# Radical Noise In Hawaiian Shirts

"We're political, we're anti-capitalist. We think there's something wrong with society," say 3-Action, the band who eat meat and support vegetarianism. Kez Owen reports

MANY MOONS ago, three couples had accidents in Hull. The cause? Three faulty Durex – according to their record sleeve. The result? 3-Action, a trio of smalltown next-door types with a pocket-full of dreams, huge ideas and a new single called 'The Journey Of A Lifeline'.

3-Action are eager to get their name known, so eager they stole a car to get here (they claim) and kissed my feet (true!).

"We've only been going properly for a year," they say. "Before that we wrote songs and learned to play our instruments. But then we were called Reaction."

Why the name change? "Reaction is a bit too

reactionary for us. 3-Action's just right, there's three of us (bright lads these) and we're all action men."

3-Action are political; and living in a post-industrial town like Hull, that's somewhat inevitable. But they don't want to be known as a boring political band. The trouble is they wear badges that say 'I support Liverpool Labour Council' (pretty silly when you live in Hull) and have a single about discontentment and unfulfilled aspirations. So it's not going to be easy convincing people.

"The single's about being an office worker when you wanted to be a spaceman, about being forced to grow up early. So yes, we are political, we're anticapitalist. We think there's something wrong with society and say so through our songs. We hope it will make others question.

The Housemartins were obviously impressed. So much so that they invited 3-Action to support them on a recent tour

"They chose us because we're natural and normal, because they're good friends and because the drummer's got a big willie –

obnoxious obsession with shit.
They call it Logs, and give me a perfectly sound reason for their fascination. Cover your ears if you're squeamish.

"We get upset by the exploitation Logs go through, being flushed down the Log Bog and forgotten. We eat meat and support vegetarianism by liberating Logs after they've been through so much pain. We're involved in re-incarnation – Logs could come back as anything."

These boys are caring, lovable and good at their job too. Gary once won a pair of his hero's (Paul Weller) trousers in a Jam fan club competition and he's very generous with them. Go to one of their parties and you too could sniff that famous gusset.

Go to a 3-Action gig and you could sniff theirs. The aroma, the music – an experience not to be missed.



#### Jonh Wilde talks to Stacey Q who has epic lips, an outrageously sexual, er, sound, and used to ride an elephant called Dildo

# LIQUID GILASS

AFTER TWENTY years in the rarified atmospheres of the avant garde, Philip Glass still won't stand in one place long enough to be pinned down.

Last time he was over for his Akhnaten opera at the London Coliseum; this time it's a concert at the Royal Albert Hall with his Ensemble. And scarcely has he had time to count the royalties from his British Gas TV commercial soundtrack, let alone promote his 'Songs From Liquid Days' album.

"I don't take vacations or time off from work," he explains in the low-key/rapid-fire New York intellectual voice we've come to understand through Woody Allen films. "Just changing what I'm doing is enough for me."

Glass first came to rock and roll's attention in the mid '70s when he signed to Virgin – in the footsteps of Tangerine Dream – and released the much praised and much plagiarised 'North Star' album.

Since then, he has arranged and played on two albums by the band Polyrock at the turn of the '80s and, more recently, has been arranging for The Raybeats and Chris Turner.

His 'Songs From Liquid Days' album is unique in that it is his first to feature lyrics, which have come from fellow members of the New York cultural mafia such as David Byrne, Paul Simon and Laurie Anderson. And his favourite band this year is Art Of Noise.

"They're very much about content, I think."
The avant garde frequently treat Glass with suspicion, not least because he refuses to subscribe to any elitist theories about music.

"I've named names and I haven't tried to make friends. But I want my music to be part of the live scene, not something you have to study at college.

"Although I come from a classical tradition, I was brought up in the rock and roll era and affected by it. My performances are a reaction against the insularity of concert music."

His Royal Albert Hall concert was certainly

relaxed by classical standards, even if the audience weren't exactly breakdancing in the aisles.

In true avant garde tradition, the sound mixer sat at the front of the stage, his gold lamé back to the audience. Nestling between the banks of synthesisers were a couple of Housemartin clones on woodwind and a pre-Rafaelite lady who sang (without words) to the seemingly repetitive, but subtly shifting, chord patterns.

Glass, in baggy black trousers and shirt, maintained a David Byrne-style frontman image, restricting his patter to, "The name of this piece is . . . "

It was a lot livelier than a Tangerine Dream concert, or for that matter a New Age concert, which is the latest label Glass has been stuck with.

"My father owned a record store and I grew up listening to New Age music – only then it was called Mantovani.

"Still, I've survived being called a primitive and a minimalist, so I guess I'll survive the New Age too."

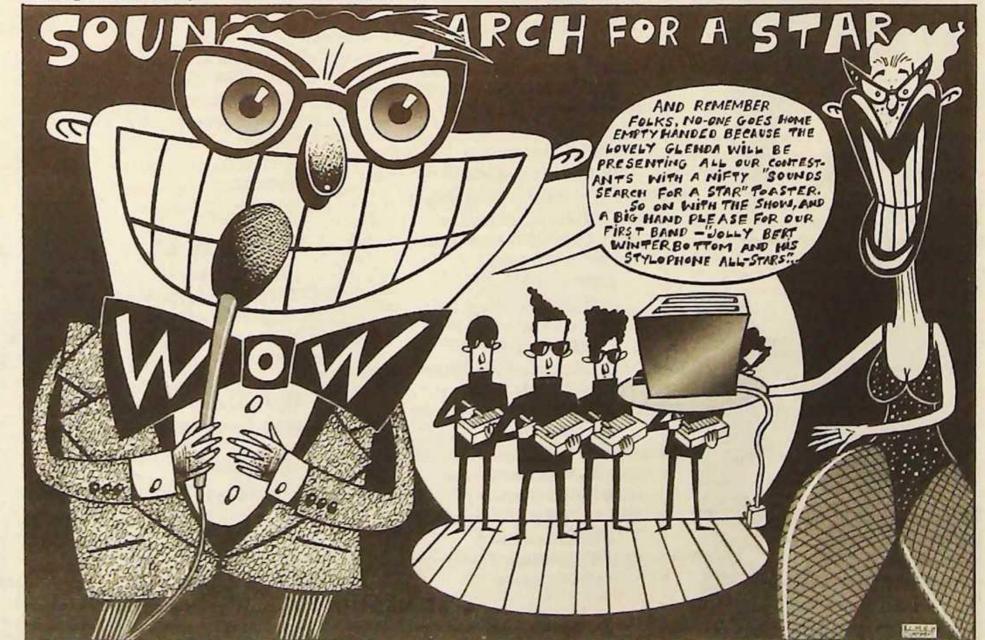

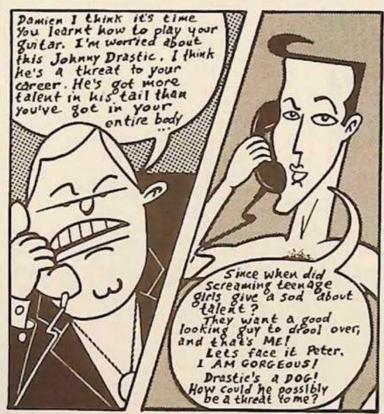

Subtle, arty, spiritual or just plain dishy? RICHARD COOK laps up words of wisdom from THE BIG DISH

## SAUCERFUL OF SECRETS

OO LATE! Pop has already eaten itself.

While the new charlatans chew over the remaining gristle, a few thoughtful heads are taking the only feasible course: sifting together new songs from evergreen verse and chorus.

"I still feel quite strongly about having an artistic content in songs. Plain speaking comes across to me as bad taste, sometimes. I'm interested in subtlety."

Steven Lindsay, a young man from Airdrie, is a firm light in this small gathering. His songs are played by The Big Dish, a Scottish band that pretend nothing 'new' in their pop. It's a bead drawn on the fine melodic ripple of the best rock: like the new jazz and the almost scientific new soul, it's a neoclassic idea at work.

When Lindsay talks about his music, he can't find much to say outside a vaguely pressing need to point out its quality, yet you can sense the importance of his songs to him.

He has a very powerful gift.

18 months ago this unassuming band released a debut 45, 'Big New Beginning', that put Scotland's great guitar jangle through its accustomed paces. On top was Lindsay's high, fluted voice to give it unexpected character. A gig I saw in Dundee was packed with songs struggling shyly into life; a live tape from the same period has been played repeatedly for a year. Something

sparkling dwells in this group's heart. Lindsay's songs are fresh, unpretentious pieces about his life: 'Jealousy' might be the best song on that subject pop has yet seen, and there are stories both charming and apprehensive in 'Slide' and the superb 'Beyond The Pale'. But if they never strive after the pontifical mystery chased by bores like James or The Blow Monkeys, The Big Dish manage to be more allusive (and elusive) than most. Lindsay never quite tells.

He's warm in the rather remote, puzzled way that's a Scottish birthmark, with a face that can look pinched or cuddly by turns. Like his schoolfriend Brian, who's now joined the group as second guitarist and singer, he was always good at drawing, and eventually took the unlikely route – for a working class Airdrie boy – to art school.

"My grandfather was a bit arty, played the piano and entertained the troops and painted a bit. But going to art school from Airdrie was, like – art school? Poof!"

Most pop workers claim to be sustained by art, but the quiet enthusiasm that Steven and Brian have for it is different to the clumsy cultural baggage that pop people try to cart around. The American realist painter Andrew Wyeth contributes two references in The Big Dish's set: 'Christina's World' is one of his pictures and one of their songs. It's deceptive. From a distance the canvas seems to show a young girl in a field; a closer look, and it's an old woman, her frame strangely crippled.

HEIR LP is ready at last, after two false starts and many personnel changes: only Steven and bassist Raymond remain from the first incarnation of the band.

The record is 'Swimmer', named after the most epic statement on the set, and it's still imperfect - a little too cleverly produced, with some of Lindsay's magical touches (like the heartstopping chord change in 'Prospect Street') nearly smothered. What survives is the inner strength of the songs. It's dangerous to talk about spiritual qualities in pop witness the soul-searching drivel which has greeted David Sylvian's disappointing 'Gone To Earth' - but how else to explain the glow that carries over from the simple early versions of these songs into the gleaming tracks of 'Swimmer'?

"I'm secretly quite a romantic person," says Steven. "I've not got a great liking for change. 'From The Neighbourhood' is about, why can't I have everyone I've ever known in the room at the same time, like?"

Lindsay looks askance at love and people. There are no explicit love songs on the record: 'Slide' is the closest he comes, and the messages of 'Jealousy' and 'Swimmer' tell of a lonely observer. Nor is there much of an attempt at the kind of wordplay teased out by Lloyd Cole – to cite the particularly foolish comparison mentioned in one early review.

"Writing's really easy. I've usually got millions of tunes but not lyrics of them all. One of the reasons we exist is that no matter what happens the quality comes through in the end. I do see depth in what we do, aye. If people get out of it what they get out of really great records like 'Killing Me Softly With His Song' or Eric Carmen's 'All By Myself' . . . "

Eric Carmen? Such a world of full-flushing emotion seems strange terrain here! But at least it's better than being stamped 'Scottish band' all your born days.

ELL, FOR a kick-off, I don't suppose too many people, given an outline map of the British Isles and a pin, would be able to locate with much degree of confidence Kingston-Upon-Hull — not unless they remember from geography lessons that it's somewhere in the vicinity of that pointy bit on the bottom-right-hand corner of Yorkshire.

But then why should anyone want to know where it is? What is Hull all about?

Well, fish of course, Rugby League, football (of sorts), the university, and a bit more fish and Rugby League.

The Housemartins' lead singer Paul Heaton migrated to Hull, and Stan the guitar man went to the big school, and the lot of them are as happy as a cat in a cargo of kippers, residing in a town with white telephone boxes, where it's still possible to buy a house for ten grand. And there's Rugby League. Do any of this mob follow the game?

Paul: "Yeah, I do, actually. I support Hull KR, and have done since I was a kid (in Sheffield), but now I only really go to watch them in the local derbies (against Hull, amazingly enough), but they play each other so much these days.

"And the game has changed. .."

Do I detect a hint of nostalgia there? Yes, I think I do. It strikes me that these young men are something of a throwback to a distant past of baggy footy shorts, a Jarrow solidarity, and a delight in the simple pleasures of life, such as the gramophone and mild and bitter. The Housemartins are, to a man, soppily coy whenever gurls are mentioned; somehow, they're a very moral bunch.

Paul: "I describe myself as a Christian occasionally – the Christian ethic and not the established religion; a lot of conservatives go to church to wash away their sins, but it doesn't

work, does it? At least it won't work when they go up to heaven, because they won't be allowed in, will they, Stan? We agree with the original stance of Christianity, against money, against Dives and his dogs."

Who?

"Dives. He was a rich man and he left his dogs outside his massive palace, and he let them lick the wounds of Lazarus – was it Lazarus? (Thinks, Don't ask me, all I know is that he played right

wing for QPR and Crystal Palace and had a habit of dropping his shorts to hecklers in the crowd.) Well, he was this poor bloke, and Dives let his dogs lick this bloke's wounds, and they are like Dives."

The word 'they' is spat out with the distaste

usually reserved for the times when you're wolfing down a pizza at home and you chomp into a scrap of tinfoil – very nasty indeed. 'They' is Paul's collective word for capitalists, Rupert Murdoch, Young Conservatives, Jimmy Hill (true – ruining the game of football), racists and sexists, to name but several millions. The list could very possibly take up the rest of this feature, so 'they' suffice. Oh, Paul likes Brian Clough.

