ALICE IN WONDERLAND, the focal point of the psychedelic revival which is staged weekly at Gossips in Soho, will have its own album out on Flicknife at the beginning of September. 'Live At Alice In

Wonderland (A Pretty Smart Way To Catch A Lobster)' features live tracks from Voodoo Child, Underground Zero, Gwyllym And The Raspberry Flavoured Cat, The Spooks and Webcore, although some of the above are better known under different names.

Instead of selling advertising between the tracks, the album has deranged DJ links by The Doctor.

MEATLOAF will finally release the follow-up to 1984's 'Bad Attitude' next month.

He's been recording the new album most of this year in Frankfurt and the first single, 'Rock 'N' Roll Mercenaries', comes out on Arista next week.

An extensive British and European tour is being organised for early next year.

CREATIVE RECORDINGS AND SOUND SERVICES who are better known under a shorter name - play their first gig in nearly two years at the Fife "Nagasaki Nightmare" free gig at Aberdour Silver Sands on August 9.

They'll be joined by Alternative, Annie Anxiety, Shattered Family, Oi Polloi, Dead Loss Angels and Swarzenbergur.

THE DOORS' documentary of their 1968 British visit, The Doors Are Open, gets a rare screening on TV this week.

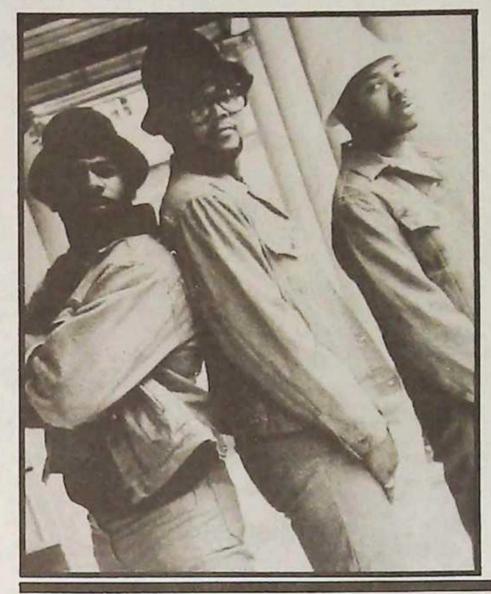
Made by Granada, the film follows Jim Morrison and the band through the British leg of their European tour, and includes footage of their London Roundhouse gig together with interviews.

It's being shown by Central, Tyne Tees, Harlech and Ulster on August 5, Anglia and HTV 6, London Weekend 8 and Border 10. Yorkshire don't get round to screening it until December and Granada don't yet appear to have allocated a spot for their own film.

UFO have parted company with "temporary" keyboard player Paul Raymond - who's been with them temporarily since they reformed in 1984.

The split happened midway through an American tour, and leaves Phil Mogg and the band to complete the tour as a quartet. But the decision was apparently "mutual", if sudden.

UFO are due back in Britain later this month and will be recording a new album in the autumn. British gigs are possible at the end of the year.

RUN DMC come over for their first British shows next month at London's Hammersmith Odeon on September 12 and 13.

They'll be bringing over the show that's been packing out stadiums across America this summer, complete with support slots from Whodini, LL Cool J and The Beastie Boys.

Tickets for the most successful rap group so far are priced at £7.50, £6.50 and £5.50.

Meanwhile, Run DMC release their version of the Aerosmith classic, 'Walk This Way', on London at the end of this month. Taken from their 'Raising Hell' album, the video features Aerosmith matching Run DMC beat for beat.

George gets fined for heroin; Steve kicks the habit but cops it for stolen cheque book

BOY GEORGE was fined £250 at London's Marylebone Court last week after pleading guilty to possessing an unspecified amount of heroin.

His barrister told the court that Boy George had been using heroin for six months, but had started to fight his addiction before police raided his St Johns Wood home early in July.

He was arrested on July 12 at the clinic of Dr Meg Patterson, where he was undergoing neuro-electronic therapy. And Crown prosecutor Brian McArdle confirmed that no drugs were found at the singer's house or on him at any time.

McArdle said that Boy

George was arrested as a result of a police investigation - code named "Operation Culture" - into the activities of drug dealers.

This operation culminated in police raids on five addresses. including Boy George's house. His brother Kevin O'Dowd is currently on bail accused of plotting to supply heroin to Boy George.

After his arrest, Boy George was interviewed for 90 minutes at Harrow police station in the presence of his solicitor, but he refused to make any comment on his involvement with heroin and his dependence on it.

The interview stopped when Boy George said he felt unwell but continued a short while later when he said he wanted to speak to the arresting officer without his solicitor present.

McArdle said that Boy George then told the officer he had been using heroin for about six months and said he

had bought the drug about a hundred times although he later corrected this to about 20 times.

He told the police he paid £100 per gramme of heroin, which he took by snorting it. Asked if he was prepared to identify his suppliers, he said: "I will help you all I can. I only blame myself for what has happened to me. I have got myself into this and I will have to fight. I have been really bad. you know."

His defending barrister. Raymond Sturgess, said it was a rare decision taken by the authorities to charge a person who had not been caught in actual possession of drugs and who had already been admitted to a clinic for treatment. George had started to cure his addiction some time before his arrest, he added, and had made a witness statement to the police.

The magistrate, Mr Geoffrey Noel, said that Boy George had "faced up to this charge

ALL-NIGHT rock TV starts up on an experimental basis this Friday on Yorkshire TV.

Music Box, Richard
Branson's cable TV channel
which already reaches an
audience of four million in
Europe and a few thousand
in the Swindon area, will be
screened by Yorkshire TV from
soon after midnight to 6am
every night for three months.

As well as videos, the show will consist of interviews, competitions and record reviews.

Yorkshire TV have also joined the BBC and Tyne Tees in reaching an agreement with the BPI over payment for screening rock videos.

The Music Box experiment will be closely watched by other ITV companies – who haven't yet agreed to pay for using videos – and the show may well become networked if the viewing figures are encouraging.

GENE LOVES JEZEBEL drummer Marcus Gilvear has quit the band due to the time-honoured "musical differences", despite the fact that the band's 'Discover' album has just shot straight to the top of the indie charts.

The new drummer is Chris Bell, who has played with them in the past and has also had stints with Spear Of Destiny and The Thompson Twins.

Marcus is considering offers from other bands, although he may finally go to America if nothing suitable transpires here.

SAXON have a new bassist – Paul Johnson from Featherstone (second from left, above) – who'll be making his live debut at the Reading Festival on August 23.

The previous bassist, Steve Dawson, quit for a solo career after the band's world tour finished in May. Singer Biff Byford still had no ideas about who would replace him when he took his car into a garage to get the tyres changed.

"While I was waiting, I could hear some tasty bass lines coming from the tyre store," he explained to Sounds.

It was 24-year-old Paul practising between customers, and he wasn't slow to accept Biff's offer of an audition either.

Within weeks, he was recording with the rest of the group for their next album, 'Rock The Nations', which is scheduled for release by EMI on September 15.

Another new face in the Dutch recording studio was Elton John, who plays piano on two of the album tracks – 'Northern Lady' and 'Party 'Till You Puke'.

Following their Reading Festival appearance, Saxon head off on a European tour but return to Britain in October for a ten-date tour.

They begin at Preston Guildhall October 4 and then play Manchester Apollo 5, Edinburgh Playhouse 6, Newcastle City Hall 7, Birmingham Odeon 9, Lincoln Ritz 10, London Hammersmith Odeon 11, Sheffield City Hall 12, Hull City Hall 13, Ipswich Gaumont 14.

Tickets are £6 and £5.50 everywhere except Preston, Lincoln, Hull and Ipswich, which are all £6.

JEAN MICHEL JARRE has his spectacular Houston concert — which has given him a place in the Guinness Book Of Records with the biggest ever live audience for one show — screened on BBC2 on August 10.

Rendez-Vous Houston – A City In Concert will attempt to portray on television Jarre's concert in April that used the Houston skyline as a backdrop with computer-controlled laser effects and fireworks and vast projections onto the sides of skyscrapers. The show was part of the city's 150th anniversary celebrations.

But Jarre's place in the record books may not stand too long. Japanese synthesiser wizard Tomita is planning a similar spectacular using the Statue Of Liberty, New York's Manhattan skyline and various islands in the Hudson River on September 13.

Tomita's extravaganza is called 'In Praise Of The Earth' and will incorporate roving helicopter lighting systems, interweaving lasers, speaker ships and a water-borne orchestra drawn from the Juliard School Of Music. Tomita will oversee the whole show from a pyramid capsule suspended above Battery Island.

The event will celebrate not only the Statue Of Liberty's centenary but also the 30th anniversary of Japanese instrument company Casio, who have supported Tomita's keyboard habit for several years.

Tomita has already repaid Casio by launching their professional keyboard range with a concert on the Danube in front of 80,000 people. The audience for the New York concert, for which Francis Ford Coppola is among the advisers, will be many times greater. The Japanese will watch the show live via satellite.

HUEY LEWIS AND THE NEWS, who had their biggest British hit so far at the end of last year with 'The Power Of Love', have a new single out next week on Chrysalis called 'Stuck With You'.

There's a new album coming next month and a British tour in the pipeline for October.

THE HUMAN LEAGUE are back with a new single on Virgin this weekend called 'Human'. It was written and produced by Jimmy Jam and Terry Lewis and there are extended, acapella and instrumental versions available on the 12-inch.

There's a Human League album coming out in September, but no further details are available yet.

LIGHT A BIG FIRE return to London just a few weeks after their Marquee date. While recording their first single for Siren, they'll be appearing at Harlesden Mean Fiddler on August 6.

He said that Strange, recently cured from heroin addiction, had continued drinking at home after the party and the following morning had set out "in a drunken state" and obtained £300 by deception at the Royal Bank Of Scotland in Tottenham Court Road, and then attempted to get another £90 out of the bank's Notting Hill branch.

He added that Strange, who was now living on £150 a week from his manager plus £1,000 a year royalties, was deeply ashamed by the "one-off offence" and had tracked down the cheque book's owner to apologise to him.

Magistrate Mr Quentin
Campbell said that he was
prepared to accept that the
original theft from the
Limelight took place when
Strange had been drinking
heavily.

But he told him: "You must have sobered up enough to get from your home in Fulham to the bank in Tottenham Court Road and then to the bank in Notting Hill." SIMPLE MINDS are recording their Paris concerts this weekend for a double live album in the New Year.

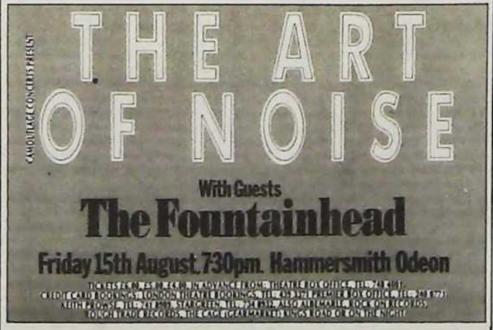
The band still have tours in Australia, New Zealand and Japan to undertake before taking a long break after more than a year spent on the road. They are unlikely to emerge again before 1988.

STEPS AHEAD, the American jazz rockers who include sax player Michael Brecker and bassist Darryl Jones (who's just finished touring with Sting), have a new album out on Elektra this week called 'Magnetic'.

KIN KELLY, former front man for Merseyside's Rhythm And Blues Incorporated, has a solo single called 'One Way Flight' released by Gipsy this week in preparation for an album and tour in the autumn.

ZUICE, "the latest in a line of British soul talent", have their first single out on Phonogram this week called 'Everyone's A Winner' produced by Stevie Wonder's bass player Nathan Watts.

MANUAL SCAN emerge from their San Diego garage to issue their first album called simply 'Manual Scan' on HI-LO (through Nine Mile) this month.

THE EMOTIONS have their late '70s hits 'Flowers' and 'Best Of My Love' packaged up on one single by Streetwave who've also combined The Gibson Brothers' 'Party Tonight' and 'Lola'.

