VIRGIN goes public this week when Richard Branson's entertainment empire floats 50 million shares on the stock market to raise £60 million.

Virgin Group plc, which comprises of the record company and its music publishing division and recording studios, the Virgin chain of record shops and the film, video, computer game and television interests, has been valued at £217 million.

The Virgin Atlantic airline, the holiday company and the nightclubs have been hived off into a separate company called Voyager which is being excluded from the floatation.

The Virgin Group achieved profits of £19.1 million on a turnover of £188.6 million for the year ending July 1986 and is aiming to increase profits to £22 million this year.

The record company has provided the impetus for most of Virgin's recent growth and they are now among the Top Six record companies in the country.

Branson himself is retaining a 70 per cent holding in Virgin, and his partner Simon Draper will hold 15 per cent.

HEAVEN 17 release their fourth album next week on Virgin called 'Pleasure One'. It includes their 'Contenders' single and eight other Ware/ Craig-Marsh/Gregory compositions "employing real instruments and real musicians to achieve a contemporary version of their politics of dancing".

#### Deb's Delight...



DEBBIE HARRY's new album, 'Rockbird', is set for November 17 release by Chrysalis. It features nine tracks — including the 'French Kissin' In The USA' single — mostly co-written by Debbie with Chris Stein, Nile Rodgers and Seth Justman, who arranged and produced the LP.

Debbie's vinyl output has been strictly limited since her last solo album, 'Koo Koo' in 1981 – her last single was 'Rush Rush' in 1984 – but she has appeared in a Broadway play, Teaneck Tanzi, and spent a considerable time caring for her boyfriend Chris Stein who suffered a serious illness. He is now fully recovered and has made a substantial contribution to her album.

THE POGUES bassist Cait O'Riordan has quit the band - officially.

She has left on several previous occasions but has always returned, sometimes before anybody noticed.

This time the break is permanent, however. Her replacement is Darryl Hunt from Cait's own Pride Of The Cross outfit, who has also worked for The Pogues for the past four years.

He steps up to play bass on The Pogues' European tour which starts this week, and will be making his first British appearances next month.

Cait's own reason for leaving is "to attend further education

Pink Floyd set the controls for the heart of the High Court in a dispute over who can use the name. Hugh Fielder gets into interstellar overdrive.

PINK FLOYD, missing presumed dead since 1983 after the release of their last album 'The Final Cut', are still alive and heading straight for a costly High Court action to determine who has the rights to the name.

Guitarist David Gilmour, drummer Nick Mason and keyboard player Rick Wright – who left the group before 'The Final Cut' – are recording an album without bassist Roger Waters which they plan to release as Pink Floyd.

But Waters has started court proceedings to dissolve the original group partnership.

According to Waters, Pink Floyd "has become a spent force creatively and this should be recognised in order to maintain the integrity and reputation of the group name".

He adds: "Since 1983 the three individuals have been unable to work together. It is only realistic and honest to admit that the group has in

KAREN FINLEY, the American stream-of-pornography rap artist, arrives in this country for a series of performances at London's ICA from November 18-22.

She'll be appearing as part of the No Entiendes cabaret with synchronised performance duo James Sienna and Chas Dean, conceptual artists Barbara Lipp and Tom Kokken, sensual dancer Ellen Fisher and psycho-disco artist Dean Johnson.

Karen Finley, whose performances consist of high-intensity rants about all forms of sexual perversions and taboos, often with personal illustrations, has a single out in Europe on Pow Wow Art International (via Crammed) called 'Tales Of Taboo' produced by Mark Kamins (who produced the first Madonna album).

But it's uncertain whether the record will be released, or even imported here because of possible obscenity charges.

"It's available throughout Europe with no problems," said a Crammed spokesperson. "But the prevailing climate of moral, political and sexual censorship over here means we could run into difficulties.

"People who have neuroses about sex or who find some words offensive might think it's obscene. But no sensible adult could take offence at it. We haven't made any decisions about it yet, we're still taking advice."

UB40 have added another date to their British tour at Brixton Academy on December 8

All proceeds from the gig will go to Artists Against Apartheid after the band heard about Jerry Dammers' financial shortfall over the Clapham Common rally last summer.

Tickets are £7 with a £1 discount for UB40 holders.

The band, who've now started their British tour, have just returned from a tour of the Soviet Union where they became only the third Western band (after The Beatles and The Bee Gees) to sign a deal with the state-owned Meloydia label.

After signing the deal the band promptly gave away a third of their advance to the Chernobyl victims' fund after agreeing that the government would match their donation.

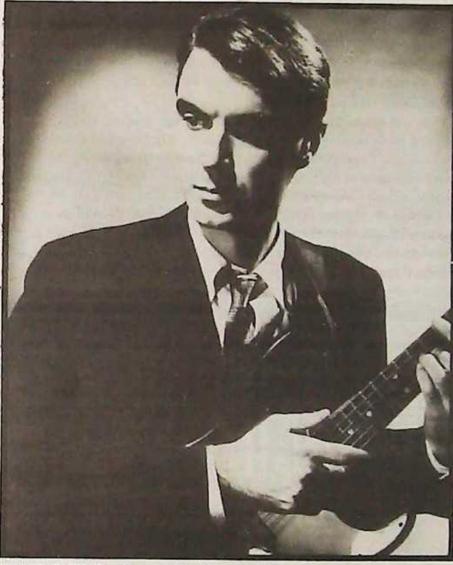

DAVID BYRNE releases his 'Sounds From True Stories' album on EMI next week.

It's the soundtrack from the True Stories movie which opens this weekend in London and bears no relation to the Talking Heads 'True Stories' album.