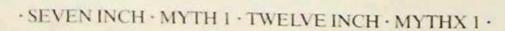
How do you rate Bernard Manning?
Paul: "He's obviously a bit backward, isn't he?
He's telling old-fashioned '70s jokes about racism and sexism; I don't think a comedian has to be ideologically sound, but I think he has got to understand that he's offending people, and perhaps he wants to, in which case he's just a fat oaf."

Maybe it's because I'm a Londoner that I am under the illusion that the Northern stereotype of a-woman's-place-is-in-the-home man is still the norm in these parts. . .

"Well, for a start there isn't that sort of mentality," berates a heated Heaton. "That's definitely a southerner's view, and if they have that view, it's because that's what they're fed by the rich southern TV companies. It's encouraged because the southern capitalists ('they') want to keep the North uneducated, because if they were educated properly they would take action. That mentality has died out up there; even the working men's circuit is dying out.

"I do think sexism exists, but just in a different form to the southern trendy sexism, which is totally patronising, as is the racism. If I was to say to you that everybody in the south wore

bowler hats – which was my impression as a twelve-year-old – you'd think I was in need of some education, which is obviously what you need."

Whoops.

Erm, let's see... sexism, the art of patronising... What about Amazulu and Bananarama?

Paul. "I don't know, really. I haven't seen much of them. We've seen Samantha Fox and we've seen Fuzzbox, people are encouraged to play roles and women are fed that a pop star is a good thing to be, like a model, or an object of sexual desire for men."

It's worth emphasising at this point that Paul isn't the only one of the band present, it's just that when he gets flowing, the others seem to lose interest. Bassist Norman is the (relatively) quiet one of the group, and when Stan speaks it tends to come out in such a ridiculously fast splurge that it's extremely difficult to decipher his babbling when playing back the tape.

Drummer Hugh Whitaker's train was late.

But wait - Stan speaks!

"I think it's just the business we're in; but instead of being like a normal industry where you've got, say, washing machines as your commodity, in our business people are the commodity. Whether you're male or female, you're still exploited, you're still treated like one of the products, and I agree that people are very much sort of like almost pushed towards the Samantha Fox end of the market, to look glamorous, but they can..." at this point Stan shifts into drivel and the remainder of the sentence is lost forever.

Paul: "There are male stereotypes, but one point Hugh has made is that there's no way four girls could have made it looking like we do, looking like scruffs."

"Everything has to be exaggerated to sell a band," chirps Norman, stirring like the dormouse at the Mad Hatter's tea party. "Journalists do it as much as record companies – if you've got a few spots, you're a spotty band from Hull."

I used to have the odd pimple and I was never a spotty band from Hull, but I see what he's driving at.

Since WE seem to have more or less strayed on to the largely irrelevant subject of pop music, it is an extremely interesting fact that nestling among Paul's record collection ("soul and gospel on the left, other stuff on the right") are two Herb Alpert albums.

Paul: "I tell you what you should have noticed — Persuasions records."

Stan: "If you want to criticise us — and I think it's about time someone did — then it's that on our acappella songs we rip off The Persuasions blind, embarrassingly so."

You've had one big hit, 'Happy Hour' – will you do it again? (The new single, Think For A Minute', is a thoughtful departure from 'Happy Hour' but it's still fantastic.)

Stan: "Interesting question. We're not sure."
Paul: "The new single is totally divorced from the album."

Stan: "No – what we should say is that the new single is really the old one slowed down a little bit with slightly different vocals and an acoustic guitar instead of an electric one. I'm going to say the new single is going to be a real hit, because in the sweepstake I've prophesied that it won't be a hit, so I can't lose."

And just how important is pop music? Stan: "Well, it's our living, so to us it's quite important."

Paul: "It's substantial, it's a massive industry, and now it's a massive part of our culture, whether you choose to ignore it or not. It's everywhere – it's on the front pages of the newspapers, it's on the television and it's on the radio. It's an important medium for our lyrics."

A platform, yes, but then again, why is it all over The Sun? Perhaps it's just as important a weapon for the establishment as it is for you?

Paul: "Yeah, there is that. Sometimes we feel like using it as a platform for direct political speaking, but you've got to be careful as so many people are turned off. We have to understand that we are light entertainment, but we also have to get the message across; sometimes the message gets lost, as I'm sure it did with 'Happy Hour' – I'm sure a lot of people didn't understand what the song was about; maybe we failed."

But they'll keep on keeping on, trying to redress the balance, Fleet Street (what's left of it) and TV news reporting is biased – at least as far as The Housemartins are concerned. But can there really be such a thing as impartiality, I wonder: Heaton takes The Telegraph – not too

many of you would have predicted that, eh?

"I like The Telegraph because it clearly maps out Tory policy, and to argue effectively against it you've got to have an understanding of how their minds work. The Times does the same, but we wouldn't buy that because it's a scab's paper."

I push my copy of *The Times* a little deeper into my bag; of course, I only buy it because it clearly maps out which specimens of horseflesh are going to shoulder the burden of my investments for the afternoon.

Why do the tabloids sell so prolifically?
Paul: "Ignorance sells because it's marketed so well. As a working-class person you're discouraged from reading something like this (The Telegraph) from the word go. At school I was told that The Sun was a Labour paper – I was told that in Social Studies, so I immediately thought this was the paper for me, and that the other papers were all Tory, and The Guardian was the Liberal paper. You were also told that politics was for intelligent people; I got into left-wing politics very late because I was put off it – you either had to have a beard or wear a bowler.

"If you turned on the television for the news, you didn't understand it, and the news is the most important programme of the day. What you learn about is the Romans and cavemen; you know everything about cavemen you could ever possibly want to know. The only thing I ever used to watch the news for was the aggro, violence, fighting."

Norman: "I was 20 before I took any interest in politics – before then I assumed it was something normal people couldn't do – like riding a unicycle."

Have you tried riding a unicycle? "Yes I have, and it is difficult!"

Paul: "But once you've learned how, the world is your oyster."

And oysters used to be a working-class dish. . .

Stan: "They certainly did; in fact, it used to make them sick, they are so many of them."

Food Paul and Stan are vegetarians (most of the time) and The Housemartins as a whole eat a lot of Sugar Puffs. A lot.

Four questions for Paul: 1) The SDP.

"You want to know about the SDP? They're so

different to politicians, right or left; they think there's a middle ground between right-wing Thatcher and left-wing Labour, and perhaps they're right. They're desperate to get back into Government because they like power."

2) The Liberals.

"They're a bit different, aren't they? There aren't a lot of things uniting the Liberals and the SDP, but they all want to get into power, and they will use political accomplices to get their way. I'm pretty sure the next election will see a Tory/Liberal alliance."

I'm not so sure about that one Paul has a Mayor McCheese car on top of his gas fire.

3) Young Conservatives.

"What do you want me to say? They're the same as all Conservatives. They're just Tories and they're scum, absolute scum, absolute scum."

4)The Redgraves.

"You want to be careful about the Redgraves - lawsuits and things like that. Very careful."

HAT ARE the positive aspects of life in 1986?

Stan: "There's a positive side to everything; Jesus – that's a positive side to life."

Paul: "The positive side for me is politics. And collecting badges (a fine collection of enamel trades union badges). And football; we sponsor two local junior sides, Housemartins FC."

Hasn't football gone downhill?

Paul: "Terrible. I could speak to you for hours about it. It's all to do with politics, blokes like Jimmy Hill (told you) leaning towards the big sides and their selfishness."

Are you making money, like real money?
Paul: "We've always given ourselves a wage, and the wages go up every June. We got £90 pounds a week before tax, but on top of that there are all sorts of things starting to come in, we can charge more for gigs."

Stan: "But not as much as Half Man Half Biscuit, huh!"

Paul: "Money's problematical for the band; it's particularly problematical for me, because I'm not sure, if it's a large amount of money, how I'll take it."

I'd hoped to be able to avoid the following as an opening or closing sentence, but it seems I've landed myself right in it. So, a deep breath and here we go...

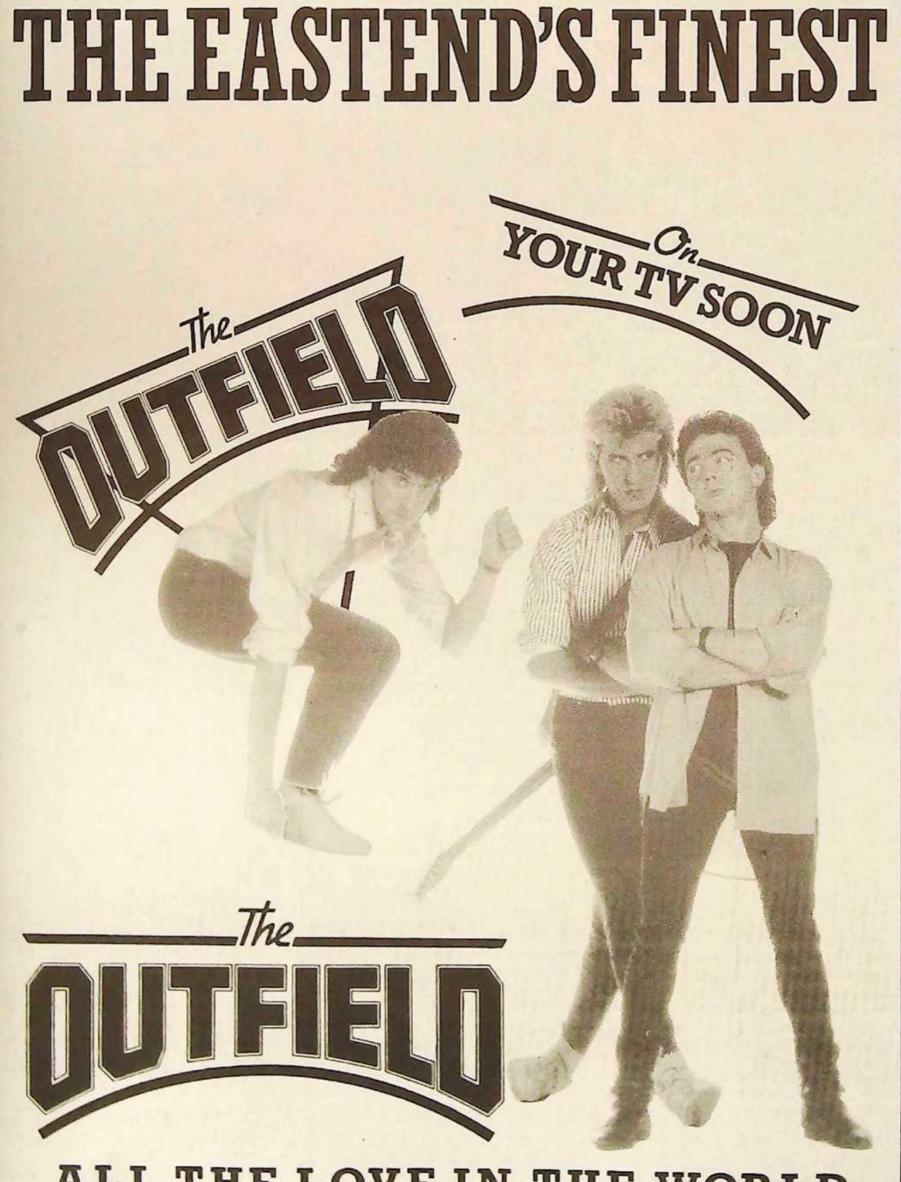

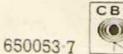

# 25 DAN ARCHER

N A Covent Garden piazza illuminated by an English summer's last ditch renaissance stands a man in search of a maypole, a misdirected morris dancer.

The baggy whites and chintzy floral waistcoat tell you this is XTC mainspring Andy Partridge long before you focus on the curiously uncommitted face behind those tinted NHS specs.

"Actually, this is the nicest I've been dressed for a long time. I'm usually a mismannered Marks And Sparks but I found this waistcoat in a junk shop and I've been wearing it ever since - the Dave Swarbrick look."

So cast out your Crolla, veto that Versace, this is the next big thing?

"No, that's looking like Maddy Prior - if only I could encourage the hair to come on a bit."

TC HAVE a new album, 'Skylarking', out in three weeks time. It's an irritating mixture of the inspired and some moments of bland hat-tipping song smithery. Not that this blend should be surprising - after all, XTC are an enduring anomaly in the span of Britpop. Mr Partridge's wassailers have long since thrown off the tutored anarchy and clever-clever wordplay of their 'punk' days and with the last two albums, 'Mummer' and 'Big Express', have confirmed a romance with things rustic. But still they don't really fit anywhere.

Their hack Hardyisms grate a bit, but at the same time they're likely to throw out one of their idiosyncratic pop hooks to fly deservedly into the top ten. Still, singing of love on a farmboy's wages is hardly very cool and it sits uneasily beside today's prevalent cynicism. It can't be easy being the Dan Archer (God rest his soul) of pop.

"Yeah, our position is pretty difficult. I feel sorry for Virgin Records. Just how the hell do you sell us? We're not young funsters we're balding and fat. We're the three garden gnomes from the West Country who deal in a pop format. I feel like one of The Residents but without the masks - that's how high profiled we are."

