They play a cheap 99p gig in their home town at Hull Tower on August 24 which will be filmed for the BBC's Rock Around The Clock.

They also play the London Kilburn National Ballroom on October 9.

Tickets will be £4 with a £1 rebate for UB40 holders on the door. An extensive autumn tour is also being planned.

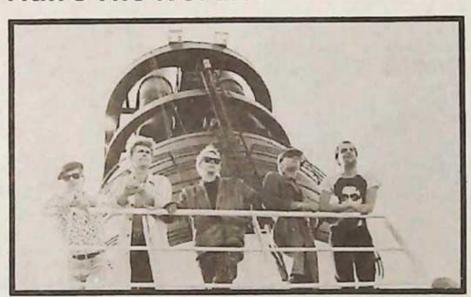

THE LEATHER NUN's "cover" of Abba's 'Gimme Gimme Gimme (A Man After Midnight)', which has been wallowing around the indie charts for some time, gets a further lease of life with a 12-inch remix on Wire this week (see Singles, page 12).

There's a 'Rejected Version' and a 'Chopper Mix', not to mention a 'Suckers Version' of 'Lollipop'.

Wire have also taken the opportunity to reissue The Leather Nun's first two singles which have been unavailable for some time.

'Slow Death' comes in a mini-album format that includes three more tracks - 'No Rule', 'Easam 1 Natt' and 'Death Threats' - on the A-side and a 15-minute live version of 'Slow Death' on the B-side.

The second single, 'Primemover', comes with its original B-side 'FFA' which has become a gay club favourite.

SHOWS

SPANDAU BALLET, back in the Top Ten with their 'Fight For Ourselves' single, will be playing their first British gigs for two years in December.

JEAN CARNE comes over at the end of this month for two concerts at London's Kertish Town Town And Country Club on August 30 and 31.

THE COMMUNARDS release a new single this weekend called 'Don't Leave Me This Way' (originally recorded by Harold Melvin And The Blues Notes) on London.

The record features newcomer Sarah Jayne Morris, formerly with Republic and Happy End, who accompanied Jimmy Somerville and Richard Coles on their recent UK tour.

After touring Europe, they return to the UK in November when a tour of this country is planned, but no dates are confirmed as yet.

Following this, Sarah Jayne Morris plans to pursue a solo career.

THE FOUNTAINHEAD from **Dublin return to London this** month for a couple of gigs to coincide with the release of their second UK single titled 'Rhythm Method' on China.

They will be headlining at the Marquee on August 14, and supporting The Art Of Noise at the Hammersmith Odeon on August 15. An October tour is planned.

SAXON, who have their new single 'Waiting For The Night' released by EMI this weekend, have a warm-up show for their Reading Festival appearance at Nottingham Rock City on August 20. Tickets are £5.

BOY GEORGE's personal nightmare continued last week when American musician Michael Rudetski, who came over to work with him on some new songs, was found dead in his Hampstead home, apparently from a drug overdose.

Rudetski, a 27 year old keyboard player from New York, was a member of Man Parrish when they had their 'Hip Hop Be Bop' hit in 1983.

He'd known Boy George for the last two years and had contributed to Culture Club's 'From Luxury To Heartache' album.

At the beginning of last week he was flown over to London by Virgin Records, at Boy George's request, to work on material for a new project

When they return they'll start work on the follow-up to their number two album 'Picture Book'.

LOUDON WAINWRIGHT 111, who used to be the new Bob Dylan until he became Captain Calvin Spaulding in MASH instead, returns in stereo this autumn with a British tour which coincides with a re-run of the MASH series on BBC2.

Loudon has been recording a new album, with Richard Thompson producing, called 'More Love Songs' which will be out on Demon on September 5, preceded by a single called 'Unhappy Anniversary'.

The tour begins at Aberdeen Music Hall on October 2 and continues at Glasgow Pavilion 4, Edinburgh Queens Hall 5, Inverness Eden Court Theatre 6, Leeds Irish Centre 8, Nottingham Old Vic 9, Hull Spring Street Theatre 10, Cardiff Sherman Theatre 12, London Camden Shaw Theatre 13-19, Southport Arts Centre 22, Manchester International 24, Exeter Barnfield Theatre 27, Bristol Top Spot 29, Birmingham Red Lion 31 – November 1, Sheffield Leadmill 2, Newry Par Hall 4, Belfast New Vic 5, Omagh Knocknamo 6, Cork Conally Hall 8, Dublin Olympia 9.

DWIGHT YOAKAM, whose "hard country" album 'Guitars, Cadillacs Etc' has been causing a stir since its release here last month, has added another date to his first British tour.

Keyboard player's body found in flat

called The Spank Gang.

He collapsed during a rehearsal session at the Gaslight Studios in Brixton on August 5 and was taken back to Boy George's house and put to hed

His body was found on the living room floor at around 4am on August 6 by Boy George's brother Kevin O'Dowd, who'd just returned from a night at the Limelight Club. Boy George had returned to his St John's Wood house with his housekeeper after seeing Rudetski home.

Rudetski is believed to have died of respiratory failure due to a mixture of heroin and cocaine, although a pathologist's report won't be completed until later this week.

Rudetski was a known drug

user in New York – some reports even said he was a registered addict – but no drugs were found on him when he was strip-searched on his arrival at Heathrow Airport.

Boy George and Kevin have already given statements to the police, who say there are no suspicious circumstances attached to the death, and that no charges will be forthcoming.

THE POGUES have their 'Haunted' song from the Sid 'N' Nancy movie released as a single by MCA this weekend.

The single also includes 'Junk Theme' from the Alex Cox-directed film, and the 12inch has the notoriously unavailable 'Hot Dogs With Everything'.

The Pogues are touring France after which they head off to Spain to star in a spaghetti western directed by... Alex Cox.

WHAM! finally release their video Foreign Skies – The Video Of The China Tour on August 18. The film, which includes live footage as well as George and Andrew being inscrutable, is to be entered in the Guinness Book Of Records as having the largest audience at any film premiere, when it was shown at Wham!'s final concert.

IN TUA NUA, the Irish septet who received a lot of attention earlier this summer when they opened several festivals for Simple Minds, will be in London on August 21 for a one-off concert at the Mean Fiddler in Harlesden.

LLOYD COLE AND THE COMMOTIONS will play two concerts for Oxfam in connection with Artists Against Apartheid.

and 6 will also include
Scottish bands Love And
Money, The Big Dish, and "a

OZZY OSBOURNE had a lawsuit, brought against him by the parents of a boy who allegedly shot himself after listening to his lyrics, thrown out of court in Los Angeles last week.

The parents of 19-year-old John McCollum had claimed that he'd decided to kill himself after listening to Ozzy's 'Suicide Solution'.

But the judge ruled that it couldn't be proved that Ozzy's lyrics incited suicide. "They may be objectionable to many, but his music has First Amendment protection too," he said.

Ozzy was, not surprisingly, relieved. "It was ludicrous to suggest that my music had caused this boy to commit suicide," he said.

"To sue me, my record company and distributors instead of accepting the reality of the situation – that the guy was obviously depressed anyway – is tantamount to admitting that the parents were at fault in not recognising his condition before the tragedy.

"Of course I'm upset that John McCollum took his own life. But to blame me is typical of the hysterical anti-Ozzy lobby in the States."

GENESIS release a new single called 'In Too Deep', which is backed with the previously unreleased 'Do The Neurotic', on Virgin on August 18.

The single is also featured in the forthcoming film Mona Lisa, which opens next month.

Genesis are due to start rehearsals for their world tour later this month. The tour will begin in the US in mid-September and will span ten months, taking them all over America, Australia, New Zealand and Japan, followed by Europe and the UK next spring.

The UK dates are not as yet confirmed, but are expected to take place at the end of the tour. Dates will be announced in the New Year.

IRON MAIDEN have their first new studio material for two years released next weekend on EMI.

It's a single called 'Wasted Years', written by Adrian Smith and recorded in the Bahamas, New York and Amsterdam (well, makes a change from Willesden).

The B-side is 'Reach Out', which was written by "friends of the band" with Adrian Smith on lead vocals, while the 12-inch contains 'The Sheriff Of Huddersfield', which is dedicated to their manager, the legendary Rod Smallwallet.

The band are now in Germany preparing for their world tour which reaches Britain in October.

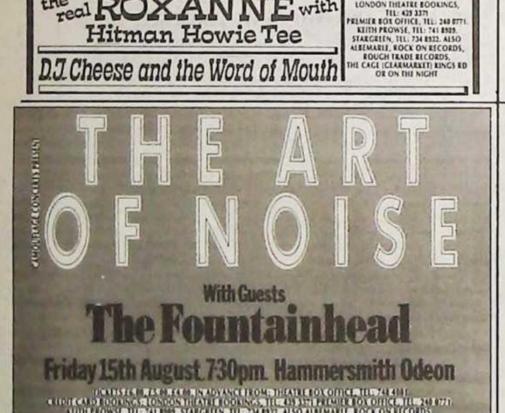

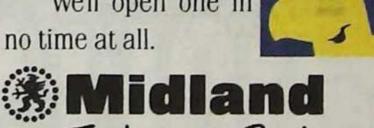

BACKTRACKS

SAN FRANCISCO's "Summer Of Love" comes to you this year via Brentford and Edsel Records who've been dropping tabs – correction, keeping tabs – on some of the obscure '60s groups to crawl out of the Bay Area.

The West Coast Pop Art Experimental Band were a mystery then and have remained so ever since despite a 'Legendary Unreleased Album' which came out in 1982 and created more confusion than it solved. 'Transparent Day' condenses their 'Part One' and 'Part Two' albums onto one record and confirms that their acid folk was as genially spaced out as their reputation.

Sopwith Camel had an equally tenuous hold on reality, although they did have a novelty song called 'Hello Hello' which could have been a big hit if anybody had been together enough to work on it. The track is included on their reissued 'Desolation Angels' album, where their crazed jug-band style made The Lovin' Spoonful sound very straight in comparison. Typically, by the time the album originally came out the band had already split up.

Big Brother And The Holding Company, who were relatively normal in comparison, have their two post-Janis Joplin albums, 'Be A Brother' and 'How Hard It Is' rolled into one album called 'Joseph's Coat'. While it shows off their musical skills, not even the addition of Nick Gravenites and David Schallok can compensate for the excitement Janis took away with her.

VENOM experience the first heady whiff of nostalgia with an album called 'The Singles '80-'86' on Raw Power. It's made up of their Neat singles together with B-sides and additional 12-inch tracks.

EGGS OVER EASY, the authentic American bar band who introduced a whole generation of British musicians to live country rock when they based themselves in London in the early '70s (with Animals drummer John Steel adding the British beef), have their only album 'Good 'N' Cheap', revived by Edsel. It was recorded in 1972 after they'd returned to the States and was produced by Link Wray. Unfortunately,

the whole band mellowed into oblivion in California soon afterwards.

TYGERS OF PAN TANG, the Geordie NWOBHM (New Wave Of British Heavy Metal for those of you who've forgotten), who toured with Malden, Leppard and Saxon and provided a useful launching pad for guitarist John Sykes, have some unreleased former glories issued by Neat. 'First Kill' features the original line-up with Jess Cox and Robb Weir and was recorded "live" in the studio at the turn of the '80s.

SYL JOHNSON, the Mississippi bluesmanturned-soul-singer who nearly had a hit with Al Green's 'Take Me To The River' on Hi in 1975, has a compilation of earlier material out on Charly called 'Is It Because I'm Black?'. The title track headed in 1969 mid-tempo soul album that made the US R&B Top 30. There's also a livelier tongue-in-funk single called 'Dresses Too Short'.

captain Beefheart's 'Mirror Man' album, originally released in 1971 and misleadingly credited as being recorded in 1965, has been retrieved for fresh analysis by Edsel. Scholars have now carbon-dated the sessions to late '67/late '68, which places it closer to 'Strictly Personal' than 'Safe As Milk'. The music remains just as gloriously manic.

Z Z HILL, the roaming bluesman who finally rediscovered his roots and was getting some of the recognition he deserved before he died in 1984, has the best of his '80s material released by Malaco (through PRT) called 'Z Z Hill's Greatest Hits'. It includes 'Down Home Blues' and 'I'm A Blues Man' among the eleven songs.

'THE ORIGINALS' is a 32-track double album of mainly '60s American hits "that have influenced and inspired the charts of the '80s". Nearly half of them are from Motown with Atlantic contributing another fistful, but the selections delve beyond the usual hoary classics and dredge up The Impressions' 'People Get Ready', William Bell & Judy Clay's 'Private Number' and Eddie Holman's 'Hey There Lonely Girl'.

SPLASH, a dance-orientated band, release their first single, entitled 'Qu' Est-Ce Que C'Est?', on Rocket this week.

MATT MOFFITT, Australian cult hero, releases his first solo LP 'As Little As A Look' on CBS.

JOHN WAITE, who flies over to Britain with his No Brakes Band to appear at the Reading Festival, releases his new single 'If Anybody Had A Heart' this week. It's featured in the forthcoming film About Last Night.

EAV, who are apparently
Austria's answer to Black
Lace, have a single that
everyone could learn to love
to hate out on EMI this week
called 'Ba-Ba-Bankrobbery'.

FULL FORCE release their second LP, 'Full Force Get Busy 1 Time' on CBS, and are due to visit the UK soon.

ALIEN SEX FIEND have now got their own record label, VAT (through Cherry Red), to "play around with". Their single is due next month and there's an album scheduled for October, enigmatically entitled 'It'.

FCORD NE WS

BILLY JOEL brings out his new album after a two and a half year wait called 'The Bridge'. It features Cyndi Lauper, Ray Charles and Steve Winwood. Although he begins a major US tour next month, there are no plans to play over here as yet.

MISSING PERSONS, who have been AWOL for three years, appear again on vinyl with a single, 'I Can't Think About Dancing', and album, 'Colour In Your Eyes', both out this week on Capitol.

WORLD PARTY, who include ex-Waterboy Karl Wallinger, release their debut album 'Private Revolution' on Chrysalis/Ensign. Karl, who produced the album, also plays most of the instruments. stranger than fiction release their debut single featuring three tracks, 'Prelude'/'Is She In Love With Love' and 'The Realisation',

on Constitution (through

Rough Trade).

SAXON, "the perennial purveyors of superior 'Power Rock'", release a new single, 'Waiting For The Night', on August 18 in time for their Reading Festival spot.

MAORI REGGAE makes its first British inroads this month, with albums from Dread Beat & Blood ('Tribute To A Friend'), and Aotearoa, who even sing in the Maori language "to reggae rhythms". Their LP is called 'Tihei Mauriora'. Both records are on Jayrem Records.

I START COMING, the duo who recently signed to Mute, release 'Catch That Look' from their forthcoming mini-album as a single this week.

GWEN GUTHRIE, still climbing the charts with her single 'Ain't Nothing Goin' On But The Rent', hopes for the same success with her forthcoming album 'Good To Go Lover' on Polydor.

SMILEY CULTURE, the multitalented MC/DJ/TV personality, steps out with his first single for Polydor this week, called 'School Time Chronicle'. The flip side is 'So What', taken from Absolute Beginners.

THE BIG DISH, Aidrie's finest, have their single 'Slide' out on Virgin on August 18 as a prelude to their autumn college tour.