Even though David Byrne, who directed True Stories, composed most of the soundtrack, it's played by such bands as Terry Allen And The Panhandle Mystery Band and new age exponents The Kronos Quartet.

THE KINKS have signed to London and have a single out this week called 'How Are You' to be followed by an album in a couple of weeks called 'Think Visual'.

Ray Davies has already taken the album title to heart by directing the video for the new single.

THE FALL have managed to get their name in Sounds for the 94th week running by cancelling their dates at Leeds Polytechnic November 13 and Nottingham Rock City 18.

His court action states that he is seeking to dissolve the group partnership "to protect his interest in Pink Floyd by reason of the differences of opinion between himself and Messrs Gilmour and Mason as to the ability of the individuals to continue to record and perform as Pink Floyd".

But Messrs Gilmour and Mason, together with Wright and producer Bob Ezrin, have no intention of disbanding and plan to release a Pink Floyd album in late spring or early summer next year.

"The strength of Pink Floyd always lay in the talents of all four members," Gilmour said this week. "Naturally we will miss Roger's artistic input. However, we will continue to work together, as in the past."

He claims that Roger left the band after a group meeting in December last year. "We are surprised Roger thinks the band is 'a spent force creatively' as he's had no involvement with the current project. The three of us are very excited by the new material and we would prefer to be judged by the public on the strength of the

forthcoming Pink Floyd album."

Pink Floyd, who have sold some 60 million albums - a third of them being 'The Dark Side Of The Moon' - is clearly a valuable name. Although all the members of the band have released solo albums since 1983, none of them have sold in Floydian quantities.

Waters' claim that Pink Floyd cannot exist without him is likely to be based on his role in the band. A lead singer on all but their first album, he wrote all the lyrics from 'Dark Side Of The Moon' onwards. He composed virtually all of 'The Wall' - on which Wright and Mason don't even get a credit although they played on it -

and the whole of 'The Final Cut' during which disagreements within the band came to a head.

On his solo tour in 1984 with Eric Clapton on guitar the first half of the show consisted of Pink Floyd material using Gerald Scarfe's animations which adorned the Floyd tours of the '70s.

He has just completed the soundtrack to the forthcoming animated feature film, When The Wind Blows, which comes out next week on Virgin. His next solo album is due out in the summer of '87 when he's likely to tour again.

### KEEPING A CLOSE WATCH ON THE NEW AGE

"First there was Penetration, the most sensitive and sensual of all the punk rock bands. Then there was the diverse and seductive Invisible Girls. And then there was nothing." Roger Holland fills in the gaps with the help of Pauline Murray and discovers a future full of hope and optimism



PAULINE: "I couldn't soil myself so I ran away from it all"

ON THE settee next to me, her hair still unrepentantly punk black, her shoes as red as China, sits Pauline Murray, perhaps the only genuinely creative original punk person still worth getting to know. Her hands cupped around a mug of hot tea for warmth and for comfort, she explains just what happened to her once blossoming career.

First there was Penetration, the most sensitive and sensual of all the punk rock bands, and then there was the diverse and seductive invisible Girls, and then, all of a sudden, there was absolutely nothing. Why? "We'd just finished a new single and a tour with the invisible Girls when our record label went bust right out of the blue. And at that point I just collapsed. I was absolutely sick and tired of the whole music business. Utterly depressed. So I cut myself off from everything and everybody in it. I just didn't want to know. . . I wanted to get as far away as I could and sort myself out.

"It felt as though the treadmill was going too fast, and getting faster. You seem to reach a point in this business where you have to sell yourself, like Feargal
Sharkey has. I'd reached that
point and I just couldn't do it, I
couldn't soll myself, and so
instead I ran right away from
It all.

"It took about two years for me to get back into the right frame of mind for making music again. And even now it's hard. To go back into the studio to record again was something of a major commitment for me. Although I do feel airight about it all at the minute, because we're doing things at our pace."

We, incidentally, are Pauline, her longtime companion, collaborator and co-conspiring bassist Robert Blamire (and at times that 'we' is more intimate and refers only to the two of them), their guitarist Paul Harvey and their drummer Tim Johnston. Or, collectively, Pauline Murray And The Storm.

And their current single is 'New Age', a slice of modern pop shine that takes Pauline's still breathtakingly beautiful vocals and melds them to a mid-paced and regular guitar pattern which eventually dissolves into a half-orgy of anarchic self-destruction.

Pauline Murray has often sung with hope and with optimism, always surfing on the crest of a wave of nostalgla for an age yet to come.

This time it sounds as though some of her optimism may be rewarded, because while the present record looks forward to a new age, the next one, a particularly stunning cover of the John Cale song 'Close Watch', is going to be a real killer.

# 25 YEARS OF CAUSE AND CONSCIENCE

Nell Perry looks into the background of the Amnesty International benefit album, 'Conspiracy Of Hope'

AS YOU read this, thousands upon thousands of people are being held in Jalls around the world, incarcerated purely for their race, colour or sex, for their political or religious beliefs.

Amnesty International is a worldwide organisation with more than 500,000 members in 160 countries that works for the release of what they call "Prisoners Of Conscience".

Winners of the Nobel Peace Prize in 1977 and the United Nations Human Rights Prize in 1978, Amnesty International have now reached their 25th year, and to mark the event (but more importantly to raise money) last Monday saw the release of an Amnesty benefit album.