As he points out, their career has continually oscillated between high

and low points. This, combined with the fact that contemporaries such as U2 and Simple Minds are making big bucks in the States, has led Virgin (who they've been with for nine years) to believe that they must step in and sort out "funny old XTC". The first step has been to bring in Todd Rundgren to produce an 'American' album which will therefore sell lots of copies in America. Rundgren was given (for them) unprecedented executive power - choosing the tracks and deciding on their presentation, but perhaps not with the desired result.

"We gave him demos for three albums worth of material and he phoned back saying he'd got a running order, which was weird because at that stage we hadn't recorded anything. He went for all the softer stuff, steering away from the tougher, more difficult stuff and he wouldn't entertain anything with a political lyric. The idea was to produce an American LP but I think the idea has backfired horribly we've ended up with an LP which I don't think will sell very well in the

Are you unhappy with the product?

"Well, I feel he hasn't let the bollocks show through - basically, his opinions were at opposite poles to mine. It's the first time that we've been induced to hand over total production control, but despite the fact that it was difficult for us to make, I'm still proud of the music -I'll hold my hand up and say that's

HE ALBUM starts off with three songs, 'Summer's Cauldron', 'Grass' and 'Meeting Place', which bear all the hallmarks of XTC's arcadian craftsmanship - a sort of musical illustration to Cider With Rosie. After this, the tracks have been orderd to move from light to dark, building to a sombre climax with 'Dying' and then lightening again with the final song 'Sacrificial Bonfire'. Sounds suspiciously like a concept album to

"Well, if I could think of any other word . . . It's not a concept album in so much as there's no songs about deaf, dumb and blind legless pinball players who take lots of acid. The songs are just conceptually ordered.

XTC recently popped up on So It Goes, Granada TV's collection of archive punk performances. Sandwiched between a petulant Pete Shelley ("Don't gob at me") and a parodic Jimmy Pursey, they didn't really fit then either.

"I was holding my sides with

laughter. At the time, it felt dead right but ten years on I just think who's that young twat pulling funny faces. Back then I just wanted to upset people. I was much more a shouter and a yeller."

PEAKING TO this quiet voiced, thoughtful, shockingly reasonable 32 year old with his bucolic Swindon burr and a wife, a kid and a mortgage, it's difficult to imagine him wanting to upset anyone. In 1978 he'd got a buzz from "hurting someone's ears with a guitar", but today the satisfaction comes from writing a well honed

"The XTC of '78 had more in common with Sun Ra and his Solar Arkestra - someone who deals with noisy things. I think we've got better as song writers - it's like any craft, the longer you do it, the better you

So you're still excited by the process of making records?

"I love records - the sleeves, the paper bag, the label. I like the idea of music going in your ear and giving you that magical picture in your head. That's still the most important thing in my life."

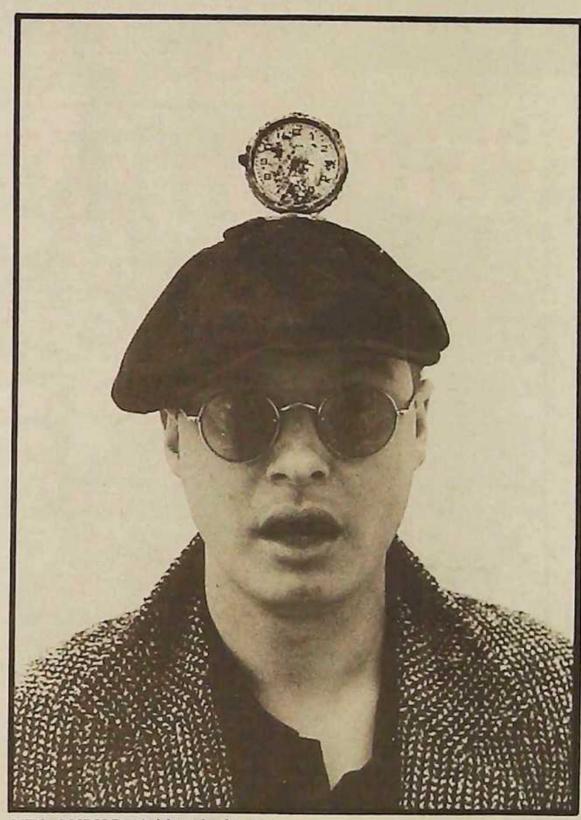
XTC's pop pepped tales of life, love and death in the backwaters are essentially timeless, removed from the inflections that mark out a Britain at the end of her tether, post industrial and pissed off. Thinking particularly of Matt Johnson's cataloguing of this country as a washed up 51st state of America, are XTC relevant today?

"Well, we were probably topical in 1978. What's relevant? News At Ten is pretty relevant. Relevant to me means essential to the time I think we're worthwhile, but I'm not going to grab people and say eat this. I think things are much more precious if you have to dig down and find them rather than to get someone flogging them at the door."

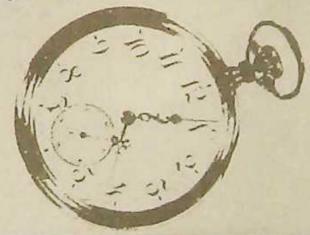
So it's fair to say that XTC won't be seen as a benchmark of the '80s, an indicator of the spirit of the age. This doesn't worry this ruminative rural sage (something he swears is unaffected: "People put that on us. It's not as if we're Pentangle or Fairport Convention."). This Ted Moult (God rest his soul) of a tunesmith is happy that what he's doing is of worth and for that matter so am I. XTC may be inconsistent but they have their moments: 'Plans For Nigel', 'Ten Feet Tall', 'Senses Working Overtime' and 'Summer's Cauldron' (from the new album) are outstanding if not important songs and it's about time XTC had another of their anomalous hits. As Andy says, they need the cash.

# AT THE MERCY OF THE MASTER

Something sad and inexplicable has happened to METALLICA, a band who were in full flight until bassist Cliff Burton was tragically killed in a road accident ten days ago. NEIL PERRY was one of the last journalists to interview the man and the band who gave thrash a touch of class. Parting shot from STEVE DOUBLE

HE DAY after I'd finished writing the original version of this interview, I learned that Metallica's bass player, Cliff Burton, had been killed in a road accident.

I'd been listening to his voice on the interview tape for two days beforehand, not knowing that he was already dead, wiped out in a crash on a foreign road thousands of miles from home.

I'd liked him a lot, as much as it is possible to like someone after talking to them for an hour. I'd been told that he didn't usually take much part in interviews, so I'd been surprised when he eagerly volunteered his services. We were in Edinburgh, the third night of Metallica's first major UK tour, and so far '86 had seen Metallica doing well, very well (except for one minor mishap rhythm guitarist/vocalist James Hetfield broke his wrist while skateboarding, resulting in a guitar roadie filling in for him). Many gigs were sold out in advance, and the third album, 'Master Of Puppets' had sold way past the half-million mark in the States.

What this means for Metallica's future only the rest of the band can say, but for now it's time to re-write, rethink and talk about a band that three weeks ago seemed unstoppable, before the whole story was given such a horrible twist.

That night in Edinburgh I'd watched Metallica drive a wild and wired Playhouse audience, already reeling from the kooky Anthrax, mental. Believe me, it had been a formidable double-bill, an inexorable sonic tidal wave. Revolutionary, maybe; the art of noise, definitely.

Thrash Metal, such a non-descriptive, redundant term, was supposedly coined after Metallica's seven-track demo tape hit the fan in '82. When the band's name began to buzz through the clubs and streets of LA four years ago, there had to be some way to describe what these people were doing. It was faster, louder, heavier and more exciting than anything that had gone before.

The band was put together in late '81 by Danish drummer Lars Ulrich and James Hetfield, and at the time included original bassist Ron McGovney and lead guitarist Dave Mustaine, to be replaced by Cliff and Kirk Hammett respectively at the end of '82.

Up to that period Metallica had already won themselves huge cult status. Legendary events such as 'The Night Of Metallica' – when the band, as support act to Krokus, saved the day after the headliners pulled an already sold-out show in Los Angeles – assured them of that. This thing was going to grow and grow.

So thrash metal it became, as the molten Metallica sound threatened to boil over and extinguish everything else. It certainly wasn't back to basics – it was more a redefinition, a real valid attempt to cut the crap.

Metal, especially American metal, had collected a lot of flounce and fluff, like a boiled sweet spat out onto a dirty floor. Metallica were the inevitable result, probably predicted by someone somewhere long ago, of a generation of American metal-heads too aware and caught up in the snowballing US hardcore punk scene not to absorb some of its positive influences.

An hour before Metallica had taken the stage at Edinburgh, Cliff, Kirk and I had closeted ourselves in the band's dressing room, which bore more resemblance to a smallish off-licence. As I turned on the tape, the sound of Anthrax drilled its way through the floor.

"We've known them a long time," smiled Kirk. "We had no money or nothin'. . they gave us an oven and a refrigerator, which was well necessary."

OK, first question. Doesn't it hurt playing at such a ferocious pace?

"We're getting a good draw, its a f\*\*\*\*\*'
hell of a lot of fun." This is Cliff. "It is painful
at first, our necks and lower backs really
hurt. But aspirin is a great drug."

I could hear the crowd downstairs baying for more, and I wondered what it was that took Metallica from having no money or nothin' to where they are now.

"I remember a discussion I had with him on a Greyhound bus," said Kirk, nodding towards Cliff. "We were coming back from recording our first album 'Kill 'Em All'. Do you remember that?"

"Nope!" said Cliff supportively.

"Oh. Well I said, I wonder what the second Metallica album will be like, and he said, Yeah, and the third. I mean, we were absolutely f\*\*\*\*\* clueless."

"You never give it much thought," drawled Cliff, "it just consumes you at the moment. It's gone over a lot bigger now, and it satisfies us. It's just a continuation."

"The underground metal scene was just blossoming before 'Kill 'Em All'," explained Kirk, "and we helped bring it together, we pushed underground metal out. The people who were into it needed something to focus on, and we provided that. I think the scene's dying now, people used to collect and swap tapes of gigs, but it's saturated, the whole genre is sub-divided into little titles now, like street metal. Don't ask! I'm as clueless as you about that."

"A lot of bands were into that, just the noise aspect," said Cliff. "But I think that we are a little too musical for that. The scene had a bad reputation, a lot of it to do with the way audiences reacted. Most of the bands and fans were drunk..."

He grinned, and reached for a can of lager.

LANDMARK in the history of recorded music', is how I had burbled about 'Master Of Puppets' in an over-enthusiastic moment, but I still stand by it. I do not know of a more total record, the result of all the ideas already developed on the second album, 'Ride The Lightning'. 'Master...' is too special to stagnate under the banner of heavy metal, too clever to be punk. Had the difference

worried them?

"We had our doubts," said Cliff, "but the public are too hard to sus out, you just do it. But the studio is just a labour, getting on stage is the reward."

Kirk: "The sales picked up considerably after we played Donington in '85. Before that we got into the usual genre, playing with thrash metal bands, speed metal, black metal, but Donington changed a lot of people's overall view of the band. We weren't the type of band to play 500 miles an hour every second of our set."

'Master...', I explained, reminded me of classical music through a wall of Marshalls, a guitar loving Wagner on speed. And Cliff shrugged, and said:

"Bach is God. We all go through periods of listening to it – except maybe Lars. We have periods when we're so into classical music. I was consumed by it, taking lessons, getting into theory or whatever. It leaves quite an influence. A lot of music will go in one ear and out the other, but you listen to that shit for a month and it stamps you. It leaves its mark."

I mentioned that I once saw Discharge back in 1980, and Kirk's eyes widened excitedly.

"Ah, that must have been a helluva good one. We listen to The Misfits, Discharge, Killing Joke, Black Flag, R.E.M., Peter Gabriel. An American band called Sam Hain."

It's the street-punk ideals that have given Metallica their huge crossover appeal, a situation that Cliff called "very healthy". Later I was to give up trying to count the mohawks in the audience.

"Being in a band puts you in a position to make a statement," continued Cliff, "but we're not some kinda f\*\*\*\*\* message band. It's a question of being used, controlled, dominated, that's the subject of a lot of our stuff."

"We're not hawks!" laughed Kirk.

"And yet it's strange what a heavy sound can do to people.

"Yeah, there's violence," smiled Cliff, "but we've never suffered from it. It's just things out of control, things happening on stage when we are onstage, like someone gets attacked, little things..."

And Cliff would not be drawn when I suggested that Metallica were leading the metal pack into a whole new ball game.

"Yeah, to an extent. It's flattering, we just do what we do." He puts on a classic American dumbo accent.

"We just get on the bus, roll in, roll out. If they don't like it, bummer! Ha!"

The lively and talkative Lars entered the room, a man who had intended to be a star on the tennis court rather than the stage, and the mention of Metallica's success set off a verbal trip-wire in his head.

"We're not the sort of band to sit around and count the gold discs. In America we've gained the level of success we've got without having to alter to any industry-set standard, image wise or radio wise. We've gone like that (he flicked V-signs in the general direction of the silently flickering TV on the wall) to the whole business in America.

"In Europe there are different ways of getting success, you don't have to depend so much on airplay so we're a bit more established. With 'Master Of Puppets' in America, a lot of people in the industry turned around and went, F\*\*\*\*\* hell, how can this be? All these people in their offices, all of a sudden they're reading their chart magazines and there's this band called Metallica doing half a million records, and there were none of the regular ingredients in the band that are needed to make it big in America. No huge image, no short songs for radio, no video, not even anything particularly outrageous, like Ozzy or whatever. Not even much of a stage show."

And with dressing up being an integral part of rock and roll the good old American way, the anti-image has harmonised Metallica with a lot of people. Lars, hardly able to get the words out quickly enough, carried on.