MONSTERS OF ROCK

featuring THE SCORPIONS

OZZY OSBOURNE

IT'S BEEN a while since we devoted this column to a set of short, specific enquiries in the old Wax Fax tradition. Just for fun, before the next major retrospective, here's a couple received during the last couple of months:

Ray Franks of Bournemouth says: "I don't think you've ever covered Spandau Ballet in detail in Info Riot. I'm not after a complete discography, but I am trying to round up the 12-inch versions of some of their singles. Can you confirm that there were 12-inchers of all the following (I know for a fact that most of them exist), but more importantly also point out which ones had additional tracks not on the 7-inch equivalents or elsewhere."

'Muscle Bound'/'Glow' was on 12-inch as CHS12 2509, in 1981. While the two titles were the same as on the 7-inch single, the tracks were reversed to make 'Glow' the A-side, and it was an 8 min 10 sec version, as opposed to the 3 min 48 sec 7-inch cut. 'Muscle Bound' was also almost a minute longer on 12-inch. Moreover, the large format had a pic sleeve illustrating a statue on a pedestal, while the 7-incher came in the white-with-border Reformation sleeve.

'Chant No 1 (I Don't Need This Pressure On)'/'Feel The Chant', the single which featured Beggar & Co, was on 12-inch as CHS12 2528. Same tracks again, but once again they were considerably longer versions than on the 7-inch, both sides running to just over six minutes.

The 12-inch version of 'Paint Me Down', on CHS12 2560, had a completely different flip from the 7incher, substituting the 6 min 54 sec 'Re-Paint' for 'Man With Guitar'. Interestingly, both had identical pic sleeves, just the appropriate wording being changed on the rear side. 'Paint Me Down' itself was almost twice as long on the 12-inch.

The 12-inch of 'Instinction' in 1982 (CHS12 2602) carried the same versions of the A-side and the flip 'Gently' as on the 7-inch single, but this time the larger format carried a lengthy extra track on the B-side too, in the form of a 'Chant No 1' remix which stretched to no less than 8 min 3 sec.

Moving on to 1984, we come to the 12-inch version of 'I'll Fly For You' (SPANX 4). The A-side of this had a 5 min 34 sec 'long version' of the cut (the 7-inch had the version from the 'Parade' album), plus the live 'To Cut A Long Story Short' which was the 7-inch flipside. The 12-inch B-side was an even longer 7 min 13 sec 'Glide Mix' version of 'I'll Fly For You'. Both formats shared the same artwork, but the 12-incher lacked the poster sleeve of the 7-inch disc, instead having a gatefold which opened up to a bare-torso shot of the group different from that in the poster, though clearly part of the same photo

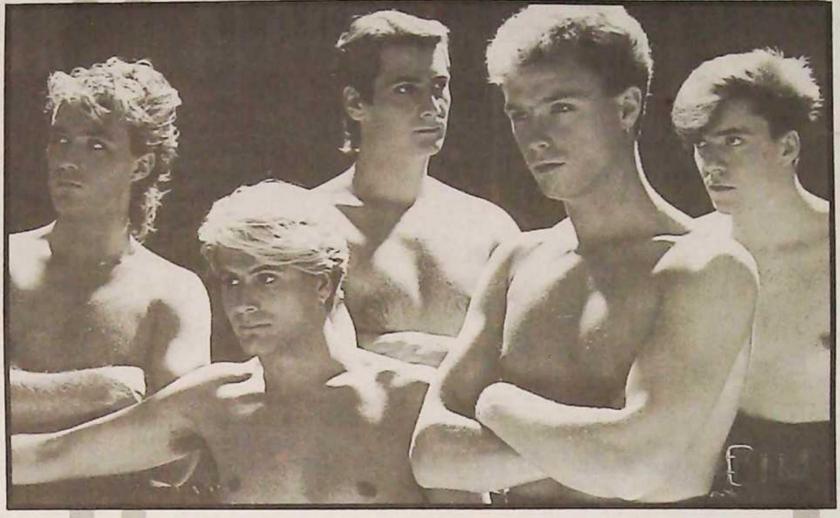
Finally, on Ray's list, 'Round And Round' (SPANX 6), also from 1984. He specifically wants to know whether the 12-inch sleeve carries a larger version of the four-page colour photo book that was stapled inside the 7-inch gatefold sleeve. The answer is no, it doesn't, and that this was one of the rare occasions on which a 7-inch sleeve gave the better deal (though I suspect it was a limited edition). The 12-inch not only has no extra picture pages, but no gatefold merely the same outer front and backcover artwork. In compensation, the record again carried more music, with a longer version of 'Round And Round' on the A-side, and a live cut of 'Gold' joining the live 'True' from the 7-inch on the B-side.

On an utterly trivial point - for people who have this particular Spandau pic sleeve - on the rear shot, the second girl from the left under the 'Amalgamated Wheel And Cartwrights' banner in the parade is Samantha Fox, though not at all easy to recognise. In the 7-inch gatefold, she's more easily spotted in a couple of shots with the group. There is no evidence that Sam ever recorded with Spandau, so don't let's start another rock trivia fairy story

Incidentally, before the letters flood in, I know I haven't given details of all Spandau Ballet 12-inchers, but I was answering Ray Franks' query about specific records. Maybe a full discog sometime . . .

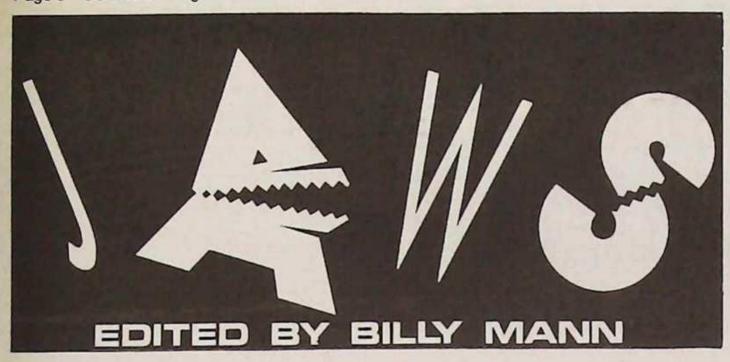
Birmingham, who asks if I've heard of a Jimi Hendrix album titled 'Guitar Experience'. He's been told it isn't a bootleg, but has established that it's not an official UK release, so he assumes it's an import.

It is an import, and as far as I can tell it is the real McCoy and not a bootleg. 'Guitar Experience' was a double album issued in Holland about two years ago, on Turning Point DB 50070. It might well be found in larger branches of shops like HMV or Virgin, since it's a Euro-import. The tracks appear to be the material which Hendrix recorded with Curtis Knight; they've been on probably dozens of albums worldwide over the last 18 years or so, but I assume such compilations are still of interest to collectors. Just to check, here's the track run-down, which I found in Jos Stikvoort's 1984 Popzamelwerk

'Flashing'/'Hush Now'/'No Business'/ 'UFO'/'Love, Love'/'Hornet's Nest'/ 'Ballad Of Jimi'/'How Would You Feel'/ 'I'm A Man'/'Simon Says'/'My Heart Is Higher'/'Day Tripper'/'Level'/'Gloomy Monday'/'Mercy Lady Day'/'Hold On To What You Got'/'I've Got A Sweet Little Angel'

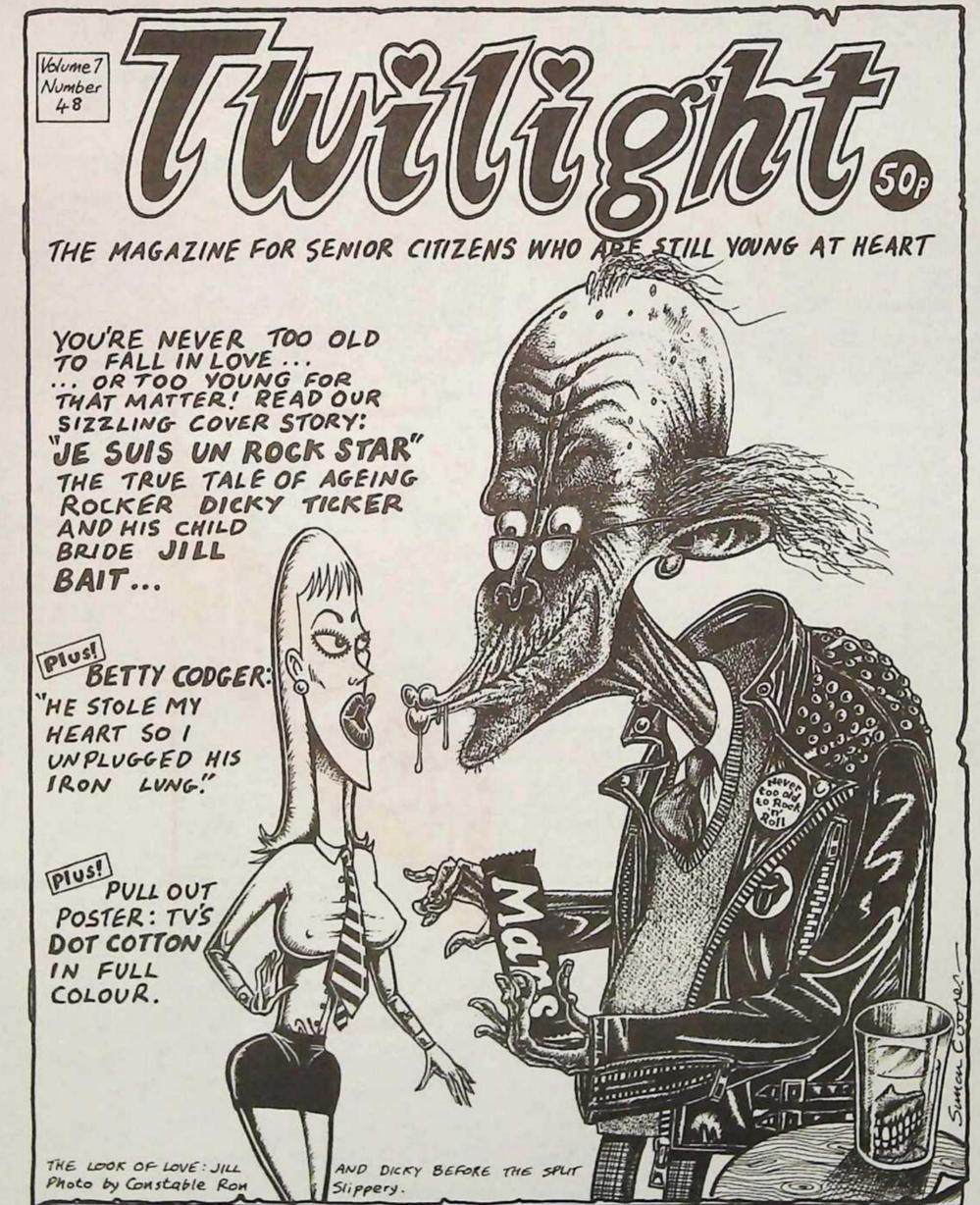

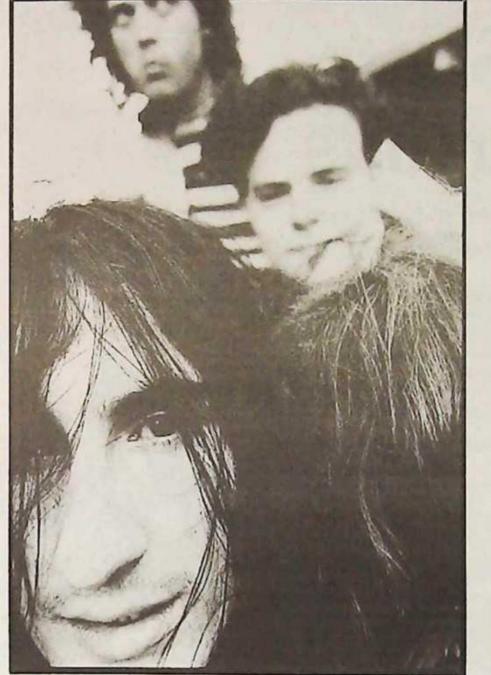

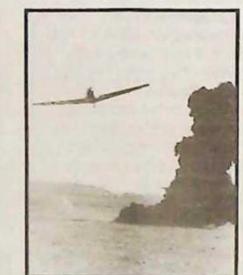

EAN AND mouthy. Mighty Mighty. "We make completely irresistible, brilliant pop music." Loud and shiny. Mighty Mighty.

"If you come to one of our gigs and fail to be moved, there must be something wrong with you."

Under a brave, all-challenging banner of 'New Pop' come five gouty wimps marching and yelling like a bunch of determined kittens. They're ready to whine and purr to convince you that they are the best pop band in the world. And who is to say they're not? With a display of invigorating lyrics and catchy tuuuunes, Mighty Mighty show that they are one of the more bouncy groups to fall away from the so-called 'shambling pop' bandwagon, which includes such luminaries as The Wolfhounds, The Mighty Lemon Drops and The Pastels.

Mighty Mighty are the latest recruits to pop romanticism, believing that songs come before image and profit margins. We'll forgive their innocence for the time being.

Mighty Mighty aren't setting out to revolutionise or stretch the frontiers of pop music, like, say, Stump, but are keen to penetrate into the basics with their own composed flyweight dandyism.

Mighty Mighty's motto:

'Be nice to everybody except the ones you hate.'

ORMED IN Birmingham three years ago. Mighty Mighty took their name from a Curtis Mayfield record and now consist of Hugh, the lanky be-goggled vocalist with 'Abba' scrawled across the back of his leather, Mick, the unstylish C&A guitar lyricist, H, the quiet drummer, Peter, the opinionated REM fan and organ player, and finally Russell, the Dick

Emery lookalike bassist.

In Birmingham, they played virtually unnoticed in enforced solitude. This meant they were forced to finance their sprightly debut single 'Everybody Knows The Monkey' on their own Girlie Records.

Hugh expains: "It was a last ditch attempt to get some attention, really, because no one had taken any notice of us before that. We approached Vindaloo Records, the only independent in Birmingham, but Rob Lloyd said he didn't really like the music. Which is fair enough, so we saved £500 and spent half a day In the studio recording it. But it did the trick, everyone started to listen and we got some press."

The single, though somewhat murky and one-dimensional in production, still shows a delightful, reviving breeziness. It's brimming with post-Postcard riffs that slice through burlesque beats and smooth organ ditties that jingle and jangle, producing a whirling pop hurricane that swallows up everyone wise enough to stand under Mighty Mighty's tranquil storm. The follow-up release, 'Is There Anyone Out There?', also on Girlie Records, shows more of the mature abundance of influences

Mighty Mighty weave together.

The reasons?

Peter: "We wanted to release classic pop singles. Every song we write is written with the idea of a single. Y'know, we've now got 33 songs and all of them are ten times stronger than anything you'll hear in the Top 30. We just write pop songs."

Hugh, trying to calm down Peter's claims: "Obviously not all of our songs are as good each other, but they're all still pretty brilliant. I quite like some avante garde music but I can't see the point to it sometimes. We're a pop group and we are recording songs that we think other people would love to listen to, and what we love listening to ourselves."

Russell comes in, "We're not a samey group either, unlike The Mighty Lemon Drops or The Shop Assistants, whose songs all sound the same."

This, of course, isn't exactly true.

Mighty Mighty do have a sound, something that reminds me of salads, mayonnaise and spring onions. Like most of the class of '86, Mighty Mighty are too refined and defined to fit comfortably under the awful, John Peel coined, 'shambling' tag, and they've also been inspired

by their contempt for popular music.

