he'll have his debut album out on Epic. There's also a new single coming next month called 'Pleased To Meet You'.

The gigs start at Dublin SFX November 4 and continue at Belfast Ulster Hall 5, Newcastle City Hall 9, Manchester Apollo 11, Birmingham Odeon 12, Leeds University 15, Bristol Studio 16, Portsmouth Guildhall 17, Hammersmith Odeon 19, Hammersmith Palais 20.

THE BILL BRUFORD QUARTET follow a Japanese tour with their first British concerts at the beginning of next month.

SECRET SPUTNIK!

Tony James explains why SSS have blown out their British tour

SIGUE SIGUE SPUTNIK last week cancelled the remaining dates on their British tour.

Their only official British gig is now at London's Royal Albert Hall on October 13, although they will be playing a number of "secret" gigs over the next few weeks.

But leader Tony James defiantly denied to Sounds that poor advance ticket sales were to blame for the cancellation.

"Advance ticket sales for our last tour were no better and we still sold out," he declared. "And our agency told me we'd still sell out, but I decided that these were the wrong kind of shows for us to be doing.

"I'd had a bad feeling about the tour since it was first put to us by the record company and the agency," he explained. "They wanted us to promote the album and said that this tour was the next logical step.

"What brought it all to a head was an interview I was giving to an American journalist. He was asking us about our show and I was explaining that it's an event as much as a show. It's the freeform projection of our five personalities with a raw rock and roll that interacts with the audience.

"Then he asked about the tour and I suddenly realised that the tour was going back on everything I'd just been talking about. Everybody's been talking about how we've got to put on this big show with a special backdrop and all that kind of thing. But we don't make shows like that. We're not some heavy metal band with dungeons and dragons all over the stage.

"Finally, I started thinking that if I was a Sigue Sigue Sputnik fan, I wouldn't pay to sit down and watch them at Birmingham Odeon. So now I'm holding up my hands and saying. Yes, we made a mistake. This is not what Sputnik are about. And so we've done something about it.

"So now we'll be playing the Royal Albert Hall

and a major show in the Midlands, using a wall of digital screens so that we can show different videos simultaneously. It'll cost a fortune but that's what it has to be - we can't use some dopey old backdrop.

"But before that we'll be playing a series of secret gigs at smaller places where we can just play without needing any of the other paraphernalia. We'll be keeping them secret because it's more fun if it's under another name it makes it a bit special. But all our fans will know

Tony James also admitted that stories in the tabloid press about the band had hurt them.

"All these stories about us splitting up and only miming on stage are complete fabrications. It's almost as if there's a vendetta against us. And it got to the point where we were starting to play their game. We pulled out of The Tube recently because although every other band was using tapes, we'd have got slagged for it."

But he did admit the band had deliberately set out to provoke extreme reactions. "I've always said that a group must be loved or hated. Indifference is nothing. It's just that the myth is in danger of turning into a Frankenstein."

Fans looking to check out the first "secret" show in London could start by following up an advertisement which appeared in Sounds last

Illustrated with a picture of Jayne Mansfield in a bikini, it states that "\$ci-Fi \$ex \$tars" will be playing Camden Palace on July 31.

Although it doesn't take an enormous IQ to work out the identity of the band from this ad, so-called "secret gigs" do have the important advantage that if they don't sell out, the "secrecy" of the event can always be blamed.

And there is a world of difference between selling out a ballroom, where promoters always expect a large "walk-up" on the night, and selling out a seated venue where most tickets are normally sold in advance.

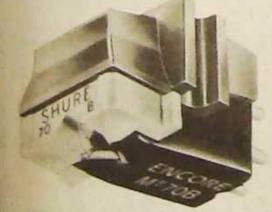

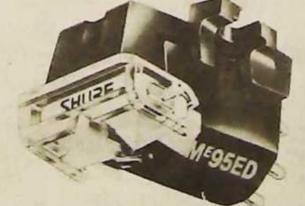

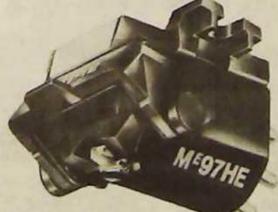

BO DIDDLEY, John Martyn and Kate & Anna McGarrigle are among the acts lined up at this year's Cambridge Folk Festival from August 1-3.

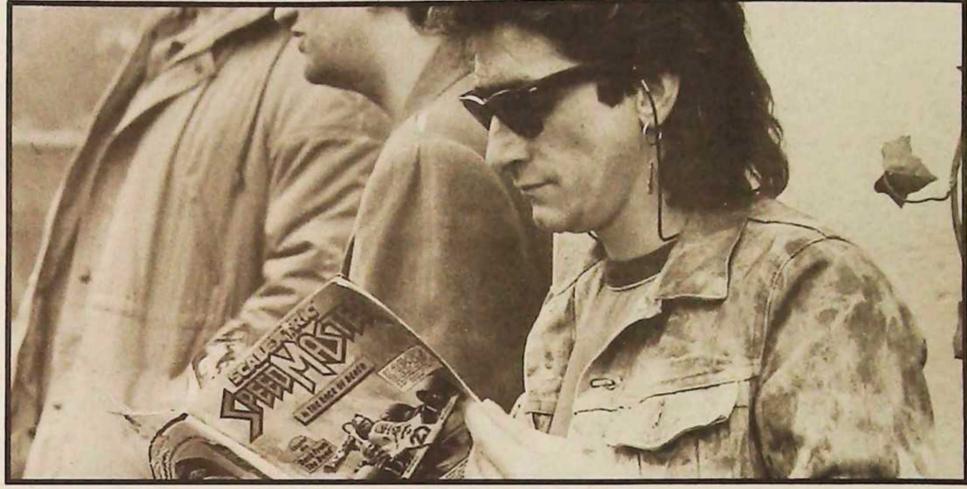

There's also an album coming shortly, titled simply 'Gary Holton'.

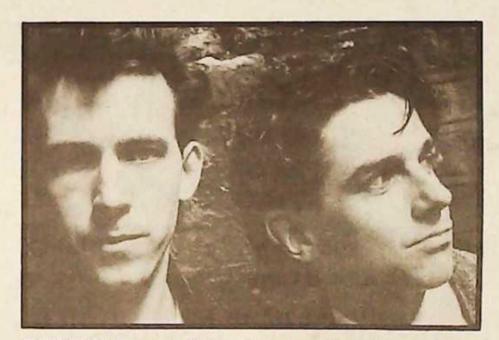

And fancy thinking that just by cantering on up to Sounds Towers, we'd give you an interview. I mean, you didn't even have an appointment!

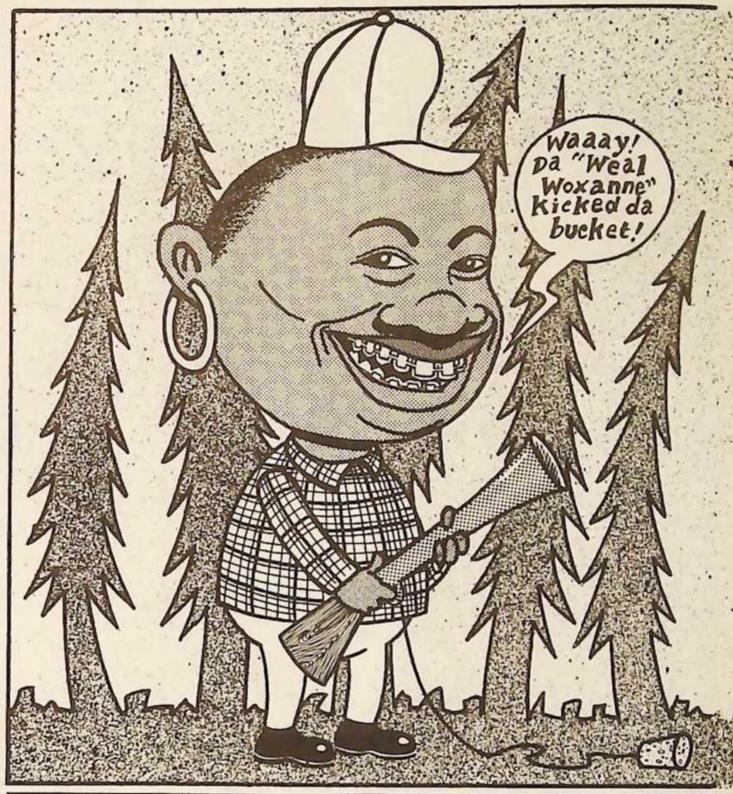

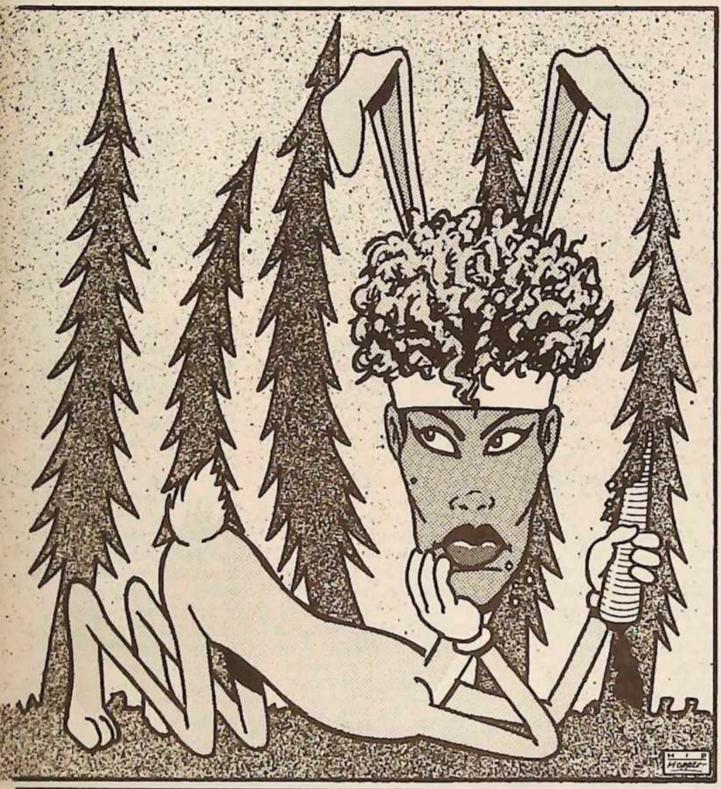

anyone who gets within ten foot of the man (bodyguards excluded).

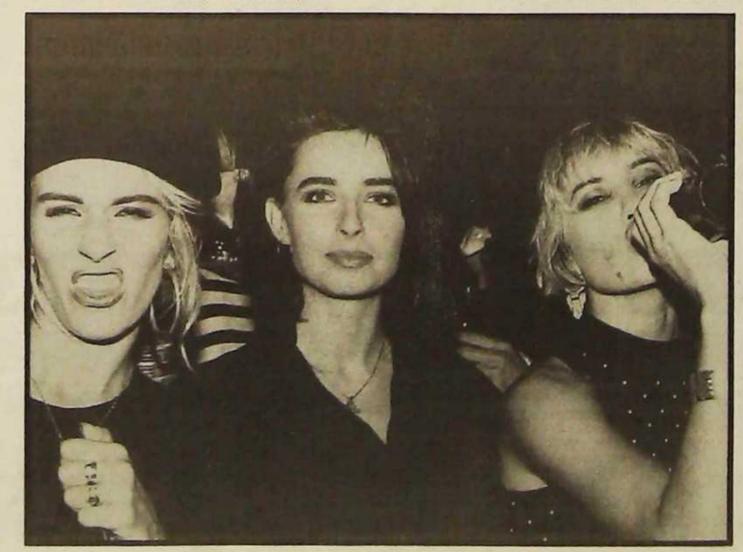

WELL RED (A Quarterly Pop And Politics Magazine From Red Wedge) 50p

SO HERE it is: the rather obviously titled print organ of the Wedgies, whose guiding philosophy is The World Of Arts For A World Of Difference. The idea of this glossy-fronted, cleanly laid out mag is not simply to deal with pop culture's relationship to the political process but to underscore that Red Wedge is "for but not of the Labour Party".

Personally I find this distinction to be so fine as to be virtually non-existent. In his editorial, which sets the tone for the publication, Red Reg says: "While we actively encourage people to vote Labour, we recognise the party's shortfalls and past mistakes, and we will do our bit to see that when elected, on youth issues at least, they will not be given the chance to repeat these errors."

This promise seems to me not only arrogant but totally unrealistic given the experience of those such as Tony Benn who've been battling for a more radical Labour Party for years. Still, these differences aside, Well Red is still worth a gander.

In it you will find an extremely shallow analysis of the history of political dance music (the '60s soul branch of America in Part 1), while Tony Fletcher, ex-editor of Jamming, offers a fairly astute article on the American bombing of Libya. Elsewhere Dr Robert, Karl out of Madness and SOGAT's Brenda Dean are interviewed while think pieces on nukes and Greenpeace and the role of women in the Labour Party feature strongly. (The role of men next issue, eh? - Section Ed.)

Aside from ideological differences, what lets the issue down for me is the lack of humour in Well Red. Still, when the biggest laugh around is the Labour Party itself, one wouldn't expect anything else.

INSIDE EUROPE'S largest Indoor fairground the Funhouse is wearing a sad face. The Superjet soars with its ione passenger while, over by the Wonder Waltzer, a ticket seller dozes off.

Along the promenade, the surface of Britain's biggest open-air pool lies undisturbed in the biazing June heatwave. A solitary chip paper blows zig-zag up the street. Who killed New Brighton? Jegsy Dodd And The Sons Of Harry Cross would like to know.

'Winebars And Werewolves' must be the most ignored brilliant album of recent times. . . honest. A powerful boot up the backside of downtown Birkenhead that leaves an impression long after you've scuttled back over the ferry to romantic, if equally depressed, Liverpool. Great slabs of beat-bounced prose trample the theory that the Wirral is the posh side of Murky(sic)side.

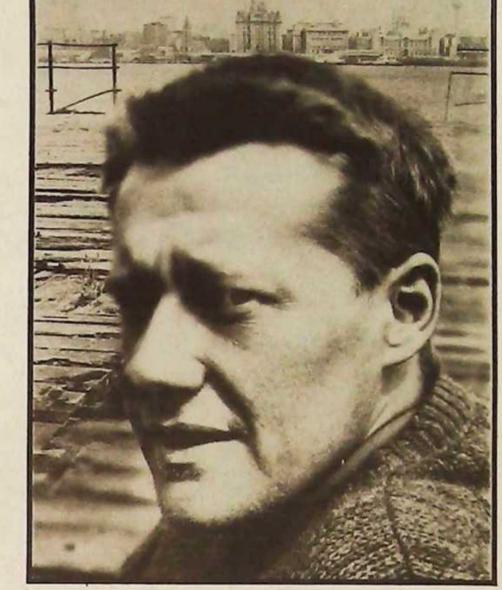
Ken 'Hippy' Hancock knocks up the tunes, but Jegs is the man with the mouth that has plenty to say. Try stopping him.

"Everyone mentions Liverpool, but not the Wirral, so I'm here to correct the imbalance. Hillview Heights was in Morton – smack city – and everyone was on it; pub tollets were full of silver paper. The 'bizzles' did nothing for three years and then went bananas busting everyone.

"Now, Birkenhead is the end, it really is, the demise of the British way of life in a nutshell. There's the Tip People scurrying over the flith as the bin lorries are emptied, searching for pram wheels, old kettles, anything. It's like a third world country, scavenging.