Entitled 'Conspiracy Of Hope', the record features all your favourite megastars (Sting, Peter Gabriel, Dire Straits, Bryan Adams etc) and takes its name from a series of US gigs in aid of Amnesty featuring

some of those people earlier

At a press conference last week for the launch of the album, conceived and compiled by smooth-talking DJ and Amnesty supporter Paul Gambaccini, Al spokesman Pat Duffy explained that the organisation had become a white, middle-class preserve, but hoped 'Conspiracy Of Hope' would 'broaden our social base". A label, Amnesty Records, has been set up along with a publishing company, 'Amnesty Music', to "better exploit\* music donated by artists from around the world.

Simple Minds, who contribute 'Ghost Dancing' to the album, are staunch supporters of Amnesty and Jim Kerr has dedicated that song to the organisation on every night of their current world tour. This year they also donated the proceeds from one Wembley and one LA gig to Amnesty. And to top it all, the profits generated by 'Ghost Dancing', out now as a single, also go the same way.

Peter Gabriel has been an Amnesty supporter since the early '70s, and Bob Geldof, Eric Clapton, David Essex and Pete

### MOUNTAINEERING

The two Secret Policeman's Ball revues some years ago, also gave Amnesty great publicity - with the likes of Billy Connolly, the Monty Python team, Phil Collins, Tom Robinson, Jeff Beck, John Williams and Midge Ure also lending support. A third revue is planned for Spring '87.

Amnesty International will receive a 20 per cent royalty from all the money 'Conspiracy Of Hope' makes, an Income only currently enjoyed by such artists as Bruce Springsteen and Michael Jackson. A single will also be released, featuring the donated tracks by John Cougar Mellencamp and Howard Jones.

Amnesty International was launched in May 1961 after a newspaper article headlined 'The Forgotten Prisoners'. which illustrated that governments are sensitive to world opinion and that an organisation which focused on their inhuman behaviour would persuade them to pay more attention to human rights. Al is funded purely by its members and supporters and Its aims are relatively simple -

the release of all prisoners of conscience, fair and prompt trials for all political prisoners, and an end to torture and executions.

But Just in case you're worried at the thought of scores of blood-thirsty terrorists running free from nicks all over the world, Amnesty have one strictly observed rule: they will work for the release of a prisoner provided that he or she have at no time "used or advocated violence".

# TO BE SHY

Kez Owen talks to L'Amourder, a primitive Finnish band with a rare recipe for success

"WHEN YOU are a little boy you fish, when you are a man, you climb trees. Then, when you are older still, you play rock and roll - this is the way it always goes in Finland," growl Jukka Orma and Ismo Alanko, owners of the deepest voices on earth and members of L'Amourder, a primitive Finnish

Three years ago they were touring their native land where the last two of their five albums went gold. Now their rhythmical concentrated noise has left those fishy shores in a mini LP called 'Ritual' and recent live performances with New Model Army.

In gutteral grunts they tell me are the result of eating a rare Finnish delicacy, namely bear meat, the two nature lovers reveal their equally rare recipe for success.

"First we had to leave Finland, because we'd played everywhere there and because the Finnish are so shy. In the weekdays you must arrange glgs in restaurants or student places because they're the only places that sell liquor and the Finnish won't go anywhere without liquor. Then, at weekends you play at forest dancehalls and these are the main venues for Finnish rock."

But these Finns are different, too idiotic to be shy. Their crazy jumping, screaming and stunningly visual live antics point towards sheer exhibitionism.

"Yes, it's so," they grunt. "We have done many crazy things lately. We played crooks in a Finnish Hans Christian Andersen movie. The director saw our show and sald we were the only ones who could possibly do the part. Also we played in Spain after learning the Spanish for Hello, we're a band. But the crazlest was Moscow. We got free Russian uniforms after telling the shopkeeper we were a military band who were playing in Afghanistan."

"Ha! Ha! So funny," laughs Ismo.

\*Oh yes, but what about the shorts?" continues Jukka, seven feet tall in his stocking feet. "We played in shorts there and Moscovites never wear

shorts – complete craziness. The crowd went wild, they'd never seen a group like us before except in the underground movement. But that's so underground that no one knows about It."

L'Amourder are a crazy kettle of fish. But what causes it? Forests? Lack of drink? Fish ple?

"We only went crazy after playing in Reykjavik, where all the powers are together, like volcanoes, glaciers and geysers - the strange force sent us mad. Before that we were really sharp musicians who used ties and sald Hello everybody, clap your hands.

"After being so shy, this is really odd."

BRUCE SPRINGSTEEN AND THE E STREET BAND 'Bruce Springsteen And The E Street Band Live 1975-85' (CBS CBS 450227) \*\*\*

T WILL appeal to those who describe themselves as 'fans' but who were totally unaware of the existence of Bruce Springsteen before

It is for the millions who last year flocked to pay homage to one of the world's greatest live performers but who could only name two of his albums.

It is for those with £26 in disposable income.

And to the rest, the ones who have passionately studied his early work, could quote the lyrics to 'Mary Queen Of Arkansas' backwards, and who have kept a vigilant eye open for the passing bootleg, it is a kick in the stomach.

Let's start with some boring but significant details. The title carries a promise it never has any intention of keeping. Though they span his entire album career covering all moods and manners, of the 40 songs that appear only one was recorded before 1978. This might sound like a rather small point to seize upon with such venom but, as any self-respecting Bruce Bore will tell you, the tour to promote 'Darkness On The Edge Of Town' that began on May 23, 1978 at Shea's Buffalo Theatre NY, a tour that lasted over seven months, 150 nights and touched a combined audience of over one million, marked the beginning of Chapter Two in the Springsteen live

Chapter One – that is generally agreed to be a most creatively potent live period *before* the release of 'Born To Run' – is missing.