THE HOOTERS, the Philly five-piece whose 'Nervous Nights' album has been resident in the US Top 100 for the past year, have a single called 'All You Zombies' out on CBS this week.

BOBBY'S BOYS, a trio of Robert De Niro nuts, combine business with pleasure by putting a De Niro scratch narrative on their 'Bobby Don't Dance' single on Oval this week.

MIGHTY MIGHTY, who prefer surfing with the tide out (I), release their second single on Girlie (through Nine Mile) called 'Is There Anyone Out There?' this week.



BROTHER BEYOND, a North London quartet, have signed to EMI and have a single out this week called 'I Should Have Lied'. An album and "live event" will follow next month.

GONE TO EARTH, who are taking folk music "by the throat and dragging and kicking it into the 1990's", have a single out on Probe Plus this week called 'Blinded In Love'.

POPMAN, who used to be a member of The Bloomsbury Set, sets off on his own with a cover of Dylan's 'Just Like A Woman' on Hem C Hay Records (geddit?).



CAMPER VAN BEETHOVEN drag 'Take The Skinheads Bowling' kicking and screaming from their 'Telephone Free Landslide Victory' album and force it out as a single on Rough Trade this week.

BACKTRACKS

ATLANTIC RECORDS indulge themselves with a luxuriant look-back over the first 27 years of their black music catalogue and come up with a monstrous 14-album box set called 'Atlantic Rhythm And Blues 1947-1974' which is also available in seven separate double albums for those unable to raise a second mortgage.

Although the 142 tracks could easily have been filled by Greatest Hits, the compilers have rounded up many minor gems that tend to get left off compilations, plus a sprinkling of rarities and curios.

'Volume 1 1947-1952' starts with jiving, jazz-heavy instrumentals from Joe Morris, Tony Grimes and Frank Culley (whose sax solo on 'Cole Slaw' spawned a million imitators). Vocals arrive with the label's first hits – Stick McGhee's 'Drinkin' Wine Spo-Dee-O-Dee' and Ruth Brown's loudmouth blues 'So Long'. And the roster spreads out to encompass the laid-back shouting of Professor Longhair, early doo-wop from The Cardinals and The Clovers and slow blues from Big Joe Turner and Ray Charles.

'Volume 2 1952-1955' finds Big Joe Turner "inventing" rock and roll with 'Honey Hush' and 'Shake Rattle And Roll' while Ray Charles starts to sort out his own trademarks. Clyde McPhatter leads The Drifters into an orgy of doo-wop and The Clovers give Steve Miller a song to rip off for 'The Joker' called 'Lovey Dovey'.

'Volume 3 1955-1958' sees Atlantic well placed as R&B metamorphoses into rock 'n' roll and white kids start buying the records. The Clovers, LaVern Baker and Ruth Brown all benefit with 'Love Love Love', 'Jim Dandy' and 'Lucky Lips' (yep, the one later covered by Cliff). The Coasters' formula sets up a string of hits and Leiber And Stoller even help Big Joe Turner continue his success with 'The Chicken And The Hawk'. Ivory Joe Hunter arrives with his smooth voice and crossover appeal and gives Atlantic their first major hit with 'Since I Met You Baby'.

'Volume 4 1958-1962' follows the genius of Ray Charles up to 'Let The Good Times Roll' via 'What'd I Say', while The Coasters chalk up more hits and The Drifters revive their fortunes with and without Ben E King. But Atlantic's smartest move is to pick up a Carla Thomas single called 'Gee Whiz' on the Satellite label. Not only do they get a Top Ten hit, but Satellite becomes Stax, and Atlantic can plug into the Memphis sound, courtesy of Booker T & The MGs, Solomon Burke, The Mar-Keys, and William Bell, whose 'You Don't Miss Your Water' is claimed to be the first soul record to make the charts.

'Volume 5 1962-1966' wraps up the careers of LaVern Baker, The Drifters and Ben E King (with the melodramatic 'I (Who Have Nothing)' while pursuing the Stax connection with Otis Redding, Rufus Thomas and Sam And Dave. A link-up with Muscle Shoals brought Percy Sledge, Jimmy Hughes ('Neighbor Neighbor') and Chris Kenner (who wrote and recorded the original 'Land Of 1,000 Dances'). And from Nashville label Dial came Joe Tex. Not that Atlantic couldn't still find their own talent as tracks by Doris Troy, Esther Phillips, Don Covay and Wilson Pickett prove. And wedged in between this lot is The Capitols' only hit 'Cool Jerk' and Nat Kendricks & The Swans, aka James Brown's backing group, doing the 'Mashed Potato'.

'Volume 6 1966-1969' comes closest to a "Greatest Hits" package dominated by Aretha Franklin and Wilson Pickett with Otis Redding, Eddie Floyd, Sam And Dave, and Joe Tex all weighing in with their finest. But there's still room for Otis' duet with Carla Thomas, 'Tramp', another Booker T And The MG's classic ('Hip Hug-Her'), King Curtis' 'Memphis Soul Stew' music lesson, The Bar-Kays 'Soul Finger' instrumental, Clarence Carter's chart breakthrough with 'Slip Away', Roberta Flack's 'The First Time Ever I Saw Your Face' (which lay dormant for three years), RB Greaves' "soft" soul hit 'Take A Letter, Maria', and has-been Brook Benton's revival with 'Rainy Night In Georgia', not to mention Archie Bell & The Drells' soaraway 'Tighten Up'.

'Volume 7 1969-1974' finds Atlantic adjusting to the '70s after their phenomenal success of the '60s. There's still an element of deep soul with Aretha, King Floyd's 'Groove Me' and Betty Wright's 'Clean Up Woman', but Donny Hathaway heralds a smoother sound (with or without Roberta Flack) that's echoed by Clarence Carter ('Patches'), Tyrone Davis ('Turn Back The Hands Of Time'), The Persuaders ('Thin Line Between Love And Hate'), and The Spinners. Beginning Of The End's 'Funky Nassau' is a portent of more changes to come. You also get time to wallow in the full 11-minute version of Leslie McCann and Eddie Harris's soul-jazz spectacular 'Compared To What'.

JANNE SCHAFFER, the Swedish guitarist who worked on most of Abba's hits, has an instrumental solo album called 'Traffic' issued this month by Shanghai (through Counterpoint).

WILL ACKERMAN, guitarist and founder of Windham Hill, has a new album out this week (through A&M) called 'Conferring With The Moon'.

BOOMERANG, who used to be Kid Creole's Coconuts, have their own self-titled album out on Atlantic this week. But The Kid is still on hand to provide the occasional song when they've run out of covers such as 'These Boots Are Made For Walkin''.

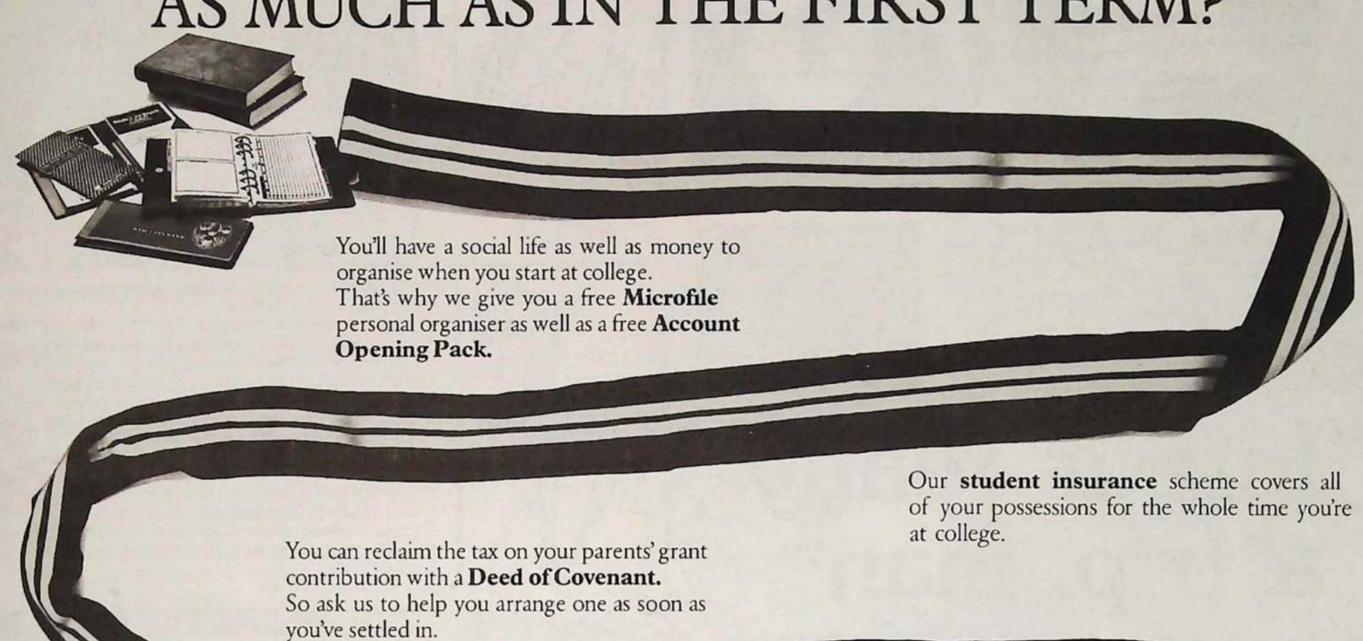
AL JARREAU's new album on Warners this week is 'L Is For Lover' and the title track was written for him by Scritti Politti's Green Gartside and Dave Gamson.

IF IT'S widely known that Wham! weren't mightly impressed with China on their legendary barrier-busting tour of the country a while back, then it's probably less well-known that, aside from a few thousand Western popbesotted oriental adolescents, the feelings were pretty mutual.

That, at least, was the impression gained by icelander Jacob Magnusson, when, earlier this year, his band Strax became only the third Western pop outfit to scale the Great Wall (always supposing you count Jean Michel Jarre as the first).

Strax, Iceland's number one band (no kidding), were officially invited to play by the Chinese Government, after books, records and videos by the group, plus a couple of Jacob's solo Jazz albums, had convinced officials that culturally speaking, the Scandinavians had a little more to offer than Britain's erstwhile number one pop

airneads

"Evidently the Chinese were left with a bad taste in the mouth after Wham!. They didn't want to know about any more pop groups. The elderly officials had found Wham! too aggressive, but it seems they would've accepted them If Wham! hadn't come back and slagged China off," says Jacob.

"When we got there, we found we could understand both sides. If you go to China and try to force yourselves down their throats, spending big bucks and paying people right, left and centre to do every little job for you like Wham! did, you're bound to be taken to the cleaners. It might be a communist country but they're all shrewd businessmen too!"

The reception for Strax was somewhat different. After each concert on the three-week tour, frall old men would come to the front of the stage and present the band with flowers – Intended, perhaps, especially for Ragga, the

band's girl singer.

And during the visit, Strax signed a recording deal with the official Chinese record label, which will result in a live album from the tour being released there. They also took a British film-crew with them, and as a result of that, a documentary of the tour should be getting an airing on Beeb TV later this year.

Meanwhile, Brits seeking out a little cold comfort shouldn't have too long to walt; Strax recorded most of an album in London earlier this year with producer Stuart Coleman, and an autumn release is planned, along with live dates.