"Local issues matter, but
I try to weave biting
comedy into serious
concerns. 'Grab A Granny'
is about mates who cop
off with old tarts at
singles nights – "come
'ome an' play a tune on me
varicose veins" – very sad.
Then there's 'Always The
Barmaid, Never The Bride',
about the 'pool."

"I've been accused of being directionless, puerile and lazy for varying the music too much. But I don't want the corporate sound of, say, the Bunnymen, ten reggae beats or ten punk thrashes. That's no

challenge.

"Everything in the indie world revolves around John Peel. There's no one he endorses that doesn't make a splash in the indie chart pool. What he says is law. He says I've lost some edge by adding music to me poems, yet strangely enough it was during one of his sessions that it was first suggested to me.

"I hate professional
Scousers like Jimmy
Tarbuck and Cilia Black
who go on about the place
yet live in the Home
Countles. The only match
Tarby goes to is the Cup

Final. I go everywhere with Liverpool, five Euro finals and never even had a ticket. I always get in, though, and it's the same with me poetry – If you're determind enough, you succeed.

"Being likened to John Cooper-Clarke is a pain. Seeing him made me want to get up and do it better but he's gone to pieces, off his cake. I'm ambitious to develop – it's OK for people to say I'm novel and shouldn't change but, in the real world, £50 a week isn't living."

BEFORE COMPLETING the Slade listing, I'd like to give those credits which went missing last week. Particular thanks for tracking down a lot of detail go to Rob Newman of Halesowen, West Midlands, and Ian Champney of Poole, Dorset; for the bulk of what follows on the group this week, I'm also largely indebted to these two.

The singles listing in the last column wound up in mid-1980 with the six-track 12-incher of Six Of The Best Records. This, of course, was a one-off, and Slade re-emerged in the early autumn of that year in a new label deal with Cheapskate Records. Singles on the label were as follows:

a new pic sleeve. It was similarly
repromoted (and re-charted) in 1981,
'82, '83 and '84. The single also went
over the one million UK sales mark in
the early 1980s, making it easily Slade's
all-time biggest seller.

The first interruption came in

December 1981, when as well as repromoting 'Merry Xmas Everybody' (which reached 32 in the charts), Polydor issued a four-track 12-inch-only

POSPX 399 'Cum On Feel The Noize'/'Cos I Luv You'/'Take Me Back 'Ome'/'Gudbye T'Jane' (pic sleeve) Dec

This 12-inch EP was issued again at the end of 1983, but this time there was also a three-track 7-inch equivalent (POSP 399), omitting 'Cos I Luv You'.

RCA singles continued: RCA 191 'Ruby Red'/'Funk, Punk And Junk' (gatefold pic sleeve) Mar 1982

This was marketed as a double 7-inch pack, the other half of the gatefold containing a disc with live versions of 'Rock' 'N' Roll Preacher' and 'Take Me Back' 'Ome'.

RCA 291 '(And Now The Waltz) C'est La Vie'/'Merry Xmas Everybody (Live And Kickin)' (pic sleeve) Nov 1982

This live RCA version of 'Merry Xmas' was credited to Slade & The Assorted Nutters Cholr. At this point, there was another interruption to the normal RCA release run, when a 7-inch picture disc

(only) appeared by Slade on the Speed label, operated by Jimmy Lea's brother

SPEED P 201 'Okey Cokey'/'Get Down And Get With It' Dec 1982. RCA singles continued:

RCA 373 'My Oh My'/'Keep Your Hands Off My Power Supply' (pic sleeve) Nov 1983

A limited 7-inch run of the above (presumably designed as a marketing tool for chart shops) also appeared with an additional track, the previous year's re-cut of 'Merry Xmas Everybody'. Catalogue number remained the same. There was also a 12-inch release (RCAT 373), which didn't have 'Xmas' but did carry the extra track 'Don't Tame A Hurricane'.

RCA 385 'Run Runaway'/'Two-Track Stereo, One-Track Mind' (pic sleeve) Jan 1984 (also on 12-inch as RCAT 385; same tracks).

RCA 455 'All Join Hands'/'Here's To...' (Pic sleeve) Nov 1984

The 12-inch version of this was RCAT 455, with the same tracks. However, once again a limited pressing was made to boost the record through chart shops; a 12-inch with the same catalogue

VENICE IN PERIL



THE MISSION'S Craig, Simon, Wayne and Mick: just one Cornetto . . .

Deaf in Venice? Or just blind drunk? MR SPENCER discovers that nobody's safe when those party animals from THE MISSION hit the Chianti trail. MARTYN STRICKLAND grabs a pizza the action SATURDAY afternoon in Italy, and the sun beats down on a fast-moving van with a lump of wood where a back window should be.

We're on the road with The Mission – Wayne, Craig, Mick and Simon. It could get a bit wild, but that suits me just fine.

I feel different reckless, grubby, carsick. The door is wide open, and we're living dangerously.

On the road with The Mission is an exercise in classic me! me! me! rock 'n' roll copy.

It's a tale of headwear and souvenir gondolas, a shameless exercise in selfindulgent I Was There pop scribbling, the traditional travelogue of crazy traffic pile-ups and all expenses paid mass murder.

Too good to be true.

The reason for my being here is clear enough; the band are playing all over Europe, interest is high, and their achingly erotic, grandiose and *happy* sounding second single, 'Garden Of Delight', has just been released on Chapter 22 records.

And yes, The Mission have signed to a major label, Phonogram, a deal arriving hot on the heels of chart-topping indie success with their debut single, 'Serpent's Kiss'.

All this, and it's only a matter of months since all sorts of legal tussling erupted between Wayne and Craig and their excomrade from Sisters Of Mercy days, Andrew Eldritch. Eldritch is going to face quite a struggle when he eventually tries to steal back some of the thunder so cheekily whipped from underneath his nose by these Mission boys.

Tonight, the group are supposed to be performing at the Campo Sportivo football club in Mira, or possibly the Sportivo Mira football club in Campo, or possibly ... well, really I haven't got a clue. You've never been there but, take it from me, it's miles away.

We arrive at the foreign-sounding soccer ground to find that both the stage and pitch have been rendered useless by a freak rainstorm.

Still, we raid the fridge and drive back to

the hotel, where Wayne and Craig put on a Jimi Hendrix tape and push the volume up high.

I consider expressing concern for the occupants of the adjoining rooms but decide against it, reasoning that to do so might seem a bit lame.

Wayne plonks his feet on the bed without taking his shoes off. Quite masterful. I crack open an iced drink and place the ring-pull on the carpet. I don't pick it up.

Outside, the rain is coming down in buckets.

"HATE to admit it, but I think I'm mellowing," whispers the horizontal Wayne. "I mean, I still like to stay up at night, and I still love to drink, but I don't do some of the crazy things I used to get up to with the Sisters. I haven't trashed a room for a while — that is something I did enjoy."

Does the singer have to strike a fine balance between couldn't-give-a-toss drunkenness and cool, calculated business sense?

"The thing to do is to know when to be indulging in one or the other. It's like before we play live, there's a point I try to reach every night, and it's absolute joy, but beyond that I fall over. It's a very thin line."

Hours later, we hit the road again, to catch a glimpse of nearby Venice in all its glittering, after-dark splendour. At Piazza St Marco (this is what it says in my plastic 'clicker' camera), the band are studying the architecture when a bunch of chunky US marines lurch over in white socks and shorts, pointing and yelling, apparently taking the piss.

I think to myself, Blimey, we're all going to die. But, as it happens, a big ape with hairy legs bumbles over and shouts into my ear: "Hell, man! It's been so long since I last heard a good band jam. England's put out some great fun acts, The Pink Floyd, they're the best, but it's good to see this shit, it's great to see a band that says, F*** it all!"

Soon, Wayne and I (me! me! me!) will laugh about this over a toasted cheese sandwich. But first, we take in the sights, catch the water-bus to the van and drive back again.

Next morning, fun-loving Mick is sat in reception with a croissant and a nice cup of tea; tatty-jeaned Simon is enjoying a coffee. Wayne and Craig are already on the hard stuff.

We hear that the previous night's abandoned show had attracted people from all over Italy. Whether this should make us happy or sad is uncertain.

Just as a matter of interest, Wayne keeps on having trouble with his teeth, or one tooth in particular. Half of it fell out not long ago. He was biting into this Mars bar and he thought, This Mars bar's a bit hard.

But anyway, he hates injections, only brushes his teeth once every two days, and is not going to let major dental problems spoil his fun on the road with The Mission.

"It's great going to all these places and getting treated well," he enthuses. "All this free drink and food..."

We stroll outside into the now baking sunshine, sit down and consume yet more food and drink. Wayne selects a cool beer, while I go for something a touch fizzier.

T'S FUNNY, actually, the way groups like Red Lorry Yellow Lorry (whence Mick originates) and The Mission – both of whom are reviled in their homeland – can actually be regarded as 'hip' and 'with it' and 'street cred' on the Continent.

"We're very much an '80s band," Wayne muses. "I mean, I'd like our records to be a mixture of Led Zeppelin, Madonna, Prince, the Sisters... everything that's ever been good in music, and not just in rock, but pop music too. That 'Like A Virgin' album, it's my most played record at the moment, it's just so happy; plus she's so filthy as well..."

Your kinda gal, right?

"Yeah. Actually, I went to see her in New York with Andrew last summer. It was just so tacky, it was great."

Wayne's current favourite pop single is Bananarama's 'Venus'. His fave Bananarama is Keren (it used to be Siobhan).

I wonder, does he admire the Italian lifestyle?

"What, sleeping in the afternoons?"

No, riding in formation on motor-scooters, stuff like that

"Not on scooters. Motorbikes, maybe." Do you think scooters are poofy? "Why, do you own one?"

Wayne and myself are getting on like a house on fire, and once or twice he even refers to me by my first name. It's really great

I find out why he prefers bikes to scooters. It's because they're bigger and faster, and with a scoot' he thinks you might only hurt yourself severely in the event of an accident, whereas if you come off a motorbike you're more likely to kill yourself. He'd rather die than suffer a broken leg.

He reckons the best way to go would be

while making love

"I've often thought, the four minute warning, what I'd do - besides initially panicking - I think I'd grab the nearest girl to me, and I'm sure given the circumstances she'd be up for it. Just to be wrapped in somebody's arms, and then ... no longer exist"

What did you make of Venice?

"It was really sweet, genuinely touching. It just made me think, God, this is nice, we're all being really mellow and it's like, unreal. Perhaps we should have a new band rule seven days of bonking and a day of culture to follow."

Oh dear. Is there no room for romance in the tipsy-turvy world of The Mission?

"You'd be surprised. I mean our roadie, Grape, was knobbing some girl on a park bench the other day. It was five o'clock in the morning and the sun was coming up ... "

Magical, magical...

"I'm a very romantic person. If I'm going to fornicate with somebody there has to be some kind of romance involved, and when you know it's only for one night, that to me is terribly romantic.

"You're unlikely to see this person ever again, yet you can be so passionate and intimate with them in one evening, more so than with somebody you've known for a year. I just think that's wonderful."

EANWHILE, CRAIG is busy sampling various liquids - anything he can pour from a bottle into his mouth, and in the fridge in his room there's lots to choose from.

We catch him in the act so he invites us to join the party. How can we refuse?

"I couldn't be cool if I tried," admits Wayne, an inebriated twinkle in his eye as he unscrews the jet fuel.

Then he tells me he was brought up as a monk, but I can't tell whether he's joking. And then he claims he'd like very much to have children, the lunatic.

"I get on really well with kids, I suppose we have the same mentality. I actually would physically like to be pregnant, to carry a baby and give birth. They say that by the end of the decade it'll be possible."

But you haven't got a womb!

"No, but they implant something, and you have it by Caesarian. Don't you think that would be a wonderful experience? It must be one of the best feelings in the world, to give birth to another human being. I'd have to take 12 months off work, buy some smocks ... "

If Wayne gives birth to a boy he'll call it Jesus; a girl he'll name Severina. Isn't that nice?

We stay up ridiculously late, until way past three in the morning. The drink and gossip continues to flow, I get to try on Wayne's hat. and eventually the big On The Road question is asked. Are The Mission ... on ... a mission?

The drunken singer looks at me blankly, a light goes on above his head, and he replies, "Yeah! We're on a mission from God!"

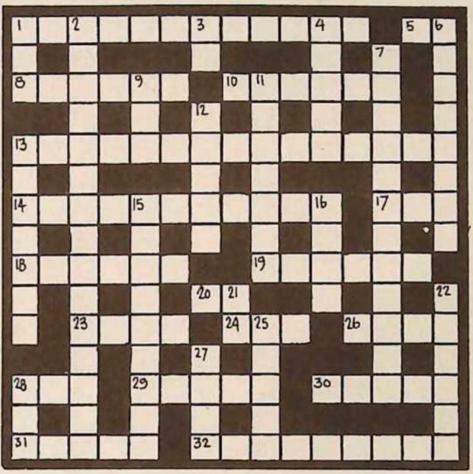

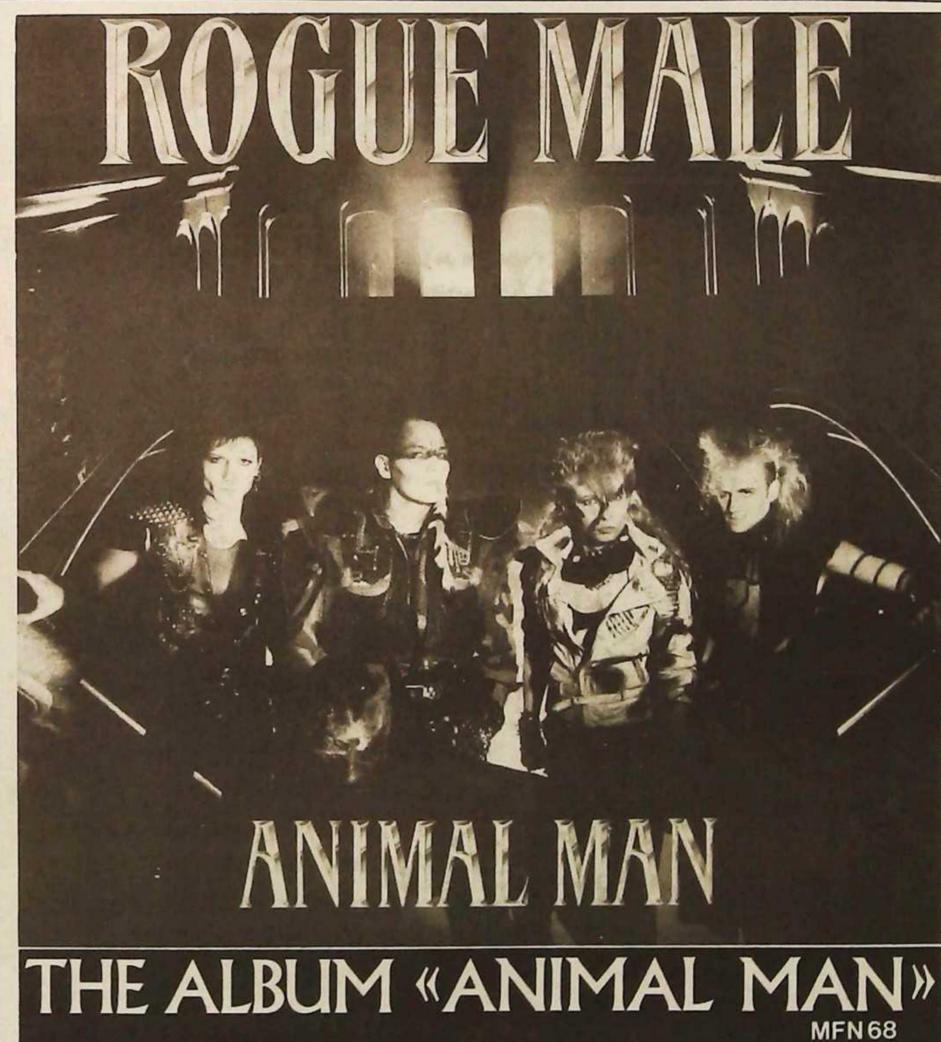

(Camera follows cab's point of view of large building.)