This was the period in which Springsteen actually forged his live reputation on material from his first two albums, 'Greetings From Asbury Park NJ' and 'The Wild, The Innocent And The E Street Shuffle', on work that would later appear on 'Born To Run' and through impromptu appearances on the club circuit with native New Jersey outfits such as Southside Johnny And The Asbury Jukes.

There are several possible reasons for the glaring omission of Chapter One, though none of them appears in the 36-page souvenir booklet or the accompanying press release. It has

always been very clear that
Springsteen sees the period after
'Born To Run' and the intense and
prolonged legal dispute with his
former manager Mike Appel that
followed as a rebirth, the end of his
apprenticeship, and this could explain
why only one recording pre-dates
that watershed.

There is also the possibility that there were no recordings from that earlier period of a quality that would satisfy Springsteen The Perfectionist. But as Mike Appel had already pencilled in a double or triple live set to follow 'Born To Run' (a move Springsteen resisted as too "easy") and despatched crack producer Jimmy lovine to preside over live recordings in New York, Philadelphia and Toronto, this is an unlikely explanation.

HOUGH ALL this probably sounds rather tedious it is significant because by 1978, which is effectively when this live thing starts, Springsteen was already a major league rock star playing large venues; and many would argue that a lot of the experimentation of the earlier live work – the re-working of old songs into fresh musical statements – had been replaced by the obligation to perform to large rock audiences in a characteristic rock way.

And there is certainly enough evidence on 'Live 1975-85' to give that view some foundation.

His rendition of '4th July, Asbury Park (Sandy)', a song that in its original recorded version scrapes your bones with its purity and innocence, is slapped out in a melodramatic way that suggests he has forgotten what the song is about. 'Rosalita' is similarly stripped of its virtues, as is 'Saint In The City', turned here from an ironic smile into a bombastic splurge.

I supose this is a testament to the fact that as Springsteen moved into the rock arena his renditions became defined by that environment. Or is it simply that not all songs travel? If that is the case, why are they here? Or aren't there versions that do travel, as in the case of 'Thunder Road', a remarkable version played with just piano and harmonica inside an electric open-mouthed silence.

Significantly, this is the one recording that appears from 1975.

Elsewhere, the collection works but only, one suspects, by accident of

place. If Springsteen was wrong to subject such delicate songs as 'Sandy' and 'Saints In The City' to such heavy-handed rock performance techniques, that same force gives 'Adam Raised A Cain', 'Backstreets', a fast spread of 'Two Hearts', 'Cadillac Ranch' and 'You Can Look' from 'The River' the kind of grinding edge that makes your kneecaps shift.

Set these next to Springsteen's own version (at last) of 'Because The Night' and 'Candy's Room' and 'Badlands' from 'Darkness On The Edge Of Town' and the collection starts to look like it might just have teeth – even though live classics like 'Jungleland', 'The Ties That Bind' and 'Prove It All Night' do not appear.

But these turn out to be the high points in the three and a half hours of material, and the ones that fall between the stools – and there are a good few of them – are, with few exceptions, just dragged-out versions of previously recorded work that leaves behind the muddy impression of looking backwards all the time.

It is this quality that ultimately pulls the collection down. You feel you've been sold something distinctly second-hand and the fact that the whole thing is structured not-so-cunningly to remind you of your last Springsteen gig crossed with all your favourite album tracks and a couple of surprises ('Seeds', 'War') only adds to the enormous sinking feeling in your stomach.

"BRUCE AND I agree that this album will not detract in any way from your memories of Bruce live," says manager Jon Landau in the press release.

Yes, you've put your finger on it,
Jon. What you've given us is a
collection of memories, of glory days
long since past. And when I think
about it, that's about as much use as
a pork pie at a Jewish wedding. All
the young upwardly mobiles that
scrambled onto the bandwagon last
year will love it. They'll flock down to
their record store and slaver over it –
all 26 quid's worth – like starved
animals. They'll talk about it from
now till the year dot and they'll
probably even have sex with it.

"You're a good screw," they'll tell it afterwards with a grin.

And the album will smile back from its rightful place on the turntable in a way that can only mean one thing.

The feeling is mutual.

### FILM-TV-VIDEO-BOOKS of the second EDITED BY TONY MITCHELL

**VARIOUS ARTISTS Punk In London VARIOUS ARTISTS** British Rock - Ready For The Eighties **VARIOUS ARTISTS** Women in Rock (All Stone Video)

THREE VIDEOS hot from the portable filming unit of the German director Wolfgang Buld. A series which appears to aspire to the status of the historical document. A series which succeeds in part. Well, two out of three ain't bad.

Punk In London looks back from 1977 upon the beginnings of the punk eruption in the previous year, and captures much of the spirit of the occasion. Live footage of such great bands as X-Ray Spex, the Pistols, The Clash, The Jam and The Adverts are set beside further footage of some lesser outfits like The Lurkers, Wayne (not Jayne!) County And The Electric Chairs and The Killjoys, and linked with a collection of interviews with many of the protagonists of the time.

Strangely enough, the two most interesting interviews are those given by the old Clash roadie Roadent and the bassist from The Lurkers, Nigel Moore, both of whom pull no punches in explaining to the unfortunate and rather uninspired interviewer that although punk was indeed precious and exciting and everything we always thought it was,

nonetheless it already had at least one foot in the grave in 1977. Meanwhile the odious Miles Copeland argues in favour of the punk bands' exciting worth ethic!