Memory Jogger: Jacob and Ragga were previously one half of superior electro combo Bone Symphony, who released a critically acclaimed EP on Capitol a few years back, held a bizarre but pleasant reception at the Icelandic Embassy in London to promote it, and promptly disappeared without trace. 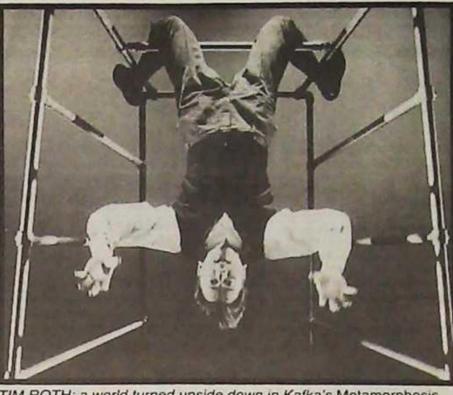

TIM ROTH: a world turned upside down in Kafka's Metamorphosis

A CHANGE OF HEART

METAMORPHOSIS

Mermaid Theatre

STAGED BY the irrepressible Steven Berkoff, Kafka's classic tale of the beetle-man loses none of the haunting clarity, but blows up the underlying humour until it dominates the surface. It achieves the near impossible feat of bringing the tale to the stage not only intact but miraculously refurbished.

As the son Gregor, Tim Roth brings a violence to the role, which Berkoff himself explains as "a fighter, a snarling angry thing trapped in his room". Transformed into the beetle overnight, Roth seethes and suffers, but the comic touch is forever bobbing underneath it all.

His momentum is perfectly met with the pulse of Berkoff (Mr Samsa), Linda Marlow (Mrs Samsa) and the magnetic Saskia Reeves as Gregor's erratic sister. Together, they let the tension drip lightly before the whole horror suddenly explodes in your

Saskia is particularly adept at switching between becalmed, bewitched innocent and raging obsessive with magnificent ease. She emerges more angel than devil - some of the most dramatic sleights of hand I've witnessed on a stage.

Berkoff's interpretation should not be missed. His treatment, every smudge as chilling as the Kafka story, takes the metaphor and wrings the anguish out with astonishing ease. Roth's beetle claws at the wall in grim desperation and finally plunges to the ground with a resounding crack. The ensuing silence is deafening. But the real terror is just starting. . .

The brilliance peels off the walls and lands in a fantastically muddled heap. Scraping the heights.

YELLOW EARTH

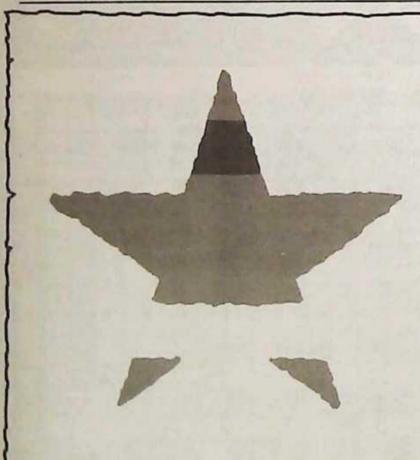
(ICA) A FOLK story from China. A soldier visits a distant rural community to research folk songs. He stays with a prematurely old man and his son and daughter, the girl about to be sent into a preordained marriage. Feelings run deep, but the young Communist cadre cannot break the tradition. When the soldier leaves, the little world is swallowed by

tragedy. Chinese cinema is tied to moralising plots and awkward, clucking characters; Yellow Earth, ironically, breaks loose from tradition by embedding itself in the deepest Chinese folklore. Director Chen Kaige uses images of huge landscapes and ageless faces to explain his story.

The songs that the soldier collects split the clear blue air like shrill birdsong. The land is run on ceremony and custom. Like him, we are mystified but bewitched. The closing minutes become a scorched, magnificent coda to the tale.

Much of the technique is borrowed. The desolate country works like one of John Ford's Monument Valley settings, and the play of characters is as painfully simple and clear as it is in a Satyajit Ray film. But Chen Kaige brings a mystical confidence to his picture, a sense of colour that's breathtaking. Yellow Earth is rare new ground.

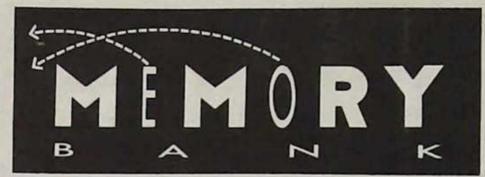

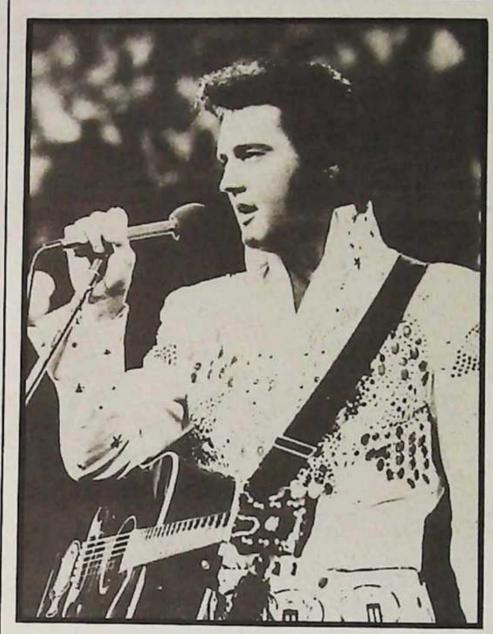

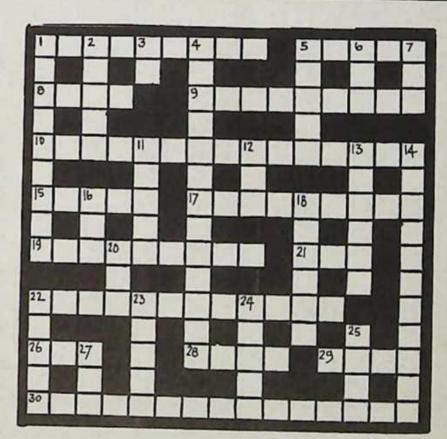

NOW REED ON

THE VELVET UNDERGROUND revisited

THERE IS, it transpires, still a little to be said about The Velvet Underground releases, to continue from our discography follow-up item of a few weeks back.

Firstly, Sandy Robertson would like our earlier correspondent Perry Bushell to know that he (Perry) actually misunderstood Sandy's "is there any more Velvets stuff out there?" comment at the end of his Velvets box set review.

"My cry", says Sandy, "referred to as-yet undiscovered stuff. I did know about the albums mentioned by Perry, but didn't add them on to the Info Riot discography since I assumed you'd left them out due to their 'semi-legal' status, and had decided to concentrate on

official releases."

Which is absolutely right. It seems a little risque in a feature deliberately designed to coincide with a box set release by a major label, to include odds and ends of at least dubious legality, so I stuck to the straight and narrow although 'The Velvet Underground Etc' was actually the only one of this particular batch of albums that I had note of anyway, although I did for similar reasons exclude the 'Evil Mothers/Rare Velvets' LP which appeared on Skydog (LP 003) in France, in 1976. Although Skydog products were sold as legitimate imports this one seemed dodgy, to say the least, since it lifted two or three tracks blatantly from Atlantic's 'Live At

Max's Kansas City' album. Anyway, to let Sandy conclude:

"Those first two albums were, by the way, reviewed in Sounds when they were issued, many yonks ago. As for legality, one has to assume that these LPs, like 'Everything You Always Wanted To Know . . ' (a box set of Velvets-related oddities) are OK, on the basis that shops like the Virgin Megastore sell them whenever they can get copies! The reason that Perry Bushell doesn't have the third album 'Et Al' is that it never came out, as far as is known."

Further well-informed comment on the matter also came in from Peter Relton, of Allerton, Bradford, who imparts some

"Re Perry Bushell's info on the albums put out by the Velvet Underground Appreciation Society: though no longer in existence, this was a genuine fan club, whose president, Philip Milstein, has an extensive knowledge of the Velvets' history. Victor Bockris and Gerard Malanga, who wrote the Velvets biography Up-Tight, said that Milstein's assistance helped them "more than any other single factor".

As well as issuing the records referred to, Milstein also published three issues of a Velvets magazine entitled What Goes On, before the society folded.

"The Velvet Underground Etc' and 'And So On' were both widely available in the UK through legitimate record shop chains like HMV and Virgin, so it still shouldn't be too hard to get hold of them. 'Etc' was first released in 1979 (Plastic Inevitable Records FIRST-1), and 'And So On' in 1982 (Plastic Inevitable SECOND-1). 'Et Al', the third album mentioned by Perry, was listed as a possible future release in the sleeve notes of 'And So On', but with the demise of the Appreciation Society, plus the subsequent final release of much unavailable material by Polydor on 'VU' and 'Another View', I strongly doubt that it was ever released - unless Perry has actually seen a copy?

"Another important release of a similar type, also made widely available in record shops (though unconnected with the releases above), was the threerecord set 'Everything You've Ever Heard About. . . The Velvet Underground', issued in 1982 on Vu Records (VU 333). This contained rare pre-Velvets material by Lou Reed (recorded originally under a variety of names), plus studio tracks, live stuff and rehearsals. Here's the full track listing:

SIDE 1: 'After Hours' (The Carol Lou Trio) (NB: the song title 'Afterhours' on the Velvets' third official album)/'Leave Her For Me' (The Shades)/'So Blue' (The Shades)/'Why Don't You Smile' (The All-Night Workers)/'(Do) The Ostrich' (The Primitives)/'Sneaky Pete' (The Primitives)/'Cycle Annie (The Beachnuts)

SIDE 2: 'I've Got A Tiger In My Tank' (The Beachnuts)/'You're Driving Me Insane' (The Roughnecks)/'Loop' (John Cale solo; magazine flexi-disc)/'Index' (Velvets interview; titled 'Conversation' on 'Etc')/'VU Noise' (from the 'East

Village Electric Newspaper'; titled 'Noise' on 'Etc') SIDE 3: 'Some Kinda Love'/'White

Light, White Heat'/'Rock 'n' Roll'/'(Here Come The) Waves' (titled 'Ocean' on SIDE 4: 'Foggy Notion'/'Inside Your

Heart' (titled '(Temptation) Inside Your Heart' on 'VU')/'I'm Sticking With You'/ 'Ferryboat Bill'/'Fever In My Pocket' (titled 'Guess I'm Falling In Love' on 'And So On')

SIDE 6: 'I'm Free'/'I Found A Reason'/ 'Walk And Talk It'/'Head Held High'/'I'm Set Free'

"By the way, a comprehensive discography can be found in the book The Velvet Underground And Lou Reed by Mike West, published in 1982 by Babylon Books. This lists all records up to 1981 (plus some from '82), and includes the group releases, solo stuff. cover versions, Cale's work as a producer, some of the bootlegs, and so forth."

Readers might be interested to know that there was a small clutch of 45s extracted from the first Velvets' albums on Verve and MGM in the States, even though they had no UK release equivalents.

From the first album, 'All Tomorrow's Parties' was coupled with 'I'll Be Your Mirror' (in an edited-down version), and 'Sunday Morning' with 'Femme Fatale', while the title track 'White Light, White Heat' and 'I Heard Her Call My Name' were both extracted from the second album, in both cases with 'Here She Comes Now' as the B-side

All these were on US Verve: catalogue numbers are not known, and in fact I don't know of anyone who has ever found copies. One further early single then came from the third album, this pairing 'What Goes On' with 'Jesus'. Like its parent LP in the States, this was on MGM rather than the Verve subsidiary. Still no catalogue number.

The tracks on that French Skydog album, for those who are bound to write in asking about them, are as follows:

Undaunted by the success of a Van Halen that no longer includes him, singing in Spanish and laughing his socks off (see, they weren't down his jeans), California KID DAVID LEE ROTH tells MARY ANNE HOBBS all about his album, his suntan and his unusual obsession with tractors

AST YOUR mind back to Donington 1984.

Who was that blond
American punk upstaging
Angus Young? Remember his
decadent domination of the
video jukebox? Recall his
back against a record
machine?

And remember just one year ago, when Eddie Van Halen announced that, after wailing this way through six platinum albums, David Lee Roth was forfeiting rock 'n' roll in favour of "a f***** movie career"?

David Lee Roth, however, adopts a rather different variation on the theme.

"Any divorce after a long term together is gonna be ugly. Van Halen grew up together, we learned a lot together. We went through a lot of hard times and a whole lot more good times – I shall always remember those.

