DUCKS DELUXE, pub rock pioneers from the '70s, have reformed for another sortie round the London circuit, which just happens to coincide with a compilation coming out on RCA called 'Don't Mind Rockin' Tonite'.

Founder members Martin
Belmont (later with The
Rumour, Elvis Costello, Nick
Lowe's Cowboy Outfit and
Highway Patrol), Sean Tyla
(The Tyla Gang and The
Force) and Micky Groome
(The Nashville Teens, Joan
Jett, The Force and Psychic
TV to name but a few) are
joined by drummer John
Clark.

They kick off at Hackney Lord Cecil October 31, and then play Fulham Greyhound November 1, Fulham King's Head 5, Putney Half Moon 7, Harlesden Mean Fiddler 8, Finchley Torrington 9, Herne Hill Half Moon 13, Camden Dingwalls 14, Croydon Cartoon 16.

BAD COMPANY have reformed – without vocalist Paul Rodgers.

Guitarist Mick Ralphs, drummer Simon Kirke and bassist Boz Burrell have teamed up with former Ted Nugent vocalist Brian Howe, and release an album on Atlantic this week called 'Fame & Fortune' (see review – page 25), produced by Keith Olsen and Foreigner's Mick Jones.

The band have started playing dates in America but there's no news of a British tour as yet.

QUEENSRYCHE, the Seattle rockers, fly in for three dates with Bon Jovi on their British tour this month.

They'll be playing a solo warm up date at Burton-On-Trent Central Park on November 23 before joining Bon Jovi at Hammersmith Odeon 24-25 and Bradford St George's Hall 26.

THERE WILL be an "organised" solstice ceremony at Stonehenge next year.

English Heritage, which looks after the stones, has promised to allow a ceremony, although it is standing firm against any kind of pop festival.

Chairman Lord Montague said at a press conference last week that English Heritage were pleased that the "violent confrontation which marred the 1985 solstice at Stonehenge was avoided.

"Next year we plan to have the monument open to an orderly one-day solstice ceremony which will be completely separate from any idea of a pop festival."

But the vexed question of where a pop festival could be sited within reasonable distance of Stonehenge has still to be resolved. The festival has been banned for the last two years at a cost of over £2.5 million to Wiltshire ratepayers.

HARD ROADS

Frankie Goes To Hollywood set to tour Britain in January

FRANKIE GOES TO HOLLYWOOD, who crashed straight into the album charts at number three this week with 'Liverpool', will be touring Britain in January — two years since their last shows here.

The band have been promoting their album and 'Rage Hard' single around Europe, and will be playing live for the first time since their last tour on this Friday's edition of *The Tube*.

They have a new single out on ZTT next weekend, 'Warriors Of The Wasteland', taken from their album.

Dates confirmed for their British tour so far are at Manchester G-Mex Centre January 10, London Wembley Arena 12-13, Birmingham National Exhibition Centre 22.

Tickets are £9 and £8 available from the box offices. Wembley tickets are also available by post from Mac Promotions, PO Box 2, London W6 0LQ. Add 50p per ticket booking fee and enclose a stamped addressed envelope.

More dates are likely to be added to this schedule, including a hometown gig.

Kate's Compilation...



KATE BUSH, who releases a new single this week called 'Experiment IV' (see review – page 13) has a compilation album out on EMI next weekend called 'The Whole Story'.

It includes the new single plus a remixed version of her 1978 number one 'Wuthering Heights', which has a newly recorded vocal. The video compilation follows shortly.

BILL DRUMMOND, the man behind Echo And The Bunnymen and The Teardrop Explodes, bows out of the music business with his first album on Creation this week called 'The Man'.

Drummond, a member of that seminal Liverpool band Big In Japan (with Holly Johnson), founder of Zoo Records, and manager of the Bunnymen and the Teardrops before becoming an A&R consultant at WEA, describes the album as "the undisciplined emotional rush of a man hitting his mid-30s".

It was recorded live at Newton Stewart in Galloway, a town not best known for its rock and roll connections until now, and features most of The Triffids and a host of backing musicians. confirmed the London dates for their British tour. They'll be playing two nights at Kentish Town Town And Country Club November 16 and 17 followed by Kilburn National Ballroom on the 18th. Support is Dif Juz plus one other band.

They also have an extra provincial date at St Austell Cornish Leisure Centre on November 14.

The Twins' collaboration with American planist Harold Budd achieves vinyl status next weekend with an album on 4AD called 'The Moon And The Melodies'.

The album was recorded in the spring after they'd met up during an American tour last year. Simon Raymonde also makes an appearance on Budd's own new album, 'Lovely Thunder', which was released by EG (through Virgin) last week.

THE MISSION, already flushed by the chart success of their 'Stay With Me' single, now have the pleasure of adding another London show at Kilburn National Ballroom on November 25 because their Kentish Town date on the 2nd has sold out.

SIMPLE MINDS have the song they premiered at last year's Live Aid – 'Ghostdancing' – released as a single by Virgin this weekend.

The song will also be part of an Amnesty International album which will be released by Phonogram shortly.

UB40 have had to rearrange the Scottish dates on their upcoming tour because they've extended their visit to Russia. And they've also persuaded the Russian authorities to allow their audiences to get up and dance – something of a cultural/ideological breakthrough.

They now play Edinburgh Playhouse December 2-3 and Glasgow Barrowlands 5-6. They've also added Irish dates at Belfast Ulster Hall November 28 and Dublin RDS 29.

AFTER TONITE, a new Coventry band put together by former Specials and Fun Boy Lynval Golding, break cover after spending three years getting it together in a room above a pub.

They release a single this week called 'Time For A Change' on the newly formed IDK Records, which features another 2-Tone hero, Neville Staples.

They've also got a batch of dates lined up at Bath Moles November 7, Bristol Moon Club 8, Bradford College 13, Birmingham Aston University 14, Worcester College 15.

And they'll be making their London debut at a launch party for IDK at Charing Cross Players Theatre (Villiers Street) on November 17 with label-mate Matt Fretton.

They have one other date at Manchester Polytechnic on November 29.

IRON MAIDEN had to cancel

IRON MAIDEN had to cancel their Ipswich Gaumont date on October 18 after singer Bruce Dickinson went down with bronchitis.

He was warned to rest his voice for at least three days or risk ruining the entire British tour. In the event, he was able to continue two days later at Nottingham.

The band are unable to reschedule the Ipswich date because they are fully booked until next May. But they've promised to include the town on their next tour. Ticket holders leaving their names and addresses with the box office when collecting their refunds will receive a signed poster of the band, by way of an apology.

GHOST DANCE, who release a 12-inch version of their 'The Grip Of Love' indie hit this weekend on Karbon, with two new tracks on the B-side, have added more dates to their British tour at Huddersfield Polytechnic October 29, Leeds Warehouse 30, Brighton Polytechnic November 19, Portsmouth Polytechnic 20, Canterbury Kent University 21, Letchworth Plinston Hall 22.

They are also lined up to join Spear Of Destiny's Christmas rally at Hammersmith Palais on December 21.

Suzanne's Night Moves...



SUZANNE VEGA has added three more dates to her British tour next month at Norwich Anglia University November 20, Edinburgh Ulster Hall 24, Belfast New Vic 27.

She has a new single coming out on A&M this week called 'Gypsy' backed by a live version of 'Cracking'. The 12-inch will also have a live version of 'Night Moves'.

But her second album, 'Tom's Diner', will not now be out until early next year.

THE FEELIES, who've just broken a six-year silence by releasing an album on Rough Trade called 'The Good Earth', produced by R.E.M.'s Peter Buck, come over for a London concert this month.

The band, who haven't been heard of since their 'Crazy Rhythms' album on Stiff at the beginning of the '80s, will be playing University Of London Union on November 14, supported by antipodean outfit Died Pretty.

GIANT SAND and The Band Of Blacky Ranchette, who both come from Arizona and have new albums out on Zippo, both featuring Howe Gelb, return for a London concert at Harlesden Mean Fiddler on November 2.

THE FARM jump straight back in the saddle, following the death of their drummer Andy McVann in a car accident, with another batch of dates in support of their 'Some People' single and 'Pastures Old And New' compilation.

With a new drummer, not as yet named, they'll be playing Hull Adelphi October 31, Liverpool Polytechnic November 8, Sheffield University 13, London Covent Garden Rock Garden 14, Manchester Boardwalk 27, Leeds Duchess Of York December 5.

THE SCIENTISTS, whose newly recorded retrospective album 'Weird Love' finally comes out on Karbon this week after a couple of weeks delay because of pressing problems, have gigs at Fulham King's Head October 29 and Brighton Zap Club November 20.

But they'll be playing them without bassist Boris Sujdovic who has had to return to Australia. More dates are being lined up.

DOCTOR & THE MEDICS' London Hammersmith date on their British tour is on December 22 instead of the date given last week. And they're playing Manchester Ritz on the 23rd.

THE SHRUBS are at Carlisle Stars And Stripes November 14, Birkenhead Stairways 20, Retford Porterhouse 21, Bedford Contemporary Archives 22, Leicester Princess Charlotte 28. NEW ORDER, who begin an American tour this week, leave behind a remixed version of 'Bizarre Love Triangle' as a single on Factory this weekend.

FELA KUTI, out of prison and back on the road, comes in for a London gig at the Brixton Academy on November 20 as part of a European tour.

He'll be bringing in a 35piece band and so tickets are £7, but economies have been made – he's only bringing in five of his wives.

Fela has signed a deal with London Records and an album produced by Wally Badarou should be released early next year.

RALLY LOSES £25,000



Apartheid Movement is £25,000 down on the rally and Jerry is making a personal appeal to raise the shortfall.

that Sounds' recent survey on record companies' dealings with South Africa was inaccurate when it said that CBS records were no longer available there.

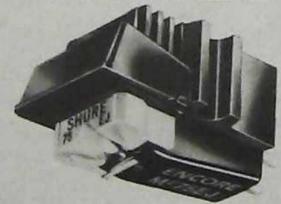
Although CBS is ending its trading links, South African distributor Gallo retains the right to sell CBS artists until their current contracts expire or are renewed.

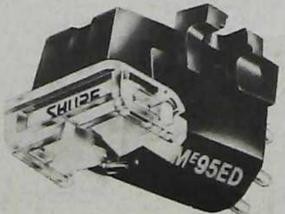

The album, available through Jungle and the Cartel, also features several bands from Davy Lamp's hometown, Harlow. The label was originally set up to raise money for the miners' strike and has decided to continue, switching its focus to South Africa.

Ronnie Randali gets an earful of The Larks' sweet birdsongs, compares them to The Fab Four and collapses as they ridicule poor Picasso's name, as if they can talk

"MOST STUDIO bands can't play live for shit."

Pardon?

"I said, who cares what we've got to say, how long we've been together or who our influences are? It's what we do and how we do it that matters. End of story!"

The Larks, a super six-pack of self-assured organisation on stage, disintegrate into a shambles of inefficiency under the mildest interrogation and the simplest of camera lenses.

They're a blustering blitzkrieg of blistering Staxarama, a live wire band on a rollercoaster to hell; and remember, the Devil has all the best tunes.

Considering the music business is increasingly a breeding ground for new, young film directors, designers and ad-men rather than new, young musical talent, The Larks are a revitalising elixir with sweat and performance mattering more than make-up and machines.

You can appreciate the boys' cynicism of a trade that ignores the phenomenal success of their non-stop

EYES DOWN for The Larks gigging in preference to the easy packaging of video-age pop pap.

Their legendary Marquee performances stir up a Rocky Horror atmosphere, with the whole (I swear) audience in tune with each nuance, each inflection of Tommy Barlow's dip and dive, duck and cover cartoon antics. Participation is simply unavoidable.

Forget the sub-Madness nonsense of their disappointing video for the self-released 'All Or Nothing Girl' single, because the frenetic tornado of enthusiasm they whip up live is a unique brand of evangelism all of their own.

But what of this political content in the lyrics?

"It's not a political thing, it's social. There are obvious rights and wrongs in society. We state the case, not the solution."

Forgive me, but the

football chant 'Maggie, Maggie, Maggie (Out, Out, Out)', flip side of the debut 'Billy Graham' single sounded like the problem and the solution to me, boys.

The Larks is an unfashionable name for a group, I suggest.

"It might be easier with a name like Fuzzbox or Half Man, but once the music gets through the name becomes irrelevant, simply a corporate identity. Look at Picasso, now that is a stupid name."