"From hanging out with a lot of other bands, I'd probably say we're quite a bit more both interested and aware of what bands around us are doing, what they sound like, what their records sound like, how they look.

"We've found so many things we didn't like, and we'd never want to see ourselves in the same silly position as some of these other bands. We've just been avoiding as many clichés as we've been able."

What do you think of when I say Metallica?

"Er. . . the band I'm in? Ha! No, energy. . . honesty. Dedication."

ANG THAT Head That Doesn't Bang threatens the back cover of 'Kill 'Em All', or maybe it's a promise. Extremes are what it's all about, and for some people there's no other way. Metallica, unwittingly maybe, became the focal point for a whole new wave of noise makers, and four years later the likes of Anthrax, Celtic Frost and Slayer (recently signed to Def Jam) are finding audiences very willing, if not quite prepared, to gobble up all they have to offer. As Cliff had said, the difference between Metallica and much of the HM field was "kind of like punching your fist in the air, rather than at a specific target".

"Everyone in Britain has preconceptions," said Lars. "They make up their minds before they've seen anything, heard anything – in Britain especially, it's so typical. That's why we stress in British interviews that there's more to us than these categories we've been put into."

Vocalist James Hetfield had just burst in, and shouted from the toilet, "Tell 'em we're jazz-metal!"

"Yeah!" laughed Cliff, "we're thrash-jazz!"
That's when I left. So it's back to the beginning, and Metallica were heart-stopping that night, as they were a week later at Hammersmith, a fusion of bodies and sound, complete sensory overload. But all that was three weeks ago, and now something sad and inexplicable has happened to a band who were in full flight. It is an uavoidable pity that Cliff's death will overshadow everything Metallica achieved this year, at least for a while. The fact that he is now just a voice on a tape is indeed a tragedy to anyone who has the slightest idea of what Metallica were, and are, about.

I'd like to thank Tim Hather of Weston-Super-Mare, A L Morris of Walsall, Gavin Bradbury of Aldridge, West Midlands, Jon Storey of the wonderful psychedelic music mag Bucketfull of Brains, Brian Leafe of Compendium International in London, and Russ Taylor of Crocodile Records in Rhyl, North Wales, for their contributions to what follows. Chances are there might be a few other readers whose info has turned up subsequently, so thanks too if you've since written but aren't mentioned above.

We'll talk flexi-discs first. R.E.M. have had one in the UK, issued free with *Bucketfull Of Brains*No 11, which came out in February 1985. The

disc was a one-sided 33rpm 7-incher, and featured the otherwise unheard track 'Tighten Up'. Catalogue number was BOB 5.

Jon Storey, the magazine's editor, is at pains to point out that this particular back issue is totally sold out, so there's no point in Sounds readers pestering him for it (though there are other back issues available, each with a flexi by an act of interest, and the most recent issue — No 17 — has one by The Long Ryders under the name of the Spinning Wighats. £1.40 per issue including P&P, from 70 Prince Georges Avenue, London SW20 8BH — or send Jon an SAE for details).

There was also a free R.E.M. flexi given with a US magazine – issue No 27 of The Bob which appeared in May this year. The track was 'Femme Fatale', on a one-sided 33rpm 7-incher (catalogue number REAL 005). Sorry, can't tell you how to get hold of this one; The Bob is NOT connected with Bucketfull Of Brains, though.

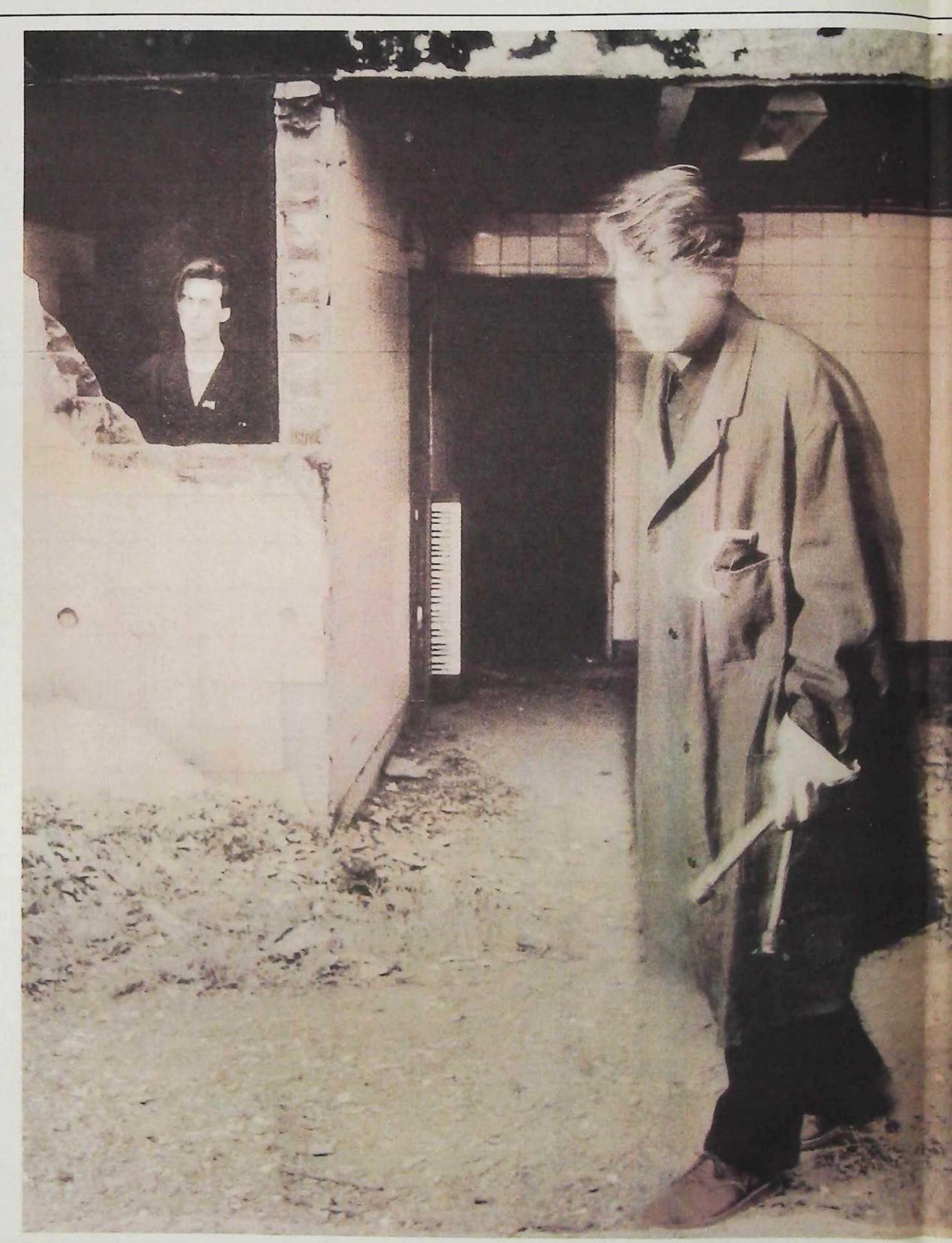

This was also released as a US 12-inch promo with 'Driver 8' on both sides, though in different

(studio and live) versions.

And a couple of US 12-inchers. . IRS (cat not known) 'Talk About The Passion'/'Catapult'/'Sitting Still 1983 IRS L33 17004 'Can't Get There From Here'/

'Driver 8'/'Life And How To Live It' 1985 (This one may have been a promo only) There is also quite a lot of vinyl by other acts which involves members of R.E.M. in some

capacity. This lot, for example. . . Michael Stipe co-wrote Both Sides Of The Line' and sang backing vocals on 'Hot Nights In Georgia' on Jason And The Scorchers' first album 'Fervor' (EMI America EE 24 00801), on which R.E.M. actually get a sleeve 'thank you'.

He also did vocals on the second Golden Palaminos album 'Visions Of Excess', on the tracks 'Omaha' (the Moby Grape oldie), and 'Boy (Go)' and 'Clustering Train', both of which he co-wrote. This was on Celluloid CELL 6118, while 'Omaha' also appeared as a 7-inch single in the US.

Peter Buck played guitar on 'I Will Dare', a track on The Replacements' Zippo album 'Let It Be' (ZONG 002).

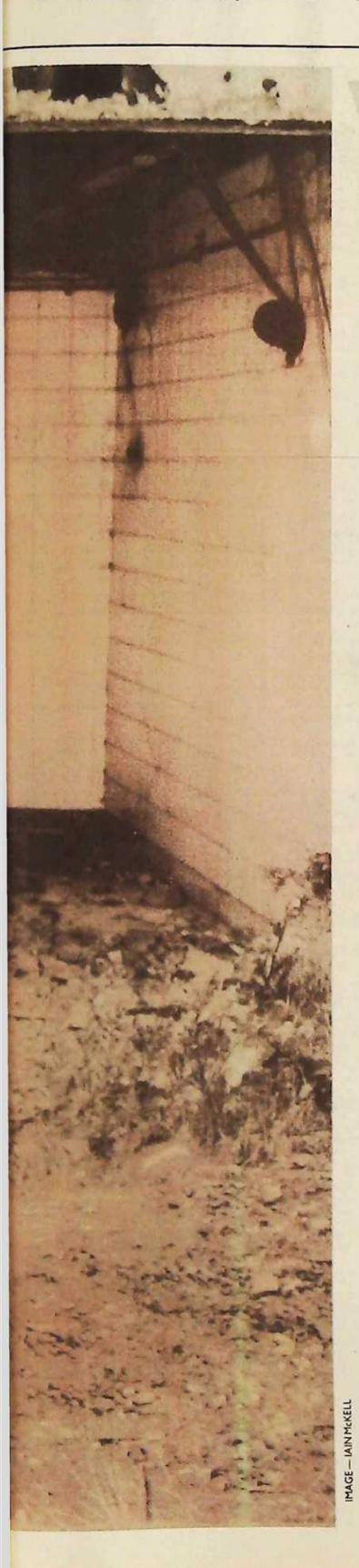
He was also on The Fleshtones' album 'Speed Connection II', released in the US on IRS, while along with Keith Streng of The Fleshtones and keyboard player Mike Mills, he made a one-off 12-inch single under the name of The Full Time Men last year. This featured three tracks: 'I Got Wheels', 'One More Time' and 'Way Down South', and was recorded in Athens. Georgia, in June 1985 ("in a short but sweet four days"), but released on a New Jersey indie label, Coyote Records (PO Box 112, Uptown, Hoboken, NJ 07030.)

Buck also produced a single for the Wolfing Cookles, a band from Greensbro, North Carolina. Titles are 'In The City' (not the Jam song)/'VB Song', on the Midnight label (MID 4512). Russ Taylor tracked that one down, and he also notes that a recent US IRS single by the Hindu Love Gods is actually by Messrs Buck,

Mills and Berry, plus Bryan Cook and Warren Zevon, of all people, on vocals! Titles are 'Gonna Have A Good Time Tonight' Narrator' (IRS 52867).

And finally. . . "If you want to get really obscure," says Brian Leafe, "Michael Stipe's sister Lynda was in a band called Oh-OK, which had two releases on DB Records in the States. The first was a 4-track 7-inch (DB 63) and the second a 5-track 12-inch (DB 69). The latter was titled 'Furthermore What', and featured another Stipe sister on backup vocals, plus a sleeve pic of a cat taken by Michael himself.

Brian adds that he has a few copies of each Oh-OK record in stock at Compendium (29, Beethoven Street, London W10 4LG; Tel 01-960 1871), while Russ Taylor of Crocodile Records (Unit 14, Queens Market, High Street, Rhyl, Clwyd, North Wales), with reference to the R.E.M. offshoot material, says, "I often carry this kind of stuff in stock." 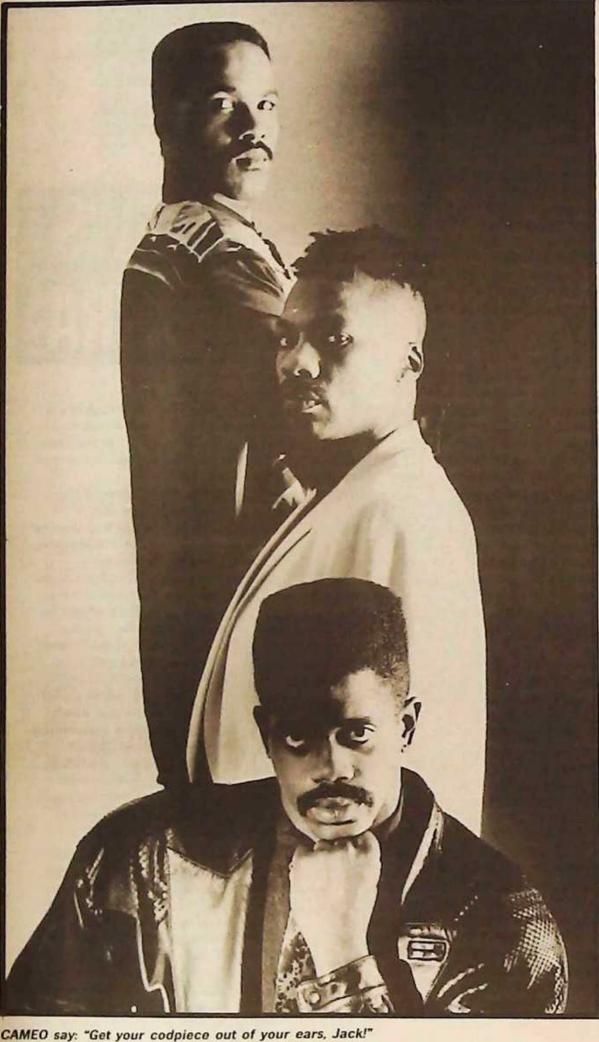

WORDS UPSIDEDOWN: Because you're not the only one whose heart has been broken and Blackmon's approach will serve to remind you of this - and how you love it - this inconsolable state.