"As far as who did what and why, there's five sides to every coin, and we all view the situation through a different pair of sunglasses.

"It starts with the music. That's first and final and foremost.

"You make a record of that music, the rest is parade time." Lee Roth suddenly swings into a rap-style spree.

"Wanna make a video, radio, interview, me 'n' you? How long ya gonna be gone? And on and on and on . . . Wanna make a movie, just like Prince? First one was good, second one so-so, haven't seen him since...

"You have to make all those decisions. Van Halen didn't care to be involved in those things, and I'm a workoholic.

lazily through the doldrums of middle-aged commercial security. Yeah, it pays the pool man and keeps the missus up to date in mink. But the elusive spirit and notorious humour eloped with Dave 12 months ago, and the same hand that once eased the seat back is currently shifting into overdrive and steering a new band. This lot are one of the things I'm here to question Roth about.

Steve Vai spent some time alongside Frank Zappa, perfecting his selection of dangerous guitar licks. He's also cut some furious vinyl with Alcatrazz and PiL. Tell me, David, is it true that you met this closet punk in jail after he got arrested at your club, The Zero?

"It wasn't actually sitting in a cell, à la James Cagney. My main responsibility as far as The Zero is concerned just happens to be bailing out my bouncers after the annual raids. But yeah, it was during this process that we met.

"I'd been hearing about him for a considerable period of time, and I know Frank Zappa officiates pretty mightily over his situation, much in the same way I do with my band, which is that I'm dependent upon my musicians for a whole lot of musical inspiration. I know what I'm capable of – I don't throw and I can't catch, but I can write a hell of a play book. I can pull a team together and motivate the shit out of 'em.

"Also, Stevie is a graduate of the Berkley School of something or other, which is a pretty prestigious qualification. So, after distilling all of these things, I figured, here's somebody who's gonna ascribe to the vision!"

And bass virtuoso Billy Sheehan joined your new line-up after a gruelling 14-year struggle with his own outfit, Talas, right? (Hours spent on research here, you'll notice.)

"Yeah, that's right. He's my white tiger."

Sorry?

"When you see a white tiger for the first time, you're not exactly sure what it is you're looking at. You recognise most of the parts, but the colours are all wrong, so your immediate impulse is to question it. With Billy, your immediate impulse is to question what it is you're listening to. A lot of the sounds on 'Eat 'Em And Smile' are like a confabulation of guitars, but somewhere in the back of yo' head you know there's a runaway bass in there."

To quote your press biography, Greg Bissonette is known as a 'great guy and a hell of a drummer'. Could you elaborate on that?

"Well, my entire purpose was to attract your attention. Greg probably has the most considered musical experience – I stole him from the Maynard Ferguson Big Band. I figured if he had enough authority to power 20 musicians through steep turns and glides and still keep a sense of swing about things, that'd easily translate into rock 'n' roll.

"The two other cats will use every possible opportunity to jam in three extra notes to demonstrate total ability, which is a rock 'n' roll sentiment in itself – you certainly don't wanna crush that. It's just a case of having to establish a not so general re-direction, which I prefer to leave to the drummer. A drummer is always so much better than having to start a song over again."

This selection was christened the David Lee Roth Band because Dave, he tells me, "feels like a shining example", although he's not quite sure of what. However, he prefers to think of the new outfit as "a roving youth gang" – just as he translates falling off a water ski into " a major boating accident", and views a minor fender bender as "a fiery crash".

"It was my goal to get a band of virtuosos who play with incredible authority, and try to get a sound out of the record which suggests that we've only been together for five minutes."

T'S TIME to ask: is the title of your new opus 'Eat 'Em And Smile' really just an alternative reference to oral sex?

"The beauty of a title like that is it's right off the bat. Eat and smile – harsh and soft. Obviously, it's aggressive; it's competitive, it's sexy and it's got a sense of humour. It's attitude. All of those things are rock 'n' roll."

Can you remember any specific anxieties during the time you spent in the Big Apple recording part of the album?

"Remember the movie Brazi? The guy steps out of his room and wham!, he's caught up in a tornado of traffic; the metropolis, the rush of the future – but it looks like the 1930s. God help New York, it must have skipped a groove somewhere along the line!

"I wrote 'Yankee Rose' in New York because the city was going Statue Of Liberty nuts. Everywhere you went, there were Statue Of Liberty T-shirts, Statue Of Liberty underwear, Statue Of Liberty cheeseburgers. I love that, America's great for all that kind of tireless promotion.

"I was surrounded by that statue

and I wrote about her like she was a real person. That's how it felt with the amount of attention she was getting – she was being marketed like Brooke Shields!"

So can you cite your home state's Calfornian culture as influential?

"In LA we all dress like one of our hydro-carbon sunsets. I'm known as the 'California Kid' everywhere I go, purely because you wear a Hawaiian print T-shirt and you're nailed for life – or six weeks, in this business. Same difference, sometimes.

"But I do a lot of travelling, and I see this West Coast, sunbelt culture catching on all over the world.

Every third person's climbing into a suntan box. Every fourth person's pumping iron or aerobicising. You couldn't get into Danceteria in New York with a pair of shorts on two years ago – now the bouncers are wearing them! This is great. I'm a big fan of fashion, colour and culture, and whether I participate or not I like to see it, I like to see it all.

"Running alongside all this currently is what I call 'Motor-Pop Entertainment'. Motor-Pop is based on the American principle of what is a good vacation which, essentially distilled, amounts to drinking a lot of beer and operating a motor vehicle, starting with the generic household automobile and continuing on to all terrain vehicles, wet bikes, jet skis, mini bikes, moto-cross and on and on and on.

"Of course, that kind of entertainment necessitated The Big Event where 'Mickey Thompson presents 20 (count 'em) 20 nitro fuel screaming dragster engines roaring up over the finish line – Friday night at the LA Coliseum'. And then they got the guy who launches himself off a ramp into three parked cars, the mud racers, the tractor pulls.

"The tractor pull is when these little old boys from down South clamber up onto tractors with four hemi-head engines plastered into a teeny chassis and drag a 4,000lb weight 300 yards down the field, while the fans and yours truly go crazy, hysterical, out of our minds hoping that he makes the 300 foot limit, because if he does that is technically known as a 'full pull', with a great big neon sign that blasts FULL PULL, FULL PULL.

"God forbid more than one fella should have a full pull in the same evening, because this would necessitate a 'pull off'. I shit you not! 'It's a PULL OFF!!!' they bawl, in front of 17,000 drooling, slack jawed, wild eyed, slavering Motor-Pop fans."

(What an incredible Simon Cooper cartoon this could induce, I'm thinking.)

"This has been a great source of inspiration."

Makes you want to buy out Massey Ferguson, doesn't it? "Or at the very least, start playing with matches again."

A viable explanation for the bombastic quotient of 'Eat 'Em And Smile'. And I believe you're going to release a Spanish version of the album?

"Yeah, that's right."

Can you sing something from it for me?

To my amazement, Roth actually sings something which vaguely sounds like this –

"Correndo pola cara tera tropica/ Oh mesha marro calo mescha me wah woloco/Pero moya mi manera/ Qui sa merca syca lista del sol.

"That's 'Goin' Crazy' in Spanish.
"You know how my voice kinda
barks at you, how it yops and bays?

OU HAVE traditionally been recognised as a mouthpiece, a face and a personality, enjoying very little critical acclaim for your capabilities as a vocalist. Do you desire a little more musical credibility at this stage in your career?

in Español."

"I don't separate the two. I mean, there are a lot of guys that can sing higher than me, but so can most girls. This doesn't in my mind necessitate either a sex change or any more singing lessons than I am already taking. There's a definite face to my voice, but it has a lot of different characters. It's not just one big anxiety-ridden peal of horniness. It's not just one clarion trumpet blast of stay-out-allnightedness. It's not just anything, but you always know who's singing, and that's better than technique any time."

Billy Sheehan seems beyond delight that not one single ballad graces the grooves of 'Eat 'Em And Smile'. Can we ever expect a real tearjerker from the pen of Diamond Dave?

"Sure, sure. I've nothing against playing any kind of music.
Obviously, the thread that winds its way through all this chaos is rock 'n' roll, and it's gonna stay that way pretty much, although we'll be changing the paint job quite frequently. However, I think 'Coconut Grove' demonstrated my ability to make left turns."

You're such a rock 'n' roll junkie, but do you ever crave culture or find yourself having to suppress an impulsive urge to attend the opera, perhaps, or an art gallery?

"Where I start culturally usually has no bearing or reference point that you can nail in the final product. As we look at this book (here he pulls something from his personal library for the purpose of

illustration) we look at Robert Wilson's *Theatre Of Images* – this is all performance art and a lot of what we do is a distillation of it."

Performance art? Judging by the number of blackouts and censored edits chopped into your video when it was screened on America's Channel Four last week, the liberal US citizen of the '80s interprets your stage show as performance pornography.

"My shows are sexy. The difference between sexy and pornographic is with sexy, all you need is a feather. With pornography, you use the whole chicken."

No doubt we can expect more of this when your show goes on the road next month?

"I make records as an excuse to go travelling!"

And what of your big silver screen project – will the movie ever be made now that you've become so preoccupied with a band again?

"We're involved in a \$25 million law suit with CBS right now. They shut down their operations and we were a week and a half ahead of shooting. It seemed like an obvious step for the Fabulous Picasso Brothers (Dave and his collaborator, Pete Angeles) to make something one and a half hours long instead of just four minutes.

"But yes, the movie will be made and I think we can do something that's classic and irreverent at the same time. I am both poles and the equator with no temperate zones."

Everyone is waiting for you to pop up on *Miami Vice* – do you have any plans to guest on other shows, or are you, er, saving yourself for the real thing?

"Aaah – there is no adult supervision around here, there are no time-tables, and my career is not goal oriented. There is no shining star that we're gonna land on. Let's just attain maximum speed and go sight-seeing. Let's take the scenic route, but at full speed! After all, life is a kung-fu movie."

"Naah. I can't be responsible for my violent actions in an adult society, and that henceforth eliminates certain career possibilities – much as I'd like to picture it!"

Do you have any morals?
"Well, I am toastmaster general
for the immoral majority."

But is it perplexing to be dismissed by 90 per cent of the general public as a sexist numbskull?

"I don't think I'm so easily dismissed anymore. I've been around for a while now and, although people may wish to do that, all the evidence is to the contrary. Sure, I play sexist on occasion, but I view it purely as a sharing experience. It's all role playing, right? It's no good unless you play along."

Does it bother you that you'll probably burn in hell for all of this when you die?

"Naah, I don't think so. What is hell, anyway? There's probably some great lawyers down there, and a few popes!"

(The following question was inspired by, and is dedicated to, Jack Barron.)

Your macho image is somewhat infamous, but tell me, do you ever get into anything totally off the wall – like, say, flower arranging?

"Haven't arranged a flower in years, lady."

Do you have any obsessions?

"Yeah, I do. I have an inability to settle for what is. I'm perfecting the ability to add things in addition to, as opposed to instead of. But I have some kind of driving force that tells me, This is good, but it could be better, or more – either way. But as long as I'm working with others for the benefit of others in some context, then I'd say that's a pretty honourable obsession."

Have you ever admitted you were wrong about anything, ever?

"Once! It's attitude, though. If you live it, people around you grow to accept it."

You were recently on the cover of the same issue of American Playgirl in which Ratt's Stephen Pearcy bared all for the frustrated suburban housewife – I notice that you chose to remain dressed for your interview.

"There's always got to be a bit of mystery. Save the money punch.

Any time you think you've got a money punch, the real ace card, just imagine Burgess Meredith standing next to you like he did in Rocky, saying, What are you doing? He's gonna knock ya into tomorrow. Save it"

Are you in love with anybody or anything right now?

"No, nothing and nobody in particular. I'm always happy, but I'm never content."