And so the Lark corporation marches on, no flim flam, just 100 per cent commitment, determination and belief. They may not sound quite as catchy as John, Paul, George and Ringo, but one day Pete, Mark, Dave, Phil, Eric and Tommy could be as familiar to you as The Fab Four, Mark my words, The Supa-Six, hot poop indeed.

SAXON GRAVES UNEARTHED

BUILDERS have uncovered ancient graves, possibly Saxon, on the edge of Epsom Downs

They were revealed on Friday when foundations were being excavated for sheltered accommodation for the elderly off Headley

Now experts from the Bourne Hall Museum, Ewell are at the site to see if there are further graves.

"There are no objects with the bodies, so they are difficult to date", said Steve Nelson, of the Nonsuch Antiquarian Society.

"They could be early Saxon - there are signs they're pre-Christian, but as they're in a group buried. east-west they could be Christian. It's hard to tell 3

This is not the first find in the area. Two years ago a group was found in Fir Tree Road and in 1929 there was an earlier discovery where many of the skeletons had objects with them identifing them as early Saxon about AD400.

SAXON WERE at the centre of a major architectual controversy recently according to a report in the Leatherhead And Dorking News. We knew that they were a bit long in the tooth but even we were relatively surprised by revelations about their formation date, AD400. Even Cliff Richard wasn't around then.

While on the subject of Saxon, we would like to draw your attention to a particularly disturbing development on the Biff Byford balonza front. BE A COMPLETE MUSIC BUSINESS BASTARD

Andy Hurt takes you on a guided tour of the music industry. pointing out the pitfalls and parasites, hereafter known as bastards

EVERYONE HAS read horror stories about the music business - the rip-offs, the exploitation, the double-dealing.

But it should be noted that it takes a mug to get ripped off, and it's not always the poor, defenceless bands that fall prey to the nefarious activities of others.

There's nothing to prevent bands from being unscrupulous, unprincipled and unpleasant thoroughly un, in fact. The main problem facing fresh-faced musicians is that they generally start at square one without knowing the rules of the game and you need to know the rules intimately to be able to bend them effectively.

But if you've got something others want, and providing you never autograph any of their wads of photocopied A4, you can have the rules explained to you as you go along, and then you call the shots.

Contracts are psychological say "we have qualified people at our beck and call who actually understand all this bilge and you are but tiny fish in a big sea and there are thousands more where you came from".

New Order have done alright without (so legend has it) ever signing anything, and without having to take the major route. But we're talking real bastards here, and friends and fans are easy meat when it comes to doing the dirty.

A new band's first encounter with the ranks of the professional bastard usually comes during the course of playing gigs.

In my experience, the majority of promoters are as straight as a die, but you have to take them on their word as to the evening's takings, since it's impossible to estimate the size of an audience with any degree of accuracy.

Your manager could possibly sort out such problem areas, but then it's always possible he'll pocket a slice of the proceedings anyhow! It is worth noting here that having a manager you can trust might get you precisely nowhere, since it helps to fight bastards with bastards - and it's better the devil you know . . .

Perhaps the most impenetrable area of the business for the newcomer is publishing, or to give it its official title, money for old rope. The attitude of most acts when offered a publishing deal is "how much can we screw them for?" as though swiping a few grand up front is a coup as audacious as The Great Train Robbery.

But these guys don't hand out

any money for nothing, and it should be realised that the only way publishers and record companies stand to lose in a big way is by an act flopping. Though it is to be assumed that the act intends to succeed and make money, and that this is the reason for the dangling of those juicy five-figure carrots.

The complete bastard publisher will angle for an overthe-odds percentage deal over as many years as can be wangled out of the saps, in exchange for a down payment of a few big ones. A better move for the sap is to tout around and force the best possible deal.

Of course, unlike performing royalties (which are divided equally between band members), publishing is due to the songwriter. The songwriter of a band can take the view that - as part of a group - he should share the royalties with his colleagues, or perhaps take a slightly larger share; but a real bastard will cop the lot and thereby earn as much as four or five times more than any of the other guys from a hit record.

If a band should become a burden (ie fail to shift units), bastardry can swiftly be put into practice by not making a promotional video, releasing a record without decent advertising and low-priority plugging - generally cutting losses and getting the thing out of the way.

If, on the other hand, the bosses decree that a hit is required, all manner of stunts may be pulled in order to mould the raw material into the desired shape; one currently fashionable manoeuvre is to 'suggest' that a band do a cover version, rather than rely on the original material the act was presumably signed for in the first place.

Eventually the product hits the streets, which is where the complete bastards have a disproportionately large say. Increasingly monopolistic retailers push top selling ranges at large discounts in order to squeeze out the opposition; such chains care little about the personal touch, and even less still about what they're selling. Consequently, less profitable lines (anything remotely specialist and singles outside the Top 50) are shelved - or rather they're not shelved, if you get my drift.

Bastards! I love 'em! Whoops, nearly forgot to mention ourselves. Writers may be regarded as something of a joke by those who wield the most powerful cheque books, but they are an essential part of the framework and as such are prone to bouts of bastardry.

Perhaps some writers are occasionally guilty of striving for a healthy bank balance rather than a decent interview, and then there are the free lunches (cue chorus of "there's no such thing as a free lunch") and the much sought-after freebie trips abroad.

But we're none of us perfect, are we, ahem . . .

IT'S MORE THAN SEX! A SURVIVAL GUIDE TO THE TEENAGE YEARS Suzie Hayman

(Wildwood House)

THE PREVAILING trend for well-meaning advice for the developing youth market continues. And if you or your younger relatives are the sort of people who could use a friendly, chatty helping hand in the shape of 200-odd pages of straight, and often rather plain talking on such subjects as sex and drugs and leaving home and all that sort of stuff, then you, or they, could do a great deal worse than dip into Suzie Hayman's comparatively comprehensive exploration of all those things likely to disrupt what everybody reckons should be the best times of your life. Even zits!

THE CINEMA OF ROBERT DE NIRO James Cameron-Wilson (Zomba Books £6.95)

AS A side issue to his quest for personal anonymity and public screen perfection, the enigmatic De Niro begs many questions. Most of them are raised here; few are answered. Cameron-Wilson too often concludes a debate with "God only knows why", and his critical sloppiness is not poetic, eg "The King Of Comedy should, by rights, be called The New King Of Comedy". Oh dear.

Lacking an interview with Bobby himself, the book is mainly a catalogue of key facts and safe assumptions. However, I found myself devouring it from cover to cover, not solely for the resonant photos and stills.

There are some wonderful stories concerning De Niro's obsessional dedication. During his undercover taxi-driving stint as preparation for the Travis Bickle role, one passenger piped, "You're the actor, aren't you? Guess it's hard to find steady work". Before The Last Tycoon, he spent weeks "just walking around the studio dressed in these suits, thinking, This is all mine". And the Raging Bull self-punishment is legendary; his fattened neck was still not proportionate by True Confessions.

As a film critic, Cameron-Wilson is far from objective (he's a fan, bless him), but he does avoid the trendy trap of underestimating the precise and elegiac Falling In Love and the restrained emotion of Once Upon A Time In America. He clinches respect by focusing on the two crucial scenes of the latter: the tenderness of the rape and the tension of the tea-stirring.

Rounding off with a few clues as to *The Mission* (with Jeremy Irons) and *Angel Heart* (with Mickey Rourke and Charlotte Rampling, director Alan Parker), this is a readable if superficial effort, high on backdrop details but low on psychological insight. But then Bobby is writing that book himself, with glances, nods and silences.

ALTHOUGH THIS rockdocumentary would be better
served up as a television film
of half its length, it's

The manager of the Germs summed up the film's philosophy when she described her job as "just like trying to look after four three-year-olds". The film provides an insight into the drug-crazed lifestyles of some of the most important California hardcore bands, and considering it was shot over six years ago, it has aged remarkably well.

Director Penelope Spheeris (Suburbia, Boys Next Door) tries hard to get to grips with why everyone in the punk movement felt so alienated, yet despite getting tantalisingly close to the answer, she keeps moving on to feature another personality or band.

The film, which features Black Flag, Germs, X and Fear, is well shot and manages to convey the very atmosphere that was meant to shock, frighten and excite all at the same time, through interviews with club owners, concert entrepreneurs, fanzine writers, and the bands themselves.

This is a film that is so nearly there, but it hasn't quite made it.

But see it, if not for the music, then for the tremendously entertaining interviews. I left, not humming my favourite tune, but with the words of the Germs' manager ringing in my ears: "We've been trying to get the vocalist to sing into the mike for years"!

After living on a razor's edge for most of their life together, **SUICIDE** are back and bristling with a fresh charge of electric energy. JONH WILDE plugs into main men **ALAN VEGA and** MARTIN REV. Shock treatment from BOB GRUEN

UICIDE IS 16 deranged years old and still too damned aimless to leave us.

In a hotel room in downtown Manhattan, cohorts Vega and Rev are limbering up for another assault.

"Usually when groups come back," Martin Rev suggests, "they've already made it and then they're coming back to cash in on the history of it. With Suicide, nobody gave it to us the first time, they didn't know what to think of us."

So, for the outlaw Suicide, it's just been a long pause?

"It's like the audience are coming back to us in a sense, they're doing the comeback, because they never finished with us in the first place. We're this entity that they want to have a look at again. We never weren't back together."

It's not just breezing back for the quick buck, at the risk of scraping away at the legend?

"We never said it was over," Alan Vega laughs, "so let them all say we're reforming for money, because it's always been the slowest buck in sight, always will be."

EGA, CHEST-WIGGED and simply creased with energy, takes occasional shooting glances at the TV baseball and sucks in the occasional, Geeeee, look at that, will ya!

He's perpetually wired, needing little encouragement to rationalise these 16 years of zip-gun dynamics. Two nights previously I catch him at the Mountaineer's Club, a downtown sleaze-pit, where, in front of 100 cramped observers, he drags his own band out for another bout of mannered frenzy, some more of that famed Vega disintegration.

There's no stage, so he just wanders on out, clutching at the crowd, highly physical and highly frayed by now, ripping into 'Ghost Rider' with all the strangled relish of old. Onstage, Alan Vega is a fallen angel, a riotous dash of comic hysteria, a defiantly ageing r'n'r hero. New York doesn't take him entirely seriously, but he couldn't give a toss for all that, it seems. In person, he's irresistibly engaging, his talk spilling like fool's gold on tap.

In contrast, there's Martin Rev, quietly detached, almost like Vega's alter-ego or conscience, speaking with an extended drawl, stoically hesitant next to the Vega rollercoaster of bashed-up common sense.

"We're like complete opposites, sure," says Alan, "but so similar in many ways, something very close and underlying. When I get my own group out there, I'm the boss, and it's something that comes completely from me. It's much more controlled in a way.

"When I play as Alan Vega, I know what my next line is going to be, the musicians know what I'm going to do. If I veer off into a different thing, they're standing there going, Oh my God!

"With Suicide, though, I never know what's going to happen. I never know what Martin is going to play. I'll be ready to go into something and he'll shoot into something else entirely. That makes me do something theatrically or even lyrically.

"I could be onstage one minute, then he'll look and see me 20 rows back, screaming my head off, then he starts to shift and we've connected. The connection is the music, like the umbilical cord in a way.

"It's like a work of art, maan. You start a painting, the canvas is empty, but you start going through it. Three quarters of the way through, the painting starts dictating to you what to do. At that point, you're no longer the artist in a sense, you're just following orders.

"Suicide is the same thing. We just put the first notes down and, from there on, every night is different, not just every year or five years."

HOUGH SUICIDE are not, in a strict sense, 'coming back', they are organising themselves for a more drawn-out skirmish.

For the last six years, there's been Vega's regular and Rev's less regular solo output, occasionally chance Suicide performances, but nothing too settled.

Last year was the most contradictory so far for the duo. While Vega launched into illadvised MTV rock raunch with his 'Just A Million Dreams', Rev was preparing a return to Suicide basics with his 'Clouds Of Glory'.

Not that Vega's offering wasn't without its brittle charms, but it seemed too obviously compromised, Elektra's vain attempt to turn him into another rock stooge, another declining rocker with some flair for melodrama and mawkish power-chord excess. If anything, it signalled the need for Suicide, more than ever before.

"I didn't see it as a step back," Vega protests to me, "because I learned more making that record than any other. Now, when I play with Suicide, I can stay in key for two minutes instead of two seconds."

So you're back to rub people's faces in it, to cause some shock waves, give your audience a sizeable kick to the balls?

"In a way. . . I'm actually giving Martin a kick

to the balls. I've been out there touring for the last five years while he's been sitting on his rump having a good time, so I'm getting jealous here!"

