The deal was sealed after Alice saw Zodiac's show with Motorhead. Zodiac says it is "an ambition fulfilled".

This would appear to scotch rumours, circulating last week, that The Love Reaction had "fired" Zodiac. Manager David Balfe told Sounds this week that all differences with the volatile and exuberant Zodiac had been made up and "the hatchet has been buried". He did not specify in whom.

THE HUMAN LEAGUE have confirmed their first British dates for five years, following the release of their 'Crash' album and 'Human'

They start with a series of stand-up venues at Crawley Leisure Centre November 26,

Loughborough University 27, Carlisle Sands 30, Glasgow Barrowlands December 1, Leeds University 2, Norwich East Anglia University 3, Margate Winter Gardens 4. All tickets are £5.

After Christmas, they'll be feeling brave enough to take on seated audiences at Birmingham Odean January 7, Poole Arts Centre 8, Cardiff St Davids Hall 9, St Austell Coliseum 10, London Hammersmith Odeon 12-13, Newcastle City Hall 15, Liverpool Royal Court 16, Manchester Apollo 17, Nottingham Royal Centre 18, Sheffield City Hall 19.

Tickets for these dates are £6.50 and £5.50 (£7 and £6 at Hammersmith).

ERIC CLAPTON plays three British gigs at the start of next year, following the release of his next album, 'August'.

With a band consisting of bassist Nathan East and keyboard player Greg Phillinganes - both of whom played with Eric on his summer tour - and former Average White Band drummer Steve Ferrone taking over from Phil Collins, he'll be playing Manchester Apollo January 3 and London's Royal Albert Hall 6 and 7.

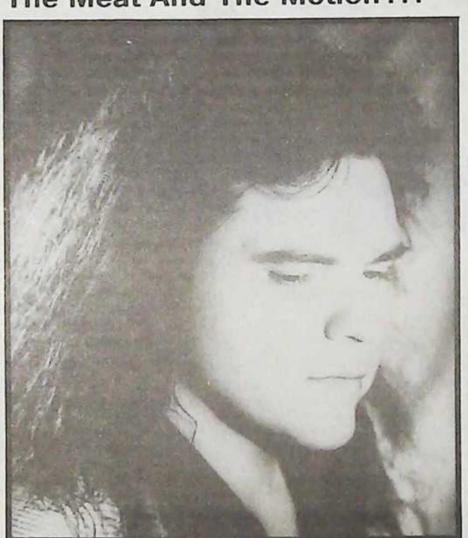
Manchester tickets are £10 and £8 and London tickets are £12.50, £10.50 and £8.50.

Support band will be The Big Town Playboys, the Birmingham R&B combo, who've been specially invited by Eric.

BEKI BONDAGE goes "On The Prowl" this week at the start of a lengthy tour that runs into December.

She and her Bombshells, who backed her on her summer tour, will be "playing loud music, wearing loud clothes and being loud mouths" at Dudley JB's October 24, Manchester Owens Park University 25, Bradford University 27, London Shepherds Bush Wellington 29, Oxford Polytechnic 30, Canterbury Christchurch College 31, London Marquee November 1, Keele University 5, Wolverhampton Polytechnic 7, Coventry Polytechnic 8, Colchester Works 13, Walthamstow Royal Standard 14, Warrington Lion 15, Rochdale Tiffany's 20, Twickenham St Mary's College 21, Telford Barons Club 27, Harlesden Mean Fiddler December 3, Finsbury Park Sir George Robey 4. More dates will be added.

But there's no new single planned until next February.

New Model Army and Joolz hurt in incident

**NEW MODEL ARMY** are considering taking out a private prosecution against Edinburgh Coasters after two members of the band and poet Joolz were hospitalised following a post-gig fracas last week.

The trouble started when a fan was forcibly ejected from the gig for "jumping on people" or "filling a plastic glass with water from an ice bucket" - depending on which side is

**Exclusive!** Crass reveal their plans for a final single and explain last two years of inactivity

CRASS release their last "formal" recording this month - a 12-inch single called '10 Notes On A Summer's Day' (available via the Cartel)

The track was written in the summer of 1984 - soon after they'd played what has proved to be their last gig together at a benefit for the South Wales miners - and recorded during 1985

The band say they will "continue to make statements both individually and as a group, yet no longer feel obliged to be limited by the inward looking format of the 'band'."

Despite the fact that Crass have been virtually inactive as a band for the past two years. the line-up remains intact apart from the departure of guitarist Hari Nana shortly after their final gig.

They are now involved in developing their individual skills from film making to healing. although several of them

worked together on an album called 'Acts Of Love' containing 50 poems in a lyrical setting, which came out on Crass Records last year.

And earlier this year, they released a double album of their singles dating back to 1977, called 'Best Before 1984

They will continue to release records by other bands on Crass Records - the most recent being Irish group Hit Parade - and plan to become

involved in book publishing. For the full Crass lowdown, see feature on page 29.

## CHRISTMAS SPIRIT

The good Doctor takes a short trip around the country dispensing Christmas cheer

DR & THE MEDICS have announced their Christmas house calls.

The band will round off a year that has seen them hit Number One with 'Spirit In The Sky'

and achieve another Top 30 hit with 'Burn', playing gigs at Newcastle Riverside December 18, Glasgow Queen Margaret Union 19, Doncaster Gaumont 20, London Hammersmith Palais 23, Folkestone Leas Cliffe Hall 27, Birmingham Powerhouse 28, Bristol Studio 29.

They've just finished recording a new single which will be out to coincide with the dates. And they'll be doing a little private practice in Japan before the British gigs.

MADNESS release their farewell single on October 27 called '(Waiting For) The Ghost Train', which also marks the brief return of Mike Barson, who is tinkling the ivories for the first time since 'One Better Day'.

The song was written by Suggs and the 12-inch features 'Seven Year Scratch', containing many of Madness' finer moments mixed by DJ Noel Watson.

Suggs, Karl, Chrissie Boy and Lee are reported to be getting another band together which they promise will not be Madness Mark II.

ROBERT CALVERT, who teamed up with Maximum Effect for his London concert at the beginning of this month, has extended the partnership for a British tour starting this week.

Maximum Effect were previously Inner City Unit until they split from Nik Turner and joined up with Calvert, making an interesting new sub-plot in the long running Hawkwind soap

They'll be playing Sheffield University October 22, Manchester International 25, Brighton The Richmond 30, Newcastle Riverside November 2, Carlisle Stars And Stripes 3, Liverpool University 4, Leicester Princess Charlotte 6, Coventry General Wolfe 7, London Hammersmith Clarendon 14.

ANIMAL NIGHTLIFE return from Europe to play their first London dates in over a year at Ronnie Scott's on October 26 and November 2. They have a single due out in January.

BRILLIANT, who've only just released their 'Kiss The Lips Of Life' debut album on WEA, are in dispute with their record company, who've been granted a court injunction preventing the band from recording for any other company.

The band originally signed a one-year contract with WEA in June 1984 but this has been extended by two years.

At the end of a two-day hearing, Mr Justice Garland said that the contract between the band and the record company was a complex one "and the contentions of both sides could not be brushed aside as unlikely to succeed at a full trial".

He therefore granted a temporary injunction to WEA, but stressed it was a case for a speedy trial.

Unfortunately, the trial will take at least six months to come to court and there's some doubt as to whether Brilliant have the financial resources to stay together that long.

BOBBY McFERRIN, the one-man vocal jazz band, arrives for a London concert at The Royalty Theatre on October 29 as part of a European tour.

The innovative singer, who uses his voice for bass, rhythms and melodies, anything he can hit for percussion and the audience as backing vocals, released an album on Blue Note earlier this year called 'Spontaneous Inventions'.

Although raised in jazz, McFerrin draws on classical, pop and soul as well as street sounds and animal noises and has branched out from clubs to perform in theatres and opera houses around the world.

Tickets for The Royalty Theatre concert are £7.50 and £6.50.

DAVID THOMAS plays a rare show at London University Union on October 30, accompanied by The Accordian Club and supported by Wolfgang Press and American band Live Skull.

But the fact is that Joolz, Slade, drummer Rob and

soundman Danny landed up in hospital afterwards, Joolz with a knee injury and badly scratched breasts, Slade with a scratched neck and concussion, Rob with concussion and Danny with a broken nose.

The police were called but took no action, despite being asked by the band to arrest everyone for affray. The band were particularly incensed that two bouncers who had apparently been instantly dismissed following the original ejection were present at the final showdown.

MORRISSEY was dragged off stage during The Smiths' concert at Newport Centre last Sunday. Although he wasn't seriously hurt, the show was curtailed, which provoked a riot.

The band were 40 minutes into their set when Morrissey was pulled off stage by a bunch of "unfriendly" fans. He fell on to the floor and received a black eye.

He was quickly pulled clear and taken back to the dressing room. Although he was stunned after the fall, he wanted to finish the show but was advised against it.

Sound engineer Grant Showbiz was hit by a bottle and had to go for stitches.

Morrissey was due to have a medical check-up at press time but it was expected that the rest of the tour would continue as scheduled.

## BACKTRACKS

THE KOOBAS, an obscure Merseybeat band who were known for most of their career as The Kubas, have their only album retrieved from the darkest recesses of EMI's vaults by Bam-Caruso (through Making Waves), who've rechristened it 'Barricades'. Recorded just before they split in 1969, the album reveals a psychedelic flair that could have turned them into underground cult heroes if they'd hung around.

'THE MAGIC TOUCH' and 'Midnight Movers' are the two latest titles in Kent's Northern Soul series. Melba Moore's previously unissued 'The Magic Touch' heads a collection of '60s material on Gusto and Brunswick from Maxine Brown, The Shirelles, Chuck Jackson and Gene Chandler. 'Midnight Movers' plunders the Liberty catalogue for the same period, bringing us Billy Preston and The O'Jays.

THE MONKEES, three quarters of whom have just played a successful reunion tour of America without Mike Nesmith, have their original goodies wrapped up with three newly recorded songs on an album called 'Then And Now' on Arista. All the obvious hits are included, but others like 'Alternate Title' and 'DW Washburn' are missed out in favour of some early B-sides. And the new songs have some of the spirit but none of the magic.

JEAN CARNE, who started her singing career in jazz, and has returned there in recent years, adding an "e" to her name in the process, has her "lost" soul years between 1975 and 1982 collected on a double album by Streetlife, called simply 'Jean Carne'. The tracks come from her four Philadelphia International albums (which weren't released over here) and her 'Trust Me' Motown album from 1982.

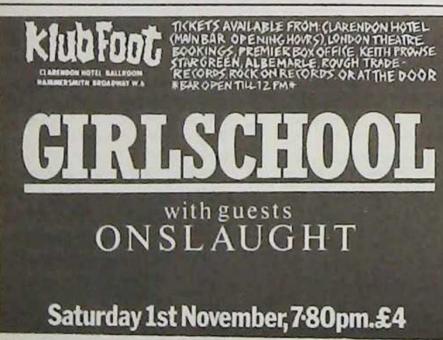
'MOTOWN TRACKING' is a 15-track compilation from DJ Ralph Tee of "genuine soul" tracks which trace Motown's stylistic changes over the past 15 years. It goes beyond the hits, and mixes star names such as Marvin Gaye, The Miracles and Eddie Kendricks with GC Cameron, Ozone, Jean Carne and Dennis Edwards.

Motown are also reissuing two more of their back-catalogue albums at mid-price – Marvin Gaye And Tammi Terrell's 'Easy' from 1969 (their third together after 'The Onion Song' and 'Good Lovin' Ain't Easy To Come By'), and 'Diana Ross Greatest Hits' from 1972, which was released less than three years after she'd left The Supremes.

(Instant Video) FOLLOWING THE eccentricities of this Brighton multi-visual co-op is entertaining to say the least Their first foray into the flickering world of video-music collisions, Auto-Edit, reaped reasonable praise, and Suck seems set to follow suit.

MADONNA IS dead. Now perhaps you'll believe me.

Rarely in the history of popular film can there have been a leading couple so devoid of nerve or telepathy. The only time they're in any danger of sparking is the one (adolescent) bed scene, after which Mrs Penn switches from prim detached missionary to tearful passionate woman-in-love.

Actually, she changes her mind about what character she's playing from minute to minute, but by the halfway stage you're either giggling or snoring and accept this as part of the bad

Sean, for his "part", acts macho as follows: crass dress sense, chewing with nothing in his mouth, dry fatalist asides, throwing a ball in a straight line. What really grates is his inability to be implicit. If this man is so cool, how come he needs to say "I don't mind" when she says "Sorry"? And why does he need to hold up a fluorescent placard reading "I am delivering an enigmatic line here" when he says "You're never lonely with a pair of silk stockings"?

The two stumble around the streets of Shanghai in 1937 in pursuit of opium. Richard Griffiths plays a twit. He's a natural. 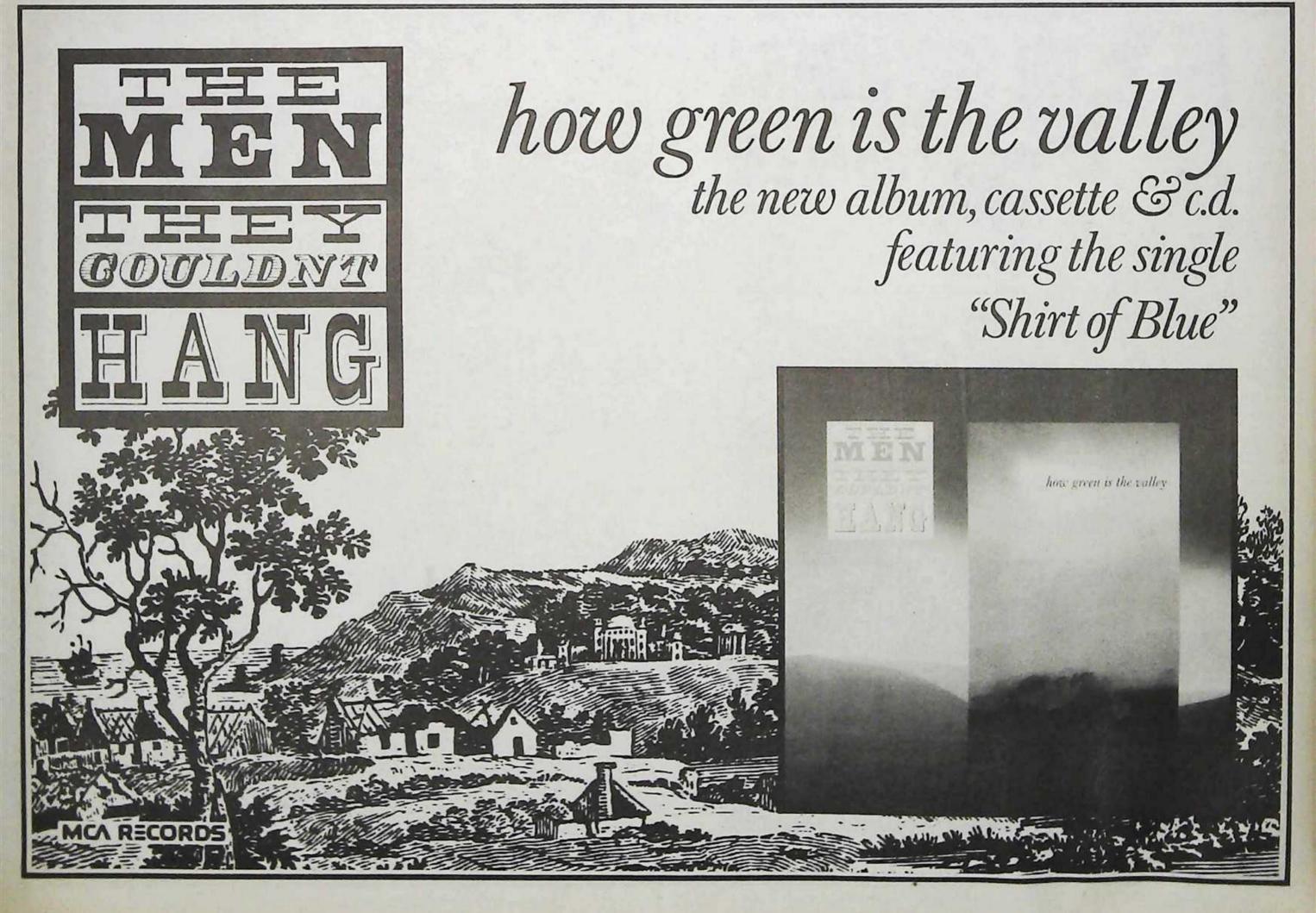
HERE'S A revolution going on in the world of comic art and literature, with Frank Miller right there at the forefront.

· Everything's been turned on its head: Superman's a government agent, Batman's a bastard, Robin's a girl and the Joker's twisting his own neck 'til it snaps, just for the crack.

This is all a bit disconcerting, almost unpleasant in fact, and that's exactly why it's taken off with such a loud bang. Folks are having their cuddlesome memories flung back at them with gleeful contempt, and they're loving every moment.

It's as if comics have been all Bash! Biff! Boff! with zero social awareness for too long, it's like the adults (but not the grown-ups) have snatched their mags back off the kids, upgrading them with thinly-veiled political comment and parodies, turning them into a fresh and totally credible literary form for the '80s. A form to be reckoned with.

Until now, these changes have remained unnoticed outside of comic book circles, but two new stories in particular, Alan Moore and Dave Gibbons' Watchmen - a mesmerising vision of cynical superheroes and big city squalor - along with Frank Miller's The Dark Knight, are at last bringing the

form to the attention of a potentially limitless audience.

The Miller tale is perhaps the most jarring of the two, in that it portrays familiar characters in less than glamorous, often unsavoury and frequently violent situations.

In The Dark Knight, Bruce Wayne is an embittered man in his 50s, haunted by a world torn asunder by crime but at the same time unable to hit back, having been retired now from his Batman duties for a full decade.

Of course, he finally gives way under pressure, dusts off the old costume and sets about cleansing the streets of Gotham City, wreaking havoc and scaring the pants off the authorities.

In a flash, Wayne's vigilante character is a wanted man, and having wiped out God knows how many police officers in his bid to avoid capture, The Batman finally faces the establishment's most fearsome weapon - a sell out/turncoat Superman.

Only occasionally is it funny, and even then the jokes are sick, verging on vile; in fact, it's all something of a nightmare dark, brutal and sad.

Frank Miller, dreamer of this dark dream, a gentle 29-year-old from Los Angeles, sits toying with his long but tastefully styled hair, and muses on the past.

"The interesting thing is that if you dig back to before the Second Word War, to the first Batman and Superman stories, you'll find the most fascinating material, and an outlaw vigilante Batman - who is a very frightening character - plus a Superman who's the epitome of the populist folk hero.

"Back then, Superman wasn't the Republican he's since become - he's The Common Man, the real common man's power manifested in one guy

Most people think he emerged out of the war, but he was born straight out of the depression.