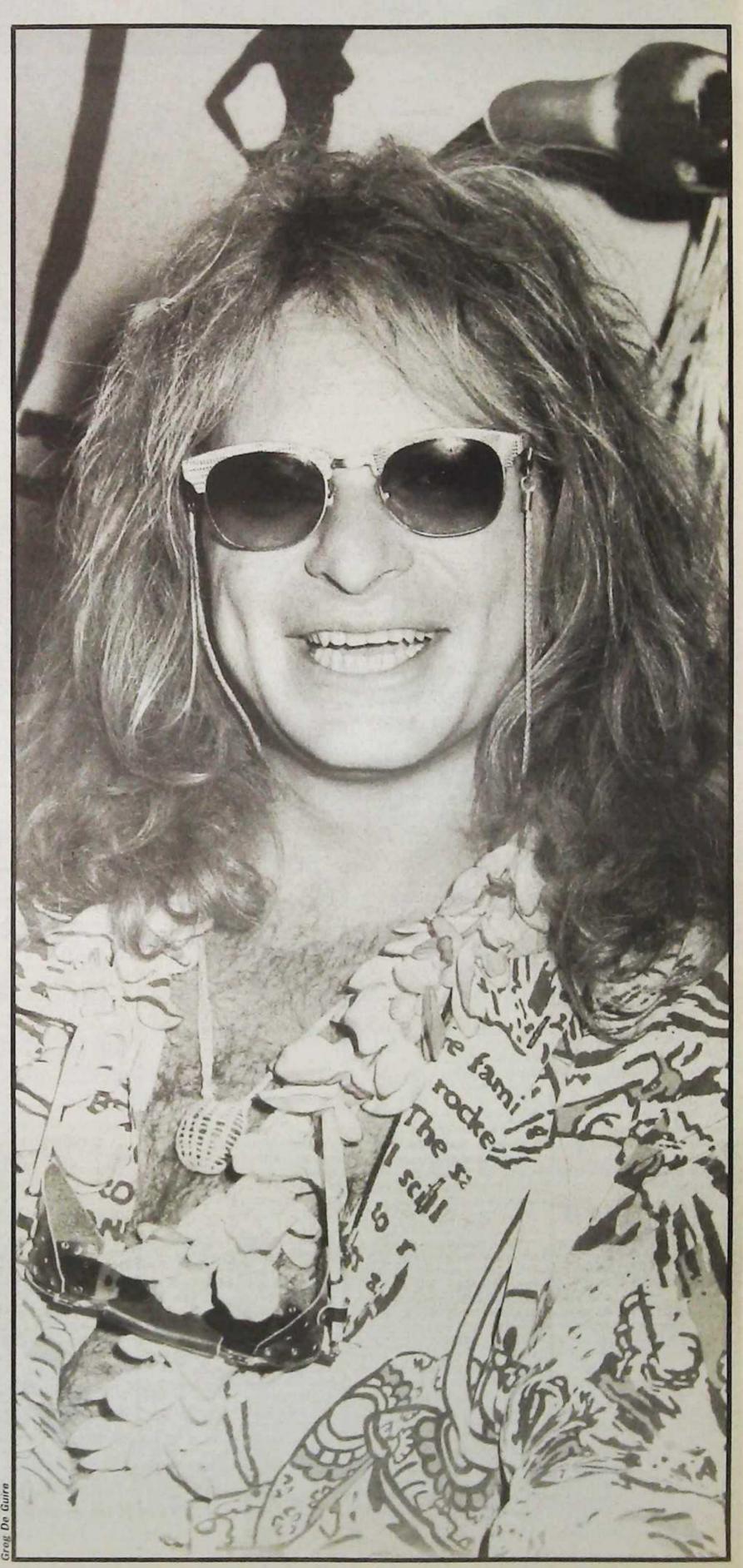

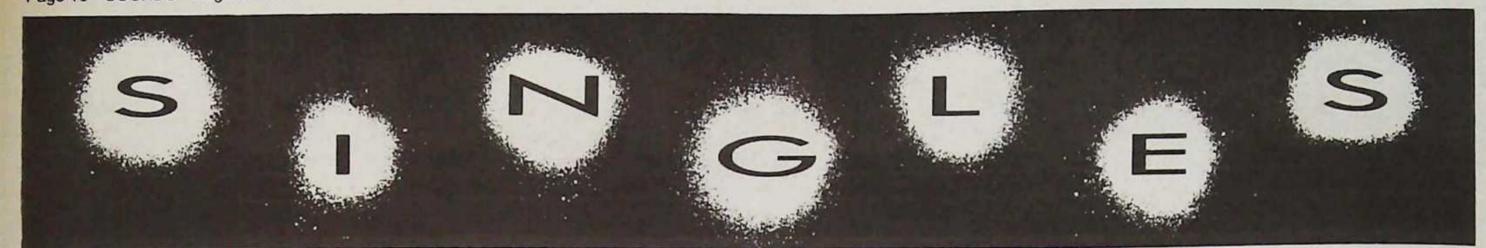
"Five more wishes, an option and a waiver."

THE TIMEBOX REPLY

I'M WRITING in reply to a rather damning letter from a disgruntled band I arranged a gig for a few months ago. I'm Jon Beast, the "fat slob" who runs the Timebox in Kentish Town, and I've been accused of "ripping off" Beat Of The Beast (no relation).

The letter they had printed (Sounds August 2) stated that they brought to the Timebox 50 paying people at £2.50, which is an exaggeration to say the least. There were about forty people from Brentwood, of which half a dozen got in on the guest list and the rest either paid £2 or less, which is the deal all bands get if they bring a coach.

They only received £15 payment because that's all there was to pay them. The first £25 went towards the gig costs which include little things like stage manager, phone calls, etc on top of the PA and venue.

I don't think these people have ever actually run a gig in London. Who do they think covers the debts when you've paid £85 to privately hire The Clarendon and only a dozen paying people turn up? Who do they think is the mug who has to pay a £200 guarantee to a main band who've only pulled 30 people?

Yes, we did make some money putting on Half Man Half Biscuit, but that's been long used up supplementing nights when we didn't clear costs.

Sometimes the Timebox is half full, yet we've taken next to nothing on the door: the reasons being that because we're a friendly, casygoing club, one that's actually interested in the bands we put on, we let most of the bands we put on regularly (The Wigs, The Mousehounds, My Bloody Valentine, A Strange Desire, Tongue, Kill Ugly Pop. The Wickermen, Stitched Back Foot Airman, Nyah Fearties, Tortilla Flats, etc, etc) in free whenever they want, and they all frequent Timebox regularly. On top of this we have a huge free list of record paper journalists, record company's A&R men and business people that also regularly visit Timebox. We want bands to have a good time and be seen by the right people. (Remember BOTB,

the good live review you received in *Sounds* following an earlier Timebox night?)

So you see, even though we might have 100 people in the venue, it doesn't mean we've taken a fortune on the door. (And we get no share of the beer sales as most clubs in London do.)

So wise up Beat Of The Beast, if I was only interested in ripping people off I'd be a ticket tout or an accountant, not a promoter. I actually enjoy seeing fresh, talented new bands, that's why I gave you the chance of a gig. See how difficult it is to get gigs elsewhere in London, and how much you get paid then. – A disgruntled and rather

bewildered Jon Fat Beast.
PS: Please print this and set the record straight, as probably lots of people have the opinion that I'm an arsehole, which I don't think I am.

Jim Lyttle says all this straight-faced. Here is a man unwilling to be the butt of any humour, and with songs like 'Take No Shit' he seems to know what he's about.

"We've put our contracts on the line, so we have, because of titles like that. We have to do it our way. For instance, people have tried to change our look, but we won't have it. We've got to be successful on our terms."

To Rogue Male, there's a dual application of their sound contained in this that's particularly pleasing.

