IGGY POP has added an extra date at the Brixton Academy on December 18. Tickets are priced at £7 and are available from the Box Office or by post from the Iggy Pop Box Office, PO Box 77, London SW4 9LH. Cheques and Postal Orders should be made payable to Iggy Pop Box Office and all applications must be accompanied by an SAE and 50p booking fee. He also releases a single called 'Real Wild Child (Wild

He also releases a single called 'Real Wild Child (Wild One)' on A&M on November 21, which comes from his 'Blah-Blah-Blah' album.

DAVID BOWIE is currently working hard in a New York studio on his new album, which is expected to be released in the Spring.
Although a Bowie spokesman has told us that there are no plans as yet for a tour, this hasn't dampened rumours that he will set off around the world following the release of the album next year, which would be his first tour since '83.

FURNITURE, who've just finished a British tour, follow up their successful singles 'Brilliant Mind' and 'Love Your Shoes' with the release of their debut album titled 'The Wrong People' on Stiff on November 10.

OZZY OSBOURNE is recording a live album from his current American tour which is scheduled for release early next year.

FM who've just finished touring Britain with Magnum – except at their Hammersmith Odeon gig where they declined to play in front of the curtains – will be guesting on the Bon Jovi tour which starts this weekend.

They are playing all dates except the final two Hammersmith Odeon shows where they are replaced by Queensryche.

ZERRA ONE, the Irish rock band, have been confirmed as support to Ultravox on their tour this month, and they hope to have an album out early next year.

BILLY BRAGG was arrested at an anti-nuclear demonstration at Bawburgh near Norwich last Sunday.

He was charged with criminal damage – cutting one strand of a barbed wire fence surrounding a nuclear bunker – and will appear in court on November 14.

He was one of 11 people arrested at the demonstration organised by the Snowball campaign.
Afterwards he said "I stand by the dictum that dissent without civil disobedience is consent."

# NUT CLUSTER

Marc Almond to play a UK minitour during November. Meanwhile, he slams Radio One for their bland programming

MARC ALMOND has set up a mini-tour to precede his London Palladium carnival on November 23.

With his Willing Sinners, who remain unchanged and unrepentant, he'll be playing Croydon Fairfield Halls November 16, Burton-On-Trent Central Park 17, Birmingham Powerhouse 18, Manchester International 19, Bristol University 21, Kingston Polytechnic 22.

For the Palladium show Marc will be supported by Miss Claudia Bliss and Lorna.

Radio One producers have been feeling the rough edge of Marc's tongue after his 'Ruby Red' single failed to get more than a couple of plays despite being in the Top 50 for a couple of weeks. It has now dropped out and Marc has slammed the "new wallpaper music age" which predominates at the Beeb. It is not known whether he has sent his complaint to Norman Tebbit's BBC-bashing committee however.

He'll release a new single soon after Christmas, with his 'Mother Fist And Her Five Daughters' album landing on Radio One producers' desks early in the New Year.

THE TAXI CONNECTION, the twohour reggae revue powered by the legendary riddim twins Robbie Shakespeare and Sly Dunbar, and featuring vocalist Ini Kamoze (pictured right) and DIs Half Pint and Yellowman, arrive later this month for a British tour.

The Taxi Gang band also includes the Ras Brass, keyboard players Franklyn Waul and Handel Tucker, plus guitarist Winston Bowen. Currently playing dates in Europe, they begin their British

dates at Exeter University on November 26 and then play St Austell Coliseum 27, Bristol Exhibition Centre 28, London Kentish Town Town And Country Club 29, Portsmouth Guildhall 30, London Kentish Town Town And Country Club December 1, Norwich East Anglia University 2, Manchester International Two 3, Leeds University 4, Belfast Whitla Hall 5, Dublin Stadium 6.

They've also contributed to the soundtrack of a new movie by John Hughes called Ferris Beulah's Day Off which will be released early next year.

ANNETTE PEACOCK, who started her European tour at London's Ronnie Scott's in August, completes the tour with another date at the same venue on November 9. As before, she'll be backed by her band I Belong To A World That's Destroying Itself.

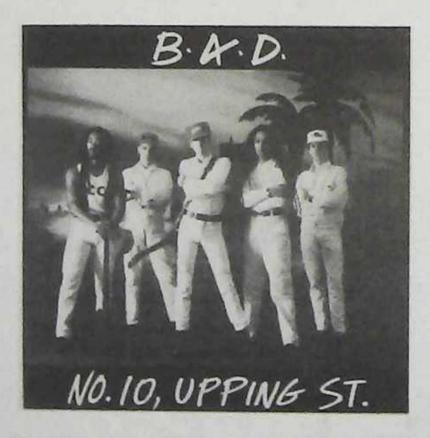

LATIN QUARTER have lined up a series of "semi-acoustic" gigs this month during a break from recording their second album.

Despite a career-long slagging in Sounds some young staffers were seen singing along to 'I Ran', 'Space Age Love Song' and 'Wishing (I Had A Photograph Of You)' during office hours. They have received black marks on their appraisal records.

'JAZZ JUICE 3' is a collection of rare Latin cuts from the '60s released by Streetwave including Eydie Gorme's 'The Coffee Song (They've Got An Awful Lot Of Coffee In Brazil)', Lou Rawls' 'The Girl From Ipanema', Rob Mullins' 'Samba' and Freddie Hubbard's 'Return Of The Prodigal Son'.

It includes his 'Rockin' At The 2 'I's' single from 1957 and a "female" version of 'Riot In Cell Block No 9' because he didn't realise he was covering a cover!

IGGY POP's 1981 Arista album, 'Party', has been reissued in time for his London gig next month. Caught between Bowie phases, it was scarcely the most creative period of his life, drawing such critical plaudits as "empty bluster", "stupidity" and "nothing new or fresh".

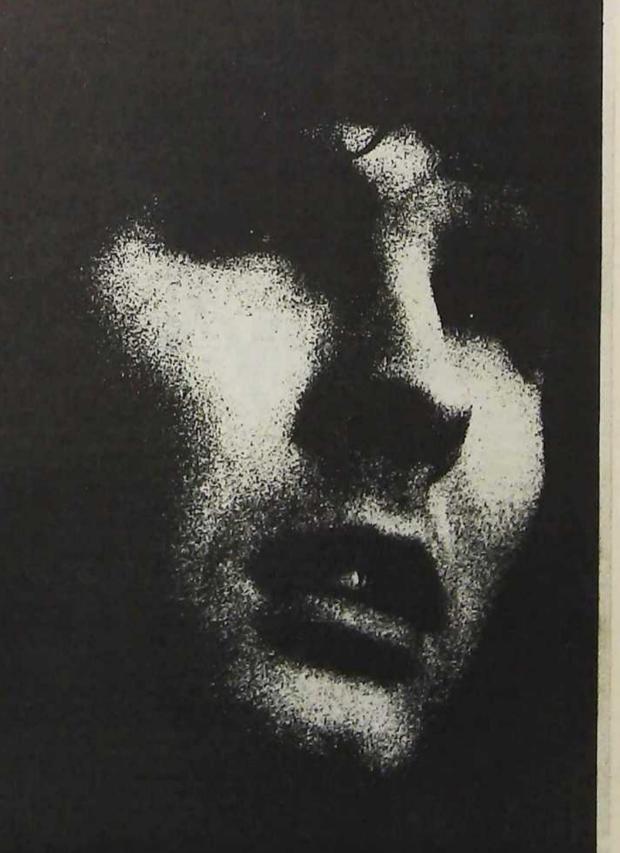

# The Fight To Be Heard

Kez Owen talks of Legacy Of Lies, a band with a mission and the ammunition

BEFORE ME stands an army in full battle dress, bandaged and bloodled and carrying a rather conspicuous ammunition

The army, it transpires, are a band named Legacy Of Lies, and they've been fighting to be heard over the voices of a waffling nation.

The fight goes on and they've now recorded a new single, 'Sacrifice The Queen' which, like their previous offerings, 'Chilean Warning' and 'You And Who's Army EP' is hard and packed with explosives.

Legacy Of Lies are so threatening because they're so aware. They Involve themselves and sing about political situations, Chile for example.

After the attempted assassination of General Pinochet who, as Legacy Of Lies say, "unfortunately survived", they chained themselves to the London embassy's rallings. And when I confess my

ignorance of the problems in Chile, I'm treated, right there in the middle of the pub, to a short history lesson that I actually understand.

American guitarist Tyme alms to return to his homeland and spread the word but that, it would appear, will prove difficult.

Bands have trouble getting into America if they have a message to get across," he says. "I mean. poor old New Model Army

had trouble with artistic merit - they didn't have enough - so visas were refused. I just want to be free to say what I want to say but, you know, people even told Jane Fonda to shut up when she started getting involved in politics."

'Sacrifice The Queen' Is about Imelda Marcos, the title coming from a protest chant against her husband former Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos. It sees the band - now three years old - adding raw power with two precision drummers and rapid, pumping ammo from the guitars and the explosive mouth of frontman Hawk.

And Legacy Of Lies are so dedicated to their causes that it hurts to hear them talk about them. That night I saw them play London's Dingwalls, I watched them bleed and I saw the guilt on people's faces as they listened to the words of the songs.

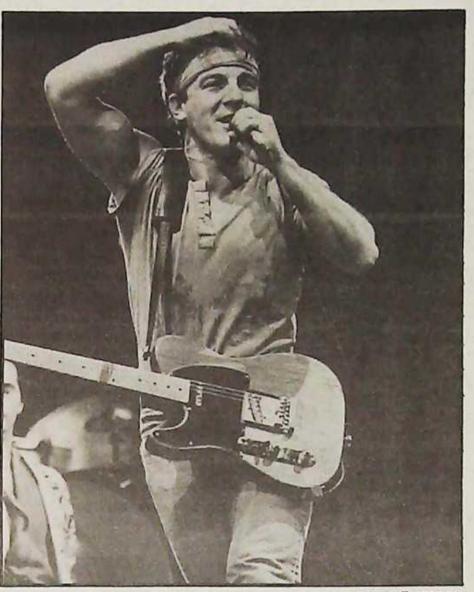
The Legacy, like the fight to be heard, will continue.

Of the 40 tracks spread across ten sides. seven have not previously appeared on a Springsteen album. After about two months that didn't work, but I was still ringing Les up, so he said, I've been stitching you up all the time, but I'm not going to do it again because I like you. So I thought, Oh no, he's pulling the same trick again, but I went with it and started to go with him to the

"He'd pay £25-50 for cars, and I'd put them for sale outside my flat - £120 and you can't really complain at that price. I really got on my feet in the business, and eventually Les told me to do it for myself. So I'd buy the cars, touch them up in the places they'd need touching up - all the moody jobs, like rust underneath - and always arrange for the buyers to come round at 7.30 on winter evenings. As a role model and ambassador for the black youth of south London, Smiley is something of a younger Clive Lloyd; look at Smiley – why break the law when there are plenty of more-or-less honest bucks to be made?

The spirit of Del Trotter and Arthur Daley lives, and one day soon every young Londoner will be seiling second-hand cars.

# Five years and two albums old, Black 'N Blue have finally found their true direction – but not without a little help from a friend. Mary Anne Hobbs hears the story

BLACK 'N BLUE are, by definition, the epitome of an aspiring young rock 'n' roll band.

Their look has been tuned and tallored to slide easily between Ratt and Mötley Crüe and onto the pages of the glossles, intent on weakening many a schoolgiri's knee.

Their commercial and melodic attributes have always been exploited on vinyl—maximising potential airplay, although the band have retained an irrepressibly hard live edge.

Perfect. Ideal. Pin-ups who can really play. And yet, five years and two albums later Black 'N Blue, for all their desirable qualities, have barely spawned a pimple on the adolescent face of rock 'n' roll.

However, the Los Angeles based quintet ain't about to throw the towel in quite yet. Their corrosive new album 'Nasty Nasty' was produced by Kiss bass player/would-be movie star Gene Simmons, and Black 'N Blue's spokesman, singer Jamie St James, is adamant that it's gonna be third time lucky for the band.

"We're far more confident than ever before," he enthuses. "We're approaching 'Nasty Nasty' as if it was our first album, because although our previous two records were good, they didn't really capture the sole of Black 'N Blue."

Last year's vinyl outing
'Without Love' featured Black
'N Blue's monumental
songwriting capabilities. But
potentially dangerous
material was castrated within
Bruce Fairburn's passive, if
sophisticated production.

Jamle credits Gene Simmons with finally unleashing the band's surpressed energies and establishing an overdue vinyl identity.

"Gene would watch us from the side of the stage almost every night when we were on the road with Kiss," recalls St James. "He's captured that live attitude which just wasn't happening on record before, and I think with 'Nasty Nasty' we've finally found our true direction."

Reasons to be cheerful, part

Blue would bag a major US
support tour, go to Europe
and guest at a few festivals,
and maybe even visit Japan.
But after last year's modest
touring experiences, nobody's
gonna persuade Jamie St

James It's that easy.

"We toured with Kiss,
Aerosmith, Night Ranger and
Dio, but we never seemed to
be on the road for more than a
few weeks," he sighs. "I really
hope that we're gonna get the
chance to tour much more
extensively with this album.

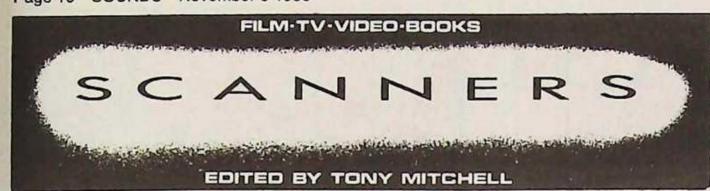
"It's Ironic really. When Black
'N Blue first came together as
a band, all we ever wanted to
do was play live. Sure, we
wanted to make a record, but
only so that we could go out
on the road 12 months a year
and play all the arenas we
used to go to as kids.

"But at last," he concludes, "I think we've finally got everything on our side. We've got the product and we've got the attitude.

"All we really need now is a little luck."

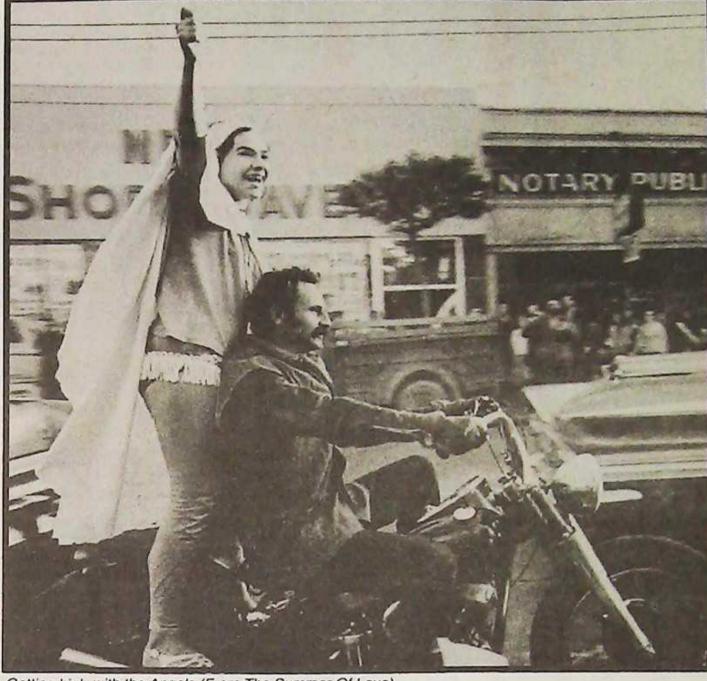

Volume 1 is not about rock and roll or The Grateful Dead, but a chronicle of the origins of "the Haight-Ashbury experience". Harrison managed The Warlocks (aka the early Dead) for a few months which is why The Grateful Dead and their mates crop up more often than Jefferson Airplane or Quicksilver Messenger Service. There's little attempt to be comprehensive, just impressionist.