"During the war he became reinterpreted as a patriotic symbol of a very warlike America. Before then he would fly into a scene - actually he only jumped, he didn't fly quite so well then and he'd drag generals of opposing armies to the front of a battlefield so they'd have to face the bullets; he'd even defend workers against corrupt employers. He was a rebel, and so was Batman."

A goldmine of information, is Frank. He talks about comics with the same earnest devotion others reserve for train-spotting or football, and yet he's not in the least bit ashamed of his passion.

How long, then, has it been socially acceptable for adults to be seen reading comics?

"Since about five and a half minutes ago," he smiles, like I've just mentioned something truly wonderful. "I really think it's just starting to happen, and it's kinda strange. We're going through a really good time, an exciting time."

There must still be those who'd rather be seen dead than be caught whipping out a DC or a Marvel comic in public.

"That's true here, clearly, and also in America, but it doesn't seem to be the case in Europe and I know it's not in Japan. They sell more comics there than in the rest of the world combined, and they consider them as just another story form, like novels or movies.

"They've gone absolutely berserk over comics in Japan; there are comics for little kids, for adults, and I mean there are even fishing comics! I couldn't believe it, I was actually flipping through 200 pages of somebody catching a big

"It's unfortunate that comics did to themselves what they did in America," he continues, "because they really castrated themselves for a long time. They said, We're nothing but kid's stuff, please don't notice us, sorry we're even here, y'know? But recently that's changed, for a whole buncha reasons. A lot of it's to do with the publishers finally realising they can make money off the stuff that's worth publishing."

When you've completed a comic, do you come away elated?

"No, I come away exhausted, depressed, and sick to death of it . . ." he laughs reassuringly. "But it's really good to see that people like The Dark Knight book in particular, and in a year or two, I'm gonna be able to sit back and enjoy it myself, but right now I'm too wrapped up in the whole thing."

With the first two instalments of The Dark Knight already out of print and parts three and four becoming increasingly hard to obtain, collectors are having to fork out unearthly sums of money to get hold of Miller's highly esteemed and desirably packaged creations.

Which is something he disapproves of as much as the suggestion that his vision of the future is apocalyptic.

"I think The Dark Knight is very hopeful. It's a pretty lousy world we live in, and I think that has to be addressed. I think we're in terrible shape, but I do have very good thoughts about our species and a lot of hope for it. But it'd be crazy to start saying, No problem, there'll never be a nuclear war, we're all gonna be fine . . .

"The one word that's been bandied around since Ronald Reagan got elected is Defeatism. Defeatism is now slapped on to any statement that isn't rosy, so if you say that people are starving to death somewhere, it's considered defeatist even if it's true.

"Rather than take the Reaganite approach, I really think it's better for people to realise just how awful things are, and take it from there."

All four instalments of The Dark Knight are due to reappear in a single package early next year, the American version of which should be available on import within the next couple of months.

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Brother number one, has found a bigger pool to splash about in. Will success be the ruin or the making of him? PAUL ELLIOTT tries to imagine his favourite blues buster on Top Of The Pops. PETER ANDERSON shutters to think.

TEVIE RAY Vaughan can't be 'The coolest guy in the universe', not with Robert Cray around.

It's all a question of attitude.

The grease-fingered Vaughan, in spite of his great records and still greater talent, slings out more guitar solos in his live show than all but the most blues-hardened palates can digest. He appears to have forgotten all about simplicity, subtlety and economy.

Conversely, Georgia-born Cray has been quoted thus: "Anybody who takes a 20 minute guitar solo should be shot."

It's not hard to work out where the fun's likely to be, is it?

Cray is the easiest of people to get on with.

Jet-lagged and with a couple of lunch-time pints in him, he's relaxed with a ready, infectious sub-Eddie Murphy chuckle. In fact, he's as open and unpretentious as his music.

We meet in the London offices of Phonogram, to whom he recently signed following the twoalbum deal with Brentford indie label Demon, when his reputation in this country was first established. No longer on a roster with the likes of Johnny Copeland and Clarence 'Gatemouth' Brown, the amiable Cray is now in the company of Dire Straits, Tears For Fears and Bon Jovi.

There's no two ways about it: the whole deal is bound to look like a cash-minded career move. What else *could* it be?

His first album for Phonogram is 'Strong Persuader', full of simple, brassy swing and cool blues inflexions. It's been rather obviously labelled as a bow to commercialism – right down to the use of horns. Robert?

"Well, we've had horns on every album we've put out," he justifies.

Using them in a stronger way has been something that you've longed to do, right?

"Yeah. We got the Memphis Horns on this record, and that's always been a big dream of mine. They were in LA when we were recording, and we thought, Let's get 'em. It turned out to be a lot of fun."

Doesn't a horn section make your sound less intimate though?

"No, not really. I've always dug horns, and I think for this record they were used in the right places."

Clearly, you're at a crossroads in your career,

HERE WAS a band who rose from the ashes of punk rock who were steeped in traditional ideas, rich in sincerity and loaded with passion.

They conveyed their energy to other people as well, managing to motivate and mould those who shared the same frustrated bitterness into a collective family that would pull together and fight against the tide of urban sterility.

I thought it was because you've been saying the same things for two and half years, more than anything else.

Slade: "I think every writer has his theme, and I suppose I do have an obsession with law and order. At what point do people leave it to the police and where do they begin to take over themselves?"

That's very dodgy territory.
Slade: "Yes, it's very dodgy
territory and I think I'm the only
person prepared to tackle it. Y'see at
some point people have to take
responsibility."

Rob: "The way you look at it is, you treat everybody the way you'd like to be treated yourself. It just applies to everything. I mean, if your brother or sister was being pushed drugs you'd want to kill the bastard pushing them drugs, wouldn't you?"

HERE WAS a band who managed to avoid the obvious traps of rebel rock music.

Their sound was strident and powerful. It was filled with determination, sincerity and

having just signed to a major label. Have you felt any pressure to write more commercially, or is that just the way it's turned out?

"No, we were picked up by the record company for what we do; which might seem strange, but that's how they wanted us, and that's the only reason we went along with it.

"I mean, we started by playing covers, anything from Elmore James to James Brown, so this is a natural progression for us, a combination of all that stuff. The Cray Band really hasn't changed from those early days."

NOTHER THING that hasn't changed is the slant of your lyrics – people still suffering at the hands of a "no good woman", or vice versa.

What surprises me is that despite having virtually disowned the throwaway 'So Many Women, So Little Time' from the 'Bad Influence' LP, you've now included a line on 'Strong Persuader' which describes a woman as "just another notch on my guitar".

Why lay yourself open to more criticism?

"Well, I'm always worried that I'm gonna get in trouble with feminists," he laughs. "But I don't mean to cause any trouble with people like that. I wanna be able to say what I feel in a song. And I think with that new song, and the line 'just another notch...', if you just take it for what it is people understand it. 'Cos she hung out with me and that's what happened."

Isn't there anything apart from your love life that inspires you?

"Just women," he smiles. "That's part of the, uh, blues and rhythm 'n' blues tradition, I guess. That's where I get my inspiration from – women."

Do you see yourself as part of the great American blues tradition, then?

"Y'know, I really don't think of it that way. We do a combination of R&B and blues. I just like to think of it as Cray Band music."

You've been hailed in the past as "the future of the blues" ... is that still in your mind when you come to write and record?

"No, not at all. I don't like to think of it; that's too much pressure."

Do you think you've been able to win over the old, stubborn hardcore blues audience, or has your support come form a younger, more mainstream rock source?

"I think our audience response is coming from younger people right now. We might've lost a lot of the blues purists but, for me, I say it's time for people to open up their ears. If you listen to just one kind of music you're cheating yourself

"There was a time when nobody could tell me that there was anything better than the blues; which was a crazy attitude to have, 'cos before that I was listening to Ray Charles, Miles Davis, Jimi Hendrix and Eric Clapton."

It must be satisfying, having admired Clapton's playing for years, to have him covering one of your songs, 'Bad Influence', on his new LP.

"I tell ya, that put a big smile on my face."

OW DO videos figure in your plans? Can you do without them or are you happy to do them?

"There's been talk about the Cray Band doing videos, and I think the only way that we could possibly come off doing one would be to have a video of us playing live.

"I mean, a lot of the tunes we do tell real good stories, but in a video it would seem so contrived. The stories are so laid out that you really don't need a video to tell what's happening.

"You don't need to see me walking up an alley on the song 'Porch Light', 'cos the song already tells you that. The picture's already painted on the album."

If a single took off soon and you were offered a slot to mime on *Top Of The Pops* would you

"Go on Top Of The Pops and mime? Sure I would, yeah. I want people to see the Cray Band."

Doesn't that contradict the blues ethic of being a live form of music?

"Well, no. If we're on a programme just to do one or two songs, I don't see nothin' wrong with that. I'm sure that anybody else, given the opportunity, would think about it."

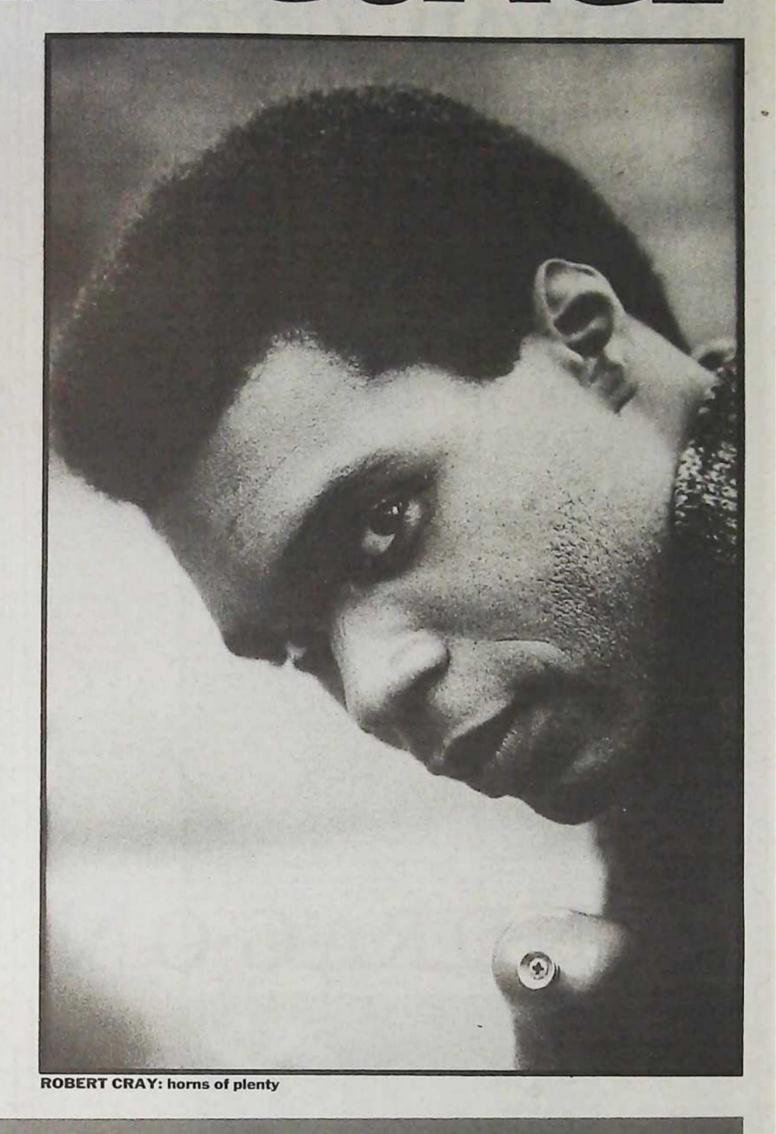
RANTED, HIS music is hardly a shock to the system, yet Cray still has the guts to stick his neck out and take the initiative.

And if the lazy blues reactionaries can't handle it, so what?

And, working on the notion that all publicity is good publicity, he's even taken a second film role (to add to his *Animal House* appearance) in the forthcoming Taylor Hackford flick, *Chuck Berry: Hail Hail Rock 'N' Roll.* 

Cray is more likely than any of his contemporaries to take blues to the masses simply because he refuses to stick his head into purist sands. It'll take more than unsalted traditionalism to haul the blues back out from the sweat 'n' grime of the clubs and on to a wider public stage.

Thank God somebody's realised.

resilience. Blazing guitars would fight every battle, each lyric would echo each small-town prejudice and it would always be warm with hope and optimism.

Now there is only a band so predictable that they've become mundane and tedious.

Why have you become so repetitive and uninteresting?

"What do you think repeats itself?" Slade barks.

Well... The way you persistently attack the usual working-class stereotypes, how you remain pessimistically bleak, and the way

you moan and moan but do little to suggest any positive solutions. All you do is build a wall of negativity that you and a few of your self-righteous disciples can bang their heads against. Not only is it very daft but it is also annoying and pathetic.

Silence. Pause. And more silence.
Slade: "I suppose it's not music as escapism, which I suppose is one of the functions of music. Escapism is wrong. I call us a folk group. We give you the news. What's happening this week and what's happening next week."

Tell me, why do you act like you know so much but give so few answers?

Slade denies this. "There's a solution in 'The Hunt'. Kick the f\*\*\* out of bastard drug pushers. There's an answer to the drug problem."

Wonderful.

On the surface Slade's arguments sound so solid. Treat everybody like you'd be treated yourself and beat the f\*\*\* out of those who stray from being good into being bad. There's no grey area. The common question of survival never comes into it. But what happens when it's your brother

who is the drug pusher, your son who is the pimp and your daughter who resorts to prostitution to feed two hungry kids? Do you still beat the f\*\*\* out of them?

What gives you the divine right to make judgement? No one has that right.

Slade, annoyed? "Why? I can say what I want. What gives you the divine right to print a slag-off of New Model Army in Sounds?"

You don't solve anything beating up people who stray from your wonderfully maintained, pompous morality.

Slade: "You do actually. You'd be surprised what you solve."

I change the subject Banging my head against a brick wall isn't one of my favourite pastimes.

Have you ever taken drugs?

Slade: "Yeah, I've taken speed and acid but never heroin. We've never taken speed before we've gone on stage. I think people who take a lot of drugs are boring and useless, and those who take hard drugs end up

You don't seem to have much faith in humanity, Slade.

"Oh, I do. There are pockets of resistance all over the country."

HE WORST aspect of New Model Army is that they make me feel guilty for being weak and ignorant. The sad fact is that, like the punk bands they followed, they are too prepared to cater to their audience's demands and have refused to try and stretch them further. All music must provoke, and when it stops provoking and becomes another closeted institution running alongside an even larger, denser institution, it's as useless and redundant as the mentality it set out to replace.

Why have you allowed New Model Army to become another boring old rock band?

Rob: "You are entitled to your opinion. We don't feel like that. You can't change for change's sake. We are what we are. You can take it or piss-off, basically."

I'm just leaving.

There was a band once ... but all there is now is New Model Army.

NEW 7" AND 12" SINGLE

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The Hawkwind holes, plugged

FEEDBACK TO the UK Hawkwind discography which we ran recently was, as I anticipated, hefty, and eliminated virtually every gap and query which remained.

One of the acknowledged experts on the band, Brian Tawn of Hawkwind Feedback (29, Cordon Street, Wisbech, Cambs PE13 2LW) sent me a detailed set of comments and additions on each of the three weekly segments as they appeared, so I'll start by reproducing these, as Brian has covered virtually every angle. Obviously, a lot of his info overlaps with what other readers have also sent in - I'll namecheck all the other guys (and lady) before the end of the feature.

Firstly, Brian's comments on the singles listing:

"There are a couple of 7-inch singles missing, the equivalents of 12-inch releases which you did list:

"Flicknife 7 FLEP 104 'Night Of The Hawks'/'Green Finned Demon' (pic sleeve) Jan 1984

"Flicknife FLS 032 'Needle Gun'/'Arioch' (pic sleeve) Nov 1985

"Also, the original 7-inch release of 'Silver Machine' in 1972 had a pic sleeve, which you didn't indicate, while the follow-up 'Urban Guerilla' didn't! (except on overseas issues).

"The RCA version of 'Silver Machine' in August 1982 had a picture disc, but it was a 7-inch, and not 12-inch as shown. The most recent issues of 'Silver Machine', on Samurai in May of this year, had 'Magnum' on the flipside of the 7-inch disc, and the additional track 'Angels Of Death' on the 12-incher. Both of these were in pic sleeves, but were not picture discs. Just to add confusion, though, there

was a shaped pic disc of 'Silver Machine'/'Magnum' which incorporated the 7-inch pressing of the single into a larger (approx 12-inch) shaped piece of vinyl.

"The various reissues of 'Silver Machine'/'Seven By Seven' on United Artists used two slightly different mixes of 'Silver Machine', while 'Seven By Seven' was a studio version on some pressings (including the 1972 original), and a live version lifted from 'Space Ritual' on others. The combinations used were various - too many to be worth

"Moving on to the album part of the discography, the original 'Doremi Fasol Latido' and 'Space Ritual' albums in 1972 and 1973 both had special printed inner sleeves, as did 'Quark, Strangeness And Charm' on Charisma. The UA album 'Hall Of The Mountain Grill' has subsequently been issued for a third time at midprice as Fame FA 41 31331.

"The Charisma album 'Hawklords - 25 Years On' had a printed sleeve, which you didn't mention, but not a booklet. Sometimes the tour booklet (a small black and white one) is now sold with the album as part of it, but this was not a genuine part of the original release.

"On compact discs, the one which you mentioned, 'Chronicle Of The Black Sword', is in fact the second Hawkwind album to appear on CD. It was beaten by 'Anthology Vol 1' on Samural CD 038, which was released in June.

"A couple of recent items weren't mentioned. 'Hawkfan 12' (Hawkfan HWFB 2), also released in June this year, is a compilation album which includes some Hawkwind material not available on vinyl elsewhere. Other acts on it include Michael Moorcock and Underground Zero, while the package also includes a poster, insert sheet, sticker, and printed carrier bag! There is also the Samurai 'Anthology' box set, to which you do refer. This is a September 1986 mail order

release (via me), which will also eventually be available in the shops, either late this year or early next. The box does indeed also contain a history/ discography booklet. "Two which don't strictly fit into your discography because it's of UK releases, but which

are probably worth mentioning because they have come into the country as imports, and you'll certainly have people telling you about them, are 'Hawkwind' (Victoria VLP 38, from 1983), and 'Welcome To The Future' (Mausoleum SKULL 83103, from 1985). The first was a Spanish double album which compiled assorted Flicknife Hawkwind tracks. while the second was merely a European issue of the Dojo album 'Live '70/'73', though it has become widely available

"Finally, some additions to the part of the discography which covered spin-offs and individual members, starting with Robert Calvert. He had two further singles:

"Wake Up Records WUR 5 'Cricket Star' (one-sided green picture flexi-disc) 1979

"Flicknife FLS 204 'Lord Of The Hornets'/'The Greenfly And The Rose' 1980

"He has also had another album released this year. 'Test-Tube Conceived', on Deml Monde DMLP 1010, Not released, however, was the Flicknife reissue of 'Lucky Leif And The Longships' - this was considered, but it never happened. The only Calvert album reissued was a US revival of 'Captain Lockheed And The Starfighters' on the Import label (IMP 1011).