NE YEAR ago, with Elektra trying to lock him into the tidy fake-outlaw persona, Alan Vega was telling me about his emotional strait-jacket, how he was ready to drop the whole thing and scrape out another racket.

His 15 minutes as powerdriving Mr MTV, bare of all the savage psychosis, swung to an end and, as always, the Suicide spectre was hovering impatiently. Creators of some of the most far-flung, terror-ridden music of the last decade, can they really expect to draw another deluge of sweat, spit and sexbeat from these rancid noise scraps?

Vega's hardly hesitant.

"When you hear Suicide, it still sounds like nothing else on earth. There's still an anger, still a statement, just crazier than ever. The only problem this time round is that we might get too accepted. There's more to fight against now in that sense."

Though the Suicide beat has been driven into many a pop doodle over the last ten years, now it becomes ridiculously blatant. In the wake of Sputnik, the Vega/Rev charge gets recognised as a r'n'r chapter of its own, scrawling rage and tension across its pages with hectic hysteria. Rather different to their burgeoning days as New York's standard rock joke, as unwanted outsiders with even less of a chance than levels of credibility.

"When we started," Alan recalls, "you have to remember how confused people were, just in terms of the music - forgetting the politics of the world, even forgetting what our name was Y'know, we would have called the group Life, but it would have been too glib, too dumb. But that's what it felt like and that's what it is. It wanted to say, The world is killing itself. The name Suicide was right on. When we came out, no one knew what a f***** drum-machine was, no one knew it existed. Now everyone's got one.

"Every night we walked out then, there was a riot, it was so new. There's two things people do when faced with something new - they either laugh their asses off or they want to beat the shit out of you. We usually got the latter.

"We didn't get too many laughs, but plenty of terror. If I walked out into the audience and touched somebody then, it was like killing them. Now, they're digging us. When I jump out into the audience these days, they rip my clothes off, out of love. It's like piranhas now, they almost kill me with affection!"

LTIMATELY, SUICIDE are our best grab-bag of tensions, like a fireball chasing across the landscape, charring all in sight. They are a howl of intentional distaste, and they know the hypnotic value of repetition. Suicide are always convulsive, never cold and never ugly.

"Suicide," says Alan Vega, "is like coming in off the street and finding the street again.

"There's no bluff, we've never gone in for that. We've always been more interested in magic than realism, though - we wanted to make miracles happen when we played.

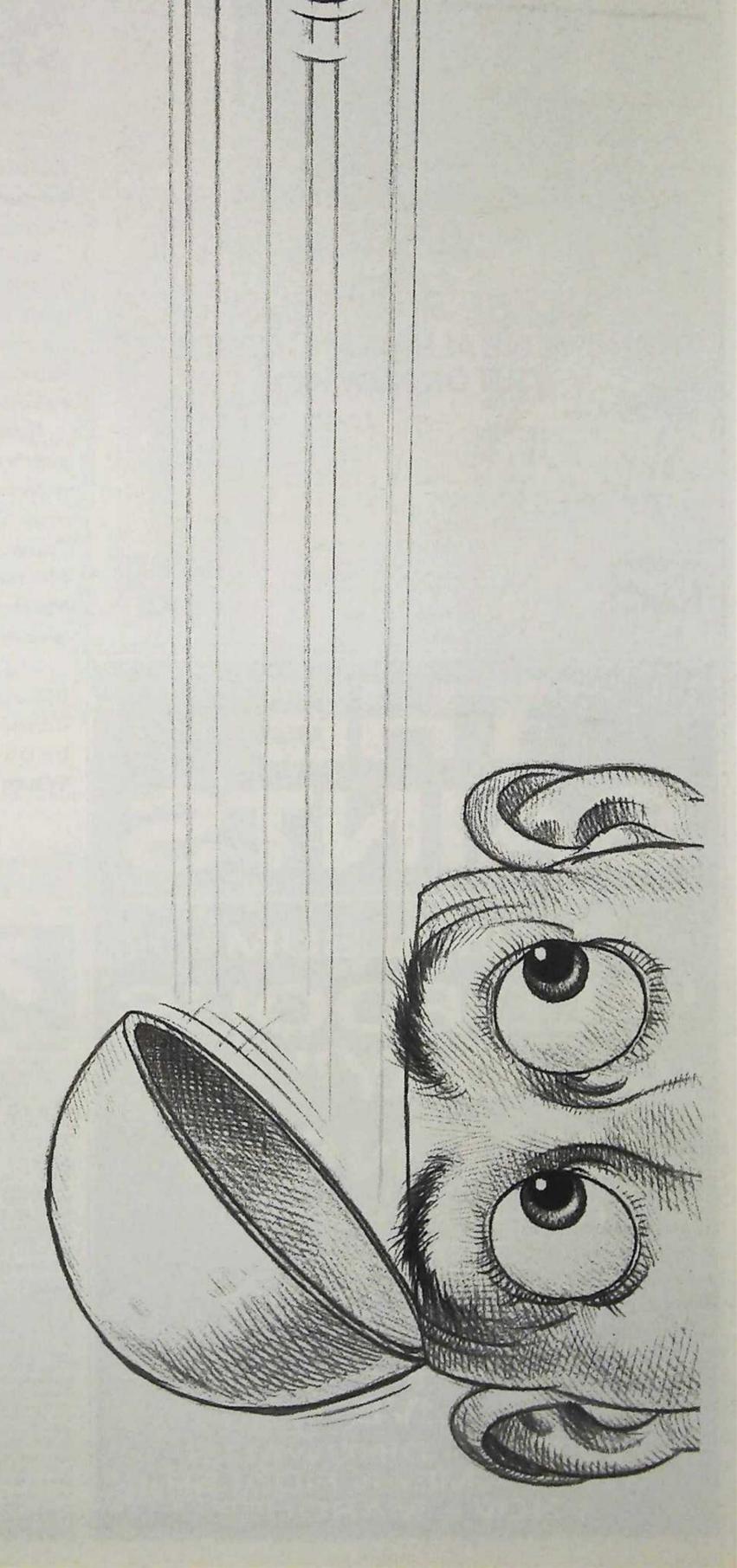
"It doesn't matter what we do, but it has to be something. We're musicians - artists, so to speak. What else are we going to do after all these years? Suicide is like an instinctive thing now, we can hardly stop. It's always been like a push-pull, love-hate thing. Now, we're getting crazy for it again and that can only be good."

It sounds like there's a secret in there, tapping away at the walls, desperate to get out.

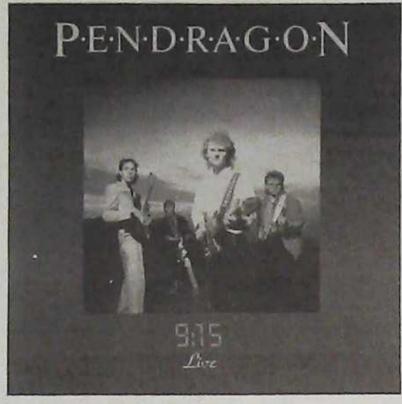
"OK," drawls Martin Rev for the last time today, "we'll come clean. For the last five years, we've been doing the cabaret circuit in Cincinnati, done up in blue lamé suits, covering Frankie Valli songs to the scampi and fries

Now that would be the ultimate Suicide.

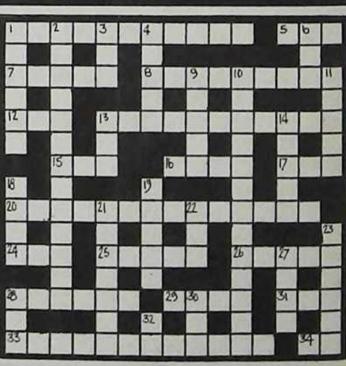

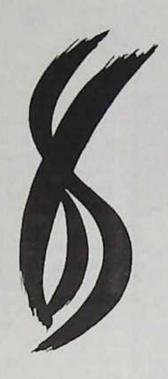

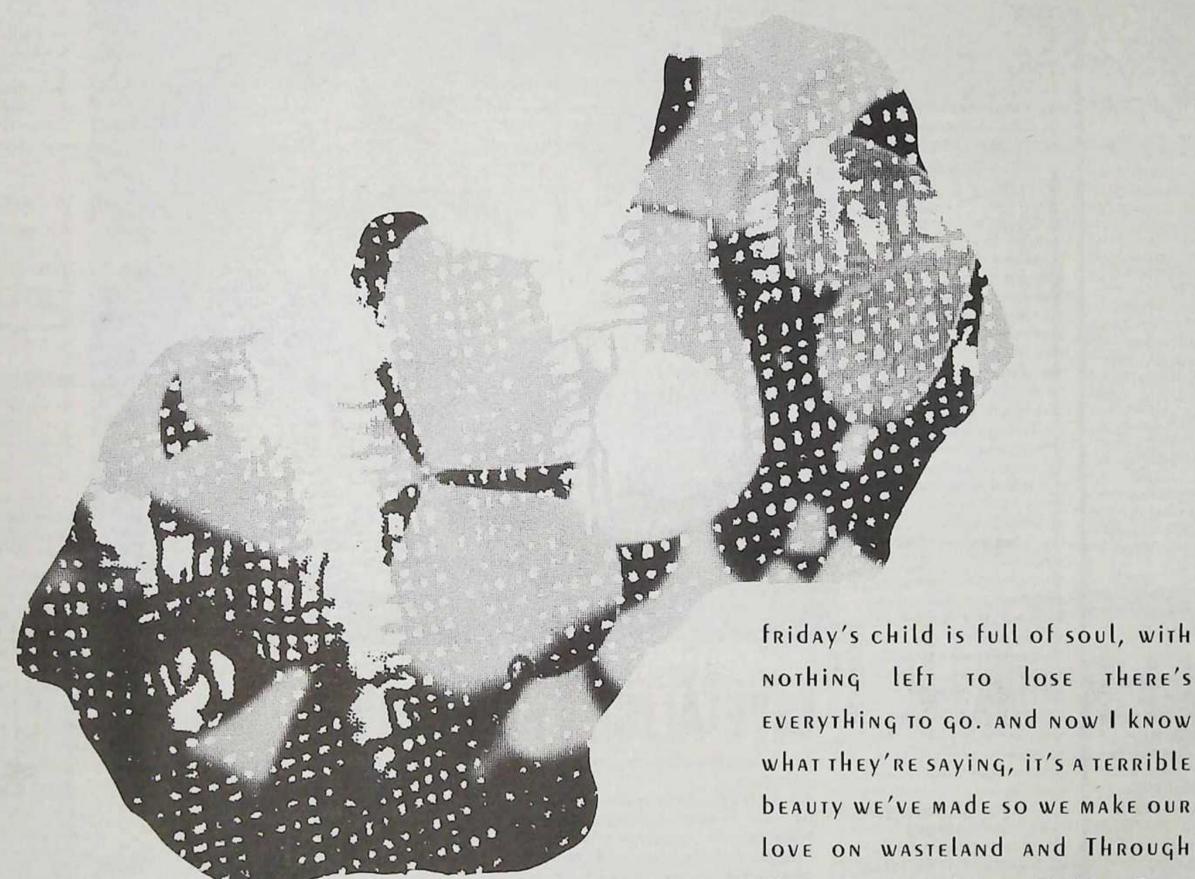

There are 'cities' such as Glasgow, Newcastle, Manchester, Liverpool and Leeds. There are suburbs, small towns, resorts and industrial estates. In all of these places there are 'bands'; bands who rarely get coverage because Sounds, in its infinite laziness, fails to encourage new writers from outside the capital.