An early sighting of the budding genius Kevin Rowland in his Killjoy days aside, the two other most interesting points to note are the utter absence of mohican haircuts and the novel manner in which, for the most part, Buld has spliced his live footage and chunks of crowd noise with the recorded studio versions of the songs played.

Punk In London manages to present a satisfactorily atmospheric and spirited summation of the punk rock phenomenon as it stood at that moment. British Rock - Ready For The Eighties then develops the analysis and follows the evolution of the most successful and adaptable of the punk and post-punk British bands. So we learn just how The Clash themselves felt they had managed to cope with their own punk legend, and then watch on as bands such as The Police, The Pretenders and Gary Numan begin to assume the ascendancy despite the best efforts of the brilliant Specials and the whole Two Tone/ Madness scene.

Again, live clips (still often complete with the more reliable studio sound!) are linked by snatches of interviews and theorising from such luminaries as the god Bob Geldof, and again the picture, if not actually complete, is at least largely accurate.

Women In Rock, however, is something of a disaster. Every 'woman in rock' Wolfgang Buld approaches makes a clear point of explaining that although they are indeed 'women in rock', they have no wish to be so defined, categorised and thus separated from the rest of rock music. Undeterred, he presses on and does just exactly what he was warned against.

A poorly devised and undiscerning video, Women In Rock is worth catching only for some quite excellent and genuinely historic portrayals of groups such as The Slits and Lilliput (née Kleenex). And indeed it is these valuable slices of musical history in the making which makes all three of these videos tapes to be cherished.

JOS STELLING'S The Pointsman: "nightmarish"

#### LONDON FILM

FESTIVAL THIS THURSDAY sees the opening of the 30th London Film Festival. From then until December 1, the National Film Theatre hosts the most comprehensive show of the world's new cinema that we can boast: something like 160 films have their debut British screenings here over these three weeks, at the NFT and several West End cinemas.

The thing to remember about the Festival is that it's not just a junket for odious film buffs. There are films from all over the world on show, from China, Finland, Brazil and Tunisia; but it's not a long parade of impenetrable art-house movies. Japan, for instance, contributes Yoshida's Promise (November 24), Yojiro Takita's bizarre satire Comic Magazine (17 & 18) and two films by the amazing Yoshimitsu Morita, a comedy called And Then (17) and the complex, shattering thriller Deaths In Tokimeki (13 & 14), which moves to a climax that will leave you numb.

The idea is that the whole

wide scope of cinema can be accessible to even a casual filmgoer. Of course, there are bound to be dull or merely worthy pictures in the programme, but there are an awful lot to choose from. Something as unlikely as the Czech film My Sweet Little Village (13) turns out to be a delight: a bright comedy of local life that should strike a chord with anyone who's ever laughed at a Bill Forsyth film. It's probably your only chance to see the film here. Maybe half of the pictures will be released in cinemas over the next year or so, but many have no distributor as yet and will be deemed 'uncommercial'. Unlikely, for instance, that the whirlwind Spanish thriller Matador (30) will be bought for screening here, or the Soviet films Farewell (29) and Save Me My Talisman (23). John Badham's Short Circuit (18) opens here shortly, but his unreleased American Flyers (25 & 27) is also in the Festival.

There are plenty of 'big' movies on show. The Festival starts with the first showing of Nicolas Roeg's Castaway (13)

and ends with Ken Russell's Gothic (30), and in between are David Cronenberg's The Fly (23) and Tarkovsky's The Sacrifice (22), as well as new films by Bertrand Blier, Louis Malle, John Hughes and Costa-Gavras. There is Vamp (14 & 15) with Grace Jones as the leader of a vampire cult, Tom Waits and John Lurie in Down By Law (28), Dexter Gordon in Round Midnight (17) and Robert Mugge's film about Sonny Rollins, Saxophone Colossus (14). A good British contingent includes Lenny Henry in the road movie Coast To Coast (24), though Terry Jones' Personal Business has been held up through legal problems.

In short, it's three weeks of great films, the best three weeks in the year's filmgoing. A couple of personal choices: Wild Mountains, (25) a Chinese sex comedy, and Jos Stelling's nightmarish The Pointsman (22 & 23).

#### Roy Carr, Brian Case and Fred Dellar

(Faber And Faber)

THAT JAZZ has appropriated almost exclusive use, within music, of terms like 'hip' and 'cool' can be seen as the final proof, if it were needed, of the arrogance of the form. This glossy carnival of a book slings the jazzers' finger-clicking terminology against your face like groovy castanets, airight, but the difference is that its aim is to undercut the exclusivity and bring everyone right inside.

Three of the knowingest, hippest - oldest? - jazz cats in the music paper world have apparently been grafting for two years on this artful piece of business and, as luck would have it, the British jazz scene's nth new lease of life makes this a good time to publish it, but what results from something this easy to digest is a bitty, pretty flick. In an effort to get its stained fingers into anything remotely construed as 'jazz', this takes in not just the players but how the covers got on the discs, jazz dance, the pulp thrillers to read and jazz in the flicks. There's even an unwelcome look at the current so-called 'scene' - Sade, Working Week - and a piece on Paris' Left Bank Existentialists. There's not the space to do justice to any of them.

There are other liberties. I still don't understand why women get their own chapters - particularly the 'Chicks, Chirpers, Charmers All' section on songstresses and (deep breath) 'Kittens On The Keys' (piano queen Nellie Lutcher was a kitten?) but I guess we're not here for correction.

It's also stretching it a bit to include Phil Silvers' Bilko and Eddle Murphy with maybe-Beat comic Lenny Bruce, and the chapter on them goes no way toward explaining their presence here.