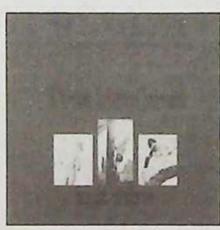

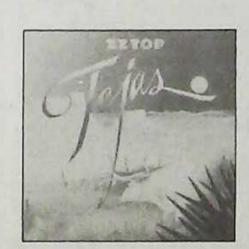

virtue of its quirkiness, its frantic rock chant aura, John Fogerty's wired voice and the wonderful "Huh!" noise that punctuates the whole affair, this song makes Single Of The Week number two.

If you don't know, John Fogerty was the main man behind Creedence Clearwater Revival during '68-'71. No, they don't mean anything to me either. I was still getting beaten up in the primary school playground at the time, but perhaps you have to be around for as long as that to come up with something as diverse as 'Eye Of The Zombie'.

As solid as a Hammerhead shark, as tight as a maniac's grip and generally pretty strange all over. Inspired, for sure.

#### THE SOUND ASLEEP 'I'm Cold Outside' (Vinyl

Solution) The debut vinyl release from this Brighton band, a record that has to be considered Single Of The Week number three. Intricate but hard, a warm blanket of a melody is constructed with the weirdest of twists and turns. 'I'm Cold Outside' can be fragile when you least expect it, and yet runs out on waves of scorched solos.

It's shaky, certainly, but it's charming and addictive and brilliant too. Play it ten, 20, 30 times and it always gets better. Buy it and restore your faith.

#### THE VERY THINGS 'This Is

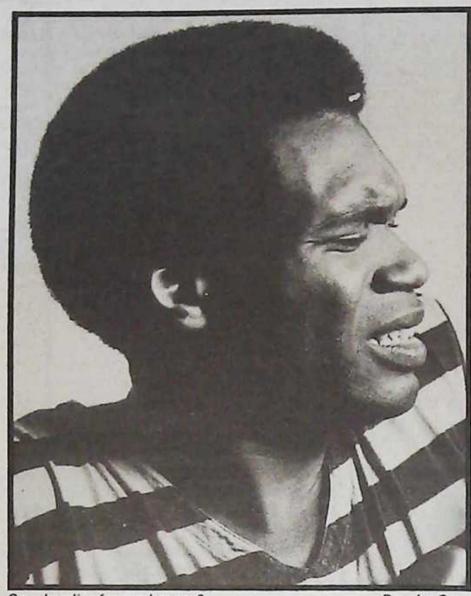
Motortown' (DCL) "Don't step off the pavement. . . this is MOOOOTERTOWN!" I've always liked the theory that all the best songs are about cars or trains, and this just proves it. I hope The Very Things have read JG Ballard's Crash or Atrocity Exhibition because 'This Is Motortown' is the perfect cousin to those visions of chrome, concrete. and glass.

Anyone who saw the band's film for their song, 'The Bushes Scream While My Daddy Prunes', can realise the potential. Nighttime, screeching tyres, a black Sedan, all coming over on the whiplash back-beat and tetchy guitars, into top gear in no time at all. "Won't you hop inside my car?"

#### RUN-DMC 'King Of Rock'

(Fourth & Broadway) More big-bollocked beat-box mayhem from the New York bruisers. Not as accessible as 'Walk This Way', and without the added rock 'n' roll dirt of Aerosmith, 'King Of Rock' is still untouched by anybody when it comes to this sort of noise. The constant MC bragging is beginning to grate, but anyone who can sing "Won't stop rockin' till I retire" gets my vote.

KRAFTWERK 'Musique Non Stop' (EMI) I'm sure I can hear a synthesised voice intoning 'boring' all the way through this. Thanks for the hint, but I'd have got there in the end. A lesson in self-

#### THE ROBERT CRAY BAND 'I Guess I Showed Her' (Mercury) Tell me where the blues is happening, and I'll be there. Sucker for it, you see, always will be. And the attraction is, it keeps breaking new ground, like The Robert Cray Band. 'I Guess I Showed Her' is funky and spunky, one big supersmooth groove of milk and honey.

Cray, like Stevie Ray Vaughan, is proving that the time is right for a new breed of bluesmen. Another ten years, and there won't be any blues 'legends' left. Cray is laying the foundations for his own legendary lifetime and this song, from his forthcoming album, should set the seal.

Cray doesn't show off, he economises in a tightly knit framework and makes every tiny curve and bend of the strings

Of course, there's R&B and soul in there too; who does play straight down-the-line blues anymore? Needless to say the lessons of Muddy Waters, Howlin' Wolf, Buddy Guy and Albert Collins have been absorbed way back and this is the result, a walkin', talkin' shining example of a band with a definite idea of what's going down.

Cause a real revolution, and make this number one.

#### THE FUZZTONES 'Bad News Travels Fast' (ABC)

So-so fuzzy rock, not quite the burst of teenage sex and outrage that the cover promises it will be. Their first release in the UK since last year's 'Lysergic Emanations' LP, and it seems the leathery, be-denimed naughty, druggy sexy world of The Fuzztones is a whole lot more convincing live.

#### **ANDY WHITE 'Reality** Row/Rembrandt Hat'

(Decca) Crystal-clear folk from the man who always seems to be on Whistle Test. People's hero? Anarchopolitical poet? Songwriters are really very rare, I mean real songwriters, and the man with the accent broader than the Irish Sea should be encouraged at all times.

#### JERMAINE STEWART 'Jody' (10 Records) Far superior to the nauseating 'We Don't Have To Take Our Clothes Off (But It Helps)', which means it won't do as well no doubt. What else is there to say about a super glossy commerical dancefloor international best-seller? He has an amazing chin.

#### **BMX BANDITS 'The Cat** From Outer Space' (53rd

& 3rd) Can't see it myself. This is a discordant burble, a childish exercise in being odd. Supposedly part of a new something, 'The Cat. . .' fades out on a scream of wild feedback, as if the whole song's been exciting. Features two live tracks, one of which sounds like Chas 'N' Dave with a Yamaha organ. Quite abysmal.

#### THE NEON JUDGEMENT 'Awful Day' (Play It Again

Sam) Grandiose, glorious, doom, doom and more doom, pile it on chaps. Only to be listened to in a seedy Berlin nightclub. The voice comes straight from the Andrew Eldritch Deep Throat method, while the drums and synths thunder and moan. I think The Neon Judgement want to put their tongues in your cheeks.

#### SMILEY CULTURE 'Mr Kidnapper' (Polydor)

Motormouth makes the evil kiddy kidnapper the subject of this little number, which reads more like a public information film than a rap. Standard amusing wordiness and nondescript reggae.

#### BRUCE HORNSBY AND THE RANGE 'Every Little

Kiss' (RCA) Sophisticated and smooth, this runs and glides along without a care in the world, upful but very mellooow. It's very classy, and I don't really like it, but that's not the point is it?

#### JANET JACKSON 'Control'

(A&M) I begin to have a sneaking admiration for Janet after the rumour sneaked out that the rest of the clan were not happy with her hardheaded, un-Christian attitude towards love and romance, ie 'Nasty' and 'What Have You Done For Me Lately'. This isn't as electric as those two. but the video's good. And you'll be happy to know she is now repenting her sins, and will appear on our screens on Christmas Day.

parody, 'Musique Non Stop' is so minimalist that the grooves are almost empty. Conviction, or Art, some might call it. I call it taking the p. . .

LONE JUSTICE 'Shelter' (Geffen) Just the right side of slush-rock to be convincing, the phased and lazy 'Shelter' flows along gracefully under Maria McKee's candle-lit crooning. Slight country undertones save it from sinking into a unromantic sludge, like The Pretenders taking on Dolly Parton.

#### **DURAN DURAN**

'Notorious' (EMI) Admit it boys, making records is no longer a major part of your lives, or even necessary. Propelled by the weakest of funk licks, 'Notorious' is a horrible little item, crawling pathetically along like a dog with its back legs shot away. Duran Duran don't care anymore: Duran Duran don't matter anymore. That they bothered to make another record astounds me. But here they are, as much a part of our lives as 3-2-1- or The Sun or Jimmy Tarbuck. Useless. Witness the death of a slug, people.

#### LOUDNESS 'Let It Go'

(Atlantic) Now, while the idea of a Japanese HM band seems to be a constant source of amusement to many (well, they're so cultured and genteel, the Japanese. I mean, heavy meta?), this is actually a better effort than many of their UK counterparts. Their credibility could have done with a better boost than the recent support slot with kings of Mickey Mouse metal, Saxon, but 'Let It Go' could equal Bon Jovi's chart success with a wing and a prayer.

#### **VARIOUS ARTISTS** 'Profane 9' (Rouska) A 10-

inch EP boasting four bands, four reasons to part with your money. Son Of Sam offer up 'God Save The King', a David

Byrne gone electro rap, the straightest thing here.

Heads On Sticks show off with 'A Place To Wait', rolling reverb with lightning forks of feedback and clouds of activity buffeting each other in the background.

WMTID score with 'Nine Years', a terrific, fully-tuned engine rollercoasting along, crushing all in its path. Vicious percussion, rampant six-string long shots and bone-crushing force leave you hanging. What was that?

Dustdevils go for more stylish banging around in the rock arena with 'False Dawn', which isn't to deny them their verve and charm. You really ought to buy this record.

#### ST CHÉ 'Be My . . . ' (Siren)

This record came supplied with three Durex, which immediately puts a rather sordid slant on what is supposed to be a savage love song. An inoffensive (unfortunately) slinky funk thing, 'Be My. . .' never really gets it up and is only saved from sinking into a lustless mire by a horny bass line.

#### THE LARKS 'All Or Nothing Girl' (Exaltation)

Ridiculously bouncy chunk of brassy pop, produced by Vic Maile who also produced Motorhead, who couldn't be further from this little ditty. Three and a half minutes of chaotic, cuddly capers, it's all a bit of a bash and a laugh for one and a half plays and then it gets very tiring, like a friendly drunk at a party telling you you've got to get up and dance or you won't enjoy it.

#### **COLIN NEWMAN 'Feigned** Hearing' (Crammed Discs)

A drone of keyboard squiggles from the former Wire man, eccentrically interesting but ultimately a piece of nothingness, a whiff of whimsy.

#### PETER GABRIEL AND KATE BUSH 'Don't Give Up' (Virgin) Possibly the

least vital moment from Gabriel's 'So' album, a warm

dollop of syrup that sees Gabriel playing despair while Bush represents hope. 'Don't Give Up' could easily be a Phil Collins sorrow-drowning exercise, but at least it's sung by two of the best voices in the universe.

Buy for the special mix of 'In Your Eyes' (also from 'So'), which is very beautiful and completely and utterly superb, or 'This Is The Picture', where Laurie Anderson gets a look in.

#### MAGNUM 'Midnight (You Won't Be Sleeping)'

(Polydor) Stirring but stolid medium-paced anthem, with some gritty sax and a driving beat balancing the scales against some real bland-out lyrics, all lovers and tears and being with each other all night. The person meets person subject has been covered in better ways.

#### PRINCE 'Anotherloverholenyohead' (Paisley

Park) Jeez, did you see what he did with his microphone on that TV show the other night? Watching Prince, erm, perform is probably the best sex education you'll ever get. None of these silly diagrams of how rabbits do it, oh no, the man is the business when it comes to unsubtlety. 'Anotherloverholenyohead' (crazy title, crazy guy) will make you gyrate with muscles you never knew you had.

#### MY BLOODY VALENTINE 'The New Record By My Bloody Valentine'

(Kaleidoscope) Goody, some noisy sods. When they play live My Bloody Valentine headbang, but no one ever takes the mickey, because with them it's seen as hip. Anyway, not their fault. 'The New Record . . ' is four songs of distinctive crashing and trashing, white noise bolstering an almost ridiculously pleasant vocal. On this week's page of big bank balances, 'We're So Beautiful' rubs against a pleasure point desperate for satisfaction.

#### THE UNDERNEATH 'The Imp Of The Perverse' (el)

Completely potty. Bunch of Ioonies. Actually, The Underneath is mostly Karl Blake of Shock Headed Peters, who's always had a healthy obsession with Black Sabbath. On the B-side we get a kind of Sabs on 45, with wacko versions of 'NIB' and 'Paranoid', while the A-side features a nutty stomp called 'Fire' and an insane 'Have I The Right?'. This record is strangely admirable. Makes Madness look like librarians.

#### BOB GELDOF 'This Is The World Calling' (Mercury)

Oh Bob, big-hearted Bobby G. Where are you headed, my son? Actually this is not quite the slice of sickly awfulness I thought it might well be, but add on a chorus of 50 voices and it could well be another Band Aid single. Geldof can out-Bowie Bowie in the vocal department when he feels like it, and. . . you know, I'm listening to it for the fifth time and it's getting better. Very slowly.

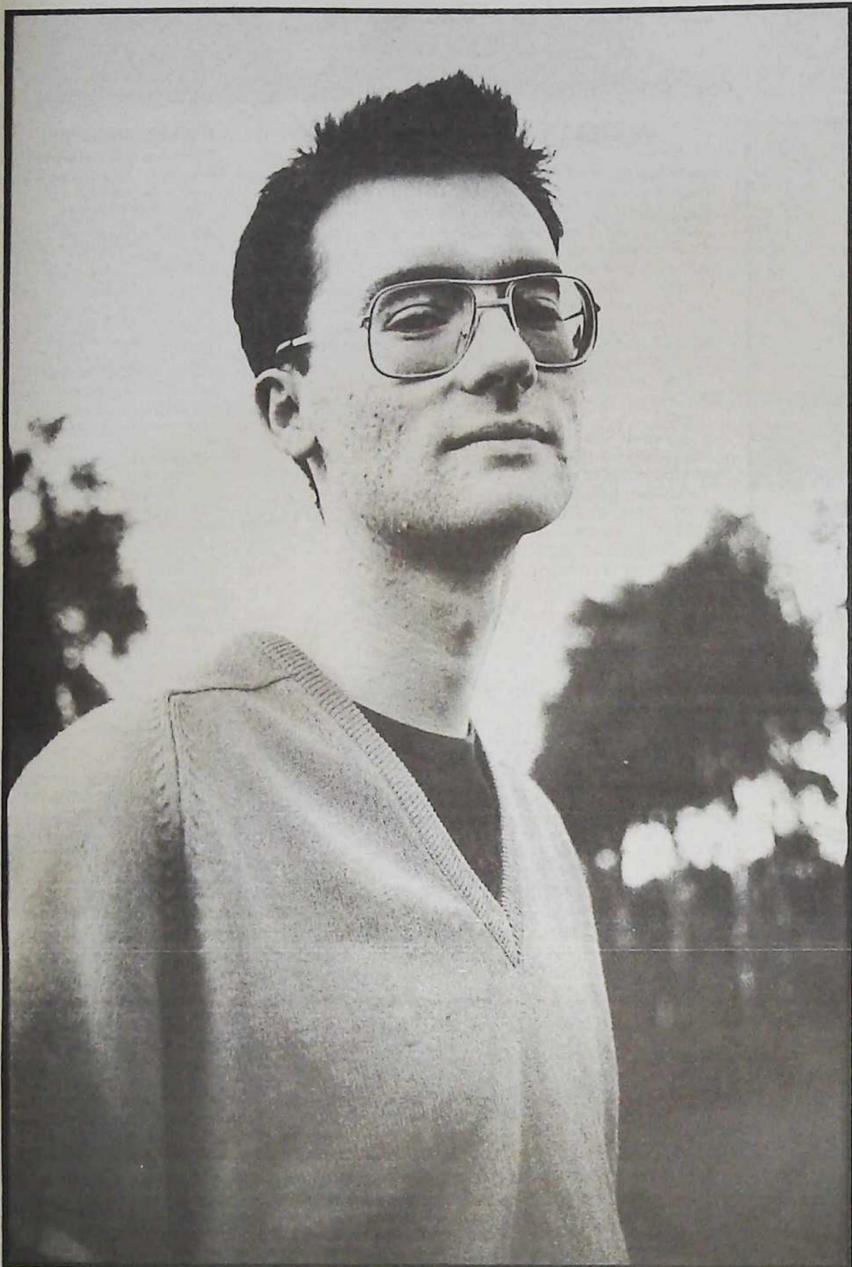

WISE ACRE John: the pimple life

More than two speeds and more tunes than many of their rivals . . . THE WISE ACRES have found a fresh plot to work on and are currently digging up all manner of musical treasures. **JACK BARRON** looks over their shoulder, turns on his lie detector and asks them to confess. EYE AND **EYE** takes a pasture postcard

"One day and it could be tomorrow/My time will come before I'm even cold." – 'One Day'

"HAT WILL happen?"
muses John White,
the tallest man I've
met all week. "Well, one day I'll
die and so will you.

"That song is just concerning how anonymous we all are ultimately.

"I don't see The Wise Acres as a way of fighting against anonymity. We deal with the politics, with a small p, of living. I don't see the band as a statement. It isn't a shot at fame in order to see our faces plastered all over front covers. That's not the point. The point is just to write and play the best we can."

John White, the songwriter, guitarist and musical mind behind Renfrew's Wise Acres falls silent. The banter in the Glasgow bar we've ended up in grows, but not quite as big as him.

Earlier John had said: "This band is going to be revolutionary." But then he

changed his mind because he knew how stupid that sounded.

We settle for the fact that in today's cemetery of pop The Wise Acres aren't pushing up daisies but glowing with the heat of being alive. The purity of that state doesn't need the swaddling clothes of rhetoric to be noticed.

HE WISE Acres – who also include Sharon Bain, Margo Strachan and Robert 'Rab'
Mitchell – don't pretend to be the new Messiahs of modern music. But they do make a holy noise of guitar-blasted three-minute pop wondersongs with hooks so sharp they should catch even the most jaded whales off guard.

'Thorn In My Side' is blaring from the video-juke as I tell Sharon – potentially the most forceful female vocalist to emerge from Scotland since Annie Lennox – that when I hear her sing on The Wise Acres' debut single I'm reminded of early Debbie Harry. This is a compliment.

"Yeah?" Sharon, who was nine when Blondie first teased, blunts her sharpfeatured face in puzzlement. "Other people have said that to me. I guess when any new group comes along people try to pigeonhole them."

Indeed this is true. Even before The Wise Acres were heard south of the border, and their four song Cherry Red EP was released, the band were saddled with that terrible Peelism 'shambling' in some publications. But there is nothing lackadaisical about their burning blue pop and consequently they give short shrift to the idea that they are inept.