Because there isn't enough time in the day and I thought I'd save you some you are about to read what was going to be the last phrase of this review: IT BUYS.

Words together: It buys into your life, does Cameo's umpteenth album. In fact it's already wiggling in the cracks between your soul and social facade. You have probably reacted in some way, from tapping your toes to chatting up a potential partner to the sound of 'Word Up!' because these pieces of Blackmon's are faves on the video-jukebox which serves as the collective musical memory of Sad Britain.

Words hook: the gimmick, the much commented on codpiece, hides some fishy music but that's only to be expected. Sonic strings that tie people together on a mass scale are inevitably woven from commonplace threads and Cameo suffer accordingly. Virtually every song is debased by the most appallingly conventional FM (c)rockist guitaring. But clichés such as this always serve a purpose by inducing an instant and unthinking hum of recognition in the listener.

Words lyrically: like, unfortunately, most current funk/soul/rapologist groups Cameo have a tendency to wear their testicles on their shoulders; whether this is ironic or not, I don't know. This comes to the fore on the pulverising, horn-heated 'She's Mine' which as the title implies finds Blackmon essentially treating a woman as a status object. Cameo are in one sense about holding onto your assets, being possessive. On 'Fast Fierce And Funny' (which is none of these things) he's lecturing us about how people can rip you off, and that includes the women around him who are golddiggers and who don't want to know him when he's lost his American Express card. The hardman side of Cameo reduces relationships to cartoons.

Words finally: Blackmon might have no time for psychological romance but when Cameo's guard slips as with 'Candy' or the ping-pong relationship groove of 'Back And Forth' we begin to touch on the heart of the matter: "Love has no guarantees". Cameo, in amongst the Disneysque synth motifs, would like it to be known that they are a positive group. But to me 'Word Up!' has too many negative musical and lyrical aspects to get excited about. So what's the word? Messy. **JACK BARRON** 

#### **COURTNEY PINE** Journey To The Urge Within' (Island ILPS 9846)\*\*\*\*

IN WHICH The Face bcomes The Sound, at last. This affable big cat of the homecooked jazz seems to have been every mag's mugshot in their token Jazz Revival spread. But how many have actually checked him out? With this important debut, Courtney Pine finally gets the new scene seriously on to record.

It's a pretty handsome shot. Normally his band like to stretch out, but ten tracks are squeezed into this set with only Phil Bailey's 'Children Of The Ghetto' a contender for 12-inch length. What's excellent about Pine's stance is his absolute commitment to the hard jazz: no sappy bossa nova workouts or funky scraps of fusion. His mentors, Coltrane and early Wayne Shorter, would have given the nod. 'Ghetto', a last minute inclusion and attempt at the hit single, is the only concession, and it's harmless.

Pine's quartet tend to bluster where the saxophonist finds more point - the heavy-handed drums stiffen up a pulse that ought to flow more - but they give him plenty of push. His own tunes, 'As We Would Say' and 'Seen' the best, are neat bits of business that don't challenge the jazz standards he picks: a lovely, considered stroll through Horace Silver's 'Peace' is the heart of the record. Best to concentrate on Courtney's saxophone sound: he's fashioned a muscular tenor voice and a surprisingly tough, gristly tone on soprano. The short measure of solo space can make him sound jolted - in When, Where, How And Why' you can hear him brewing up for the big tenor outburst and having to wind it up too soon. A trio for bass, bass clarinet and scatman Cleveland Watkiss plants a sense of fun and an ear for detail.

Blue Note veteran Michael Cuscuna blesses all with a genuine jazz production. A young lion starts to stretch, checks his claws, gets ready.

THE FARM 'Pastures Old And New' (Fire REFIRE 3)\*\*\*

THE FARM are wellmannered Scousers with their hearts in the right places. They're one of those awkward imageless bands who have had plenty of good things said about them but,

due to their clean-collar normality are never remembered. 'Pastures Old And New' is an abortion of old singles, John Peel sessions and new songs. It rarely surprises and never bores enough to depress. In this web of mediocrity, The Farm wilt desperately.

Their aspiring, worthy pop songs are too dependent on stale formulas, snatching at jolly ideas like watered. white-boy reggae in the bland 'Information Man'. Too often they toy with calypso riffs and leathery trumpet bursts. This may please the inhabitants of the council estate and get them swaying at the local NALGO party, but it does little to harden the emphasis of poignant lyrics that focus on various social ills. 'Heart And Minds', their best crack at commercialism, manages to stand out of the grey, claustrophobic production of the album and heightens the fact that too many of The Farm's songs are like framed pictures with no images to observe. All that's present is the white emulsion belonging to walls of calculated pop precision.

The Farm need to believe in themselves more and decide whether integrity can cuddle with pop, principles can be balanced with strong tunes and, most importantly, they must decide where their true direction lies. Until then The Farm will wallow around the edge of yawning worthiness, where they'll finally be forgotten. And that would be a shame.

'Distressed Gentlefolk' is his best record since last year's 'Sex And Travel' LP. the one that was meant to be like a concept album, a rewrite of 'The Third Man'. These ten ripples smirk loud enough to make Gibraltar Spanish all over again. They feature the usual filthy buzz and burr of electric guitars and the Butcher's wry outlook on life, sticking his tongue out at pop and cleaning some of the ear wax while he's about it. It starts with Jazz Butcher sings Hank Williams, continues with Jazz Butcher sings like a literary

kleptomaniac and ends very sweetly, but I'm not going to spoil the ending for you. The

IN THE heart of the Texan landscape, underneath the burning gaze of the midday sun, a previously insignificant snake twists and wriggles up to a sensual tree, heavy with the rich fruits of rock and roll. The snake swallows the fruits and 'Texas' is born, ripe with whining guitars that sing an

anthem to the barren deserts of the rejected heart.

The snake playing with his ego, masturbating his romantic soul and strumming with that devil called erotica is Nikki Sudden. Yes, the same one. Yet because Sudden is a ridiculous law unto himself he can still manage to dig into his own self-obsession to produce an album so gloriously selfindulgent that it surpasses parody and lands on the plateau of explicitly sensual extravagance. In 'Texas', Sudden has, through luck more than skill, enriched that embarrassing rock and roll heart of his by ambiguous steamy guitars that wallow, whine and yelp with the brooding possessiveness more commonly associated with The Gun Club's old holster.

'Texas' is stained with human rejection, obsession and seediness. It's a triumph of self-indulgence and shows that being continually one step out of time with current trends isn't necessarily such a bad thing.

When is a prat not a prat?

#### SEVERED HEADS 'The Big Bigot' (Ink INK 22)\*\*\*\*1/2

A HEAD sings. Shock schlock from the Aussies who know how to re-shape plastic, reroute noise gates and generally be a nuisance in the ear drum.

It was so easy then ... to be different, to be difficult, but now the oddballs have moved on and Severed Heads are showing the way. Noise manipulation, sonic variants and general degradation are the kind of electronic fanzine catch-all phrases that leave a lot to the imagination. But in there, somewhere, is the simple monosyllabic word which sums up the Heads' noble art.

Fa. Yes, Fa. You see, deafmen, if you have an imagination that's the size of a pea, Severed Heads will mean sweet FA to you. If you're one of the nouveau intelligentsia, though, then the word is, of course, Fa. . . b.

FELT 'Forever Breathes The Lonely Word' (Creation CRE LP 014)\*\*\*\*

FEARS FOR Lawrence's sanity are galloping these days, fuelled by his Chaplinesque public outbursts, his erratic live performances, these capricious records. During his last London stage appearance, seemingly blurred by something or other, Felt's main man could be heard intoning in complete darkness, "Turn those bloody lights off, everyone's looking at me."

In the midst of all this barminess, Felt have somehow made their most polished, most complete LP to date. Their second this year, it is thankfully removed from the ice-rink, fake Hammond organ tinkering of 'Let The Snakes Crinkle Themselves To Death', more like the featherlight touches of introspective pop they're best recalled for.

There's no 'My Face Is On Fire', no 'Penelope Tree', so none of their most photogenic three minutes. 'Forever. . .' is a long sulk, but Felt at their most stately, most wellproportioned. Lawrence's Lou Reed drawl drags itself across eight entrancing new flicks, with some typically absurd ti-

'All The People I Like Are Those That Are Dead' and 'Hours Of Darkness Have Changed My Mind' are particular favourites here. There's no 'Sunlight Bathed The Golden Glow' retreads, there's not too much of Lawrence's legendary self-pity, there's Felt on heat in an ironic kind of way. Unlike 'Ballad Of The Band', he doesn't seem ready to jack it all in, fed up with being ignored and broke. With 'Forever. . .', Lawrence seems to have unearthed some new melodies, some new thoughts, lifting his Felt from the slump that set in after the peak of 'Primitive Painters'.

Their new record might only interest those concerned with Lawrence's hate for sprouts or his naked confessions, but they've been a private club for years now, there's nothing new in that. 'Forever. . .' will never make converts to their weird and wired world, but it will delight the disciples.

GIANT SAND 'Ballad Of A Thin Line Man' (Zippo

Records ZONG 013)\*\* IN CASE the under 30s amongst us hadn't noticed, Giant Sand have derived the title of this, their second album, from a distortion of a Bob Dylan cut of much distinction and little quality. This is perhaps the most interesting thing about Giant Sand.

You might also find it interesting to note that they follow up a long winded alternative 'Freebird' (but with none of the bollocks) of a title track with a outstandingly flat and contrived rock through Dylan's 'All Along The Watchtower'. Truly, these men are inspired.

Led by Howe Gelb (no, honestly...), a man with a developed talent for flatulent souvenir postcard guitar solos and a heavily suppressed Lou Reed complex, Giant Sand reverberate loud with the hollow, echoing ring of empty self-importance.

There are three other mildly noteworthy things to be said about this album.

The first is that the best song on the record is a cover of Johnny Thunders' 'Can't Put Your Arms Around A Memory'. The second is that Giant Sand do an even worse version of this great song than even Thunders could manage on his last tour. And the third is that Giant Sand recorded most if not all of this live in just one night. At least they didn't waste valuable studio time.

RATT 'Dancing Undercover' (Atlantic 781 683-1)\*\*\*\* 'Ratt' (Atlantic 790 245-1)\*\*

'DANCING UNDERCOVER' picks up the threads left by 'Invasion' and sticks to the same sweetly succinct pattern. It could almost be a continuation of the '85 sessions, and I s'pose for the most part it is. They know what's been lining their pockets (the odd sock or two, eh Stephen?) and naturally they want some more. There's one sure way of getting it. .

Ratt's third (more of the mini-album later) is once again best savoured as a smouldering whole, a nonstop party animal that relies more upon overall rollercoaster momentum than on individual songs. Now, as ever, they're spitting out frazzled raunch in the grand, randy old style popularised by (I hate to have to bring this up, lads) Aerosmith, this time with more of a "swing, a casual backbeat".

The one shortcoming (barring the obvious) is the unfortunate habit they have of sounding hurried. Better than sounding sluggish, I know, but if only they'd let the songs build a little more rather than whittling everything down to under four minutes.

As it is, 'Dancing', like its forerunners, is still a touch too disposable. It's over too quickly and leaves only the barest trace of aftertaste.

It's good while it lasts, though, which is more than can be said for the minialbum, re-released here after three good years on indie label Music For Nations. Really, without Beau Hill on hand to cover it all in gold, Ratt sounded hopelessly clumsy and starstruck, and the inclusion of 'Walking The Dog' did tend to make their influences rather obvious.

They couldn't even get the cover right, bless 'em. Mice? Dear oh dear.

this. Then the inspirational passive pain of 'Someone' leaves you thinking the only reason you're not gasping is because The Temptations have done it, ie perfection, so many times before.

'More Love, Your Love' is the choice of the remaining romantic rosaries, all of which gurgle and blush with class, though the grooving numbers don't sparkle a twinkle. For once The Temps could've left out the fancy footwork and dived for the smooch.

But then it's the human condition to gamble wrong and then gamble wrong again. Oh look, I did a proper record review only last week. It was boring.

TOM ROBINSON 'Still Loving You' (Castaway

HAVING CHANCED upon a hit formula a couple of years back with 'War Baby' and 'Atmospherics (Listen To The Radio)' Tom has not surprisingly decided to burrow deeper into the same seam.

'Still Loving You' is essentially an album of love songs which you can classify as sophisticated singer/songwriter pop or AOR rubbish according to taste/age/class etc etc.

Tom casts his mind back over a selection of past affairs, reliving the pleasure and the pain in lyrical snapshots, most of which use Holland as the location.

He's careful not to get too specific about genders until he gets to the last track, 'The Wedding', where he sings "It isn't the bride that I wanna kiss".

If the music is calculated to soothe rather than grate on the airwaves, at least it does so with a direct simplicity that proves that you don't need American session musicians and 12 producers per track to get a clean commercial sound.

The only social issue on display is a raunchy anti-cocaine ditty called 'Nothing Like The Real Thing' that hits you with the insidious truth without bothering to preach. The album's other rock, 'This Little Romance', is an anti-love song, impatiently ending an affair.