Hugh: "Most of pop music today is complete crap. It's groups like The Jesus And Mary Chain and The Housemartins who prove, though, that you don't have stoop to a Top 30 image or fear Radio I producers.

"I mean, I love pop music. When I used to buy a pop record it would make me feel good. It meant something just to listen to it, whereas most pop music today means nothing to the people who make it or the people who buy it."

How do you feel about being lumped in with the aforementioned 'shambling' bands?

Peter: "It's better than being pushed out completely and ignored. As long as we don't sink with it when it finally folds, as it surely

Hugh: "There's going to be a massive backlash against all these groups soon and there's going to be a handful of groups who come out of it and stay for a few years. We're going to be one of them."

Brave talk, and only time will tell if it rings true or hollow.

Do you hate anybody?

Hugh: "We only hate bad pop music." Mighty Mighty, high on polyunsaturates.

Beneath those favourite dark shades, behind those ridiculous sideburns and within those ever so 'rawk 'n' roll' checked shirts, there beats "something that will keep us warm tonight".

The Beat Farmers were just about the only American touring party of last year I actually enjoyed. The subsequent album release was a little disappointing, but this hour of footage shot live in Los Angeles catches the band at something approaching their best.

They play country blue rock
'n' roll. They cut from a Velvet
Underground cover, 'There She
Goes Again', to a Neil Young
cover, 'Powderfinger', and they
fill the gaps between
impeccably. With
straightforward hammer-down
moments of sorrow. With acute
observations such as 'Gun Sale
At The Church'. With kazoos.

And with the odd break from the back by drummer Country Dick, who takes to the front of the stage and the first few rows of the audience to jolly things a long a little.

Unlike most American bands,

But anyway, that's not my main gripe with this obituarycum-post mortem for the longest running unsung zeros of the underground. It is, instead, that they couldn't write a decent tune, not even if the very existence of their miserable ideals depended on it.

So for an hour (give or take what seems like an age), I get barraged by this junky poop culled from their farewell gig at a dancehall in London.

Cut in between songs are little snippets of the perpetrators of these crimes against music giving their invaluable opinion on aspects of the band's history. "When did you form, why did you split, what's your favourite colour?" Riveting stuff: this is what the kids want.

THE PRIMA donna as prat, or the prat as prima donna? You can take your pick as Prince totters his way through *Under The Cherry Moon* on his five-inch heels, oblivious to the guffaws as he flaunts his preposterous ego.

After all, you've read the tittle tattle. You know the guy's a rich, pampered weirdo. And nobody's going to say "no" to Prince if they want to hang on to their cushy little number in his circle of acolytes.

With a plot that makes Purple Rain seem Brechtian, Under The Cherry Moon is loosely, very loosely, set in the '40s. That means it's in black and white and takes place on the French Riviera. With '60s cars and '70s helicopter. You get the picture? You've probably stumbled in on the tail-end of dozens of them on late night TV.

Prince (he's the pretty one, the only pretty one, apart from some of the girls) is a plano playing gigolo. A successful one. This much becomes clear in the first 30 seconds.

He sets his sights on the rebellious daughter (introducing Kristin Scott Thomas, an obstinate Sloane and not Prince's usual taste in ladies) of the richest guy on the coast, who also happens to be the local gangland boss

(Steven Berkoff, no less).

He works all his romantic charms on her, particularly when he dances on top of the white piano while his latest hit blares out of a ghetto blaster, a slice of out-of-period artistic licence that's equalled only by having the latest Miles Davis album cover lying on the chair in his bedsit.

And of course, they fall in lurv. This upsets Prince's business partner, a fine stooge of a man played by Revolution percussionist Jerome Benton, not to mention Berkoff who sets the heavies on him. But no man who wears a jacket carefully cut away to reveal his small but perfectly formed lumbar region is going to let a little thing like that bother him . . . But I won't spoil the end of the story for you.

It's all too easy to slag off. Prince's ham acting is so contagious that even Steven Berkoff catches the bug. But looking at it that way, you miss the first part of the joke, which is that Prince has hijacked somebody else's movie and abused it for his own nefarious purposes.

Once you've got that, there are plenty more laughs in store. Which is probably why Berkoff stuck it through to the end.

California rock hotel, and OZZY OSBOURNE talks lucidly about music, his kids, having fun and trying to get some liberality into this world. A lifetime later, it's morning in a California hotel and PAUL ELLIOTT watches a strong man crumble before his demon. PETER ANDERSON frames the final solution

ALIFORNIA, THE beautiful state full of beautiful people? Good God, no.

At nine in the evening the sun still hadn't quite dropped behind the stadium walls, and there, within spitting distance (if I make it a good 'un), sticky and heaving and licking its lips to Judas Priest's thumbscrewing 'Turbo', stood the wasted youth of sunny Sacramento.

Deep fried, gum-chewing and gaptoothed, this was ugly, it was rowdy, and it was packed like a rush hour tube in its eagerness to get close to what we were sharing a hotel with.

Sacramento told the big geezer in shorts that, yes please, they would like to kick some ass. Curtains up, the wanted man was lowered to the stage in the clutches of Ernie, a monstrous mock-up of Ozzy fresh off the 'Ultimate Sin' LP cover.

Over the next hour or two, Oz, magnificent in stars 'n' stripes outfit and matching cape, eclipsed the rusty desperation of openers Blue Öyster Cult with a Donington dress rehearsal (of sorts) which suggested that August 16 will be very much his party, regardless of however many bottles gatecrashers like Def Leppard and the Scorpions bring along.

I ain't so sure about Bad News, though . . .

America and Ozzy Osbourne could have been made for each other. To the mainstream press, always kicked into morally indignant overdrive by a flesh-ripping yarn or two, he's bread and butter. To the Parents Music Resource Centre, America's self-appointed public conscience, he's a red rag to bullish stupidity.

And to the firecracker-throwing kids who've swelled attendances on his ongoing US tour (it continues after Donington, too) he's a lasting addiction.

BROFFER

Seems like everybody's feeding off his ceaseless nervous energy in some way or another, so what does Ozzy get in return? Simply, a fat payoff, plus the satisfaction of wild punter response and heated media attention. What else could there be?

ATE AFTER the show, the three of us (me, Ozzy and the tape recorder which one day, I swear, Queensrÿche will regret laughing at) retired to the quiet of the hotel bar to talk.

It probably would've been quieter out on the freeway, seeing as some rich-looking, slackjawed plonkers took it upon themselves to 'upstage' the unwinding Ozzy with a mouthy piss-up on the piano, but we carried on anyway.

'New York, New York' suffered a slow, drunken death as I asked Ozzy whether America became a mere blur through the haze of continual touring.

"I dunno, really. I'm not one of these guys who goes round analysing everything. I'm not one of these f***** intellectuals who thinks, Oh yes, it's rather blurry today. I just get up there and do it, y'know?

"This was the first good gig I've done in weeks because I've had these things called polyps on my vocal chords and it's been getting kinda shaky for me. You get nervous when you get up there and you can't deliver what you know you really can."

Do you find time to enjoy travelling, or is it just a show after show routine?

"It's show after show. I do try and keep myself sane these days. I don't take, y'know, drugs, and I drink as little as I can, but I have benders and I go off for a while.

"It's still there, the drink problem. The thing is, after a show I like a few drinks, and it's kinda difficult to say no sometimes. But I'm a lot better than I used to be. I used to be out there all the time. That's where all the craziness comes from, me being f***** up on cocaine and booze all the time. I was a terrible coke freak for a while."

Having tried to dry out in the past, how do you now view the idea of prohibition?

"F*** off! I mean, come on, it's a choice. There are times when I feel, f*** this, I've got to have a drink.

"I've had my first drink tonight in 19 days. That's a bummer, actually, 'cause I shouldn't be drinking at all, but in rock 'n' roll, what do you do? You come offstage, you're full o' beans, you've done a great show, what are you gonna do? Sit there in the back of your limo playing with your dick?"

Ermm ...

"You can't f*** chicks, 'cause you're married. You can't have a good time. You can't drink. You end up sitting there like one of the Osmond brothers with a hard-on and an empty belly."

Is your attitude to drugs the same as it is to drink?

"I don't touch drugs if I can help it anymore. I've had my fair share of drugs, I've had my fair share of everything in my time. But me and drugs are a bad combination 'cause we go crazy together. That's when I go and do the most hideous stunts you can imagine.

"But I feel like a drink every now and again. I can't stop. I can stop on a daily basis, but I've gotta have something to release this tension. It's like going to a party with a glass of water and you sit there like a prick.

"What I'm saying is, I'm trying to fight this thing all the time, but I cannot see the day when I'll ever stop totally. For a lot of people I'm an idiot and a fool, because they can't see that you can't rock 'n' roll and not

drink. You can't quit drinking on the road. You can't quit anything on the road."

EDIA MONSTER. It's something that Ozzy's mutated into fairly naturally, the growth evident on each successive LP cover (everything from werewolves to tacky gobfuls of jam). It's all fine, I s'pose, until people start taking it to heart.

Like the airport official, nosy beyond the call of duty, who'd asked us who exactly we'd come all this way to see.

"Ozzy Osbourne? Did he, uh, bite any birds' heads off? Heh, heh, heh."

Ozzy takes the crap with as much grace as could be expected. But why bother to keep up the image?

"I don't try to keep to it, it's just that people won't let it go, y'know?"

You reckon it's more or less a press creation, then?

"I think most of it's been pulled way out of proportion. I mean, I don't give a shit what people say about me, it's just press, publicity. I just play music, y'know? I just get up there and give 'em the best shot I can on the day, and that's all I do.

"All this bullshit that surrounds Ozzy – the f***** animal thing – it's long overdue to quit that crap now. I look at it this way: all publicity is good publicity."

Even the stuff on the American news recently blaming you for the death of a (clearly unhinged) kid who jumped off a balcony at one of the gigs?

"I don't give a shit. It's a figment of their imagination. F*** 'em, they're idiots."

Have your kids mellowed you any?
"No, listen. I'm not professing to be
anything and I can't even play an
instrument. I just get 'em going a bit nutty
and having a good time and that's it.

"What gets me is all the people in this business, bands like The Style Council and all that shit, who try to put their political ideas into music. I think that sucks. Music should stop at entertainment.

"Politics is f*****. I don't know anything about it, but as far as I know it's f****.

They never do me any favours, and they never do anybody any favours by building more and more destructive weapons, although I know that they're a necessary evil that we've got to have."

The PMRC ...

"They need a good f*****," Ozzy snaps.

As a parent, don't you agree that they've a cause for concern?

"Bullshit! What did they listen to as kids? The PMRC? They're just a bunch of frustrated groupies."

Is there any music that offends you?

"There's certain things that I don't like, but nothing offends me. If it's played, and people like it, then what right have I got to say it's no good? I may not like it, but

somebody does."

Why are all the God-fearing types after your blood?

"Because I'm the prime target for attack.
I'm glad in a way, 'cause I get so much
press it's untrue. I've just fired me publicity
agent. I don't need him any more."

Are you a strict parent?

"I'm a very good parent. Or I try to be. A very loving parent. I don't understand all this 'strict parents' shit. I look at my kids as being young adults, young people, and I speak to them as one to one, like I'm speaking to you now.

"For instance, I spoke to my oldest daughter this morning who wants to change school, and I said, Well, darling, you've got the choice. If you don't like it and you're pissed off with it, I can't tell you that you've got to stay there 'cause if you're not happy you're not gonna come up with any results.

"I mean, I went to school and just played truant." (Worrr! It's all coming out now! Is his Mum reading this?) "I didn't wanna know.

"And I speak to my kids like people, not this coochiecoochie shit, 'cause that kid'd turn round and say, F*** you, what's the matter with you?"

Have you ever felt awkward communicating with an adolescent audience?

"No. I'm an adolescent myself, I s'pose." How do you remember yourself as Mrs Osbourne's little boy?

"I was a nutcase. A rogue, a rebel, a vagabond, misunderstood and all that shit. I was one of them."

What if your kids rebelled against you?
"I honestly don't think they would
because I'm a fair kind of a guy. I realise
that they've got their own lives to lead.

"If my son was a drug addict then I'd do
the best that I could to fix him up
(unfortunate turn of phrase, Oz) but there
comes a point where you've gotta say, OK, I
have tried, now you're on your own. 'Cause
as much as I love my kids, I have my own
life, and I wouldn't be one of these parents
who says, Ooh, my poor little Ronald, he's
stuck somewhere with a needle in his arm,
what are we gonna do?

"I love my kids, and I'd try to help 'em, but if it didn't work then they're on their own."

Kinda makes you wonder what Ozzy's parents did when their boy was snorting himself stupid not so long ago.

OES THE wife call you 'Ozzy'?
"Yeah, and the kids do."
Does anyone call you 'John'?
"Yeah, my family, people who know me closely. I don't even acknowledge the name

'Ozzy'."

Is music still a challenge, or is it just an enjoyable means of earning a living?

"No, I still see it as a challenge, a very frustrating challenge as well 'cause I always wanna get better. I mean, the review I had in *Kerrang!* this year was incredible, it was the worst review I ever had."

Does criticism still bother you, then?

"No, it doesn't bother me. If it's justifiable criticism then it's fine. If I've done a duff album, then fine. I know when I've done a duff album and you do know when you've put a load of shit out, and I did plenty of that with Sabbath. But when a guy with a grudge against you writes something unfair then I get pissed off, sure I do."

HAT, I think, most people like best about Ozzy is his sense of fun. He'll laugh at anything and everything, a trait which never fails to rub the more serious among us up the wrong way.

The PMRC? Ozzy's even taking a film role soon which has him cast as a Bible-bashin' do-gooder – ring any bells?

He's everybody's favourite bigot, rock's equivalent to Alf Garnett, loud, foul-mouthed and all the more enjoyable for it. Remember, a few years back, that fetish for eyebrow-shaving? Ozzy does . . .

Does your sense of humour frequently get the better of you?

"Yeah, always. It's just that my sense of humour f***s people up. I laugh. I laugh all the way to the bank.

"I mean, Americans are the easiest people in the world to stir up. And it amazes me that in England there are people starving, and yet they do everything for everybody else while the unemployed and the aged are living on dog food.

"And yet, if a cat's stuck up a tree it'll be national news. Mrs Jones' pet poodle got shot up the arse by some naughty boy with an airgun and boo! Put the little sod down and electrocute him."

Do you think you've ever lacked humour?
"I can't be laughing all the time. When I
don't do a good show, when I'm not on
form, I get pissed off with me and the
world."

Have the people you've worked with over the years lacked it?

"Yeah, the lot of 'em. The lot of the idiots around me. I like to get out there every now and again."

So would you record a disco number for laughs?

"Well, if it took my fancy, sure. But not a disco thing – are you f***** crazy? I'd do something weird. The thing with being branded as heavy metal is that it's so limiting. I'd like to venture out and do something weird, something different . . ."

On that note our conversation was wrapped up for the night. We had the whole of the next day to finish, so there wasn't any great urgency to see it through in one evening.

Ozzy spent some time relaxing at the bar. "You've got nice eyebrows," he grinned as I tottered wearily to my room for my first kip in 26 hours. Fearing the worst, I double-locked my door. I was taking no chances.

T WAS suggested that we pick up again over breakfast. Fine, but by the morning there were problems.