Magenta (reading sign): "The London Opera Centre. (Takes out notebook.) We must follow that up. Anyway, for this programme, they want you to pretend you've just come off stage and walk into a green room or whatever. It's about rip offs in the music business. . Dar-ling, they want you to talk about managing yourselves."

Tony: "I'll say don't manage yourselves."

Magenta: "It's good because it's like a current affairs, investigative programme. I like that sort of thing. They've got more credibility than pop shows. We could play the knife music from Psycho to start with. Also, they want to show all the press headlines. . ."

(Insert. Rapid edit close-ups of newspaper headlines: Sputnik Launch! Sputniks Shot Down! Horror Of Sputnik Maniac! Sputnik Stitch-Up!)

"...and you can explain that you're not really like that."

Tony: "And then we wreck the studio. I really think we're going to have to give Ray a drug problem or something to get on the front page of The Sun."

(Insert. Headline: Marilyn On Heroin Rop. Music:

Shoot it up, now, shoot it up. . . ")

Sound effects. Car phone rings twice and is answered. Traffic noises drown out conversation.

Magenta (louder): "Jane, quick, give me a quote on the band's music, we need it for the biog. . . (Into phone) Oh, I've crossed music out, have I? How appropriate."

CUT TO

2 Archive footage of band rehearsing 'Be Bop A Lula'.

FADE TO

3 Exterior. Daytime. Car parked in East End as driver scours street map. Police officer appears at window. We see Tony James and Martin Degville exchange nervous glances in the back seat.

(Sound effect: Knock on window.)
Driver (winding down window): "Afternoon, officer."

Policeman: "Can you do us a favour and move it off the crossing?"

(Insert: The Sun headline: Zig Zag Sputnik In Double Yellow Line Shocker!)

(Voice over.)

Tony: "Band went on orgy of destruction!" (Fade up soundtrack: "Shoot it up, shoot it up, shoot it up, shoot it up, shoot it up. ..")

CUT TO

4 Interior. Daytime. A photographer's studio. Tony, Martin and Magenta sit on the floor. A copy of The Sun is open at 101 Things You Never Knew About Sex.

Tony (reading): "Men's bodies produce sperm at the rate of two million a day. An average Kleenex holds 40,000 million sperm."

Narrator (voice over): "I thought the singles reviews you did in Smash Hits were very

Martin: "People can't believe we've got a sense of humour."

Voice over: "I suppose people can't see the funny side of making money."

Tony: "That's what's funny. People think we've got four million quid! If I had four million quid, I would not be here. I'd be in the Caribbean. That figure just inflated itself in the press. I never said we got four million. All I ever said was I can't remember. But I like that figure because it translates into six million dollars in America, and the six million dollar band has this ring of headline-ness about it.

"I love the myth of rock 'n' roll. I read all those books. I don't want to expose the absolute truth. We've been very careful. There are no pictures of this band walking down the street in daylight. . ."

FADE TO

5 Exterior. Daytime. Flashback. Tony and Martin, dressed for a Sounds spread, are walking across the road to photographer's studio, a riot of orange and purple against grey walls. Locals appear in doorways to stare.

Tony (voice over): "Because if you think of films like Terminator and Blade Runner, one's image of the future is night-time. Neon and smoke."

DISSOLVE TO

6 Exterior. Night-time. Outside The Hippodrome. There are police and barricades holding back the crowds. Neal X whisks past in a long silver lurex jacket. Girls scream: "Neal! Neal!"

(Voice over.) "Recalling the golden age of Lig Lig Sputnik, it must be rather dull now that you're actually *invited* and don't have to gatecrash any more."

Martin (voice over): "We're not, actually. We were told for the Wham! party that we'd been 'filtered out'."

Tony (voice over): "Neal fought to get a ticket, but the rest of us wouldn't crawl."

DISSOLVE TO

7 Interior. Night-time. Queen party, Kensington. Sputniks out in force. Martin Degville is dressed in black, and is completely bald except for an extra exotic top knot. He is speaking to a journalist who is off camera.

Martin: "I've never seen Sigue Sigue Sputnik as just a six piece rock 'n' roll group — I always saw it as more of a multinational corporation."

FADE TO

8 Martin is on the dancefloor pumping his pelvis to 'Shout!'.

Tony (voice over): "People see Martin as some kind of idiot playing a game, but I don't think he is playing a game. I think he's the real thing. Martin has real rock 'n' roll-ness, this incredible instinct. He knows when things are right. I trust Martin's opinion 100 per cent. Also, he's so great because he knows no fear. He'll say anything – sometimes dumb things, which he shouldn't."

Martin (voice over): "If Sigue Sigue Sputnik were to finish, my life wouldn't come to an end or anything. You know what I mean?"

FADE TO

9 Interior. Daytime. Photographer's studio. Tony: "When we played Kilburn, it was packed, sold out. Mick Jones was offered 50 quid for his ticket. And The Mirror review the next day said it was half empty and the touts couldn't give the tickets away. That was the start of the rot, where they'd make up stories just to slag us off. Like the story that Martin and I had a big row backstage at Top Of The Pops and the band had split up.

"If it were true we'd say, Yeah, it's a fair cop, but we ain't got nothing to hide. And that's what they can't stand – there ain't no dirt. They've rung all the old girlfriends and got nowhere. And stories that we were miming: what the f*** did this group spend five years rehearsing for if we were going to mime?"

CUT TO

10 Interior. Night. Newcastle. A phone booth in a hotel foyer. A Sputnik gig can be heard through closed doors.

News Of The World reporter (into phone):
"A Mayfair employee told me comma quotation marks... they had come... to the end of their tape... and they couldn't rewind it quickly enough... stop... new sentence... that's why there was no encore... full stop end quote... That's it. Cheers mate, I'll ring you back in an hour or so... yeah, right... ha ha ha."

FADE TO

II Interior. Night-time. Sigue Sigue Sputnik live on stage at Newcastle Mayfair.

Tony (voice over): "We'll sue 'em all for four million quid. It'll be great."
(Freeze frame on Tony's grinning face on stage.

Superimpose SSS logo.)

Commercial break.

FADE UP

12 Interior. Daytime. Home of journalist.

Messy. Journalist sits by the phone looking pissed off. Looks at watch. Phone rings. She answers. Hears through phone: "Jane, sorry we didn't call you back. There's been a fire."

FADE TO

13 Interior. Daytime. Sputnik HQ. Magenta and journalist are walking upstairs. Magenta opens the door to reveal a charred cooker.

Magenta: "It started in here. We said to each other, Can you smell burning? We came up here and opened the door and all this smoke just poured out. It doesn't look so bad now. Yana's cleaned a lot of it up."

Tony (unseen, from downstairs): "What are you doing now?"

Journalist: "I'm supposed to be meeting Neal for dinner."

Tony: "No, do me now, I've just done one interview and I'm all geared up for talking." (Insert: rapid edit of Sigue Sigue Sputnik front covers from around the world.)

FADE TO

14 Interior. Night-time. Close-up of framed front covers stacked in the corner of a room. Camera pulls back to reveal Tony and Magenta's living room. Magenta is holding up a fob watch.

Magenta: "Look what the invitations for the Limelight party came with. Isn't that nice?"

Tony who has his hair turked inside a

Tony, who has his hair tucked inside a baseball cap, slips a video into the machine and sits on the table facing the journalist, who is trying to fix her tape recorder. The TV screen will be in the background of all following shots, showing scenes of skylines, MTV and sexual intercourse in unusual circumstances.

Tony: "All this stuff that says we can't play, that we're nothing to do with music. Well, we always said that it's not about music. The music is just a soundtrack for the video. When the office nearly burned down today it all became very clear to me what this group is about. The reason it's exciting when we're at our best is because the music is a vehicle."

(Close-up of journalist's raised eyebrow.)

Tony: "You know how the music is free form and random and there's no arrangement to any of the songs? The way Neal fires stun guitar bursts into the audience – there ain't no arrangement. He fires it when it feels right. Martin singing randomly. It works totally spontaneously. Those gigs where there were almost fights with the crowds. There's that anger, that emotion back from the audience. Like the music galvanises this massive weapon..."

Journalist (interrupting as she searches for a cigarette): "Does this happen every night?"

Tony: "It don't always happen. Sometimes it ain't so great. I was talking to someone in America today and they said, Is it a great show? And I said, No, it ain't a great show. It's the real thing! That's the difference with us. It ain't

But let's not get too excited, let's watch the tape. I saw a

buttock, there were people in body stockings, boob tubes with oversized mammary bits made out of sheet iron and jackbooting stilettos. Shots in a nightclub, too.

This is for converts and worshippers only. There is no technical prowess here, the songs are mere shadows of Queen (as are the video ideas) and the final clip, Dave Clark's 'Time', should go down in the annals of rock history as the night that Freddie flipped Terrible song, lacklustre performance... a kind of ageing George Best trying to waddle inside Kenny Samson and merely tripping over his shoelace.

LEX COX and I have quite a lot in common. He went to a grammar school on the Wirral, I went to one just over the water. He took a rather poor degree in law, and so did I (and we both did it for exactly the same reason - we didn't know what else to do). He has just written and directed a film about Sid Vicious and Nancy Spungeon. And I've just been to see it.

This film is sort of called Sid And Nancy ("actually the film is still called Love Kills, but. . .") and it lasts for very nearly two hours. But these are two of the shortest hours I've ever spent in the pictures. For Alex Cox has contrived to shape a gripping piece of cinema.

But, nonetheless, this acutely involving film is the tale of two of the least attractive characters you could wish to avoid, Vicious Sid and Nauseating Nancy. Their deaths in New York, she at (presumably) his hands, he of an overdose, were as grisly as they were inevitable, and watching it has been one of the most souldestroying experiences I've had since Manchester United last beat Liverpool.

So why on earth did Cox, whose only previous film was the highly successful Repo Man, decide to make it in the first place?

Apparently he had been attempting to write a screenplay about The Sex Pistols and that final American tour.

"And about halfway through writing that, I realised that the most interesting thing in it wasn't the singer or the guitarist or the drummer. It was the bassist and his girl. What became of them was ten times more interesting than what happened to the band. The pair of them, this incredible unit, very bad in many ways but still more than just two isolated, paranoid, lonely individuals.

"And I just wanted to make a film about Sid and Nancy because I felt that this was a really good love story. A real love story, as opposed to a Flashdance. They seemed like such great characters. Even though not everything about them was completely savoury, they were still an incredible pair."

Despite his evident fascination for the bond between the sorry couple, Cox is clearly not respectful of their persons. For Sid And Nancy is also a very funny film, and most of the humour is at the expense of an almost always unaware pair.

"If you see that interview with them in DOA (almost a punk documentary), with them in bed in their flat in Maida Vale. . . it's just the funniest thing. It's sad to see what they were becoming, but still you can't help laughing at them."

And Cox has no respect for drug addicts "They were junkies. And junkies are wankers, they are not admirable."

A sentiment which the film communiciates quite strongly, on the whole. And perhaps one of the most telling scenes, in terms of the context of Sid and Nancy's self destruction, comes in a New York methadone clinic when a caseworker loses his patience with the pair. "You guys got no right to be strung out on this stuff. You could be selling healthy anarchy. But as long as you're addicts you'll be full of shit!"

Cox: "Drugs are an asset to governments because they keep the people down. They keep large chunks of a potentially discontented population in a stupor. As that guy in the methadone clinic tells Sid and Nancy. And he's absolutely right.

'Because it's a matter of public record that the CIA flew heroin out of South Vietnam at the behest of the Vietnamese warlords. And that it came back to the States where it was used to keep the populations of the inner cities smacked out. Just in the same way that we, the British, used opium against the Chinese. The Chinese weren't a bunch of addicts until we came along and gave them the

Although this line of thought might imply a modicum of sympathy for the poor addict kept smacked-out and stupid through government by omission, Cox is still vehement that he's "sick of people viewing junkies as victims. As poor victims of the evil pusher. They're not, they're victims of their own inclinations".

As were Sid and Nancy?

"Yes, but they have this additional quality which makes me like them, which is that they were terribly attached to each other."

This really is the central theme of Cox's case. You should be going to see his film, he feels, not because it's ten years since punk, or because Sid Vicious was a Sex Pistol. But because of the wonder of the bond, of the love between the two protagonists. And the only problem with this argument is that Cox's film simply does not convey the almost tangible affection between the two. which he asserts, and which I believe, did exist.

In conversation, Alex Cox can prove his case. "When there was only enough money for one of them to get off, Sid would make sure that Nancy

was the one that did. And for a junkie to do that is nigh on incredible."

He hasn't transferred this onto film. Sid And Nancy is a compelling experience but it never communicates anything like the same understanding of the relationship between the two as Deborah Spungeon (Nancy's mother) did in her

"I couldn't sleep. I just lay there in the darkness. thinking, groping toward some kind of grasp on Nancy's relationship with Sid, her only lasting relationship.

"They were two lost souls who had found each other. Their relationship came out of their inability to find what they wanted in the outside world. They were on the same wavelength. They fit each other's needs.

"Both had trouble getting along with most people. Both were troubled and angry. Sid had the capacity to lash out in anger at others. Nancy tended to direct her anger at herself. She needed to have everything her way. Sid needed to have somebody to tell him what to do. She was bright

and aggressive. He was, seemingly, withdrawn and not very verbal.

"They were dependent on each other. They cared for each other. To them, what they had together was genuine love. It was the only time for Nancy. Sid was the one great love of her life." (And I Don't Want To Live This Life - Debbie Spungeon.)

It will also be said that this film somehow betrays the memory of The Sex Pistols, first in that there are some chronological and factual inaccuracies, and secondly - and this is an argument that even most intellectual featherweights will ignore - that some of the characters don't actually look too much like their counterparts in reality.

"Yeah, some people definitely will be offended by the fact that Perry Benson doesn't look like Paul Cook, or that Drew Schofield doesn't look like Johnny Rotten. But I don't think that matters. You have a choice when you make a film like this. between choosing people who are really close lookalikes or casting really good actors who are going to make your characters three dimensional beings.

"This is not Beatlemania! This film is a love story about Sid Vicious and Nancy Spungeon, and everybody else, including all the Pistols characters and the McLaren character, they are all peripheral. It was far more important to work with actors that I thought would be inspiring in their roles than with someone who looked like Johnny did back in

"'I honestly can't understand her,' David said as we drove home. 'She's dying. She knows it. Why won't she stop herself?"

"'She doesn't want to,' Frank said sadly. 'She wants to die. She has for a long time. It's been her goal.'

"But why?" asked David.

"'She hates being alive,' I said. 'She hates her pain. She hates herself. She wants to destroy herself."

"'Isn't there anything you guys can do?' asked David.

"'Yes,' I said.

"'What?'

"'Watch her die.""

(And I Don't Want To Live This Life) Sid And Nancy all too vividly portrays Nancy Spungeon's frightening death wish and her inability to handle life. And it gives new substance to two figures from punk folklore. A largely wellcrafted and sympathetic movie, it is often very funny and yet 'ultimately' it's the most depressing film I can remember. Because it does not convince the viewer of the existence of any great bond between the two beyond the mutual dependency borne out of their desperate straits. And therefore there is none of the cathartic release which Alex Cox had intended.