In Manchester you have James Brown; in Brighton Chris Manthorp; in Birmingham Geoffrey Kent. Three writers for the whole of 'The Rest Of The Country' And you wonder why people don't buy your paper? -

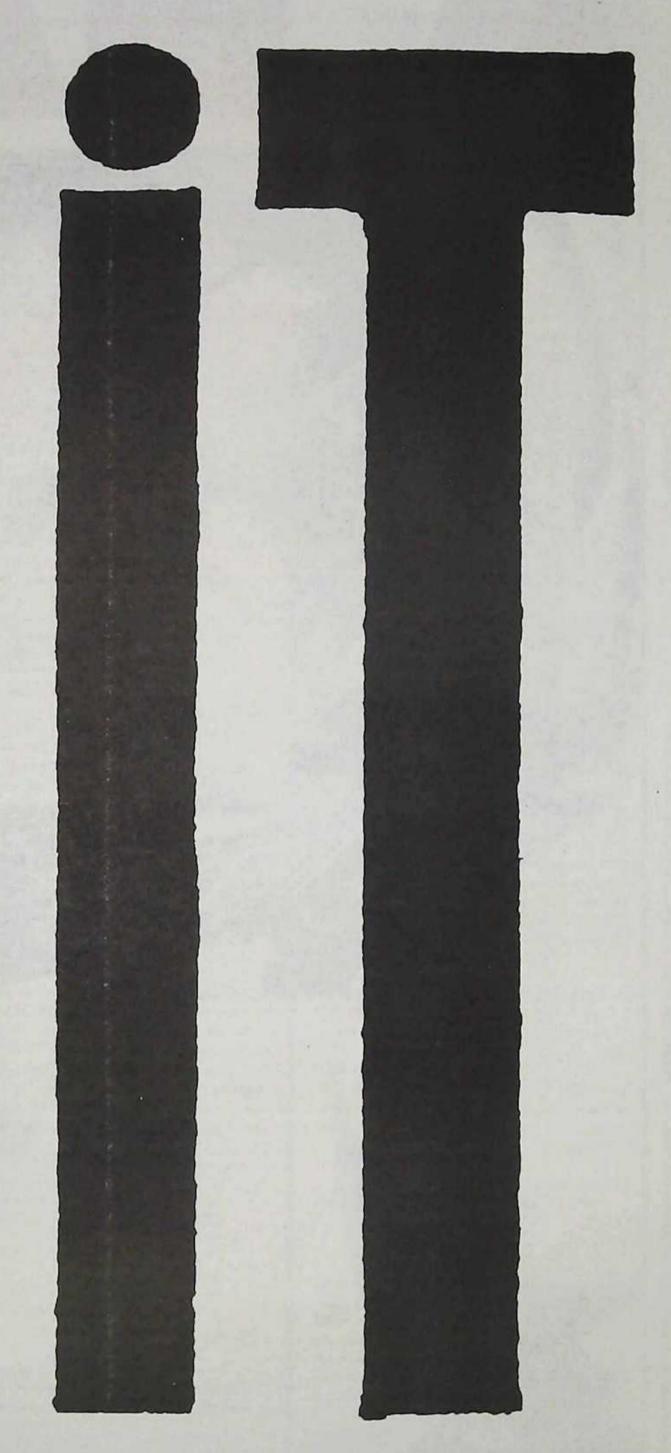

MARMITE sandwich flies through the air, whistling over the top of a brightly painted backdrop.

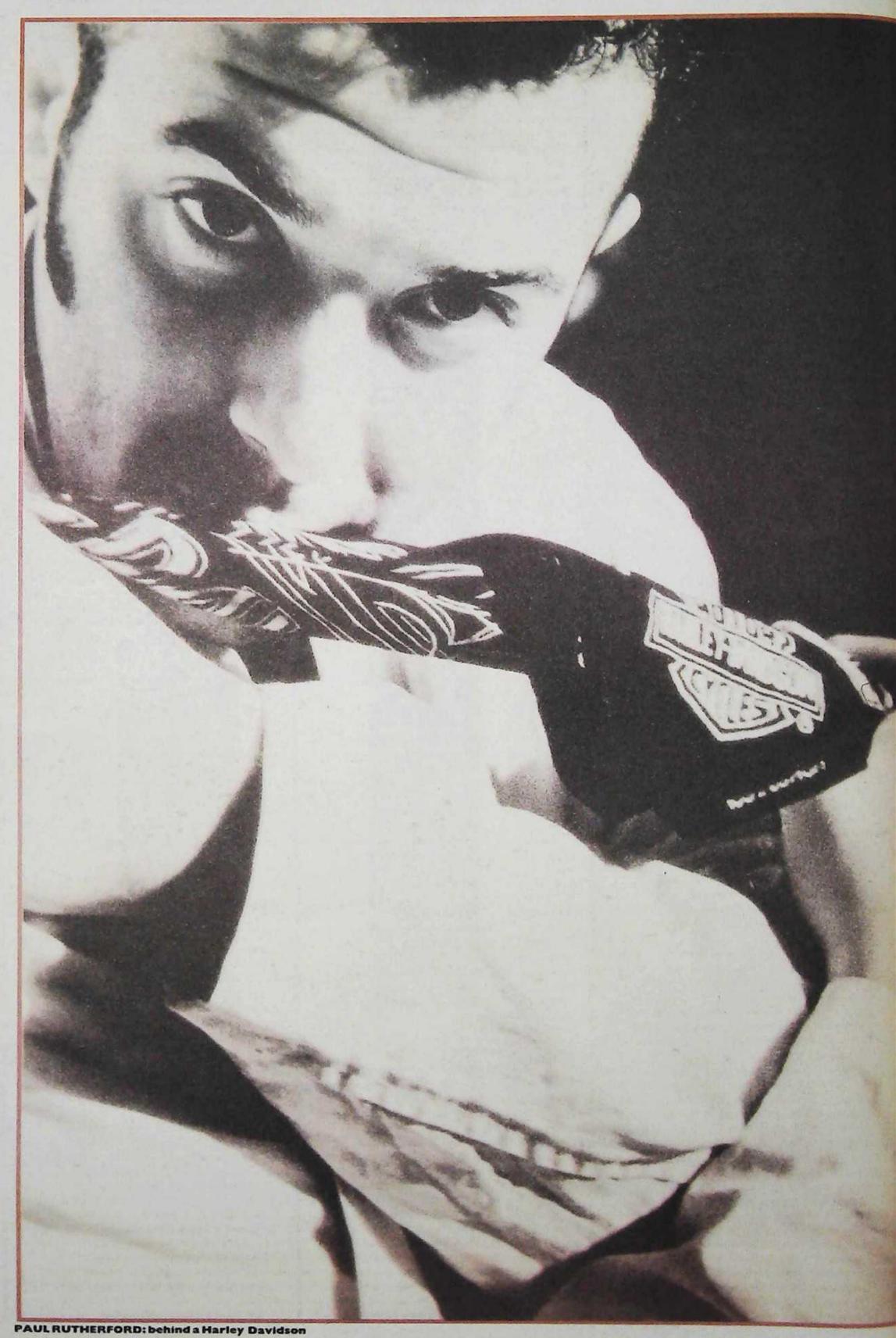
It plummets earthwards just inches behind a French TV presenter's head, hitting the stage with a stodgy thump live on air in front of an estimated 70 million viewers.

Holly giggles and scurries over to the backstage monitor, where we've all been observing – with barely concealed amusement – the madcap results of this saucy singer's nutty escapade.

Basically, we're all terribly bored. And any entertainment, however juvenile, comes as a welcome respite from all this waiting. We're hanging around (now without even a savoury snack to ease the tedium) for Frankie Goes To Hollywood's brief appearance on a dreadful Channel One pop extravaganza by and for the French but, for practical reasons, going out from a large barn in Brussels.

You have to laugh. Frankie do. Like, for instance, when earlier today our fleet of chauffeur-driven cars pulled up at the barn for rehearsals, and to our dismay we found that the vehicles would on no account be allowed through the gates. This meant the band would be forced to walk some 20 yards to reach their destination.

Naturally enough, there was much uproar as the group's tour manager leapt





out and battled with bewildered Belgian security guards, themselves unable to put a foot right having been victims of incompetent organisation from the word 'go'.

All they could do was apologise, but it wasn't good enough.

Frankie sat tight - Holly, Paul Rutherford and the lads doubled-up with mirth at the chaos they were causing, tears dribbling down their cheeks as they watched their spokesman go in for the kill.

Then after five minutes of absolute bedlam, the band simply got out and made the journey by foot, grinning from head to toe, leaving their tour manager fuming.

It's like an episode of Jim'll Fix It. Almost like Frankie wrote in asking to be pop stars for a day, got what they wanted and then vanished with the goodies. They've been pop stars now for over two years, although some might say Savile's in hot pursuit and gaining on them fast.

Well, maybe he is, maybe he isn't.

In a flash car now, bombing through the city, making a point of offending the locals. The lads - Mark O'Toole, Gnasher and Ped - are fooling around with tampons and the girl driver's cackling like she doesn't really mean it. It's like, Tee hee hee, you have to laugh or else you'll get flung out at 70mph which wouldn't be altogether nice.

Check the rear-view mirror. No sign of Savile as yet, but then he'll never get his limo back in one piece anyway, not after these nutcases have finished with it. Oh no, they'll not be giving up their bumper haul without a fight.

ATELINE: AUTUMN 1986. Regress a couple of years and Frankie Goes To Hollywood are busy being the greatest rock thing since the revelations of Joy Division's 'Unknown Pleasures' and, before that, the wicked smile on Johnny Rotten's face during his sublime Bill Grundy interview in December '76.

I'd clean forgotten how splendid Frankie had once been. But now, that summer - the summer when 'Two Tribes' came at you constantly but never grew tiresome, where the band appeared on Top Of The Pops and actually dirtied it, briefly, with their seedy splash of leather and flesh and Liverpudlian hardnut arrogance - it all comes flooding back to me.

They'd been subersive, crafty, amusing. They'd stormed the world with their gayboy guerrilla tactics and there seemed to be no stopping them. Frankie spelt Excitement. They were the word on everybody's lips, the rascals.

Then there arrived a pretty Christmas release and the top-selling double-album, then the edited down 'Welcome To The Pleasure Dome' single, followed by the debut tour and then silence.

And a year after it all went quiet there was 'Rage Hard', a blistering Top Five single, and now there's 'Liverpool' - an exotic new LP which finds Frankie suddenly emerging out of nowhere with a more restrained outlook - still dynamic and captivating, but no longer a shock to the senses. Unfortunately, it has received widespread critical condemnation.

Today we have to accept them for what they are, and one thing they are not is Bigger Than Jesus - unlike, for instance, Dirty Den, who is.

Frankie Goes To Hollywood: five hooligans from Liverpool; three lovable rogues and two super-snazzy mischief-makers.

I'm squashed up next to Holly Johnson (truly a crown-prince of mischief-making) in the back of our speeding vehicle, watching riot police seal off large areas of Brussels. Something to do with the whole of Belgian society collapsing, I

(Turning to my neighbour) Don't you find this whole thing competely absurd?

"Absurd?" Holly is stunned. "Well, it's no more absurd than there being a Queen or a Margaret Thatcher or you being here talking to me now."

This is true, after all; we're in this together. Frankie After The Bang. Meanwhile, in Brussels tonight there's an unmistakable whiff of anarchy in the air, the kids are taking to the streets and the government's crumbling.

The Frankie Gang, on the other hand, are content with going "Wooo! Wooo!" as their car whizzes through the capital city's tunnels.

It's a lovely sound. It's like the 'Pleasure Dome' cartoons coming to life. What I mean is, this is the world where the big pop stars live, and nobody can touch us, not even that large be-helmeted chap who's jumping up and down and waving a loaded sub-machine gun above his head... YOINKS!

Back at the barn the TV show's now well underway. We all point and laugh upon catching sight of top continental pop-metal band, Europe. Nothing else to do, no Marmite sandwiches left, so it's off to the makeshift dressing-room where Holly almost puts his weight down on a trick chair (its legs have been mangled by some zany prankster!), but fortunately a kindly soul warns him off before any damage is done.

"I'm just having an off day," the stylish singer explains. "It's this strange weather making me feel odd, like just before a thunderstorm, you know?"

It is indeed a bleak day in Belgium. Frankie are preparing to go onstage and mime to 'Rage Hard', which has recently been toppled from the Number One position in the German charts. The locals have caught a glimpse of the band and the vibe's now so intense that the kids are considering standing up rather than sitting

Naah! Actually it's like a morgue, and to worsen matters the boys really aren't in the mood for thrill-a-minute pop action. But then I always think it's fantastic when artists perform regardless of illness or exhaustion.

I mention this to Holly during an hour-long respite from sticking two fingers up at people and general looning around.

"I mean, at Hammersmith Odeon I had the raving Russian'flu and I was expected to go onstage," the natty warbler recollects with a wince. "But if I'd turned around and said, Look, I want to cancel the next four dates, there would've been murder and outcry. So you tend to just do it, which is of course wrong."

Do your companions' barmy antics embarrass you?

"No, I don't feel any responsibility towards them at all."

Ped (he's the big hairy drummer): "Holly f***** starts it most of the time!" (This is correct.) "He doesn't give a f*** what we do and we don't give a f*** what he does."

You don't feel like a father or a mother figure to the others then, Holly?

"Not at all, that's their trip."

Do you often have to smile at their crackpot

"I laugh about it, yeah. I mean, I've been there and, what's more, I fully understand it." You see, they're all in this together. Frankie After The Bang.

HE BIG question: at this point in time, are Frankie Goes To Hollywood an exciting phenomenon? Or is it simply the sound of '84 all over again? Or what?