"We are not a shambling band. The Shop Assistants are a shambling band. People think we sound like them too but that's only because there are a couple of women in the group and we use guitars. People would rather be lazy than listen," says Sharon in disgust.

Here, for the hard of hearing, are four reasons why The Wise Acres aren't second-hand Shoppers:

"We've got more than two speeds," points out John, looking taller by the minute.

"We've actually got tunes, The Shop Assistants haven't," scathes drummer Margo, who like Sharon is 18 and truculent in a shy way.

"We're not as trendy as them nor would we want to be," continues John.

"And we're better looking by far," grins Margo, going for the kill.

Do you have an attitude problem?
"No, if people don't like what we do
then they can f\*\*\* off," she laughs.

Both Margo and Sharon left school with dishonourable discharges. In the drummer's case her departure was precipitated by the fact that she spat in the Head's face. "It was a bit of an accident. I laughed at him and this spit just came out and he told me to leave and never come back. So I did," she recalls.

Round about then John was in a local Renfrew group called The Ocean's Pace and both Sharon and Margo were roped in as backing vocalists. Eventually the three of them did a runner from that outfit, picked up bassist Rab on the way, and The Wise Acres were born in a cradle of delicious feedback.

Do The Wise Acres lie a lot? I

"No," denies John, who like Rab is 21 and confident his band will go far.

"Oooohaaarrrrhhhburble!" is everyone's reaction to John's brazen

"Oh alright, I lie once or twice or three times, but never in the songs," admits the guitarist. "I've written 28 songs in the past year and a half, I think they're as good if not better than the shite I hear on the radio. What else have I been doing in that time? Oh, stumbling through life, getting drunk, going to as many parties as possible. I used to be a clerk, now I'm unemployed. It's fun, I enjoy it."

So what's the value of lying?

"It depends on who you're lying to," says John. "You can save yourself in a lot of difficult situations if you're a good liar. You've got to have a good imagination for it to work though."

Do you have a vivid imagination John?

"Yes."

HIS ISN'T a fib. The songwriter's inventiveness can be heard in the The Wise Acres' dashing compositions. On his bedroom wall at home White has pictures of John Lennon and Nick Cave. He takes music seriously and speaks about it knowledgeably.

"The thing is," he continues, "no matter what we say, and it could be the truth, people will interpret it in their own manner. That's always the problem of treating an interview as a confessional isn't it?"

So do you treat your songs as confessions?

"Yeah, our sins come out in them," reckons John.

So what is the worst sin you've committed this week?

"Oooooh, probably the usual one of drinking far too much," smiles the guitarist. "What sin have I committed?"

wonders Rab before leaving for his job as a croupier. "Oh, I dunno really."

"Rab's the good guy of the band," butts in White, "he never does anything wrong, hahaha."

"You have to remember John is a good liar," retorts Rab.

"Adultery! That's my big sin of the week, I've stayed out all night and got a slap in me face from my mum," laughs Sharon. On her bedroom wall at home, next to pictures of Bowie and The Velvet Underground, the singer has biblical quotations like "Honor thy father and thy mother" and "Thou shalt not commit adultery".

"You know, I'm trying hard to think of what I've stolen this week," adds Margo. The band's self-confessed kleptomaniac ironically has a poster in her boudoir which implores "Prevent street crime!" She used to have one of The Sex Pistols but her mother tore it down because she thinks punk is outdated.

And so it is.

The Wise Acres are part of the next generation of British bands who aren't looking backwards but moving forwards. The emphasis is on the individual in their bittersweet songs, not the collective.

Both John and Margo come from families steeped in a strong communist tradition – indeed Renfrew has had a militant socialist council for the past three decades or so – yet The Wise Acres shun the notion of using their music to promote a political cause.

"I'm not interested in being a spokesperson for a generation or any of that crap," says John. "Like I said, we deal with the politics of life and living. We don't want to be The Redskins or Billy Bragg, making overt statements and alienating people. To me that's pointless.

"I guess I'm a spectator in the grandstands of life. I write about the relationships around me and what I see, hopefully in a manner most people can relate to. I trade opinions about life with other spectators and in the end I walk away back to something closed and cosy: the house, my parents and my bedroom with its posters."

One day, and it could be tomorrow. The Wise Acres' time will come.

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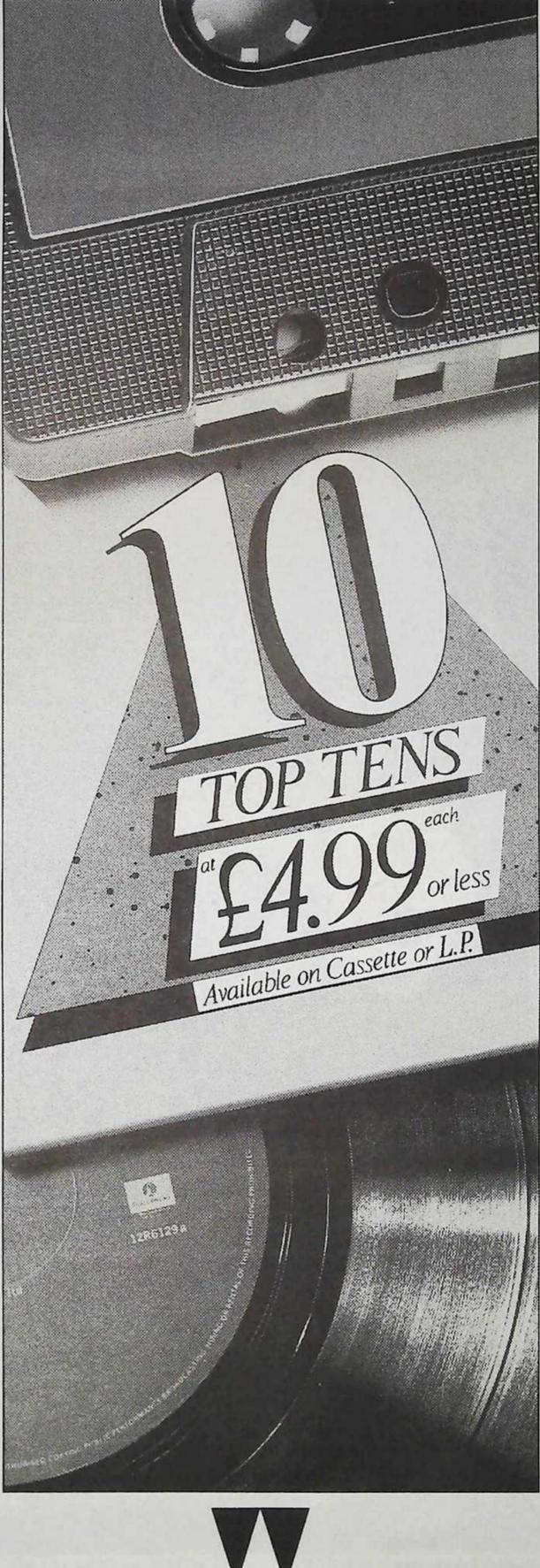

Will The Real ZZ Top Eve

Just before playing their current British shows, ZZ Top decided to park their car in Europe and step out to look at their surroundings. JANE SIMON caught up with them in Paris, dragged them onto their hotel roof and tried to discover the faces behind the fuzz. KASS takes the stage

ERRORISTS? NO problem.

Billy, Frank and Dusty check out of their hotel rooms on the Champs Elysees – too obvious – and into the equally expensive but less exposed Royal Monceau around the corner.

The French take an even more casual stance on security, despite facing a better chance, statistically, of being blown to smithereens than winning their lottery. It is quite possible for four bedraggled foreigners carrying decidedly suspect baggage to wander in to the Royal Monceau and plonk themselves in the midst of its chandeliered splendour while the staff ignore them and go about their greater business of being aloof.

The night before, we four had also strolled, unchallenged, into the backstage area of the Palais des Sports, an unprepossessing little 15,000 seater of concrete, steel and glass that looked as though it would go up with a very satisfying bang.

The solitary security guard manning the barrier would have discovered, if he'd bothered to ask, that not only didn't I have a backstage pass, I didn't have a ticket either, and come to think of it, my passport wasn't valid.

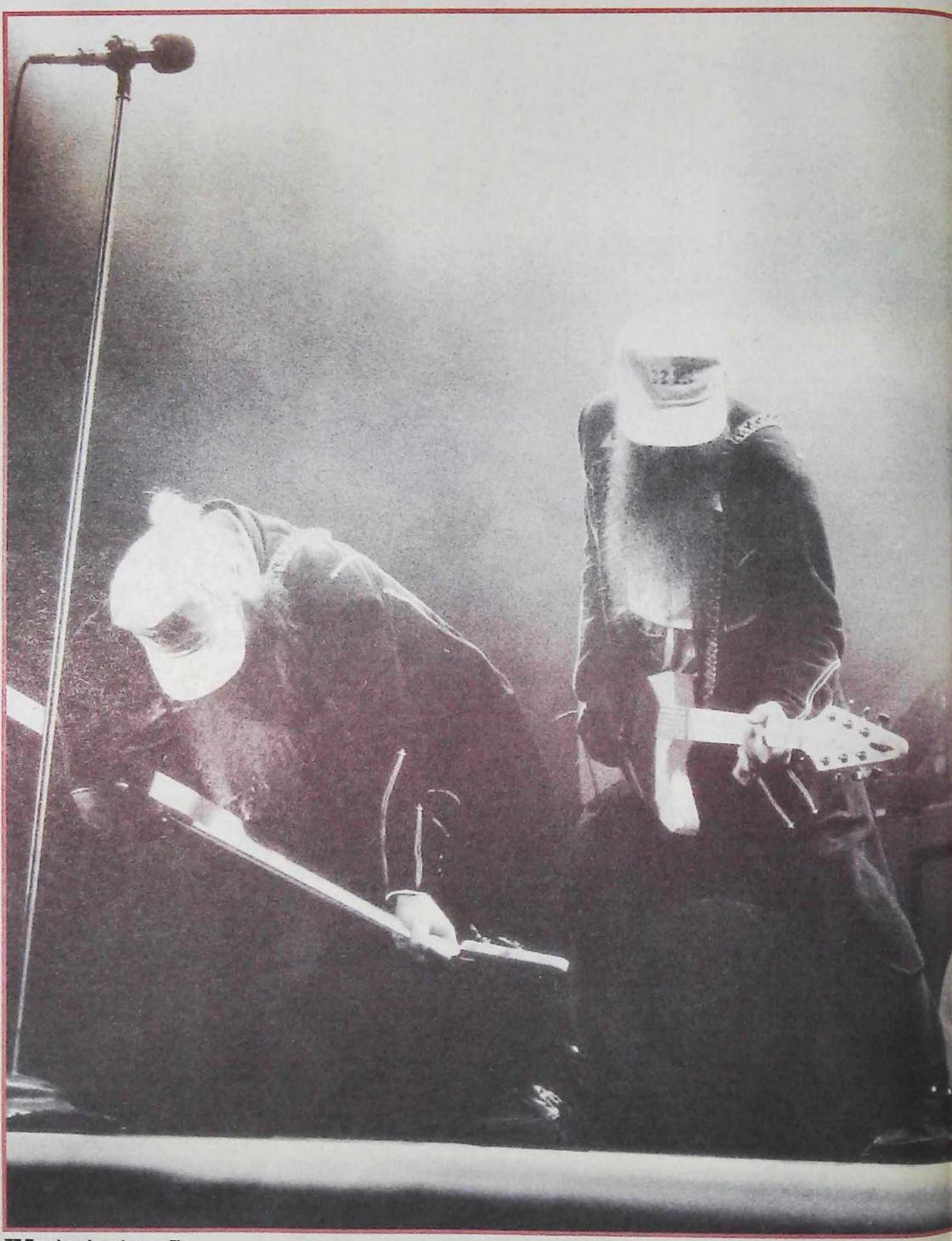
But maybe I have an honest face.

In the auditorium 15,000 fans and, no doubt, the odd Sudanese taking a night off from urban warfare to check out ZZ Top, are making impatient noises in French. Why ZZ Top are taking so long no one knows. It's not as if they have to shave or anything. But ZZ Top aren't scared of angry mobs either.

They're certainly scared of something, but what that is, I can only guess at.

ET'S EXAMINE the evidence. Since the release of 'Afterburner' ZZ Top have been on the run. Maybe you prefer to call it on the road, but what normal person lives out of a suitcase for over a year when he doesn't even need the money?

Since they began this life on the lam, ZZ. Top as a favourite source of good time bull-shitting interviews has also dried up. These days they prefer the escape clause of the press conference, thus avoiding one-to-one confrontation. Those interviews they do give – like this one – are 15 minutes long, if you're lucky, of Billy, Frank and Dusty joshing each other in their private

Top-speak, tossing out glib one-liners. And just when you think you might be getting somewhere, some gofer comes in and tells you time's up.

Well, hell, you got your interview didn't you? What did you expect? A sensible conversation? Don't forget, these boys haven't seen a real person in 12 months.

Sometimes though, none of this matters. Like when Billy, Frank and Dusty get up on that stage in the Palais des Sports and the bonds that bind them together start to flow like a three way current and you stand
there in some sort of dumb awe and
wonder how those puny little strings got so
damn fat all of a sudden. And if someone
suggested to you at that moment that ZZ
Top were anything less than Godlike, you'd
separate their teeth from their gums without
a moment's hesitation.

That's when you think, maybe it doesn't matter that they can't tell you why it works. That's when you think interviews are pretty stupid anyway. So what if Billy, Frank and

Dusty hide behind their jokes, and their beards, and their lasers, and their managers, and their cheap sunglasses, and their security guards, and their money, and their reputation, and their schedule, and their baseball caps?

So what if you're not sure if they really exist behind all that? So what if the real ZZ Top won't stand up?

But when they've dragged you all the way over to Paris to interview them, the least they can do is get out of bed.

## COVER r Come Clean (Shaven)?

"Our beards are like medieval chest plates that people wore to protect themselves when they went into battle" — Billy Gibbons

WO WHOLE hours before I have to get on a plane and fly home again, I meet ZZ Top on the roof of their hotel. It's the only place we can find daylight in which to take photos without actually going outside, where Billy, Frank and Dusty would, of course, run the risk of coming into contact with some real people, God forbid.

Billy, Frank and Dusty are never rude, however. They don't need to be. They have people to do that for them; men who are paid to appear at regular intervals and say "five more minutes" leaving Billy, Frank and Dusty free to carry right on being perfect southern gentlemen.

When we get back on the ground, I kick off with Why? Why are you pushing yourselves so hard?

Billy: "I have no idea. We asked whether other bands did it like this and they said yes, so we thought if it's good enough for them it's good enough for us."

Is it getting to you yet?

"It has put us in a state of mind which is equal to the chemically oriented '60s."

Does that mean you're totally spaced out by the whole thing?

Frank: "It means we're blithering idiots."
At the beginning of the 'Sleeping Bag'
video, the old woman begins a bedtime
story about the three little pigs, and the
three bears, the three blind mice, three
wise men, three musketeers, three stooges
- is there something magical about three?

Billy: "It's compact. You only have two other people to deal with. Musically, personally..."

Dusty: "Financially."

Frank: "Fi-nancially?"

Dusty: "It just came out that way."

Which three are you?

"The three wise asses!"

Why is that? Why do you clown around all the time and act so mysterious, making up all these stories?

"You mean we lie a lot?"

I didn't say that. I only met you half an hour ago. How do I know what the truth is?

"The truth is: ZZ Top is the truth," Frank pronounces solemnly and then chokes on a peanut. The Lord also works in mysterious ways, it seems.

Do you think interviews have presented the truth about ZZ Top?

"As far as they can," says Billy. "And I think you're right. A lot of it has to do with what we've managed to come up with. I've read a number of interviews that are just as confounding to me. It must be our delivery."

"It's pretty confounding to us too, to sit and listen to some of the answers you give," Frank tells him.

Are you afraid of the truth? Do you think if you didn't make things up people would say, Oh, that ZZ Top, they turned out to be pretty boring after all?

"Well, I don't know," says Dusty. "I never thought about that. I don't know which truth

you're talking about."

"Give us an example," says Frank.

Well, how old are you, for instance?

Dusty: "That's none of your business."

"Plenny seven. No, he's plenny-seven. I'm

plenny-six," says Frank.

He looks more like Ian Botham with each
passing minute. I laugh politely.

NFORTUNATELY, FRANK and Dusty are both surprised to learn of David Sinclair's new ZZ Top biography.

Billy has seen it, but says he only looked at the pictures. As for the American biography Sinclair constantly refers to in which Deborah Frost slings some well-aimed Rio Grande mud in their direction, only Dusty will admit, gruffly, that he's "just glanced at it".

I take the hint and change the subject.
What happened to the girls in the videos?
Frank: "Billy had a falling out with them."
Billy: "No, they got famous and started
getting lots of other work."

Frank: "They blew Billy out!"

"Now there's the truth," says Dusty.
Were those three girls your alter egos? If
you were women, are they the kind of
women you'd want to be?

Billy: "That's right. That's exactly right."
Whose idea was that?

Frank: "It was mine. My idea. All of it was mine."

Billy: "We asked the director to scare up three pretty girls he felt would go along with the Texas image, and there were a number of models he knew so he got their portfolios and we were asked to judge them. And before we could answer, he said, Good! Because this is who's going to be in the video. But we were happy, because, I suppose, if there's such a thing as female alter egos, they're as close to what we were doing at the time to anybody you could find."

Those videos were so neat. The way you gave these ordinary, oppressed little people the key to the dream machine, complete with fairy godmothers to kick the shit out of the opposition . . .

"Fairy tales can come true, it can happen to you," croons Frank.

Dusty: "Heck, it was pretty basic. Just a regular story about rescuing somebody, or something like that."

Billy: "Just your basic disappearing human beings . . . "

AVING DISPENSED with the girls, and with the car taking a backseat these days, ZZ Top have inexplicably gone all Egyptian on us.

The stage is dominated by a massive head of Tutankamun that shoots lasers from its sunglasses, and for 'Velcro Fly' they take it upon themselves to walk like an Egyptian.

Sorry, maybe I'm being particularly obtuse here, but I really can't see the connection.

"Ah, do you have any of the photos of Egypt handy," Billy asks Dusty, as if he carries his holiday snaps on a chain round his neck or something. "Well, we just wanted to go and do what everybody does when they go to Egypt."

"See the pyramids, hang out by the sphinx, ride a camel," Dusty explains.

"We're all fans of the interest by the scientific community to explain the pyramids and when we got there, it was so overwhelmingly different from what we expected, it became thoroughly ingrained in us. I suppose our inclusion of Egyptology was just as curious as our going there in the first place."

"We found the dance to 'Velcro Fly'

written out in hieroglyphics, thousands of years old," Dusty insists.

I see, so the Egyptians invented Velcro.
"No, they invented flies!"