One of Ozzy's kids, the youngest I think, was quite seriously ill and, on hearing the news during the night, his willpower snapped. Three weeks of teetotalling went to pot.

This year's foremost monster of rock eventually emerged from his hotel room in the early evening, crazy, drained, and no longer fun to be with. The booze had kicked the shit out of him. The interview died.

Ozzy was desperate to get back to LA and to his wife and kids. His weary head buzzed with vague suggestions. We could charter a flight to LA. Go to Malibu and finish the interview on the beach near his house. We could see his kids. We could do the interview on wet-skis.

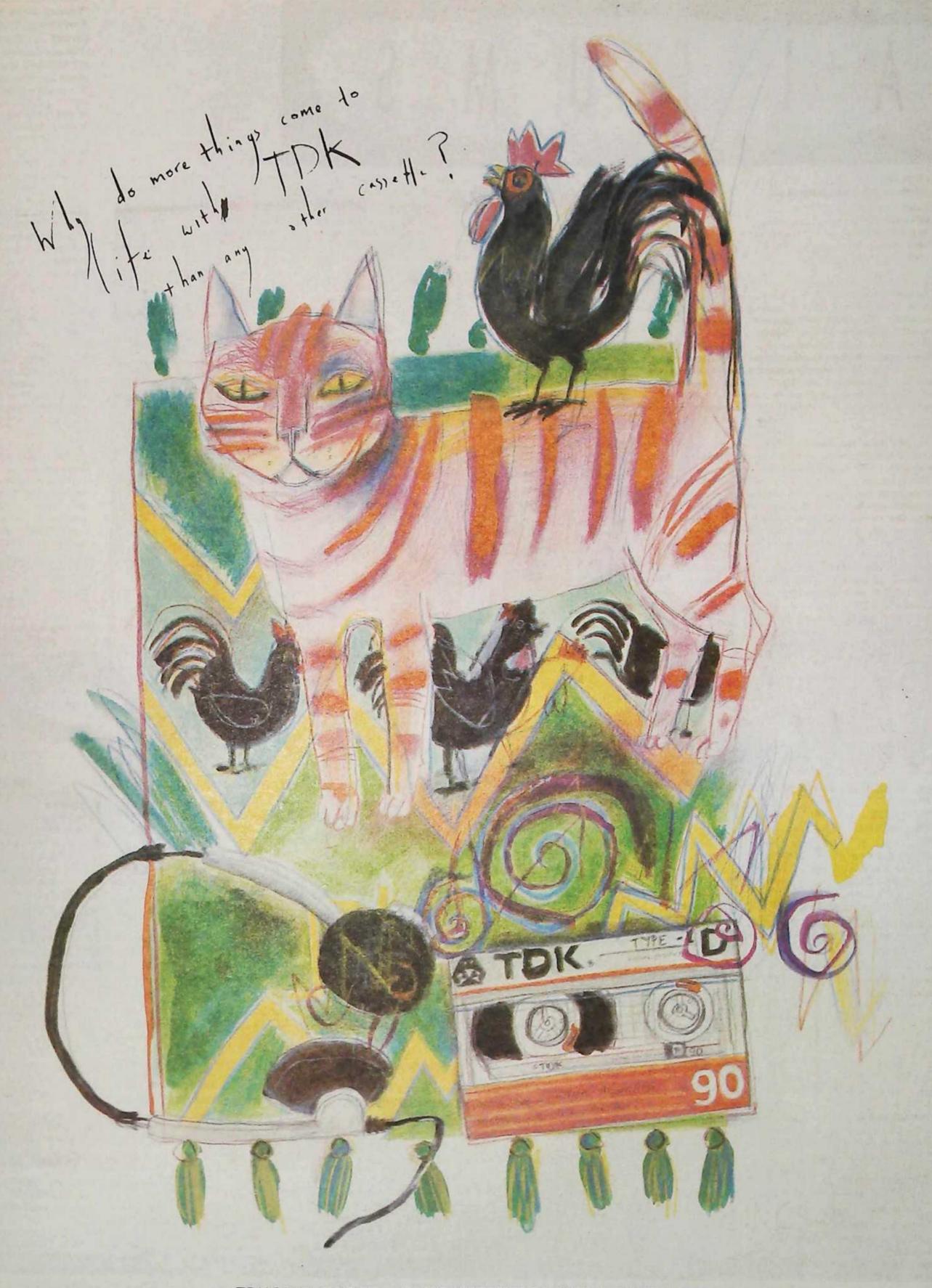
Clearly, Ozzy's mind wasn't on the job. He ordered up a vile banana brandy and insisted that we all have one. Cheers. Ozzy sucked the stuff back in one swig, staying quietly slumped in his chair before being lead off to the airport, Omaha bound, for another date, another dollar. LA would have to wait.

Of course, he's sure to be in better shape for the big day in August. I don't think Ozzy could ever be accused of taking his responsibilities towards the punters too lightly. But it was disappointing for all around him to see the vitality of the Saturday night show choke overnight into a sullen, boozy stupor.

"You can't rock 'n' roll and not drink."

And Ozzy can't seem to stomach the boredom of a life outside of rock 'n' roll, a vicious circle that leads inevitably back to booze. Ozzy'll have to give up kicking ass if he's ever to stop falling, glassy-eyed, off the wagon.

But is that really what he wants?

NICK CAVE AND THE BAD SEEDS 'Kicking Against The Pricks' (Mute STUMM 28)*****

OPEN UP those furnace doors, brothers and sisters, this here's one hot coal that's past redemption. Sure, he reads his good book regular, but that's only a hoax to get you thinking that he's changed his ways, like that thur Elvis feller useta before the drugs 'n' junk food finished him off and sent him to hell.

Nick Cave doesn't need anybody to tell him where he's going. The course he's charted can only be travelled at night by the light of a nicotine coloured moon. To keep himself company, he sings the songs he's carried inside, each one a stigmata wound that throbs with a certain power.

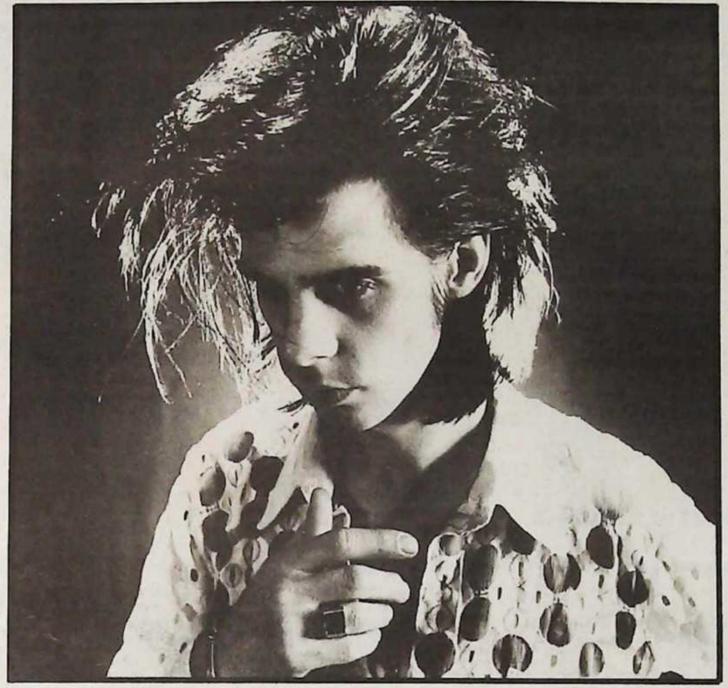
The songs once belonged to people with names like Johnny Cash, Lou Reed and John Lee Hooker. Now they all belong to him; he has taken their first-born innocence, he has squeezed them mummy dry and sewn them tightly into his soul, letting his rich, dark blood re-nourish them into new life.

The songs Cave sings on this third record are squirming and alive, heavy-lidded, venomous with menace and fatalistically beautiful. I've yet to hear a better version of the old garage standard 'Hey Joe' than the one that Cave and his Bad Seeds have sculpted in sound here, where the insane jealousy of the Joe in question is brooded on with a meticulous obsession. The songs Cave loves search for the skull beneath the skin; he reaches beyond the bone with his cover versions and manages to touch the live wire that sparks inspiration.

Sometimes, the electricity he's playing with gets out of control, most notably on his rendition of the Velvets' 'All Tomorrow's Parties'. By beefing up what was once a cold plece of well polished chrome, Cave and his Seeds have reduced the song into sounding, from a distance, like some stupid bellow from one of those World Cup Squad type outfits. It's his only stumble on the entire record though. The rest lures, chills and entertains sufficently to mark it as essential.

This compilation of stories about the damned and the doomed which have been collected here will probably haunt your dreams for months to come, forever scratching at your subconscious, wanting to be let in. Open up your furnace

KICK OUT THE GEMS

STRANGE CRUISE 'Strange Cruise' (EMC

3513)*1/2 ARRESTED FOR stealing a Filofax from a press officer! This quite marvellous true event sums up the extent of Steve Strange's spiritual rebellion better than anything has summed up anything since The Magna Carta.

"You did your bit, you're number one, now it's time for fun", his pedestrian posse of poseurs pretend to sing on 'Rebel Blue Rocker'. Steve Strange's particular bit was a very small bit indeed, as bits go, and most of it was other people's bits anyway. As for fun, I'm sure he still has a lot of it and good luck to him. But a rebel? Or even a rocker? Like Sandy Gall is, yeah.

The eponymous (word attributed to helpful EMI person) debut album from Visage-under-any-other-name is a sickly smooth contrivance of limp electric phoney funk, sexy as a sou'wester and much less stirring than the strawberries I am currently eating. Phrases like "go for it" (never heard that one before) and "communication breaking down the walls" lead onto obsolete automated guitar solos and affected infectious choruses.

It suffers from a chronic absence of inspiration. For Steven's benefit I will explain what inspiration is. Inspiration is like what happens when someone asks you a question and you say "I don't know!" before bursting into helpless peals of laughter. Inspiration is not something you find much of in the army.

The son of Mr and Mrs Strange (I wonder about this) has an innate drive to be

the '80s emotional fraud squad. It sits on him well, as do dunce's caps. In the great (well, mediocre) Face in the sky, he will appear in the adverts you flick through blankly at the back. This record will not even sell.

This, then, is a joke book of typically variable wit and humour, combining snappy one-liners with shaggy dog stories that have a tendency to run out of steam before the punchline. An outrageously good record or an outrageously bad record? Give 'em the benefit of the doubt!

THE COVER artwork is mock engraved in black and silver. But the music within has been chiselled with heavy hands in black and grey.

This is the sound of

totalitarian politics, the sex beat suffocated beneath a strict discipline of empty freedom and haphazard industrial revolution.

Laibach deal in harsh allegory. In technology as a primitive force. In synchronised discord and the prearranged collapse of civilisation. There can be no question of their good and honourable motives. There can be no doubting their intellectual commitment.

And I'm far from unsympathetic to their cause; I simply find no single shred of emotion within their hollow chest-thumping. It is Laibach who are unsympathetic. They have lost their sense of humanity.

Car Skid And Crash are hilariously risky. They should carry Government Health Warnings. Good girls listen to their mothers but if you know what's good for you, you'll do as I did and never heed the warnings. Dangerous experiences can be fun.

DARYL HALL 'Three Hearts In The Happy Ending Machine' (RCA PL87196)**

DARYL HALL seems to have been around forever and, as the little purple Prince of fishnet disco once sang, "That's a mighty long time". None of this would matter assassinated Tory Cabinet member if it wasn't for the inescapable fact that Daryl expressed everything in his musical vocabulary a decade ago on 'War Babies' 'Abandoned cheonette'. Since then he's been making the sound of silt.

On an Awayday from his partner John Oates, this is Daryi's second solo album and what a hall of infamy lurks within the grooves. Most of the nouveau bozo muso establishment pensioners you'd expect to pop up on an effortless exercise to equate soul with style are here: namely Dave Stewart, Joni Mitchell, Bob Geldof and Kate St John from Dream Academy (who?). As someone might have said, "The great minds of a generation meet and the backbe heard slapping can around the world".

But because tamed textures are inescapably the theme music of the modern age, Daryl's croon will be heard in the four corners of the globe. It has all the requisite anodyne requirements: this is Habit(at), an underarm expensive deodorant, a close electric shaver masquerading creativity. This is, in short, the enemy of innovation.

So what do I hear? Ten songs, some partly penned with Dave 'Sheepishdog' Stewart, which unconvincingly explore the bitter twists of love. The angst derives not so much from having a broken heart but rather a heart attack. If this vinyl were a town it would be called Basildon.

Out of touch and out of time with the lifeforce which occasionally makes music an unfettered artistic thrill, I hope Hall's cack ends up in the gutter with all the other silt. Soul should talk in emotongues. Three Hearts' speaks like Stock Exchange.

RICH AND INFAMOUS



REM: they'll blow you away

REM 'Lifes Rich Pageant' (IRS US Import 5783)*****

NOW WHERE did this panther spring from? Seems like only a minute ago I was hacking my way through a jungle of ugly pop fever when suddenly, this animal's on my back, slashing and tearing, panting hot on the back of my neck. For one glorious moment, passion is back in fashion, and being torn apart never felt so good.

All the tricks that REM have learned are weaved into this latest tapestry (due for UK release in September). A dream state that alternates between '60s Byrdsian elektric folk and '80s garage rock, prickly with switchblades. REM make music sound simple, as though it pumps up out of the ground like crude oil, a gushing torrent of Ideas that seemingly spouts forever. They drilled a hole in the right piece of dirt and struck black gold, making them, if not commercially, then at least artistically wealthy young men.

The crow for copy means that only the surface of this latest record can be scratched. With time, though, the depths can be fully explored, the treasure mined and stored with the rest of the booty that BerryBuckMillsStipe have showered on their faithfull following thrice already.

This time, the edge is rougher and louder. Previous producer Joe Boyd's delicate grandeur has been partly replaced by Don Gehman's rootsier echo, cavernous, complex and compelling. Michael Stipe's lyrical imagery is as mysterious and magical as ever, ghostly fragments of prose set to equally haunting playing. Whatever's being suggested in a song like 'Cuyahoga', for example, certainly takes a long time to fade from the memory and it's probably the most immediate highlight on 'Lifes Rich Pageant'.

Buck's knowledge and practise of his country's many and diverse musical forms, coupled with Stipe's fondness for strange folklore, gives REM the edge over their more contemporary rivals who flounder into the swamplands of nostalgia and are lucky to be seen again.

REM have trodden more wisely by cutting their own path through terrain that still enthralls them. If your spirit of adventure is up to it, then you are strongly advised to tag along and bring your imagination with you. Now, more than ever, you're going to need it.

EDWIN POUNCEY

LET'S ACTIVE 'Big Plans For Everybody' (IRS MIRF 1011)***3/4

MITCH EASTER produced three REM albums and was therefore involved in three good things. With Let's -Active's 'Big Plans For Everybody', he gets to do his fourth good thing.

'Big Plans' and Let's Active are essentially Mr Easter - he writes all the songs, sings them, plays 90 per cent of the instruments, produces and mixes. He sits on a wooden bridge amid Gentle Ben scenery for the cover shot. 'Big Plans' is no bad thing on which to be Renaissance Man.