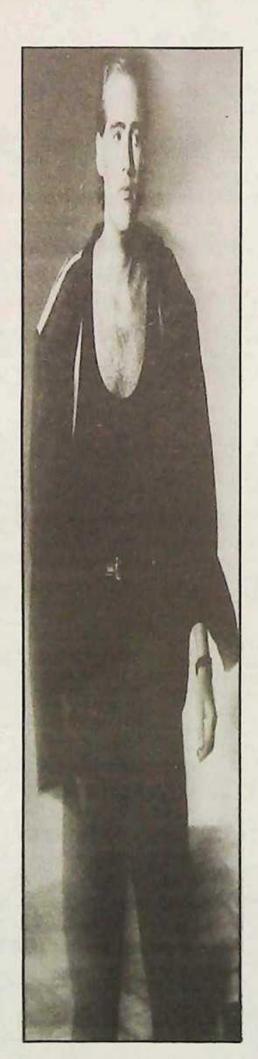

### VARIOUS ARTISTS Supershow At Staines (Virgin Video)

A HIDDEN treasure made public at last, Supershow is a must for anybody who can remember what the best of rock 'n' roll sounded like way back before punk.

Check this out: it's March 1969 and you're sat with hippy crossed legs in a disused lino factory in Staines. It's cold but you don't give a flying thingy because on a makeshift stage in this makeshift venue a whole lotta stars are shaking a whole lotta stuff.

There's Eric Clapton, Jack Bruce, Steven Stills and even Glen Campbell before he became Glen 'Rhinestone Cowboy' Campbell. There's the extraordinarily versatile Roland Kirk with a hundred and one instruments hanging about his neck, there's the excellent Buddy Guy and the powerful Buddy Miles. Jimi Hendrix, unfortunately, missed his plane! But still you don't really care, because there before you,

taking pride of place as always, are a very, very young Led

They could be the Ramones! Only John Paul Jones' already patented wimp look and Jimmy Page's pouting girly lips half hidden behind his long black mane give Zeppelin's game away. There's none of the later sword-and-sorcery nonsense here, only a marriage of brute force and sheer sexual genius. Only 'Dazed And Confused'. Only a hefty slice of history.

This, of course, is the appeal of Supershow. It's something of a souvenir of the late '60s, something of a work of reference, and also something of a record of the early days of some of today's great rock legends. The whole two-day event of ace performance and monstrous jazz sessions was recorded for posterity by an American film company, but amazingly the finished article is only now seeing the light of day.

Personally, I'd kill for a tape of the rest of Led Zeppelin's performance.

#### STRYPER Live In Japan

THE SUBJECT promises all sorts of good things but the finished product is roundly disappointing. Such a video will do Stryper no favours whatsoever, falling as it does to convey any of the excitement that the band of holy joy were whipping up on the night. As Debbie Harry returns, we resurrect Blondie's vinyl history



Blondie's 45s, except the first, were on Chrysalis, so having established that, I'll list them with just the CHS prefix rather than re-listing the label name umpteen times. That debut exception was on Private Stock, who recorded the group's first album, but later passed the recordings over to Chrysalis when the latter company bought up Blondie's contract.

Blondie also had one track apiece on two soundtrack albums. 'American Gigolo' (Polydor POLS 1018) featured 'Call Me', while 'Roadie' (Warner Bros K 66093) had a revival of the old Johnny Cash song 'Ring Of Fire'. Debbie Harry also had an acting role in this movie, which starred Meat Loaf. These albums were released in April and June 1980, respectively.

Chrysalis also released two Blondie videos, both equivalents of albums 'The Best Of Blondie' (CVIM 4) featured the promo clips for all their singles up to the end of 1981, while 'Eat To The Beat' (CVIM 5) had the same tracks as the LP.

There were innumerable Blondie bootleg albums from all around the world, most of them live recordings. They do, of course, fall right outside the scope of this discography, so we'll say no more about them except that many of their sleeve designers had a penchant for using (faked) nude pictures of Debbie on their covers.

Overseas Blondie releases are a bit of an estoteric area too. Unless someone can correct me authoritatively, I don't believe there were any actual Blondie recordings which appeared overseas but not here, only different combinations of the same material. For instance, 'I'm Gonna Love You Too' from 'Parallel Lines' was released as a single in the US (Chrysalis CYS 2251), coupled with 'Just Go Away'.

Pre and post-Blondie recordings by the various members of the band are also not particularly relevant to this feature, though we should probably make an exception

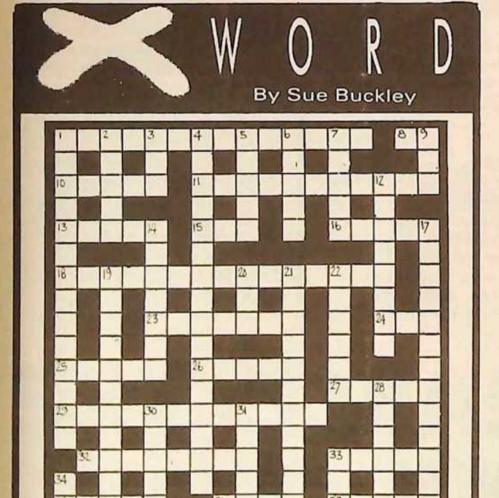

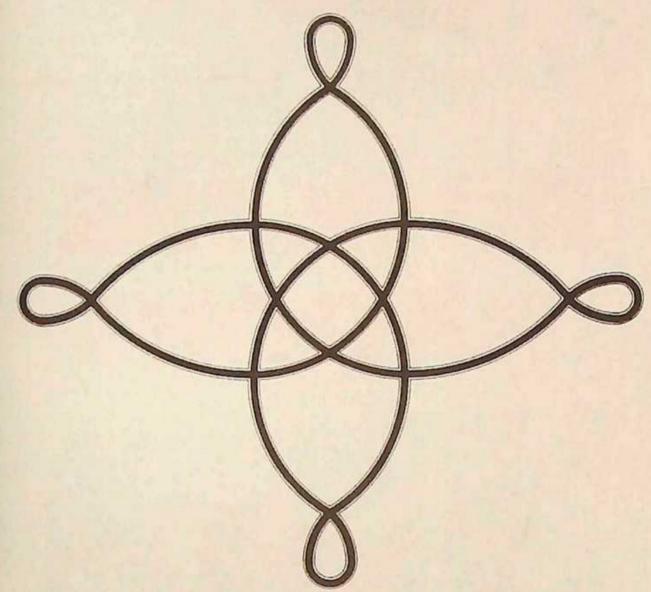

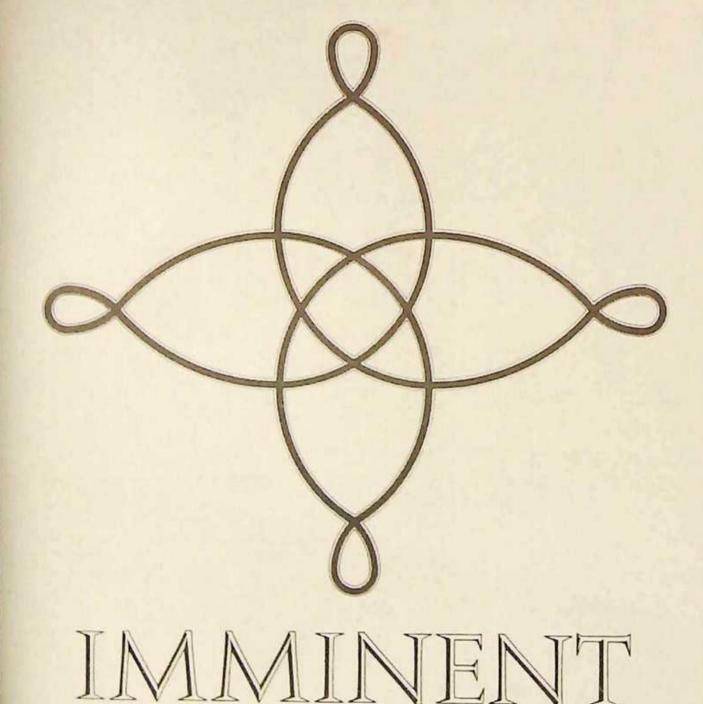

# STUMP STEP TWILIGHT

HE NAME of the quartet nursing hangovers tonight is perfect.

Stump!

Satirical, hard-humoured and devoid of half-measures, both musical and alcoholic, no other group in 1986 has provoked such divided opinions. Some consider them to be "weird old bastards rehashing Beefheart and XTC".

Others reckon the foursome's challenge to pop's conventional structures is "revolutionary".

In their wake most people are left literally Stump-ed.

What do they say?

"Revolutionary? Phew, that's a pretty heavy word. It makes me think of The Beatles, the Pistols, the Velvets, The Byrds, people who influenced generations," reckons drummer Rob McKahey in his swingalong Cork drawl. "I don't think we're going to do that, but we are more interesting and innovative than some people give us credit for.

"Julian Cope said, Stump are XTC, maaaan. I always thought they were simply a rock band and we're more. Personally, I think Julian Cope should kill himself straight away, not because of what he said about us but because he is a complete 'erbert. He takes up too much space walking around. There should be a pasture where they put such bozos out to grass when they've dried up. Give them a few guitars and let them jam themselves to death."

"I like the fact that we annoy as many people as we convert. It's good to be stirring the shit," butts in singer Mick Lynch with his Irish eyes smiling.

HIS IS the story of how Rob,
Mick, Kev Hopper and Chris
Salmon Stump(ed) the world
and sent the bails of music flying
With characteristic good-bad
taste and self-deflating humour, the
group have titled their mini-album
'Quirk Out'. The catalogue number is
STUFF U2 and it will appear on their

own label because nobody of consequence – indie or major – would deign to set it loose on a public not used to rock, country, soul, jazz, funk, pops and pans all being irreverently crammed into a pressure cooker.

"At Rockfield where the album was recorded we stayed in this house on a hill. I chose the attic bedroom because it was really beautiful and cute. Er. but Steve, you use steel guitar don'tcha? "I use steel guitar, I lean on it pretty heavily, but probably the basis for the sound of our records is acoustic guitars... and plenty of 'em. We rock pretty hard, we play rock clubs and we're definitely the loudest band in Nashville."

UITAR TOWN' probably isn't going to be the best record of his career but it will do very nicely for now.

Buried deep in the album are the seeds of hope for a better country music scene and songwriting that stands up tall and proud with the best of Springsteen, Jackson Browne, Hank Williams and Johnny Cash.

"We've worked this summer with George Jones, Waylon Jennings, The Replacements, Long Ryders, Green On Red... it's pretty schizophrenic as far as the type of crowds go, but then we're starting to develop the odd market where they're not so much worried about the radio format.

"In Chicago we played this large room and there were country fans there and there were rock fans, nobody infected anybody and everybody got along fine. I don't know why it can't be like that everywhere. I have a feeling that if I don't accomplish anything else I'm gonna help that happen, where it doesn't matter anymore, it's just music."

ROM HIS roots as a humble folk singer to playing bass for seasoned veteran Guy Clark to having a hit country album seems to be a pretty giant step for such a 'new talent' as Steve Earle.

Does it feel scary suddenly having the eyes of the press looking him over?

"It doesn't scare me one bit, this is all I've ever wanted to do, I've been working real hard to get to this place. It's my job! There's no use in complaining about it. I don't make a lot of money onstage but I make a living and I'm addicted to

"Working with The Replacements was kinda scary because their audience tends to be pretty hardcore and they throw a lot of shit onstage and stuff. But when I went out and really saw their audience they were pretty clean cut, post-punk

"We went out there and they thought we were from Mars. They'd never heard anything like us before, but they listened and they listened to the words. There's a lot of people who just assume these kids are here to absorb decibels, they're not really listening to what's going on. But I don't think that's true.

"The reason I play those dates is because country music is going to die if a younger audience isn't attracted to it. I go out and tour with Waylon or George Jones. . . well, that's great for the people who are already listening to country radio, some of them are going to buy the records. But kids are not going out to see those acts and you have to go out and get that audience to listen to you."

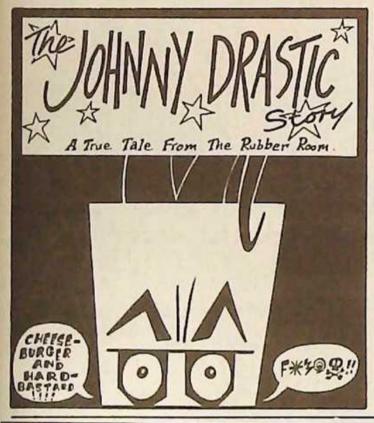

They will not be willingly chopped down to size. Trip over them soon.



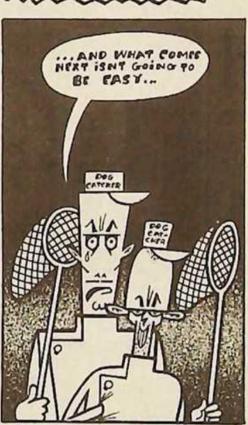

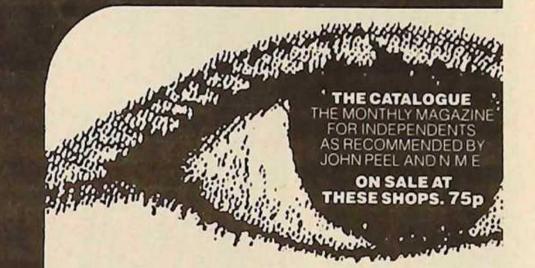

ZAPP 'Radio People' (Warners) At last, someone is distilling a new soul sound. The key to get into Roger Troutman's Zapp is made of golden, glistening pop music.

Troutman hears Prince, Blackmon and all those cats, but he's just as interested in reclaiming the melodic nuggets that Euro-hucksters like Kraftwerk, the earliest Numan and original OMD never followed through. The logical thing was to bring all this back home to the simple soul-dance records of an earlier black music.

What comes out is 'Radio People', a twist of technology so light and tangy that it tastes like electric sherbet. A vocoded voice chews up some nonsense about a radio population while Troutman's crew slither and spiral all around. It might almost be the most ultrasophisticated jingle you'll ever hear.

On the other side, they deliver a much harder punch to the libido in 'Itchin' For Your Twitchin" – is anybody else finding such extraordinary ways of matching soul voices with all-treble-up technology? No contest. Mark Troutman down for maverick genius of the week.

#### POP WILL EAT ITSELF 'Popplecock EP' (Chapter

complete chaos, this bulging set turns out to be a home brewed masterpiece. Of course it's messy and scrubbed together in the now inevitable Garage '86 style, but Pop Will Eat Itself have taken up insights that most of the wastrels and beggars out there aren't anywhere close to finding. Every song has the spark of an idea, but better than that is the way ideas get out, exactly right.

There are ten songs on the 12-inch of the EP and it is peculiar the diversity they wring out of an unremarkable voice, burnt-out guitars and tinpot drums. They sound tough and rowdy yet the singer's a chump, the tunes dabble in Beatlesque beauty and there's even a strand of poetry in them. Dumb bits like 'Candydiosis' could be dumped, but titles like 'Titanic Clown', 'Monogamy' and 'B-B-B-Breakdown' have a bleak, hell-bent energy that their stupid side reflects on in a bizarre way.

Whatever the toss, this is a fast, smacked-about view of pop that shows it to be far from devoured yet.

ANITA BAKER 'Sweet Love' (Elektra) The week's best music, probably, though hardly suitable for single status. Anita's album should be taken in one swallow, deep soul too intense for one little record. Even in the trappings of a million dollar production, she always finds the private moment. A contralto voice that can squeeze or cushion lyrics as she pleases. A sense of drama that makes the air burst around her. This is a great, overpowering record, but you must have the LP.

#### DEBBIE HARRY 'French Kissin' In The USA'

(Chrysalis) A smart old cookie makes a moderately welcome return. Somebody needs to assert opposition to the creepy cool world of Suzanne Vega. Deborah's record is a fusion of two old tunes, both just elusive enough to have their titles

forgotten, and the sound walks the thin line between irritating novelty and pop heaven that Blondie would pace out with every single. A bit too big and blowsy, actually, as if she's a bit unsure and trying too hard.

### 'Ghostdancing' (Virgin) THE DAMNED 'Anything'

(MCA) I respect Jim Kerr's ambitions but I'm out of sympathy with the sound Simple Minds concoct. Part of the problem is Kerr himself: every record gets more stuffed with words, a torrent of cities and lights and the like, and most of 'Ghostdancing' is a man gabbing his head off. At the same moment the music gets complicated and pointless. It doesn't seem worth deciphering, and I can get just as much sense out of The Damned, who tread their accustomed stairway-toheadache.

#### GRACE JONES 'I'm Not Perfect (But I'm Perfect For You)' (Manhattan)

Nice woman, Grace, but her ideas about radical music suffer from the slight problem that she's no idea what's going on. After the sublime disdain of the old Island records, this retreat into functional but anonymous bomp music sounds like emotional exhaustion.