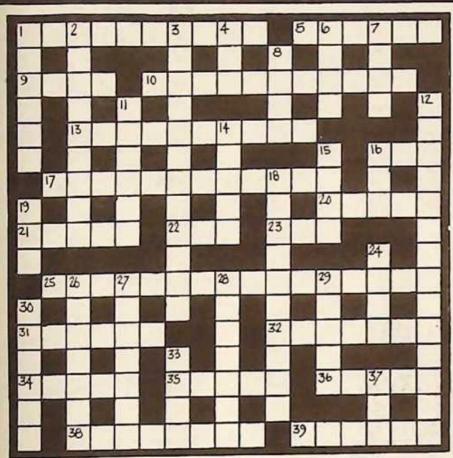
I like it, but then like Tom I'm getting older.

and pleasantly tidy bathroom, sitting on

"Bloody hell," I actually gasp, thrilled by the thought of you waiting outside, wondering what the hell I'm doing in here, using up all the bleedin' Supersoft.

Minutes later, I'm perched on one end of a sofa with Alice Cooper at the other. Can't take my eyes off him but he doesn't seem to mind. He's looking good, so much better than I'd expected: glossy jet-black hair, sleazy leather boots, a hint of stubble, and eyes that appear to sparkle as if in hot pursuit of a whole new kind of excitement.

It's the mouth that really gets me, though Even before the photographs, without a scrap of make-up, it's possible to see exactly where the charcoal lines and smudges are meant to go. Alice's face is actually built that way.

Adrenalin pumping, watching him talk, not really listening half the time. He has a mean face, I decide, the type of face that keeps a guy out of trouble. No way is he a disappointment.

Intriguingly, Alice's new single is the theme-song from the forthcoming gore-flick, Friday The 13th Part VI. 'He's Back — The Man Behind The Mask' is uncharacteristic of his current material in as much as it's a lightweight, synth-orientated pop number, although naturally enough the lyrics are well suited to the grisly film for which they were written.

A new album, 'Constrictor', is out this month and a UK tour is lined up for November. The shows are expected to be spectacular, very loud, very theatrical.

Produced by Sean Hill of Ratt infamy,
'Constrictor' is a brilliant heavy metal LP, but
that's about all. The old seediness is
nowhere to be found, while that brooding,
malicious undercurrent seems to have gone
forever.

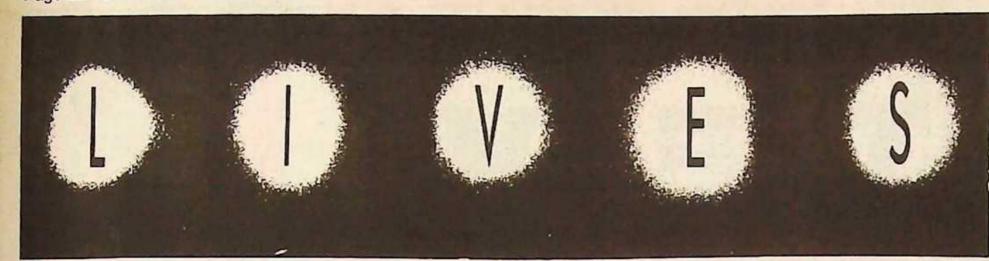
Nowadays, Cooper's compositions rarely insinuate badness; they clobber you over the head with it.

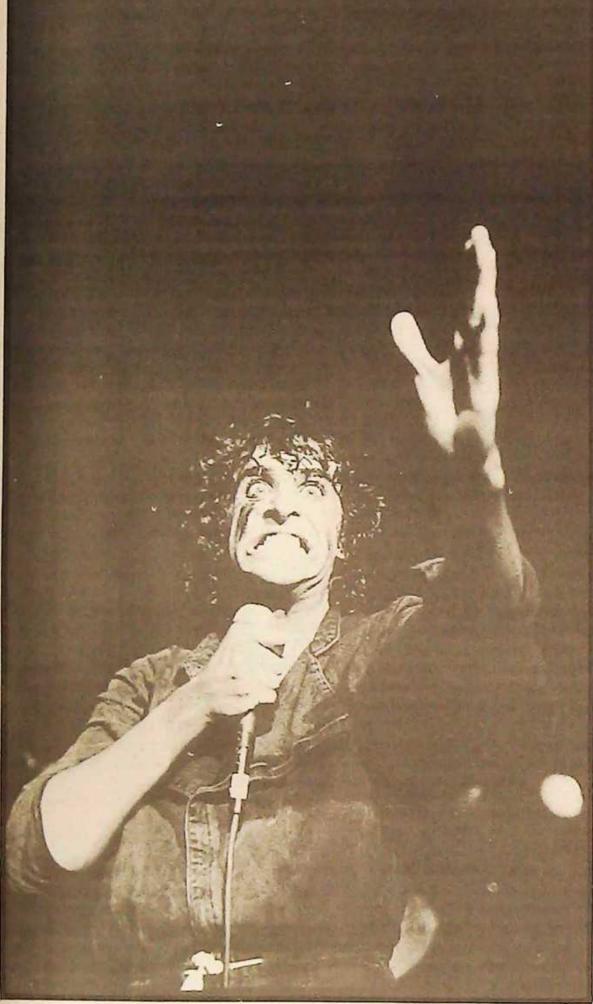
He reckons this is a great new approach, even to the extent of enlisting Randy Piper (ex-W.A.S.P.) on rhythm guitar for the tour.

#### KILLING JOKE Hammersmith Palais

NO MYSTICAL energy burning me up, no frenzy, no nothing. Killing Joke come on with a roar, play some new songs and a few old ones, then they go away and that's it.

They've always been a great source of frustration, what with all their claims of holding the key to people's minds, of having the ability to harness long forgotten powers, to whip up a pulse of terrifying potency... to what avail? One gorgeous Top Twenty smash in 'Love Like Blood' and now this so-so show at the Palais.

It's loud, it's flash, but after all the verbal it's just so ordinary: single in the shops — album on the way — let's hit the road! I've always been led to believe Killing Joke are above all this, far and away on some higher stratosphere.

Thing is, they come close at times to fulfilling their promise. When they glide into 'Love Like Blood' or crunch into 'The Wait', the juxtaposition of violence and beauty is completely stunning, almost but not quite supernatural.

Their music's designed to touch and motivate people on a cerebral level, mysteries are to be unravelled before our eyes and we're supposed to feel like Gods, but they never actually crack it.

If only they hadn't set themselves up as saviours-come-black magicians in the first place, then we'd be able to savour the group's rousing music without having to keep a check on our body functions, waiting for englightenment, keeping the faith.

Their current stab at wider acceptance, 'Adorations' – a pop disc of unsettling restraint – has its subtlety squashed like a tulip under a steam-roller at this oddly muted gathering.

In a live situation, Killing Joke can only triumph with the old stuff, the grinders ('Requiem', 'War Dance'), and even then the response isn't half as mad as it might be.

So you keep hoping, banking on their frequent flashes of brilliance being a pointer to something truly scarey. But for a group with plans as juicy as Joke's, tonight's show is close to pitiful. Just a rock 'n' roll band treading the rock 'n' roll path. Dead ordinary.

IN THE unmemorable moments after the pubs have closed and before a trio of cheek-tounged Boys a GoGo start transvesting and transiting between their cages, a woman brings a stuttering wodge of r 'n' b to a halt, teeters on her stilettos and screeches, "I waaannt ya to meeet ma baaand". It's a ridiculous noise that provides an almost perfect voice for this hoary platitude. It sounds like Chloe Webb playing Nancy Spungen doing an impersonation of Patti Smith. It sounds pretty sad.

If you wanted to be silly, you could say that this warped, grinding drawl contains all the pathos of its owner's life. Painted with an indelible wash of equal parts of fame and infamy, because she was once married to someone. Angle unashamedly plays this for all it's worth, but at the same time is desperate to prove her own intrinsic worth. The last

time I saw her on this self

deluding, self abusing search

for a studio flat and someone who'd call her an artist, she was wearing a nice hat and reading some naff poetry over some Mick Karn basslines. That was an unintentionally poignant artschool parody but tonight she's simply pitiful.

She crouches provocatively (well, she thought so), touches herself up and traverses the stage like a Zandra Rhodes waxwork on castors. Her band belt out their primary rock thrash and then she starts singing. Mercifully, her projection doesn't match that of her speaking voice and she goes unheard, largely unnoticed and completely untalented before retiring with a Parthian shot from the ludicrous larynx. I think it's OK being silly.

#### IQ Marquee

NEGATIVE AS it is to pigeonhole bands, sometimes they leave you no choice. IQ are progressive rock to the core, right down to the 'mature student' look and carefully plotted arrangements. #### THE BODINES Manchester

MICK RYAN has a haircut the quality of which cannot be described in 300 words. It is the Manchester haircut of the moment. So big, so symmetrical, so swooping. Dragging your attention away from his eyes (which have to be big), and focusing you on his lips.

It isn't long since I cast The Bodines aside for being timid, old style Cherry Red teds still biting and weeping into their 'Pillows And Prayers'. As the new pop rolls on, I'll take that back. It's becoming easier by the day to see just who is punchy and who is plain, who can pump quality pop on stage, and who can capture it in the studio. To witness those who want to stay small and credible in the gutter, and those who really are hungry enough to throw their songs into the whole shitbath of the outside world and let the talent do the talking. Talk like, We're The Bodines and we're f\*\*\*ing smart, can we come and meet your mother.

Not that any of that was said but just that it brings us onto M Ryan's voice, a voice that nags as well as entertains because it resembles someone else's. #### I,000 MEXICANS Fulham Greyhound

THE AVERAGE butterfly bears little resemblance to the average caterpillar – well, sod all really, let's face it – and in this instance (for the time being at least), the 1,000 Mexicans caterpillar seems the more attractive of the two forms; no Camberwell Beauties these, nearer to, say, High Brown fritillaries or even Dingy Skippers (I do my

research you know).

That said, the metamorphosis was an essential one, as by their very nature, the Mexicans of old had dug themselves into an indie trench that was leading them nowhere, sharpish;
Andrew, Michael and Julian got into a huddle and concocted a play for a whole new ball game, the world of stadium rock.

The idiosyncratic touches remain, although the endearing rough edges have been mercilessly culled. At heart they remain the musical equivalent of the '70s Dutch side with their total football, instruments being passed from one pair of hands to another, with the surrogate drummer tape deck being jettisoned in favour of the genuine article George, who

thankfully has far more musical talent-than he does hair.

On the plus side: the harmonies are as great as ever, they still tinker (successfully) with clever clogs rhythm sequences, and Andrew does have a magnificent voice. On the negative side, for a would-be smart-arsed, money-spinning enterprise the image and presentation is still a little slapdash. As a long-standing (about five feet eleven) Mexicans fan, the new-look, new-sound set requires more than 40 minutes' worth of acclimatisation. Evidently, after a few years trying, it's early days yet.

### THE BAMBI SLAM/THE DREAMS The Oval, Union Tavern

NO FRILLS. No fuss. Just one extended headlong dive into the wall of sound. From the moment the long lamented cry of "Onetwothreefour" set The Dreams into sequence, it was absolutely 20 minutes of non-stop, gol. buddy gol power. Without even enough time for the singer to catch his breath between songs, these four boys from Shoreditch tore down the walls of Beast's new Timebox 2 club.

Chewing gum, sneering and leering and flaunting the severest flat-tops since your dad took his hedge-trimmer to within a millimetre of your scalp, The Dreams play Phil Spector at 900 mph. Or The Ramones on speed. Or even a supercharged, tearaway, youth-eating speedball of guitar fired bubblegum energy. And they told me no one was interested in raw power guitar music anymore. Far from it kids, far from it. And to be perfectly honest, that was initially why I was here to see The Bambi Slam. But whereas The Dreams are idealy suited to the lack of technology currently available at this venue, the subtleties and depth of The Bambi Slam require at least a modicum of a decent PA.

What they could be is dangerous; going where the Mary Chain feared to tread and a hundred times more real. But not tonight. Instead, their infinite possibilities just deflated into a very ordinary, limp set. A stage presence to match their embryonic chiseled pop noise could have helped salvage some of the performance, but Christ, give 'em some time lad.

STEVIE RAY Vaughan could be the coolest guy in the universe. He has got to that point on the guitar where he doesn't really have to do anything, at least that's how it seems. He strokes it, caresses it, talks to it and urges it to do his will; and it never fails to come up with the goods.

The blues has never seen the popularity here that it enjoys in the States - the image of middle-aged blues bores banging away in crowded Saturday night pubs is too well dug in in many people's minds. So when some of the real stuff is going around, as the packed Palais testified, the chance should not be missed.

Stevie Ray Vaughan and Double Trouble, from Austin, Texas, were magical, groovy, on fire. The first two songs told it all, band, two instrumentals of stunning force, amps bleeding electricity while Stevie Ray, fancy shirt and feathered hat,

calmly switching between white noise and delicate finger-play.

The man spoke after a while, every word greeted with a mixture of cheers and plain old awe. A heavy, heavy run through Stevie Wonder's 'Superstitution' was oh-so-funky, the solo he played behind his back was ridiculous, breathtaking showmanship, the time he sat on the stage saw the front row thinking all their Christmasses had come at once.