"It is absolutely perfect for that moment," Holly recalls.

You made 1984 really sparkle!

"Well, you see, this is a different year altogether. I think there's quite an air of the dismal about 1986 really, it's been a dreadful summer."

Is 'Rage Hard' another way of saying 'Live Fast Die Young'?

"No, it's saying: don't die quietly, resist the greyness surrounding us at the moment. I do think there is a particular cultural greyness, and this kind of manifests itself in lots of forms, particularly in the way people just wear black these days, as if there's this huge funeral going

Perhaps there is.

"What a pity."

Are you optimistic about the future? "Sometimes I am and sometimes I ain't."

It strikes me that musically, at least, Frankie are sobering up.

"Well, I mean, I describe the 'Liverpool' album as removing the rose-tinted spectacles of 'Pleasure Dome'. It's a more mature record and a more serious record, but it's a case of like it or lump it, you know? I'm not a performing puppet."

Hmm. Were you indignant at having to leave the car and walk here earlier today?

"No, that didn't bother me in the slightest. Why? Did you think it would've?"

It certainly bothered me.

"Did it?"

No, I'm only pulling your leg.

"I don't think you should take yourself too seriously in that respect - Oh I'm a Star! I can't walk those few steps - because with that attitude you'll soon be back on the street. You just get on with the job in hand."

(To Ped) Don't you think it's potty, a bunch of geezers like yourselves being treated like royalty?

"Oh yeah, it's a good laff, and you take all the advantages out of it that you can."

Do you enjoy being able to do things you wouldn't normally get away with?

"We'd mostly be doing the same things anyway, only no one'd be there to look at us doin' them."

I suppose so, yeah.

Holly: "Actually, sometimes it is unreal, but you see I lead a pretty ordinary life when I'm not working. Nobody bothers me round where I live really, except just the once when 'Rage Hard' came out. I'd lived there for six months and no one'd said boo to me, then suddenly it was incredible, the difference in attitude that the people in the corner shop had."

What did they say?

"Occooh, c'mon! Give us your autograph - all that kind of bullshit."

And you just wanted to buy a can of beans! "Yeah!"

But not a jar of Marmite?

"Definitely not Marmite, bluuhh!" (Dishy Frankie Frontman Holly Doesn't Like Marmite Shocker!) "Pineapple jam is more my scene."

Pineapple jam! Why I only bought myself a new jar last week!

"It's good, isn't it? But don't bother with peach, they simply can't recreate the peach taste."

They certainly can't.

O HERE we are, utter bedlam, a dump of a dressing-room to start with and now it's even worse, bottles all over the place and the Frankie Gang threatening to drown out the music of their fellow artistes with their own loutish conversation and raucous laughter...

Crash!!! Glass breaking. Crunch!!! Table collapsing. Splosh!!! Crappy wine going all over the floor. Gaffaw!!! Someone makes a rude wisecrack about Boomtown Rats keyboardwizard Johnny Fingers. (It's his name, it's his name, geddit???)

Ped pauses to dip a tampon in a puddle of

"The jokes we like are absolutely so stupid that everyone just hates them," he grins. "In fact, anything everyone else hates we all enjoy, but we're not so much into jokes as doing stupid things, like kicking people out of cars and all that."

So who's your favourite comedian? "Someone like Tommy Cooper, because he was so ridiculous it was funny, like."

Ever get reflective, serious, poignant? "Only when we absolutely have to be."

"Oh God, that's a really bad one, when they say, Oh how are you? Dying to meet you, haven't seen you in ages, and no one really gives a f***. It's just bullshit, all this, We'll have to get together sometime, and they know quite well you won't, like."

Brilliant stuff, love it. . .

"Anyone who ever does that out of this band, especially us three, they just get a good fist in the kidneys."

Thonk!!! This man's a hero!

And off they go, striding through a crowd of admirers up their stairs to a smallish stage in the middle of the Wembley Arena-sized auditorium.

Suddenly the group are alive with enthusiasm: Holly goes amongst the fans and Paul boogies numbly while the others mime their respective instrument parts, with gusto.

Upon finishing, the lads are surrounded by autograph-hunters. After the band have shaken as many hands as possible, we all leap into a waiting car and head for the gates.

They're my new mates, The Frankie Gang, I know it's true 'cos I'm allowed inside their limo. (Ped: "Nobody gets into the lads' limo.")

Holly Johnson, a question: at this point in 1986 do Frankie Goes To Hollywood deserve to be on the cover of a top-selling national pop

"Well, I think the more relevant question is does a top-selling national pop paper deserve to be on the back of Frankie Goes To Hollywood, to tell you the truth." HARRUMPH!

FLASH car accelerates towards the horizon with The Frankie Gang forming a human pyramid on the roof. It soon vanishes in a cloud of dust. All is tranquil. Nothing to be heard, just the distant hum of Brussels by night.

Scarcely audible at first, a mysterious huffapuffa sound breaks the silence. It grows louder and louder, building to a crescendo. And then he appears.

An elderly white-haired gentleman with running shorts and a cigar emerges over the crest of the hill. Barely pausing for breath, he winks in our direction and jogs off into the sunset, in hot pursuit of the Frankies.

What happens next is anyone's guess.

FALCO 'Emotional' (WEA WX 75)***3/4

YOU MIGHT choose to dismiss Herr Falco as some European oik (most Britons are xenophobes at heart), but the more I hear of the fellow's work, the further I nudge the pointer on the sliding scale away from complete dork in the direction of misunderstood genius.

On his fourth album, the linguistic schizophrenic happily hopscotches from German to English, throwing in the odd snippet of French, with the assistance of his Dutch production team. As with all second-language English users, Falco delights in catchphrases, curiosities and puns, and occasionally cocks it up completely: "My Ronnie lies over the ocean" is amusing but "sacrify the day" is totally bemusing.

In these glum days of chart lyrics which elevate 3-2-1 clues to the status of poetry, the idea of someone writing a commercial song about a real-life war photographer ('Kamikaze Cappa') can only be admired, even if the words are decidedly oddball.

He also writes about 'The Kiss Of Kathleen Turner', which certainly holds more appeal than a quick grope with Lorraine Chase. And he's got a few decent songs in a fair range of styles. Not bad for a supposed nutcase.

A DAMP SQUIB?

BIG AUDIO DYNAMITE 'No. 10, Upping Street' (CBS CBS 40445)***1/2

THE SECRET is not to listen too closely. What Strummer and Jones were good at was the blur of rock 'n' roll: in sharp digital focus, all their contempo-rebellion sounded puny. So it is with the second slab of BAD, the reunion of the outlaws with Joe behind the desk.

When you can't quite hear what BAD are doing, when they become a fast, ugly clatter of beats and pieces, it starts to work. Mick Jones hasn't altogether forgotten the value of urgency. 'C'mon Every Beatbox' and 'Limbo The Law' are clumsy crossbreeds, chunks of old rock riff and brash technology, but BAD are so bloody-minded about it that they actually pull off the collision of words and rhythm. 'Beyond The Pale', one of two Strummer-Jones songs, picks out their strength and fallibility. It comes on like a noisy rewrite of The Clash's 'Something About England', betraying Jones' sen-

timental heart, but it's taut where the other was flabby.

It needs an ambitious loudmouth to make this sort of thing connect, not a noble savage. Between them, Jones and Strummer should still have hold of the credentials. Significantly, BAD never sound very clean. If Don Letts' cut-ups don't have the wit or dark irony of Cabaret Voltaire, they never devised a real pop base to build on. It takes a kind of dumb pop insight to come up with the wheeze of 'E=MC2'.

So why does the record fall to pieces on side two? After the muscular beginning of 'V Thirteen', it subsides into mediocrity: Jones isn't a jolly man, and 'Ticket' and the stupid 'Dial A Hitman' try to be satirical when everyone should be scowling. If there were two sides as strong as 'Limbo The Law', BAD would be really bursting out of something. As it is, this second blow is an inconclusive struggle to answer: what do they really want to do?

ROMP STAKES

XTC 'Skylarking' (Virgin V2399) ***

XTC'S PARTNERSHIP with producer Todd Rundgren for this album was reportedly fraught; he refused to countenance anything gutsy or political, insisting on 'relationship' songs.

Maybe that's the reason this is such a 'soft' album, veering back towards that 'English Settlement' countrified whimsy which came as such a shock after the power of 'Drums And Wires' and 'The Black Sea'.

But as well as dreamy songs like 'Grass' and 'Summer's Cauldron', we have a whole section that might be titled 'Swindon Welcomes The Beatles 1966-68', where Partridge and Moulding seem intent on outdoing Neil Innes in the recreation of moods and the reworking of riffs from the 'Rubber Soul'/'Revolver' period. The string section link between 'Ballet For A Rainy Day' and '1,000 Umbrellas' is pure 'I Am The Walrus'; 'Season Cycle' is McCartney at his schmaltziest; 'Big Day' a pastiche of Fab Four harmonies.

There are bright spots among all this retrospection just the same. 'That's Really Super, Supergirl' sports a lively complexity of structure, not to mention a Rundgrenesque guitar break which I suspect is Dave Gregory out-Todding Todd. And side two opens with the best song on the album — 'Earn Enough For Us' — which exhibits the kind of classically tuneful, spirited pop sensibility associated with the XTC of yore.

This is XTC today, then: determinedly English to the point of eccentricity, comfortable, nostalgic, pleasant. 'This Is Pop'? Maybe, but more in the fatherly sense than anything else.

Ivor Cutler's 'Prince Ivor' plays were originally broadcast to an open mouthed public on Radio Three. They have an ageless, surreal quality to them, especially in the way they have been recorded, and can easily lull you into some other corner of the Cutler imagination. Alas, I found myself getting fidgety after two sides. I politely listened to a few more jokes and then sneaked away while my narrator's attention was diverted by some Radiophonic Workshop sound effect.

Unravel what you can from 'Prince Ivor', but I'm afraid my copy may soon be taken down the Oxfam shop.

W S Burroughs usually bores me to death, but this drably dressed record eventually jerks a tear of mirth to my eye. Its true purpose escapes my poor aching head, but loyal Burroughs devotees will no doubt be thrilled to add another artefact to their collections. The pompously titled Les Temps Modernes will hopefully be a label to watch, one with a much needed sense of adventure in its releases. Fwait, with bated breath, to see what else they are going to unearth.

Meanwhile, I'll bury

Burroughs' greatest in my record library and let it gather dust for a while.

That, in a precise way, sums up the strengths and weaknesses of Freddie Jackson: his giltedged voice penetrates much further into the notion of 'soul' than the actual lyrics he sings which, for the most part, are lame and tame.

Upon the release of the American crooner-swooner's debut album 'Rock Me Tonight', a platinum success Stateside, Freddie was perceived as a hand-medown heir to the late Marvin Gaye. Being a self-confessed ladies' man with a penchant for burnished ballads and a desire to dish out invitations welcoming one and all to his sexual healing party, Jackson has all the attributes for the role thrust upon him. Yet the fact that he is less openly

sensual, and the innocence implicit in his celestial voice, saves Freddie from being a mere imitator.

'Just Like The First Time' isn't like that at all. This record is altogether more polished than 'Rock Me Tonight'. Indeed, six different production teams have been roped in to provide the high gloss sonic screen. Consequently, from every finger click, through the massed squadrons of Stradivarius violins to the occasional Gucci-shod funk stroll, each note is perfectly pitched.

Against this luxurious musical backdrop Freddie's voice, the equivalent of a cashmere pullover and a silk suit, glides effortlessly over a lyrical terrain of love. Each song on the album is about amour – yearning for it, achieving it, being spurned chasing it and being burned giving it – to the point where the message gets more than a mite trite.

One can only hope that, in future, Jackson will become more adventurous in selecting the topics for his tunes. For now, his larynx expresses a greater breadth of emotions than his words. A case of the singer, not the song.

STRYPER 'To Hell With The Devil' (Music For Nations MFN 70)**** HOLY SHITI Christian rock's come good.

You think I'm joking? O, ye of little faith! Mind you, I had my doubts too till a tape of 'To Hell' snuck on to my Walkman. And then. . . lordy, lordy, 'twas a revelation. Sort of.

Sure, I laughed at 'Soldiers Under Command'. I still do. It's far too po-faced for its own good. But this is a different story; put across with greater conviction, it's certain of a bigger audience.

Stryper have cobbled together riffs like Dio's, tunes like Angel's and harmonies like Styx's, somehow making it all sound natural and, at times, perfect. It's a bloody miracle! Honestly, you have no idea how surprised I am to be saying this.