Somebody give her another movie to do and let's be done with it.

#### BILLY BRAGG 'Greetings To The New Brunette' (Got Discs) "How can you!

(Got Discs) "How can you lie there and think of England when you don't even know who's in the team?"

The melancholy humour of Bragg's characters props him up. He stands up and sings, like a reformed layabout, and waits for England to parade past his eye. None of his tunes are anything much and once you've heard Billy do his put-upon snarl once, you've heard it for always. So what's left is his clumsy tenderness: he wants to embrace all old England in his wiry arms. When he does an American

song, like Washington Philips' beautiful 'Tatler', he sounds hollow and lost.

#### SURREAL ESTATE 'Curtain Call' (Létharge)

Surprisingly soft and murmuring music from Liverpool. Guitars jingle like loose change in the pockets of the song, passed on by vocalist John Potter in a style that northern Yankophiles have made their own. No tornado of excitement but sweetly done.

#### THE GO-BETWEENS 'The Able Label Singles'

(Situation Two) Four early and embarrassing chapters from an erratic career. Very little of the ensuing mystery of the current Go-Betweens can be stalked out of these old tracks. 'Lee Remick' is the kind of feeble fan letter that funnypunk bands delight in, though 'Karen' is a neat enough portrait of a wimp's obsession. Come to think of it, I don't like the current Go-Betweens either.

#### DAVID & DAVID 'Welcome To The Boomtown' (A&M)

Don't look now but the concept album is poised for a major comeback. Everybody's doing it. Sylvian, Simon, Motorhead . . . now here is the '80s concept piece put into American irony by David & David.

'Boomtown' is a slick package of satirical details about life in the money zone, and while there are plenty of good lines – the "succulent sound" of dollar bills – the pith and moment of the whole deal is going to be lost on a nation not exactly steeped in spendthrift decadence.

#### NEW ORDER 'Bizarre Love Triangle' (Factory) New Order sound thinner and

Order sound thinner and crisper (like a pizza?) than they have done for a long spell: Shep Pettibone's mix lights up the frothiest side of the familiar gloomy energy. Like everything else they've been doing of late, it's essentially a further dispersal of the tensely packed 'Everything's Gone Green'. Curious how they've managed to sound

'contemporary' while consistently ignoring every other trend around them.

# ORCHESTRAL MANOEUVRES IN THE DARK 'We Love You' (Virgin) THE LARKS 'All Or Nothing Girl' (Exaltation) KIM KELLY

'To You' (Gipsy) OMD bounce along in their stone-faced way, quite harmless in their stride. Can anyone remember how they once pioneered a way through the misty drizzle of electric pop? The Larks seem to remember as far back as Dr Feelgood. Kim Kelly is a man without a memory: he thinks nobody's chanced on this sort of fake Springsteen before.

#### WE'VE GOT A FUZZBOX AND WE'RE GONNA USE IT 'Love is The Slug'

(Vindaloo) The idea that these women are complete bumblers is only partly confirmed here. The record is played with plenty of guts, but nice clean studio drums and sprayed-on vocals can do that for anybody. There's a gimcracked vigour at work, but who cares? This sort of girlie-pop-for-real-men is the kind of freezing pain you get from impacted teeth.

### THE BOLLOCK BROTHERS 'Faith Healer' (Charly) 'Harley David' (Play It

Again Sam) One is perplexed by the sudden glut of B Brothers singles. The Charly offering is an unexpectedly sturdy go at the Alex Harvey chestnut – a camp impersonation of the old Scotsman, but heads will probably nod. 'Hardly David' is for that rare breed, BB fans only. This time Jock does his sick Jim Morrison voice and the record is puerile to its leather boots.

#### CRASS '10 Notes On A Summer's Day' (Crass)

This isn't a single, it's a damn lifetime. It's also their valedictory offering. What's left of the Crass attack? They never really found a niche in the popular memory. Unlike Throbbing Gristle, they didn't summon any death-chic clientele, never performed a

true critical act on the body of rock. In their severe isolation, they must have reached a state of grace. This is a calm, almost beautiful symposium, one side of song-like jottings, one of darkening guitars and keyboards.

#### ELVIS COSTELLO AND THE ATTRACTIONS 'I Want

You' (Imp) Costello's tragedy of the heart, composed so finely that listening becomes intolerable. He piles on the agony of her new preference till he's gnawed his fingers down to the wrists. The mix lets his voice rasp right in your ear. It's not something I want to hear but some will cry "masterpiece".

### The World' (WEA) Well, you have to grant her this much:

nobody gets a record going with a banshee wail quite as rousingly as Chaka Kahn.
Thereafter it settles down into a plea for a global picnic, finally marching into Donna Summer's kitchen by whistling up a children's choir. Hollywood language has gripped the soul woman so strongly that nobody seems to escape in the end.

#### J C BROUCHARD WITH BIFF BANG POW! 'Someone Stole My

Wheels' (Creation) Could have been the only good bad guitar racket of the week. It starts out that way, six strings howling in the direction of purgatory. Then it turns down into some old piece of pop ripped out of a '60s wind tunnel. Song missing in action under the wheels of an electric organ grind. But great amplifier hum at the end!

#### A GIRL CALLED JOHNNY 'Hello It Isn't Me' (10)

Photogenic cheekbones grafted on to a tune in sore need of some face. Three men in black strum to one side. Ms.

#### BRILLIANT 'The End Of The World' (WEA)

Historians among you will have no trouble tracing this back to Twinkle. A hit here in 1963 for Skeeter Davis, but our demure British version was much better. I digress in order to gloss over the presence of this quite appalling resurrection.

#### PHIL FEARON 'Ain't Nothing But A House Party' (Ensign/Chrysalis)

Fearon's done some passable work in making Britfunk talk in pop accents and this one should go down as a nearmiss. Hustles along well enough but the tech quotient finally gets the better of a song that ought to be wholefood natural in the way it's put down.

#### JESSE'S GANG 'Real Love'

(Geffen) The charmless trend of HM funk mixes gets one pace closer to complete brain death. Synths chip chop away while everybody involved gets bad advice and takes it to "the max", as we engineers say. 'Jackmaster' is the fellow behind this grim show of strength and he should be penned up immediately.

#### JASON & THE SCORCHERS '19th Nervous Breakdown' (EMI

America) Seems like a last-ditch stand under the old flag here. Two years ago, this tough-talking team sounded like the decent answer to the problem of wedding bloody rock energy to the salty authenticity of Texas country. Many cowpokes have come and gone in the interim, but Jason and sons are still trying to light the torch. This one staggers around in just about any old bar band's metal licks.

# THE SINISTER CLEANERS 'Goodbye Ms Jones EP' (AAZ) RAZORCUTS 'Sorry To Embarrass You

EP' (Subway) Four doleful traumas from the Leeds-based Cleaners. One of them wears a Paisley shirt but the group can't evaluate what pop, rock or any of that stuff is about.

Razorcuts wilt under the handicap of a vocalist who must have grown up in the withered arms of Clifford T Ward. Quite preposterous, and no amount of twanging guitars is going to change that.

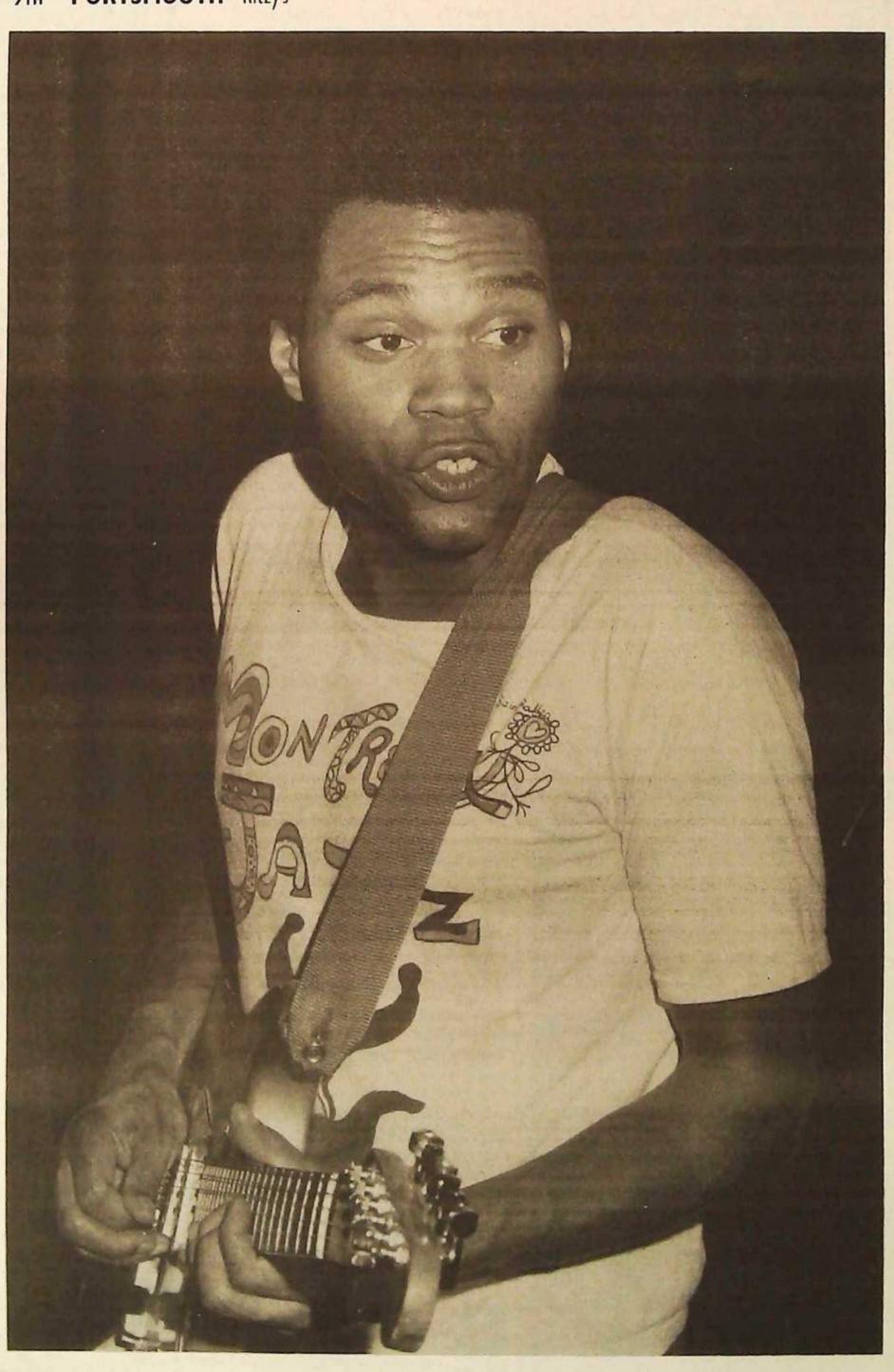

#### Is MARC ALMOND a true degenerate or an artistic genius? And why is he being censored by Britain's New Morality Brigade? TONY MITCHELL travelled to Barcelona to uncover the answers. Photos by PETER ANDERSON

HIS COULD be a dream or a nightmare, depending on your musical and sexual tastes.

Marc Almond - the backstreet sailor with his newly mohicanised skull topped by a dough-boy hat from beneath which pokes one solitary, cheeky black curl - is perched on the rump of a mechanical horse which bucks and turns in the centre of a small stage.

To keep his balance, he leans forward against the occupant of the saddle and clutches the rider's enormous, naked breasts.

Whooping and giggling, the pair continue their crazy journey to nowhere for several minutes more before Almond, his duty done, is allowed to dismount and reclaim his seat in the audience.

So this is Barcelona.

Or to be precise, this is the Club Bagdad, where nightly, a bizarre crew of transsexuals and other carnal exhibitionists disport themselves for the entertainment of those who care to pay the £15 entrance fee and risk having their bulges felt and their organ size become a matter of detailed interrogation by the 'lady' whose horse-riding act opens the show.

F SUCH an establishment exists in any city where he has spent more than a night, Marc Almond will find it.

That Almond has practically taken up residence in Barcelona during the last year, suggests that the city must be a positive cornucopia of such delights - a successor in his affections, perhaps, to New York, whose sleazy underbelly was a welldocumented inspiration in Soft Cell days.

"I've had that Spanish and Mediterranean

influence for quite a while," he reminds me. "Even from the days of 'L'Esqualita' and through the 'Torment And Torreros' album. But with the new album, it's not so much a Spanish feel as a Barcelona feel, which is very different from the rest of Spain.

"I wanted to reflect some of the smell of the streets, the warmth of the place here, and that particular type of smoky warmth in the music. Quite exotic, frayed around the edges, a decaying splendour that's how I find Barcelona.

"And the colour of the characters as well. I've always liked writing about characters, whether it's me or a fantasy of me, but here there's such a wealth of characters that it's perfect.

"I still love New York and, like every New York junkie, I try to go there now and again to get my fix. But this place gives me injections of inspiration on a much warmer and more personal level," Marc explains.

"Soaking up these atmospheres has been a very creative experience for the new album. It's a very soul-baring album as well, which I think worries Virgin a lot."

True, stories about the reception which greeted this album (due for release in early '87) and the just released 'Ruby Red' single, never mind the censoring of the 'Ruby Red' video with its impishly homosexual imagery, are already widespread.

"Everything I do worries them," says Almond. "They're very suspicious of me and I think, Why the hell did you sign me to the label? Why did you spend all this money? You were battling with EMI for me - why did you want me?

"They know my track record; they know I'm not there to be changed. If they'd done their homework on me, they would have seen that I'm what is known in the music business as a 'difficult artist', hahaha. They say, Oh you have a voice, you could be doing this, you could be directing your vocal talents that way. But why? That's not what I'm about.

"But having said that, I'd rather have Virgin than EMI at the end of the day. I can imagine the battles I would have had with EMI.

"I just write honest, soul-baring lyrics the way that I feel, my observations, the things I experience - and they call them 'lyrically filthy'. Well, I'm not going to apologise for the way I live my life or the way that I write about it.

"And I think right now that's even more important than ever, as an antidote to the horrendous Spandau Ballet thickos and that type of designer pop.

"I think I write good pop singles, but as for what fits into the mould, I probably couldn't, by today's terms, write a pop hit if I had a ten ton weight hanging over my head."

UT THEN, he has written 'Ruby Red', which would seem to indicate that a ten ton weight isn't necessary.

Driven along by the smooth momentum of Almond's rich, powerful voice, it deals with "love, sex, death, blood and my bedroom decor" in a way that will undoubtedly, as Marc wishes, "stand out like a sore thumb".

That Barcelona touch is, however, felt more on the 12-inch EP, where you'll find such songs as 'Anarcoma', about a comicbook 'heroine' created by local artist

Nazario.

And, of course, there is the LP itself. . . "The title track of the album, 'Mother Fist And Her Five Daughters', is a very Barcelona-influenced song too. It's like a sailor's song (Barcelona's a port, of course), but the title comes from a Truman Capote book, a short story from Music For Chameleons, where he says 'Every night, I'd lay alone with mother fist and her five daughters'. Truman Capote is my favourite writer."

And it's in the tracks of other great writers that we follow this night, joining up with two of Marc's pals for a crash course in degree-level degeneracy.

We head for a famous bar where writers like Hemingway and Genet and painters like Picasso took their inspiration from absinthe, a poisonously potent anise flavoured liquor made from wormwood and long since declared illegal in most civilised countries, including Spain.

Our journey takes us through narrow streets lined with the ugliest whores I've ever seen, diverting via a tiny bar where we sample pastis, the modern legal substitute for absinthe. After going from one bar to another, we eventually arrive at the Bagdad where the evening's show is due to begin in 15 minutes.

With lubrication provided by yet more pastis, the event seems utterly Felliniesque, and when the final curtain comes down, there's nothing left to do but cab it back to our respective hotels.

ROM BARCELONA to Soho is not such a conceptual leap, then, as it might at first seem.

And Marc found himself making that transition a few weeks back, headlining at the Soho Jazz Festival, to the consternation of those who believed it to be less than appropriate.

"It was a surprise to me, too," he confesses. "But I was very flattered. People obviously recognised certain things I do as having a certain credibility, to be taken seriously on a singing level. You know me, I don't take myself seriously as a character but I take my work seriously.

"A lot of people who came to see me were really surprised. They said they didn't realise I did that, they were only aware of the pop side, and they didn't know what to expect, but it was really great.