That this love did exist will not be in doubt to anybody who has read Debbie Spungeon's book, and in particular the letters which Sid sent to Nancy's mother after Nancy's death. That Sid And Nancy fails to match the depth of communication of that book is this most absorbing film's only important failing. However, if, like me, you are sufficiently moved by the film to seek out the book, then even this is not too killing a flaw.

"Nancy You were my little baby girl And I shared all your fears. Such joy to hold you in my arms And kiss away your tears. But now you're gone there's only pain And nothing I can do. And I don't want to live this life If I can't live for you."

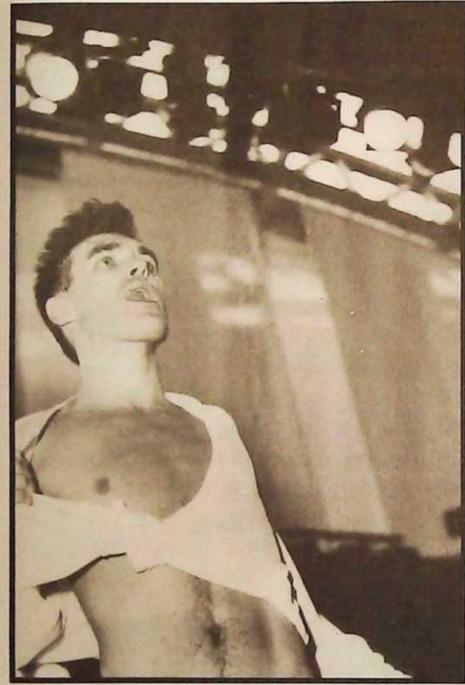

THE TENTH Summer: a time for peace, remembrance, and mourning for those who fell at credibility's wayside and went and got famous. Eleven hours of silence, a thrilling little trip to the spunkiest museum of them all, some history. But first the bright and biting bits that made the day tingle, that proved it was more than a '76 to '86 pop smear test to see who was fit for dancing and who was

headed for the knacker's yard. Like Derek Hatton and Ken Livingstone joining The Fall for 'Pink Press Threat', lan McCulloch taking the vocals on New Order's 'Ceremony', The Smiths encoring with Elvis's 'His Latest Flame'. Like Bill Grundy publically castigating Jonh Wilde and then attempting to crack City Limits' Bruce Dessau with his walking stick. Dessau retaliating by throwing a glass of whisky over the NME's Adrian Thrills, Like Derek Hatton's initial appearance which received a louder clash of jeers and cheers than any of the bands could have hoped for.

"Will you be joining **Howard Devoto and Steve** Diggle on stage?" I asked Pete Shelley as we shook each other's soft hands. "F*** off" he giggled in reply, leaving to play his set with his embarassing little boy backing band and light show but with that vocal here and hug me now!

So where can you find Ken Livingstone, Derek Hatton and Morrissey all together on one July evening? At G-MEX, of course, celebrating punk's tenth anniversary. JAMES BROWN delivers a barbed wire bouquet. IAN TILTON takes the party snaps

stumpy Amber Shamblers could ever be. That buzz and excitement that pounced from 'Enola Gay' and 'Electricity' didn't so much leave you sad as remind you just what a brilliant song sounds like.

"I had a run in with Boston Immigration/To my name they had an aversion/The cops are tops, welcome to the '80s '90s" . . . " The Fall's 'GB Grenadiers'

Boston's not alone in its aversion to Mark. Mortgage E Smith, that aristocratic speedbank prefect, silver stick stuck spiky kebab mouth, a vocally vicious little creep with riding boots to kick and playing live with his

drips evil. And that's LIVE and not LOVE spelt backwards.

A hot afternoon bop to 'Cruiser's Creek', 'City Hobgoblins', 'Living Too Late' and 'GB Grenadiers'. Is 'Grenadiers' The Fall's swansong? Are they about to bow out minus a cantankerous old man's catarrh solo? Now, that would be polite.

Such is the power of pop, that image of Morrissey with his banner and his band won't leave me.

WOMAD FESTIVAL Clevedon Kenn Pier Farm

FOOD, EVERYWHERE you looked there was food. A festival can't function on an empty stomach and WOMAD '86 was running on all four hotplates. You could eat Japanese, Indian or African, or just plain old hot dog with extra grease. You could dine at Desperate Dan's or perhaps The Yellow Banana. And hasn't the price of hash cookies rocketed?

WOMAD, Peter Gabriel's brainchild, is back once more. through thick and thin.

Clevedon was the lucky venue this year, a town where old people go to die. The gods were on our side - it was sunny - and if the local constabulary were everpresent, they kept their distance, perhaps knowing there would be no trouble. Not here.

Friday evening, and the air of expectancy was almost crushing - the world at our doorstep!

A slight traffic problem saw to it that we arrived just as Misty In Roots were winding up but there was just enough time to grab a beer before the Chakk attack commenced. This was the first of many times that the audience in the Stage Two marquee would, almost desperately, forget themselves and move.

Chakk were tighter than tight, but they've learned how to ease off since I last saw them, giving themselves and us the odd breather. They were wickedly danceable, one big electric groove.

Gil Scott-Heron was imminent on Stage One, and even the sunset was inspiring as shadows weaved through the candles and smoke and painted faces. Gil Scott-Heron was as smooth, as funky, as loving as he always is. "Hang on to your dreams . . . " he implored, and the glowing moon broke through the clouds. Resist that voice, that beat - and probably the best bass player in the known universe - and you're made of stone.

By Saturday, the site was hot and buzzing. It's the people that make or break a festival, and WOMAD-goers are prepared to give anything a chance.

After a light lunch of space cake and mushroom wine (a good year, was 1983), I joined the crush for Ivor Cutler, the bard of Glasgow, His inimitable whimsy and indispensable one-liners wowed the crowd.

"Load of rubbish!" bawled a spoilsport.

"I don't see any chains holding you down, sonny," replied Ivor, to a huge cheer, his near-OAP status making him seem like a wise old grand-dad.

Over on the main stage, rhythm master Arrow, filling in at a day's notice, washed us clean with shining, scintillating Caribbean fusion. It was fast fast fast, and the swaying, jostling mass lapped it up.

In that legendary place known as the backstage bar, Peter Gabriel strolled and supped, looking well pleased. Furniture had unexpectedly appeared that morning, so time to net a few floating opinions. "Brilliant!" was one. "Awfull" was another.

Likely lads The Housemartins took the stage, to the great delight of the many Housemartins fans. Their power-packed pop is not for me, but the songs are pure craftsmanship, and the smiles and energy saw out the afternoon in a blaze of happiness.

And while the bands played on, the little world in a field made the most of its time.

"Asss-id! Fresh melons! Cold lager! Haircuts!" went the background orchestra of voices, while bike engines revved and dogs growled, and the workers at The Samaritans tent looked slightly bewildered.

James were next in line; their songs were jarring and insolent like a nutter on a bus. They were disjointed, anonymous, almost cowpunk at times, but

confounded me by performing an invigorating encore. Distinctly British.

Back to the big stage, where Senegal's Youssou N'Dour lived up to all expectations, rumours and gossip. He was brilliant. Most recently heard on Gabriel's album 'So', Youssou N'Dour's voice is like a slippery snake, weaving and turning and coming up behind itself. His music was carried by the finest drumming of the whole weekend, intricate patterns, subtle and strong, that were talking to us.

His dedication before playing 'Nelson Mandela' brought tumultuous, frenzied applause, and probably a few tears as well, it was that sort of evening. Everyone had been telling everyone else that Gabriel would appear for the encore. He didn't.

What? Not another weekend of sun, sea and scratch-mixing? NEIL PERRY applies the acid test to WOMAD (pix: EYE AND EYE), while, opposite, ANDY HURT hops into FRESH gear for Wembley (pix: STEVE DOUBLE)



A quick dash, via the queue at the bar for some life-saving liquid, resulted in catching the tail-end of The Shop Assistants' set. Full of nervous punky energy and delightfully noisy tunes, they are the galloping stallion to the Mary Chain's somnolent, stubborn mule, and I wish I'd seen more. Over on Stage Three, The Blue Aeroplanes had by all accounts excelled themselves. And then we waited . . .

Siouxsie And The Banshees were the only rock stars present, and it showed. Curses were muttered and killer glares dealt as the band and entourage froze out the whole backstage area. In contrast to the day's previous entertainment, the gap between band and audience was mammoth.

Flash guns did overtime as Siouxsie whirled and curled, looking magnificent in praying mantis head gear, but that's where my interest died. The whole concept was monstrously impersonal, and while several songs such as 'Christine', 'Nightshift' and 'Happy House' (golden oldies - get the idea?) had all of us up there, the majority of the material walked in a spiritual wilderness.

Reports of Banshees crew members wrenching the cameras from fans' hands filtered in and set the seal on the whole thing. As cold as the night air.

Almost as if in apology, Sunday provided the most magical moment of the festival. Carriacou Big Drum, hailing from Grenada, packed them in with a vital show of drums, voice and dance. Omnipresent, the beat was throbbing, hypnotic. For the last song, they picked up their drums, and jumped off the stage into the audience. Shock turned to joy, and after a few minutes, musicians and crowd were locked together, inseparable.

A near-naked female stepped methodically over inert bodies, clutching her tray of cookies, as Courtney Pine and his Jazz Warriors confronted a slowly but surely dwindling crowd. Looking faintly ridiculous in Absolute Beginners get-up. their busy, jazzy funk-blues more often than not came over as a muddy cacophony, the razor sharp back beat obscured by legions of battling horns. Uncomfortable.

The Daintees lived up to their name for a while, soothing tired and culturedrunk heads with quaint, countryfied ditties. Which made their sudden explosion into a fiery, impassioned, storming ballad all the more

They were closely followed by The Bhundu Boys from Zimbabwe, proudly proclaiming: "When in Rome, do as Romans! We eat fish and chips!"

The Bhundu Boys make scorching, electrified, African dance sounds, cleverly interwoven with some basic blues roots.

They can change the rhythm in a wink of an eye, chopping it up as the entire noise keeps itself together.

With a deadline to meet, we took one last look round. dodged a huge horse being ridden bare-back, and left

UK FRESH'86 Wembley Arena ELECTRO IN i.D is one thing; down the Wag, rubbing shoulders with models and occupants of the chart's lower reaches. This, however, is the real thing. Pimples have no respect for racial barriers, and the spotty youth of the world is united in a day-long celebration of acne, one nation under a zit. Half the audience wear trainers; 80 per cent are under 20, the larger proportion male.

It's fitting that at Wembley Arena - just a mortar bomb's lob away from the home of football - a fashion that has transformed the manufacture of referee's whistles into a growth industry should converge for its convention, the sporadic bursts of concerted tooting sounding like a plague of locusts.

The upping of the stage lights precipitates an ant-like swarm of those seated two kilometres away in the cheap seats towards the wider open spaces within sight of the performers. As a reward for their efforts, they are greeted by that absolutely

street-cred figure, Capital Radio's living fossil Mike Allan - for those of you outside the capital, imagine Bob Holness of Blockbusters as an MC and you'll have the vibe.

I settle for an unhampered ant's view but still manage to sit next to "a foxy lady" (Allan's phrase) who dances her bum on her plastic seat. setting off seismic vibrations along the row and making the next five hours resemble a bumpy bus ride.

First up, some dextrous digital diversion from the decks of DJ Cheese, then a spot of skeletal body popping and the day's first protracted yawn courtesy of Steady B. "Everybody say ho!" This is the first of many such exhortations, and although I've always considered this request rather inane, it is only now that I construe the real, deep meaning of the chant It is a throwback to the '60s and they are singing about Ho Chi Minh. Aha! So how come they never shout "everybody say Mao"?

Despite the debatable excellence of DJ B (alias MC Boob), foxy and her bum are is determined to make a reappearance and it becomes impossible to study The Racing Post.

Masquerade mime a number, to be followed on stage by Morgan Khan who introduces the UK's contenders for Fresh '87, the unconvincing Family Crest. The story the other papers got in a huff about - the clash of the two Roxannes gets a brand new twist with the announcement that Roxanne Shanté is in bed with chicken pox; Captain Rock stands in with an energetic stint. By now I'm starving, but chips which look like they were pre-fried at Chernobyl? No ta! I opt for an Ethiopian hot dog and instantly regret it Sir Mix A Lot does the regular stuff, then Dr Jeckyll And Mr Hyde add a touch of class and experience with a Tom Tom Club mix and customary "ho"s.

For the umpteenth time, Allan The Geek snivels about how unfortunate it is that the three headline acts can't all be on stage together. Apparently they've all drawn lots for the running order (although with all the gear to set up, it would be virtually impossible for Bambaataa to go on at any time other than last). Grandmaster Flash's fivestrong vocal crew are low on "ho"s, but high on audience response, initiating a parrotlike bout of shouting and flapping arms that wouldn't have been out of place at a Nuremburg rally.

Allan is really rocking now. "STAR-SKI, STAR-SKI!" hollers the old codger, a pathetic sight. One number and the green-jacketed Lovebug is off the stage as his backing tape takes a coffee break. He returns, momentum destroyed, with half the speakers blaring half the chant of 'House Rocker'.

Between sets, I stand on the wrong part of a flip-up seat and get my foot stuck for over a minute. This is a good way to feel very stupid.

And then real drums and 'Planet Rock', aka 'Trans-Europe Express', take us back to the neolithic era of electro, introducing the human tank that is Afrika Bambaataa.

On the Simple Simon Says front, he succeeds even better than Flash, inciting the front ranks with his assegai and bringing the first house to a fitting climax. "If you don't like South Africa, stand up." Emotional blackmail, eh? 'Sun City' has them rocking in the aisles.

A sneak backstage offers a comfy chair and some peculiar ham/pizza vol-auvents, all in all a far more attractive proposition than a reprise by most of the lesser acts from the afternoon, a notable exception being DJ Cheese who proves that he is the most accomplished

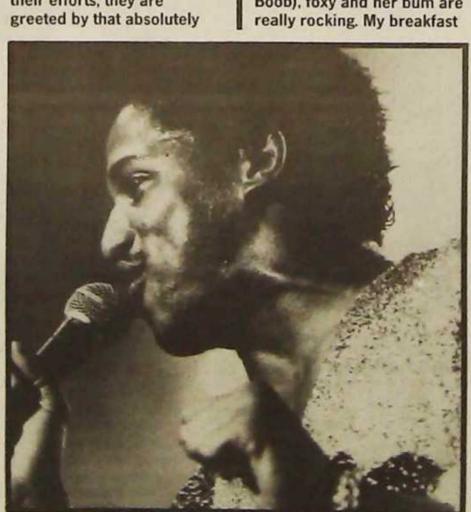
scratching DJ on show today. World Class Wreckin' Cru play instruments (unusual) and have some nifty quickstep choreography to show off, as well as some serious satin jackets. By now, "wave your hands in the air" and "yo, baby, yo" are emerging as pretenders to the throne of King Ho.

Towards the back of the hall, a succession of small circles are being formed to watch the displays of the local breakers. Suddenly, the floor clears with a rapidity that suggests tear gas, but the actual cause of this panic is the appearance on stage of two gangs of dancing kids whose spins and springs are judged by their peers by whistle blasts which act as hip hop clapometers. Wow!