Ultimately it's only romance, a man in perfect tune with his guitar, sweating under the lights, mouth silently moving to every crystal line of feedback that rips through the air. permanent band together at last, even if it does sound more like Ratt - or indeed W.A.S.P. - than the classic Buxton/Bruce/ Dunaway/Smith outfit of the early 70s (joint Greatest Ever Rock Group along with Purple, Zeppelin and the Pistols).

"Everybody in the band now has already been in a group that's played my songs," Alice tells me excitedly, his Detroit drawl both humbling and thunderous.

"I know I can play Alice now better than I ever did, and this band is going to be louder than any of the others I've had. So, I mean, I'm feeling really comfortable now, it all fits

Dumbstruck at finding myself suddenly

sharing a sofa with this man-come-God, I stumble and stammer something along the lines of: your new stuff, it's a lot more, sort of, heavy metal than before, isn't it?

Yeah!" he enthuses, thankfully missing the point entirely, "it's much more metal than it was, and to me that's great, although I think we're different from heavy metal in as much as we've taken that metal sound and made it Alice, and that's what makes it special."

It's true, I think to myself, you're so right, Alice, so wonderful...

"Almost every one of the albums has been hard rock, but I think until now, technically we've never been able to get the guitar sound I really wanted. If we were to have done 'Billion Dollar Babies' with this technique, with this kind of guitar, I'd have been much happier..."

(What are you saying? We're talking about the greatest guitar playing in history on that LP! Have you lost your mind?)

Good, smashing, terrific, the only thing is I can't help thinking, isn't 'Constrictor' a tiny bit less subtle than your older stuff?

"Yeah, right! It's a sledgehammer!" (He's missed the point again.) "I mean, there's nothing subtle about the album, except maybe lyrically, but that's about it."

What impressed me in the past, you see, Alice, was always the suggestion of something malevolent.

"Yeah, well the only thing 'Constrictor' lacks, if anything, is a Bob Ezrin influence on the production. But we're going to be doing enough of the older material onstage - in fact, 75 per cent of the show is going to be early stuff, because it is in demand, and the songs'll sound much harder than the originals, too!"

The currently peaking goth/glam burp of excitement has not gone unnoticed by Alice.

"Everybody's doing exactly what we did, and they're very successful at it," he smiles. "W.A.S.P., Ozzy, all those people, they've taken a little piece of Alice and they've incorporated it into their look, their performance, their attitude...'

(I want to grab him by the shoulders at this point and make him see sense; they don't understand, Alice, they're just scummy heathens, can't you see???)

Erm, I don't think they've taken the best

"I don't believe they could, I think the best bit about Alice was the fact that there is something about him that I know which they don't know. It's something I can't explain, but there's an attitude when I walk onstage as

Alice, and it's impossible to copy."

Is it something you truly can't explain or are you just not telling?

"Well, it's what the adrenalin does to my alter ego. When Alice goes onstage he knows he's only going to live there for 90 minutes, so he gets as much out of his life as possible within that space of time. He considers everybody out there to be a prop. y'know? He considers everything that he's doing to be theatrical. He never goes out there with the attitude of, Gee, I hope you like us tonight, he walks out and grabs and molests the audience, and then he throws them back. That's what makes it so intense."

could be designing a new car. You make mistakes, you have to go out and find where all the bugs are, and I might not get this whole Alice Cooper thing right until I'm 90 years old."

Back in '69, in the early days, were you proud of the reputation you had of being the worst band in LA? (Yes! Yes! Yes!)

"Well, at least we were the most at something," he laughs. "Uh, we really weren't the worst band, though, it's just that nobody understood what we were playing. We were doing music on 'Pretties For You' which was like Devo! We understood it, but the audience I can remember was very big on Buffalo Springfield. They were all into peace 'n' love, and I mean, if anything, we were like the stake in the heart of the love generation. We just came along and squelch! We killed

In retrospect, was the uproar you caused pretty much a fuss about nothing? (No! No! No!)

"Well, you see it affected a lot of people. Folks were just getting kind of used to the fact that the hippies had long hair but they were harmless. We suddenly came along with something that wasn't so harmless, and we weren't hippies, so what were we? They're mutants! Mutant hippies! They must

"It was such an attack on society that people simply didn't know what to think. We attacked everything that was sacred to the public. Just the fact that we existed, it affected the three things that people were most interested in: sex, death and money. We were involved in all of them."

Did the public believe you truly were a demon, a Satanic entity?

"Oh yeah, I'm sure some people thought that. A large number of religious folk assumed we had a lot to do with antireligion, but we never touched on the subject. The only time we did was when we touched on their money with 'Billion Dollar Babies', and on their sexuality with the long hair and all the make-up. That's the closest we got to attacking their religion or their politics.

"All we were saying was, it's more fun to do what we're doing than what the hippies are doing. I don't know any hippies who have fast cars, y'know?"

Did the hostile reaction amuse you? "Totally, even now it does, it totally amuses me."

Do you still have the capacity to outrage? (Of course you do!)

"The new show should be fairly... I mean, we'll be doing two or three things that nobody's ever seen before, especially the guillotine."

The guillotine's back!?!

"Oh sure, it's back with a vengeance. I mean, it used to be just the idea that we had this thing, but now it's actually technically frightening. The blade is like 40 pounds of steel..."

Gulp!

... And it's like more dangerous than it was before, and that's important for the audience to know. It's not just a cardboard blade that can't go wrong. I want them to know that there's every possibility that it could go wrong. That adds to the danger of

LICE COOPER, 38, watches splatter movies for his breakfast. "It's funny," he says, "I go into airports sometimes and people pull their kids away, like I'm going to do something unspeakable, and that's fine, it makes me feel great. They haven't forgotten."

Are you capable of wholesomeness? "Onstage? Never onstage, unless it's to set up something diabolical. Look at the name

Alice Cooper, it's a very wholesome name, and yet it strikes absolute terror into me." Sitting here talking with you Alice, I'm pleased to say you don't appear in the least

bit wholesome. (Good grief, you're wonderful!)

"Yeah, well, I don't feel it .. "

That's all. He shakes my hand and the rest of my life is suddenly without meaning. The End.

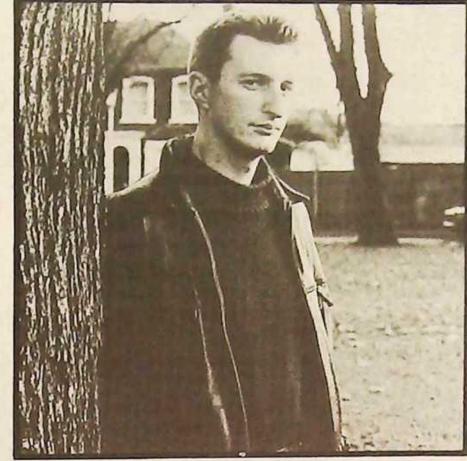

#### ROLAND S-10 DIGITAL SAMPLING KEYBOARD €999

QQ1/2 VV1/2

THEY'VE BEEN a long time coming, but as I write, some 100 S-10 samplers lie in Roland's warehouse in West London, awaiting the arrival of some 100 operation manuals before being dispatched towards the itchy fingers of Roland Main Dealers the length and breadth of the country.

Roland's reputation is based on producing good quality, reliable instruments sold at reasonable prices: such a company's entry into the world of sampling keyboards seems to validate the whole affair, and many, I'm sure, have been waiting for 'a Roland sampler' before even thinking about taking the plunge.

As you probably know, Roland have two sampling keyboards in the pipeline: the S-10 being smaller, cheaper, and less sophisticated than the S-50 which should be available soon.

Whereas the S-50 looks to occupy a territory loosely covered by the Akai S-900, E-Mu Emax and Sequential Prophet 2000, the S-10 is

somewhat out on its own. Priced in the vacant sub-£1,000 slot, the S-10 is a complete instrument with a 49-note velocity sensitive keyboard and built-in 2.8 inch Quick Disk drive. It has a relatively stingy maximum sample time of 4.4 seconds at 30kHz, but nonetheless is quite capable of being used for powerfully authentic piano sounds and the like, and is not, as I originally feared, simply best suited for

storing and playing effects. The deal is this: sounds are stored in four banks, ABCD. Each bank can hold a sample of 1.1 seconds. Courtesy of dedicated panel switches, these banks can be linked in a variety of combinations (A with B, all four together etc). So, depending upon your samples, one sound can be multi-sampled in truly playable fashion across the entire keyboard, or four separate sounds can be played in predetermined areas (bass in the bass, snare in the middle, effects at the top etc).

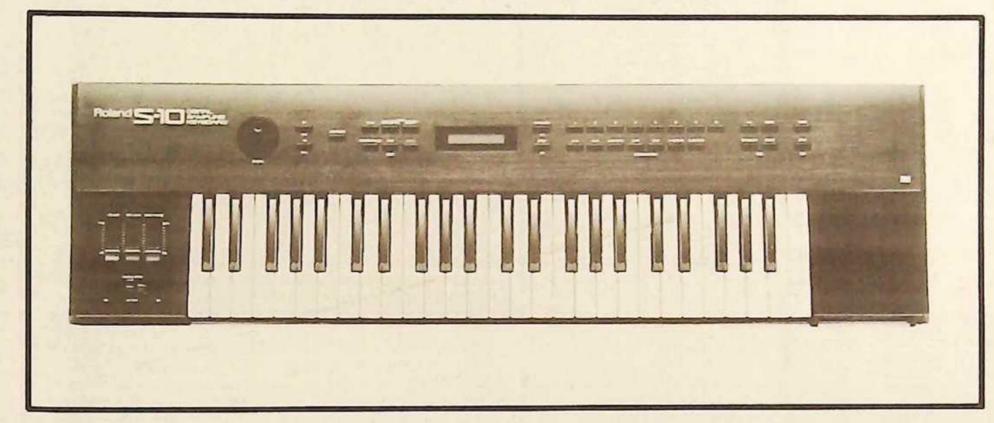
The system may seem fiddly at first (a multisampled piano requires the independent loading of both sides of two Quick Disks), but it is flexible. Before we get on to user sampling, a word about what Roland have to offer the casual/idle/nervous user who just wants to be able to play and manipulate a bunch of previously sampled sounds.

Along with the instrument you will get six pre-recorded disks. One pair of disks features a nicely gated bass drum and snare plus toms and hi-hat; another features a twangy bass guitar along with the ubiquitous orchestra hit, a trumpet, and some percussive effects, and the third, eerie male and female voices plus some (rather tinny I'm afraid) strings.

On loading a pair of disks, the S-10 will automatically position the sounds, though you can re-position them if necessary. If the eerie male and female voices take your

fancy and you'd like to have them playable over the entire keyboard, simply press A/B and there they'll be. You'll notice though that the male voices turn distinctly drunken as they plumb lower depths than originally sampled, in much the same way as the females become more hysterical (and younger!) as they hurtle into the stratosphere. This, of course if 'munchkinization' at work an inherent problem on instruments blessed with relatively small amounts of sample time.

In addition to these six disks, Roland will be producing their own (well. . . such is the nature of sampling that I doubt the company could resist a bit of piracy) sound library. These library disks will be made available to main Roland dealers, from whom they can be purchased at, or near, the price of the disks themselves (around £2 a throw). So far I've heard two pianos (one classical, one hard and rock 'n' roll), a harmonica (pretty good actually), plus brass and strings and all the others you'd expect.

The problem with pretty well all samplers is the time it takes to change sounds. This can take the form either of single disk load-up time such as the E-II's famous 17 seconds, or, as on less powerful models such as the S-10, the fact that you have to load several disks for access to complete sounds.

Needless to say, this will make using the instrument in live performance rather tricky. Although the S-10's load-up time is negligible, I would not relish the prospect of fiddling about with umpteen disks, nor dealing with the exceptionally springy disk eject mechanism which, on occasions, seems to have aspirations as a slipcatch practice machine (sometimes launching disks a full yard before you can field them) in front of an audience. But in the studio, or at home, the S-10 seems to perform admirably. And in the studio, or at home, you will also want to create your own samples, WON'T YOU?!

Although Roland have made user sampling fairly painless here, there is inevitably a certain amount of command and procedure learning to be done, both before and after a raw sample can be taken.

What did I sample? Well, me going "Ah" (God, is that the true timbre of my voice?), me playing acoustic guitar, the dog, various snatches off CD, you know, the usual stuff. Aside from the fact that it took me ages to figure out why nothing was happening (I had the record level slider on zero - well it is placed somewhat unobviously among the left hand performance controls), the basic sampling of sounds is simple.

You choose a bank, you select a starting pitch point, you select a sample rate (30kHz is standard though 15kHz can be used for longer, less accurate samples), you choose manual or automatic

triggering, you adjust your input level, you press start and make your sample. Then you wait. For quite some time, in fact, while the S-10 automatically searches (or rather serches, as the backlit screen spells it) for the ideal looping point. And it's pretty damn good too; where likely, almost totally glitch-free.

Sometimes though, you won't want a sound to be looped, in which case you simply press the relevant bank number, having made your sample, and the sound becomes playable automatically.

Tailoring your sample into the exact shape you want is also pretty painless. I'm not sure I understand how the distinction between them was made, but Roland offer two batches of sound manipulators under the headings Wave Parameter and Wave Modify. In Wave

Parameter (accessed in toto by push button, then individually by forward and reverse keys), you will find the tools for trimming samples (beginning/end), looping them forwards/ backwards/alternately, retuning them and fine tuning them, as well as controls governing vibrato, the pitch bender, keyboard sensitivity, and an Alpha Juno type wodge of envelope generator parameters.