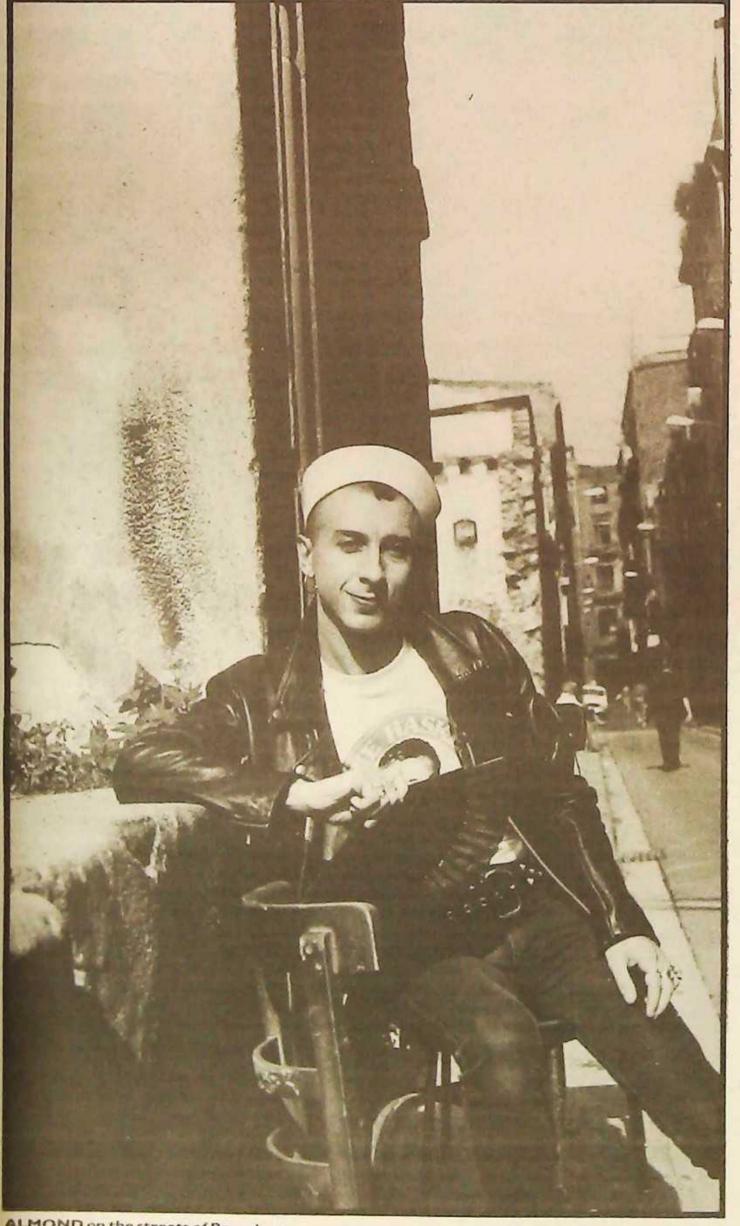
"I've been tending across the years to get into a 'big music' sound, and at the end of the day I think I've been swamped under it all. So, for the new album, I've stripped everything away to much more of a simplicity, and from it comes much more of a warmth, and much more of my character comes through. Whereas the other albums have shown facets of the Marc Almond character, this album shows more of a total view.

"It's a real Marc Almond album - it's the album I've been wanting to make for three

But does he ever fear he'll run out of ideas?

"I think there'll come a point when I'll tire of doing my own material, because since I started, I've been covering the same ground and writing about the same obsessions and images. It's just that I think you keep going over it trying to get it right.

"I already enjoy doing other people's material, but not in the horrendous and despicable way some record companies are getting their artists to record tried and

tested cover versions at the moment. I could go out tomorrow and do a Supremes number, another 'Where Did Our Love Go' or whatever, and it'd be a sure-fire Top Ten hit.

"But when I do a cover, I'd much rather it be something like 'Woman's Toy', which hardly anybody had ever heard, which I can take and make my own song. I like to find songs that haven't the burden of being mine lyrically, so they're not so soul-baring and they're not bringing back old memories, but at the same time they fit into what I like to sing about. It's like playing a character in a film, in a way.

"I've always liked Jacques Brel, and I've just had some of his stuff – very fitting with the Barcelona atmosphere – translated into English for the first time. I'll be recording these English versions, and I'm going to be doing a Brel festival in Amsterdam in January or February, which'll give me a lot

of satisfaction.

"At the same time, I like to put out a single like 'Ruby Red' to keep one foot inside the pop arena. Having one foot inside it and one outside is something I don't think anyone else does successfully, even though every record I bring out seems to get stuck at number 41 or something.

"And another thing I hate so much is all this moralising, preaching and who-gives-a-f\*\*\* opinion that comes from some of these big stars. All this attach-a-charity-to-my-name-and-wag-a-finger hypocrisy.

"I made the biggest mistake of my life not so long ago when I did a GLC concert at Finsbury Park. I was trapped in a corner in my caravan and the TV cameras came in and they said, We want you to do an interview for a TV show about heroin.

And I said, It's not my thing, I don't feel like wagging my finger and moralising – not

being particularly an angel about 'substances' myself.

"I think the whole Boy George thing has worked the opposite way. The papers have publicised it so much – Boy George takes heroin, look what it's done to him – that there'll be 20 or 30 Sharons and Traceys out there who love Boy George so much that they'll want to do anything Boy George has done to be on his level.

"Anyway, I was conned into doing this thing, cornered into answering these embarrassing questions that I felt awful and hypocritical about. And I saw this programme and I said I think it works the opposite way, because all these famous people admitting they've been involved with or dabbled with these things in the past glamourises it.

"You can see people spouting off in magazines now who I know still indulge and dabble. It's why I feel so suspicious of some of those people. Who gives a f\*\*\*
what those people think? The world still
turns and Simon Le Bon is still the worst
singer in the known universe."

ARC ALMOND is still, thank
God, an anachronism – a freethinker who came upon pop by
accident and decided to stay awhile, not
fully understanding what stroke of fate
decreed that he wasn't born in time to
share a bottle of absinthe with Genet,
Hemingway or Picasso in that dusty
Barcelona café.

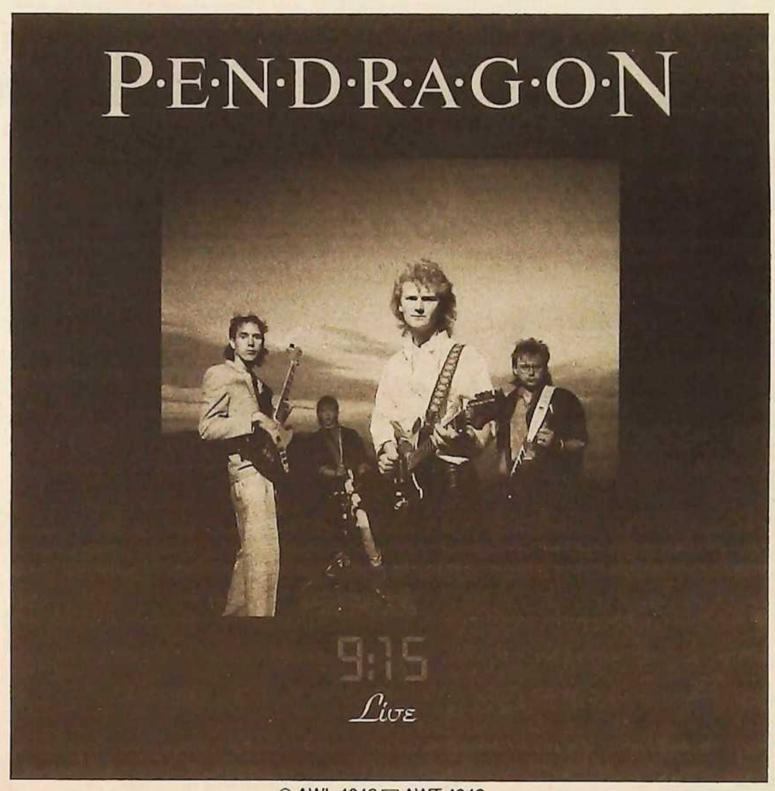
In an area of endeavour where art is a luxury, a label or just a dirty word, Marc Almond remains an artist, true to himself and his ideals.

If you embrace Almond's work, then you embrace the person too. You accept that not everything of worth was conceived in the missionary position with the lights out. You concede that, beyond pop's designer-disposability and the banal flat earth of the tabloid newspapers, there is a real world that's very different, and a damn sight more interesting.

It needs a voice, and Marc Almond helps provide one for it.

# ZEN HUSSEY

THE MISSION 'God's Own Medicine' (Mercury MERH

THE END of a record, what better place to start? "Love me to death. . ." whispers a brazen Hussey in a voice you just wish you could eat or drink or even take to bed with you, and 'God's Own Medicine' kisses the base of your spine one last

And if you badly wanted the first Mission album to be stupendous, as I did, you won't be cheated. Rich with spicy passion dripping from every note, this record (that title!) never once stumbles or falters, running on guitars of almost ridiculous clarity and relentless rhythm.

The grandiose mock-majestic sleeve harbours a pulsating universe of love and lust; and love, it seems, is the law, the one and only, a daisy chain draped round the band's solid rock persona. There is a spatial charm, a morass of delicate melody, and if hippies have as much wit, wisdom and freeflowing grace as this then The Mission are hippies

extraordinaire.

A cheeky orchestral version of the single 'Garden Of Delight' is outrageously lush - if Keats were alive today, you know that he'd be listening, too. But there are blistering streams of rock 'n' roll romance such as 'Sacrilege' or 'Bridges Burning' to stop you getting too soppy, and I bet the Top Of The Pops producers haven't really listened to the words of 'Stay With Me'. . .

I love to see the intellectual talking pop heads get wound up by hair and bangles and guitars, and, with any luck, 'God's Own Medicine' will make them sick with its blatant disregard for fickle industry fashion.

Not even one year old, and The Mission prove that they mean to happen in an epic, quite spectacular fashion. Play this record while doing something wonderful with someone you really love and just see if it doesn't have that sort of effect. One dose a day keeps the misery away.

BILL DRUMMOND 'The Man' (Creation CRE LP 014)\*\*\*\*

HE USED to be a deep sea trawlerman, used to manage the Bunnymen and the Teardrops, and had the dubious honour of playing with Holly Johnson in the seminal Liverpool combo, Big In Japan. And now, as he turns 331/3, he releases his testimony, 'The Man', a long playing record.

When managing the Bunnymen, Drummond had a fascination with ley lines that led him to send his band on a tour that began in the Scottish Isles and ended in Iceland. Perhaps it's this familiarity with the supernatural that allows him to release his album to coincide with the resurgence of Julian Cope and thus attract much publicity with the track 'Julian Cope Is Dead'. This composition combines Drummond's plea for Copey to commit suicide as a publicity stunt with the Bagpuss theme, and is every bit as funny as it sounds.

Not that 'The Man' should

be regarded as some adjunct to the career of everybody's favourite Tamworth sex god. This album, which crosses the eccentricities of Ivor Cutler with the rock 'n' roll fascinations of Kim Fowley, is a touching if idiosyncratic biographical statement.

Recorded with The Triffids

and Voice Of The Beehive in a village hall in his native Galloway, 'The Man' veers between Scottish jigs and Phil Spectorisms. 'I Want That Girl' is a breathless tale of love forgotten, 'I'm The King Of Joy' a ridiculously optimistic account of his lust for life: "I've a heart like a

Viking, and faith like a child/ Have you ever heard the song 'Born To Be Wild'?" And the linchpin, 'I Believe In Rock & Roll', is an eloquent exposition on Bill's primary fascination.

'The Man' is a work of humble genius; the best kind. ROY WILKINSON

KRAFTWERK 'Electric Cafe' (EMI EMII001) \*\* JUST AT a time when you

thought those electronic pop masters had hung up their sequencers, they emerge from the wilderness with another episode of hypnotic minimalism.

Since Kraftwerk swept in on the new wave of German avant-garde sounds in the '70s, along with the likes of Can and Neu, they have been heralded as purveyors of state-of-the-art techno trickery, with a gift for simple splendour. They possessed an intoxicating blend of experimentation and humour, harboured well within the realms of pop.

Now we look back affectionately on those pioneering days with a nostalgic glint. Kraftwerk's once original perspective has acquired a certain naive charm. Their sound has changed little over the years and their sense of invention has all but evaporated along with their sense of melody, with only the occasional glimpse of their glorious past to dwell on in the symphonic shape of 'Sex Object'.

But having set themselves such high standards, they must live and die by them, and the once quiet road they strode down alone has since become a noisy thoroughfare.

The whole feel of this LP is more spacious, but it's an empty space where once sweet genius lurked. By way of a comparison I dig out 'Man Machine' and tingle all over, then wish that this story had a happy ending.

'Electric Cafe' has the right chefs, it's just the menu that's wrong. Unappetising.

#### THE SAINTS 'All Fools Day' (Polydor POLD 5203)\*\*\*\*1/2

ROCK IS full of legends in their own lunchtime who, after the flash and dazzle of their initial impact, are only too willing to peddle myths and fraved ideas with technological facelifts as a meal ticket. The hollow beatbox rebel braggadocio of BAD springs to mind, as does the dull deluge of the Banshees. Meanwhile, that Australian contemporary of Jones and Siouxsie, Chris Bailey and his Saints, carries on in a dignified manner, making some of the most entrancing records you're ever likely to hear. ...

In 1984, Bailey's pent-up emotional turmoil exploded in a set of harrowing songs on the acutely titled album 'A Little Madness To Set You Free' which, through its sheer musical scope and lyrical perception, was one of the year's more satisfying releases.

'All Fools Day' - infested as it is with a union of lush orchestration and hot-lips horns, over an R&B rumble sympathetically producd by Hugh Jones - takes Bailey one step further towards

revitalising rock.

The songs here, though sometimes burdened by overly fussy arrangements and occasionally veering too close towards selfindulgence, are mostly powerful works. I can't think of many other trad-orientated artists who say more about the human condition or do so more articulately than Bailey.

A lifetime ago, The Who sang 'Won't Get Fooled Again' which, of course, was an empty boast as the fate of every subsequent musical 'movement' attests to. 'All Fools Day' is an inversion of The Who's naivety. It's a comment on the ruthlessness of the star-making machinery which puts personalities, gimmicks and contrived style before musical content. Yet the overall effect isn't bleak or mawkish.

Far from it. This is an extremely tender record which for the most part plucks all the right soulstrings because it rings with the changes that experience brings. As he sings on one of the LP's tracks, post-punk Bailey is looking for 'Big Hits (On The Underground)'. You might enjoy helping him.

**ELTON JOHN 'Leather** Jackets' (Rocket EJLPI)\*\* EVERY SO often Elton John produces a memorable album that contains a mint of classic songs, wherein he manages to strike the perfect balance between ballads and the uptempo songs. 'Too Low For Zero' springs to mind, and many of his earlier albums. Sadly, though, this is not one of them.

Elton seems to bounce in and out of fashion like a pingpong ball, and if the back sleeve is anything to go by -Elt and his band togged out in paunchy, sub-Zodiac leather boy regalia - he is desperately trying to become trendy again. But his preoccupation with image overtakes his music at times, and 'Leather Jackets' is certainly a case in point.

After a very promising opening with 'Leather Jackets' and 'Hoop Of Fire', one gets the impression that Elton might have cracked it again just when you were expecting it least. Yet, however harsh it may be, when he doesn't make the grade the disappointment is all the more severe.

The man's talent is undoubted, and after 27 albums it would be far more refreshing if he was prepared to take greater risks and be a little more adventurous. 'Leather Jackets' shifts erratically from the dreadful 'Paris' to the moving 'I Fall Apart', and ultimately this very inconsistency is the album's downfall.

I trust it won't be too long before we hear Elton's 29th album, but I hope by that time we can expect some more original ideas.

# BLUES 'N' TROUBLE

ROBERT CRAY 'Strong Persuader' (Mercury MERH 97)\*\*\*\*

LISTEN TO Robert Cray's words: this man sounds like he's living in a world so bad and lonely he can hardly stand it. Yet Cray's blues are cool, absolutely controlled. There's nothing ragged in his music. He plays blues songs, not the ancient 12 bars, and he's inherited the flash-lightning poetry of the more eccentric bluesmen. Robert's trick is to make these things fall easy on ears for which blues are dead or meaningless.