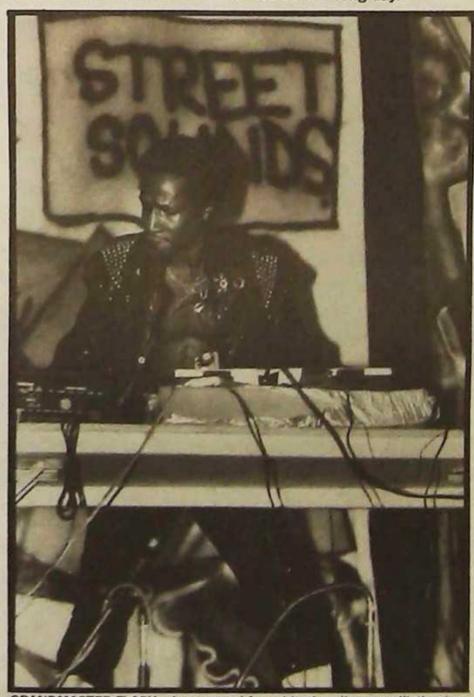

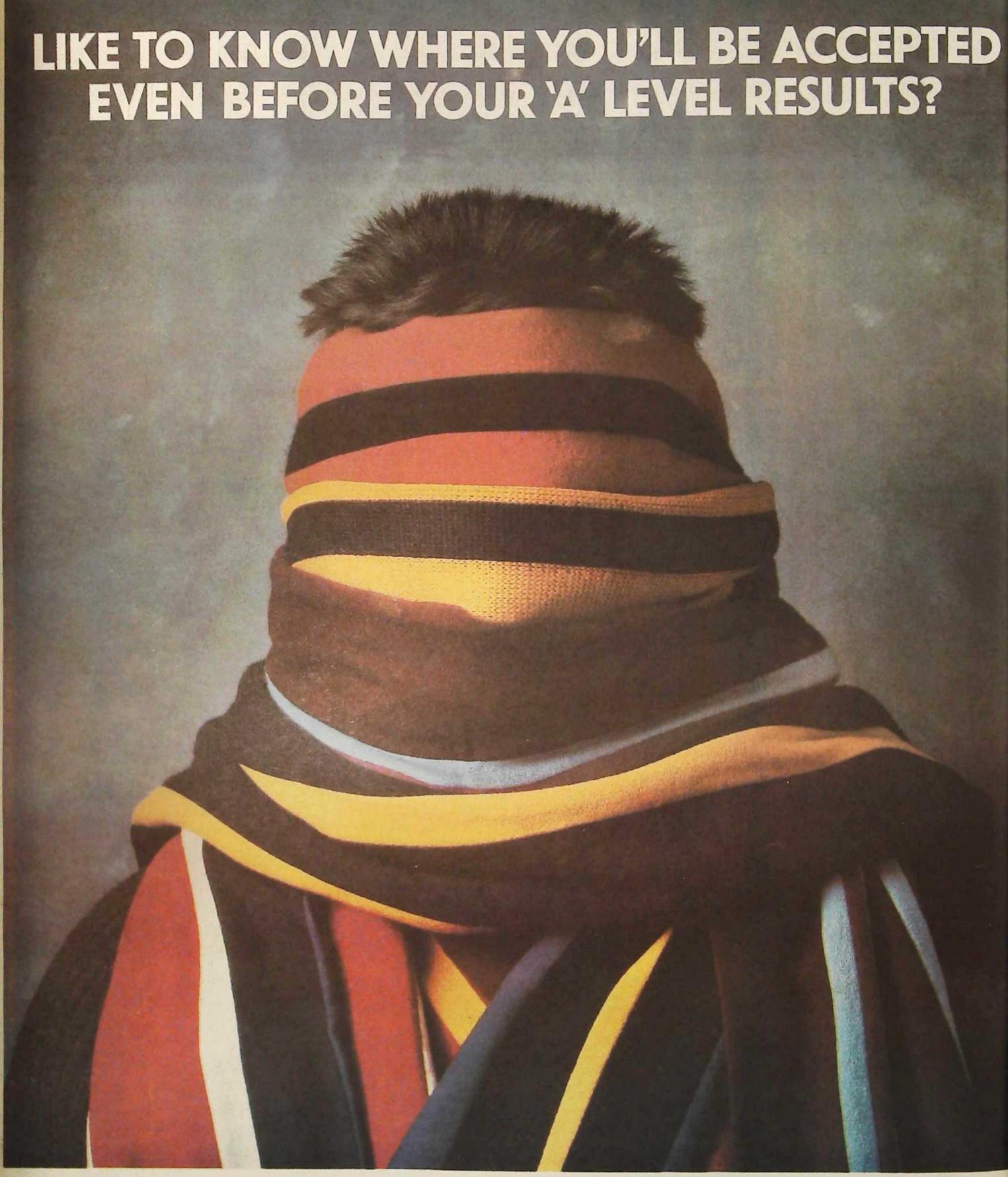

GRANDMASTER FLASH: always good for a bit of audience callisthenics



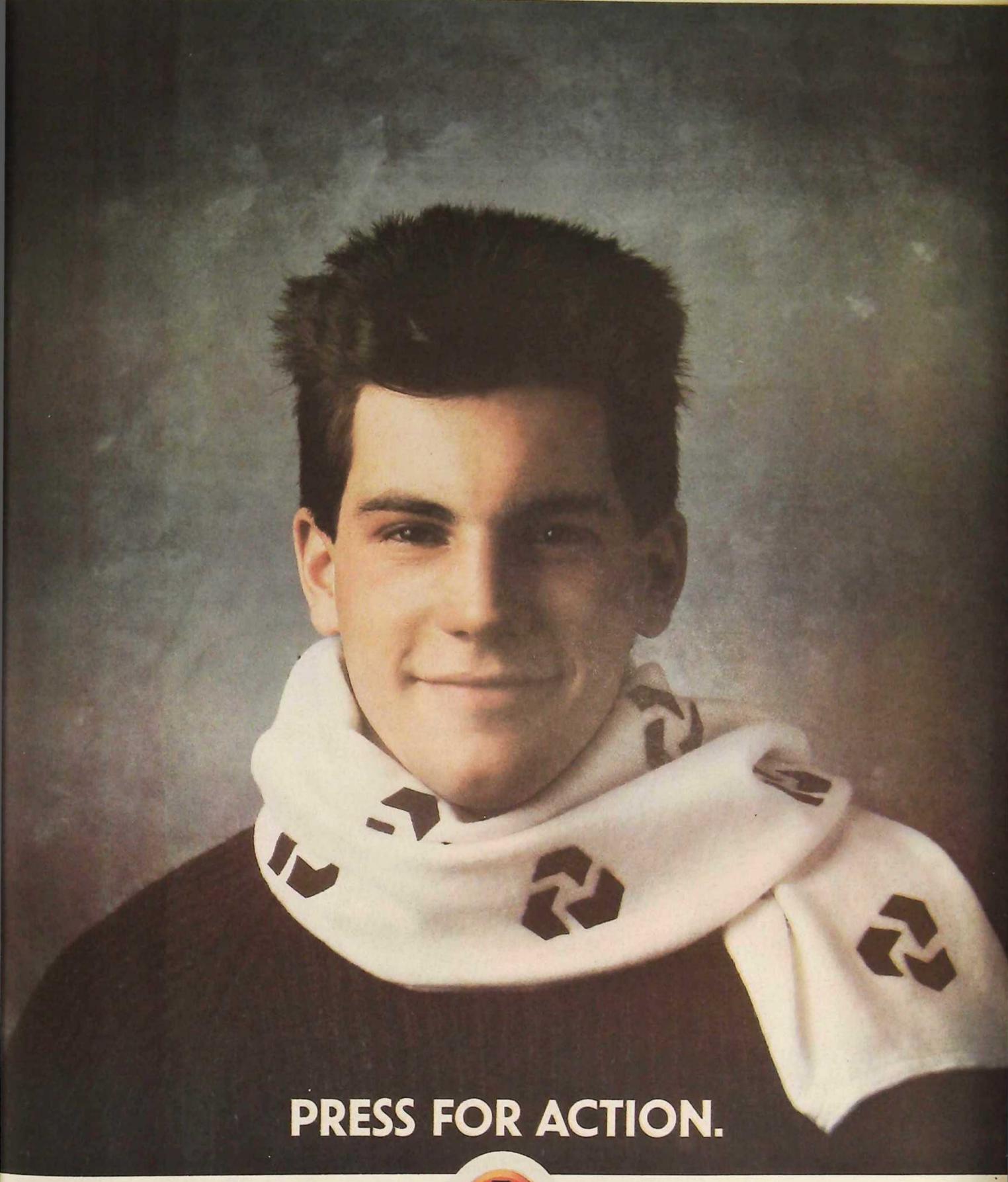

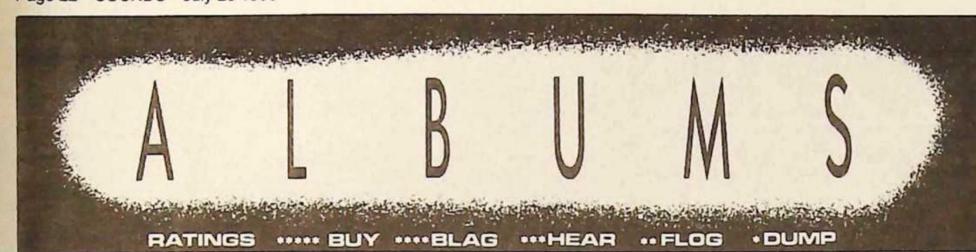

UB40: too many cooks?

UB40 'Rat In The Kitchen' (Dep International LP DEP 11)***1/2

MANY MUSIC scribblers, including friends of mine, stubbornly maintain that UB40 have only one song and that they don't even play or perform that very well. From Brum to dumb, this ragged reggae regiment are critically perceived as existing for the cause of lining their own pockets while propagating a hazy, hypocritical pop 'socialism'.

'Rat In The Kitchen' partly represents the band attempting to come to terms with the ironies of their journey, from 'Signing Off' the dole queue in 1980, to the enchanted chart life they lead today. The fascination is, this is a game they will never win: UB40 have had their cake, eaten it and are now choking on a loss of credibility, but the sound that comes out is so torridly tuneful it ensures this record will sell till hell turns to ice.

Full of self-doubt, sometimes mawkishly sentimental, occasionally downright embarrassing in its self-pitying, lyrical self-flagellation, 'Rat In The Kitchen' is UB40 stripping away the facade of stardom to reveal uncertainty. As Astro makes clear via the overlong title rap, this crew feel betrayed, and

their confusion and hurt is writ large, from Norman Hassan's parading of his born-again conscience on 'Looking Down At My Reflection' to 'All I Want To Do' where Ali aches, "My life is a joke, but to me it isn't funny".

I can already hear the typewriters rattling deprecatory gags about UB40 like Gatling guns, but in amongst the pristine agit-pop of the current anti-apartheid single, 'Sing Our Own Song', and the toasting promise of 'Tell It Like It Is', there is a streak of trenchant honesty which it would be churlish to

The centrepiece illustrating the cleft stick UB40 find themselves beaten with is unearthed on 'Don't Blame Me', where Ali lets loose with his stratospheric blue voice: "Think it's fair to say, we welcome riches down our way . . . I want to be a millionaire . . . I'm scared to death of poverty . . . Don't blame me for wanting more . . . Even so I'm holding on thinking the world could live as one".

A case of poor little rich boys? No. This sometimes inarticulate record, which resonates with some very fine reggae, is the sound of UB40's growing pains.

ROGUE MALE 'Animal Man' (Music For Nations MFN 68)****

IT'S NOT a happy place, the world that Rogue Male inhabit, full of tension and bitterness, populated by psychotics...

I quickly forgot about Roque Male after I saw them

at the Hammy Odeon last year, apart from the fact that they played at a painfully loud level. But 'Animal Man' could be the work of a different band. It is not always easy listening but it has an edge, not unlike Metallica's 'Master Of Puppets', because Rogue Male are changing the rules

Take the opening track, 'Progress', nothing short of stunning fire and brimstone. It is almost up-tempo funk but, mangled and mutated by slashes of sheet metal noise, it charges along. By song number two, 'LUST', we begin to get the message:

OT FOR TEAC

VAN MORRISON 'No Guru, No Method, No Teacher' (Mercury MERH 94)****

WHEN ONE considers that 1984's 'Live At The Grand Opera House Belfast' was Van's first burst of listlessness since 'Hard Nose The Highway' more than ten years before, his stature becomes more than impressive, more like unearthly. Last year's 'A Sense Of Wonder' almost brought Van back to his '70s high-water mark but lacked an overall coherence that his most devastating work pos-

His most consummate record since 'Wavelength' and his most intriguingly involved since 'Astral Weeks', this is bursting to saturation point, Morrison at his most mystical, magical best.

Like 'Astral Weeks', it comes with a fullfledged scenic atmosphere, his own childhood fragments taking on supercharged lust. Always more fondly inclined towards his

more curvaceous soundscapes - especially when stretched across an entire album - 'No Guru' thrills me as it sways with eyes of blue and soul enchanted. Without flaws, it gently coaxes much gripping sublimity out of the softest of refrains, the lowest undercurrents of sound. At his most effective when understated, the crescendos here are never dampened by their subtle nature, and never fall short of blinding.

It's impossible to select a favourite moment here because this whole event aches with a uniform grief, a steady stream of sorrow. Morrison's ability to make desolation visibly moving has never been surpassed by anyone in any form; this is another astonishing peak amongst peaks.

Only the delicately jaunty 'Ivory Tower' single, the finale here, breaks a mood of solemn, sublime reflection. 'No Guru' simply enraptures, the best record of this year so

AND ALSO THE TREES 'Virus Meadow' (Reflex LEX 6)****3/4

I DOUBT if anyone had to mortgage their house to finance this recording but the production team have done a fine job, avoiding flashy chartbound tat, preferring

instead to take their cue from the mighty Russ Abbott in opting for an atmosphere. Precisely what sort of atmosphere I'm not sure, but this is not a record to play a) during half-time at football matches, b) at a 21st birthday party, or c) during an Orange march.

If anything, I could envisage 'Virus Meadow' as a soundtrack to How! hero Jack Hargreaves' long-running TV smash Out Of Town, the theme tune to which is uncannily like the Trees' 'Gone . . . Like The Swallows'. Whatever, the feel is maintained throughout, sometimes overshadowing individual songs.

The evocative (God, I swore I'd never use that word) gatefold sleeve indicates the importance placed by the band on the reproduced lyrics of Simon Huw Jones. I'm pathologically antipathetic towards self-proclaimed 'poets' in rock (I mean, Jim Morrison) but the Jones pen manages to translate bittersweet music into appropriate words. The essence of And Also The Trees, however, is the guitar of Simon's bro' Justin, more haunting than anything the Ghostbusters ever came up against. A very beautiful record.

BOB DYLAN 'Knocked Out Loaded' (CBS 86326)

ALL THAT big stage fold-back sound is starting to clog up Dylan's ears. He's taken to writing readymade anthems for stadiums around the world to vibrate to.

You can almost see thousands of upraised arms swinging to 'Brownsville Girl' or 'Under Your Spell'. And Kris Kristofferson's 'They Killed Him' gets smeared with gospel goo and a children's choir - subtle it ain't.

Tracks like 'Driftin' Too Far From Shore', which would have been masterfully understated back on 'Blood On The Tracks', have turned into leaden rock songs. Only 'Got My Mind Made Up', a bottleneck boogie with Tom Petty, and Little Junior Parker's 'You Wanna Ramble' rise above the woolly-minded blight with a distinguishing sparkle.

You can argue that 'Knocked Out Loaded' is a welcome relief from the hellfire and brimstone Dylan was preaching a few albums back. But the muddled attempt to go back to early Dylan-rap on 'Brownstone Girl' with its half-hearted ambiguity is a bit sad.