OK, it's not without its faults. The two ballads smack a bit strongly of dewy-eyed choirboys for my liking, and I'm also sceptical of the way that the whole album has been built up as a kind of soapbox for their relentless sermonising. But aw hell, erm, I mean shucks, I prefer to let the music do the talking.

And doesn't it just. The songs are strong, purposeful and varied, and the sound, the production, is fantastic. From bumptious metal through breezy pop to feathery goo, no two songs are the same, and the self-explanatory 'Sing Along Song' has the most daftly addictive hook of the year.

God only knows how

In Your Ear' (Virgin V2403)***1/2

I SUPPOSE that, putting on my thin and pointy churlish hat, it is possible to question the need for this artefact. At best, humour has a limited shelf life, and the topicality of many of the choicer Spitting Image vignettes restricts the long term worth of such a record further still. To an extent, the compilers have cushioned the inevitable impact of this pitfall by concentrating on the less ephemeral items.

The format is logical enough, with regular alternation between songs and the spoken word, the strength of the latter generally compensating for the weakness of the former. I guess the songs are doomed to failure because they are essentially one-liners strung out over a couple of minutes, the ZZ Top spoof 'We've Got Beards' being a perfect example.

Obviously there are numerous genuine classics, such as Sir Alistair's 'Someone Famous Has Died', Gielgud and Olivier ranting "dear, dear Niney" on 'Tea At Johnnie's', 'Coleman Peaks', in which David climaxes his commentary a lap too soon, and lots, lots more. You know the score.

NIK KERSHAW 'Radio Musicola' (MCA FM 1001)***1/2

IN MANY people's eyes, Nik Kershaw shouldn't feel at all welcome on this page. This is an inky rock press page and, as such, could be expected to shun Nik as just another video age, '80s-style pop insignificance. This time, though, that's not really happening.

Nik may be pretty, well mannered and a veritable wellspring of hits for his record company, but he LUCK IS what Hugh Cornwell recently put The Stranglers' repeated success down to, luck that millions (surely) of people get off on their words and music. Who's to say otherwise?

So it's lucky that 'Dreamtime' is a good record, lucky for The Stranglers and lucky for us. The inveterate Men in Black have made a nervy, twitchy but solid LP that commands your . . . yes, your respect. To immerse yourself in the hellfire of the classic 'Five Minutes', say, and then to bathe in the cool of 'Dreamtime' is to understand a certain process, to learn about growing old, to see the wild become the wise.

Courting convention in an unconventional way is the trick, keeping that Strangled atmosphere, and that air of discomfort is the punchline. In ten years The Stranglers have travelled a zillion light years, an orbit of their own making and their own desire, sometimes losing their way but never losing their kudos.

Some facts. 'Dreamtime' is spooky and melancholic, melancholy, but never down, riddled with bleating horns and (a token complaint) swathed in Dave Greenfield's synth swirls which sometimes obscure all the other little touches.

But listen to 'Big In America', a chilly piece of pop darkness, and watch David Byrne realise what he should have done on his last record. The slick, mellowed out title track is the perfect foil for something like 'Was It You?', a nasty way of asking a question. ("The famine and the genital disease, was it you?" Dig it!) 'Ghost Train' is just that: it sounds like a phantom engine floating down the tracks in a creepy hypnotic rush.

So 'Dreamtime' is clever and detailed but never obtrusively so, another chapter in the story of four men with, if not a mission, then a definite method. The Stranglers are always pushing back the boundary lines, which is good enough for me and you. Good luck to them.

'Radio Musicola' is an impressively accomplished collection of pop songs about specifics. The neatly compressed funk of the title track deals with big business delineation of the product, a subject close to Nik's MCAconstrained heart. 'Nobody Knows', with its perfect pop hook, takes the irrelevance of public intrusion in the face of private intimacy and treats it competently, even movingly. Despite his dress sense, Nik is a sensitive soul.

'What The Papers Say' uses a collection of 'found' headlines from an American tabloid (Girl Gives Birth To Alien Baby) for its chorus. David Byrne is taken very seriously when he uses similar devices, so why not Mr Kershaw?

'Radio Musicola' is a fine, even mature, pop work, and if you should find your younger sister listening to it, take a moment to congratulate her on her good taste.

L'AMOURDER 'Ritual' (Fun After All M AFTER 3)****

ANYONE WHO saw L'Amourder on the recent New Model Army tour won't forget the experience, whatever they thought of them. A complete mess of freaky dancing and wild shouts, banging and jumping and really having fun.

Hailing from Finland, they are not constricted by any stuffy old English rules of cool - like how not to behave on a stage - hence the somewhat awed crowd reception. But L'Amourder are heavy as well, twin guitars growling and howling and rock-bottom drums meeting in a spastic, full frontal collision.

After three albums in their homeland (where they go platinum and are known as Sielun Veljet), the band attack Britain after playing most of Europe and even some shows in Moscow. What the local commissar made of them is anyone's guess.

Here, they mutate on Dylan's 'Blowin' In The Wind' (you won't recognise it), burn up - crazier than crazy - on 'I Have A Dream' and run a wire brush against your nerve

endings on 'Tango Schitzophrenia'. L'Amourder are not afraid of anything, not afraid to try out whatever takes their fancy, totally (deep breath) aware. The sluggish 'Canoe Song' seems at odds with their frantic tightness but no worry, as this LP should set the mould for many more British blitzkriegs.

characterless names, long fringes, jangling guitars and pleasantly forgettable songs. The Passmore Sisters, The Rain, The Hit Parade - all bid for distinction but only crowd each other into relative insignificance because they all sound like mild variations of each another. But The Dentists have a potential number one with their 'The Sun In The Sands'.

And McCarthy are a little special because they manage to craft tragedy with playfulness, and their drums sound like big hollow trombones.

The agonising laments of C-Cat Trance, Pulp and The Royal Family And The Poor spread their brooding ecstasy all over side two; music that walks on air, harrowed feelings and breezy, gentle moments. Still, it may be a little too avante-garde for people who have never worn leather trousers.

But what about the social cause, you cry. Well, Easterhouse are here as well, making this an album for everyone. The worrying fact is that most of the ideas featured, as good as they are, do little to outline any real or lasting challenge.

CHRISTY MOORE 'Ordinary Man' (Demon FIEND 82)***

CHRISTY MOORE has settled for complete mastery of two out of the three distinct disciplines of Irish music that instantly spring to mind. Not for Moore the diddle-dee-dee jiggery pokery of a Walt Disney Emerald Isle. Christy is, however, a supreme exponent of two song forms so diverse they virtually turn full circle and join up in the middle: the melancholic, philosophical ballad, and the super-frivolous 'Paddy McGinty's Goat' nonsense

song. This album opens with a lament, a Lyle and McGuinness song, 'Sweet Music Roll On', which immediately reveals the innate beauty of Moore's voice. This quality is further demonstrated in 'Ordinary Man' and others, especially 'The Diamondtina Drover' and 'Quiet Desperation', two songs which in lesser hands (and vocal chords) would be swimming with puke-

inducing sentimentality. Ed Stewpot frippery abounds to an almost equal degree, albeit with a very adult, dry wit absent from Tom Paxton's kindergarten repertoire, although 'The Reel In The Flickering Light' and 'The Continental Ceili' certainly have that Paxton touch.

A hangover cure for rock and roll nights; a very warm record.

BAD COMPANY 'Fame & Fortune' (Atlantic WX69)***

BAD COMPANY celebrate their first seven-yearly reunion and Paul Rodgers doesn't even get an invite. Shocking? Well, maybe old man Rodgers turned them down, but the fact remains -Bad Company without him is like The Magnificent Seven without Yul Brynner, like Arsenal's '70/'71 doublewinning side without Charlie George, like. . . not as bad as I'd have thought, really.

The man who's stepped into Rodgers' cowboy boots and loud shirts to hitch up with original Bad boys Simon Kirke, Mick Ralphs and dear old Boz Burrell is Brian Howe (English, thank God) who fronted mildman Ted Nugent's band fairly recently. He's delivered an excellent and (I think it's fair to say) face-saving performance.

As for the other three - it's hard to believe that they could've been doing anything

else over the last seven years. I don't doubt that the main motive for them getting back together was money; the relative success of The Firm compared to this lot's misfortunes probably explains why Rodgers isn't involved. However, an album that I approached with a mocking disbelief has won me over (to a point), not through sentiment but through quality.

Well, maybe there's some degree of sympathy behind it, cause whereas Deep Purple raped a pitifully cushy market, these boys (boys?) aren't gonna get it easy.

I don't think they have any idea of how little the name Bad Company means in 1986. It'll hurt 'em to find out.

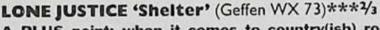

A PLUS point: when it comes to country(ish) rock, this lot defecate all over 10,000 Maniacs. This might be an achievement on a par with clouting Stockport County, but it's better than nothing. Having masqueraded as hip hotshots throughout '85, Lone Justice are now showing their true colours, coming out of the closet to raise the AOR banner aloft.

Obviously, the pivotal factor of the whole shebang is Maria McKee and her incredible larynx. This is a singing voice recorded with Maria sat atop a rabid spin dryer in full flow, with the resultant warble having a cartoon animal pitch to it. Yes, I quite like this voice.

The McKee mouth works its most effective magic on the mid-paced, mid-emotion numbers like 'Reflected (On My Side)', 'Belfry', and the wanna-be-Ritchie Blackmore, guitarencrusted 'Beacon'. Towards the extremes, though, the lass' bleating becomes mildly irksome. On ballads, it's Melanie plays The New Seekers, an acquired, sugary taste which blands out totally on the title track. That said, the planoplinking 'Wheels' is perhaps the outstanding number, sort of Liberace-meets-Zsa Zsa Gabor during a DIY hysterectomy practical.

When McKee really lets rip, however, the world lives in fear: on bagatelles such as 'I Found Love' and the truly unnerving 'Inspiration', the hapless innocent is left stranded as her terrible tonsils sweep across the barren wastes of the listener's lugholes.

'Shelter' is a CD must, melodic and occasionally soulful, with a surprising heart to it. Music for grown-ups, which is fine considering the bilge the kiddies are listening to these days. Anyone for the oral holocaust?

WASP: not to be taken too seriously

WASP 'Inside The Electric Circus' (Capitol EST 2025)****1/2

'FOR ANIMALS only' reads an ad for this bloodsucker. You have to laugh.

I love the way WASP ham it up, raw meat 'n' all. And I like the way people slowly come round to their way of thinking. I too thought they stank at the ass-end of '84 when they roughed up the Lyceum. And now Blackie's hogging the NME's front cover. Things change. . .

As do WASP, and it's always for the better. Gnarled melodies tied screaming to snowballing powerdrive, this is, at best, epic, unbowing stuff. Time after time it stirs up the 'Wild Child' image of Blackie, astride some macho monsterbike, burning a smoky trail over parched desert plains.

'Easy Livin", the old Heep hoarse chestnut, has no place in this landscape. It should've been left as a forgettable B-side cast-off, not made into a heavy-lidded hangover, a rusty reminder of rock's ropey past on an LP that's otherwise as fresh as salt in an open wound.

The other cover is fair enough, a rollicking version of Humble Pie's 'I Don't Need No Doctor' that almost out doo-wops 'Dressed To Kill'-period Kiss. But it's the originals, and especially the title track (a flawless Lawless boneshaker), that take the honours.

Within the space of three albums, WASP have gone from gorehound buffoonery to deft yet blasting supremacy. Yes, they can be unbelievably crass (they seem to go out of their way to prove it on 'Shoot From The Hip') but I really don't think a bloke wearing a flame-spitting codpiece ought to be taken that seriously. Do you?

ROSIE VELA 'Zazu' (A&M 395016-1)*****

THE INTEREST in this record stems from the reunion, after seven years or so, of good old boys Fagen and Becker – let's face it, 'Zazu' even sounds like a Steely Dan title. The tackiness of the concept is assured by the knowledge that our Rosie is a one-time New York model, and a glance at the sleeve credits hardly raises hopes ("Thanks to God, Jesus . . .").

And yet this much-vaunted debut lives up to, and easily surpasses, all expectations. An unexpected jolt, this: an addictively playable album of nine songs totally compatible in terms of quality and atmosphere. I guess Steely Dan fans will appreciate a record which manages to pin down that elusive jazz feel without ever sliding into the much-vandalised jazz ghetto.