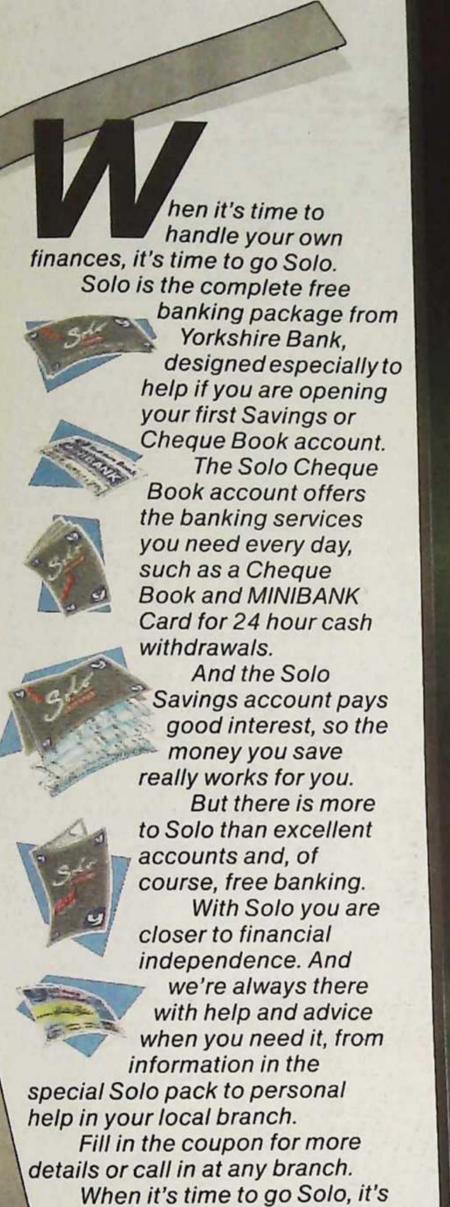

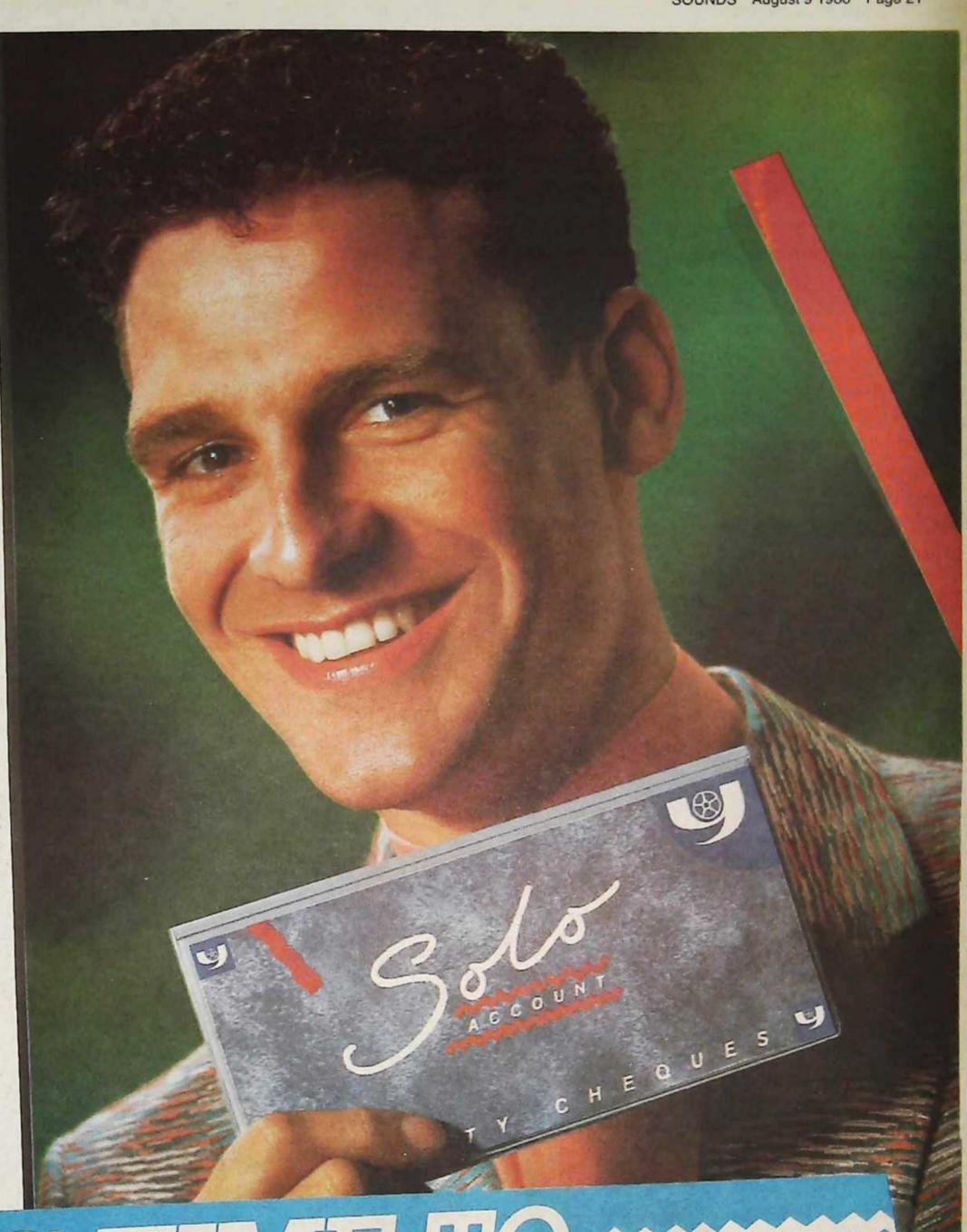

BALAAM AND THE ANGEL 'The Greatest Story Ever Told' (Virgin V2377)****/3

YOU GET the impression that the 'majors' treat the indie charts as some kind of sweepstake — a few bands might hang around punterless for a while but, by the very nature of the game, they all get snapped up in the end. Most people know what it feels like to put 50p in the Derby kitty only to watch your nag do a remarkably good impression of a thousand prospective cans of Belgian cat food.

I'll own up to having held a similar view of Balaam And The Angel, somehow managing to avoid them both live and on disc since their debut at the Festival Of Britain in 1951. But 'The Greatest Story Ever Told' (some folk are hellbent on setting themselves up as coconuts to be shied down) dispels my impression of the Morris brothers as twatty goths and replaces it with the image of a fairly decent new rock band with a few jolly tunes.

That the Scots-cum-Midlanders have arrived in the fairytale world of the big-time production job is evidenced by the presence of double-tracked recorders (and you thought those long years in the primary school orchestra were a waste of time) on 'Burn Me Down'. This track also reveals singer Mark Morris as being a terminal American accent junkie — I believe I'm right in thinking that in croaking "the air tastes egg-sardine", he means exciting, but I prefer the former.

Having been put on the Yankophile track, it occurs to me that on several numbers I'm reminded of Golden Earring (no bad thing in my book), trumpets and all, and no more so than on 'Warm Again' onto which Jones grafts the horn riff from the Teardrop's 'Reward' virtually note for note.

An album that's about as threatening as Sir Geoffrey Howe and just as cuddly. If they get any more accessible, they will become Irish and sing about trees. An extremely nice record.

WRITTEN OFF (deservedly) as mere Birthday Party imitators a few months back, the Austin, Texas hardcore bulls, Scratch Acid, return here to grab Cave's sacred cow by the horns. Branding it with fire-iron guitars, they rip the beast to shreds and serve up psychodelick stakes with which to stab your tongue to the roof of your mouth. Try eating like that, toots.

There are more handguns in Texas than in the whole of Europe, and the redneck state also has hallucinogens of the highest braincell-bending quality.

Put them together and watch the scarred flesh flow under a sickly yellow hepatitis moon to the sound of a Cherokee yell. I have never met anybody sane from Austin; there again, I've only met Butthole Surfers.

Scratch Acid aren't as avant-surreal as the Butties, but they have a similar sense of ghoulish humour which can be interpreted as misogynist unless you recognise men can be so in love that they'd rather kill their partner

than see her walk away with another chap. I'm not suggesting you try this at home, kiddies, merely that crimes of passion occur daily.

Sometimes, when love gets a boot in the groin, out stalks a psychopath. That's the nerve end Brett Bradford, David WM Sims, Rey Washam and David Yow tie into a hanging knot of swinging trapdoor music through texturally diverse tracks such as 'Ain't That Love?', 'Amicus' and the parental farewell fanfare of 'Spit A Kiss'.

My favourite, though, is the (true?) story of 'Crazy Dan' who, after dinner one night, sets fire to his wife, goes mad with guilt and gets towed off to the asylum. It offers this advice to spouses: "If you're married to an unbalanced man, best not ask for a light."

Like Crime And The City Solution, Scratch Acid use The Birthday Party as a launch pad, not a blueprint. Giggling, dissolving and cussing while they rot in society's sulphuric tub, their music will pull you in screaming. Make no mistake.

and 'I'm Just A Broken Heart' from 'Basement' laid siege to this reporter's affection as strongly as any white man's wooing in the last 12 months.

And that's something.

High as a burning kite, the follow-up to last year's 'I Feel For You' monolith possesses no single song to match the sublimity of 'Ain't Nobody' or 'Heed The Warning' but, in the Scritti Politti-penned 'Love Of A Lifetime', boasts a Top Ten Terpsichroean tease, a perfect way to make the boys (and girls) go crazy. And as a vibrant spinning whole, this summery summary of Chaka's vocal peaks and valleys and Arif Mardin's few remaining waking hours is upright and fluid from starbright start to fulgent finish.

Imagine Scritti rhythms wed to 'State Of Independence' layering and Skipworth/Turner floor moves, and you have the canvas. Over this, a confident Khan gives — I'm serious — her strongest display of supremacy to date.

HOWLING WILF & THE VEE JAYS 'Cry Wilf!' (Big Beat WIK 51)****

BLUES FALLING down like showers of rain? A leaky cistern, more like. Whatever, 'Cry Wilfl' makes the legendary Chess studio recordings sound positively digital.

Backed by a bunch of busking bluesers, young Wilf has a thin, reedy voice that cracks up at the slightest strain. But you can almost touch the intensity coming off him.

Behind Wilf and his bubbling harmonica -

somewhere in the next room just within range of the portable hi-fi's built-in mike you can distinguish a murky rhythm guitar that occasionally breaks into muted solo runs, a double bass thudding away with all the tonal qualities of a tea chest, and a drum kit that probably fits neatly inside the aforementioned tea chest.

So why is 'Cry Wilf!', with its pot-pourri of ageless R'n'B gems (the result of thousands of hours sifting through record racks and friends' collections) and self-penned numbers, so infectious? Because, despite the tranny production, it sounds as if they'd rather be doing this than anything else.

More tellingly, if you didn't know the originals - and there's no reason why you should spot most of them unless you're an R'n'B buff you might have trouble spotting the difference between them and their own songs. And that's not denigrating the originals.

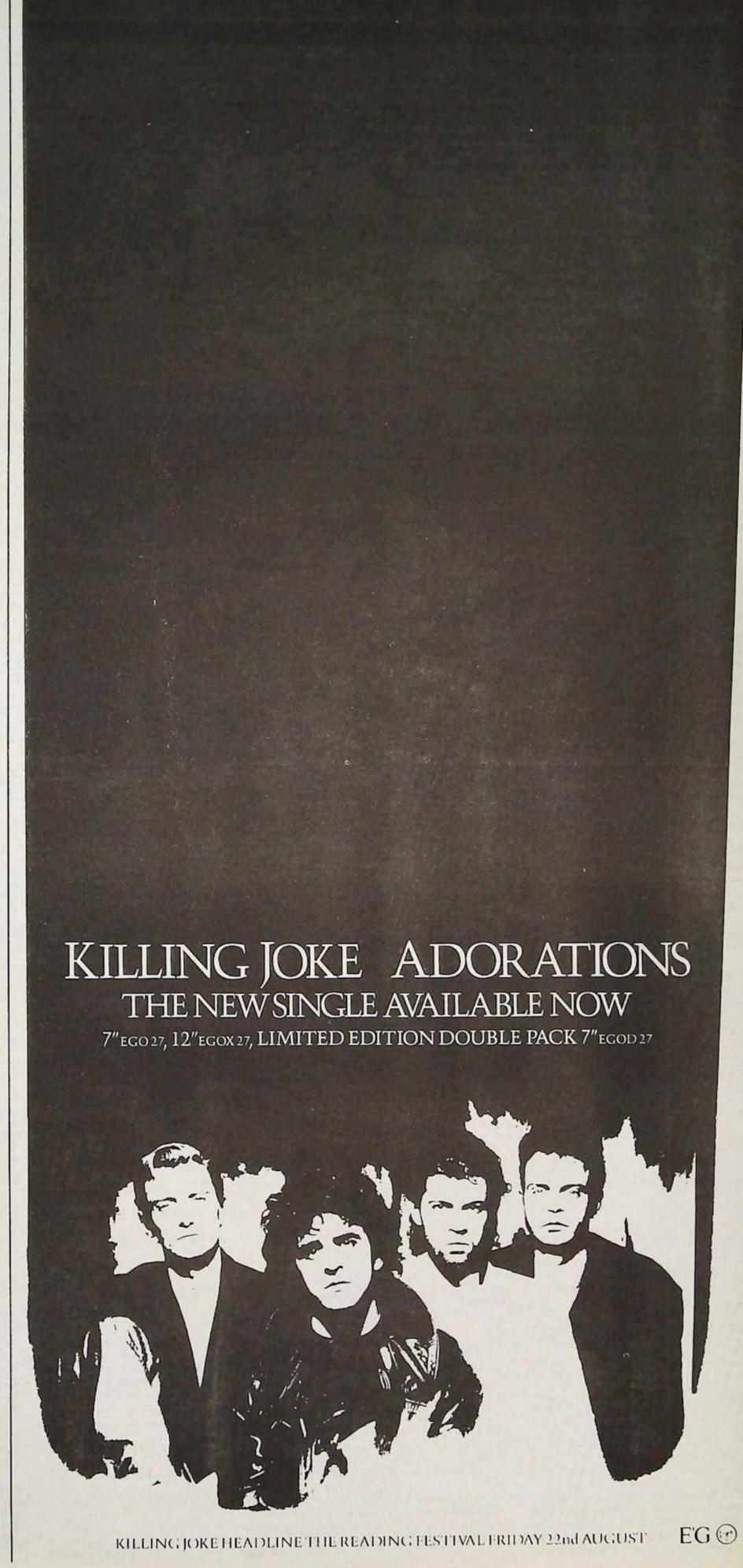

Slightly more imaginative and worthwhile thing for me to do: talk about Slade for a bit.

Slade were the Wham! of my youth, if less streamlined, in that I neither hated nor loved them. 'Take Me Bak 'Ome' was a stormer and 'Everyday' had a pretty tune. Slade are still alive. I know this because me and Little Flame got into a taxi last week and the cabbie said, "Oh, that's where Noddy's staying". Quick as a limpet, I chortled, "Oh brilliant - p'raps he'll let me go parp parp in his car".

"Nnnggh," remarked our driver. "I don't think he's got his car down with him actually."

Here is what I said next: "Oh. Right."

Little Flame said, "There you go then".

I have now entertained you for a whole side of a Quiet Riot album. Are we going to turn it over? Is our middle name 'stamina'? OK, but we'll turn it over anyway.

Now the thing is, Quiet Riot rose to fame by covering old Slade songs. I know this all by myself without any information whatsoever from anyone at all, especially not Robbi. VIRGIN PRUNES 'The Moon Looked Down And Laughed' (Baby Records BABY 005)****3/4 VIRGIN PRUNES are an

enigma, right? Mysterious riddlers dropping clues at your feet. Bend down to pick them up, though, and they'll kick you up the backside. They make records too. though, bloody good ones. Seductive, mournful, intricate pieces of plastic, profound and absurd.