I had assumed, mistakenly it seems, that 'Velcro Fly' was their solution to Erica Jong's quest for the Zipless F\*\*\* which titillated America in the late '70s. When I mention this, they go all goggle-eyed and choke into their orange juice.

"Velcro seemed to be a real up to the minute technological deal. I'm big on Velcro – it makes such a great sound," explains Billy, inviting me to listen up close to his trainer flaps opening and closing. "Actually, there was concern among some group back in the states who thought that kids would grow up not knowing how to tie their shoelaces because of the Velcro straps."

The Buckle Majority strikes again.
Coincidentally, Chanel's Paris boutique has just reported that customers are stealing the solid gold buttons off their customised 501s.
The Velcro Fly could also keep the crime rate down.

Do you think that lasers are really compatible with numbers like 'Tube Snake Boogie'? Some people would have ditched the old when they brought in the new. It almost seems like two bands up there now.

"I can see it now," says Frank. "The Two Band Theory. It's gonna be big. Tell me, do we do too much of the new, or too much of the old or what? We've had one guy tell us that we highlighted the technopop side of the two band theory and he liked that, and the next guy said he was glad we were doing so much of the old material, and it was the same show. It just depends through whose eyes you see it.

"I don't see those things pulling against each other in any way. It's fun bouncing back and forth the way the set is arranged. I mean, it seems a lot of fun to do 'Sleeping Bag' and then do 'Waiting On The Bus' and 'Jesus Just Left Chicago'."

Most reviews commented that the title 'Afterburner' reflected the technological advancement of your music. Was that true?

"Look, things aren't really that deep," says Dusty, shuffling about.

So there's less to you than meets the eye? "More or less."

O YOU think you use your beards as security blankets? It's such a shy thing to do, covering your faces with hair and dark glasses and peaked caps, especially the way that Billy and Dusty look identical.

"Yeah, I'm a pretty shy person," agrees
Billy. "My favourite comparison is that our
beards are like medieval chest plates that
people wore to protect themselves when
they went into battle. The funny thing is, it's
become such a trademark that we can't
even walk the streets, so I don't know if it's
serving its purpose."

Is that what you use Bill Ham for as well?

To build walls around you?

"We all build walls."

At this point Frank decides to turn the tables by pointing at the brooches on my jacket. "Do you like birds, or something?" he asks.

Yeah, I tell him. This one's Isis - she's

Egyptian. They're French parachutists' wings, and that one's an eagle.

"Is there something deep in that?" he says, winding me up to see how I like it. Yeah, there is. Don't you have flying dreams?

"I had one last night, as a matter of fact,"
Billy says. "This is really weird, a recurring
one. It's a bi-plane that has psychedelic
patterns painted on its wings and there's a
pilot flying the plane, but I'm laying on the
upper wing and it leaves the edge of this
island and it goes out over water and it's
just great. It's fun. It goes and goes."

How long have you been having that one?
"Maybe ten years. Same plane, same take
off point, the works. I forget about it from
time to time, but it's there."

He hasn't had his dream analysed or anything, but I'm sure if he looked down one night, he'd see Dusty lying on the bottom wing, and if he turned around, the pilot would be steering with a pair of drum sticks...

CALL a halt there, so that no minder gets the satisfaction of blowing the whistle on me. But just before he goes I ask Billy about the time he spent in Paris before ZZ Top's re-appearance working with Artiste Contemporaire, a group of avant-garde musicians.

"When one is caught up in any kind of artistic movement, you think you've just unfolded the answers to the universe. Those people were just kind of a fun sideline. It all took place during that three year disappearing act that we pulled off from '76 to '79 and it gave me a chance to surround myself with the kind of individuals and the kind of input that would provide something totally different from the regimen of doing a proper tour.

"Musically, I don't think it was unrewarding because it was that relaxation that allowed us to come back into the studio and try some things that we hadn't done in ten years. When we got back together, we went back into the studio and found ourselves playing as a band, rather than locked up in some private booth across the room. The benefits were evident immediately because the engineer walked in and started waving his hands and said, Don't touch a thing, it sounds great – we're gonna make a record like this!"

Was it necessary for you to disappear?

"Well, we had reached a point where
making records was so much by the book,
and on the advice of producers and
engineers, and I think it unfolded a great
thing for us. Certainly the success of
'Eliminator' proved that and, if nothing else,
just getting the opportunity to feel that
freedom again was wonderful.

"I think it did a lot of good, because what you saw last night is the same thing – this kind of synchronous motion that signifies the ZZ Top live visuals. It's a real spirit of togetherness and that kind of broke its way out of that freedom that we had found by getting away from the structure, structure, structure, structure, so it's really a composition of opposites. Here we are acting, exactly alike, but we're doing it from this base of freedom, you know?

"We can do anything we want."

FRANKIE GOES TO HOLLYWOOD 'Liverpool' (Zang

Tuum Tumb ZTTIQ 8)\*1/2

FRANKIE GOES To Hollywood, their trainers, their handlers and everybody else connected with this slab of unexceptional plastic elevator muzak should be made to eat every copy pressed and every sleeve printed. 'Liverpool' indeed!

Holly Johnson has about as much to do with either the reality or even the dream of Liverpool as Paul Morley has to do with the neighbouring city of Manchester. And the Frankies' album of the city is so slight, so insignificant, so very bland that it should have been called 'Milton Keynes', or maybe even 'Telford'.

A record with a title like 'Liverpool' should make broad and sweeping statements. It should hit hard and fast and dirty and low. Never mind the implications of that title, a record named for the city of 'Liverpool' should scream with anguish, attack with pure hatred and kick like a bad-tempered mule on a bad acid trip. It should also charm you, make love to you and crease you up with the odd one liner.

However, Frankie Goes To Hollywood's 'Liverpool' makes only one valid statement. Within a cocoon of gleaming bright technology (Frankie Goes To Croydon?) and amidst a plethora of evidence that the three 'lads' are now capable of playing in Yes, the second Frankie LP quietly underlines all the flaws which reared their heads on the first.

On 'Welcome To The Pleasure Dome' there were at least two top notch pop eruptions in 'Relax' and 'Two Tribes', and a halfway decent giggle in 'Born To Run'. But on 'Liverpool' there is only 'Rage Hard', a weak kneed trembler born out of despair, and a whole load of up beat proficiency and clumsy lyricism. And so, bereft of those sparks of inspirational brilliance which once more than compensated for all the obvious weaknesses, all we have left are all those obvious weaknesses.

The pumping signature from 'Warriors Of The Wasteland' apart (and even that title speaks volumes about the quality of the imagination at work), there is not one worthwhile hookline here, although somebody has thrown in every kitchen sink in the street in an attempt to make you think otherwise. And with nothing to distract you from the Frankies' quite puerile Jennings Of The Third Form lyrics and ideas in action, you can only wonder that these jokers ever summoned up the nerve to attempt a comeback.

'Liverpool', according to FGTH, is a weak joke without a punchline. Don't believe them.

#### **HOWARD JONES 'One** To One' (WEA WX68)\*\*

GONE ARE the awfully imaginative hairstyles, the punk meets street theatre coiffure. Gone are those daringly offbeat baggy jumper and boiler suit combinations from the C&A 1983 'New Waves' range.

Having abandoned some of his endearingly gauche trademarks, H is looking a little less silly these days. But just because High Wycombe's arch humanist has thrown off his old clothes, the ones he \*hought were a bit of a statement, a bit of a risk. doesn't mean that he's lost his heart. That's still beating passionately and it's clear that he still wants to know us well and that things can get a lot better.

This Arif Mardin production, which features a lengthy list of musicians (Nile Rodgers lends a hand and Howard's brother plays bass), may be a long way from the "one man band ideal" of his first album, but Howard has not changed where it counts. He's still got his chum Jed

dressing up in masks and throwing off his chains, he's still knocking out infuriatingly catchy synth motifs and he's still spouting the blindingly obvious.

On 'Good Luck, Bad Luck', he warns us that we are all conditioned, but on Where Are We Going?', he gives us a way out. What you have to do is ask the ultimate rhetorical question and "refuse to be clones or work in someone's scheme". Yes, in Howard's ideal world, no one will do a YTS.

Howard still wants to be loved ('Will You Still Be There'), still has a lot of love to give ('You Know I Love You') but realises that it's not all that easy ('The Balance Of Love') and that understanding is what we need ('Step Into These Shoes'). Howard is still a very, very nice person with his heart in all the right places (ie everywhere). So nice in fact that even at your most cynical, you don't really like telling him that 'One To One' is an appallingly trite confection of soap commercial ditties and

harmless open heart philosophy. Nice one, H.

#### **VOLCANO SUNS 'AII** Night Lotus Party' (Homestead Records

HMS070)\*\*\*\* THERE IS more here than first meets the ears.

What one eventually discovers, is gold, gloriously hot and rattling around inside one's skull like some claustrophobic scorpion eating its own tail. Rock's Last Supper, as cooked by Boston's Volcano Suns tastes

'All Night Lotus Party' is the second album by this offshoot of the late Mission Of Burma. And for all its surface bursts of ferocity, it's imbued with delightful lyrical and euphonious subtleties.

The trio - who're given spine-snap by the bass of Jeff Weingand, stamina and elocution via the drums and vocals of Peter Prescott, and a nervous breakdown courtesy of Jon Williams' schizoid guitar - operate in the

territory of jetstream harmony pop navigated by Hüsker Dü that is too often termed 'hardcore'.

Sorry to be a pedant but this band deserve more than lazy labelling. Their nearest reference point might be Hüsker Dü but, not having the instrumental guile of Moul and co, the Suns settle for penning superior songs. These lyrically explore small town mentality on 'Dot On The Map', ("The kind of place where sparks can never fly") even smaller minds are twisted on 'Village Idiot', while the lure of big bank balances rustles restlessly on 'Sounds Like Bucks'

But what singles out Volcano Suns is not only their vivid words but also their abrupt changes of pace. One moment you're pushed down a drainpipe of splintered glass guitar feedback, the next you're being assaulted by a cracked rockabilly.

Let Volcano Suns blow the top off your prejudices - not with a whimper but with a bang.

**BOSTON 'Third Stage'** 

(MCA MCG 6017)\*\* LESS THAN a feeling, more a brainwave that got strung out, wrung out and distorted by an obsessive quest for perfection.

And this is their 'Sunset'. 'Commercial Suicide' (Crammed Discs CRAM 045)\*\*\*\*

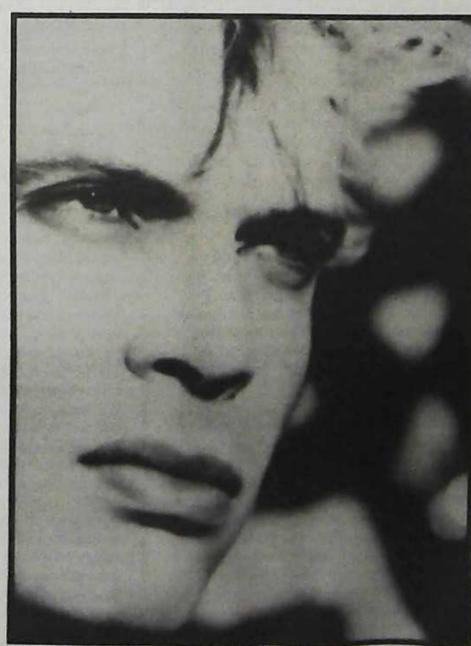
OF ALL the class of '77, Colin Newman was the only one I ever came close to worshipping. Wrongly or rightly I always took him for the main man behind Wire, if only because of the sneered vocals and wildly off the wall lyrics that seemed to be so much a part of his own persona. And now, nine years and a discography as long as yer arm later, 'Commercial Suicide'. Autobiographical or two fingers to the business?

Well, we'll reserve judgement on that one just for now but what is certain is that, as a 40 minute morsal from the three course lunch of his career, this record is as tasty a bite as you could wish

I guess that the obvious thing to say is that 'Commercial Suicide' shows Newman to have mellowed with age. Oh, the words that collide inside your brain are still there, their meanings shattering into a thousand splintered thoughts, but the music is less overtly tense than any of his other solo LPs. Instead, a solemn, brooding atmosphere permeates, like the sound of a secular, 21st century church, built as a monument to the frail emotions of the human species.

There are glinting raindrops of notes falling around the frozen beats that carry the

#### SOMO SOMO 'Paris' (Stern's Music STERNS 1014)\*\*\*\*

FAN FAN, the Zairean master of mellifluous and sensual soukous guitaring, and his ever-changing Somo Somo band were once dubbed "African pub rock" by some dipstick. And in a sense it's geographically true: the onetime chief picker of Franco's phenomenal OK Jazz could be seen performing in your local if you lived in Shepherd's Bush a couple of years back. The thing is, even when Somo Somo were essentially a British pick-up group of Africanophiles, the melodious grace of Fan Fan was paramount, as indeed it is on his latest album.

In a sense the fate of Fan Fan mirrors The Sun Wave's fortunes in Britain. When he came over here it seemed as though the sounds of Africa were about to become international currency. King Sunny Ade, Fela, Manu Dibango, Ebeneezer Obey and myriad others were the cool names to drink in the hot summer of 1984. Everything looked set to go and in a sense it did: early gigs by the likes of Youssou N'Dour were unforgettable experiences. Now, in 1986, it seems like so little was achieved.

Anyway... though the public's interest might have switched to this or that, the sons of the Sun Wave have simply kept going their own sweet way. 'Paris' - which was recorded in the same city - is proof of that. Featuring some of the slinkiest Francophone soukous exponents extant, this fourtrack tropical treat of horns exclaiming "happy!", guitars in sharp-suited formation,

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PAUL YOUNG 'Between Two Fires' (CBS 4501501)\*\*\* PAUL YOUNG'S the sort who wins by default. Of course, you'd rather hear him than Rod Stewart or Tony Hadley. But what emotions does he engage? Young's only strong suit is the gruff ballad, where he can play the silent sap who gets left behind. He seemed to invent that air of puzzled, blundering loneliness. It comes up a couple of times on 'Between Two Fires', while the rest counts through his deck of surly bulldog poses, sung in the usual able seaman voice.

It's a pity that someone who began as a decent interpretive singer now decides to fill his records with original songs that nobody else would want to cover. 'Wonderland' and 'Wargames' are the only songs Young hasn't concocted with his band; the rest are memorable in the way that some things remind you of other things. Actually, the record comes on like a British bloke's 'What's Going On', with Young's downturned mouth chewing over all sorts of bad-old-modern-world mus-

Hugh Padgham has effected a shrewd compromise in the studio. The record sounds very played, beefy with rock drums and guitar, but there's a modern patina that shines over any coarseness. It's a growing-up sort of LP, as if 'Every Time You Go Away' was silly adolescent stuff and we all had to get on to bigger and more significant things.

One song is called 'Prisoner Of Conscience' - phew! I prefer the bluff loner to the pop statesman. It will look a little old-fashioned when it's parked in the Top Ten: one rock singer and his band, Sunday lunch, home service.

'Brilleaux' (Stiff Records SEEZ 65)\*\*\*

IT'S FUNNY how times. change. It seems like only yesterday that every brash young pop punk pretender would tear the heart out of some classic hit or other, but here we have Dr Feelgood taking on The Undertones' 'You Got My Number',

BILLY IDOL 'Whiplash Smile' (Chrysalis CDL 1514)\*\*\*\* WILLIAM BROAD: the everyday tale of a simple lad who took a failed career, some bleached locks and a dodgy lip, and set off in search of success. America got a bit of punk heritage and William got rich.

Trouble was, no one took him seriously over here; seems that camp showmanship and respect don't go together. The Americans, however, just lapped it up. His years in exile have fuelled his overt indulgences and he's created a mutant cliché rocker. William Broad has become Billy Idol.

The leather-clad peroxide snarl would be history now, were it not for a series of great chunks of celluloid sexism, hung on metal hangers. The boy was designed for MTV. 'White Wedding', 'Dancing With Myself' and 'Eyes Without A Face' happened to be brilliant records, which kinda gave the story a neat twist.

'Whiplash Smile' is the next episode, his first proper album since '84's 'Rebel Yell', if you don't include last year's compilation 'Vital Idol'. It grinds the same axe as the early affairs, taking snippets from his best moments and rearranging them in familiar guises. 'World's Forgotten Boy' (no relation) has a cocksure driving beat chewed up by rampant guitars, while Idol's voice flirts with a whisper before turning nasty. The new single, 'To Be A Lover', is a sweet bit of bar-room boogie dripping in Elvis-isms.

For such a fragile beast, he still strives to be the convincing hard man. Macho rock tinged with subtlety and the occasional lament, like 'Sweet Sixteen'. Idol's created an irresistible caricature with a sound to match. His voice just yearns to be loved, and every time he tries to get tough, as in 'Man For All Seasons', you can't help but smile. Nobody could conceivably take it seriously, except maybe Billy.

Much of the man's magic lies in the visual fantasies bestowed on his music, so the album's only half the story; imagination, for the time being, provides the rest.

'Whiplash Smile' is an arrogant, confident collection of meat-eating rock that sways not with the passage of time or transient whims, but which moves majestically down a wellworn path that leads to the end of the rainbow, the path that made Idol rich.

He now seems to scorn the country that deserted him, but he'll always have a friend in me. There's too many saccharine sheep and too few performers these days.

## HYNDE QUARTE

THE PRETENDERS 'Get Close' (WEA Records WX 64)\*\*\*

JUST LIKE nectar poured over old scars, one of rock's most distinctive vocalists, Chrissie Hynde, comes out of hibernation with a miasma of sentimentality, cynicism and self-soulflagellation in unequal doses. Lost as it is in a limbo of 'pleasant' textures, and because rarely has the song as a confessional sounded so painless, 'Get Close' is destined to be a mammoth seller. But that can't mask the fact that it comes over as very long in the tusk.

With fellow musicians dying in unfortunate circumstances and her own personal life undergoing dramatic changes in the past few years, one can hardly accuse Chrissie Hynde or her group of being predictable. And true to form, 'Get Close' is hosted by a new Pretenders line-up. Bassist TM Stevens and ex-Haircut 100 drummer Blair Cunningham are now in the Hynde gang. And so?

Well, what with a dish of funk on the side and a dash of reggae, even the music on this fourth Pretenders effort has undergone a subtle shift (a result of the Simple Minds connection?). In fact, the only constant is the gloriously drawling voice of Mrs Kerr which scrapes like scuffed boots on the sidewalk of experience. Yet why is 'Get Close' just so damn mediocre? Even when she initially pretended to climb on the boil-infested neck of punk way back then, Chrissie was always more a trad rock rebel with a fringe. The term 'sassy', so outdated now, could have been invented for her gutsy renditions of songs like 'Brass In Pocket' and 'Kid'.

The rub is, there are simply no compositions of that calibre on 'Get Close', discounting Jimi Hendrix's 'Room Full Of Mirrors', which is covered in a slavishly redundant way that never cracks it, and Meg Keene's arcane 'Hymn To Her'. The rest of the album is a bag of glad and sad rags - mostly the latter.