Funny, that; his sleevenotes for the excellent 'Biograph' set at the end of last year seemed to indicate that he'd developed a shrewd sense of perspective.

VARIOUS ARTISTS 'Live! For Life' (IRS MIRF 1013)***

AN ODD little collection. In aid of the AMC Cancer Research Centre, this selection of IRS live out-takes by the label's most successful sons and daughters is both disjointed and rather understated.

It's a question of fans forking out for their heroes' rare live appearances only to find them rubbing shoulders with some of the shoddier IRS fare.

Of note, perhaps, are Sting's 'I Been Down So Long', in which he takes five to introduce the band and the burbling guitar of Jeff Beck, REM's 'Ages Of You', and The Bangles' harmonised 'Hero Takes A Fall', Also-rans include Squeeze, who sound like Squeeze and . . . well,

that's about it.

The rest is pretty uninspiring stuff from Stewart Copeland and Derek Holt, The Alarm, Silent Movies, Oingo Bongo (what?) and The Go-Gos. What you have to do is weigh up whether you really want one of the tracks. It might be easier just to send your donation straight to the charity.

TWELFTH NIGHT 'Twelfth Night' (Virgin CAS 1174)***3/4

THE MYSTERIES of Twelfth Night were explained to me in a would-be country pub recently: "They can all play but the singer can't reach one good note."

Well, the same could've been said of Van Halen before Diamond Dave split for good, and in those days VH were simply the best. They ain't so hot now, though, so maybe vocal shortcomings are, in the right context, a bonus.

Unfortunately, Twelfth Night appear to be having difficulty coping with them. Andy Sears, the man with the less than golden vocal chords, isn't all bad, especially when the tighter, single-orientated arrangements on side one condense his histrionics into a more acceptable form. 'Pressure' (Tears For Fears' 'Mothers Talk' comes to mind) and 'Jungle' (like a bouncy U2) get the best out of him.

But leave him to carry a lengthier track, and you've got problems.

Ultimately it speaks volumes for the songs - and for Twelfth Night as a whole that in spite of this they've still produced an encouraging and listenable album. Seeing as Sears is so obviously a part of the band, I can only hope that he'll stick around and make his efforts count for more next time.

JAMES 'Stutter' (Sire |IMLP |)***

I AM trying to think of a group other than The Housemartins who look more boring than James. I am having big trouble in this quest. I am listening again to the long-awaited debut LP from these 'thoughtful Mancunians' and screwing my nose up at the word 'thoughtful'. They are shrieking about people who set themselves on fire. They want to be accurate poets and there is no such thing. They have never met Willie Colon.

But they're not stupid. I mean, you look at the cover — dutifully beautiful, truly unruly — and you release that. And you remember the dynamic delicacy of 'Hymn From A Village' and wonder why why why is this Lenny Kaye production such a... such a slight disappointment. Perhaps it's because you keep comparing it to 'Horses', which is like comparing this review to the complete works of Susan Sontag. (Oh, gee, thanks, that's really sweet of you.)

Commencing with 'Skullduggery', James mark out their territory. It's a rather uncommitted tale of insects eating brains. This they do by entering through the ear. James attempt similar. Here is the rocky bit which they do so well, with such composure. It's tinny. It's flat. It's one-dimensional. It's bound to improve. . .

But it doesn't, until the single 'So Many Ways' starts sucking its own thumbs and fingers. And even then they blow it by dramatising their own main weakness and folly. This they do by proclaiming "Seduction has to be wrong". With this one line they pinpoint the blindspot of their sensibility. If it didn't make you not love them, it'd make you love them.

Things get tougher, stronger, there's less whining on 'Johnny Yen' and the inventive, scurrying 'Summer Song'. Timothy John Booth's voice and James Lawrence Gott's guitar (Lord, those names!) start to show off a bit on 'Billy's Shorts' and 'Why So Close'. Mmm, come on, let's see some strut, some pride, some greatest love of all. . .

But no. Without the self-modelled pelvic biology of a Mac, the comic genius of a Morrissey, the uncontrived rush of The Wedding Present or Age Of Chance or the vaguest nuance of glamour, James here fall between about seven stools, the extremes of which are urban folk and Steve Hackett with short hair. "Need a wash, need a wash" is one of the closing refrains. It is glaringly obvious what James do need.

An interesting but club-footed student exercise. File under 'Raymonde'. What? Oh, I think they were once the most important pop group of all time as well. . .

EP earlier this year, here, in transports of cut-up excess, comes more of the same. 'Big Sexy Land' frets impatiently, cranking with extraordinary violence, complete with endless shock spasms and sudden, unexpected intrusions.

Not that this constant racket yearns for any soft oral darkness; Revolting Cocks sound forced but essentially lithe. Having verged on charred severity and dense frustration with their previous Ministry, they throw their shoulder-pads to the breeze and bring the chicken bone back to the throat of all this fraught funk.

Janitors live and it is quite clear that their perusal of that essential tome, Andy Hurt's book on How To Succeed In The Music Business Without Really Having Any Talent Whatsoever (as used by Bananarama) has not stretched as far as chapter eleven, The Live Performance (though, of course, this is not to suggest The Janitors are without talent – perish the thought!).

Once the boys get cracking on the visual side, they'll do full justice to a set of killerdiller material, as evidenced by the near-magnificent seven songs on 'Thunderhead'.

My fave is 'Nowhere', an uncharacteristic track due to the absence of slide on the guitar. But away with the shopping list and on with the compliments! Oh, why bother, it would only be going through the motions to rifle through Roget. Suffice to say, all the adjectives would be favourable. That's about it, really . . .

ANDY HURT

HEAD OF DAVID 'Dogbreath' (Blast First BFFP5)****

DAVID'S HEAD is sizzling in the microwave. Eyes bulging like ping-pong balls. Temples throbbing with fear. Mouth twisted like a razor scar. He's waiting for that split second when the ugly and the beautiful explode into a red smear. Living in Dudley can do strange things to a person.

HOD – far from labourers – are definitely onto something, judging by this debut minialbum which burns with scalp-crawling intensity. At least, that's the impression one gets from the guitar of Eric Jurenovski which sends Tony lommi shrieking off for a fight with Rowland Howard. Limbs fly in all directions; heavy metal floats like scum in comparison.

There really is something brutal about 'Dogbreath' – maybe Dave Cochran's bass, which bludgeons like a club, lifting HOD out of the mud of Birthday Party come-latelies and into another sphere altogether. Up at max volume, even the Swans-ish 'White Bastard' and the cover of Suicide's orbital 'Rocket USA', the two atypical cuts here, feel as though they are tearing the skin off your body.

Quite what singer Reuben
Burroughs is trying to impale
with the pointed stake of his
voice I still haven't
deciphered, though song
titles such as 'Newly Shaven
Saint' and 'I Will Fall At Your
Feet' are intriguing enough to
make me listen more closely.
Their pain is my pleasure.

The first genuinely visceral British band since the Mary Chain but without the pop hooks. HOD blast first and ask questions later. Deadly.

COMMUNARDS

'Communards' (London LONLP 18)**1/2

IF IT weren't for the way their roundabout gets wound up on 'Disenchanted' or 'Heavens Above', I'd give this nothing at all. During those few moments it's a capable white disco clip. Otherwise, this is a little sneeze of a record.

The songs Communards write are lovesick moans, blubbering bits of pathos, teardrops trickling into cups of tea: it's so sad, all this, but it's a sadness you can't draw any uplift or beauty from. On 'Reprise', a paltry little sob about life under Thatcher, it sounds like Jimmy's grazed his finger and wants to have a good cry about it. Boo-hoo.

Richard Coles might be the main culprit. The fellow's got no idea of what to do with the music, prattling away at his synthesiser ABC. All we get is bits of classical rhapsody at the lonely piano or Moroder sequencers dressed in frilly petticoats.

'La Dolarosa' is a weedy Brecht-Weill rip off. Drawing camp comparisons won't do them any favours, but the texture and bloom of a track like 'You Are My World' recalls Manilow and Streisand. The waters part for Jimmy to hit an operatic high note and the result is almost

neurotically kitsch in effect. Jimmy Somerville deserves better than these bubble bath surroundings but someone's got to figure out what to do with the bizarre thing that is his voice. Most of time he sounds like Michael Jackson singing 'Got To Be There' a party turn, and we're tired of party turns. This shrill piping is the stuff of novelty pop, not pale loverboy music. The unrepeatable Bronski moment of 'Smalltown Boy' set the voice in a

severe shell of beautiful precision; Coles' keyboards just putter politely below Jimmy's trampoline leaps.

Communards are remorselessly right-on. There are songs for Thatcher and the GLC, and 'Forbidden Love' is the obligatory gay tract. They need some urgency in their world. Communards want to be clever, shy, soft, sincere and loving; they're glad to be wimps. OK, for sure. The pop music still stinks.

SID 'N' DEATH

ORIGINAL SOUNDTRACK 'Sid And Nancy (Love Kills)' (MCA MCG 6011)***

LOOKING LIKE a phoney epitaph to a sick fairy-tale loosely based on rock 'n' roll degeneration, suicide and murder, here's the Sid And Nancy soundtrack LP. And I wonder if this will be the final nail in Sid's coffin, the last dance of his creaking bones and spirited soul in these conformist '80s.

The mood on this obtrusively moody, schizophrenic record paints an odd picture, placing the film halfway between a Hollywood-style tragic love story — a gooey sentimentality surrounds punk's Romeo and Juliet — and an artistic, anarchic Hitchcock plot reliant on question marks that don't really

Old Joe Strummer edges towards the Hitchcock theory with his title track 'Love Kills'. Joe always was one for melodramatic bellyaching, romancing topics that really were beyond romancing. His two contributions are bog-like dramas and corny with it.

The Pogues — sounding so unlike themselves that I had to check the track-listing to make sure it was them — firstly come across like Patti Smith with 'Haunted' and then, with 'Junk', like PiL. Both capture more than most the drugged emotions, paranoia and stark, chilling conclusion of Sid and Nancy's love affair, if, indeed, it really could be called a love affair.

Steve Jones — yes, the one who use to be in The Sex Pistols — here typifies today's worn punk elite, trying to earn an honest crust but burning the toast with some awful MOR. Steve's 'Pleasure And Pain' (the title really says it all) is an insult to his past. Surprisingly, it's left to The Circle Jerks to get it just raucously right with their throttling 'Love Kills' (no relation). It's so fresh, raw, menacing, ferocious and exciting that it captures Sid at his self-destructive best, a victim of his own press.

All this soundtrack really does is raise the question: is Alex Cox just flogging another dead horse, or merely riding with a handicap? I'll reserve my final verdict until I've seen the film.

RON ROM

THE SISTERHOOD 'Gift' (Merciful Release SIS 020)*

"AS WE walk on the water, we forget" . . . how to make good records! I, being a man of sound reason and judgement, am worried. The reason for my concern is the present mental health of my old cohort in crime, Andrew Eldritch. For someone who once flirted with genius and had the ability to recognise and acknowledge, and even occasionally write, a good song, there is absolutely no sign of such talent on this unwanted 'Gift' of an album.

The opening track, 'Jihad', starts out like a Blancmange out-take and is only mildly irritating, but after what seems like an eternity of "two-five-zero" chanted over an extremely repetitious keyboard theme, I run screaming to the local off-license. To drown my sorrows, you understand!

As 'Colours', which is more of the same tedium, brings side one to a close I have the distinct feeling that only Doktor Avalanche en-Joyed making this record, and he's Andrew's ever faithful drum computer.

'Giving Ground' commences side two and this turgid and lumbering rendition is even more tedious than the 'hit' single version. If people will insist on writing songs about me then, please God, let them write more songs like The Cult's 'King Contrary Man'. Even the presence of the 'Chorus

WYNTON MARSALIS 'Tomasi/Jolivet: **Trumpet Concertos'** (CBS Masterworks IM42906)*** BRANFORD MARSALIS 'Romances For Saxophone' (CBS Masterworks M42122)***1/2

THE OBTUSE manner in which these records by the brothers Wynton and Branford Marsalis respectively two of the most bedazzling and Grammy beknighted technicians of the trumpet and saxophone in the world today - have been received in some quarters is downright remarkable. Remarkably dumb that is.

Wynton and Branford are two black Americans. Some critics think the pair are not negro enough so they throw mud at them to make them go a darker shade of black. The critical muck which supplies the ammunition on this occasion is that, on these two albums, the brothers play interpretations of classical and neo-classical compositions by white folks such as Jolivet, Debussy and

Mussorgsky. I mean, so what? My gripe against the Marsalis brothers is that they are simply and literally out of

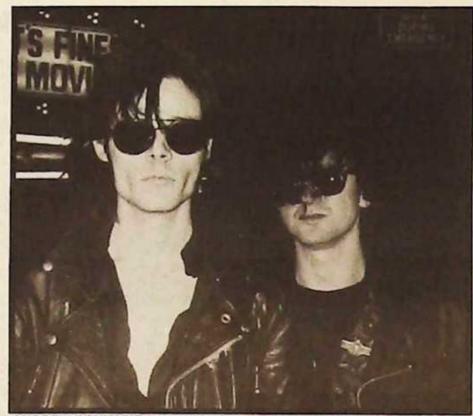
time in a musical sense by recording the orchestral fossils on these two records (which are digitally mastered, making the boredom factor even stronger)

Wynton might take The Philharmonia Orchestra through its venerable paces on his faultless expositions of Tomasi's 'Concerto For Trumpet, String Orchestra And Piano' but it's not very thrilling since it's somewhat

akin to listening to a robot build a car. Branford, one of the men who lends the mascara of legitimation to Sting's current jazz face, fares slightly better from my point of view. But only because some of the pieces he exercises such as Stravinski's 'Pastorale' and Satie's 'Gymnopedie No 3'

induce a bittersweet melancholy whenever I hear them In the painted history of music, these albums are no

more valuable than tracings. JACK BARRON

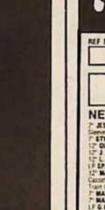

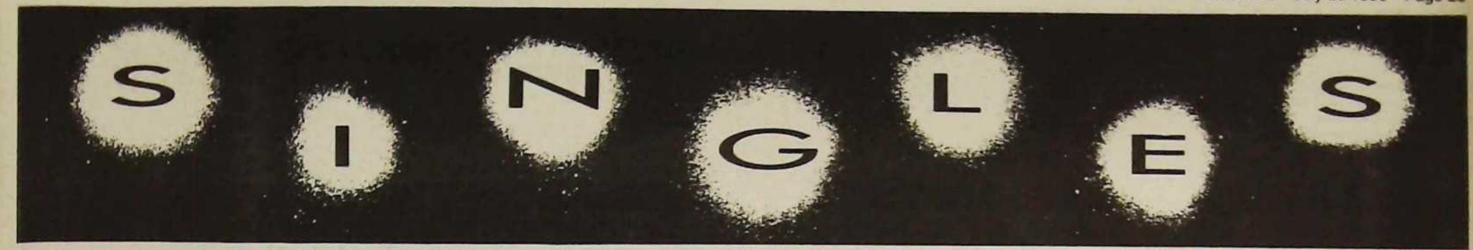

LATIN QUARTER 'America For Beginners'

(Arista) Once again, Latin Quarter are so calm and chillingly calculating in their social commentary that you begin to wonder if they really have it in them to get angry. Will they ever shout, Get out of Central America, you dirty, filthy interventionist warmongering blighters!? Well yes, they might. And indeed they may have on this record. The serenade put me to sleep so fast I could have missed it.

HINDU LOVE GODS 'Gonna Have A Good Time Tonight' (IRS Import)

When I was invited to the room of a select London hotel to hear some new demo material from Warren Zevon and heard some of the richest songwriting I'd ever heard, I was excited at the prospect of that talent teaming up with the sheer drive of REM.