But the book is pretty. There are arty pictures by the number, old ads to admire and several photos of Chet Baker to swoon you. The sketchiness of the written content isn't so painful once you realise that this is just a graffiti of reflections, a series of tasters, the tease but not much of the tale. The Hip conveys a communication that jazz is an attitude, a looseness that can be perceived in a variety of manifestations. This unworried book is one.

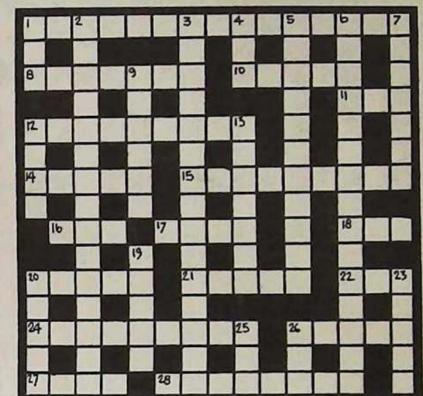

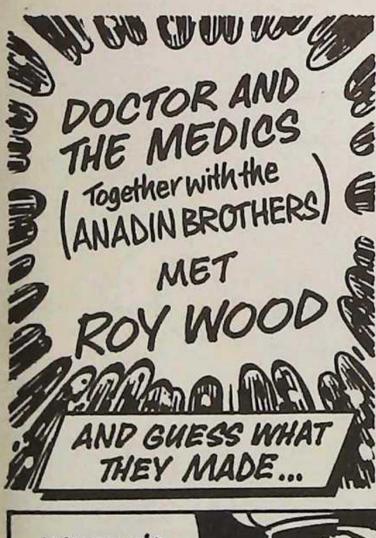

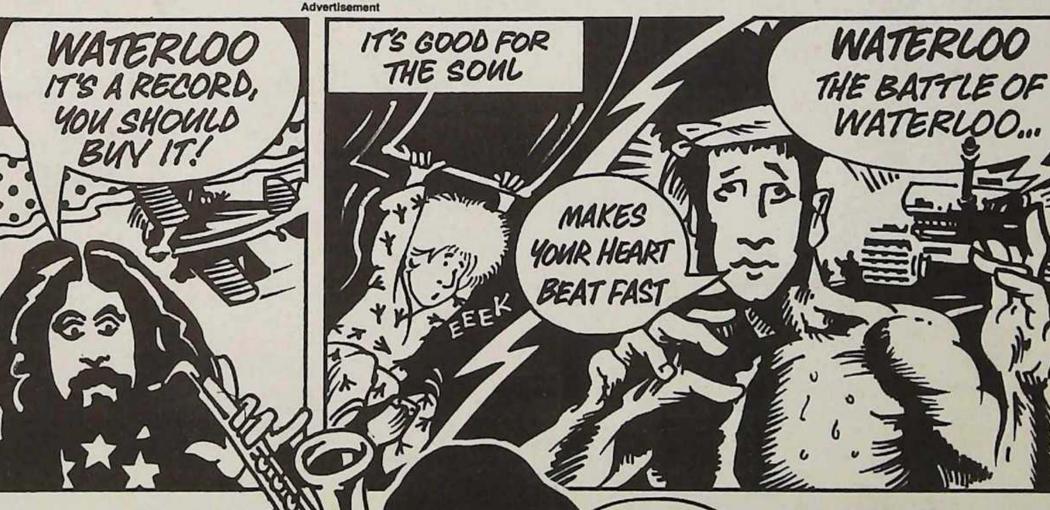

# BRRRMM! THE SOUND OF MOTORTOWN

ROBIN GIBSON traces the Birmingham soul of THE VERY THINGS all the way back to its inspiration in Detroit. Photo by GREG FREEMAN

'This Is Motortown' is an intent and intensive epic. It's an authoritative summary of the occasional dangerous joys, high-speed thrills and pervasive sorrows inherent in young(ish) Birmingham, and it's also one of the year's best singles.

It throbs, long and loud. It takes its escalating tension and urban thunder from the Midlands Motortown, but it grabs its intoxicating beat and energy from the original Detroit model. The Very Things' craving for soul apparently dates back to long nights listening to 'Seven Rooms Of Gloom' (in the Shend's genuine seven-roomed house) and roadying for the top Midlands soul DJ of 1967 (Robin Raymond's genuine brother), rather than actually being in on those heady Berry Gordy Jr days at Tamla. But the geographical and spiritual overlaps, together with their own agile imaginations, raise some interesting points.

A quick flick later through Gerri Hirshey's soul odyssey Nowhere To Run and the relevant Motown myths are at my fingertips, ready to be shattered or confirmed.

How much truth is there in the popular saying that when the rest of the nation gets a cold, Detroit catches pneumonia?

Robin: "I would say it's very true. It's certainly still true in Birmingham. The churning out of cars from Birmingham is the bedrock of a lot of people's existence. And as soon as the economy slumps, people stop buying Metros. Mind you, they should stop buying them anyway. They haven't got enough chrome on them.

"You know, the styling of Birmingham was quite a deliberate attempt to make an English version of Detroit, and it's got a tremendous bearing on what we do. The energy and optimism that went into its creation, for it to have turned into a pile of festering concrete. . ."

Shend: "It seems quite ridiculous."