The Moon Looked Down And Laughed' is such a record. It's woven with a silken thread that shimmers inside your ear, slow and swirling, deep, sonorous notes ringing pure. Sometimes the tunes themselves are humorous, a black comedy of errors, circus tunes (literally), but more often they are these glistening, dark pieces, entwined with violin.

Then, cutting through this fine material, comes the voice of Gavin Friday, a commanding, half-tortured rumble that sets you on edge. Shifting between unbelievable ham-acting and unquestionable sincerity, his voice is a carrier wave for the station you've never yet tuned into.

I make an assumption about Virgin Prunes - that they are Catholic - but it seems to be a valid one. That particular brand of pious reasoning is beautifully subverted by this group. Religion controls people through guilt and fear, in one all encompassing cage. Virgin Prunes are sitting outside laughing, like the moon, at human stupidity.

The ideas of heaven and

hell and the purgatory we live in are explored through the rites of loving and leaving. Dead angels and a simple phrase ("you never loved me") combine in the song 'Heaven' to absurd effect. But it is in the ridiculous and childlike places that profound wisdom is found.

Virgin Prunes have a wisdom beyond their years. This record wants to share it with you.

Hugh Cornwell - cold blooded in the steam bath – has a new STRANGLERS LP to brag about and an interesting way with journalists. **CHRIS ROBERTS sweats** for this feature: RUSSELL YOUNG lifts only the weight of his camera

"I was never sure of the accurate score when I sat in for a hand with the Ice Queen/One day I'd win and the next I'd lose when I sat in for the blues with the Ice Queen" -'Ice Queen', The Stranglers, 1984

ECENTLY BITTEN by a horsefly the size of a Stuka, Hugh Cornwell of The Stranglers is wearing a ludicrous pair of swimming trunks when I first meet him.

He asks me to strip. Not wanting to show off too much, I borrow a pair of shorts and a T-shirt and adopt my 'OK, I'm game, let's go' persona. Bloody silly, really.

Next I am shown the rudiments of weight training. Weight training is not something I do a lot of, always having considered Olive Oyl more glamorous than Popeye. Two days later, bits of my arms still hurt. Throughout this interesting experience, Hugh Cornwell is eagerly lifting away.

We are at a health club in Bath On the door it says 'Discover a whole new sense of well-being'. Cornwell, a popular local figure, here mingles with young married accountants and French waiters.

I am in the steam bath. What a trooper. It smells of eucalyptus. A six-foot square room, it's hotter than a dog's nuts. I don't know a lot about dogs but this image strikes me as suitably repulsive

Hugh explains how it all works. Volcanoes since Roman times and stuff

"Gasp," I point out. "Gaspy gaspy gasp." Hugh nods agreement and into something called a plunge pool he plunges. Purified to recklessness, I do this too. It's colder than an Icelandic dog's nuts in winter. I swear for the first time in my life.

What gets wetter as it dries? A towel The easy part of the interview is over.

HE STRANGLERS' ninth album, probably called 'Dreamtime', will sneak up shortly after the new single 'Nice In Nice' has bleached your receptors. The Stranglers could be described as "living legends", or "a rock institution", or "clever con-men" or "maestros of mystique". I think the best description is "a law unto themselves"

Their exploitation of their given "attitude" has been almost profound in its flip wisdom. To this day, when Cornwell (for instance) is apparently a mature, relaxed, life-loving English country gentleman who visibly flinches at sarcasm, The Stranglers' name still publicly stirs up images of decadence, sin, rebellion

Rarely can it have been so useful for a group to be unable to shake off an obsolete reputation The new music is fine. Conventional, intelligent soft rock-pop, laced with Stranglerisation. When Jean-Jacques Burnel opens 'Nice In Nice' with "Hey, look at that gurl!", it's still very different to. say, Owen Paul doing the same It's still lustful and a mite wicked.

And when Cornwell intones a line like "the man with the gun", it somehow makes more political sense than its lack of focus should allow. Maybe these self-styled intellectual thugs will never be drowning rats.

O YOU look back on the band's early aggression and antagonism as rather

"No no, it's not naive. I don't think our recorded work has ever been naive."

You don't spark off much controversy now, though, do you?

"How do you know?"

Eh?

"It might not be what you see."

I don't understand. What are you saying? Every healthy pore of Hugh Cornwell's body politely but firmly makes it clear we are now going to move on to another subject.

ELL... WHEN we first started, a certain mood prevailed, and whether we liked it or not we got carried away on it. Most musicians who were around in those days will agree - they had very little control over what was going on. It was all just happening. Everything was out of your hands except for playing.

"There were all these people like ... like McLaren. And you yourself, on stage, were just happy to have an audience.

"Things like that become increasingly clear to me as time moves on. I just went to see that film about Sid and Nancy. And it was a very remarkable experience. Because it's very good.

HUGH CORNWELL: his icy stare

Superb." Is that then a fair representation of the era for

It's excellent. The guy that plays Sid is brilliant.

"Well, yeah - well - I only met Sid a couple of times so I can't say whether it was a true representation of his life, but, um, it seemed pretty accurate, there were no blinders. It set me thinking - one, that it was ten years ago. which is quite remarkable, and two, that it actually happened I mean, no-one could have written a better scenario for a punk film than that. And it's fact. I was stunned. It was documentary*

So would you say punk could be summed up as a doomed romance?

"Punk? Oh, that's quite interesting. Yeah ... maybe, maybe. Quite deep, aren't you? That could be quite a good interpretation. Yeah, very good. You surprise me. Hey, everybody - he just came up with something really good ... "

Hang on - deep, you said Deep Quite deep. "Hmm. Yes. Hot stuff. Have some mushrooms."

The old feller is working hard on eye contact. So is Hugh Cornwell He's behind a businesslike professional mask which he lets slither just occasionally, as a tease of sorts. I have to do an impersonation of plucky vigilance and grab it like diamonds when it's there

NO DOUBT there will be some who read this review, nod to themselves, and say: 'Of course, none of the audience turned up to support anti-apartheid, they just wanted to see the bands.' For such as these there is no hope.

For the rest of humanity, events such as YIVA! offer a touch of optimistic reassurance that the good guys will win in the end. Even if, for the moment, the bad guys seem to be having things all their own way - in Iran, in the Contra camps of Nicaragua, in Chile, in South Africa.

What can we do about it? On a governmental level, bugger all while Thatcher and her stormtrooper intellect are in charge. On a purely human level, though, we can trust in events like YIVA! Sure, paying £8 for a ticket or putting ten pence in a collection tin is hardly likely to make P W Botha and his mob shake in their jackboots. But it might just give some of the people they're stamping on the strength to fight back

Five thousand turned up to claim their reward of a clear conscience. As a bonus, they got nine clear hours of music from a decidedly odd mixture of bands.

Buddy Curtess & The Grasshoppers were impressive in a polished, cabaret, all-purpose club band sort of way: all shiny clean and safe, like a brand new engine. Showaddywaddy with talent, they're bland enough to be massively popular.

Half Man Half Biscuit, on the other hand, are a peculiarly personal entertainment. One day, when the whole world has bought their album, they'll play the NEC with impunity. As yet, the large stage and cavernous roofspace eat their energy, leaving only bare bones behind.

A rather meatier Balaam And The Angel drew the short straw and had to play the opening set but still proved that they are growing nearer to fulfilling their potential. The Icicle Works, meanwhile, proved only that they're as good at throwing guitars in the air as just about anyone. As for Ruby Turner, she brought a tear to the eye not so much by the soulful power of her soaring vocals as by the excruciatingly tight leather two-piece she'd been levered into.

Almost as painful were New Model Army, who ranted to little effect and even less appreciation. But even they could not match Joolz, a scarlet-headed harridan who murdered bits of the English language and called the carnage poetry. Latin Quarter arrived just in time to provide a sedative of monotonous worthiness.

Thank God for The Pogues! Shambling through 'Dirty Old Town', 'Sally McLennane' and a host of other sodden classics, they brought an element of unbridled sleaze and untrammelled entertainment to the evening at the point where it was starting to sag. Too bad they left too soon.

For next came Feargal Sharkey, further consolidating his position as an updated, male version of Shirley Bassey - all showbiz razzmatazz and disposable sincerity. He wore a white suit in keeping with the clinical nature of the operation.

Paul King was dressed in white too, serving to make him an easy target for the plastic glasses and bottles that flew from the front stalls as soon as he appeared. An undeserved insult his performance was one of the most skilful and most effective of the day, especially on the final 'Free Nelson Mandela', where he was joined by Junior Giscombe.

Did it change anything? Probably not. But then YIVA! means "listen". And the people we're talking to have problems with their hearing.

They carve out the best song titles ('Were Those People Throwing Rocks At The Seagulls Or Feeding Them LSD?' being particularly memorable) and their noise is an abnormal delight Happy Mondays dance the polka while their rusty hinges creak like crazy. Love them, love them.

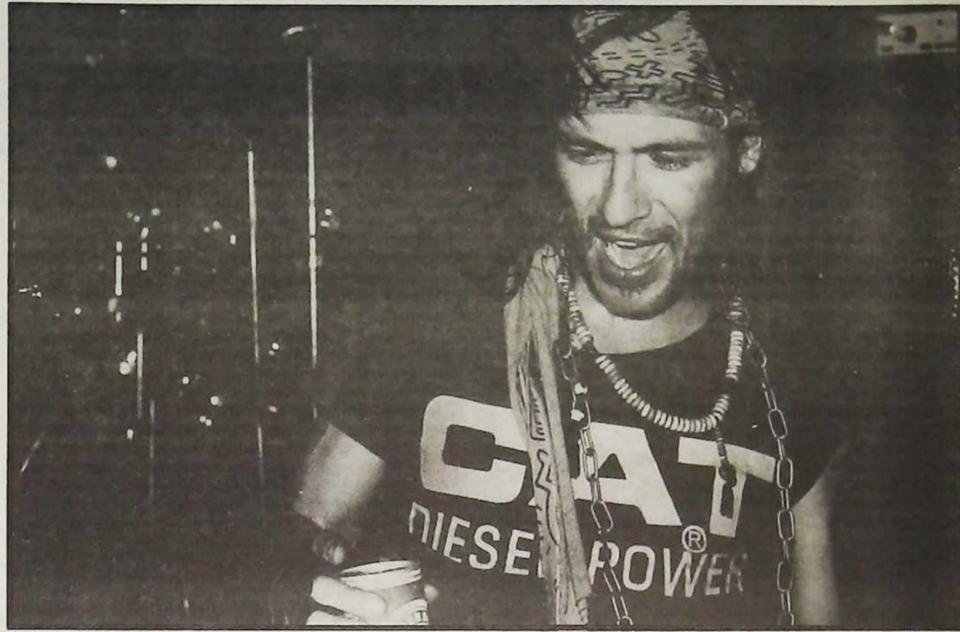

ANYONE HERE present from Marplan would be in heaven. A custom-built random survey sample between the ages of 15 and 45 has rolled off the production line, a majority of this ultimate cross-section displaying an intimate knowledge of the Baker repertoire.

Hearing Anita Baker's voice is like having bicycle clips forced onto the legs of your jeans, three gallons of Angel Delight poured down your crotch and then being schlepped in the goolies with a cricket bat.

Naturally it turns out that the big voice belongs to a body which is - as we say in the business - dead titchy. TONIGHT, THE fast improving punch of Criminal Damage Records hits Reading full on the chin. With a wealth of good press under the label's belt — much of it from this very paper — this evening, in theory at least, looked set to be a good one.

GOLDFINGEREDI

It's the eve of the Goldrush, but success is still a meaningless commodity to YELLO's Deiter Meier – or so he'd have JONH WILDE believe. ANTON CORBIJN frames the midas magic

elTER MEIER
never smiles.
We eat cucumber
sandwiches at Claridges in
London's West End. He
maintains a neat stoical reserve
and rolls every question about
on the end of his tongue before
delivering the reply.

Yello's arch conceptualist adds another layer of intrigue to their ongoing plot of words and images. The Yello tactician doesn't smile, but he makes that plot seem ridiculously simple.