Being a mature woman, Chrissie's reflections on ageing and motherhood should in theory be her strongest suit. But where she touches on the subject, like with 'Chill Factor', she never convinces, though her performance on this song is far superior to the mawkish sentimentality of 'I Remember You' or the slush that infests 'Light Of The Moon'.

Ironically enough, the only occasion Hynde really hits the mark is with the cutting 'How Much Did You Get For Your Soul'. The line "You're gonna make it rich/ As long as some poor bastard in Africa is lying in a ditch" might well refer to a certain act on Live Aid.

Are there any worthwhile conclusions to be drawn? 'My Baby' hides a clue. "If there's a method to writing a song/ How come I'm getting it wrong," implores Hynde. Well dear lady, from title to terminal you are peddling us the inert poetry of the mundane mostly. 'Get Close' never really does. It will have to settle for being awarded platinum instead.

Picnic' (Cor Records GURT15)\*\*\*\* THERE'S A beautiful, smouldering bomb-fire of white noise burning in the dark woods of The Stupids' 'Retard Picnic'. The fire crackles violently with tiny internal explosions, and little flames reach for the sky, fuelled by a wall of hardcore noise.

Screaming melodies plead from the heart of the fire as they desperately try to wriggle out from the ashes of rock. Meanwhile, whipping drums melt the guitars that have been thrown into the fire by The Stupids, the wicked magicians mixing this heart-pounding potion of chainsaw hardcore.

Like earlier Hüsker Dü spells, The Stupids dig into the mysteries of throttling white noise. Their songs strangle the last breath out of the corpse of punk and the heart of rock. This demolition derby of skateboarding tunes displays the humour and the adventure so sadly missing in English hardcore.

'Killed By A Cripple' and 'Violent Nun' are a couple of my favourites. But most importantly, 'Retard Picnic' demonstrates great poignancy when pining guitars are left to castrate the final silence lurking behind the album's ceaseless barrage.

Before we know it, the fire fades and dies and we are left to grow cold again.

'Life Stories' is taking things a bit far though, with the noble guitar picker making John Williams sound like Jimi Hendrix, real Billy Blando stuff. This is better than BBC2 test card accompaniment, more like a pleasing filler for the remnants of commercial breaks in late Channel 4 Bmovies.

ALICE COOPER 'Constrictor' (MCA MCF 3341)\*\*

SNAKES ALIVE! The cover, boasting the return of Alice Cooper, promises a real Killer is going to uncurl and hiss in our ears . . . The printed lyrics tease a grin out of us before we've even heard the thing, with Ramones-esque exploitation smeared everywhere. This should be good, we gurgle, but as

Excuse the pun, but this record is a real boa. The 'Love It To Death' make-up that's smeared all around Alice's chops covers a sham; the real Alice is pounding his head against a padded wall somewhere.

the needle digs in deep the truth blows up in our faces.

This Alice is a clone. For starters, the real Alice would never have surrounded himself with such a witless bunch of nobodies. Yer typical Face reader's idea of what a heavy metal band sounds like. The hard rock equivalent of elevator music, laughably old fashioned, a hopeless stereotype of the genre. The real Alice would never have let the dictates of fashion intrude on his perfectly warped vision, in the way that his clone has allowed things to slide. Only occasionally does the Alice Cooper we long for flicker into view through the dense smokescreen this record puts up in order to woo airplay.

'Give It Up' gets both stars for having a good lyric in the true Alice vein, a regular Crypt Keeper thumbs down that's aimed straight for the eyes of all normal folks everywhere: "Just when you got it made/And all your bills are paid/You stumble and fall into your grave/Too bad . . ." Too bad the rest of 'Constrictor' failed to ignite with the same sort of mania present on this song. As the guitar goes gargling in the dark again, my impatience returns to reign supreme.

The real Alice suggests that it might not be a bad thing if an 'accident' happens when that guillotine blade comes crashing down onstage at Wembley. Chuckling at the thought, I find to my horror that I'm agreeing with him.

## THE VERLAINES 'Hallelujah All The Way Home' (Flying Nun FN040)\*\*\*\*'/2

TOM VERLAINE, of course, was the man who put the TV in Television, but the name derives from Paul Verlaine, a 19th century French Symbolist poet who, his dirty limericks aside, is usually remembered for killing his chum Rimbaud. And for my money, New Zealand's Verlaines are honouring the original rather than the spasmodically brilliant televisionary. Certainly they snatch your breath away with their own originality.

This is not the sort of music you can readily pigeonhole, although if you twisted my arm I'd opt for a more mature, more world-weary, more talented Bodines crossbred with Richard Thompson and The Fall. This is the sort of music you should simply wonder at!

The strands of countless influences and compulsions are weaved together into just one cloth. It's not an immediately obviously high street fashion, but still it's the sort of look that lasts. The traditional rock infrastructure of drums, guitars and self-pity is subtly subverted by the infiltration of all kinds of seriously classical instruments and made majestic by a width of wit and vision you don't discover every day.

Sometimes The Verlaines employ restraint and build their climaxes slowly. And then again, sometimes they tear the roof off a passing sucker. The Verlaines talk dirty and joke wistfully and they don't feel like they belong. And it is their sense of isolation, their anger and the occasional off-beat beauty in their expression of these emotions which makes them a sensation to be savoured.

#### BLACK 'N BLUE 'Nasty Nasty' (Geffen 924 111-1)\*\*\*\*

Blue were just a bunch of booze-headed bozos. I was right, too. But since when has stupidity been a hindrance to good rock 'n' roll? Never, and it's vital to this stuff.

As soon as one of the boys coughed up a sticky one and spat it out over a bump-started riff, one of those gut feelings told me that this wouldn't be a particularly

And with a supporting cast that includes Rockin' Ron Keel and (gaspl) Peter 'Acutely Embarrassing Solo Album' Criss, how could they go wrong?

'Best In The West', featuring the above celebs, scores highest on the clapometer, though the rest aren't far behind, especially the astonishingly composed 'I'll Be There For You'. Gene Simmons produces, natch.

They may not be as irresistibly flamboyant as Dave Lee Roth (who is, dahling?) but if it's trashy toons you want, these boys'll sure as hell kick yer ass. Black 'n' blue.

## THE DELMONAS 'The Delmonas 5!' (Empire SYF 95)\*\*\*\*1/2

NOW WE are five: up to five records (singles included) and down to five members, a falling-out reducing the singing girlfriends from a trio to a duo.

The two remaining girls act like a cupful of Comfort on the scratchy, itchy raw material provided by Thee Mighty Caesars, the in-house backing band. And while '5!' hardly represents the pinnacle of high-fidelity recording techniques, in comparison with the sound quality generally favoured by the Caesars of Chatham, this is the height of sophistication.

But then this lot were always more interested in a good tune than flashy effects, and this selection of songs is possibly their best to date. I think it may well be a compliment to Mr Prolific himself, Billy Childish, to suggest that his compositions are on a par with the chosen cover versions, the big giveaway being a penchant for daft titles and, especially, for ludicrous girls' names. This time around, how about 'Black Ludella' or 'Delmona (The Temptress Of Love)'?

The songs tend towards the extremes of go-go Caesarbeat ('Why Don't You Smile Now'

and 'Jealousy') and slower, ballads ('Heard About Him' and 'When I Want You'). The twin vocals sound just about right, with an engaging tendency towards the occasional stray note. A happy record.

#### 'Appointment With Venus' (él Records ACME 5)\*\*\*\*\*

MUSIC THAT reminds me of missing the last train, shivering at the station with her all night, talking about the Trevor Howard film, getting the milk train home at 5.30, then two hours of bedroom sighs before she ambles off to work.

Louis Philippe, él's master chef, invents the word 'seducteur' and charms our socks off. After two warm-up singles - just some adequate late-night snooze - he finally throws himself utterly into él's remarkable spirit of invention. On this record, during a song called 'Heaven Is Above My Head', he sings the line "Come to my boudoir and I'll show you the meaning of 'snog' for ever" in French. The debut from Louis plunders that post-coital abandon with a hefty dollop of French dressing.

In his spare time, Louis, born the same day as Colin Blunstone of The Zombies, collects stamps, practices tennis, drinks wine and shoots woodcocks with a crossbow. The irrepressible Mike Alway at él HQ describes him as their Trojan Horse, their Joan Of Arc, their Martin 'The Ghost' Peters. These songs, driven not detached, possess a Faunting timbre but are full of snags. Louis sets off on his quixotic voyages with passion, thankfully more Scott Walker than Charles Aznavour.

Deathly pale ballads with a glowing cinematic feel, Louis veers from 'When I'm An Astronaut' (rippling sarky satire) to 'Angelica My Love' (crushing lovelorn visions), the chanteur blessed with a voice that could make bridges collapse and empires crumble. Come 1987, the world will be divided into two camps, those that like Louis Philippe and those with carexhausts for ears. In short, the man says "What we dream we become", and he could be right, you know.

#### FAUST 'Return Of A Legend: Munic And Elsewhere' (Recommended RR 25)\*\*\*\*\*

WOLF! WOLF! No one ever takes me seriously – that's the drawback of taking the piss out of everyone. Most music these days is OK to while away a stray hour or two, but very little merits serious consideration. Faust do, honest they do, the most radical and innovative group

of the '70s by a street . . . sorry, strasse, Can included.

Their relative obscurity can be attributed wholly to their Howard Hughes avoidance of individual identity. In the anonymity stakes, Faust beat The Residents to the punch by several years.

Anyway, sod references to bands being important. Faust piss all over the lot of them, and their crappiest of material would demand five stars at the very least (I'm doing my best to be objective here).

So, an album of unreleased material. Gasp! To put 'Munic And Elsewhere' into context would take years, so I won't even attempt the impossible. Faust devotees will buy the record as a matter of course, and rather than recommending newcomers to pick up a copy I suggest they

buy the lot. Chronologically, this selection slots in between their Polydor and Virgin periods. The opening track, 'Munic/Yesterday', anticipates 'Krautrock' from the fourth album, building on monotony, an elusive art that Faust had thoroughly sussed. 'Munic/Other' verges on Can; 'We Are The Hallo Men' is a rap over backwards tape. And 'Baby' is an absolute classic, perfectly illustrating the lifeblood sense of humour so characteristic of this, er, important group.

RIO 'Sex Crimes' (Music For Nations MFN 65)\*\*\*1/2 THERE'S A bare-breasted woman on the LP's cover. And Rio mainstays Steve Rodford and Jon Neil are a pair of tits for agreeing to such a sleeve. I don't care what their reasons are, the effect it'll have will be the same regardless: all but the most thick-skinned of women will be miffed, and only a dork with a brain the size of a peanut wouldn't be embarrassed to pick it up.

Sex as a weapon? It'll backfire on Rio, and that's unfortunate. Unfortunate because, as 'I Don't Wanna Be The Fool' from their '85 debut 'Borderland' illustrated, they do have their moments. There are a number of them on 'Sex Crimes'.

As the cover suggests, this is an altogether more tough, brash and feisty record than 'Borderland', crisp at the edges and less prone to dreamy (dreary?) Americana. That said, 'Atlantic Radio' (about as subtle as FM, lads) flutters its eyelashes prettily and unashamedly at the export market.

The overall feel, though, is snappy, rocking, even thunderous, if a little clockwork in places – songs ticking over just to mark time ('Guilty' being just that). It's good, but is it good enough?

I hate to sound so dismissive about a band who have it in them to become semi-legendary at the very least, but Rio have brought it upon themselves by indulging in stock slobbering sexism. I only hope that this one, er, boob, won't be enough to put everybody off.

#### RIC OCASEK 'This Side Of Paradise' (Geffen Records 924 098-1)\*\*

ISN'T IT funny how all these rich old men, widely respected for their ability to shape moments of engaging and individual pop brilliance, still feel the need to prove something.

Usually they want to convince themselves of something, and too often their unremitting self indulgence takes the form of a solo career which attempts things it should not. Sting comes to mind, and Mick Jagger might if he had ever done anything halfway decent. I guess it's that something they call the male menopause.

Such solo projects can normally be relied on for a couple of good belly laughs at least as the rich and the ridiculous reveal their innermost ambitions. To be a serious jazz head or something. However, Ric Ocasek, the head Car, has quite modest ambitions, he just wants to be Talking Heads before they went doolally.

And so 'This Side Of Paradise' is neither more nor less than a map of some sparse and flat modernist pop terrain lying halfway between 'My Best Friend's Girl' and the Martian that lives inside David Byrne's brain.

#### RICHARD THOMPSON 'Daring Adventures'

(Polydor POLD 5202)\*\*\*\*/4
WHEN I was a wee laddie, the main source of musical entertainment on TV seemed to be a couple of Scottish folkies called Robin Hall and Jimmy McGregor, best remembered for their

legendary 'Football Crazy, Football Mad'. But they were also responsible for the mighty opus 'Donald, Where's Ye Troosers', and although I never thought this song would provide inspiration for one of the more refined talents of the last two decades, Richard Thompson's ditty 'Baby Talk' is a deadringer for the jocular

For a man seemingly so impervious to outside influences, 'Daring Adventures' is bursting at the seams with them, a meaty Stilton shot through with rich veins of various injected cultures. With Knopfler having successfully adopted/ adapted the Thompson guitar style, Dicky boy speeds up the cashing in of those IOUs. moving ever nearer to Dire Straits' dollar bill sound.

Jocks' classic.

The voice continues to mutate, though, and on 'Jennie' (one of his better ballads of recent years), he is Gordon Lightfoot. On the writing front, the old subconscious has taken hold, 'How Will I Ever Be Simple Again' bearing a clear resemblance to the Aussie classic 'And The Band Played Waltzing Matilda'.

So, lots of fun for Thompson spotters, but there are plenty of moments of pure authenticity from a man who is permanently heartbroken ('Long Dead Love', 'Lover's Lane' and 'Nearly In Love' hint at a preoccupation). A nearly very good record, which will probably improve with age. I think we're back to the Stilton again. . .

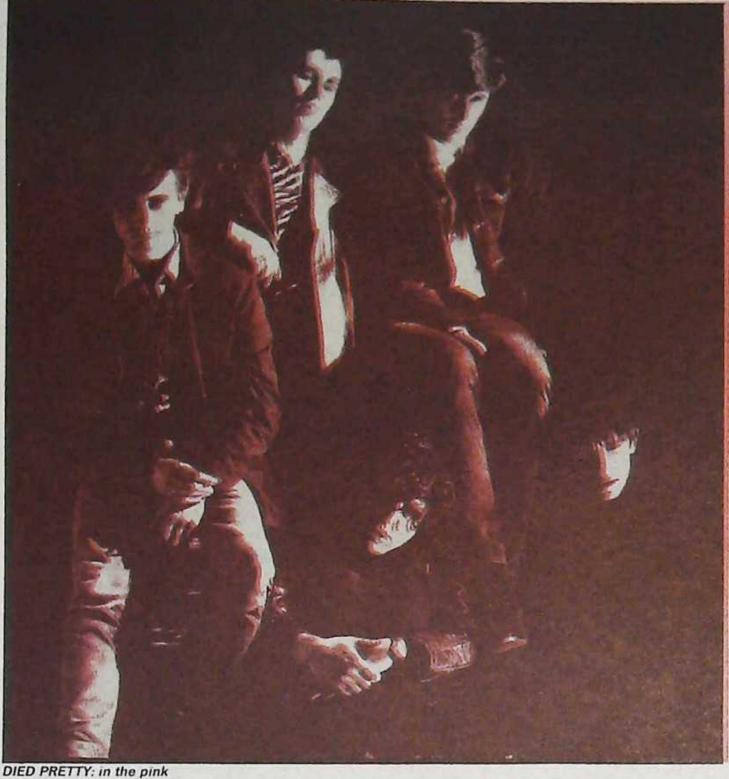
#### **VARIOUS ARTISTS** 'Tuatara' (Flying Nun FN 45)\*\*\*\*

AH, SO, now we've sucked Australia dry - drank their lager, danced to their music, eaten their Mighty White bread - New Zealand's slight variation on rock-encrusted pop is being laid bare for a prying eye or two to cast their attention over.

The Flying Nun label is operating in the UK from a shed near you and the sound of chanting eccentrics is hammering at the door. New Zealand, nuclear free and full to the brim with bustling, harmonious pop music.

There are 13 takes here, 12 moments of distinct charm and a vaguely similar sound (they probably all use the same amps). The standard is high and the names are just as silly as any new English hope. Get your listening tackle around The Clean, or The Chills who tripped out cordially on Creation some time back. Then there's The

DIED PRETTY 'Free Dirt' (What Goes On Records GOES ON 7)\*\*\*\*

DIED PRETTY are still potentially the greatest rock group to emerge from Australia in a kangaroo's life time. They've already had three Singles Of The Week in this very paper, so it was not unreasonable to anticipate that 'Free Dirt' would be one of the albums of the year in the no-contest category. But - at the moment of writing, this LP fails the acid test for various reasons. Jesus, I could cry.

It's not as if 'Free Dirt' is bad per se, far from it. But the thing utilises just a fraction of Died Pretty's gifts as exemplified by their superb EPs, 'Out Of The Unknown'/'Mirror Blues' and the prosaically titled 'Next To Nothing' which, paradoxically and poetically, encompassed everything that's uplifting, great and just damn rib-rippingly exciting about music.

The former was a typhoon of spittle harmonies and sulphuric guitar climaxes, the latter more subdued and ornate but still a fascinating journey into the possibilities of epic rockscapes. Both found Died Pretty working naturally outside the prevalent '80s blueprint of mono-melodic song construction and closer to a '60s sensibility where several different atmospheres are evoked within a single number.

That still holds for some of 'Free Dirt', only at times the structures carry excess baggage.

As a basic unit with the sneering serpentine vocals of Ronald S Peno, the meandering organ stream of Frank Brunetti, and the electrified quicksilver guitar of Brett Myers - all laid over a shimmering rhythm section - Died Pretty are perfectly armed and poised.

But, on this debut album, their textural tension is sadly undermined by sax, pedal steel, violin and other instruments, all of which make Died Pretty seem oddly trad at times by default. For instance, the mandolin on the opening track, 'Blue Sky Day', immediately conjures up echoes of The Faces' 'Maggie May', not a good thing.

As for the song compositions - lyrically, they are reactions against the modern world's raping of innocence, dreams, ideals and imagination (I think!) - there is a tendency towards tuneful sameyness, not a good thing either.

So much for the bad news, yet there are quite a few transcendent moments on 'Free Dirt' which bode well for the band's future, especially the spiralling hysteria of 'Just Skin' with its outcry "I'm so happy it scares me to death/I'm so soft I cannot exist". In fact all of side two is smart, so maybe the vinyl will figure as a permanent turntable fixture in 1986.