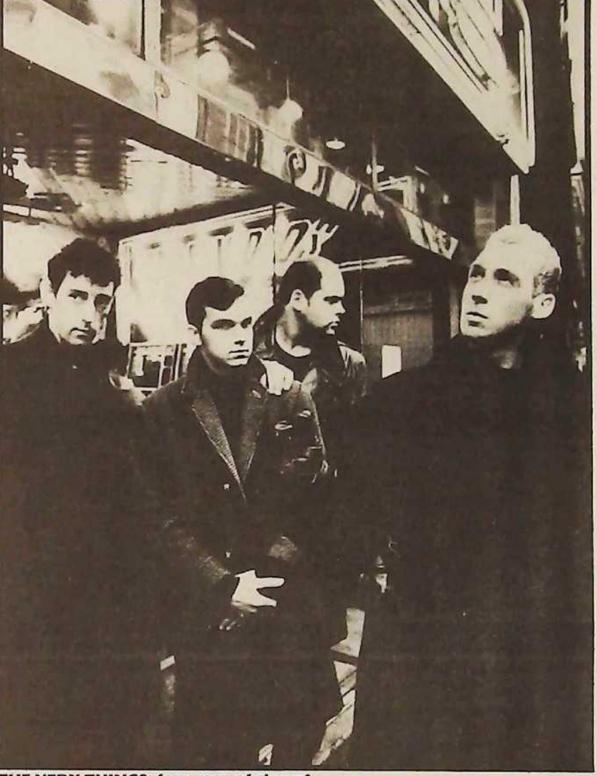
How closely did you identify with Levi Stubbs when he was arrested on the road for carrying a handgun?

Shend: "Closely. He'd just gone. . . over the top. I mean, I've resisted the temptation to buy a handgun, because they're, um, very expensive. But the pressures do increase, the more successful you become. And sometimes you know that it's just going to. . . snap."

Robin: "That's what really interests us about the whole Motown situation. People under pressure, human people, people with blood gushing through their veins... against the background of the automotive city."

Were there ever any problems with the infamous quality control department?

Shend: "Certainly not once we got our mitts on it. Everything is totally under control now. Our control. That's why we started DCL Electric Recordings label."



THE VERY THINGS: four men of gloom?

What was the lowest you were ever marked out of ten?

Shend: "9.8, wasn't it? Something like that."

Robin: "When Berry held up the cards and it was 9.8, we were in tears. But fortunately, it's never repeated itself. It's been straight tens all the way."

During the boom years, wasn't the biggest star the sound itself?

Robin: "Yes, I'd agree... the spirit and the sound carried the artist, on occasion. And it's still happening with us, now. We've created this monster of a sound, and it's taken us over. Now we've just

got to go forward with it."

To where?

Shend: "The City Fathers, who inscribed Forward on Birmingham's coat of arms – did they know where they were going?? It's alright as long as it all goes somewhere. . . unlike Birmingham, where the City Fathers built many underpasses and bypasses that lead nowhere. They've come a cropper, but we won't, I'm afraid."

What advantage is there in having the drums in the bathroom?

Shend: "It's the enamel, really."
Robin: "Yeah. You get this
colossal snare drum sound. It just

gives this fantastic reflective quality. And of course with the handclaps, and the tambourine, the sound is stupendous. It's like a drug actually, and everyone starts running around. In the bathroom and sometimes outside, as well. Because we record some things outside."

Shend: "And then, obviously, you get a group of people congregating outside the bathroom. You know, trying to get as close as possible to the sound. Afterwards, it's like somebody's taken all your muscles out. You become a jelly, really."

Do you know that Diana Ross has no scrapbooks from her days with The Supremes?

Robin: "No, but I'm not surprised. I haven't got any, either."

Shend: "I mean, we're not too keen on the nostalgia point of view. You're too busy moving forward to notice what's gone in the past, really."

(The very next thing, by the way, is an LP – due in the New Year – to be entitled either 'From Motortown' or 'Blue Chrome'. And to be, quote, "awesome, driving soul sounds".)

When you're searching for salvation, do you take more from Marvin's method of groping beneath the sheets, or from Stevie's of intense introspection?

Shend: "It's a bit of both, really, with me. Groping beneath the sheets can be beneficial, at times. But, um, inside my own body is more important."

This new record is more a massive thrash on the mattress than a grope beneath the sheets, isn't it?

Robin: "Yes. That's what it's about, really. Dashing to your car with your loved one, and hurtling home. . . Thrash that Very Things record on the turntable, she says, when you get back. So you do, you crank the volume up, and. . ."

Shend: "And put it on the autochange. Fun all the way to heaven."

"I'm a friendly stranger/in a black sedan/Won't you hop inside my car" – 'This Is Motortown'.

Don't be afraid. He'll probably offer you some goodies if you'll just strap yourself in.

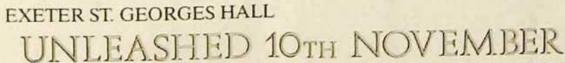

SCOTT HUTCHERSON from Edinburgh wrote in recently suggesting that a Dead Kennedys discography would be a good idea for Info Riot. The DKs have never been featured in this column in any depth, as far as I can remember. Scott has put his knowledge where his mouth is by actually supplying what is a complete Dead Kennedys discography to the best of his knowledge. I've found nothing I can add to it so I'm reprinting Scott's efforts here in their entirety, and we'll leave it to other DK's collectors who may have additional info for a future follow-up piece, if one seems to

DEAD KENNEDYS 'California Uber Alles' (Alternative Tentacles). This is the best yankee punk single I've ever heard. It's funny, it's hard, it's loud, it's imaginative without being contrived, it's as dirty as a bear's bum in production, it doesn't refer to 'shit' or 'fuck' or 'grr' even once. If you like the band's name you'll love the single. Governer Jerry Brown is the subject of the thrashing punk perjoratives: 'Carter power' will soon go away !! will be. Fuhrer one day/I will command all of you! Your kids will meditate in school . . .