"Basically, it has always been the same approach in Yello – we tell stories with words and music. If I was living in the Arab community, I would be a story-teller in a market-place with a little instrument to give a certain mood to my tales. Yello, in effect, rarely thinks outside the stories. We never set out to do anything to an audience, and it has never been our intention to perplex them.

"Really, we're just telling the stories to ourselves."

It seems like a desirable time to take account of Yello's disguises and their rising international prowess, since this month sees them juggle their way back into the spotlight.

There's a swarm of riddles in their new single, 'Goldrush'/'She's Got A Gun', the former containing the cutglass voice of Billy Mackenzie.

Then there's '1980-1985, The New Mix In One Go', a wily tangle of their first five years, a spectacular introduction for anyone who's missed this journey so far.

Drawn from Yello's maverick path – from their 'Solid Pleasure' debut to last year's 'Stella' – it shapes up as a succinct reminder of their cinematic soundscapes and the profound influence of that sound on a whole universe of '80s pop. Their marriage of European cunning and grinding dance rhythms has been squeezed miraculously into one fluent rush, re-mixed by Meier's collaborator Boris Blank.

Meier, in the meantime, appears a somewhat unlikely pop idol. Middleaged, moustachioed, very soberly attired, he looks like a cross between merchant banker and mad artist. Former professional golfer and professional gambler, this millionaire's son mostly plays at full-time artist. He knows Yello only as well as he knows the stranger on the bus... but sometimes like the back of his hand.

"Meaning is important," he banters, "but Yello never meant anything in the strictest sense. The music was always a statement on its own, and the pieces change every time you hear them.

"I have a favourite painting in a

museum in Italy and, every two or three years, I take time out to see it. It's always the same painting but I sometimes hardly recognise it because I've obviously changed. There's no such thing as a finished piece of art."

Meier is an endless stream of parable, illustrating every other point with some dense metaphor. He reserves the right to remain opaque.

"I refuse to talk about the music. I think, by definition, what is said by this music cannot be said better. If we want to talk about music, we should have a record-player here and we could just listen. I could say some general things about our sound – that it is narrative, it evokes pictures, it is quite movie-like.

"It's a kid's approach at having found something and then playing with it. For example, the name Yello has nothing to do with the colour, it's more like a name I would give to a toy for children. The entire notion of Yello is playful."

OLDRUSH' APPEARS like some clever sidestep from the established Yello path. Having left their early, experimental collages for more measured pop works like 1983's 'You Gotta Say Yes To Another Excess' and the more recent 'Stella', this new material must rank as a severe reversal.

"It is a return of a sort," Deiter admits. "The record company are complaining that we won't get airplay off it. But it's important for us to release it at this point, to show the kind of sound we've been working on for some of this last year."

For Meier, to detach and to muse are second nature. Nothing is trivial. He tells me about himself with all manner of frankness, then later, I realise that Deiter Meier gives only a whisker away.

As with his swarming melodies and his tales of paradox, he is lethal in his everyday calm. I learn so much about the solemn man in 90 minutes but, during that time, he remains the most vexed question in pop.

"Asking where I get my shoes and tie from are not trivial queries at all. It's at least as interesting as how we do the music. The incidental areas are important to me, there's nothing more or less important. The way I order another drink in this tea room is just as important as how I create my lyrics."

Brilliantly observant in their fiction, Yello are stylish and subversive in a dramatic way. Like this inscrutable dreamer before me, Yello enjoy incomplete things, more chance than

"I never finish a book," he declares.

"I've only finished about a dozen books in my whole life.

"Of course, I don't mind leaving things incomplete. Sometimes I go to Milan to see a certain opera I like very much and, after ten minutes, I walk out because it's not the right mood for me at this time. Sometimes I walk out of very expensive restaurants because the meal is not right for me."

However, he's firm on some ground. The only ambition, for example, is to be good.

"It's a moral category, a way of living," he declares. "It's not something you actually achieve, which is the mistake that most revolutionaries make. When the revolution has happened, they think the work has been done, but it should be a permanent revolution.

"Asking us how we keep our sense of challenge in Yello is like asking a kid how he can go into the same sandpit every day. As long as you are pleased to be making forms, building your little

castles and your little houses, you just do it. It only becomes absurd when you're forced to think about it.

"Fame is a different question altogether. The reasons for keeping Yello going stay the same, only we sell a few more records than a few years ago, which is nice, but a highly unimportant guideline. I see it as a dangerous challenge now that we're successful. Of course, I like it, but it's not something we aimed at.

T TIMES, the very rich schemer seems quite at odds with the nature of Yello. To their eroticism, he appears remarkably sexless. To their incorrigible mischief, he's surprisingly rational. As always, of course, Yello are just a part of his globe-trotting world.

Meier's other habits and indulgences are as wide as ever. There are exhibitions of his drawings and photographs, children's books, another film to direct in the autumn, an essay on the impossibility of disarmament, together with work for a new Yello LP later in the year. All this is doubtless infused with his dabbling instinct and, he claims, "a sense of disquietude, a strangely fearful feeling".

"That's why I see myself as the dilettante, as it seems the only proper way to approach anything interesting anyhow. For me, to know how to do something is not to want to do it, because then it's boring. Every video I make, I'm always scared because I have all these abstract ideas and I must find out whether they work or not."

When I want to talk about Meier's moustache, he wants to tell me about the philosopher Wittgenstein. When I prompt him for one single favourite song, he tells me it could be a little boy

who is hammering on a tin somewhere in Havana, or it could be something by the Symphony Orchestra Of Chicago. Deiter Meier likes to stretch the context of things.

When we prepare to leave, he asks if I'd like to accompany him to the Andy Warhol Exibition, opened just around the corner from this hotel.

"Come on, let's go see Andy, the old motherf*****," he almost, almost breezes.

Arriving, we scamper past George Melly, slip around Meier's old friend Andy, and smirk awkwardly at the man's latest lump of artistic bankcruptcy.

I leave him talking to Duran Duran art-fake Nick Rhodes, enthusiastically opening a discourse on the steam that comes out of the roads in New York.

Deiter Meier, for the record, is not smiling.

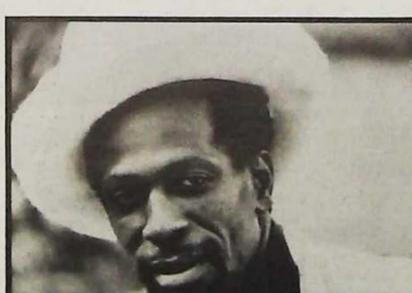

INETECH

FOR MY money, Roland certainly stole the show on the trade days of the British Music Fair, thanks to a stunning exhibition of their latest drum pads and padtriggered gadgetry by Tommy Snyder.

Snyder's sizzling set
(complete with one-man,
three-part vocal harmonies,
thanks to a pair of Boss Pitch
Shifters controlled by a
sequencer and synth) must
surely mark the arrival of the
complete instrumentalist who
can now base himself solely
around 'drums' of one
persuasion of another.

Many other companies have cottoned on to this new freedom for drummers (Simmons and Yamaha for two), but no one else has Roland's depth of product in drum machines, pads and instrument modules.

But though it may be more newsworthy to claim it, keyboards are not quite dead yet! Of the many new arrivals, two surefire winners were to be found on the modest Ensoniq stand.

The ESQ-1 Digital Synth plus eight-track sequencer is surely the one to beat this year, even at its slightly increased price of £1,120. And the SDP-1 Sampled Piano, which has had a facelift since I last saw it, has an improved action which will make it all the more attractive to the £1,000 digital piano seeker.

The Yamaha 'village' was simply too massive and allencompassing to report on in depth here, but one product or rather package – must be mentioned. The Midi Studio

System (seen in Japan as the X'Art), consisting of DX100, QX21, RX21, monitor speakers, mixer and four-track recorder, all mounted on a good £100-worth of very hi-tech stand-cum-work-station, will sell at £1,800 or less, and is a complete system not to be missed.

Korg too had a healthy showing of new gear, including a brand new (flown in the day before) digital piano selling for £699. Rather a home-based, if pleasing, effort, it's unlikely to outshine Korg's DSS-1 or SG-1 – the two current flagships in the range of synth/sampler/piano-type keyboards.

Meanwhile, outside the official show, in a neighbouring hotel, sampling kings e-mu hosted a very pleasant and mind-blowing evening to launch the Emax – a low cost (though minimally less effective) version of the thunderous E-11. Having basically reduced the Emulator to a chip the size of a box of Swan Vestas, e-mu can now offer the resultant Emax at under £2,000. Gulp. Yes please.

But drummers have definitely got the most to look forward to this year. MIDI have widened their scope of control way beyond rhythmic percussion type elements in music. From now on, keyboardists will have to fight to keep their position at the top of the technological tree!

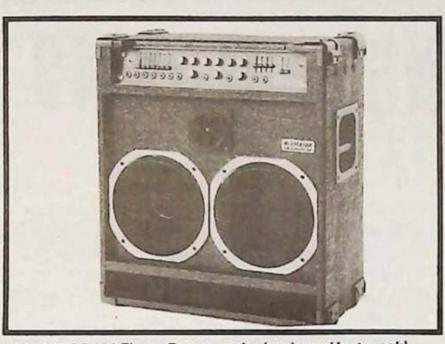

demoing the Shadow GTM-6 guitar-MIDI converter, Roland showing off their own GR-MIDI add-on package and a sadly slimmed-down but nevertheless active Summerfield exhibiting the Ibanez MIDI guitar system, there was plenty to distract axe-players from the inevitable run of new shapes, new finishes and super-duper wang bar systems.

Perhaps the most exciting product for guitarists was not actually at the show, although a lucky few got a sneak preview 'around the corner'. It's the British designed and built Stepp, a complete guitar synth in one unit, which is claimed to knock spots off anything currently on the market.

Looking superficially like the Synthaxe, in that it has a guitar neck mated to what looks like a computer body, it will sell for a lot less than the latter's inaccessible thousands. A full press launch is expected soon.

At the absolute opposite end of the market, the quality of cheap guitars is becoming frighteningly good.

Hohner have some nigh-on amazing Strat and Flying V replicas at just £100, while Mark Ray on the Westone was justifiably proud of his new £150 Clipper Six, a Teleish axe with a single, switchable humbucker which was designed in Britain, built in Japan and shipped over to the show all within the space of two weeks.

Washburn are also now using Korean labour to assemble Japanese guitar parts into very tasty-looking beasts that you can pick up for £200 or less, and the same company is bound to do some good business on the Rhythmstick, a guitarish-looking sling-on drum controller from the German

Dynacord company, whose complete range Washburn have now taken on.

The Rhythmstick comes in MIDI or non-MIDI versions at around £500 and £400 respectively. Carl Palmer seemed to be enjoying his, and many more are bound to follow.

Amplification - the mainstay of the British instrument manufacturing industry - was at the show in abundance, with new finishes like Carlsbro's abounding. Nice to see Alligator getting the cosmetics up to the standard of their electronics, and I'll be surprised if Marshall don't do a bomb on their miniature Marshall Lead 12 stacks (a little head plus two cabs each fitted with one ten-inch speaker) which are priced at under £200, complete.

Best amp at the show, though, was Peavey's amazing little 15 watt practice combo, which has incredibly versatile EQ and really convincing distortion circuit, all for just £79.95.

Best stand at the show – at least in terms of entertainment value – had to be Sound Technology's. They had robot dancers throwing bananas at people, coconuts strewn around the floor, and their demo booth was a zoo cage. I'd even say that someone there was intent on making monkeys out of us all, if I didn't know that it's worth practically any degree of humiliation to get your hands on one of their Alesis.

"I find life a very difficult process. It's fraught with pitfalls, disappointments, and surprises. And it's tragic."

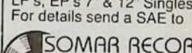

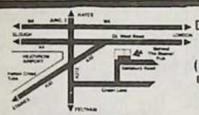