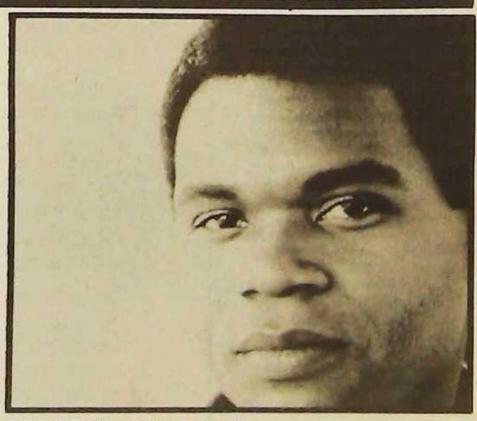
'Strong Persuader' sounds too tamed and smooth at first, everyone in Cray's band tucked neatly into place beside his guitar and voice, but it's the insidious quality of his songs that itches in the mind. Like a bad conscience, Cray keeps coming back and tapping on your door.

He doesn't knock me cold the way that,

say, Fenton Robinson does, and he's a shadow of the titanic power that is Albert King. But Cray's blue groove is a different matter, a refined edge. His guitar sounds cut and polished here - it was tougher on the bristling all-star album with Johnny Copeland and Albert Collins, 'Showdown'. But what's played in 'New Blood' or 'Foul Play' is stinging modern blues.

Cray's clear and painless voice makes his material all the more disturbing. 'Smoking Gun' is a relentless sex-death metaphor, 'I Guess I Showed Her' a cruel vengeance, 'Right Next Door' a man observing the home he's destroyed; those are just the first three songs. #### JOHN PARR 'Running The Endless Mile'

(London LONLP 23)\*\*\* ANYBODY OPENING up a record with a song that's subtitled 'American Anthem' is sure to suffer from a heavy loss of credibility. And that's something that John Parr, the Hepworths man of rock, can ill afford to do on this side of the pond. Already synonymous with that naff stars 'n' stripes guitar, Parr is in danger of being permanently branded a fawning Yankophile, and whilst he may be decidedly old hat, that'd still be a pity.

Admittedly, the cliches can at times run thick enough to really clog up the pipes, making 'Running The Endless Mile' as exhausting as it sounds. Yet there is hope. Every now and again, John lets his grey hair down and gets, well, funky (not well funky). And though it's not nearly as rousing as Eric Martin's 'soulful metal', it's nevertheless a welcome diversion from meat 'n' potatoes AOR.

Maybe 'St Elmo's Fire' hasn't typecast him after all, a point backed up by the title track, a slowie that could crawl unnoticed onto a Jeffrey Osbourne LP, and Scratch', which could almost be a Frankie piss-take. Parr's sense of humour isn't something that I've paid much attention to up to now.

Like all good radio rock, 'Running' is great for tapping a steering wheel to. Mind you, seeing as I've just failed my driving test, what do I bloody care?

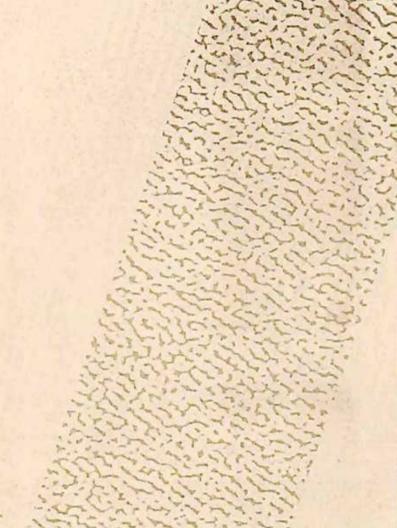

Robert's mum's a jazz singer in a Sydney club and the boy was raised on rockabilly, bee-bop and generous portions of Presley. It was enough to make him jack in his job and form a band himself, The Blow Monkeys (slang for sax players).

Robert could already play piano, but guitar just had to be the one. "It's the biggest cliche in the world, you know, the guitar, but I'd always wanted to use one. Apart from maybe the sax, it's the biz. But the sax takes a long time to learn. With guitar you can get pleasure out of it more or less straight away."

Nowadays Robert picks a semi-accoustic Yamaha SA1800. It's a big guitar but Robert is a pretty big bloke. "It's dead easy to play," he says, "and I need all the help I can get"

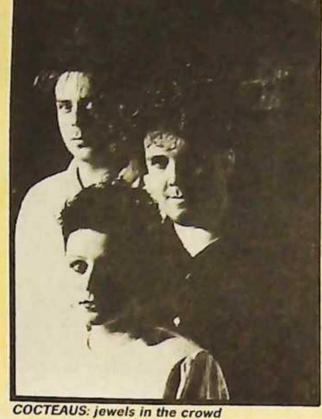

HERE ARE two of the most beautiful records you'll hear in a fathom of kisses. The Budd record has titles like 'Flowered Knife Shadows' and 'Ice Floes In Eden', while the Cocteaus' collaboration lists 'The Ghost Has No Home', 'Eyes Are Mosaics' and — the winner by a neck — 'She Will Destroy Me' amongst its jewellery.

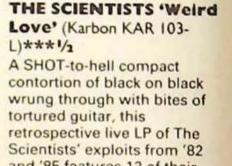
Thunder' is his fourth solo work. It's preferable, though, to pretend he's come from the other side of nowhere like a cool wraith on a sticky night, because these 40-odd minutes of deep blue ambience comprise the genre's definitive statement.

Ominous and soothing, distracting and rekindling, 'Lovely Thunder' (a spiritual cousin of 'Brilliant Trees') captures moments you thought had run out on you. It makes flowers bloom in the desert and simple stuff like that. crescendos. Get down to wherever you get down to and buy the Cocteaus concept, sure, but die, and die, and die again for 'Lovely Thunder', a timeless hymnal hum of retrospective magic. And weather the storm.

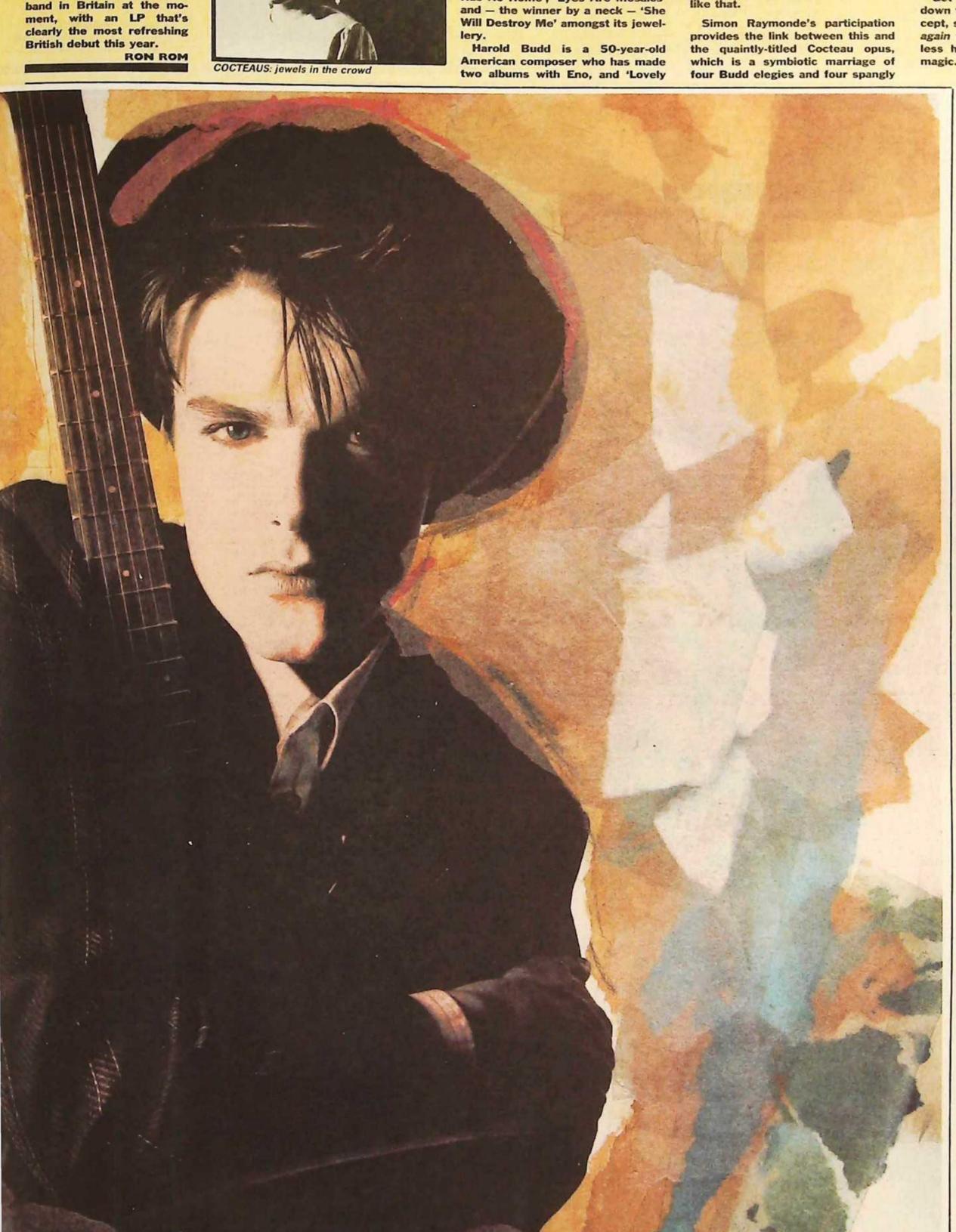
The Len Bright Combo are ill-mannered hooligans. The great unwashed wreaking a terrible revenge. Loud, greasy and bitter, they wave their cheap electric guitars high in the air and build a misshapen but invigorating wall of sound.

The Len Bright Combo are still 'Wreckless' Eric Goulden, the jocular Russ Wilkins and his fellow ex-Pop Rivet and Milkshake Bruce Brand. And they play songs which go crash, bang, boom and bump in the night.

Songs which make twisted observations about some of the more twisted aspects of mundane life. Songs which match what is best described as a hideous din, a cacophony of duck's arse tight R&B, with Eric's quite unique vocal 'delivery'. Songs like the angry sliding blues batter of 'Ticking In My Corner', the absurd 'Phasers On Stun', the obvious 'Club 18-30' and the excellent 'Pleasant Valley Wednesday'. And instrumentals like the tortured and monumental psychedelic blues distortion of 'The Awakening Of Edmund Hirondelle Barnes'.

#### CRIME & THE CITY SOLUTION 'Room Of Lights' (Mute Records

STUUM 36)\*\*\*\*

THE ROOMS full of emotion that Crime & The City
Solution pull us through on their second album are mostly desolate hovels where love lies limp with broken legs, though it still wants to walk into welcoming arms. This is where the blues have finally found asylum in the late '80s. It isn't a party.

Crime said from the outset that they wanted to create "atmospheric, hypnotic songs". With 'Room Of Lights', they have finally achieved that goal. Rowland S Howard plays a telegraphic guitar strung with exposed nerves, its message jagged and forlorn. The bass of Harry Howard stalks one's senses with feral intentions. The drums of Epic Soundtracks flash in the eye of the resulting storm which is coordinated by one of the unsung musical masters of our time, all-round instrumentalist Mick Harvey.

This vortex sucks one further and further into the switchback lyrical world of singer Simon Bonney as he recalls an early encounter with innocence on 'Six Bells Chime'. Then there's his experience of the sleazy, cash-dominated sexual favours of a prostitute which twist through 'No Money No Honey', and a love-hate relationship in 'Right Man Wrong Man'.

The old argument of whether Bonney is a facsimile of Cave or vice versa that flared last year is laid to waste here. They are individual voices with different obsessions. Whereas Nick's songs tend towards folk-stories populated by outcast characters, Simon is centrally part of the scene he is singing about. Of the two, Bonney's torment makes him the untouchable.

Crime are now the missing link between Big Star, The Doors and The Birthday Party, a modern day musical expression of foreboding so black they make traditional blues artists like Robert Cray seem positively white. But 'Room Of Lights' isn't miserable, it's moving.

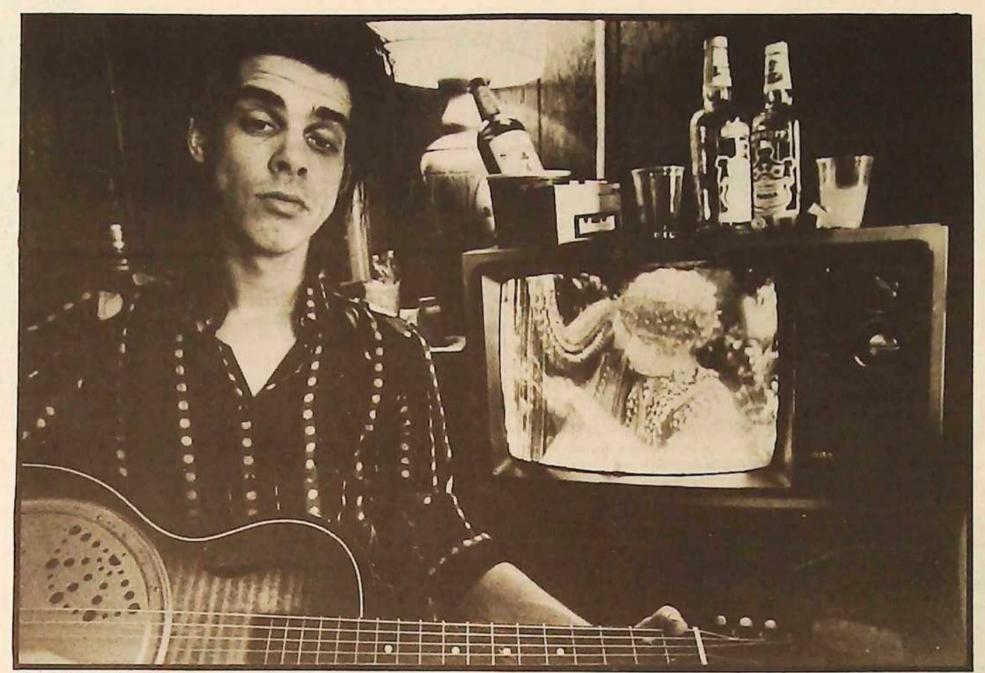

NICK CAVE AND THE BAD SEEDS 'Your Funeral. . . My Trial' (Mute STUMM 34) \*\*\*\*1/2

GIVEN THAT Crime & The City Solution have just released the most accurate and moving psychotic shriek of a record in many full moons, Nick Cave's continuing shift towards thinking man's country and doing person's Tom Waits is both timely and astute. This is a solemn and intense four sides (eight tracks), with only the whirling 'Hard On For Love' open to misinterpretation as a kind of joke. Or, at least, it is once you work out that it plays at 45rpm.

'Sad Waters' opens the floodgates, borrowing brazenly from the great Tom Jones' 'Green Green Grass Of Home'. But its mock ballad form induces a false sense of security, and 'The Carny' is a depressing narrative howl. "Funny how things go", it concludes, obviously but effectively.

The title track is glum self-promotion of a charming ilk, while 'Stranger Than Kindness', written by Anita Lane and Blixa Bargeld, is — if you must — melodic and accessible. 'Jack's Shadow' ropes in Crime's Mick Harvey and is a finely venomous assault, battering through to the aformentioned

'Hard On . . .', which is almost danceable if your skeleton's frisky. This includes the most wonderful of many memorable couplets on the record: "They can stone me with stones I don't care/Just as long as I get to kiss those gypsy lips."

'She Fell Away' is poignant enough, but everything comes together on the closing 'Long Time Man'. This superb Tim Rose song is about the ambiguous pain of growing old. The way Cave sings "love" on the line "I ain't had no love since I don't know when" is more than OK. Otherwise, it sounds like Kirk Brandon backed by The Stones circa 'Gimme Shelter'. When the bottle's empty and there's no one to throw it at, this is the one to play loud. It's for those who find the phrase 'the dead of night' inexplicably worrying.

Perversely, 'Long Time Man' captures and then unleashes everything Cave's image represents, and it does it better than anything since his stuttering interpretation of 'Wanted Man'. But anyone who doesn't agree that 'Shivers' by Cave's Boys Next Door was his peak moment has never seen a firework in their life. 'Your Funeral. . .' is a different kind of pleasure.

Aretha is always worth listening to. 'Aretha' is sufficient to nibble on for a few months, but let's hope the main course of a classic album isn't too far away.

epicene eclecticism on the swirling spoken intro where she acknowledges her debt to the Velvets, The Ronettes, The 13th Floor Elevators and the Stooges amongst others, before declaring that: "It's my own creation, my own monster, my own private oyster." Fair enough.