But I'm disappointed. This single sounds like a pissabout jam session and the main narrative thrust is "Gonna have a good time tonight/Rock 'n' roll's gonna be alright". Ugh. A sad, opportunistic piece of work that does no credit to any of the artists involved.

DARYL HALL 'Dreamtime' (RCA) To use the vernacular of our friends on Kerrang!, 'Dreamtime', with its big back-beat, mad pulse and theatrical ELO style wall of guitars and keys is "well rocky". And of course, Hall's voice - being what is surely one of the great white soul voices of my lifetime at least - carries the whole thing off in a blaze of rock glory. There's something missing, though. A black moustache, maybe?

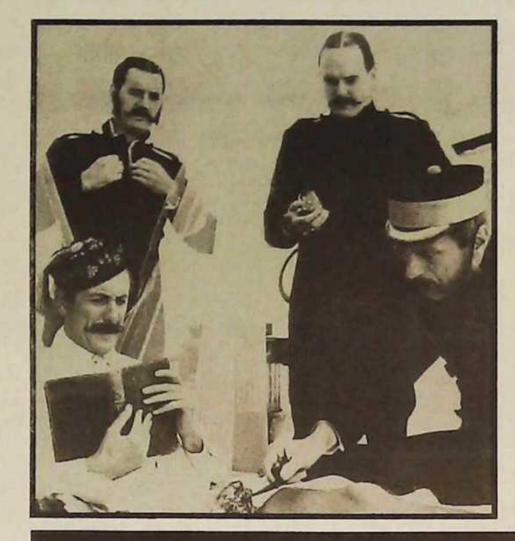
TWENTY FLIGHT **ROCKERS 'Johnny Seven'**

ZENO 'Love Will Live'

THE WALKING SEEDS 'Know Too Much' (Probe Plus) A while ago Sounds ran a fond obituary for a band from Liverpool called The Mel-O-Tones. It said that three members of the band would continue to kick seven types of shit all over the place while guitarist Martin Dempsey went off to find his real self.

The Walking Seeds are the shit-kickers. They have been joined by ex-Marshmallow Overcoat child-lunatic Barry 'Don't Call Me McCulloch' Sutton who, if anything, has made them sound even dirtier, smellier and heavier than before.

The Mel-O-Tonic rock 'n' roll speed and thrash has given way to an earthy splud, the overall result sounding more like primitive punk at its best. And when I say punk, I don't mean Punk. This music is thick, black and violently percussive. Frank Martin's voice is a man-eating animal that spits rusty nails straight into your eyeballs. It stamps on your knee-caps. The rhythm section from Bob 'The Slob' Parker and 'Rat Face' Jon Neesam gleefully pours liquid cement into your boots then dares you to dance.

'Know Too Much' is four tracks of rotting flesh. You can slam it down the throats of your enemies and make them gag to death.

Rocker' (Epic) And so, the man who is supposed to have invented the term 'hip hop'

LOVEBUG STARSKI 'House

whilst pretending to be a frog in the bath releases the follow-up to his massively rocky 'Amityville (The House On The Hill)' and falls flat on his fanny.

The very very fashionable guitar/rap ingredients are still there, but the whole thing just lumbers around like a drunk elephant singing "Love-Bug Star-Ski". Thankfully, it only does it for three minutes 46 seconds.

PETE SHELLEY 'Blue Eyes'

(Mercury) I used to hate Pete Shelley's voice. He always seemed to be trying to wrap his vowels around your balls only to slit them with his consonants. These days, though, he's mellowed. He sounds wiser, softer, a more charming proposition entirely.

And yet he's lost none of his aggression, it's just less physical. At this rate, I could end up liking the old whingebag.

NU SHOOZ 'Point Of No Return' (Atlantic) Another

follow-up to previously acquired mega-action. The bassline itself will carry this one into the clubs from where it will slip and slide and act as a chaperone to a million passionate exchanges of the sweat-spilling variety. Spinework in motion.

SPANDAU BALLET 'Fight For Ourselves'

(Reformation/CBS) I've been sat here knowing this was in the pile but afraid to touch it.

To people down here in London, Spandau Ballet must have once seemed fairly glamorous. They became poseurs almost because they wanted to show the poseurs how to pose properly. Up north we thought they were plonkers of the first order. We hated the sneaky, snivelly looking Kemp brothers almost as much as we hated

people asking us what a 'butty' was.

But as the singles ticked by, I came to like them in a funny kind of way. That tall bloke couldn't half sing and, well, they sort of won me over. So when our News Editor told me they'd been involved in a lot of complicated legal stuff and changed labels I thought it would be interesting to see if, after so long, they could still pull it off.

They can't. As artists they are effectively in a coma. The pomposity that came to scar their original sense of fun and pleasure has, during their enforced absence, seeped through the entire Spandau body. They chant desperately (and repeatedly) "Everybody (boom boom) we gotta fight for ourselves", leaving you with the feeling that it won't be long before you see a plastic jar on the bar of your local saying Help The Spands. Pitiful.

PAUL McCARTNEY 'Press' (Parlophone) There's a school of thought that says artists like Paul McCartney constipate the musical community (whatever that is), blocking the way for new, exciting talent. Bullshit. Though I have personally found most of his recent work pretty floppy, so is most of this so-called new, exciting talent. So who is constipating who around here?

What's probably more significant is that McCartney in 'Press' seems to be constipating himself. He's stuffed the lot in here, forging it all together in some wreckless attempt to manufacture the perfect "pop orchestra". It doesn't work. Everything sounds phoney, manufactured and, dare I say it, unfinished. Schubert it's

FOSTER PILKINGTON 'Listening Land' (Arista)

Earnest people; earnest, serious, crafted music. I know Tracey's voice drags a bit, leaving you with the impression that half of it is still back up her nose, but when will they get on Wogan? Will this record do it? Yes, I think it will. But that doesn't mean to say I like it. It's expansive, orchestral,

SENSIBLE SHOES 'Build Me An Empire' (Lambs To The Slaughter) A quasi-religious chant ceremony. Sounds like one of those new-fangled hymns the kids sing in school today. Give me 'Jerusalem'

any day.

CLASS WAR 'Better Dead Than Wed' (Mortarhate) A 'Dear Marje' type message to Sarah Ferguson from a collection of her closest friends; a variation on the singing/performing telegram. Hilarious. Some say in bad taste. Fergie will say "I obey".

THE CHICAGO BEARS SHUFFLIN' CREW 'The Superbowl Shuffle'

(Mercury) Flat, lifeless rap from The Bears, who include one William Perry whose neck is wider than his head. Laugh, I could have scored.

HOW WE LIVE 'Working Town' (Portrait) Soft,

bedroom melodrama; childlike reflections on the industrial community. A cross between the bleeding souls of Renaissance and Jim Diamond.

THE GLASS BEAT GAME 'Do You Remember' (Influx Records) There's

something strange and fascinatin' about women in rubber, but I haven't quite worked out what it is yet. 'Do You Remember', however, is a lot less fascinating than its singer's clobber. It half pumps along with nowhere to hide beyond the smallest of small dancefloors.

THE FOUNTAINHEAD 'Rhythm Method' (China

Records) As all good Catholics will tell you, it's the only way. Selling a song about it is a lot more difficult, though. Even if you use words like "head" and "penetration" and breathe heavily "rhy-thum me-thud oh, oh, ooh, ooh", nobody is going to believe you're talking about real sex when you sound so fagged out and limp. Put it away, please.

ODIAC ROAD WARRIORS RIDE AGAIN!

WARP FACTOR ONE

ISTEN CAREFULLY, and you may just be able to hear the cry: Zodiac! Zodiac! Zodiac! Zodiac! Zodiac!

That little voice has been talking in a lot of people's heads lately, building up like a dam about to burst.

We're talking Zodiac Mindwarp And The Love Reaction here, real scene stealers, and the London club circuit has been the domain they've ruled for the past six months, the bikerdelic warlords stomping every also-ran into the beer-sodden boards.

On the strength of one single – Zodiac's autobiographical statement 'Wild Child', made with a band cobbled together from Brilliant for that track only – the Love Reaction have been gigging furiously and desperately, and fronting the whole freaking caboodle is this . . . this person called Zodiac Mindwarp.

The intention is clear.

He wants your world.

The Love Reaction are the good guys in black, existing in a twilight zone of leather and metal, and they are offering not only their love, but their luurve. "Pretty baby, it's your lucky day – I bring you pleasure beyond all measure..."

Not so much lock up your daughters, more lock up the whole damn family.

And now the world waits as the first Love Reaction record proper, the mini-album 'High Priest Of Love', breaks its chains. Cobalt Stargazer, Slam Thunderhide, Kid Chaos and Mr Mindwarp would like you to leap on board the crazy train. Hold tight, for tonight we storm the gates of Heaven...

I meet up with the cosmic guitar gods at Peter Anderson's studio, where the band and their three faithful roadies, Smiffy, Gimpo and Evil Bastard, do their best to look utterly charming.

After the shoot, Zodiac, Evil and myself return to Zodiac's lived-in Clerkenwell flat, entrance to which involves someone scaling the wall to the first floor staircase, the key having been lost long ago.

A sense of the ridiculous creeps over me. I mean, Zodiac Mindwarp lives here . . . do his neighbours know what's happening on their doorstep?

WARP FACTOR TWO

E POSITION ourselves among the piles of comics, guitars and general debris, Zodiac showing off his new Flying V, which has tiny red lights inlaid in the fretboard.

"The guy said, Do you want one that plays well or one that looks good? And I said, I'll have that one, man..."

Evil sits impassively in the corner. Zodiac, lithe and laid back, begins to talk.

"I managed to blag my way into the Wham! party. It was like being on TV or something, all these characters walking around staring at each other. They completely ignored me. There was all this take snow in the doorway, that's what this stuff is on the floor. I brought some home in my pockets 'cos I liked it so much."

It has been said he's mad, you know. Stark staring bonkers. He throws off his jacket to reveal his many tattoos and I decide not to ask him if he is – not yet, anyway.

For me, the Mindwarp menace began earlier this year at Dingwalls, when about 50 people watched in horrified fascination as the fledgling Love Reaction howled and growled through 40 minutes of amplified lust. When did it begin for you, Zodiac?

"It just kind of . . . happened. It rolled along. I had this nutty idea one day, and then I just kept meeting people and it all began falling into place."

Almost like it was meant to . . .

"Ordained? Nah, it's my particular attitude where I take everything that happens and see the good side. The band, they just ... turned up. Kid Chaos arrived and said, I am your bass player ... almost like magic."

And with the recent signing to Phonogram, it's all falling into place very quickly. Just what is the secret?

"If I knew, I'd bottle it and sell it, set up an advice agency. It still hasn't sunk in. People say, Hey, everybody's talking about you, Zodiac! I do a show and come home, I don't see it.

"That's why it offends me when people say we're hyped. That couldn't be further from the truth.

"Time Out said we were a hype, which implies that we are cynical. Hype to me is synonymous with cynicism, it's a cancer that stifles people. Anyway, it's the antithesis of rock and roll, it's business, not emotion. Apparently, I've also got to get a producer, but I don't even know what they do.

"I really take things day to day, I never had a plan – I couldn't, I can't remember my mum's telephone number."

"Or where she lives," interjects Evil. "We were there for hours the other night, trying to find her house."

WARP FACTOR THREE

WAS born in Leeds, in a hospital with a lot of other babies. But I came to London and got a job here. I was married once, you see, and my ex-wife was great, she was quite happy coming home with the money and she didn't mind me being a slob. But she had a mother . . . who forced me to get a job.

"I worked on Flexi-Pop and Metal Fury, doing cartoons and illustrations and stuff. Flexi-Pop was quite innovative, it got busted for obscenity."

It seems you have quite a tight little family now, roadies and all . . .

"Yeah, we all dig each other. I've known Evil Bastard for years. I met him in a pub in Bradford – he had a bald head then, and he looked even more evil.

"Mr Smith, Smiffy, he's a real professional, he's been all over the world with bands. He's very choosy, and he came up to me after a gig and said, I'll work for you for nothing. He was once in the Royal Marines, so you don't argue. He knows everybody – Simon Le Bon came up to me at *The Tube* and said, Zodiac, I didn't know you had Smiffy working for you! Like, what?

"Gimpo was in the Falklands. These jets were flying over bombing them, and he ran out to take pictures of them. He thought it was just like a war film, until they started strafing him, so he got behind this big gun. He thought he was playing Space Invaders."

WARP FACTOR FOUR

ODIAC OBVIOUSLY likes women. Do women like Zodiac?

"Oh yeah, I have no problems in that direction. I've had a recent change of attitude as far as women are concerned, actually. From now on, I shall never tell a lie to a woman, as long as I live."

What's made you come to this decision?
"When you lie to a woman, you end up in terrible shit, because they never forget what you say. You say, I'll love you forever, baby, and the terrible thing is that you do mean it at the time. But there's this voice in your head going, You lying bastard. What are you doing?! And I'm starting to listen to that guy now..."

Women and sex do inspire your songs, though, 99 per cent of the time.

"I try, I really do try to write songs about other things, but I can't do it. It'll go for a week or two and nothing happens, then all of a sudden this sensation starts fluctuating around my trouser area. It creeps up my spine and into the back of my head, whizzes down through my neck and down my arms and out of my pen.

"I haven't had sexism thrust at me in the press yet. I'm sure it'll come. But it's sexy, what we do. You've seen the girls down the front at a gig. They like it, it's sex."

WARP FACTOR FIVE

TAKE a deep breath. I understand you went through a rather heavy time a few years back?

"Yeah, and I never really got out of it, I just manage to cover it up well now. I know I'm not crazy – the whole f***** world is crazy, not me! I'm perfectly normal in my world.

"You see, I spent a long time out of my brain. I went through the whole love trip, how the way you perceive reality is the way you perceive human beings . . . and everything seems funny to me now. I do care, nuclear war and stuff, but, like, I'm really into reading about outer space, right? You learn about quasars, which is when there's the entire destruction of a galaxy, billions of f***** stars, and that can happen any moment! That makes a continent seem pretty small peanuts to me . . ."

When your real name is mentioned, it's as if you're talking about another person.

"It's all me, though. Maybe I am schizophrenic, but I don't go up to people in the street and go, Uuurgh! I admit, I do talk to myself. I have conversations where I say, Hey Mark, you're being a real asshole! Then I reply, F*** off, Zodiac!

"With Zodiac, I guess he's my conscience, he just won't let me do things. He shouts at me, kicks me up the ass and says, You little asshole! Let me out of here! You f****, I'll send you crazy again! But I don't mind, it's a sort of benevolent schizophrenia. He always makes the right decision. I think..."

WARP FACTOR SIX

HY DO people like Zodiac Mindwarp?

"Because I like them. I like that audience, and perhaps they sense that. It's a two way thing, that's where the answer lies. I wouldn't like to analyse it too deeply, in case it stopped happening."

Do people look up to you?

"I've been called a dickhead for 15 years, and now people are saying, Zodiac, oh wow. Like, they called me a dickhead last year!

"But anyway, I think perhaps I am a dickhead. What am I doing, shaking my dick on stage? Oh, f*** it, people seem to like it . . ."

WARP FACTOR SEVEN

"OU KNOW we did The Tube, right? The best thing that happened to us was... you saw that kid who came on with The Smiths? Yeah, well he was in the hospitality room, which of course The Smiths never went in, and the kid was eyeing us up in our strange garments. He put Cobalt's jacket and shades on and then he said to Cobalt, I wish I was in your group instead of The Smiths! You got taste, kid! That was really brilliant..."