Either way it's early days yet for Died Pretty, who will be over here in November. I guess I just prefer them stripped down in the musical garage and going for broke like pyromaniacs in charge of a firework display, rather than being ostentatiously elegiac.

#### LINDA RONDSTADT 'For Sentimental

Reasons' (Asylum Records 960 474-1)\*\*\*\* QUITE CLEARLY, Linda Rondstadt is carrying a torch of her own. Not too far removed from Carly Simon's 'Torch', 'For Sentimental Reasons' is a reawakening of some classic songs, mostly of the torch variety, and it marks a collaboration between Rondstadt and the late great Nelson Riddle and his orchestra.

Indeed this is the last record Riddle - the genius behind gems as eternal as Sinatra's 'I've Got You Under My Skin' and Judy Garland's 'Zing! Went The Strings Of My Heart' - ever worked upon, and so I'm very glad to be able to report that the talented but fickle Yank superstar has not let him down.

Of course, with songs like Hoagy Carmichael's 'I Get Along Without You Very Well' (coincidentally one of the songs attempted by Carly Simon), the Gershwins' 'But Not For Me' and three from Lorenz Hart and Richard Rodgers ('Bewitched, Bothered And Bewildered', 'My Funny Valentine' and 'Little Girl Blue'), and with arrangements as timelessly beautiful as Riddle's, even Danielle Dax might have been expected to turn in a fairly decent performance. But still it has to be said that Linda Rondstadt sings out of her skin in this her very public love affair with this staggeringly grand material.

'For Sentimental Reasons' might not be quite as hip as The Shop Assistants or Swans, but if you smuggle it home inside your anorak you might just get a very pleasant surprise.

#### SOVIET FRANCE 'Misfits, Loony Tunes And Squalid Criminals' (Red Rhino REDLP67)\*\*\*\*\* 'Gesture, Signal, Threat' (Red Rhino REDLP67 A)\*\*\*\*

THE LEGEND of Soviet France is the antithesis of rock 'n' roll tradition. Here, three people from the far north make music that's different. To the horror of accepted values, they do not do interviews, they do not play live, they do not appear on TVam.

Soviet France do, however, sell healthy quantities of their releases to hungry consumers as far afield as the Californian wastelands and the European battlefields. In England, in Britain, they are just one more weirdo bunch with a daft name.

To say that they piss all

over Neubauten is the kind of low level rock jibe that doesn't suit. But it's true. They also make Throbbing Gristle and their myriad copyists sound as bland and unconvincing as time has made them.

Soviet France paint pictures without brush or canvas, they write books without words, and are totally straight in a world where surrealism is just another everyday yawn.

These two releases are an education. The first two parts of a seven piece collection (the former being an LP, the latter a cassette of out-takes), these delights are just a progression in their lives which are littered with albums clothed in metal, wood, tissue and clay. An evolution of sorts.

Arty? Pretentious? Maybe, but ultimately rewarding and one of the few outfits in this country with any lasting musical quality.

#### TOTO 'Fahrenheit' (CBS 57091)\*\*

#### LOOSE ENDS 'Zagora' (Virgin V2384)\*\*\*\*3/4

IT'S HARDLY surprising that Loose Ends only perform 'live' personal appearances. Any backing band would more than likely end up as zomboid mental cases after even the shortest of tours, as this band display all the

rhythm and variation of car windscreen wipers gently swaying during a long wet summer drive. The lyrical content doesn't exactly stretch the imagination either. Still, when you're in the groove ...

The secret of Loose Ends lies in the finest blending of male and female harmonies since the heyday of Shalamar, 'Zagora' continues in the same sensual vein as their two previous albums; indeed, their sound circa '86 is interchangable with their sound circa '82, only now it's more fashionable. Much of the material

appears to have been recycled. The current hit single 'Slow Down' is little more than a clone of last year's shimmering sex-soul stunner 'Hanging On A String'. While the final track, 'Rainbow', despite its mutation into a '40s style jazz big band sound via 'Take The 'A' Train', owes its lyrical hook to the early 'In The Sky' single.

But who's complaining? Peckham's finest have a distinctive sound that's all their own, and they're fast becoming a major force in the progressive march across the airwaves of homegrown black British soul.

A CERTAIN RATIO 'Force' (Factory

Records FACT 166)\*\*\*/2

SOMEWHERE WITHIN the spongy underbelly of A Certain Ratio, there are urges. The flabby excesses of jazz-funk have never been so savaged, and, in the process, a swishing arm waves wildly at radio airplay in a valiant attempt to dislodge Level 42's crown.

Manchester's former mutant soulboys are at yet another turning point. Captured over eight tracks is the current flux, the leftfield delights and the MOR workouts.

In a sense, A Certain Ratio are still so much more than ordinary. The new single, 'Mickey Way', is an '80s conversion of their healthiest, most experimental tones, while other tracks uncover those commercial desires that say: yes, if A Certain Ratio were not steeped in Factory-ness, if they were not rife with past cred, they would surely be radio and chart contenders with no less than half the tracks here.

Part of the Uncertain Ratio, however, is where they go next. But, for now, in 'Force' they at least have an excellent album which straddles the crazy world of compact discs while still retaining something of the mystery that asks what they're doing with their other

A Certain Ratio know where the right place is and they know how to put the right noise there. 'Force' is a powerful statement that breaks free of the urban dancefloor sound and hammers hard on the big league committee door.

Purist BOFs (like myself) may hate it, but still they can't deny the potential. Unassuming Yuppies should investigate.

## GREEN PARTY

THE MEN THEY COULDN'T HANG 'How Green Is The Valley' (MCA MCF 3337)\*\*\*\*\*

OH, THE memories that the front of this sleeve evokes scenic green landscapes, the kind I was dragged yearly to in Wales for childhood hols. And on the back a mill, remember them? Ah, bliss! Playing this record, I can smell the cowpat splattered daffodils and feel the heat of working men in the mills. The Men They Couldn't Hang work damn hard to take you to pastures new. And whether those pastures be Irish, Welsh or Scandanavian 'tis of no matter, it's a pleasurable journey anyway.

Off they go, marching through a tale of the British unions, 'Ghosts Of Cable Street', skipping to 'Dancing On The Pier' and merrily knee-slappin' their way along. Flip over and it's even faster, even jollier and there's 'Shirt Of Blue', their latest single, a singalong song if ever I heard one, but then most of their ditties provoke some kind of audience participa-

Another thing: although TMTCH play rather frisky music. their lyrics are often meaningful or serious, a good combination. They are also excellent musicians. 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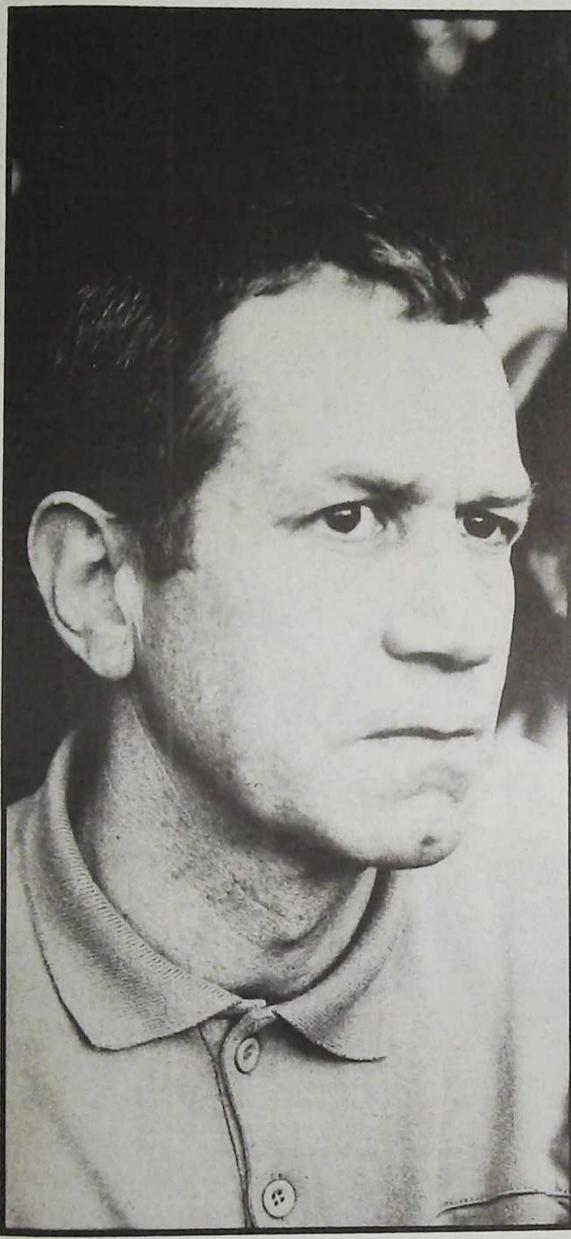
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## CRASSEA MILIANT



A serious Penny Rimbaud

Two years ago CRASS couldn't decide whether to blow up the country or grow cabbages fortunately for the Tory Tyrants, they chose the latter. NEIL **PERRY** and **HUGH FIELDER** find out what they have been up to since 1984. Photo by GREG

FREEMAN

N A beautiful old farmhouse in Essex, surrounded by naked fields and towering trees, live Crass.

The band - who were once discussed in the House Of Commons, who consistently refused to have anything to do with 'the music business', and yet sold thousands of records - have spent the last two years of their lives trying to get a perspective on what they have and haven't achieved.

In their seven years between farming in the summer of '77 and their last gig in 1984, Crass became an unwilling legend. Their complete control over their records and their unbridled assaults on all things authoritarian made them the

reluctant leaders of an anarcho-punk movement that was about anything but leaders.

Some of the scams are also legendary.

Like the time a song called 'Our Wedding', from the Crass album 'Penis Envy', was given to the teenage readers of a romance rag called Loving. The song, by Creative Recording And Sound Services, was soon the excuse for much scandalous copy in the national dailies.

Or there was the 'Thatchergate Tapes', a fake conversation between Thatcher and Reagan (in which the former admits responsibility for the sinking of the Belgrano) put together by the band. The tape ended up in the US State Department in Washington DC and caused international media interest in "a bunch of punks"

Crass' response to Thatcher's behaviour during the Falklands War in the single, 'How Does It Feel To Be The Mother Of A Thousand Dead', resulted in her being asked in the House Of Commons if she had listened to the record.

And yet through all this, Crass remained in the background, heroes to their followers and a mysterious annoyance to the authorities. After years of being called leftists, rightists and many other ists, maybe they felt being enigmatic was the best answer.

Until last week, that is, when we arrived at the old farmhouse in Essex, at the band's invitation.

OME OBSERVATIONS: Crass seem tired; not sleepy tired but world-weary tired. Band members and friends come and go. We don't catch all the names but it doesn't really matter, because we've never before been in a group of people who are so obviously at one with each other. When one person speaks, it is safe to say that he or she is a common voice for all. Their desire to talk is great, almost urgent. And there are cats everywhere.

Why do you want to talk to the

music press now?

"For the last two years," starts Pete, the bassist, "we found out that what we were doing was more or less absorbed, outflanked, everything was containable. The choices seemed to be more and more extreme. . . or we could draw back and find out for ourselves what we were doing.

"We've been ... individually evaluating ourselves and everything that's going on."

Penny Rimbaud, the drummer,

"We naively thought we could draw things our way. A lot of people thought that at first, but not many hung on to that as a principle."

But you did.

"Yes, yes, but what we imagined was that through the example. . . believed, two years in, that the whole independent thing could be totally free-flowing, that it would control and command the music industry. It did appear as if it was possible at that time. But bit by bit, we increasingly found ourselves

"The isolation was not on our part; we genuinely wanted to share our ideas, but we didn't want them distorted and we were very rigid about that.

"We've always made this place available, open to anyone, but we didn't want to promote this as a lifestyle, it would be very easy to pick up on. It has been a self-sufficient organisation for years, it's a certain way of life. Not necessarily the best or one that is adaptable and manageable for a lot of people."

But it has often been the selfsufficient, commune existence of Crass which has been one of the main points of interest to a lot of people.

"Yes, it has, but I think that's because if you put forward very strong principles people want to see whether or not you operate them. In terms of the letters we get - such as, How do you plant cabbages? - they were honestly replied to, as we know how to plant cabbages.

"But we were very lucky. This place has been operating for 20 years. We rent it still, very cheaply, and it's not privileged, just very fortunate. We've done handouts on cooking and bread making, but in all honesty, it's not a practical way of life to promote, so we do stuff on how to squat and other areas.

"We didn't want people copying us; we were saying, Ask yourself this, or, Why do you do that. None of our records said, 'don't'. It was the bands who became known as the 'Crass bands' who shouted, Don't eat meat!"

EA IS supplied, a new round of cigarettes are lit, and the responsibility that Crass felt reveals itself.

"There's a fundamental problem in making strong statements," says Pete, "which is also to communicate to people the considerations that you'd make having those statements."

"If you're promoting action, which we did do," continues Penny, "you always have to think it isn't to people so like ourselves to whom we're promoting, we're talking to young kids, maybe 13-year-olds. There was an awful lot of covert suggestion in what we did, increasingly militant and increasingly covert. As we became more specific, we also had to become broader. Everything had to be phrased differently. We didn't want 12-year-old kids going bananas on their estate or whatever, because we know the consequences.

"That's always the big question, can rock and roll be political? And, ultimately, when it comes to action it can't be. On a one-to-one basis it's fine, but when you're talking to thousands, as we were, you have to be bloody careful. The downfall of the whole anarcho-punk thing was that it had to, at some point, become rhetorical. We sloganeered as a covert activity, there's no other way of doing it unless you're going to put people in the shit."

To an extent, isn't that almost playing the game you despise?

"Yes. When things became very serious politically with the Falklands and the miners' strike, it wasn't surprising that the band started seriously questioning itself. The fact that we were more involved in rock and roll became obvious. It was about that time we realised we were compromising, we had to.

"If we had kept going in the same way," sighed Pete, "what we would have been putting out was a call to arms. The logical conclusion to what we were doing was to go all out."

Penny: "We were put in the position where we either started going around shooting people down, bombing activities or whatever, or we backed off. We went through a great deal of dialogue."

"Crass became 'the word'," says a woman called Ge Sus, or simply G, who does Crass' artwork. "Everyone waiting for the next direction, and that's not what we wanted. There's a demand to make the same statement over and over again until you can hear your own voice and you're saying it like a parrot. There was nothing wrong with what I was saying, it wasn't enough any more.

The conviction wasn't there? "Oh, I had the conviction but I

wanted to take it a step further. The band had spoken on a certain area as well as anyone could, but we personally needed to shift, not away from it, but to another level. We had

to stop to find what it was."

Penny takes up the drift.

"We've been bathing our wounds, helping each other, and specifically looking to ourselves. If you care, and that's the reason you do something, you can't stop, you want to give, give, give. In the case of Crass, because it inevitably got involved with finance, we gave all that away and that f\*\*\*ed us up, but that doesn't matter. I wanted to bleed to show that we

"The hardest truth is that if people say what's happened over the past ten years hasn't worked, then it's their fault. I say it hasn't worked and I believe it is my fault, not because I'm one of the spokespeople of Crass, but because I'm a spokesperson of this planet. It isn't because the state's more powerful, it's because our bloody answers aren't good enough."

But if Crass was about spreading ideas then you almost have to lead to be a focus.

"That's absolutely true, but as we had to narrow down, it created divisions, the individual differences. Within Crass there were the militants and the non-militants, so it became increasingly more difficult saying, Smash the state when half the group didn't want to smash the state in that way. We never made any statement that wasn't from us, and it became difficult to do that."

So after two years' analysis. . .? "It's been an attempt to find a practical expression for some of the ideas," Penny answers. "One of the band has been working for the Samaritans, some of us are producing food. It's a return to finding ways to directly help one or two people. The best I can do at the moment is to make myself physically

But you're not disillusioned?

"Disillusionment doesn't come into it," says G. "It's knowing what more you can give. I needed to know that I was of use to somebody rather than this long distance thing. Hundreds of letters come in, all these people sitting in their houses and nothing connecting."

But surely all the people you've reached with your records is some sort of return?

"It is in its own way," agrees Penny, "but it's not good enough. It was spectacular, given the principles with which we operated and the manner which we operated in; it was unbelievable. But with the big gigs towards the end, we were Crass and they were the audience. That's not to demean all the people there, obviously not, but we weren't touching people anymore.

"People have been waiting years for us to 'sell out'. We didn't have a holiday for eight years because we were worried that someone might f\*\*\*in' see us getting on the boat, and I'm serious. It wrecked us."

N A practical and emotional level, Crass gave all they could, and it took its toll. There are a hundred questions we didn't ask, and a thousand valid points which there isn't space to print.

As Crass, bruised but not broken, say themselves, This is not the end, but the beginning.

#### **NICK CAVE AND THE** BAD SEEDS Kentish Town Town And Country Club

CRASH BASH smash, ole Nick's in town again. Nick the Devil singer, with the weird pinched features and the oily rag hair. Is he really as dark and hollow as his name implies?

Nick's a star, and that's a fact, because his mere physical presence makes people scream. And it was good to see him on a stage again, good to see that body jack-knifed over the mike, to hear that Melbourne growl.

But there's a problem, if you let it worry you (I do, I do). And that is. . . Nick and women. He doesn't like them, so it seems. Is he really the murderous, morbid misogynist with a nice line in tunes? (He has said he doesn't hate women, he just wants "to do violence to them". This does not help.)

Think about this in your own time, because Nick the star was shining tonight. The Bad Seeds' noise is sharper, still loose but no longer collapsing in disarray, easy rather than lazy. Cave's voice married to a crashing piano chord is brutally beautiful, and there was a moment, one of those moments when he stood in the spotlight, hand outstretched, cigarette smoke spiralling towards the ceiling, when you thought: oh, yes. . .

It is safe to say Cave is an obsessive (if I had a guid for every time he sang the word 'she', I wouldn't be here now). He plunges deep, that's for sure, sometimes too violently deep for me to handle, but just you try and work out what's going on behind those bloodhound eyes. Just try not to be thrilled to the core by the way he delivers Johnny Cash's 'The Singer' or 'From Her To Eternity'.

Nick Cave And The Bad Seeds are a bastardised blues spectacle, one of a kind. Listen to the man's words, if only to avoid living with so much pain.

#### WHITNEY HOUSTON Wembley Arena

I WAS there.

Is it Forster's The Longest Journey in which the play the characters are watching is so fine and intense it makes him temporarily forget that She's by his side? This is clearly the ultimate response a stage performer can aspire to induce. Whitney creams it.

Houston's first ever British entrance (think Sinatra, Minelli, Ross, think higher than Jackson) is surprising and other-worldly even without a turquoise hurricane. A revolving stage in the centre of the aircraft hanger trembles as lights and then feet touch it. The feet are really something. Above the feet is a dress made of Cointreau, and in this dress is a body made of mint Matchmakers, and from this body there flies a voice of milk and honey and embers. So you don't understand this. So you weren't there.