Although 'Private Oyster' is a

familiar brew of guitar-driven, pop punctuated glam rock, it is given a life of its own by Jayne's slightly hackneyed taste for tack and a voice that modulates between a fruity baritone and a twee Minnie Mouse on mescaline.

Jayne is at her best when sticking with her gift for natty lines of her own invention. This is best seen on 'I Fell In Love With A Russian Soldier' ("He's my comrade in arms/ We'll get engaged in Afghanistan") and the abovementioned 'The Lady Dye Twist' where Jayne casts an envious glance towards the high kitsch of a Royal Wedding and resigns herself to never getting hitched.

Other successes are 'Double Shot' (recorded live in a Hong Kong massage parlour) and a cover close to Jayne's silicone cushioned heart, The Barbarians' 'Are You A Boy Or Are You A

Girl?'. Jayne's quite a sweet transsexual on the quiet and here she's got an oyster that'll slip down very nicely with or without Guinness.

MEGADETH 'Peace Sells...But Who's Buying?' (Capitol ST-12526)\*\*\*\*

"SWINGING THE hammer, I hack through their heads. . . I mangle their faces, 'til no features remain."

Brutality and brilliance go hand in hand in the maelstrom fashioned by Megadeth mastermind Dave Mustaine. By most accounts, Mustaine, the man Metallica allegedly had to sack to keep him and James Hetfield from each other's throats, is a difficult and uncharitable devil to deal with, yet you have to hand it to him, this is viciously good thrash.

Nothing has been smoothed out to mediocre major label specifications.

Mustaine, the man who has also claimed to have written the best of Metallica's material, including 'Leper Messiah' and others for which he's not credited on the 'Master Of Puppets' LP, has here and now thrown up what is arguably the single most challenging and demanding album ever to emerge over thrash's brief and belligerent history. With a mercurial unpredictability matched only by its pure intensity, 'Peace Sells' is the complete headache: loud, unrelenting, intricate, off the

Lovable it ain't. It's unlikely that the masses will clutch this to their collective bosom as they did with 'Master Of Puppets' and 'Ride The Lightning' before it. The reason? Simply, it's because Megadeth offer no quarter. Even the featured Willie Dixon tune (see what I mean by off the wall?) mugs rather than courts the blues.

Mustaine, the man whose name you'll remember for years to come, is one in a million. Catch him while you

THESE THREE hoodlums come with triggers cocked, and snarls curled at the ready. The noise is getting rabid, someone reaches for the switchblade, the whole place is shaking but the street is silent.

Halfway cartoon Suicide, halfway bona fide zip-gun r 'n' r bravado, the Sirens wail with convincing friction. They claim as inspiration "dreams, comic book style action, love, hate, prophecy and finding expression through rock 'n' roll guitar, cut-up lyrics, beat boxes. . . " and lay it all to waste. Without quite diluting their sources, the roots are shredded, the beat-box liberally thumps, and words are spat and spun out with a Vega-like sneer and a Jaggerlike pout.

On this thrill-seeking debut, the influences tend to poke through more firmly than would be advisable, but the result has enough gall to get away with it. Anyhow, that teasing Vega-Rev hip-shake wins me every time. The Sirens, promising to shoot from the hip in sonic boom style, don't sound even slightly respectful anyhow, their plagiarism just hitching itself to the restless pace and the slurred sex beat. This racket lurches forward on the balls of its feet, muddled and bloodshot. It sounds like a record without a heart, but something here is pumping like crazy.

I'll give them the benefit of the doubt. This is a big ball of a debut.

That's an understatement. Das Psych-Oh Rangers' debut single is called 'The **Essential Art Of** Communication'. Tonight, at the Camden Palace, they could hardly have made less of an impact if they'd been mutes. I have never witnessed a band die quite so badly.

The harder singer Be Decard and the other pretentious names of DPOR banged their risqué haircuts against a wall of audience disinterest, the more laughable the spectacle became. There was no applause, nothing except for the odd insult from punters to the effect that Morley's latest protégés are masturbaters who don't know who their fathers are.

Das Rangers are everything that makes music mediocre and predictable. A 'rocky' quartet who look prepackaged, they fail to kick a hole in one's backbone because guitarist Troy Tempest puts pose before inspiration. Vocalist Be Dull wants to say something simple but masks it in false profundity; he hits all the right notes but sings in a dead language.

Yet, paradoxically, this new group could be successful precisely because they are selling old ideas instead of originality. They have three gimmicks: a song that could be a cousin to Toni Basil's 'Mickey', another tune born out of an unhealthy appreciation of Gary Glitter, and Decard's high-pitched squeals of "ooh-ooh!" that have long been passé on the funk front.

Still, apart from their marketing techniques, ZTT aren't exactly known for their innovation, and with Das Psych-Oh Rangers it's business as usual . . .

Alas, though a world above their support act, the reformed Suicide too often merely went through the motions of safe entertainment to satisfy fully. Bearded and be-shaded,

Martin Rev's barbaric synths and keyboards lashed out like a spiked cudgel and his mutant beat-machine spat the trademark coital rhythms. But these, unfortunately, served only to make Alan Vega's performance seem impotent despite the singer's garish gestures.

'Rocket USA' flew nowhere very interesting, much to the dismay of those arch Suicide fans Reuben and Dave of Head Of David, who'd travelled down from Dudley to catch this reunion. Even worse, 'Cheree' - one of the leanest and most tender love songs ever composed - came over as bloated as Vega's body. His physical deterioration parallels the flabbiness that now undermines the American duo's music.

Indeed, aside from a totally possessed rendition of 'Fast Money Music', during which a sustained howl from Hades erupted and shook one to the core, there was very little evidence of the demented sonic attack that has made Suicide one of the most influential groups of the past decade. The 'hits' came and went - much to the audience's pleasure, it must be said - but they all sounded like they were straight off the 'Jukebox Babe'.

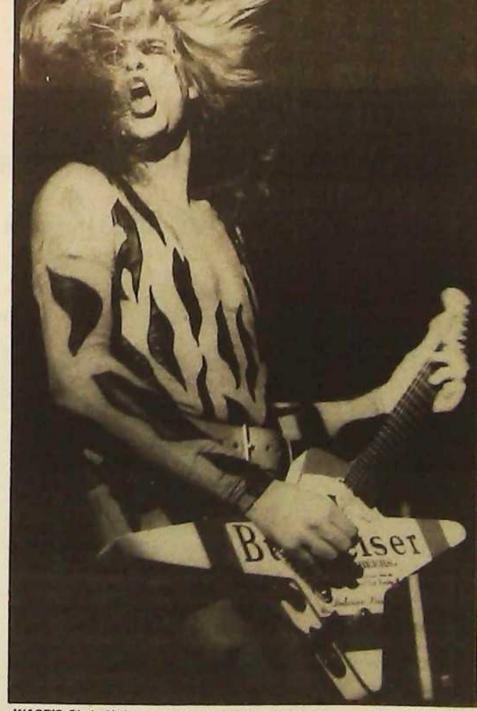
Just like attempted Suicide, this was all a bit sad.

EVERYBODY SAY vo!

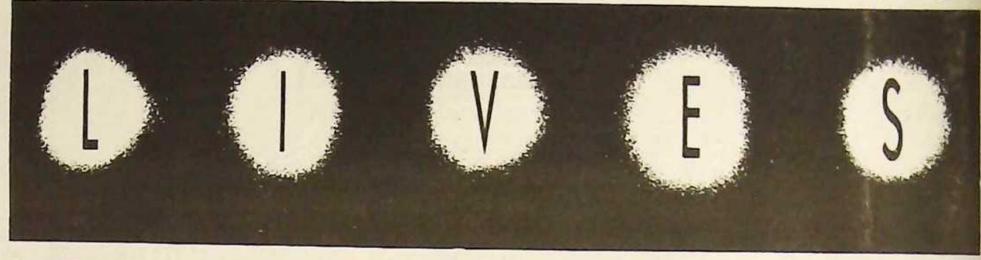

Other highlights are the singles, 'E=MC2', 'C'mon Every Beatbox' and 'The Bottom Line', all of them full of guns and cowboys and

BEAUTIFULLY DRUNK and staggering around, Andrew Burnett is posing for all he's worth. Wearing his Oxfam elegance and missing tooth, and grinning with pride, he sings with a joyous disregard for tone or melody. Not that Close Lobsters don't know a good tune when it sidles up to them. But on a night when a small waterfall of beer must have found its way down their necks, they aren't - how shall we say? - the most upright of groups ever to grace a London stage.

Still, it's what yer right arm's for, OK? That and thrashing hell out of your six string thing while twisting some remarkable pop contortions around the audience's heads. Which is, of course, exactly what Close Lobsters do as they swim full speed against the current tide of music biz blandness.

These five Scottish louts have taken the jingle jangle of Orange Juice and wrung it through the mangle of heavy rock, leaving a compressed and densely intelligent sound that shakes every last flake of dandruff from your receding hairline. I couldn't care less that strings break and cues are missed, Close Lobsters are leaps and bounds ahead of their shambolic contemporaries.

Burnett's obvious love of the limelight can only be a plus at a time when too many young performers want to hide behind their insecurities, and anyway, he's not adverse to taking the piss out of himself, lurching round the stage lashing at his imaginary guitar.

Bold and brassy, Close Lobsters are lighting fires in

the basement of pop, playing with matches and burning the building down. You may not have realised it yet, but the flames are getting higher. Whatever you do, don't call the fire brigade.

#### THE RESIDENTS **Hammersmith Odeon**

ONE OF the few questions left unanswered in this madcap world is: what's behind The Residents' masks?

Celebrating their 13th anniversary this year, these four latent phantoms of rock's opera decided to take us back through various periods of their past before bringing us back up to date with the mythical Big Bubble Band, who were created in the fourth part of The Mole Show. During this part of the performance, the chief Resident detached his eyeball mask from his head to leave his face open to the glare of the public, creating a small furore.

I didn't actually get a close up view, but this isn't surprising since the Palais has to be the worst place to witness The Residents. Their show is essentially a visual one, and when you can't see anything frustration creeps in and the whole experience is lost.

Also, the set was too onepaced for much of the time to generate any outstanding power. The heavy reliance on backing tapes didn't help the momentum. But aside from these flaws, The Residents' brand of 'performance art' easily satisfied.

The eyeballs, props and choreography were all there, running parallel with strange, haunting covers of James Brown's 'It's A Man's Man's Man's World' and Presley's 'Jailhouse Rock'. These aural

gimmicks, and the two new female dancers, never diluted the stark potency of the music, however. The Residents are always intensely unfathomable.

Like the cult '60s TV show The Prisoner, The Residents have plots that are vague and images that are blatantly confusing. Their show is theatre of the totally absurd, fascinating and compulsive. RON ROM

#### WE FREE KINGS Dublin Baggot Inn

WHETHER OR not it was head Waterboy Mike Scott's seal of approval that brought out the curious, at least it was a healthy crowd that greeted the arrival of his fellow Scots,

**New York Madison Square Gardens** 

DAVID IS on stage, dusting off some of his oldest lines. One goes like this: "If you're sticking that tongue out at me, then make sure you're gonna use it." Still, 19,000 mad Americans want to butter his toast and find out if that's really a volume of encyclopaedias tucked away down there, or if it's the real thing.

At this point, someone throws a hamburger at me. I'm in New York, suddenly dodging this hailstorm of hamburgers, caught in the middle of a laddish skirmish, while there's all those tall buildings outside waiting to be admired. Dave Lee Roth wriggles his groin under the noses of 19,000 New Yorkers. This is America.

The guitarist, Steve Vai, is making his instrument squeal without humility, Dave's hosepipe peeps out behind his right ankle, and I'm marvelling at how close this is getting to one ghastly blow-out of guitar histrionics. I'm not a Van Halen connoisseur, but still I recognise 'Everybody Wants Some', from 'Women And Children First', being ritually slaughtered up there ...

After years of enthusiastic riffing, Van Halen found platinum pop with the delectable 'Jump'. But now Roth is emerging from the daydream, and finding he has inherited a bigger bunch of hamfisted rockists than before. Whatever, he seems happy to keep cranking out this blur of monstrous metal claptrap.

Of course, as far as metal goes, it has the lot - bombast, plonker-pulling riffola, loads of masculine muscle, droopy aspirations and very thin platitudes. But Roth's camp comedy and cruel good looks are wasted on this endless gurgling metal

When Roth's comic charisma gets slotted into the middle of this - during the overlong 'Ice Cream Man' - it fits awkwardly, looking and sounding both trite and cumbersome. His devotees would disagree, enjoying his every dumb move and his every goofy posture. But watching an audience laughing hysterically at rock's number one sex symbol making a goon of himself is a strange sight, especially when you feel like you've landed on some foreign planet

We trail out wondering why Roth doesn't make it more special, why he keeps squeezing away at this empty carton. David Lee Roth, court jester and rock 'n' roll jerk, is plainly wasting his time.

Pogues comparisons are inevitable, but We Free Kings move closer to a rollicking, punky bluegrass fusion rather than the bastard ceilidh of Camden's favourite sons. More Kentucky than Canaervon. Like The Pogues, however, their initial charm lies in their hamfisted raggedness, their devil-maycare attitude and their dedication to hootin' and hollerin' and generally having a good time, appreciative audience or not.

We Free Kings don't so much play songs as pummel them into submission, squeezing every last drop of blood out of their swollen

bodies. With cello and violin (not to mention Joe Kingman's dangerous drop kicks) flying off in all directions, songs like 'Death Of A Wild Colonial', 'Scarecrow' and 'Motorcycle Ray' rush past in a noisy acoustic whirl.

Like a shot of coarse whiskey, We Free Kings, taken in small doses, can excite and envigorate. But being avowed buskers, they'll understand a desire to move on. I suppose it all depends on whether or not you feel the world needs another trashed out encore of 'C'mon Everybody'? CD enthusiasts need not reply.

### **LAG ROCKLINE** 'SNAKESKIN' CUSTOM €575 001/2 VV LAGSTARLINE £545 QQQ VV

ALORS! FROM the team that brought you those wonderful Vigier guitars and basses, Capelle drums and Europa effects, comes yet another line from La Belle France - Lag guitars, a brand which has already captured the imagination of some top British players.

The Lag Custom 'Rockline' in snakeskin livery, is identical to one used by Laurie Wisefield, but in case one guitar was misleading, lalso borrowed another of Lag's models for assessment, the 'Starline' Explorer clone.

Priced at around £575, the Rockline meets several of the better Japanese brands like Aria, Charvel and Fernandes head-on in price. To see how it compared I gave it a side by side test with several of its competitors. I don't get off on snakeskin all that much but it might do something for you: no accounting for taste, is there? If you prefer other finishes then that's no problem because the 'serpent special' is just one of several fancy patterns Lag offer. It's not, of course, real snakeskinit's just a transfer that's been applied beneath what looks like a polyester lacquer, very much as per those exotic Samurai warrior finishes Tokai have indulged themselves in from time to time.

I have a feeling that it makes the Lag look a cheaper guitar than it is - after all, these fancy transfer jobs are most often found on Hondos and the like, and the Lag is a totally different nest of vipers, believe

The basic concept of the guitar is that of our dear old friend the 'Super Strat', a vaguely Strat-shaped body (maple) allied to a bolt-on maple neck with a rosewood 22-fret fingerboard and hot pick-ups.

The single-sided headstock is a spliced addition to the neck wood. Furthermore, the position markers are in the unusual (but very sensible) top position of the fretboard so that they're nice and easy to see when you're adopting Regulation Heavy Metal Superstar poses 1-999.