But this is by no means a Steely Dan venture. Becker and Fagen only actually play together on three tracks, and as telling a contribution is made by Rick Derringer. No, this is Rosie Vela, a voice which almost certainly is sultry, expressing chameleon moods which touch on Ann Peebles ('Interlude') and Carly Simon ('Taxi'), while generally evading direct comparison. A publicist's dream of a record.

ANDY HURT

THE RESIDENTS 'Stars And Hank Forever'

(Ralph Records RZ-8652)****

PART TWO of a projected ten record set that will take us eventually into the 21st century. Each record features the work of two American composers, both of whom get the fullblown reverential Residents treatment. And this time round, it's country godstar Hank Williams and patriotic marcher John Philip Sousa, the man responsible for much of America's national pomp.

It is the Williams side of this record which works best. The Residents, although clever and ingenious, have trouble extracting anything they can call their own out of Sousa's puddingy anthems, but Hank's a leaner tunesmith and ripe for tinkering with.

'Hey Good Looking' boasts
Snakefinger back on guitar,
as lithe and slinky as ever.
'Kaw Liga' gets Michael
Jackson in on the act and
'Ramblin' Man' could put Nick
Cave to shame, so sombre is
its funereal plod. Good as this
is, though, I still yearn
nostalgically for the good old

days when people honestly used to think that these Residents hated popular music. There are no screeches of outraged loathing here, nor any major upheavals of any sort, come to that.

The Residents may be older and tamer nowadays but, unlike many of their contemporaries, they're still trying to amaze. For that alone, they should be both applauded and rewarded. I just wish that a rush of the old bile would flood back into their work occasionally.

MILLIE JACKSON 'An Imitation Of Love' (Jive HIP43)*****

IF MILLIE Jackson was your auntie you'd probably spend the whole Christmas break getting pissed and laughing at the rest of the family and talking about absurd ways in which you blew love affairs. It'd be great. Thus her new and possibly most disciplined record has been the soundtrack in my home for the last three days.

'Disciplined' only in that she channels her sassy vitriol through a set of conventional smooth funk gurgles which lick the soles of Stax. But Millie could never be bland – the closest game to 'tame' here is a resplendent reading of Prince's 'Wanna Be Your Lover'. The pause between "wanna be the only one who makes you come" and "running" is cool beyond lasciviousness.

Millie's expertise oozes from the single and opening track, a lush rhythmic 'Juicy Fruit' approximation endearingly entitled 'Hot! Wild! Unrestricted! Crazy Love'. In which she's gonna love you all over, long and profound. I'm spinning.

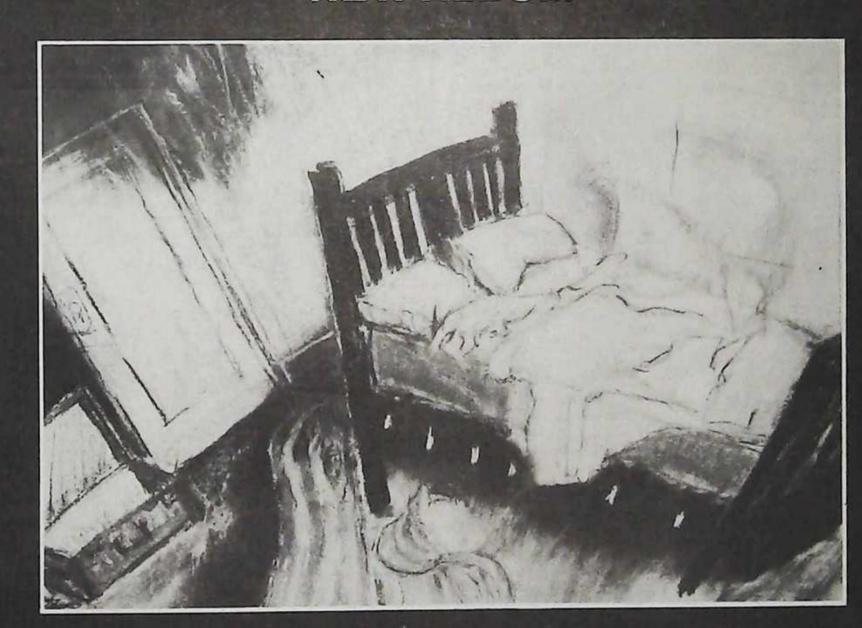
Ms Jackson's mature wisdom continues to emanate from 'Love Is A Dangerous Game' and 'Mind Over Matter'. Sometimes, Timmy Allen's bright healthy production takes it into Maze/Beverly mode, which is no lifeless thing. But the familiar husky rap keeps it grainy and rooted in realism.

Agile and ageless, she expresses her philosophy of life ("it's a thang") and, of course, this is more than accurate. As a finale we get the eternal paradox: 'I Need To Be By Myself' followed by 'I Fell In Love'. The rap is minimal. Is that a sense of Millie getting more romantic or just an attempt to sell some records for once?

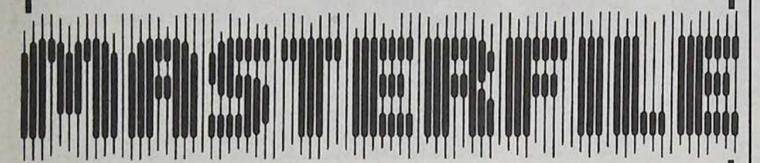

IF SEX BRAGG

BILLY BRAGG may have a lot to say about the state of the nation, but when it comes to his private life he's surprisingly quiet. JAMES BROWN finds a jilted lover in Lytham St Annes. Photo by MICK PEEK

BILLY BRAGG is crossing the road back to his minibus.

His raincoat is wrapped around his shoulders almost as tightly as my fingers cling to my tape recorder.

We're in Lytham St Annes, five minutes south of Blackpool. It's 8.30 in the morning and it's cold.

We've just left two mildly amused pensioners putting their way around the miniature-golf course. They're happy because this young man with a Cockney accent has just joked with them in the same cheery sort of way they fondly imagine their own sons talk to old age pensioners. They did not hear him suggest we rush over and push them into the hedge.

Do you have any trouble chatting people up, Billy?

"Yeah, I'm like the world's worst at it. I'm one for spending ages trying really hard to get someone on their own and then freezing and crawling up the wallpaper. Then when I see people just go up to strange women and start talking to them, I think, How do they do that? I suppose it's fear of rejection or something, isn't it?"

The two old women don't know that this was the first time the polite young man had laughed sickly to himself in days. Nor that the night before he'd enthusiastically entertained his Winter Gardens audience to rampant grinning point only to usher two old friends back to his hotel to get miserably shitfaced. The Jack Daniels went out of the

bottle into the glass and down the throat until it went swiftly back up the throat, past the lips and onto the carpet. Hank Williams was on the tape recorder and Billy Bragg was getting grim.

Even his manager kept away.

Why was the Berk Of Barking with the soul of gold acting like a shamefaced and tearful old alcoholic bore? Because, ironically, within a day of my Sounds LP review suggesting his life needed a good shaking, he's been chucked.

A good time for me to stick the critical Stanley knife in.

RAGG'S THIRD LP, 'Talking With The Taxman About Poetry', is the clumsiest stage in his development from frothy sub-Weller Barking Brat into mature but articulate singer/songwriter. What Bragg calls a "focusing of ideas", I call mellowing. The LP isn't without quality songs – what is missing is precision.

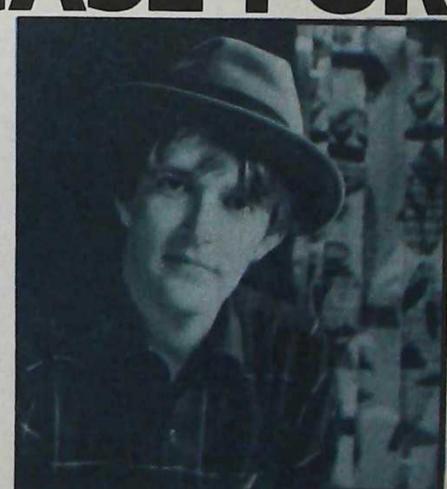
Where Bragg's confusion in the past had been channelled into anger, verbal aggression, and pointedly obvious but biting social and political commentary, it has now been pushed towards an attempt at untangling the harder topic of personal relationships. He still understands his political targets and stabs as deftly and accurately as is expected, but it's the attempted exploration into the wider field of adult relationships that's revealed his bark to be sharper than his bite. And when you've a quality control the level of Billy Bragg's for everything else in life, it's disappointing when your songwriting slips.

Sex, pregnancy, marriage –
Bragg's songs increasingly seem
more suitable as Play For Today
scores than as relatives to the
yapping puppy dog enthusiasm and
social snarling of the 'Life's A Riot'
LP.

a lot of the songs on the new LP seem redundant now?

"No, not really, because when I'm singing them live I think, Yeah, ouch, I can feel that right now. Like 'Honey, I'm A Big Boy Now' is very meaningful at the moment. I'm really cynical when it comes to relationships. Anything really good has to come to an end.

"This is the first time I've just waded in blind in ages and ages and ages and it's all rebounded onto me in a really bad way. And it's my fault because it was me who walked into it so gormlessly.

"I think there's a lot of humour involved in relationships, I think they're very funny. There are few things more hysterical than being naked in bed with someone. It's so serious to so many people, and so important, that for you to be able to admit that you were lying there wondering what time the train leaves is achingly funny."

Why should people put any faith in what you're saying politically and socially when they know so little about your private life?

"They shouldn't. They shouldn't look up to my ideas any more than those of the person next door. As for there being a veil of secrecy around my life, well there aren't any great secrets or anything, but as far as my privacy goes, yeah, I do keep things to myself and long may it remain that way."

HE MOST disgusting thing I have ever seen at a concert is people dancing to a slow Billy Bragg song, out of political empathy.

Utterly styleless and stiff, and completely lacking in life, innuendo, or physical presence, this arseless liberal sloth boogie was revolting, yet it was probably as much an indication of why people like him as anything.

The popularity of The Clash, The Au Pairs, The Redskins, Psychic TV (before B Jones), and The Special AKA, shows that certain people do enjoy the fusion of pop and politics. And while most concentrate primarily on the music, there are Billy Bragg fans who will gladly tell or show you that their main reason for paying the man cash and attention is that they enjoy this

political polemic.

Your live performances are very sexless. Don't you ever want to go on stage naked so that we can see what it's all about?

"No, because that's not what it's all about, James. That's just sensationalism. It's just the lowest common denominator. Aren't we supposed to be appealing to something a little higher? Don't you think there's enough sex being sold in popular music at the moment without me joining in? I'll quite happily give it out if people want to ask, but me walking onto the stage

stark naked would just be sensationalism."

What I mean is, you don't have people down the front screaming and trying to take your pants off, do

"Oh yes I do! At the Young Socialist Conference there was a young girl down the front who grabbed me by the ankle during 'The Marriage' and wouldn't let go."

Well, if that's your idea of sexual hysteria I'll be giving your bed a miss tonight. Throughout the interview I've sat and picked at the seams of my 501s. Now, hours on, standing

all roadfaced and niggling beside the white Bedford minibus, we both know what's been bothering the other.

Bragg understands that my main beef with him is that, instead of getting wild and tearing into the grim reality of our country and our existences, he's decided just to tug away and document it. He knows we're both having difficulty growing up, artistically and personally, and that it's a bit strange. And he knows I think the guitars should be faster.

I know that Bragg is suffering emotionally and that he is extremely

lonely - that's why he puts himself in front of so many people each night. It hardly sweetens the bitterness but it's likely the songs he writes now will be far better than those he's written during his last months of contentment.

It's frosty. We exchange smiles, Bragg smacks me round the head, and the two of us set off in different directions. Him to soothe his jackhammered heart, and me to mend my trousers.

Emotionally disturbed pop stars? For God's sake keep them away.

THE COUNTRY

ROM HIS hat to his toes, Peter Case is comfortable and all-American.

He enjoys old things, old ways: his guitar is new but he likes it because it's made to an old standard.

"It's a Gibson J-45. In the '70s Gibsons were made like big slabs of wood. But two younger guys took the company down to Nashville and they're making them like they were in the '50s.

"The thing about acoustic music is, uh, you try and record it really live. Just set up microphones and play music. Some engineers didn't know how to deal with it. Monitors are always turned up high for huge bands. You take this guitar on and strum it, it blows your hat off."

Case cracks his knuckles and takes out his guitar. The surface shines, like old rosewood. A string is missing.

"I'll put this on while we talk."

E SPEAKS in a folksy mumble. When he sings, it's in a throaty, cracked-corn voice, telling tales of a recent past he grew up in and is reluctant to leave. 'Peter Case', his first solo record, runs through a stack of such tunes. The music, he says, is "all plucked and hit". Acoustic guitars and percussion make the music chime and glint around Peter's newspaperish lyrics. Produced by that professional eccentric T-Bone Burnett, it's simple and subtle country and city music, USA.