It's a guitar album, guitars substantially steeped in the '60s (even played backwards on occasion) but carved with significant dashes of the '80s idiom. As befits Mitch's age, 'Big Plans' is riddled with verbiage lurking beneath a silly but non-irritating mysticism (witness 'Writing The Book Of The Last Pages') and, as befits his hometown of Salem NC, in the heart of Little America, it is doused with velleities which give it

that quiet, driftwood appeal.

The single, 'In Little Ways', is. . . well, the most singular moment. Underpinned by a simple, cathartic piano figure, the guitar alternately pinches and releases in a nice combination of old and new. As for the album as a whole, it's marred by Mitch's slightly adenoidal voice and those lyrics: "We're really living now/The ups and downs of misty people/Condensed in time, some barbed wire/And thrown in my love for you."

'Big Plan' it might be, but the fact remains that by getting someone else to write the words and sing, Mr Easter could produce something truly activating. At the moment he's just hinting at it.

ROY WILKINSON WEATHER REPORT

'This Is This' (CBS 57052)***

BY WAY of acknowledging their longevity within the biz, Messrs Zawinul and Shorter have slipped in an insert which features caricatures depicting the 20 or so little helpers who have come and gone over the past 15 years. It lasts any longer than it

strikes me that their names could have been lifted direct from the staff register of any typical New York pizza parlour. . .

Regardless of the pace and ethnic origins of the individual songs, the overall sound is dominated by those Weather Report trademarks which have ripened into triumphant clichés: the bass goes wob-wob-wob and Wayne Shorter's sax goes fnarp-fnarp. Plus ca change and all the rest.

Perhaps it's too much to expect revelations from these middle-aged men, particularly when the resemblance between Joe Zawinul and worst-ventriloguist-in-theworld Roger de Courcey is so striking. Would you buy a used keyboard riff from this man?

I have given this record a chance. I have played it while watching the 100 metre heats of the Commonwealth Games - the main purpose of which seems to be to eliminate competitors from Botswana with the volume off and Weather Report on, and they fit perfectly. Hello, I'm Desmond Lynam.

THE UNITED STATES OF EXISTENCE 'Introducing . . . The United States Of

Existence' (Bam-Caruso Records KIRI 048)***1/2 COMING TO you from the state of Maryland via the sophisticated streets of St Albans are The United States Of Existence. Singing of mini skirts and plastic boots. And so on and so forth.

Four young American psychedelists with organs, electric harpsicords and electric sitars, The United States Of Existence wear their hearts on the sleeves of their favourite paisley shirts. You'd think 'Whole Lotta

Love' had never been written. "Life's too short for bad times, it's a drag . . .

Wrapped within their swirly summer sounds, these boys are speaking our language. Their bright and breezy, positively jaunty pop melodies clap hands and smile knowingly. No song

should and some seem just that little bit too short. Which is how things ought to be.

But still, when you tear your eyes away from individual trees and take a look at the forest as a whole, then 'Introducing . . . ' is no . breaker of barriers, no brave new hope. Nothing new at all, in fact.

And, similarly, The United States Of Existence are no more than a competent and 'quite good really' sort of catchy flowerpop group. Of course, I can think of a whole lot worse places to be.

ROGER HOLLAND DIANA ROSS AND THE SUPREMES '25th Anniversary' (Tamla Motown WL72436)****

THE STUFF which short fast dreams are made of. Twenty hits, 20 previously unreleased recordings, a 1965 interview, a highly informative booklet (lyrics, discography, pictures

with great hairdos) and - this is the big one, the pop artefact to end them all - a Coca-Cola advert.

If Sigue Sigue Sputnik think they have invented anything at all, they should hear Diana whining "let's go share a Coke" and learn the true meaning of exploitative commercial tack. As if to emphasise her mocking mastery of the genre, she renders 'Someday My Prince Will Come' and 'If I Ruled The World' crasser than a rubied pout.

Other jolts from the vaults include twee twitterings of Bacharach ballads and Walt Disney toons. The absurd interview itself, conducted by a man whose voice is so disgustingly smooth and creepy it's definitive, reveals Mesdames Ross, Wilson and Ballard to be shrewdly naive, coolly giggly.

And when the padding on a triple album is a treasury of

melodramatic majesty - from 'You Keep Me Hangin' On' and 'Itching In My Heart' to 'Love Child' and 'I'm Livin' In Shame' - a born-again emotional delinquent can only recline and savour, bop and cheer, swing and chuckle. Undoubtedly - and for once there is considerable factual grounding to my argument the most fascinating and durable music known to the post-Hiroshima populus. You can't hurry it.

CHRIS ROBERTS **UTFO 'Skeezer Pleezer'**

(Cool Tempo CHR 1551)*** "BLAH, BLAH, blah," you go, shooting off your mouth once more. You talk too much and say too little. All brag and bluster and b-boys doin' it for themselves. I know it's hard being a son of the ghetto and all that, but once it's down on vinyl I don't give a tinker's cuss if you're a five-eyed slug from the sin galaxy G'broan

or three teenagers from Brooklyn, New York. UTFO are, of course, the latter.

They are also (they claim) the Untouchable Force. I don't agree, even though they've had a hit single of no small influence on the burgeoning world of black dance music. 'Roxanne, Roxanne' was a watershed, a spawning ground, a great single. It lasted about five minutes. So should 'Skeezer Pleezer'.

There's no need to stretch hip hop music over a 40 minute groove thang - that's for trad rock bands. But the fact is that singles just don't bring home the record companies' bacon the same way LPs do.

Lyrically and musically UTFO are left flogging their one foot-tapping idea through the ten tracks, when it had already died a death by the end of track two. I danced to one of their songs at a club the other night; I fell asleep while listening to the album at home.

RICKY KILDARE

PAUL DI'ANNO'S BATTLEZONE 'Fighting Back' (Raw Power RAWLP 020)**

PAUL DI'ANNO goes back to his roots. Realising that bedridden AOR doesn't pay the bills, he's drafted up Battlezone (surely the ugliest band ever) to try to revive his former glory. Dubious.

Even so, I'd have loved to have loved this album - loved it as much as Maiden's first (and best). Fat chance. For starters, old as it is (six years now), 'Iron Maiden' was a gem. Naive, boyish, barmy, it still roasts anything they've done since.

Coupled with this, Di'Anno, whilst his voice will always do wonders for me, these days sounds a bit lost, jaded by recent failures and lacking the inspiration of 'Arry's spiffing songwriting.

I saw Di'Anno - the band, a soft rock cop-out shot - in a Guildford pub not so long ago. Somebody shouted for 'Phantom Of The Opera'. His reply? "We don't play that shit." So why is he bawling his head off at a Maiden mirage some 18 months later? And why did he leave (or allow himself to be pushed from) Maiden in the first place? What went wrong?

LIONEL RICHIE 'Dancing On The Ceiling' (Motown ZL 72412)***1/2

WELL, I think we can safely call this one a superstar, don't you, Barry?

The Motown phenomenon has most certainly paid his dues, churning out an impressive series of hits for The Commodores (although we weren't aware of his contribution at the time). Since his emergence as a solo artiste, Lionel has assisted in the elevation of the pop video to the level of soap opera art; who can ever forget (I wish) 'Hello', in which it was conclusively proved that a blind girl is as capable as any sighted person of spending two hours every morning applying

Were it not for yer man being such an ugly bugger, Richie would long ago have taken up the mantle which is his birthright, that of the Motown Manilow, not so much macho as mocha.

Had the first track of side two opened the album, I would have had grave doubts about my ability to treat it with the faintest trace of seriousness. 'Deep River Woman' is utter blige, custom-wrought to ease precisely into the "you've been a wonderful audience" Vegas designer sludge pigeonhole.

How can you criticise the man when the charts are so lamentably bland that he seems quite radical by comparison? I'm paying him the highest compliment, I'm sending this album to my mum.

CLOSE TO THE WEDGE

Though a debut album's about to hit the racks and a single is hitting the dance floors, THE **COMMUNARDS** still find themselves hitting back at discrimination. KEZ **OWEN** breaks through a lighthearted surface to glimpse the Somerville blues. **JAYNE HOUGHTON** picks the flowers

> JIMMY AND RICHARD: hardy perennials

F BEING gay was an option, nobody would rationally choose it.

"It's not an easy number, and it's not till you start doing it that you realise how fabulous it is."

So say The Communards.
The Communards know that it's fabulous. In a world brimming with banality and prejudice, they're still happy, carefree and light-hearted. The word 'gay' means all of these things. The Communards are gay.

Their debut album is simply titled 'Communards' and reflects this emotion. Songs bubble along and ebb and flow with various moods, like their instigators.

On the cover, Richard Coles and Jimmy Somerville hold aloft a red flag, triumphant and hinting at politics. But despite the band's heavy involvement

with Red Wedge, the album shrugs off their hardcore Socialist values to reveal a frivolous sense of adventure and fun.

Taking the history of The
Communards as a starting point,
and the new LP as a line of
continuation, I chose to begin
this interview by asking why, just
when they have stirred the inert
consciences of the abstaining
young, they have turned away
from a political line – something
that their fans probably
expected?

"People always have this idea that we're going to be political.

"It's because of the name.

"'Communards' stems from 'The
Paris Commune', a bunch of people
who took over Paris when the army
were at war with Prussia. The
relation of that to us, is that they
wanted to do something about their
lives, have control over them, be
different from the general mass who
didn't understand or relate to their
way of life — that's how we see
things today.

"But the album is political, really.

For a song to be political, it doesn't mean you must have lyrics like 'kill Maggie Thatcher' or 'Maggie Thatcher's awful', most people know that. We're not into doing that, we don't want to be polemical. If one man writes a love song to another man it becomes a political song — there are different levels you can be political on."

So you think love is political?

"It is if you're a queen. Also definitely if you're a man and definitely if you're a woman, I'd say. You don't have to be a lesbian – you could be a straight woman and it's still political. Rape and marriage are seen as something that's acceptable, so those things are political issues, because they're to do with you and the way that you're treated and the way that you're seen and the way that you're seen and the way that you're disrespected. When you don't have any say in being an individual – that's political."

The Communards have explored new avenues of music with this new LP. They've danced, skipped and sauntered along them with happy footsteps pattering to the beat.

The boys have even added a continental feel to the album. Camp castanets click fervently on 'La-Dolarosa', a skirt-swirling Spanish number. The two pallid but eager faces turn towards me and there's a glint in their eyes as they explain their Spanish dip.

"We think it's great. It's sexy and there's a hot bloodedness about it. Usually, when people incorporate Spanish rhythms into modern music it's got to be seedy, dirty and with a sense of low-life sleaze, but ours are pretty. We wanted to do a pretty song."

Unfortunately, though, this world is ugly. Bigoted, fickle and ugly, with no place for sweetness. There are songs on the album about secrecy, secret affairs – but does homosexuality have to be secret?

"Well, most gay scenes are nighttime activities only. It's like we all sneak out from the woodwork at night. When you first start meeting men, it's like shady glances, secret, quick and hidden.

"Homosexuality is illegal. If we wanted to kiss our boyfriends, it would have to be behind closed doors, in a private flat with nobody else in it and with both of you aged over 21. Even then, that wouldn't be legal, it just wouldn't be criminal."

This makes me feel ashamed that my life and emotions are so simple, so spasmodic. I cannot comprehend why people dislike gays. Is it that they feel gays threaten their sexuality? Are they jealous of their contentment? But it's a contentment that's difficult to obtain. I had thought groups like Culture Club, Bronski Beat and The Communards had made the gay scene more acceptable, but . . .

"The gay scene is just more known now, but not accepted. There's still a lot of prejudice. Queens still get beaten up on the streets. But the BBC are the real power brokers of society, the worst. The media can totally dismiss you and then you're running around in circles. You don't have any control. If The Sun wants to write about gays being AIDS carriers — what can you do?"

Jimmy: "Here's a classic case. A woman from one daily paper phoned me to ask me about Red Wedge. She was asking me social things, though, like, Do you go out night-clubbing, what clubs do you go to? etc... really general stuff. But then the story appeared as 'Jimmy Somerville, why I'm scared of AIDS and why I stay at home because I'm too scared to go and dance next to people in clubs in case they've got AIDS'. Trash, utter trash, and not one mention of Red Wedge."

Does AIDS frighten you, then?

"It frightens everyone. It should
do. It's something that people know
little about and it's also a fact that
there's no cure. You have to treat it
as another new incurable disease
like cancer."

Would you like to do . . . how can I put this? . . . an AIDS aid song?

"We really would like to, but it's difficult to write a tasteful song about AIDS! You'd have to do something that would do justice to the subject, something positive – perhaps the 'Safe Sex Rap'!

ND NOW I must ask the question that's been asked a thousand times. Do you feel rivalled by Bronski Beat, Jimmy?

"No, they're a whole different entity – that's my new word, by the way. I mean, I left Bronski Beat, among other reasons, because I couldn't cope with the success and all the pressure. It was instant success. We were only playing for six months and within eight months we had a contract and a single."

OK, let's get back to the present band. You two met when working on the documentary Framed Youth. Am I right or am I right?

"You're right. And guess what, it's on TV this month, three and a half years later. It was only shown in small cinemas and youth centres at the time. We did a version of 'Screaming' (a Bronski Beat song) and Richard played a saxophone in the toilet. It seemed really adventurous and revolutionary at the time, young gay people talking about their lives. I think it was a calculated political move not to show it then, because it was so controversial no one could handle it - it showed happy young gays who knew what they wanted and what they were doing, talking about it intelligently."

It was initially about the trials and traumas of adolescence. Do you feel you've left those behind you now?

Jimmy: "I have but, because I'm small, I always get treated as a kid. When we have dealings with lawyers, they talk to Richard and look at me and talk to me like, I know this is going to be hard for you to understand, because this is a big world of grown-ups in

What can make you feel most intimidated?

Richard: "People in power, people with the power to change things without you having any say."

Jimmy: "Naff casuals, skinheads.

It's frightening that people can just go out on the street and beat other people up. And it's always in gangs, they'd never be so bold on their own, it's false machismo – they've obviously got problems."

Obviously, What adventure would you most like to carry out?