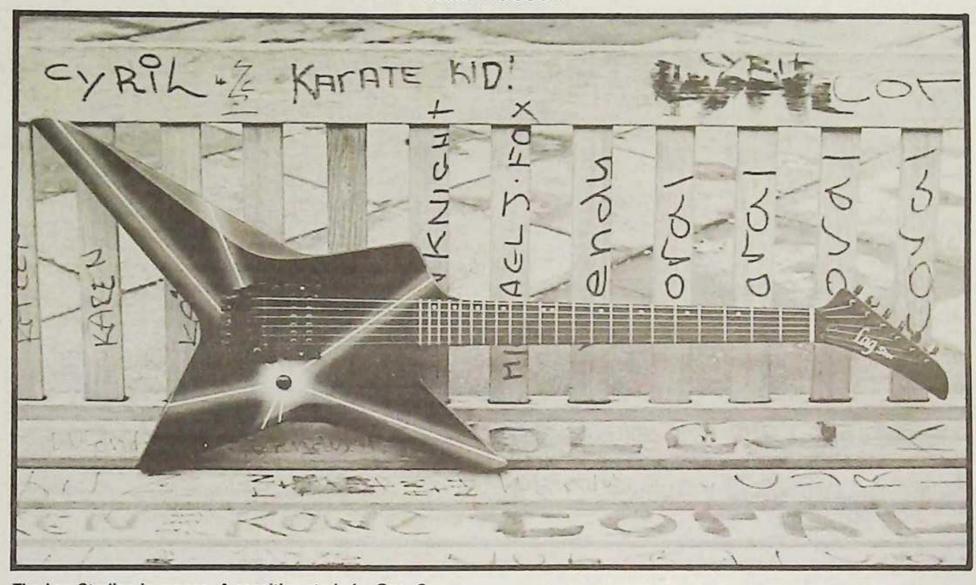
The fittings on this version of the Lag Rockline are an odd mixture of the up- and downmarket. The machines are black finished Schallers and the pick-ups comprised of a Seymour Duncan 'Jeff Beck' model at the bridge with an SSSL 1 up by the neck. It's an unusual combination, I must say! All this stuff is, of course, top-end expensive shmutter, but the nut lock and trem system looks to me like a common or garden Japanese identikit fine-tuning typemaybe a Gotch?

That said, the trem isn't at all bad, it's just nowhere near as smooth and sexy as a Kahler and nothing like as sensitive and workable as a Floyd Rose. Considering that this is a relatively cheap guitar to make (bolt-on neck, etc) I would have expected a Kahler for my £575, but you have to pay a little more to get one of thoseanother £30 or £40, I understand.

Seduced by snakeskin and lured by laser-lines, Gary Cooper lets the new Lag guitars steal his soul.

disappointments when you start playing the Lag, however. The satin finished neck is as slippery and fast as a greased rat and the wide fretting on my example complemented an impressively low action by giving buzz-free, high-speed soloing with no problems at all. The flattish fretboard was also delightful and I can confidently predict that it'll appeal to any HM or rock player with a taste for dynamic, flashing soloing.

All that's enhanced by the sound from the pick-upsalthough I still maintain that they are an odd choice to find on this sort of guitar. The Seymour Duncan JB is actually a replica of the back pick-up on the Les Paul which our hero used on his 'Truth' album and, as such, is more usually found on Gibson-like guitars. But it works well here, having a high output and a richness of tone which gives the Lag a distinctly better sound than is often the case from its Japanese competitors. »

Although it may be derived from a Gibson humbucker, it picks up bags of top from the Lag's body, has excellent sustain and, given a good enough amp, it really does make for a fine rock sound.

The three-way selector switch pushes you over to what is, in principle, a nice hot Strat-like pick-up, and this makes for a strongly contrasting sound against the richness and balls endowed by the JB. I'm not sure that these pick-ups don't sound a little too different from each other to satisfy some tastes. But I found it great to have such a ballsy, toppy sound from the neck pick-up (it really does sound amazingly good when used 'clean'!) and then to be able to throw over to a driving lead sound which is so very different.

Trying this guitar with a couple of average quality

transistor combos, it sounded neither better nor worse than many others - pretty average in fact. Plugged through a proclass valve amp, however, it revealed a depth of character and class which is hard to find from mass produced guitars. Moral-don't run a Lag through rubbish amps, it deserves something better.

Overall, I'd say that it's the fact that this guitar has a definite sound of its own that makes it so interesting. By no means is it your run of the mill 'SS'. Pricewise I don't feel that it's bad value for a handmade

guitar (especially alongside, say, a Westone Pantera or a Charvel), but it does have worthy competitors from the UK - perhaps most notably from the Jerry Bix Pantera series. At £575 it deserves a classier trem but, that aside, it's a very worthy instrument

By the way, being a sort of custom, prices in this Lag Rockline series reach up as high as about £700, depending on which you opt for. Different trems are offered, as are umpteen pick-up configurations and types.

Worth serious consideration, would be my summing up!

Very similar to the Rockline in nearly all construction respects, the Lag Starline is a 'sort of' Explorer, again with a maple body and bolt-on neck plus a high class rosewood fingerboard.

Virtually all the comments I made in appreciation of the Rockline's excellent setting up, fretting and the speed of the neck etc apply equally to this model but, regrettably, so does my feeling that it could do with a better trem for the money. It isn't the same device as on the Rockline but I gather it too is Japanese; it does its job well enough if not exactly spectacularly Better news is on the way, however, as I understand from Capelle that production models are to be fitted with Kahlers as standard. Nice to hear that!

Similarly, I have some reservations about the transfer laser-line beneath the body's lacquer. It looks pretty good, it also looks like a lot of far cheaper guitars which use similar ideas to tart up their images.

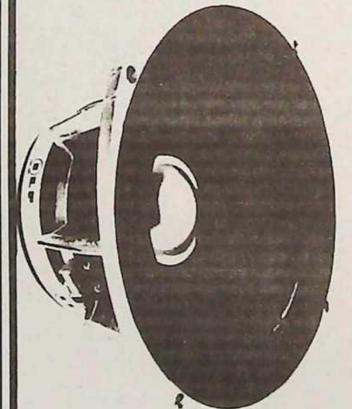
Tonally, the Starline is a heck of a lot fiercer than the Rockline, having just a single Seymour Duncan Invader humbucker (and neither a tone control nor a coil tap) at the bridge. This is (as if you hadn't guessedl) a real proto heavy metal axe hero's guitar, as everything about it tells you from the moment you pick it up. The satin finished neck fits comfortably into your hand, the almost flat fretboard lends itself to speed soloing (with no cut-offs on bends) and the whole guitar feels nicely tight and purposeful.

The sound too is straight out of a blast furnace. You've really got to hand it to Seymour Duncan - he really does make exceedingly good pick-ups. Yes, for the dyed-inthe-wool metal merchant, this guitar is a winner all the way. It may not offer anything so very different from dozens of others, but it does what it does exceptionally well.

My only reservation about this Lag is its price. £545 for a bolt on necked quitar with just the one pick-up (however good) seems a bit steep, especially given this trem. If, however, when the Kahler equipped models arrive, they do so at the same price then it'll be more easily acceptable in my book.

If you're in the market for a £550-ish guitar and your idea of a genteel evening's entertainment is a Motorhead gig, try this one. It could steal your soul.

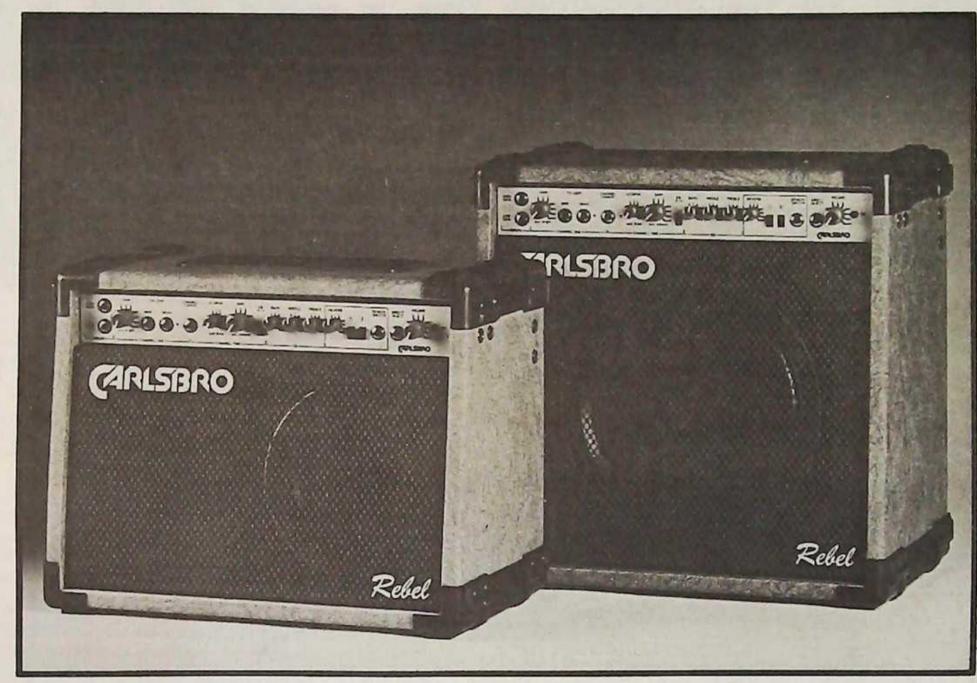
LAUNCHED AT the British
Music Fair and just hitting the
shops, Carlsbro's 90 watt
Rebel 1 × 12inch and 2 ×
8inch guitar combos mark a
complete change from this
manufacturer's familiar allblack appearance. To my
mind this is a smart move, as
it maintains the brand's
individuality at a time when
so many other amps are
starting to look boringly
interchangeable.

In place of the familiar Carlsbro black is a handsome new grey leathercloth, giving the Rebels a distinctly upmarket look. Coupled with this classy appearance is the sort of diminutive size which makes the Rebels ideal for players needing total portability. True, they're not Gallien-Krueger small, but the 2 × 8inch Rebel 1 borrowed measured only 19 x 14 by 10inches and was easily carried in one hand - hernia victims take note!

Facilities of the two Rebels are identical, the only differences between the 1 × 12inch Celestioned model and its sibling being that the 2 × 8inch is slightly smaller.

Twin channel amps, the Rebels' back panels feature IEC mains inputs, FX loops, headphone and line outputs in addition to extension speaker outlets enabling you to connect auxiliary speakers rated at 4 Ohms or more. The front panels, meanwhile, present a very user-friendly array for Channel A comprising (L to R) High and Low inputs, Channel A Gain (with a pull-bright option), a second pair of FX loop sockets (useful) and a socket

for the channel switching footpedal.

Channel B is provided with Gain (with a pull-smooth

setting), Overdrive (with a pull for boost) as well as a new departure for Carlsbro, a preset EQ facility operated by a rocker switch.

Tone control on the Rebel series is via just a single set of three rotaries (Bass, Mid and Treble) which, I have to say, seems hardly overgenerous at the price. Ideally, you'd always have the opportunity to set quite different sounds on each channel of a twin channel amp, and although the Rebel isn't unique in making this compromise, it might be felt that an RRP of some £328 could have justified something a bit more than just the fitment of the pre-set EQ switch, which is (overdrive apart) your only real way of having different rhythm and solo tones.

These facilities, however, give no due to just how remarkably *loud* the Rebel is – at least in its 2 × 8inch you're considering buying this 90 watter or someone else's 100.

Characteristically, you might have expected that the use of these two 8inch speakers (an unusual choice) would make for an incredibly toppy sound, but it doesn't. In fact it's less noticeably treble biased than it is rather 'boxy' and 'tight' sounding, much more of a traditional combo sound than I expect you'd get from its 1 × 12inch relative.

This aspect is bound to produce definite 'love/hate' reactions. Guitarists who like this sort of sound (perhaps older players or young traditionalists) will probably love it to bits, but others, who prefer a more 'open' (arguably more contemporary) sound, will possibly call this version 'old fashioned and boxy'. Fortunately, the manufacturers have provided us with the option.

On that question of treble I did have some very unexpected reservations. Knowing how many guitarists seem to have an insatiable lust for bat-grounding topend response, I have my suspicions that they might make an instant bee-line for

this model, assuming that its 8inch drivers will do the job nicely, only to be disappointed.

On Channel B (where you don't have Channel A's 'pull bright' feature) the sound I got, especially from humbucker powered guitars, really was quite restricted at the top end, and if you use the pull-smooth feature on the Gain control, this becomes even more pronounced as it works by introducing a high frequency filter. You might argue that choosing 'Smooth' in the first place implies that you don't want very much treble, but I think I would (depending on the guitar I was using at the time), and I think others might too.

On a happier note, the distortion is excellent - well up to the standard expected of this maker and much better than most because it's so flexible. For example, although Channel A doesn't have a distortion facility as such, you can get a reasonably dirty rhythm sound from it by using the pre/post gain settings. But the real fun comes when you use the Boost facility, which raises the overall loudness by 10dB, a very healthy lift for your solos.

Then again, set the 'smooth' in operation and (although you do lose some treble as I've said) the resulting sound is a nice replica of that late '60s/'70s classic tone. The 'pre-set EQ' adds even more to this, giving an even fatter warmth. All in all, a particularly impressive overload set-up.

Value for money is difficult to assess because there is no other amp that I can find which uses two 8inch speakers, and of course direct comparisons with single speakered combos would be unfair. Possibly it is a bit expensive but it's got a unique sound with a very definite character. Bland it isn't.

### EPIPHONE BY GIBSON EXPLORER £ 161 QQQ VVV

THE NAME'S a bit of a mouthful, but it's intended to let you know that the new, cheap Epiphones are out of the Gibson stable and therefore to be taken seriously. And who could not take seriously a guitar with the Gibson brand on it retailing at £161 or less?

For me, this was a particularly interesting review, because I've been an Explorer owner/user for some years, and regard my '76 reissue with an affection only slightly moderated by awareness of the numerous abuses the classic body-shape has suffered at the hands of other manufacturers, since it became an established metallurgist's axe.

What I can offer here, then, is a direct comparison between the original Gibson design and its new Epiphone quise.

Without such a comparison, it's quite possible that the difference in size and the subtle shape changes of the Epiphone might go unnoticed. But basically, cheaper brother is also little brother, with the best part of four inches shaved off overall length, and the body proportions scaled down appropriately.

The fact that there doesn't seem to be that much

**DIGITAL DELAY pedals are** pretty common today and they're not too expensive, particularly considering how much better they are than the older analogue types. As always happens though, a good idea is rarely left undeveloped in technology so more and more effects makers are now adding both increased delay time and what they like to call 'sampling' to their products, a typical case in point being the latest Japanese-made Arions, the DDS-1 and DDS-4, both of which I've recently been twanging through.

I have to say, from the outset, that I've always had mixed feelings about Arion pedals. I've tried a lot of them and, without exception, been impressed by their logical layout, easy-to-use facilities and high grade electronic performance. Against that, their consistent use of plastic casings has troubled me; after all, FX get trodden on, don't they? Metal casings seem a safer bet to me.

But Arion have stuck to their (moulded) guns with these two recent introductions. Both are fitted with full rubberised bases but both are entirely housed in plastic. Presumably Arion have had enough experience to feel confident in their use of this material so perhaps I should stop worrying about them.

Virtually identical, the
Arion DDS-1 and DDS-4 both
offer easy battery access via
slide-out flaps on their top
surfaces. They also have
identical 'kick' on/off flaps
and have their connection
sockets on the rear panels. In
addition to standard mini
connectors for 9v stepped
down mains feeds, a mini
jack is employed for
connecting either unit to
either an external footswitch
or drum machine etc for

triggering purposes.

Three standard ¼inch jacks complete the line-up: Input,

difference in weight may be accounted for by the increased body thickness (about 1/8inch) of the Epiphone - a most unusual addition in a budget-priced

instrument, but not one to complain about.

There are subtle changes in the headstock, with its more acutely angled, roundcornered upper shoulder. That famous scimitar shape, while easily recognisable, has been slimmed down, as has the body, with its more compact dimensions and chamfered back à la Strat.

And there are other Fender influences. One of the more obvious economies comes in the form of a bolt-on neck, with rosewood fingerboard laminated on to maple. The

frets are thin Fender-style, there's an exposed trussrod tip and there are two circular string guides (the latter not needed on the original as the headstock was angled back).

These economy measures are also concessions to fashion, of course, since the Strat is undoubtedly Number One Guitar at present, and in the neck too, we find a slim Fenderish feel in contrast to the chunky original - but with Gibson fret spacing retained.

Down at the business end there's yet more Stratorama in the form of a combined bridge/tailpiece and floating tremolo system - something no self-respecting Original Explorer-scorer would countenance. But these days, you can't sell a guitar if it don't have a whammy bar, so this one does.

What a shame the whammy bar supplied with my sample was too big to screw into the hole meant for it in the bridge now I'll (sob) just never know what it would have sounded like. I think we can guess, though, can't we?