"I was born in Our Lady Of Victory, right on the border of Lackawana and Buffalo, New York. We used to call it LA. It's a steel town. Used to be a real smoky place, in the '50s and '60s. You could smell sulphur and you couldn't see very well. But when the plant closed down, the air got real clear. It's not the same. Everybody's out of work.

"My father was an industrial chemist. Then his brother sold him an ice cream stand. But they have bad winters there and my father'd be home a lot because he couldn't sell the ice cream. Then he became a physics teacher and I still meet people who knew him at school. It was just a little town, you know. Little homes."

The string in place, he ripples off some chords. It's easy to be nostalgic about Peter Case's world. Does he dwell in the past?

"That might be true. I'm a nostalgic guy. I mean, no, I don't think I dwell in the past, there's just a whole lot of stuff that's being covered over now and a whole lotta really bad things are happening ..."

He is making a speech, and puts on an Abe Lincoln dialect.

"... I tend to love musics of the past. You don't think Leadbelly called up a thousand people to find out what would make people turn their radio on? He just played what he did. But I don't dwell in the past."

T'S NOT as if Case has just sprung up from nowheresville in America. He fronted the strong and unsuccessful Plimsouls, whose two albums are lost diamonds of pop-rock.

After they broke up, he spent a couple of years driving through America and preparing songs. He loves Blind Lemon Jefferson and Mississippi Fred McDowell, and you can hear the wry sting of the blues at the back of his

work. But he's no revivalist. The LP has a contemporary bite to it, music sharp enough to involve the past and not merely invoke it.

Wrong, perhaps, to label Case as part of a new roots movement. Most listeners don't give a damn about 'roots', anyway. The only thing he really has in common with the likes of Dwight Yoakam, Marshall Crenshaw and Tommy Keene (aside from the point that they all end up with WEA) is a sense of individuality.

He will probably wind up another critics' favourite, a couple of records, a footnote. But Case is worth taking some time and trouble for. He has good stories.

"When I first lived in Hollywood there was a tennis court across the way. Well-to-do businessmen would come down and play tennis and people in my building would shoot at them. I'd be walking out the front door and this cop'd be there with a gun pointing right in my face, hands shaking ...

"Another time, these girls were walking out of the building ... "

This story involves a man called Albert, a ghetto blaster, a man in his pyjamas walking a dog, some marijuana plants, an escapee from Arizona Prison and a bad conscience. There's a song in there, somewhere.

A CERTAIN RATIO Kentish Town Town And Country Club

FILING ON as the massively accomplished songsmith talents of The Bible still echo around, ACR are looking as gaunt and as removed as ever. But lead skeleton and stage hub, Jeremy Kerr, has something new to say: "We're not The Smiths and we're not New Order. We're A Certain Ratio and we're the hardest band in Manchester."

This recently acquired gift for rhetoric goes down well with a large section of this audience, certainly the largest I've seen the Ratios attract. They've still got their retinue of fatigued funk ascetics but tonight the front is crowded out with followers of a casual, inter-city nature and they're supporting ACR with all the

THE STRANGLERS **Edinburgh Playhouse**

NEVER BEFORE has the old adage 'like audience like band' proved so true. A year ago at the Dominion in London, The Stranglers were a gruelling spectacle, distant, dreary and tame. A year ago, they were quite plainly going through the motions.

But tonight, amidst a virtually hysterical atmosphere making even the most debauched of London gigs seem funereal - the band stalk into their revitalised set with an obvious lusty glint in their eyes. Cornwell is sleek and sinister. JJ Burnel taut and supple, Jet Black solid and reliable, and Dave Greenfield, a raven-haired dandy in matching sweat-shirt and long johns, a wee bit odd, but there you go.

To begin with, it looks dicey. Greenfield's keyboards splutter and die, only to burst back into life then fizzle out yet again. But the sheer exuberance of the event itself eventually overshadows, then banishes these initial problems altogether.

Songs from the new and surprisingly vibrant 'Dreamtime' LP are received already like old friends, as is the suave and gently psychedelic current single, 'Always The Sun'.

Latter-day Stranglers material - tunes like the exquisite 'Strange Little Girl', stuff that's revealed the group to be highly competent brute balladeers - doesn't quite click as it should within the live environment, but the snarlers work like magic.

'Nice 'n' Sleazy' sees the stage invaded by 30 or so would-be JJs, each mimicking the bassist's curious karate kicks and hip-swivels with a rabid eye for detail, turning the performance into more of a family get-together than the big pop concert I'd been expecting. Cornwell's smiling face says it all.

It's good to see so many people not caring about who's hip and what for and why. It's also nice to find The Stranglers putting out their best music in years, getting to grips with it and having fun. They never actually do anything startling but that's possibly where their strength lies: they excel at being artfully ordinary. I'm almost converted.

MR SPENCER

THE ROBERT CRAY BAND **Hammersmith Palais**

THE BLUES have been blighted over here for too long by the '60s connection. But it looks like Robert Cray has set up a generation gap to judge by the paucity of

beat boom survivors at a

packed Palais. And not only did he prove that young men can sing the blues, he did it with considerably more dignity than many of his illustrious

forebears have managed. He looked his audience straight in the eye and they looked right back. He didn't rock out much but then he didn't have to; he has his own kind of intensity, breaking the mould of hackneyed blues lyrics and replacing them with a new poetry.

He didn't move about much either, but sweat was still dripping off his face after a few minutes. It was left to his faithful bassist Richard Cousins to provide most of the movement as he stalked around his master with exaggerated care.

Not that Cray wasn't nifty on his feet when he did try a little dancing. But it was only a ten second burst - he doesn't believe in much

razzamatazz.

Maybe his set was a bit one-paced but I was so pleased by the lack of clichés that I had no difficulty being enthralled. Cray even retuned his guitar in mid-solo, so he must be a real blueser.

PETER MURPHY Kentish Town Town **And Country Club**

PETER MURPHY has a treasured home in many hearts. Those for whom he represents some special days gone by and those who pay homage to his exquisite features. All are gathered here to witness the angel dance alone, with no more distractions to steal away self-doubt. They come to see if the spotlights that once illuminated his passion still shine as bright.

The sound of 'Blue Heart' pierces the gloom and a voice teases the senses before its owner appears. His hair plays over his dress shirt while a belt impersonates a cummerbund and make-up cuts deep into his cheeks. He looks like heaven.

Magazine's 'The Light Pours Out Of Me' is given new life as long-suffering boyfriends balance loved ones clutching cameras and fantasies on their shoulders.

The sound is often complex and clinical, musicianship tearing out the heart. But throughout, Murphy's manicured mannerisms elevate the scene to theatre with a twinkle in those eyes that hints at humour.

When the ghost of Bauhaus is resurrected with 'She's In Parties', it's as if nothing's changed, all hopes are realised. For one so fragile, he strides around with towering arrogance, posing and preening, teasing the lights with contorted gestures, and no one questions his belief.

'Spirit' and 'The Passion Of Lovers' toy with later models, with 'Confessions' coming on like Bowie's 'The Bewley Brothers'.

A change of speed, a change of style heralds the climax as Pere Ubu's 'Final Solution' envelops your soul. The noise eats up and spits out those with reservations, and the balletic twists make for a sweet end as the man is carried off to the wings. For me the night had ended; that they chose to rekindle 'A Kick In The Eye' was incidental.

Seeing Peter Murphy in a bus queue is a treat; witnessing him on stage is a dream come true.

IT HAS to be the coolest, neatest, sharpest intro that I've seen to any live show. Ever.

As the curtains swish sideways, a giant sphinx looms, (cheap) Ray Bans obscuring its eyes, a vast dustsheet spilling out of its jaws to shroud the stage. And then: schluuurp! It sucks the mass of flapping white material up a greedy nose, revealing a manic, mechanical dashboard, fuel gauge pumping in the gas, radio dial tuned permanently to station ZZXS.

And there they are, the three beards. Crazy cartoon characters beaming down to reality. Or at least, as near to reality as ZZ Top can maybe get ...

Strange how a band born out of something as basic as the blues should become such a' showbiz spectacle. These days, their stageshows are funk exhibitionism rather than metal bombast, more Cameo than Iron

Maiden. Everything flows as smoothly as did 'Eliminator' into 'Afterburner', their vinyl progression underlined when the auto stage set mutates into the flight deck of a futuristic spaceship. It's clever, almost too clever but for the ridiculous touches that punctuate the package: Billy Gibbons and Dusty Hill disappearing in pantomime puffs of smoke, their furry guitars left spinning in mid-air.

But it's with their singularly appropriate selection and insertion of large slices of their Texan history that ZZ Top really show their style. 'Cheap Sunglasses' and 'Jesus Just Left Chicago' need no introduction. But inspired versions of 'Tube Snake Boogie' and 'Ten Foot Pole', Gibbons' strangled vocals pulling the latter to new lascivious lows, cut across the years, linking the old and the new with that irresistible beat and that highly individual sense of humour ...

THERE'S QUITE a few things you can do during the support act at a New Model Army gig. You can watch the band (but hardly anyone did), you can read NMA's fanzine or just mingle with their disciples, chaps such as Rich from the Walton Militia who knows everything you need to know about Slade and co.

But the lesson's about to begin and the faithful masses crowd to the front, or strip, or climb onto friends' shoulders or, like Liz, tonight's champion groover, do the udder-pulling dance. They all know the routine. The intelligent (like me) pay attention to the gospel according to Slade.

The music's not just loud, it penetrates. The message is clearer than ever before and apathy's definitely out this year. Suddenly, a few bars into 'The Hunt', they stop, but any mistakes seem intentional. "We do requests, you know," says Slade, "but don't bother asking because it's out of the question." All the same, the crowd yell and get their medleys.

New Model Army are the old and the new and, like the very best of pickles, they're scrumptious, even if a lot of people reel back from the stench.

ALTHOUGH 'JACOB'S
Ladder' was written by
support artist Bruce Hornsby,
it actually fits like a glove as
the opening track to both

But while Hornsby appears to base his career upon the cerebral quality and sophistication of his songwriting, Lewis' appeal is quite blatantly built upon the fact that he's one of the most engaging and likeable performers of the decade. Lewis goes straight for your feet and your heart, his very naturalness striking one huge power chord in your subconscious.

Live, Chris Hayes' guitars are turned up much louder and often played much more aggressively than they are on record. But the central message remains the same.

Because Huey Lewis is all about the simple things.
About honesty, about ambition and patience reconciled, and about the power of love. And when he sings about that last one, he brings on the marvellous Tower Of Power horns.

The very personification of those qualities he champions, Huey Lewis is living proof that the heart of rock 'n' roll is indeed still beating.

THE SMITHS London Palladium

WOT, NO roundabout? Apparently not. Just because The Smiths were playing Sunday night at the London Palladium, it didn't mean they were going to make an occasion of it. This was a gig like those at the Kilburn National and the Brixton Academy before it. And like the whole tour before that.

In fact, the gig started back in America where they've finally decided to give it a crack. The grandiose operatic aria followed by the classical anthem and bright lights dazzling the audience gave way to a blistering version of 'The Queen Is Dead' with Morrissey waving a placard like a demented demonstrator and Johnny Marr burning his midnight lamp on the wah-wah pedal.

'Panic' followed instantly, Morrissey twirling a noose as he sang "hang the DJ". But then The Smiths don't need a DJ; they're quite capable of plugging the entire 'The Queen Is Dead' album by themselves.

Which is what they proceeded to do. But as they did so, the alacrity gradually waned and the blue and green lights took on the same murky hue as the sound, which often rendered Morrissey's voice inaudible. You could hear him growl, though.

Occasionally, they delved back into 'Meat Is Murder' for the title track and 'Rusholme Ruffians'. There was a new song too, called 'Is It Really So', but none of them added much contrast. That only happened when Johnny Marr stopped trying to compete with his newly acquired rhythm guitarist, Craig Gammon, and played like the lead guitarist he should be.

Morrissey managed to pierce the dense sound on 'The Boy With The Thorn In His Side' and 'Cemetary Gates' when he overcame his ambivalence sufficiently to start taking off his shirt. Two songs later, he threw the shirt into the crowd and the set was over.

The applause had virtually ceased by the time they came back for four numbers: an instrumental, 'How Soon Is Now', another long break, 'Still Ill' and 'Bigmouth Strikes Again'. These songs were much better. In fact, they should have been in the set. What difference will EMI make?