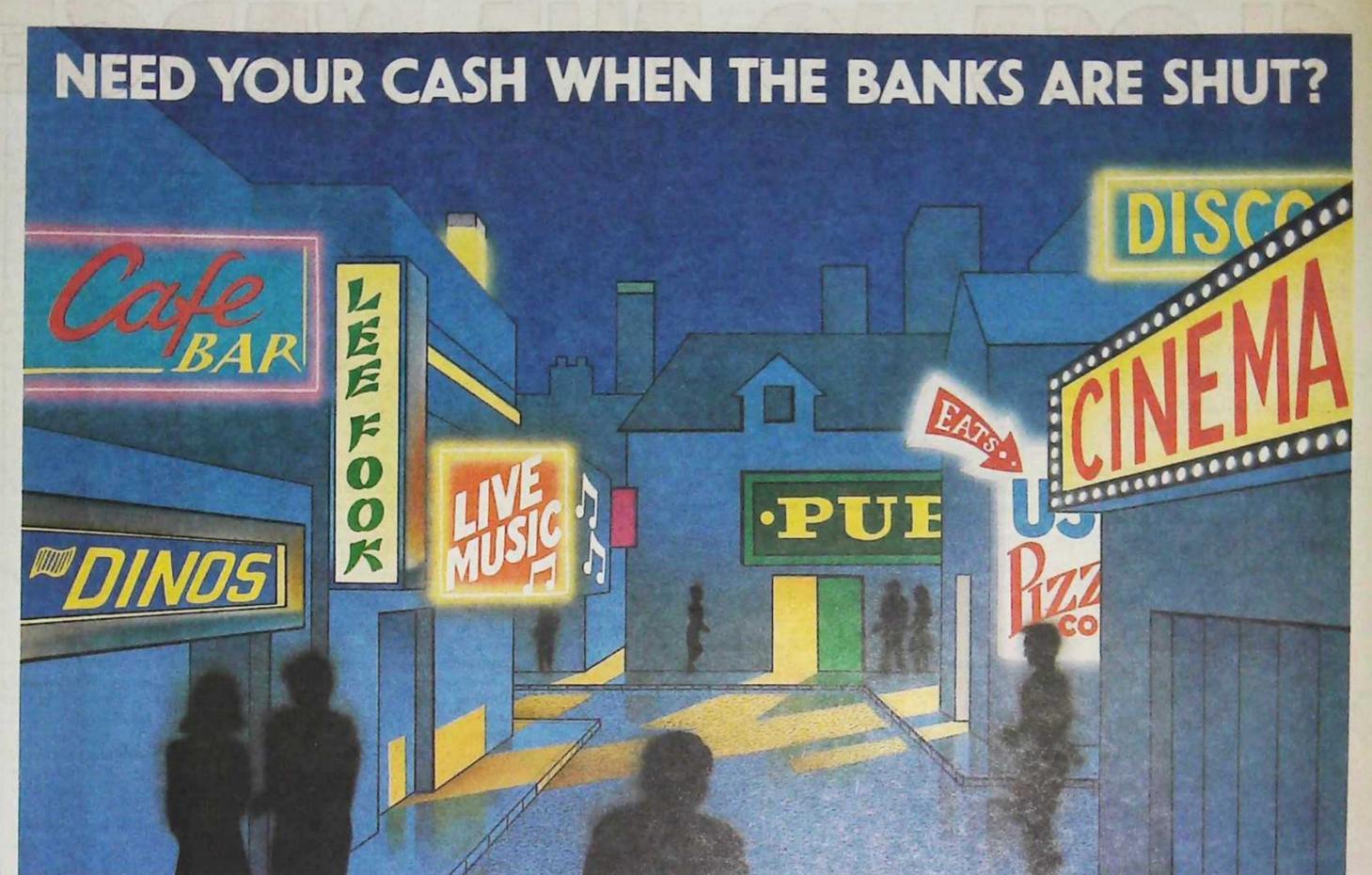
Jimmy: "I'd love to do something with a huge orchestra (little tinkers) conducted by someone famous like Nelson Riddle, or choirboy stuff. We have plans."

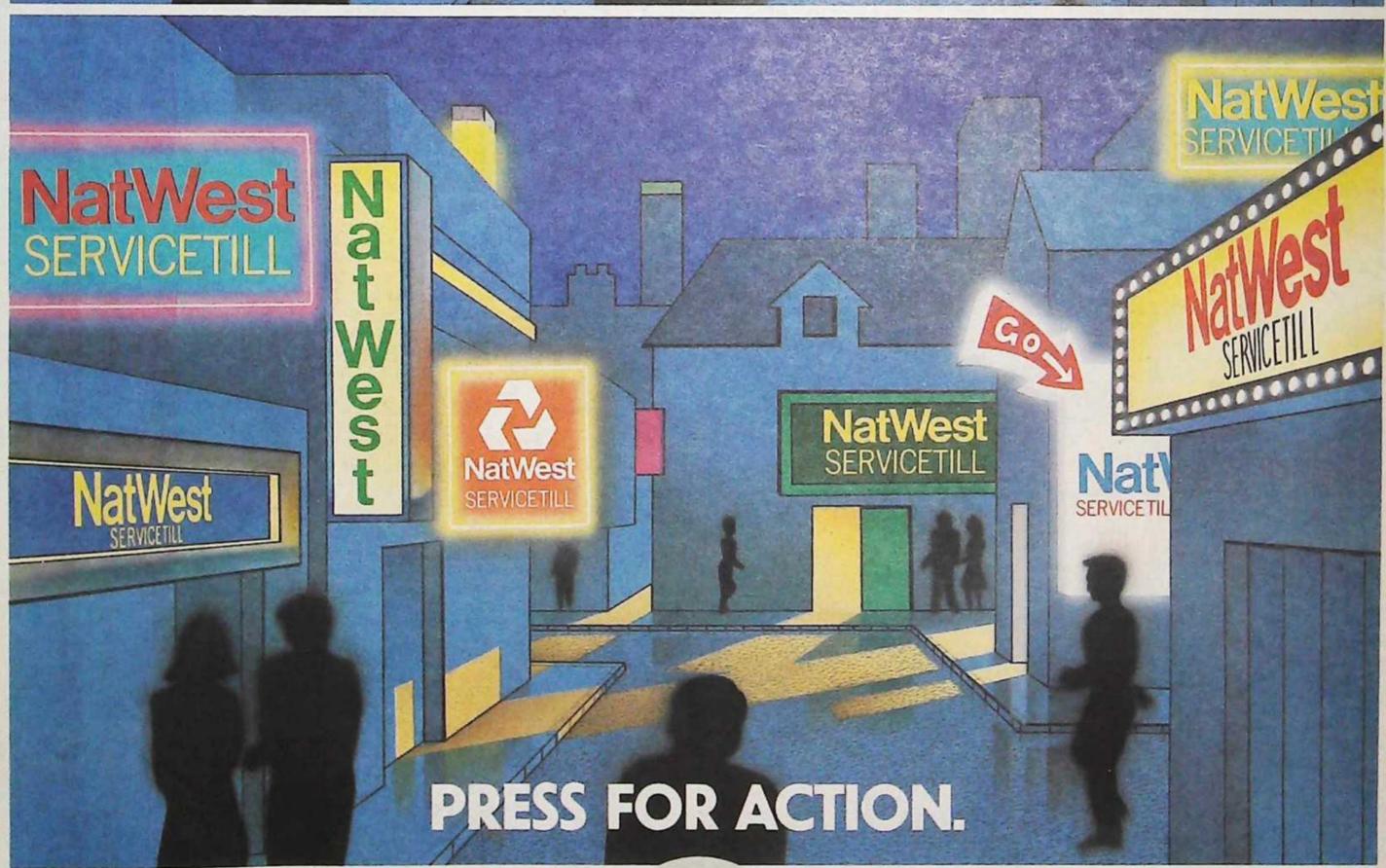
"One thing that's most important to us is sincerity. I hope that comes across in our writing," adds Richard.

The Communards ended by surprising me. I admit I felt apprehensive before the interview, not because of their sexual persuasions, but because I had seen them live at the Royal Festival Haff a month or so ago and had felt threatened by their professionalism. They had an unspoken synchronicity and I feared I would be excluded, left by the wayside

But The Communards turned out to be just normal, and I left that show feeling that I'd knesse theor for years. There was no exclusion at all in their behaviour.

RESTLESS 'After Midnight' (ABC Records ABCLP 7)***3/4 WHEREAS ONCE the word was, "Have you heard the news, there's a good rockin' tonight", now we're more restrained, satisfied with "Wake me up before you gogo". Wake me up when something happens even. Of course, it's always easy to miss what's sitting right under your nose. But neither Restless nor anybody else with itchy feet will give a toss. We'll all be out having a ball, and the party starts right

here.

The good man Hurt tells me that 'After Midnight' is something of a departure for the four good vicars of the parish of Restless and I'm quite willing to agree. The record is classy and polished, not the sort of sound you'd find down your local toilet, and I'm not convinced that this is a good thing. Back to basics rock 'n' roll needs some grit to grind between its teeth, some grease to rub into its jacket, but maybe I'm too much the purist.

I give Restless the benefit of the doubt, though, because the quality of the eleven songs here is too good to have me do otherwise. 'The Face', 'You Lose', 'Somebody Told Me': shiny little diamonds of tunes that don't just rock, they twist and hook with chords and melodies that don't scream but beg the word timeless.

And what I believe prompted Hurt to utter his pearls of wisdom is the inclusion of brass and piano. Arrangements that add to the songs, bringing out the subplots. I wonder if somebody somewhere is trying to cross Carl Perkins with George Michael, thereby coming up with Restless? Whatever, the final product makes the question redundant. If there's a band to put rock 'n' roll back into the charts, this lot are it.

'Boomerang' (Atlantic 781 652-1)*

Astles and his merry band no favours at all. OK, so including 'Cajun

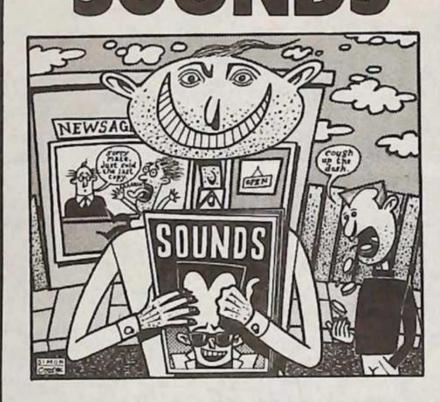

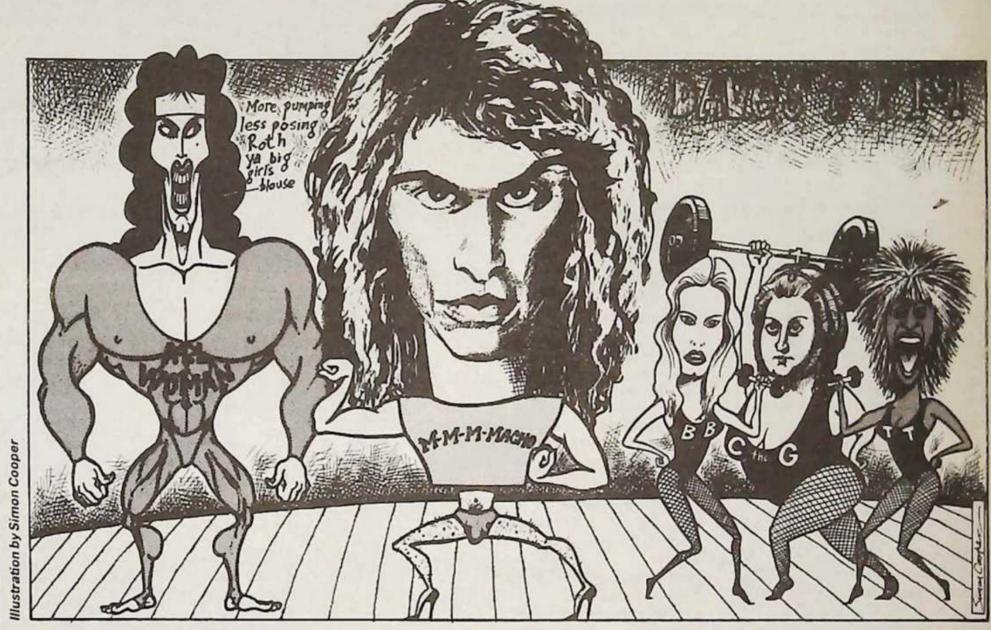

BAD NEWS keep on truckin'

T'S GREAT to be back," Bad News' lead guitarist and singer Vim says proudly.

He flicks that famous peroxide fringe from his face before yelling, "We're revved up and ready to rock!"

And y'know what, folks? I can well believe it!

Y'see, there's this sparkle in crazed axeman Vim's eye that says, Watch out - this time we really mean business! Which will doubtless come as good news (geddit?) to the band's small but dedicated following, which has had to wait three long years now for a fresh dollop of that infamous, uniquely beefy brand of Bad News metal.

It's been an endurance test of bollock-blistering proportions for rock-starved 'eadbangers of all metallic leanings, but now Bad News are back with a prestigious appearance at the massive Monsters Of Rock festival lined up for August 16.

I begin the interview by telling the 'appy blond 'aired singer how brilliant it is to have him and his krazy kompatriots in krime (there's Vim, of course, plus drummer Spider, bassist Colin, and Den on rhythm guitar) back in the metallic fold.

And I ask Vim if they're louder now than they were on the legendary Bad News Tour - as seen by thousands of goggle-box watchers when the group became the subject of a Channel 4 documentary, back in 1983.

The vocalist leers at me with a wicked grin on his boat and promises, "Yeah, we're a lot louder now 'cos we've got some new equipment. Most of the time before, the amps never used to work, and when you play an electric guitar without an amplifier it doesn't sound as good as it should. In fact, it sounds really quiet."

Would you say your music's matured over the last few years? "Well, it's certainly got a lot

older."

Vim has no patience with the loony lefty liberals of pop. dismissing 'socially aware' dogooders like Paul Weller with a few carefully chosen words of scorn.

"If you're gonna say anything in your music, you should be talking about fundamentals like fire and blood and skulls being crushed. Outrage With Volume - that's my motto. We've got something to say, and it's important that we say it very loudly, and what we really want to say is, This is very loud."

What do you reckon to the American scene? I ask.

"They're a bit too clean in the States for my taste, some of them even wear dungarees. I mean, what's that about? It's not heavy."

And metal's pretty bollocky music.

"Yeah, it is, it's very bollocky music."

I mention the approaching Monsters Of Rock appearance, which Vim describes as "something quite special". It'll be the first time Bad News have played a major festival, so won't the guitarist be getting nervous?

"No, I never get nervous," he assures me, "but I go to the toilet a lot, I'm sick and that, and I can't walk straight or anything, but that's not nerves, that's energy."

The golden-voiced one tells your inquisitive hack that onstage is the only place where he truly lives.

"I'm trapped inside a body that normally just exists - it's a bit like I'm a sex-change person, although I'm not homosexual or anything like that - but when I get onstage, I start to come alive."

Do you become a beast?

"I never see myself on a stage, because I'm always on it, so I can't get around the front to have a look, but people say I do."

I hear there's a funny story about your after-show requirements. What did you ask for?

"Well, we just asked for a pub, basically, 'cos you know we're English, and we like a drink in a homely environment. We wanted them to set up a little pub there, with a cellar and things, but no - so apparently we're getting some cans and a few sandwiches."

I get the feeling you're gonna blow Donington clean away, I gush moronically.

"Yeah, we've got all our equipment sorted out, amps and everything, and we're gonna be using a PA!"

It's gonna be heavy? "YEAH!!!"

And y'know what, folks? I can well believe it!

Deviously squirming out of talking to the mega-metal BAD NEWS, our hack Mr Spencer got headbanging TEDDY 'BOWYERS' BRONSON to do his dirty work. See our scoop of the week (above)

HY SHOULD a group who have courted anonymity with the same feverishness that others reserve for the pursuit of fame suddenly want to perform as a live band?

This was one of many questions which was not in my mind as I fought my way through the throng at the bar of New York's Ritz Ballroom, and the reason it wasn't in my mind was that I already knew the answer.

The Art Of Noise feel the need to prove something that can't be proved simply by making very clever records with Duane Eddy and Max Headroom.

It is the logical progression from their parting with ZTT and signing to China. They were tired of being regarded by one and all as nothing more than an idea dreamed up by Paul Morley and Trevor Horn over cocktails.

And yet, despite this understandable

desire to receive the credit due to them for the anarchic 'Into Battle . . . ' and the chart-breaking 'Beat Box', Anne Dudley, [] Jeczalik and Gary Langan still don't want us getting too close to them.