Whammytheless, the Epiphone is undoubtedly a gutsy rock guitar, with a good, if slightly 'dry' tonal range and plenty of sustain, thanks in part to two gritty humbuckers whose separate, exposed cream and black coils are probably there for the same reason as go-faster stripes on

a Ford Capri.

Controls have been economised down to single master volume and tone pots (sporting authentic clear black hatbox knobs) and a threeway pick-up selector, the latter so close to the bridge pick-up that it can be flicked effortlessly - intentionally or otherwise! Still, at least it saves the cost of routing out the body to run a wire through to the tip of the lower horn, where the switch is located on the real thing.

And there's no scratchplate - but the original was cheap and nasty anyway, and who needs one when you've got a nice black spangled body to show off? (White's available too, by the way.)

Okay, so this Epiphone isn't really an Explorer, but it's probably as much of an Explorer as anybody wants at the moment. And with its Gibson logo and styling, fashionable Stratish touches and a (working) whammy bar thrown in, it's really a lot of guitar for the money.

What's more, it's as good as any Japanese axe you can get for the price, so the temptation to buy this, with its American pedigree, rather than something of more anonymous origins, is bound to be considerable.

And why not?, as Barry Norman would say.

# ARION'S BOX TOPS!

Output One (mono) and Output Two (stereo). The controls are identical too, both pedals providing level, tone, repeat and delay time rotaries plus 'delay range' selectors with 'rec/play' (sampling/sound-on-sound) and 'play' settings. Slider controls govern stereo/dry and trigger/remote uses.

From a technical angle, the Arions are both advanced. They have virtually identical frequency response (bandwidth) characteristics

to the far more expensive DOD units I've reviewed elsewhere in these pages (does this imply that they use the same chips? I suspect so) and perform on a entirely equal basis, notwithstanding their considerably lower prices. Sorry DOD - Arion have you beat here, even if you do use metal casings against their plastic ones!

To be truthful, the Arions are a lot easier to use as well. Although it must be said that the DODs are both more

sophisticated and versatile, both types are intended, primarily, for use on stage, where sophistication can be a positive disadvantage if it slows you up.

Being the cheaper of the two pedals, the DDS-1 is, naturally, the more limited, but it's still an advanced unit offering a thoroughly professional signal-to-noise ratio, freedom from hum, buzz etc, and a fine frequency response. In many ways it's really only usable as a delay, the maximum sampling time (a mere 1024ms) being next to useless for stage purposes (although it could have some applications in home recording for limited sampling effects).

It is, all the same, a very good delay with a superbly clean sound for such a low price. Is a one second sampling time worth having? Only you can judge, but all the doubling, slap-back and normal DDL sounds are there, are easy to get and sound great. Price for price, this is a good DDL, even ignoring its

'sampling' features, and would be worth having for its delay functions alone.

The DDS-4, on the other hand, is much more of an attractive proposition for S-O-S/sampling uses. No, it doesn't have quite the extra features of, say, the DOD PDS 2000, but it's a lot cheaper and (as far as I know) offers

the longest sampling/soundon-sound times of any current pedal - even Boss only go up to two seconds, after all! Moreover, even at the extreme 4 second end of its range, the Arion's sound is clean as a whistle, well up to cassette multitracking home recording use, and has the sort of sampling time that

can even make sense on

Moreover, it offers this four second maximum for a price below that of most two second sampler-delays.

Leaving my reservations about their plastic housings aside, both these Arions look like sensible buys to me.

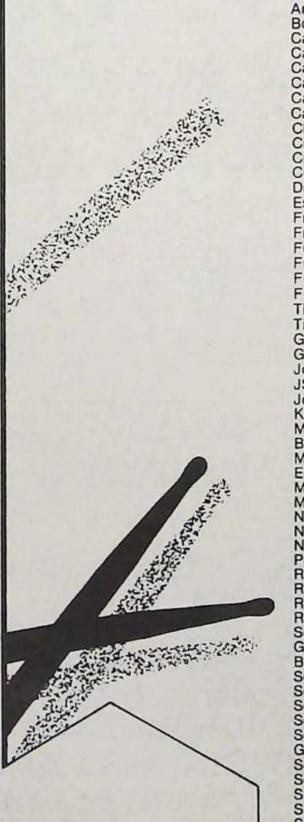

# COUGAR PUTS YOU IN CONTROL

### COUGAR CLX 100 WATT LEAD COMBO £320 QQ1/2 VV1/2

COUGAR MAY not be a name which you're familiar with but the people behind it, distributors FCN, are one of the country's largest outfits, so their debut in the quality amp market must be taken seriously. Given all their resources and experience, FCN both could and should have got it right, so do the Cougars live up to these high expectations? I borrowed their 100 watt lead combo version to find out.

The Cougar CLX 100 lead combo's a handsome looking unit, not so cosmetically different from the vast majority of today's amps but obviously well built, with a

sturdy no-nonsense look to it.

Finished in the usual black leathercloth vinyl, with a metal kick-proof grille protecting its 12-inch cambric-edged MacKenzie speaker, the Cougar stands a fair bit smaller than many other 100 watt guitar combos, being nearer to most 60/75 watt combos in size and weight. That's immediate bonus No 1. Bonus No 2 is that the Cougar is very well provided with features.

The back panel, for example, doesn't have just the usual IEC mains input but offers two sets of FX sends/ returns, extension speaker jacks and both headphone and DI outlets as well.

The front panel is also unusually well kitted out although it does look a bit fussy as a result. On the other hand, it's probably churlish to grouch when you're being offered so many control options. The array starts with three jack inputs, High and Low gain for Channel One (which is also the input to use when you're employing the remote channel switching facility) and a separate 'split' input for Channel 2, which is intended for use when the amp is being shared by two players.

Having plugged your guitar into the appropriate socket, your next job is to connect the two-way LED-indicated footswitch which comes with the amp. This governs reverb on/off as well as channel switching, and plugs into a somewhat fragile-looking DIN

### DOD FX PEDALS: PDS 1550 PROGRAMMABLE DISTORTION PDS 1002 2-SECOND DIGITAL DELAY PDS 2000 DIGITAL SAMPLER PDS 1700 DIGITAL STEREO CHORUS/FLANGER (Prices and ratings in text)

ALL FOUR of these units come in DOD's 'Digital Series' and are USA-produced in identical cast alloy cases with twin 'touch-sensitive' footswitch flaps and tight, precise controls.

The housings used in this series have easy-access top mounted battery compartments (each unit taking a PP3 sized cell) with optional stepped-down mains feed via suitable adaptors and strong jacksocket ins and outs. In common with all the other DOD pedals I've tried, they seem strongly enough made to handle a world tour with AC/DC, which places them at the top of the pro class for ruggedness. How they sound, of course, is another matter; in a nutshell - good to excellent. In detail . . .

### PDS 1550 **PROGRAMMABLE** DISTORTION £149 (QQQ VVV)

Generally speaking I can't stand most fuzzboxes - when distortion is what I'm after I almost always prefer the natural overdrive effects of a fully wound-up guitar and amp. And yet there are just a few distortion units I've tried over the years that have sufficient extra qualities to recommend them to me, and this new DOD is definitely one of them!

The bright yellow metal housing carries a row of two red LEDs and seven rotary controls on the top edge, labelled Frequency, Octaves, Cut/Boost, Level A, Gain A, Level B and Gain B. Connections comprise standard 1/2inch jack sockets for Input, Output and Dry Out, with an extra mini socket for a mains stepped-down feed.

As it's a 'programmable' device, there's rather more to getting the required sounds out of the DOD than there is with most fuzzboxes. The purpose of this mayhem machine is to replace with one pedal the two or three separate distortion pedals which many players now find themselves having to use to get all their overdrive sounds. What the DOD provides in an attempt to achieve this is a twin distortion set-up with Gains and Levels for each (A and B) plus a three-control parametric equaliser.

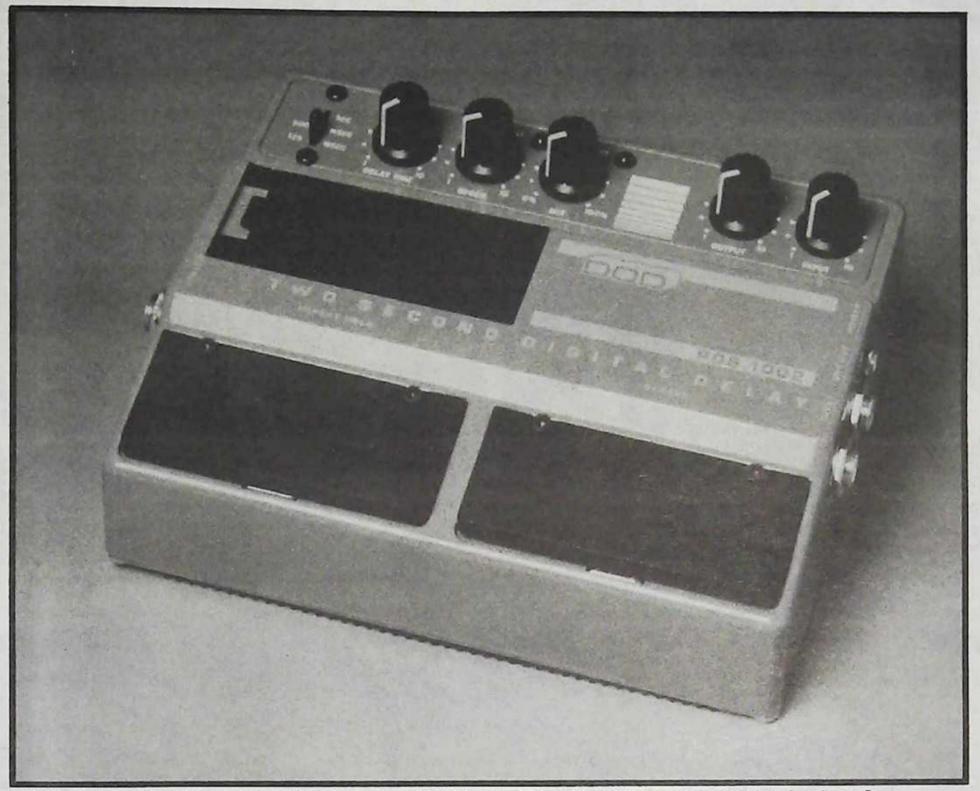
In that sense the PDS1550 just offers two distortion pedals in one box (albeit with that parametric tone system). One footswitch governs In/ Out, the other toggles between distortions A and B.

Distortion A is a heavy metal type with programmable filters and an in-built delay to give what sounds like some of the 'spaciousness' you get from, say, a Scholz Rockman, while Distortion B is more of a basic overdrive type.

But there's much more to the DOD than this. Inside the pedal is a series of computerlike DIP switches which are at the heart of the programmability. Remove the unit's baseplate and you have access to these switches which govern functions as follows - 1 and 2: Delay Time options 40, 20 and 10ms; 3: Parametric EQ enable/disable on Distortion B; 4 and 5: high cut/boost filters adjusted via a trim pot;

OK, OK, we know it's a digital delay unit, but 'Dod's got a digital delay unit' doesn't exactly pack the same zing, does it now?

6: Low Boost On/Off; and 7: Distortion A, delay on/off.

Once you've begun to experiment with these possibilities, the DOD reveals itself as possibly the governor distortion unit of all time. It takes some considerable fiddling with to deliver exactly

what you want but the total versatility of the sound options makes it tower above any other distortion pedal I've ever tried. Be thankful, then, that DOD include one of their sensibly straightforward user handbooks which shows you how to fiddle with these

controls. Four basic settings are illustrated, heavy metal 1, tube overdrive, heavy metal 2 'bright' and English tube. For me, it was the last of these that made the DOD particularly desirable. The HM distortions are all that you could ask; raw, wild, and fearsome; but it's

that English Tube sound that has to be the winner. Here it is, that Jeff Beck echoev overdrive at the stab of a footswitch!

Throw out your half dozen assorted distortion pedals, buy one of these, take your time learning to set it up and you're established for life.

socket. This plug and socket may stand the test of time, but I have my doubts, and would have preferred to have seen something more robust.

Allied to the socket is a rotary click-stopped switch which enables the Cougar's user to select a variety of operating parameters including Channels 1 and 2 individually as well as 1 and 2 in two 'mix' settings. Two push-buttons adorn each channel's pre-amp stages, one for FX Send on/off, the other for connection to the in-built Accutronics reverb (a nice touch as it gives you the option of having reverb on both your clean and dirty channels). Channel One also has two rotaries - a Gain and Distortion - while Channel Two (the 'Clean' one) has just a solitary Gain.

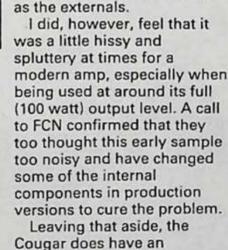
Another positive aspect of the Cougar is the provision of four-band EQ, divided into Bass (100Hz), Low-Mid (400Hz), High-Mid (1.6kHz) and Treble (2.5kHz+). These controls are really effective, endowing the CLX 100 with a very wide ranging sound

A single reverb 'depth'

control comes next, followed by a master volume pot and then an ingenious push button which alternates the amp between full On and Standby, with a single LED swapping from red to green as the amp's status changes. I liked this a lot, not just because it was clever, but because it gives the Cougar a

'bump-free switch-on' from standby and enables you to do it from the front panel without the need to mess around with your mains switch, which is safely stowed away at the back.

Overall, as you can see, this is a well-endowed amp for the money. And the Cougar's sound is, as you might expect



Cougar does have an excellent sound. The Clean Channel really is clean and the balance potential between the Overdrive dial-in and Channel 1's pre-amp gain enables you to set up the sort of versatility of distortion which will suit almost any guitar. It's a good smooth distortion too, the sort of sound which, especially when reverb is added, places the Cougar immediately in the top bracket of modern transistorised guitar amps, with maybe just one or two that can better it.

### PDS 1002 2-SECOND DIGITAL DELAY £199.95 (QQ1/2VV) PDS 2000 DIGITAL SAMPLER £259.95 (QQ1/2 V1/2)

These two new DODs look very similar, both in blue boxes and sharing virtually identical control layouts. Slider switches govern basic delay settings on the extreme left hand edge, rotaries control Delay Time, Regeneration, Mix, Output and Input.

The difference between the two really comes from the expanded facilities of the PDS 2000, which DOD have seen fit to call a 'Digital Sampler', designating the cheaper PDS 1002 as a 'mere' two-second Digital Delay.

Both units are, in essence, high quality digital delay pedals, suitable for sound on sound, infinite repeat and all the usual delay tricks. What really differentiates the two is the PDS 2000's facility to sample a sound of up to two seconds long and then repeat it (via a touch of the footswitch) exactly in synch with any suitable outboard device, for example a drum machine, a synth etc.

Both units offer three clickstopped settings of 2 Sec, 500msec and 125msec, plus a 1-10 rotary delay time variator. The PDS 2000, however, also has a three way selector offering 'Normal/Trigger' and 'Sample' functions which are the controls for the sampling features.

Set to 'Normal' the PDS2000 functions just like the PDS 1002, but set to 'Sample', a touch of the 'infinite repeat' pedal starts the sampling time, placing the effect in the 'Infinite Repeat' mode when this is over.

The problem, as with all such pedals, is that the sampling time is extremely limited. Unless you have a sound which can be squeezed into the available 'window', then it's not a lot of use to you, particularly on stage, although it could have its uses for home recording, especially considering the high sound quality.

For all that, it seems to me as if the lower cost PDS 1002 offers the better value for money, especially for the essentially 'live' player. It sounds as faithful and as clean as the far more expensive PDS 2000 and will do most of the things that any live player will want of a DDL pedal. That to me makes it the better buy, although it's still a bit expensive compared with some of the other upmarket delays around.

### PDS DIGITAL STEREO CHORUS/FLANGER £199.95 (QQ1/2 VV)

Another very comprehensive pedal, DOD's PDS 1700 has the familiar array of twin LEDs on the top edge, seven rotary controls beneath (governing Speed, Delay, Depth, Speed, Delay, Depth and Regeneration) plus the familiar twin (Chorus/Flanger and Bypass) touch-sensitive on/off pads.

Its abilities are a degree more than those of the average Flanger or Chorus, as it enables you to set up independent FX sounds which you can select at will via the appropriate 'kick flap'.

But it's really no better in this respect than the TC Flanger/Chorus that I use (and which costs quite a bit less). Come to that, you can pick up a pair of individual Chorus and Flanging pedals so cheaply these days that the DOD's RRP of nearly £200 makes it look very pricey.