Whitney Houston, confident, self-possessed but without the folly of excessive ego, renders 'Wanna Be Startin' Somethin" white-hot before an insatiable band, and then edges contrast

round the sides of your neck with 'Eternal Love'. She has won after minutes. Essentially, 'How Will I Know?' is a straightforward question, but 'Saving All My Love For You' and 'Someone For Me' are diffidently revamped. which at this level is structural anarchy. Yes, 23-year-old Whitney has claws.

The Iull into Reaganism for gospel and 'The Greatest Love Of All' is balanced by the moist duets with her elder brother on 'Hold Me' and 'Nobody Loves Me Like You Do', wherein stealth is all. During the new single, 'All At Once', a monitor buzzes. I expect someone lost their job because of that; in a morally pure universe, they would be executed without right of appeal.

Whitney herself - there in the dazzling middle, frail but way beyond weakness proves to be a professional and a wisp, all guts and lilacs, slender energy and fluid poise. It's Broadway and Beelzebub, a shining and a shadow, a shivery kick then and now. One more breath and the future is hers.

I was there, and I'm not coming down.

#### MARC ALMOND

**London Palladium** WELCOME TO Sunday Night At The London Palladium. Welcome to the Soho Jazz Festival. And welcome, if you will, Marc Almond!

I've always felt some sort of proprietary interest in Marc Almond. My girlfriend's brother used to sit in the desk behind him at school, and was almost certainly one of those who made his early days such a confounded misery. And when I found my way over the Pennines to Leeds, I discovered that one of my friends there used to room immediately beneath him. Mere coincidence you may say, but I say what the hell, it makes for a good intro.

Anyway, if it's Jazz Week in Soho, Marc Almond is here under false pretences because his show is no more 'jazz' than you or I. For one thing, Marc's show is interesting! And for another, it's based around pretty much the same sound as his last two 12-inch singles. That may be a trumpet held tight and played hard at the back of the stage, but even so, the sound of that trumpet is no more than one more prop in the extravagant and eccentric theatre that is Marc Almond these days.

His voice is vastly improved - strong, demonstrative and often genuinely stunning and he knows it. And in flaunting it so, he comes close to spoiling the party. At times, there is neither need nor justification for the extraordinary embellishment he loves to give his lines.

A tendency to overact apart, Marc Almond (tonight the Gene Kelly sailor as played by Liza Minellil) is superb! His songs are now quite blatantly music hall vaudeville torch epics, his heart strings are plucked for all they are worth, and his control of both his material and his audience is almost beyond criticism.

Who else (except perhaps Ivor Biggun, and I think he played it for laughs) could close his act with so overt a paean to self-pleasure as 'Madam Fist'? And who else could cope so well with the grandiose histrionics and melodrama of a song like the excellent 'Saint Judy'? Marc Almond: the 'lady' is a tramp.

But that's all in the past. The whole thing barely lasted a fortnight but blow me if it wasn't every bit as worthwhile and historymaking as the Pistols. More so in fact, because the Pistols were, of course, just a rock 'n' roll band whereas Sputnik, mate. . . Sputnik wore shiny costumes! Sputnik were all echoey! Sputnik got arrested! Twicell

So here we are, a threequarters packed Royal Albert Hall. A less impressive turnout than last year but still not too bad considering the lads haven't done anything worth mentioning for nearly half a decade.

And they're not bad either. There's millions of TV screens and loads of bouncy bosoms, and all these futuristic images flickering on and off, off and on, on and off. And the boys have got all the gear on with (yes!) the hair sticking up, it's really great. They're looking dead pleased with themselves, just like the old days.

Down the front, the hardcores go mental and security men squabble over earplugs; those without protection get their ears mashed. It is fun, it is novel, but without the setting of a world in fear of its children's lives, the whole thing is entirely meaningless, a private party. Who cares?

#### **BIG FLAME** Manchester Saturday Club

BIG FLAME'S last concert ever. There's something very noble about suicide, and financial suicide is what Big Flame have always been about. No T-shirts or badges, no rip-offs and no encores: commercial naivety but artistic integrity. Financial bloody suicide.

For ten seconds of their existence, Big Flame ease up. They splutter some verbal Manchester hip hop, commandeering Redd & The Boys' 'Moving And Groovin" and turning it into 'Highway To Hulme'. They allow themselves 'Janie Jones' sliced into their own 'Debra', and then dish out the sort of weedy non-quips that a band who've been moving so fast they either can't remember what they were once about or can but don't care - would trifle with.

It wasn't planned but it didn't take long to become obvious. Instead of nipping life in the bud Mishima style, Big Flame were going out struggling, slow, witless and slack. Alan kickstarted his bass, rolled his mouth around his vocals and never looked back at the set list again.

The mighty Mancunian minimalist jazz punksters took it all to the shredding machine and didn't even stop to say Goodbye. In it went, the tension, the excitement, the anger, and the arguments. Too many nights in cold empty vans, too many interviews arguing the toss. Depression and aggression. This was art, not rock 'n' roll, and they were wrong to misunderstand that.

Big Flame could have been Test Dept, they could have been Graham Greene, but they weren't. They were Big Flame and they played some pretty groovy industrial crush funk, and this was their last concert. Ever.

THE GREATEST story ever told could well be 'Lady Waters And The Hooded One'. Tonight it's the encore and time is tight, so Robyn Hitchcock recites it in the manner beloved of racing

#### PETER CASE **Euston Shaw Theatre**

PETER CASE is this season's representative of that most doggedly resilient of breeds, the singer-songwriter, the god of Yuppie music. From a gold mine, first opened up by the great sham Dylan, was struck the heavyweight crown for which a succession of contenders have slugged it out down the years. Is Case an undeserving winner, like Bruce Springsteen; or is he an undeserving loser, like John Prine? ("Who?" asks our youthful readership, but this dude generated reams of newsprint in his day.) On this evidence, I haven't a clue.

The man is sometimes accompanied by two or three musicians who play with their volume controls set on two or three (even the percussionist), in order that we may hear the lyrics (a Yuppie preoccupation). But as the vocal delivery slurs and contorts many lines into near incomprehensibility, you need to know the lyrics beforehand, which rather defeats the object

However, the best song of the evening, 'Walking Woods', is performed solo, just an acoustic guitar and a harmonica, passion signified by knock-knees and pigeon toes. With his lank hair, glasses, scruffy suit and half-mast tie, Case looks like a vounger version of Denholm Elliott in any role - hardly the rock and roll archetype.

His is a set of an assured quality, with much to like, bits and bobs to admire, little to love. He holds a few nifty tricks up his sleeve, but in comparison to L Wainwright and R Thompson battle-scarred losers who hold a minor slam of trump cards of pain, anguish and humour between them - Case is still at the novice stage.

Case goes with Kinnock, Costello and Ben Elton as an acceptable Yuppie accessory, and so I find myself drifting off and dreaming of watching Hogan's Heroes on the video. Curses! I'm a Yuppie too!

A HARD rock act without any breast-beating, bullshit or banality? A rarity for sure, and when one does bubble up to the spotlit surface, it's almost too good to be true. But not too good to be Magnum.

Two nights into the tour at Guildford, they were so good that I felt that there was nothing left to add, that it couldn't really be bettered Yet \*he Manchester show proved me wrong, a bigger spectacle though equally intimate, more polished though never smugly slick.

Sure, we've all got our own little notion of what Magnum are like, and before 'On A Storyteller's Night' broke the ice. I too fell in line with the popular opinion that they were all pastoral pomp and frothy, folky flatulence. That idea's as out of date as most people think Magnum are.

What's made these old criticisms redundant is an album called 'Vigilante' and a virtue called fortitude. Magnum have the will to succeed, and the key to a fruitful future sparkles clearly in Tony Clarkin's dab songwriting hand.

Live, it hits home still harder. 'All England's Eyes', 'Arrow', 'When The World Comes Down'...these are great songs, no ifs and buts, great songs, full of grit, guile and emotion and none of the usual crotch-stuffing vanity of modern day (pah!) metal. With luck, Magnum could

become almost as popular as they deserve to be.

#### PAUL ELLIOTT THE APARTMENTS/ THE POPPIES

**Oval Cricketers** TWEE POP is dead. Long live hard, menacing, vivacious, strident, heavy pop.

The Poppies aren't exactly the sort of band I'm looking for. They're too nice by far. But their abrasive backing guitars and interesting melodies make them difficult to decipher. They're awkward, and while this may be down to their apparent lack of self-confidence, when they do manage to shine out they can be a bit of a minor revelation.

The outstanding brilliance of the night, however, belongs to The Apartments, who have managed to pull various Moodists, Go-Betweens and Bad Seeds out from their bedsits to witness their refined pop composure.

The Apartments have sophisticated songs that are instantly likeable, which is unusual for an Australian band. The vocalist displays an emotional intensity that's uncluttered by ambiguity in a cover of Charlie Pride's 'Everyday I Wake Up With You'. The Apartments' textures are rich with all sorts of possibilities.

And yet everyone is dancing, the walls are soaked in energy and there's a definite buzz in the air.

My Bloody Valentine are exciting, energetic, noisy and fun, usually. They're psychopathic, homicidal, suicidal (in more ways than one) and frequently loud. My Bloody Valentine are also unimaginative, repetitive and shallow, always. They're ultimately rubbish because all they do is make a mighty juicy racket that grows into a hollow, uneducated din, only fit for the garages it has so obviously emerged from.

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Signal processors get smarter by the minute, and Roland's DEP-5, with four simultaneous FX on offer, is the smartest of the lot. Cheap, too, adds Julian Colbeck

#### **ROLAND DEP-5 DIGITAL EFFECTS PROCESSOR £675 QQQ VVV**

SIGNAL PROCESSORS seem to have taken over from keyboards as the fastestchanging area of business nowadays. Only a while ago, we were all stunned into silence by the Yamaha REVs 1 and 7, then it was the SPX 90, then the Midiverb.

Well now it's the DEP-5 from Roland.

Signal processing - and here I am really talking simply about delays and reverb - has come a long way in no time at all. From units that offered a mere one or two settings to mega units that offer almost unlimited potential, we then quickly moved along to units like the SPX 90 that, in themselves, were capable of functioning as several devices. But Roland have gone one better with the DEP-5, since it is capable of functioning as several devices simultaneously - a feat that no other signal processor can match, as of today anyhow.

The 'devices' or effects in question are reverb, delay, chorus, and parametric EQ. The big two here are of course reverb and delay indispensable items for home studioite and pro alike now that such luxuries have become generally affordable.

And Roland's imaginative powers have indeed extended beyond this already



excellent basic concept of multi-effectism. The system for accessing and tweaking all the DEP-5's features has been designed with perfect regard for practicality. In short, Roland have come up with an ideal marriage of precise digital and userfriendly analog controls.

On the front panel, you are first greeted by a row of colourful rotary controls, some of which have dual functions. To edit almost any parameter, you simply tweak the relevant control and value changes then flash up momentarily on the pretty blue screen (ie no delving deep into the hidden software to make simple changes). If, on the other

hand, you really want to spend time on a parameter value change, then a 'value' button can be pushed and whichever parameter you're working on will appear permanently on the screen. This might all sound a bit long-winded but in practice, such a system is a Godsend.

And so on to some of the specific workings of the DEP-5. Although I'm quite sure most people will make quite sufficient use of the 99 'patches' that arrive in the machine not to bother learning how to program multi-effects of their own (and why not, I guess), Roland again have made user programming about as easy as it can ever get.

The best way to start is to choose an algorithm. What? Gasp! Algorithms? Don't panic, all you have to do is choose which combination of effects you want to be dealing with. Do you want, say, non-linear (gated) reverb with delay, or maybe just EQ with reverb? Well, you simply twirl the click-stopped algorithm control to the chosen combination. There are eleven to choose from.

The reverb part of the DEP-5 is wide ranging, quiet, and courtesy of the dedicated knobs for jobs, easy to fool around with. Three controls look after pre delay, reverb time, and high frequency damp (controlling gate time). All manner of reverb types

seem possible, from large auditorium and long hall (as opposed to haul) plate settings, to a whole range of room types - kitchen (not joking), small bright room, large bright room, tiled room etc. Since the DEP-5 uses high spec 16 and 28 bit processing, I suppose it isn't surprising to hear real quality in this unit.

The best compliment I can pay to such a device is that no matter how unknowingly you fool around with the controls, almost everything you alight upon sounds bloody great. The same goes for the endless range of chorusing and modulation effects on hand. Leslie effects, flanging,

harmonising, regular doubling . . . none are a

problem to find or work. And let's not forget EQ. Easy to dismiss at times, EQ-ing of effects can be as important as the effect itself. With three bands to tackle, the DEP-5 may not rival the fancy-schmancy dedicated parametric equalisers but it certainly helps you tailor your effects to an extent unknown on most dedicated delay or reverb machines.

Although there is storage for some 99 combination settings, a full compliment of 128 MIDI programs can be used, and of course you can externally manoeuvre patches via any 16 MIDI channels.

I could ramble on about endless details but I think it is more relevant to talk about why such a unit must be listened to. The DEP-5 simply has too many applications to be ignored. Any instrumentalist is quids in with this one. No home studio should be without it. No PA (for pub, club, or hall) will be complete without it, and well, what more do you want?

When you add up the cost of buying, say, a good DDL, a digital reverb, and maybe even a small parametric, you are going to be way above the cost of the DEP-5. Then add in the time you will undoubtedly save since the device is so damned easy to use, toss in rack-space saved for good measure and it all adds up to an irresistible proposition.

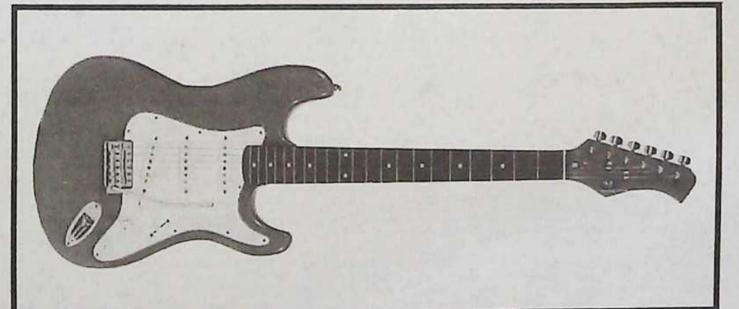

Body shape, pick-ups, controls and hardware follow the familiar Strat configuration, and a fulcrum tremolo is part of the package. Finishes include a Racing Orange (above) very reminiscent of '50s styling, and JHS points out that the substantial weight of these guitars is testament to the quality of timbers available in

Meanwhile, JHS' Encore brand receives a couple of additions in its 'upmarket' price bracket of around £150. Under the name

Hunter, these Strat-type guitars feature sophisticated electronics and choice of chrome or black parts at £149 and £159 respectively.

Pick-up configuration is two single coils and a high output humbucker at the bridge. Each pick-up has its own on-off mini-toggle and the humbucker features a coil-tap and a rotary resonant frequency control, which acts as a normal passive tone control when coiltapped, but as a resonant frequency shifter when humbucking.

The two single coil pick-ups have a common tone control, and a master volume pot governs the overall output level.

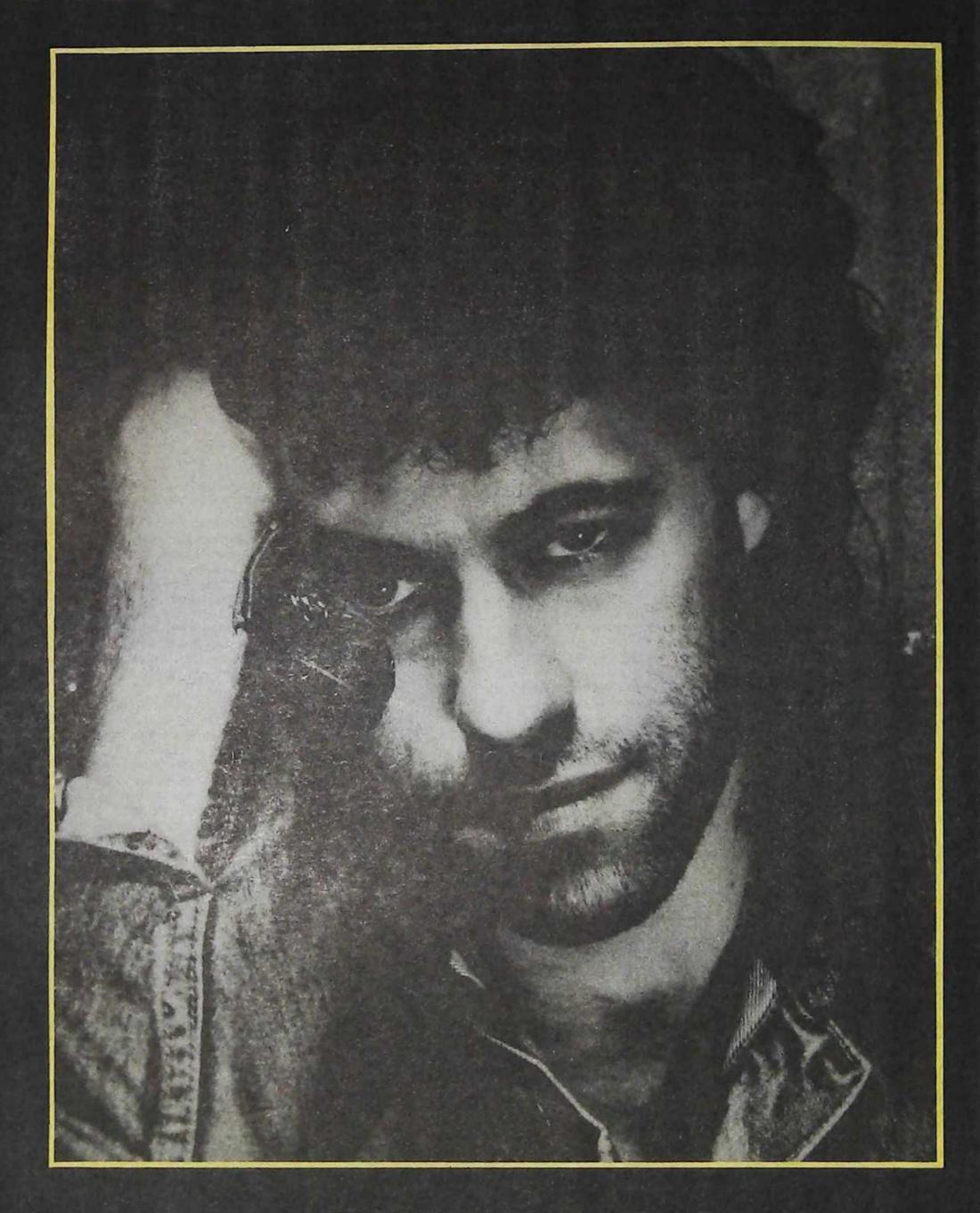