WARP FACTOR EIGHT

ODIAC'S RAMSHACKLE room is lined with book-filled shelves. Zodiac thinks, therefore he is.

"I spend a lot of time in my head, working out where electricity comes from. I sit here and I plug in my amp and it buzzes, so I think, Where the f***'s that buzzing coming from? I follow the lead to the plug, and I think, That goes all through the walls and under the ground to a power station. And then it's, What powers the power station? It's coal, isn't it? Right, what's coal? It's fossilized trees, and maybe a dinosaur pissed on that tree. This buzzing in my room is the sound of a dinosaur pissing! Then it's, Oh, stop it, Zodiac!"

WARP FACTOR NINE

O IS there a Zodiac philosophy, a code by which you live your life?
"I couldn't put it in a nutshell...
well, I could, actually, it's be yourself and don't give a damn. To know what's right and wrong, and to know when you are wrong, that takes a lot.

"You start respecting age, respecting old people's wisdom. They've lived longer than you and they do know. But they're not going to tell you if you don't want to know."

For a moment, Zodiac Mindwarp looks very vulnerable, squatting on his mattress, asking if he can have another roll-up.

MAXIMUM WARP POWER - FULL SPEED AHEAD

EY, IT'S like going to see a psychiatrist, doing an interview. We ought to do them on couches!"

In his own words, Zodiac Mindwarp is humble, modest and happy now that he's really found himself. In my words, the Love Reaction is the most exciting thing I've had the pleasure to witness in a long time.

And there's the realisation that, behind all the space-cadet verbals and the rampant press coverage, there is the music – it's the guts, not just a side-show – and the fact that even the sky is no limit for these people.

"If I get really rich, I'm going to buy a Space Harrier machine. It's this amazing video game, all mind blowing state-of-the-art graphics, where you actually sit in it, and get into this rocket ship. It throws you all over the place, and you fall out onto the floor of the amusement arcade, screaming and shouting.

and shouting . . . Aaaargh!"

I leave about now. Reluctantly.

This album is nothing more than a pathetic show, using a formula already spread thin, from a group who admirably fooled the media into believing their first three or four singles (which were admittedly quite good, but no more than quite good) were something special, transcendent even. I mean, if first year students need to have something to listen to while they mope around their bed-sits in self doubt, trying to find something to relate to in these wretched nursery rhymes, then I suppose this album has a use. After all, Steven and the boys have to make a crust, don't they?

As for Holland's review of the 'Bigmouth' single, just write the lyrics on a piece of paper and it should become obvious that the majority of these words would be more at home in a primary school playground than be taken at all seriously by the music press.

Well, make up your own mind, but anyone who can appreciate Motorhead, the brilliance of TV Personalities and even 1,000 Violins can't be all bad, can they? (Yes! - Ed.) A little word of advice, listen to 'The Queen Is Dead' again, deduct the appropriate stars mentally (about three and a half - the packaging isn't bad) and store the experience for future use. Remember, as someone once said, 'That joke isn't funny anymore'. Bury these fossils! -Joskin & Marigold

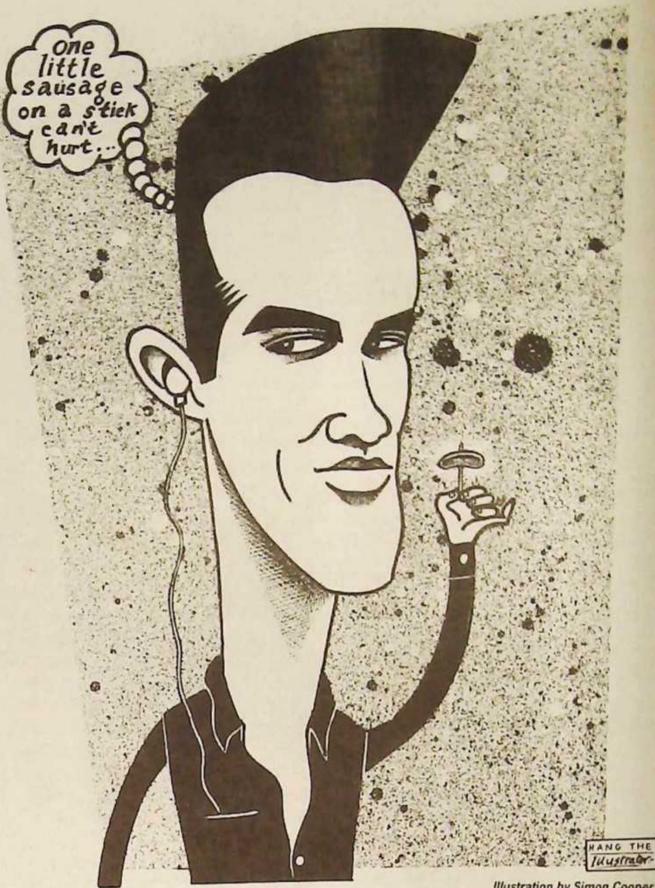

about fancy backdrops and big light shows and theatrics and choreographed playing. It's the real thing, and it's either exciting and brilliant or it's totally shit.

"I like the feeling of losing control when we play. I'd hate to walk out on stage and feel like I was going through the motions. You know, like those groups – they play the same numbers every night in the same order. When you go to a Sputnik show, you don't know what's going to happen next.

"And the other great thing is being there, being part of the event. Those are the groups I always loved. The ones where you spent ages thinking about what you were going to wear. When you went to see Ziggy or the Pistols, you weren't going there to see the album performed; it was to be there. To be part of it." (Hold close-up of Tony's face.)

Journalist: "Do you feel in control of the rest of it?"

Tony: "When the first record came out, I was totally, I00 per cent in control and now that it's taken off and exploded so huge worldwide, it becomes like there ain't enough hours in the day. One of the worst problems I wrestle with is to maintain control over the finest details and not to become part of that bullshit rock 'n' roll circus. It's real hard and I'm being honest here...

"You always think, It's so easy, why do groups screw up? You know how groups are brilliant when you first go see them and then they become really big and somehow it ain't special no more? It's because of the big stadiums and big everything else, and those

little details that made it special for you aren't there any more.

"Like The Cramps had it until they played Hammersmith Odeon. I don't wanna see The Cramps play Hammersmith Odeon – it ain't about that. And suddenly they've lost control.

"At the moment I'm clinging to the empire by my fingertips – I can't stand it if it's not special. It feels like we'll have to slow up just to hang onto it. People say to me, Well, do you wanna sell eight million or one million? And I have to say, I wanna sell one million because that's the way I like it."

Journalist: "Is this a reaction to what happened to Gen X? What were you like then?"

Tony: "Totally not in control. Totally didn't know what I was doing. I had my head up my arse. I thought it was just about music, about revolution."

Journalist: "How did Fleet Street manage to slip through your net of total control? Had you taken the backlash into account?"

Tony: "No, but I guess it was always obvious that a group who came up as fast as us and took off like an absolute rocket, that they would try and shoot us down just as quick.

"No, you can't control Fleet Street, but the whole truth of the press thing is that if you're a person who uses press to sell records you gotta know that one day they're gonna bury you with it as well. You wanna play that game, you gotta accept that, and we'll just have to get down in the mud and slog it out.

"The weird thing is that people either love us or absolutely hate us. I've never known such hate for a group."

Journalist: "Had you ever considered that possibility?"

Tony: "No, I kinda thought everybody would love us. I thought maybe that some people wouldn't like us, but I didn't expect people to loathe us to the extent that we were some sort of threat to their existence."

Journalist: "Why EMI? Wouldn't the Sputnik story have been more convincing on bootleg?"

Tony: "No that would have been like."

Tony: "No, that would have been like one of those commune groups – like Crass. You need the big machine, but you driving it, not it driving you. And there's something about EMI that's so brilliantly English rock 'n' roll. EMI's like the Sainsbury's of British rock 'n' roll. You kind of trust the product."

Journalist: "Didn't you lose some control by

allowing Georgio Moroder to produce you?
Wouldn't it have been better to do it yourself?"

Tony: "No, you can't do it yourself, that's a big mistake. There has to be someone who tells you when you're being an asshole."

Journalist: "How did you feel about having someone telling you what to do?"

Tony: "I hated every second of someone telling me what to do. Me and Moroder in the same studio was like the worst clash of egos ever. It was almost like he didn't want me in the studio, because I don't think anyone's ever said no to Moroder before. But you almost need someone there to hate. It's like the boss syndrome. You need someone to blame."

Journalist: "I think where you blew it, strategy-wise, was when you started talking about it. Your motto should have been: Never apologise; never explain."

Tony: "I know, you take the sting out of it. Unfortunately, it began to feel irresponsible bandying about phrases like 'designer violence' when it actually meant some kid walking out of a concert with stitches in his head, and I began to feel bad about that. I had to explain."

Journalist: "But why say anything about designer violence in the first place? Why not let people figure it out for themselves? That's what I loved about the masterplan. You promised you'd never do interviews. What made you change your mind?"

(Extreme close-up of Tony's face.)

Tony: "Well, we said we wouldn't do interviews to start with... but what it was... we wanted it so bad... Five years, we'd practised. Five years we'd talked about it. We lived being the greatest group in the world and never told anyone. You know, Jane, that one day in this same room I told you the whole story, how it was going to be? And what's weird is — it happened. Just the way I said. The whole ghastly story unfolded like some Frankenstinian dream.

"And I couldn't keep it a secret. I wanted to tell people because we felt it was so great. We wanted to say, Look, this is what it's about. This is how we formed the group. It was such a brilliant tale, I couldn't resist telling people. And once you get one front cover, it's like a drug, like seeing how much you can get away with. "

Sound effects. Doorbell. Footsteps up stairs.

Neal X enters, in streetclothes, minus quiff.

Neal: "It's OK, Tony, I've brought the bible

back (drops Led Zeppelin biography Hammer Of The Gods on coffee table). Come on, Jane, the taxi's waiting, it'll cost you a fortune."

Journalist: "I'm not paying for it." Neal: "Yes, you are. I haven't got any money."

Ad-lib argument which ends with Tony slipping Neal £30.

15 Interior. Night-time. Close-up of sashimi being placed on table. Pull back to reveal Neal X and journalist in Japanese restaurant.

Neal: "Managing ourselves? It's kept us sane. Stopped us turning into complete babies. You know, those groups who have to get their manager to get their bottles of Scotch and hookers for them."

DISSOLVE INTO

16 Interior. Night-time. Dinner table. Pull back to reveal party at Georgio Moroder's white marble palace in LA. Sigue Sigue Sputnik are in their element.

MUSIC UP: 'Atari Baby'.

Neal: "We went to Georgio and said, We've written this ballad, and it was great. You could sing anything over the top of it – 'Walk On The Wild Side', 'Imagine'... And we gave it to him and he stayed overnight and recorded this song he wrote over it called 'She Was Only 16 But She Was All Woman', which I think says something about Georgio Moroder.

"And we said, That's terrible. So we put Martin in the studio and he made up all this stuff and we wrote down all the words that fitted."

synth by programming his SDS 9 and hitting his pads. This was great news for the SDS 9 owner but users of earlier Simmons products such as the SDS 5, 7 and 8 were left MIDI-less and could only look on in envy.

To solve that problem, Simmons have introduced two interface units - the TMI and the MTM - which enable you to use your drum pads not only to trigger any of the Simmons electronic drum brains but also any other MIDI instruments. And the MTM will also translate almost any audio signals into MIDI code. So you can trigger either a Simmons drum brain or any MIDI synths from a miked-up acoustic kit, or even from sounds already recorded on your multi-track recording tape in the studio.

Furthermore, as Simmons have also brought out their SDE (Simmons Drum Expander) for you to use all your MIDI interfaces on producing a vast variety of interesting sound possibilities ranging from African log drums to all kinds of tuned percussion - a vast creative field really has been opened up. As I discovered

watching Barry Watts at Simmons using one set of pads to run through interesting and everchanging sets of sounds and effects.

As you will have guessed from the price, the TMI is the smaller brother of the MTM and converts the trigger signals from Simmons pads into MIDI code. It's a slim rack mountable unit the same size, and finished in the same colours, as the new SDS 1000 drum kit brain. The rear panel houses the trigger input channels into which you would plug your pads and five trigger output channels from which you can trigger, for example, bass drum, snare and three toms. or any other sounds of your choice from any of the Simmons drum brains available. Also on the rear panel is the MIDI output to your synth, SDE or any other MIDI voicing unit.

Next to that there is a cassette dump facility so that you can store all your programmed information on to tape, and also an output marked 'suitcase kit', which is another new product Simmons have in the

pipeline.

Finally there is a socket for your dual footswitch option which enables you to run through your various programmed options on the TMI with a tap of your foot.

The front panel of the TMI is split into two halves: on the left hand side there are the eight sensitivity controls that adjust the sensitivity of each channel; underneath each one is a trigger LED which comes on when the TMI detects a trigger signal at the relevant channel.

These LEDs also play a secondary role in indicating the chosen channel when you are programming a patch.

The right hand side of the TMI contains two segment displays, a MIDI channel LED and a MIDI note program LED. These light up to show you whether you are programming a MIDI channel, MIDI note or MIDI program change. To the right of these displays are five buttons which operate selection storage and display facilities.

Information is stored in the TMI in the form of programmed patches - such as which MIDI channel you have selected, which of the

eight MIDI notes available you have selected to be triggered by which pad, etc etc. You can store up to 99 different patches in the TMI's memory.

All information is programmed into one of the 99 patches, that can in turn be sequenced into your preferred running order and selected during playing by use of the footswitch, instantly changing the sounds on your kit or individual pads.

The MTM is an interface just like the TMI and does everything the TMI can do and a lot more. It is an eight channel unit designed to translate audio (analog) signals into MIDI code and MIDI signals into triggers to drive other analog synthesisers. It's larger than the TMI but finished in the same way in black with blue highlighting.

The top of the rear panel houses the eight input channels which accept either jack or XLR inputs. Below these to the left you will find eight analog trigger outputs which could be used to trigger the SDS 5, 7, or 8. Next to these are the

footswitch and cassette dumping outputs, your connections for MIDI facility and an input for a selector pad as used with the SDS 7. for which it was primarily designed.

The front panel houses, as well as the trigger sensitivity controls, a whole batch of programming buttons with a display window on the right hand side of the unit to show you exactly what you are doing.

The really big difference with the MTM is that the additional facilities include a method of adjusting an incoming trigger so that the signal need not come from an electronic drum pad. The MTM will accept signals from many sources and would be invaluable in studios where a recorded sound may be required to trigger drum voices such as the SDS 7 or 9 or any other MIDI-controlled voicing system. For example, a single hit on a recorded acoustic tom can be the trigger for a whole sequence of notes and drum sounds.

Successful triggering always seemed to be a problem in studios before, but not with the MTM: you can easily replace all your old prerecorded multitrack drum sounds with new ones. MTM will also convert MIDI signals into analog triggers allowing drum machines and sequencers easy access to the SDS 7 and other Simmons drum units.

Programming the MTM is also done in the form of patches. Another big plus with the MTM is its effects bank, which gives you access to dozens of programmable effects like echoes, sequences and the like. whereby you could program a bass sequence to begin just by the striking of a particular pad. Chordal effects are also available, with pad dynamics controlling the number of notes in the chord!

There are ten factory and 30 user effects in the MTM; 20 factory and 99 user patches can be stored and ten sequences of up to 100 patches can also be stored in the MTM and selected via footswitch.

The MTM is a remarkably creative tool and I'm sure its versatility would stretch as far as you ever wanted it to