They delight in going unrecognised, refuse to be photographed in any way that would make this possible and giggle mischievously every time someone in their audience calls out "Hello Trevor" to II (whose resemblance to Mr Horn begins and ends with the fact that both wear glasses).

And yet, here they are, churning out their hits and mixes to this capacity crowd on the eve of the New Music Seminar, warming up for a stint at Hammersmith Odeon later this week, and trying out a line-up that includes a drummer, a percussionist, three girl singers, a video intro from Mr Headroom and a spot from

All (except for Max) absolutely live. I mention this again because they are very anxious that you should comprehend. There may be Fairlights on stage, but there are no

hidden tape recorders or Sputnik sequencers doing the hard work. Even the Noisettes have had to learn new words, like "nwark" and "pphhnnooolp" that were originally uttered by machines and must now be vocalised by humans.

Impressed? I thought you would be.

Langan's desire for it is evidently so great that he is not available for interview after the gig. Unless, of course, he was disguised as the sofa in manager Dai Davies' penthouse suite, in which case I guess he'd furnished himself with the perfect alibi.

Anne Dudley is available, however, and she's joined in due course by JJ, whose sporty blazer and cultured demeanour suggests that he might just have flown in from Henley Regatta.

The best way to talk to these folks seems to be to get yourself in on the joke. Interviews are treated as opportunities for wordplay and little more. You can slip in the odd serious question and get the odd serious response if you're lucky

Here's Anne being serious:

"Playing live is specially difficult for us because we don't have a Tony Hadley at the front, or a Jeff Beck, or some kind of front man people can identify with. I think that's what put me off the idea of touring for a long time. I felt people didn't want to come to see an instrumental band. They want to see people yelling their heads off, screeching around playing guitars. They don't want to see me playing keyboards – it's a bit boring.

"But eventually my objections were broken down. It happened when we went up to do The Tube. Suddenly we felt like a band on the road, on the coach to Newcastle."

Here's me being serious. Don't you think that by having three girl backing singers, you're just aligning yourself with every other live act? Isn't that the kind of cliché you should be trying to avoid?

"Yeah, but clichés in live work nowadays means backing tapes and sequencers, and we don't do that. We use Akai samplers and the drummer and bass player are both triggering sampled sounds. I certainly don't feel obliged to apologise for the girls. It's good to have them along. They do good backing vocals, tell great jokes and lend me their lipsticks."

This is when JJ arrives, which more or less puts paid to any further seriousness.

I gather the 'Paranoimia' corroboration with Max Headroom came about through a chance meeting in a restaurant?

J: "Yes, it's remarkable the people you can meet in restaurants when you don't mean to."

Anne: "It was a very good restaurant."

Do you want to give it a plug?

Anne: "Certainly not."

JJ: "You plug them and they get very crowded and you can't get in yourself. I made that mistake once before. Never again."

Anne: "And so he said, I'm terribly clever and witty and I like your track. And he really kinda gets down to that track, old Max, he gets down and boogies."

JJ: "Is your pause button meant to be in?"

Don't worry, I've got a photographic memory. So let's talk about the rest of the band.

Anne: "Well, they're all called Dave."

JJ: "There's Dave Simon Morton on

end of the Ritz show and everybody walked straight past me and didn't recognise me.

"We didn't encourage people to want to come along and see 'personalities'. They wanted to see a show and listen to what the hell we were going to do. And they had no idea what was going to be going on. Now, their curiosity is satisfied and they still don't have to know who we are and what underpants we wear and all that stuff."

So you'd argue that you're purists, because you demand that music takes precedence over personality?

JJ: "Oh, very much so. Impure purists.

Absolutely. Wholeheartedly. In as much as we are shallow, we are deep."

Has incompetence become a virtue in music?
Anne: "Well, it appals us. We've worked
with so many people in the studio, we're well
aware of the inadequacies of most musicians in
the bands around. We must be the hardest
people to work with."

JJ: "We've had three drummers . . ."
Anne: "We demand the best . . . and we get

Does it irritate you that less competent bands have to resort to using skilled professionals such as yourselves to compensate for their inadequacies?

JJ: "Yeah, but it's nothing new. Look at the Bay City Rollers."

Or Elvis Presley.

J: "Absolutely. He didn't sing a thing on his records. It was Dirk Stevens, the famous Welshman. He did all Elvis' vocals. Elvis just looked great. As long as he had his gear person with him and his hair person with him, he was OK. Tragic, really – Dirk went unknown."

I've certainly never heard of him.

JJ: "Well, it just goes to show, doesn't it? I mean, you say Dirk Stevens to people and they say, Oo? But when you say Elvis Presley, they know exactly who you're talking about."

Isn't there a danger that you'll be hoist on the petard of your own technology, and that despite all your efforts, people may still not think you're playing live?

Anne: "D'you mean we've gone to all this expense for nothing? Oh, my God."

You could have done exactly the same thing with tapes.

Anne: "I don't know how you can say that."
I'm being devil's advocate.

JJ: "But you're not, because devil's advocate ... because devil's advocate should actually be ... should actually ... you're absolutely right. But we wouldn't do a thing like that. Nobody's ever done that."

Anne: "What's the fun in that – three weeks posing around America playing to sequencers and tapes?"

You played three gigs over here before the Ritz. Have you had any revelations?

Anne: "Yeah. The audience like us."

Ji: "We didn't anticipate this. Just because they've bought the records means nothing.

Actually, buying records is the last thing by which you can judge whether people like your

music or not.

"Beat Box' and 'Moments Of Love' became anthems here, but they were kind of frustrated by the fact that we didn't tour, so you still don't know what people really think. In the one public appearance we made in LA, this guy was overheard to say, I've been a fan of The Art Of Noise for three years – that is not them. And there we were."

O YOU think you appeal to intellectuals?

J: "Never."

Do you know what kind of people buy your

JJ: "We have a day-by-day analysis of just who buys the records. We know exactly what's going on – and it doesn't help in any way."

Anne: "I think it's a mistake to analyse it. Some guy came into the dressing room and said, It's a very interesting demographic split you've got there. And I thought, demographic split?"

JJ: "But it's the American mentality, isn't it? It's, Well, you sold 44,000 records yesterday, 19,950 went to black people, 1,150 went to Indians . . . And you say, Yeah? Whaddya going to do if they all turn out to be white tomorrow? Well, gee, we'll have to do something about that."

Do you think you might be a studentish band in Britain?

JJ: "We're a very big college group here in the US. This album has been in the college network top ten since it was released."

And you were voted Number Two Black Band at one point?

JJ: "Last year in Billboard. If one backs away from the personality syndrome, it allows one to be voted, unvoted and promoted into all these places one didn't know existed."

Any feelings about how you'll go down live in the UK?

J: "Yes – we'll probably sink without trace, which is just how we want it. Most of the press in England has had its say about how good, and now how bad, we are, so it's our launching pad."

I wasn't thinking particularly about the

JJ: "No, no, nor was I. Just my feelings about those complete and utter, utter, utter ... "

Anne: "Hang on, he's one of them. But I'm sure he's never written anything nasty about us."

I've never written anything about you at all.

JJ: "Well, you're tarred with the same brush, you bastard."

People are bound to say The Art Of Noise haven't been up to scratch since parting with ZTT, just because of the kudos associated with the label. Although that's taken a bit of a denting of late.

JJ: "Well, there hasn't been anything.
There've been statements like 'Noiseless
ZTT' "

Anne: "And 'The Art Of Silence'. We liked that, actually."

JJ: "Even in being absent, we were being referred to."

Are you afraid of the anti-intellectual element in the music press?

JJ: "Never come across it. We don't read the music press, you see. Nor do we listen to pop records."

There's a school of thought which holds that musicians shouldn't be too articulate or intelligent.

IN LOS Angeles, Van Halen are victims of certain circumstantial pressure. adrenalin rush as such fine three minute jewels as 'Freak Out' and 'Blimp'. That said, 'Snowball Down' sounds a fine opening shot for a first single.

But A House are good entertainment, and if their songs seem a bit samey at least they're of an above average calibre. Singer Dave Couse plays the cheery cheeky scallywag (even if he does wear an unsightly white cap) and dances in a contorted, ungainly manner that is nonetheless endearing. Eclectic puns and imagery flow from his mouth, at times engaging and at others infuriating and senseless. Sometimes you just can't

help wondering: what's the point? Too many verbal gymnastics can ruin a good

Not so the music, a curious melodic Half Man Half Smiths collision with The Woodentops that continues the perfect guitar pop lineage which seemed in danger of extinction when The Undertones split up.

A House are the ghost of pop past freewheeling carelessly into the future, taking a sharp intake of breath and hoping for the best. They'll have their moments so enjoy them while you can.

THE SHAMEN Alice in Wonderland

THE SLIP of paper sticking to a beer stain on the table before me informs me that The Shamen are "a quite well known skedelic shambling ragga rock group". Not a term I've heard before, but this is the language that these psychedelic types use, I've got to get hip baby, get down and shake it man.

You see, taking a trip (no pun intended) to Alice In Wonderland does things to your mind; it's quite an experience, never mind the ordeal of trying to see the group. You push and weave your way to the front and find your view obscured by sturdy pillars and strips of toilet roll that dangle from the ceiling.

On stage, The Shamen are surrounded by a swirling mass of coloured lights. They begin and it's crazy man crazy. The Aberdeen quartet (three boys and a girl) emit this vibrating wall of noise that squeals and wails and staggers, yet at the same time they look unmoved by the excitement they are causing. Oh yes, this trippy music makes you sweat. I see now that the strips of loo roll are actually fevered brow wipers. I wipe mine repeatedly.

The vocalist's eyes glint in the darkness as he sings the most beautiful songs imaginable, including the single 'Happy Days'. The guitars and organ float along nebulous waves with a deceptively hot flavour. There is an Oriental feel to this music, the way it makes you sway and shake. And there's a distinctive aroma here, full of Eastern promise and Buddhist psychology. It will convert you, calm you, make you at peace with yourself, and then leave a taste in your mouth that makes you thirst for more.

The Shamen are a pleasurable trip in the dark, but look out for the trapdoor.

KILL UGLY POP/THE INSTINKS/SPACEMEN 3 **Chalk Farm Enterprise**

SAY WHAT you will about the "fat slob" Jon Beast, he's the only person in London at the moment with the guts (geddit) to put on regular gigs for the unknown and struggling future-of-mutantbastard-sex-beat groups. Bands that your established venues and real asshole promoters wouldn't touch with a barge pole because they're too adventurous/ dangerous/exciting and because their fans won't contribute towards a fat

profit. Bands like Spacemen 3 who, in six months time, will have people falling over themselves to grab a booking for their seedy, over-priced toilets.

The four boys of Spacemen 3 have discovered that Lou Reed actually died after recording 'Sister Ray'. Thus they've contacted him through their hypnotic ouija board of lengthy but frantic song dramas and two note solos, and persuaded him to come back and operate the psycho-delic light show tonight.

Beast's new Chalk Farm club is called the Ghost Station and Spacemen 3 give it a fiery send off.

The Instinks, by comparison, are much less straightforward but equally densely textured in the noise that they make. Quirky little tinkers playing rhythm games with flames, twisting songs inside out until they wrap your whole body in an intense heat. "Hey this is fabulous, hey this is stupid," croons the singer, and who am I to question his insight?

If only Kill Ugly Pop were even half as original or

invigorating. In tonight's environment they're about as welcome as Sam Fox at a feminists' convention. They come on like this damn youth club band who never grew up, the singer in his dogcollar doing a passable impression of a shell-shocked preacher trying to convert his audience. They're all front with no subtlety to the tunes, nothing to leave you hoping or wondering (except, Is this what happened to Ten Pole Tudor?)

Kill Ugly Pop should heed their own excellent advice. Suicide would be smart.

HUGE BIG MASSIVE Rock Garden

"HI, WE'RE from Chicago. What's the name of this band?"

"They're from Leicester and they're called Hugebigmassive." Chuckles. This is Covent Garden. They used to be called Sister Crow, but everyone thought they must be a heavy metal band and so the name had to go. That's progress.

Singer Andrew Sharman used to be a bit of a twat on stage but he's honed and developed his stage presence over the course of the past 12 months, sacrificing excess hair (one of the band informs me that when he visits his barber he says one word, that word being "Rampton"), exposing two daintily earringed lugholes, and generally sharpening up his act. He's now nine-tenths of the way to becoming a complete twat (a real compliment in my book), an essential quality in one with the vaguest pretensions to stardom.

Sharman has rediscovered the lost kingdom of charisma. "F*** off!" exclaims our hero as the more fervent among his retinue request another old favourite - a true charmer. And then there's his acquired knack of going doolally during the course of an absolutely spazzy guitar solo, without disturbing the symmetry of an otherwise perfectly sensible song

In the background, a disciplined sax; to the fore, Karl the bass with his baby D'Artagnan tash and goatee, and Stuart Simpson, rocking out in a big way on keyboards. Good songs are what they've got, in

FELT/THE SERVANTS Ladbroke Grove Bay 63

TONIGHT'S ATMOSPHERE is evasive. It's an evening when the moon decides to hide under a blanket of clouds and the strongest aficionado of hidden gestures and disguised moods is tested to the full...

The Servants, a complex four-piece, demonstrate their exhilarating, allusive melodies and wickedly bully their songs, songs which end up as exhausting anticlimaxes but which still somehow manage to keep us waiting for the punchline.

The fact that the punchline never arrives is both The Servants' strength and their exasperating weakness. They hinder their semi-evocative gentility with dispassionate ideas that are too secretive, with guitars which battle continuously with each other. THE SCAREHUNTERS **Nottingham Forest**

AS THE first day of Nottingham's annual rock and reggae festival lumbers to a close, over two hours late, the faithful few huddle around the makeshift stage, running low on cigarettes and patience. Gone are the neohippies playing with scraggy dogs and painting children's faces; it is, as they say, time to rock 'n' roll. . .

The Scarehunters are the creation of one Andy Ryder, ex-guitarist with Medium Medium, and although the white funk past of the latter is played well down, it's still there as the backbone of the music in its most minimal sense. The bass lines are primitive and the guitars sound chunky, creating the intended sleaze-noise to back up an intelligent lyrical attack which only sometimes veers towards tongue-in-cheek rock banality.

The overall effect is exciting and penetrating, if a little blunted by a poor mix. And the performance is fittingly entertaining and engaging for those who have endured the mediocrity of most of the previous acts.

Despite not slotting into either the independent scene or a mainstream chart image, this bunch are hopefully onto a winner.

Well, despite my prejudice, after a couple of minutes I had to admit that the goonish Big John, with his goofy grin kissing a cigarette, is a bit of an Olga Korbut on the fretboard. Back flips, the splits, somersaults and tumbles, never have such nicotine stained fingers licked themselves so clean.

It's perhaps arguable that the best looking member of Blood Uncles is the drum machine, though a passing Kez Owen made my cheeks blush with the comment, "Eeeee, 'tut singer's gotta nice bottom". That may be so, but either way, with his voiced pitched in a black hole somewhere between Nick Cave and a sand-blasted Jim Morrison, Wee John Carmichael isn't to be dismissed with a shrug.

The poor boy has got a problem though. "I'm living in a broken down world," he seethes. Windows smash, doors warp and floors crumble. "This is about car crashes and orgasms," Wee John says. They should have called such a song 'The Balla(r)d Of JG'; instead it's titled (zzzzz) 'Crash'. A small example but indicative of how, for every feat of imagination Blood Uncles achieve, they spoil it by putting their feet into wooden clogs of clichés.