In Wave Modify you can delete certain unwanted portions of a sample, mix samples in bank A with bank B etc, and gain access to the low and high pass filters. All modifications are made using the now famous Roland Alpha dial, and can be stored and remembered on a Quick Disk along with the samples themselves.

Certainly I had no trouble in looping off unnecessary

bits of sample, or ending up with the exact form of looping that I wanted, but I did find changing the placement of, say, four independent samples across the keyboard fairly labour intensive. Maybe the manual will simplify the procedures.

There are other goodies too: an arpeggiator, though with no Hold feature except when using a footpedal (and for some reason the arpeggiator boosts the volume considerably), and an embryonic DDL - embryonic in that you can only vary time and level.

The third goody really got me going. The sample input jack (used for a microphone in this case) doubles as an external trigger input. I discovered this on MIDI-ing the S-10 (using the multi drum disk) to a DX (on a bass sound) and was happily playing away as a complete rhythm section. I just brushed past the mike and the snare drum was triggered. Hmm. Very interesting. Finally I perfected the art of playing my 'complete rhythm section' for a while and then clicking my fingers at the precise moment when I wanted a couple of lone snare cracks. With no re-patching or setting up, you too can amaze your friends with this one. I haven't yet figured out how to trigger a precise note (and so a different sample or pitch), but I will!

There is much more to say about this instrument. But it will wait. The main thing is that it offers a reasonably high level of sophistication for little outlay - cash or energy wise.

It is not an instrument I'd recommend for prolonged or involved live use (any more than I would an Akai S612 for that matter), but as an instrument for bringing sampling to the masses, the S-10 can only be judged a success.





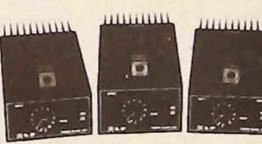

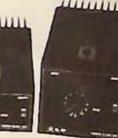

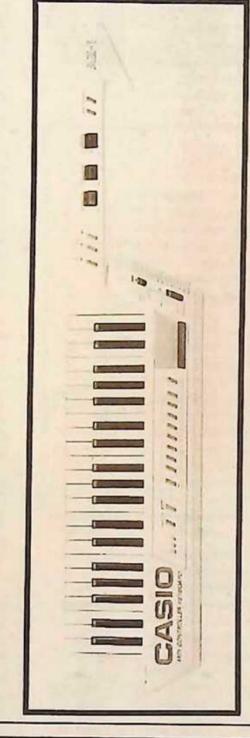
# CASIO IN CONTROL

#### CASIO AZ-I MIDI CONTROLLER KEYBOARD £349 QQ VV

I MUST admit I was amazed to learn that Casio were bringing out a remote, 'slingon' type keyboard. This is a path down which many companies more experienced than Casio have trod of late. Without exception all must surely regret it (a Yamaha KX5, to name but one, though a perfectly good instrument, can hardly be given away).

But there we are. Or rather here I am, looking at this sort of mix between the Korg and Yamaha remotes in basic style, and wondering, for the umpteenth time, why no one bothers with this type of keyboard. I hope Casio will forgive me if I nibble into what is primarily a review, in order to plead a case for the existence of such instruments by whomever manufactured!

The most obvious advantage they give is freedom to move but, hell, this type of controller is not expensive, so what? It looks good. Sling-on remotes are not ideal for two-handed playing, so choose songs when you're just bashing away on fairly simple chords, or playing a nice interlinking



riff, even a solo - wowl Secondly, such keyboards usually offer more (in the way of immediately available and

usably-optioned) controllers such as portamento switches, friendly mod wheels, and hold (sustain) buttons.

And thirdly, as often as not, these keyboards are velocity sensitive, whereas many low cost synths (DX21 et al), although capable of receiving such information, do not have velocity sensitive keyboards themselves. This then is a very cost-effective way of harnessing velocity sensitivity.

And so on to the AZ-1 itself. As mentioned, the shape of the instrument is quite familiar and pleasing enough, but the feel is a little too plasticky for my liking. The three and a bit octave keyboard is fine to play and the small display screen is angled, allowing you to read all the information clearly when standing up.

Above the keys is a row of small push buttons for accessing a full complement of 128 program change commands. Alongside these are two further push buttons - one definable (in other words you can program its job yourself) and the other being used to set up MIDI channel numbers. The AZ-1 can ready two MIDI channels, allowing you to switch between them instantly another highly useful feature to have up your sleeve in live performance, and one which in effect doubles your patch memory.

Moving over towards the neck, we first come to a definable slider and a three position octave switch. Personally I would set up the slider for volume, although

Casio have given this task to one of the definable wheels on the neck itself, in default mode. This illustrates the beauty of definable controllers. On the AZ-1, you can easily re-program the wheels and buttons to control parameters that suit your style of playing/hand size/ whatever. A regular synth will seldom permit such rejigging, though of course most dedicated, non sling-on remote keyboards do these days.

On the neck are five push buttons - three close to the keys (two definable and one for 'solo' - mono) and two way down at the end controlling portamento and sustain. Between them lie three wheels - two definable but set up initially for volume and modulation, and the third, immovably, for pitch bending. Since this is springloaded, it is unlikely you'd want to change it either.

The neck controls feel pretty comfortable, as indeed does the whole instrument once strapped on.

Well there's not much more to say, frankly. As a sling-on remote, the AZ-1 is a high quality example of the genre, feature wise, if just a little cheap in appearance. However, it seems quite robust (wouldn't you know the first thing I did was drop it? Sorry, Casio) and yet is light (3.8kg) and wieldy.

Roland's Axis - yet another splendid non-seller probably beats the AZ-1 for in-depth features, but it is fairly complex to set up. Casio have produced a sensible blend of flexibility and usability here. I just wish a few more people would even consider using one in the first place.

### **ELKA'S SERIOUS** SYNTH

#### **ELKA EK22 ANALOG** SYNTHESISER £999 QQ1/2 VV1/2

TRADITIONALLY, FOR the consumer, autumn is a quiet period of the year as far as looking at new instruments goes. By now, more or less all trade-shown goodies have made their first tentative steps into the shops and everyone can settle down safe in the knowledge that the choice you see in your local shop today will remain relatively unaltered until, say, March '87.

There are of course exceptions. And here is one of them.

I'm sure most people have heard of Elka. For years, they have made a very nice living thanks to home organs and accordians - breeds of instrument whose market even the most ardent of fans will tell you is dwindling, to say the least. Recognising the fact, Elka have decided to investigate the production of synthesisers and related hitech gear, and their first two items were previewed in prototype form at this year's BMF.

Of course, Elka's current involvement in synthesis is not entirely without precedent. Remember the Synthex? Launched in 1984, this good but rather unwieldy (and at the time overpriced) synth has, ironically, become

almost sought after, thanks to Elka's recent price slash.

And so to the EK22 - the analog model of Elka's pair of new EK synths. (Their EK44 Digital Synth, bearing no small resemblance to a DX7, will also be scrutinised in due course.)

The EK22 is a six voice synthesiser, possessing two digitally controlled oscillators per voice that can be manipulated by a healthy wodge of programming parameters, a six octave velocity sensitive keyboard, and a 32 channel programmable patch memory to complement the instrument's 64 presets. Some 16 'performance' settings (splits, tunings, patch combinations and the like) can be stored also, as can a sequence of patch programs, both of which make the EK22 quite an attractive proposition for those primarily interested in live performance.

A favourite Italianism (used extensively and irritatingly by SIEL - not a good omen, all things considered) is this business of having to press an Enter button every time you select a preset or editing parameter, making the operating of the EK22 just a touch laborious.

Still, on power up, it won't take you long to figure out what's going on, using, as you must, the ten digit keypad to 'ready' a patch and then the Enter button to gain access to it. This is a doubleedged sword, since on selecting your patch number, the central LCD screen only displays the patch number, not its name. The name (verifying your correct choice perhaps?) only appears once Enter has been pressed. The

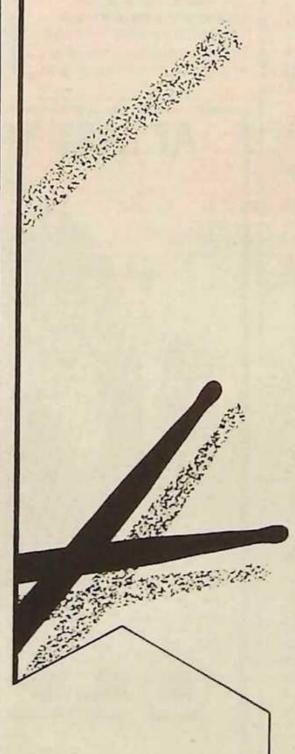

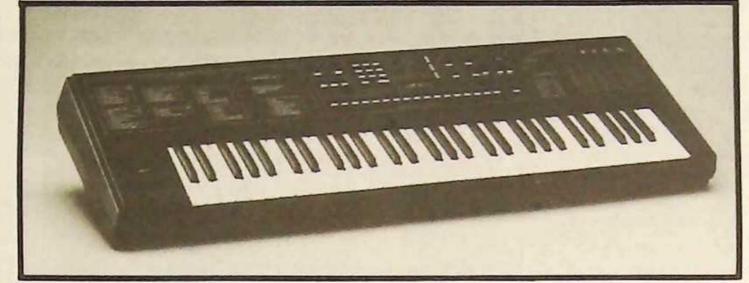

good side, though, is that a previously selected patch will continue to sound until Enter is pressed, thus making swift, one-off changes possible at lightning speed.

Elka have provided you with 64 presets. You cannot overwrite them, but modifications can be stored in any of the additional 32 channels of programmable memory.

The presets cover a wide if standard range: pianos, brass, strings, percussion, and a nice smattering of effects with colourful names like Wave Aura and Softens. With two oscillators per voice on hand, the sounds are mainly full and substantial, all the more so when the (two position) chorus is applied. In normal mode, the sounds are simply playable right across the keyboard with six note polyphony. Courtesy of a seven-stage velocity sensitivity parameter, you can adjust the amount of keyboard dynamics for each sound, and although this may not be sufficient for the most



rigorous of programmers, the EK22 nonetheless feels and sounds responsive and lively as a result.

You'll notice almost immediately there are other playing possibilities since the LCD always displays two sets of patch names and numbers. The upper half displays the main, polyphonic patch, while the lower corresponds to a possible - monophonic addition. The range of sounds available to this mono section are identical except for their monophony, and their ability to be positioned

over any designated section of the keyboard starting from the bass, either in an independent 'split', or layered on top of your (now fivenote-polyphonic) main patch.

The EK22 has a very full bag of programming parameters. On the oscillator front, each oscillator can combine two waveshapes that (gradually as opposed to distinctly) cover a range from square to thin pulse, and sawtooth to triangle to pulse triangle respectively. You can balance the relative volumes of the oscillators, adjust their pitches over a four octave range, hard sync them, cross modulate them, and send each on, independently, to either of the two envelope generators.

Each envelope generator comprises some six stages, including the breakpoint and second decay, as well as key follow and velocity sensitivity control, and can be used to shape either oscillator or the VCF.

No instrument would be complete without some anomalies though, and the EK22 indeed sports one or

two. The first, minor one, concerns parameter values, some of which are confusingly offered (00 = slow attack; 99 = full attack etc), and the second, more importantly, concerns Elka's Second Touch feature. I do presume that by Second Touch, they mean After Touch (if not, apologies!), in which case the range of settings here could only possibly suit a gorilla. At either end of the spectrum I had to press the keys so hard that I practically dislocated my back trying to produce vibrato or filter cutoff movement. It works - finally but I think some adjustment is needed here.

As I mentioned earlier, one of the instrument's most useful features is the performance memory or Performance Registration as Elka call it. Some 16 push buttons placed handily just above the keys operate their recall, and in them you may store 'performance' data such as patch combinations, split points, and certain pieces of MIDI information.

In MiDI terms, you can select different MIDI channels for each half of a split, and specify whether or not certain data such as Second Touch, the wheel controller (pitch bend/LFO modulation), pedal volume, keyboard velocity, and system exclusive, are to be transmitted or received. Handy too is the MIDI On Off button - a dedicated switch on the panel itself.

Finally, the EK22's memory can be increased courtesy of optional ROM or RAM cartridges, housing 64 patches in each.

On balance, I like the EK22. It offers programmability in an encouraging fashion and backs this up with a generous number of presets, pre-programmed sounds and 'additional sounds' cartridge option, as well as providing many useful features.

So while it would be dumb to underestimate the problems Elka may face in convincing us that a synth bearing their name should be taken seriously, I think the EK22 does have a future.

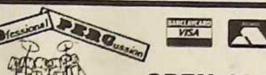

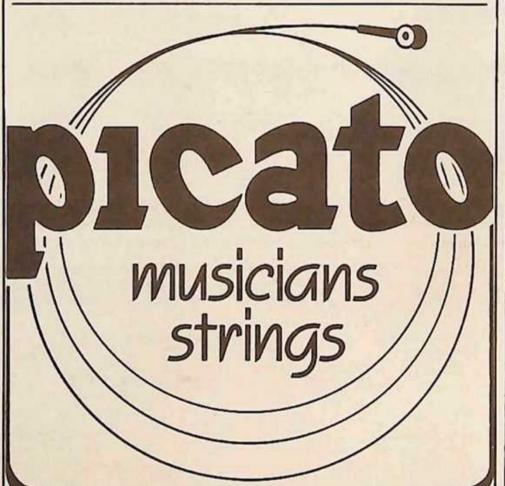

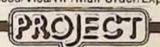