Not a major transfusion yet but still worth ten minutes of your time. Blood Uncles could bleed for you profusely in a few months.

Any comparisons with The Pogues would be purely complimentary, but whereas those doolally drunkards turn maudlin at the drop of a pint, The Doonicans lift your spirits high to their mouths and drink with a mile-wide grin on their faces.

GAYE BYKERS ON ACID Croydon Underground

WITH A cap proclaiming 'No Justice, Just Us' and a chest painted red with the message 'A Miasma', Mary is quite the best looking manchild I've seen onstage for a while. He pouts like some lecherous Lolita, peforms oral gymnastics with his waggling tongue, rubs his beleathered crotch searching for satisfaction . . . but tonight he has all the sensuality of a squashed slug. Gaye Bykers On Acid are a slime trail of ineffectual thrash on a bad

trip to the unenjoyment line. They suck, and they don't

even do that well. As some sort of implosion of sex 'n' psycledelics designed to shift your mind in the bow-wow! lane and hone your body with new hormones, at the moment the Bykers have everything going for them except for the most essential ingredients: maximum music and scorching songs. They look good: bassist Robbo being like some SD-mutated son of Sid and guitarist Tony like the wild child of a peyote princeling. Even drummer Hydie smugly overcomes his ugliness by setting his top hat on fire. But out of their freakily painted instruments all that emerges is a very noisy dwarf whose revolving hunchback becomes a blur.

Unlike the best of America's acid attackers, the Bykers take all the magnesium energy of punk and, and instead of warping it into strange new psychotropic dreamscape, they rev the beast into a generic corner where it slams its brains out against a brick wall. There's no focus, no clarity, no charity of emotions, no dynamism, no laughter or lust and, above all, no good songs - just a series of chain-linked riffs.

Still . . . this was only the Bykers' tenth gig and what they have got going for them are their blistering bursts of

enthusiasm. The day Mary forgets about apeing Iggy Pop will be the day he gives an immaculate virgin birth to a music which really does tap into the acid-zap that the group's name promises. If they aim at altered states instead of worshipping at the altar of pure speed, then maybe their moped will turn into a Harley-quin.

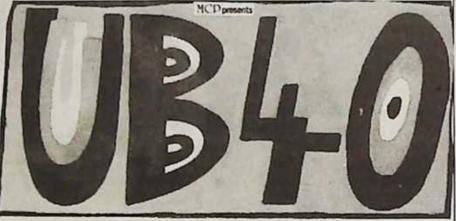

THE VYLLIES 'Lilith' (Fun After All/AFTER 2)**** THE VYLLIES, so I'm told, are characters from Giselle - a ballet by some chap called Adolphe Adam all about diseased women. These shameless floozies, so the story goes, return from the dead to haunt their unfaithful

lovers, forcing them to dance

to death and cross the river

Styx. I caught my first dose of Switzerland's Vyllies after a close encounter with 'Ahia', their previous single. And despite desperate experiments with various aural lubricants, I couldn't find a cure. But months later, after frenzied bouts of itching and scratching around, relief has arrived in the welcome form of 'Lilith' - The Vyllies' new album - soothingly cool and unmistakably scented with traces of feminine disquietude.

The all-girl trio, comprising Ursula Nun, Ilona Prism and Manu Moan, sigh, gasp and heavily breathe their way through the sinister lyrics like hedonistic zephyrs - perverts

should keep the volume low. This precaution is especially important for 'Bad Trip', a song with a tantalising French intro about unwarranted harassment on a train.

The music, like the lyrics, has an adversely creepy element; it's chillingly different and classically refined. Keyboards ripple, sending sensual tingles up and down your spine. Breathy whispers continue, blending with moans and evil laughter on 'La Nuit Des Vyllies'. It reminds me of a horror version of the Magic Roundabout theme tune, tinkling from the Tannoy in a deserted fairground.

In fact, this album would make brilliant theme music for TV thrillers - Tales Of The Unexpected perhaps - but maybe it deserves more privacy than that. This isn't entertainment for the uncultured masses - it requires a certain amount of concentration, a sublime understanding of deeper things. The Vyllies are a personal experience.

ANGELIGUPSTARTS



"OK, GUYS - when I said let's reach for the sky, I didn't quite mean like this. . ."

Taking her sobriety in her trembling hands and trying to inflict sporran order, KEZ OWEN grabs two of BALAAM AND THE ANGEL and gets Chapter 22 and verse. Read on for the angelic conversation

E'RE ALONE in a room in Oxford, Balaam and The Angel and I.

In a couple of hours they're to support Big Country on the final date of a long tour. Des has disappeared.

The others explain that he doesn't feel that he has anything to contribute to interviews. Like most drummers, he's dedicated to his drums. Vocalist Mark squirms in squeaky leather trousers and he and Jim (guitarist) toss long untamed locks over shoulders that have never experienced the weight of a chip greased with worry. Nor, it seems, are they ever likely to.

The three Morris brothers appear to have

After two years they've got a huge following who call themselves The Sperm Bank. They've had several releases on their own Chapter 22 label and have an album, The Greatest Story Ever Told', due out soon on Virgin. They seem set to break through barriers without having to try too hard, a fact that should please them. It's not that they're lazy - may my navel heal over if it appeared I was hinting at such.

No, they deserve a restful rise to the top: they've played too hard for too long without the recognition they deserved, starting with the lowly beginnings of gigs in Staffordshire working men's clubs.

Jim: "We were only 16 then, and it was a whole different concept, very working class and very cabaret. We played cover versions of the Top 40 and foxtrots and waltzes to middle-aged people. Years later, we formed Balaam. We thought we could do something better than what there was. Every band we saw was this grinding, depressing wall of noise. There had to be an alternative."

So you're happy, poppy people at heart? Mark: "Not really. 'Slow Down' was about people who take themselves too seriously, that's why we made it poppy. We wanted to go to extremes, so the next single will be hard. We want diversity. I don't think there's enough colour in music."

The Balaam album is a spectrum of colours. It glistens with 'New Kind Of Love', dazzles with 'She Knows' and radiates with 'The Wave' Why

Mark: "We recorded it once and it didn't sound natural enough, so we spent time trying to get it right, but it just wasn't working. So we went in a different studio with Hugh Jones and did the whole thing in three days.

"When you do a single on an independent which you think will only be released in Britain, you're not so worried about the technical side because the British like a rough edge. If suddenly you then get a load of cash for recordings, you think things have to be spot on. That's where we went wrong, so we've gone back to the old formula of thrashing it out now."

So after all the thrashing, are you satisfied with the amount of versatility in the album? Jim: "I think we've achieved what we set out

to do by using a variety of sounds." Mark: "You've got to balance things out. How do you know something that's loud when you don't hear something against it that's quiet? How do you know a powerful song when you haven't

got a less powerful one?" I'm beginning to think there's two hippies in here, but there's no evidence of joss sticks, or kaftans - just Angels with slightly tarnished halos. Who corrupted them, influenced them into joining this wicked world of rock, I wonder aloud.

Mark: "Probably punk. We grew up on the punk scene, but Cannock, where we live, is a heavy rock area so that influenced us a wee bit too. We originally liked thrashing punk like Killing. Joke and The Dead Kennedys. Killing Joke have matured now, but you have to. You can either stay defiantly independent and elitist, preaching to a totally converted audience all the time, or you can become more accessible to a larger majority of people."

Don't you think that defeats the object and loses any elements of obscurity?

Jim: "I'd rather have a watered down Killing

Joke in the charts than Bucks Fizz any time " Mark: "I don't think they're watered down, just more songy." For the next minute Mark Morris laughs, a hearty guffaw. We wait till he's regained

control and then he says, "Here's a joke we made up. What do Killing Joke say when they go into a café with four of their road crew? Eight teas "

E MET Long John Silver in a pub the other night. He was a real sea-going type with a red face and a beard." This is Mark talking "He looked just like Captain Bird's Eye and he swore at a Sally Army bloke who tried to sell him something.

I remember that this pair say their father carted them to pub gigs when they were young and now positively grooves along to bands like The Jesus And Mary Chain.

Mark: "Our dad really encouraged us to perform. In fact, he looks a bit like Tom O'Connor or Jimmy Tarbuck or Bruce Forsyth, himself. He's one of these men with the million dollar smile and white hair. He's always followed the music press and, if he had his life over, he'd have been a musician instead of a miner.

"I think miners are all frustrated artists. They're down the pit all day, shovelling coal and singing to each other. I used to work in this place with fork lift trucks and lot of characters down there could sing, too. Yeah, a lot of miners desperately want to be on stage."

Balaam are also philosophers, it seems I want to get closer, but their sporrans are deep and ticklish. I know I'm just ruffling the surface, staying where it's safe, but further delving could result in my hands being slapped.

I've always been a bit frightened by rough Scottish accents after a frightening encounter on a school trip train Journey when a drunken Scot grabbed someone's teddy bear and stabbed it till its stuffing fell out.

Balaam Scots are different: Mark may have a heavy Scots accent, but he's only capable of knocking the stuffing out of me with his humour. I decide to attempt a serious stance.

Tell me about your record label, Chapter 22. Jim: "We set it up, but we don't really have time to do much with it now. It has become pretty obvious which bands will be signed. The Wild Flowers had new material and they were from the same area so there wasn't anything to discuss, really. The Mission asked us to put their single out for them, and that's raised the profile of the label. So the next release might be by a new band but people should think, Chapter 22 always put out good records, and buy it."

Mark: "We also wanted to compete with the major labels. An indie label isn't worth much if it doesn't say. We're gonna show those bastards."

So why did you sign to Virgin? Jim: "At the time, it was becoming clear that we couldn't go any further in the indie scene,

and to get a larger audience we had to move to a bigger company. You get a feeling that other companies would swallow you up in the big machine: Virgin is more on an Individual level."

Mark: "I'll tell you what really clinched the Virgin deal, shall I? We do hairobics (Mark's word) to prevent beer guts, so Virgin took us to the Wag Club and we had a headbanging session. They started playing some of that heavy funk music. We got a wee bit drunk and the music began to sound like a '60s B-movie, so we started go-go dancing. Suddenly everyone else started to do it - they thought it was the new Wag dance, especially the Chinese girls. Virgin signed us straight after that exhibition of talent."

And do you still do a bit of the fancy

footwork?

Jim: "Oh aye, we've got a dance routine, sort of Shadows type footsteps. A bloke from some club or other thought that all we needed were nice suits, a dance routine and a few cover versions and we'd be made."

Mark: "Why doesn't Zodiac Mindwarp do a cover of 'Doctor Love'?"

Jim: "I don't really like covers except in Christmas shows. Then we do Sham 69's 'Hurry Up Harry', that's one we did when we were a cabaret band. The punters loved it. There's a lot of morals in that and everyone gets entertained the same way."

Being angelic (well, sort of), you must have some morals?

Jim: "I've seen so many bands make big statements. Music is there for entertainment and, in the indie scene especially, there's not enough entertainment. Like punk - that just became a vehicle for what people wanted to say.

*Bands like the Medics are entertainers. If people want to say something, they should be in a different field, music's not the way - they should be politicians or teachers. Sure, there's messages, choices in our songs, but only things that might affect you.

"I suppose in a way, politicians are still entertainers, though. They've all got images. They're more like the Spitting Image characters than the characters themselves."

Mark: That's a brilliant programme. I didn't realise that Jimmy Savile went, Ooooohh ooooohh, ow's about that, then, till I watched it.

Who's the other one we like . .?' Jim: "Er, Jim Bowen on Bullseye. How's it go. now? Oh aye, Keep out of the black and in the

red, nothing in this game for two in a bed." The lads are still laughing when I realise that have totally lost the thread of the conversation it's tangled in those sporrans before me

To cover my embarrassment, I tell them I'm thinking of joining their Sperm Bank. I'm sure f'll forget to ask for details before I leave.

SESSION ROCKETTE 30 £175 QQQ VV1/2

APART FROM making some very fine sounding amplifiers, one of the characteristics of Session's products is their refusal to follow the pack. It's typical of Session to come up with fresh ideas which surprise me when I encounter them, yet leave me wondering why no one thought of them before.

A typical case in point is to be found in the Session Rockette 30's input system. A conventional looking combo, covered in grey tweed cloth, the Rockette 30 is a twin channel amp with two jack inputs. However, where most makers would offer you high and low gain levels (never all that necessary, given the provision of gain controls on most amps these days), the Session does things differently.

Input one connects you to channel B only (the overdrive one), while the second input lets you channel-switch, either via a footswitch or the top panel's rocker selector. The point of this is to enable two guitarists to use the Rockette simultaneously.

Given that one of you is likely to want to use lead/

IT'S ONLY ROCKETTE ROLL

overdrive sounds all the time, you'd plug one guitar into the topmost input, leaving the lower input for another player, who can then switch channels between A (clean) and B. It's a neat arrangement and a sign of how far Session think from the player's angle. In real life, small amps are very frequently shared, and it's nice to see that Session have provided the means to do so.

The tone and switching facilities on the Rockette are also quite unusual by today's standards. Neither channel has the pre/post gain control set-up which we're used to, channel B just featuring volume, overdrive and filter.

This provision of a single 'filter' control might look a bit mean at first, but not once you remember how few lowcost amps have any sort of independent tone facilities on their second channels at all. Usually you have to pay a fair bit more to be able to channel switch and have different sounds set up on each.

Channel B, though, does have traditional tone controls (bass and treble) plus its own



volume. It doesn't, however, have any provision for overdrive, which is a shame for players who want a raspy rhythm sound and an overdriven lead. With the

Rockette, channel A stays resolutely clean.

Apart from these features, the Session is well endowed in other respects, having an overall reverb (operating on

both channels), FX send and return, extension speaker and headphone sockets.

Altogether neatly turned out, the Rockette has a sealed enclosure containing a single 12-inch speaker, a fixed mains lead and metal corner protection. It's easily transported and ideally sized for carting around from rehearsal - even if you have to go by bus.

Soundwise, the Rockette is very impressive. It's loud and punchy, with a very satisfying 'ring' to it - especially on the clean channel. Testing it with a Strat, I found it capable of some far better 'clean' sounds than I've got from much more expensive amps. And it's versatile too, equally capable of a shrill treble response and a smooth jazzier warmth on the guitar's neck pick-up. Clean, the Rockette sounds much better than I'd thought likely for the asking price.

You might expect the single dial-in overdrive to give a sound reminiscent of one of those old tranny amps from the days before most makers switched over to pre/post

gain configurations. But it doesn't. Again, a Strat was my chosen weapon and, once more, the Rockette accepted its fairly low output perfectly. enabling me to wind-up the overdrive and get a pretty respectable lead sound.

Likewise, switching to a hotter guitar, the Session sounded sufficiently Motorhead-like to impress itself very forcibly on my next-door neighbours. Just the thing for three am vendettas! It's not the ultimate overdrive sound I've heard but (especially with some of the on-board reverb applied), it's far better than the sort of effect you get from most small amps, and more than acceptable for the price.

Overall the Rockette is a really attractive little amp especially for the less well off (younger?) player who needs to share his combo with a friend. It's plenty loud enough to compete with an acoustic drum kit, sounds very professional on the clean channel and more than adequate on overdrive, even with cheap guitars.

There's a wealth of 30 watt combos on the market today, but the Rockette stands out as one of the top two or three I've sampled.