They sound as though they mean it too. Ray Valium's guitar machetes a course of burning white heat over a glonous, Pistolean riff that is fat and beefy, while Jello Biafra's vocals sneer and rant, managing to rhyme 'police' with 'niece' (a glorious conceit). This makes The Ruts sound like the Dooleys, and it's not the only good yankee single I've unearthed in the last few weeks

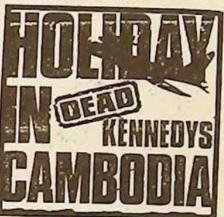

cassette version on VIRUS 45C
had different – generally
extended – mixes of five songs;
overall playing time is some five
minutes longer than that of the
LP. The LP included a free
poster of infamous design!)

Almost certainly somewhat less than fully legal is a cassette titled 'Live In Germany', recorded in 1982, while an American live LP called 'Skateboard Party' on Starving Missile Records is mysterious in its origins, to say the least – but can be bought in many major record shops here.

Several compilation albums on an assortment of labels feature DK's tracks not available elsewhere. 'Can You Hear Me - Music From The Deaf Club' (Optional/Walking Dead OPT-LP 001) has live versions of 'Police Truck', 'Short Songs' and 'Straight A's'. which were actually the band's first recordings, from 1979. A slightly different version of 'Nazi Punks' is to be found on 'Let Them Eat Jellybeans' (Alternative Tentacles VIRUS 4), while 'A Child And His Lawnmower' is on the double LP 'Not So Quiet On The Western Front' (Alternative Tentacles/Faulty Products VIRUS 14). Finally, 'Kinky Sex Makes The World Go Round'

can be found on 'Wargasm'
(Pax PAX 4). Other otherwise
unavailable cuts have turned up
on an assortment of
bootlegs. There have also
been a small number of
individual efforts by or involving
Jello Blafra, Klaus Fluoride
on Alternative Tentacles and
other labels.

And that's it. So all credit to Scott for a solid research job. We will, of course, be pleased to see any relevant Dead Kennedys feedback. In particular, Scott is extremely keen to hear from anyone who may have a video of the band. If there is a reader who can help here, let me know and I'll pass on the details to him.

The kings of bad taste win the day with another gripping, growling gem, almost surpassing the classic 'California Uber Alles' in sheer vitriol. T TAKES a lot of living up to. Being a Beastie Boy isn't easy.

When people expect you to be gloriously obnoxious, to smash up hotel rooms, abuse your audience and generally be a talentless bunch of loudmouthed bozos, er, well, you've got your work cut out.

Know what I mean?

Imagine, then, my absolute shock when the Beastie Boys turned out to be three regular guys, three ordinary Joes. Sure, they've got their idiosyncrasies and, yes, they like a drink or three, but they're not that bad, actually.

When I stumbled in their general direction during their brief UK visit as guests of Run DMC at Hammersmith Odeon, they were clad head to toe in Adidas garb (the company were sponsoring DMC on the tour), slightly unshaven, tired (too much late night action) and in need of a beer.

For their sins they hadn't bothered to let CBS hear their debut album, 'Licensed To III', which by the time you read this should be stacking up in your local record shops. I mean, the myth has to be massaged.

So, are the Beastie Boys the over-the-top creeps that people say they are?

"Nah!" exclaims MCA – or is it
Adam, or maybe Yogi? This guy has
a lot to hide. He was born in
Scotland and later delights in calling
everyone "Laddie". What's more,
with human beatbox and scratch
effects from Adam (Mr Adrock), the
duo go on to introduce a rapping
version of the classy 'Michael
Finnigan' social-politico nursery
rhyme. The Hampstead pub is
impressed. CBS don't get a tape of
it

"Nah," MCA reiterates, "it's all a show. I mean, we just do that so that the press have something to write about."

So you haven't just been forcibly ejected from the Columbia Hotel?

"Well, we did rearrange the furniture... Over a few drinks, yeah, we rearranged the furniture. And we did try to fit all three of us in the lift with our cases."

Hey, small crimes. But still, it is rock 'n' roll, after all. Just a listen to that debut LP (which incidentally CBS have now heard), and you can hear those mangled metal guitars.

"We like Led Zeppelin," muses MCA.

And Motorhead?

"Sure," adds the laddie.

So, do you usually trounce hotel rooms? (After all, that's what the readers want to know.)

"Well, not really," offers the sanest of the triad. Mike D looks young and almost innocent.

"We played in Texas," he continues, "and they'd put us in

rooms above each other, so we, well, we sawed a hole in the floor. I mean, it was much better than using the internal telephone. Those things are so impersonal."

Ah yes, that must have been the US tour with Madonna. Some say you were invited on that because you were so bad that you would make Madonna look good.

"Could be right," reckons Adrock

– a guy who looks like a dead cert
for a lead role in the remake of

Angels With Dirty Faces. He claims
to have the biggest balls in New
York as he polishes his A-D-R-O-C-K
knuckleduster.

"But he's got the smallest dick!" adds MCA, breaking into a Dick Van Dyke-style Cockney barrow boy

Er, so you guys know Madonna? (The earnest journalist changes the subject in a vain attempt to avoid other genital exclamations being bellowed around the pub.)

"Yeah, I do," MCA admits. "Er, I phoned her and asked for an invite to the wedding, and she sent me one. I didn't have the money to get there from New York, though, so I didn't make it. I thought of ringing her again and asking for the air fare but that wouldn't be right. Would it?"

Not really. So does Sean Madonna know that you call his missus for favours?

"He's a weird guy," reckons MCA.

other 'est' that you can imagine.

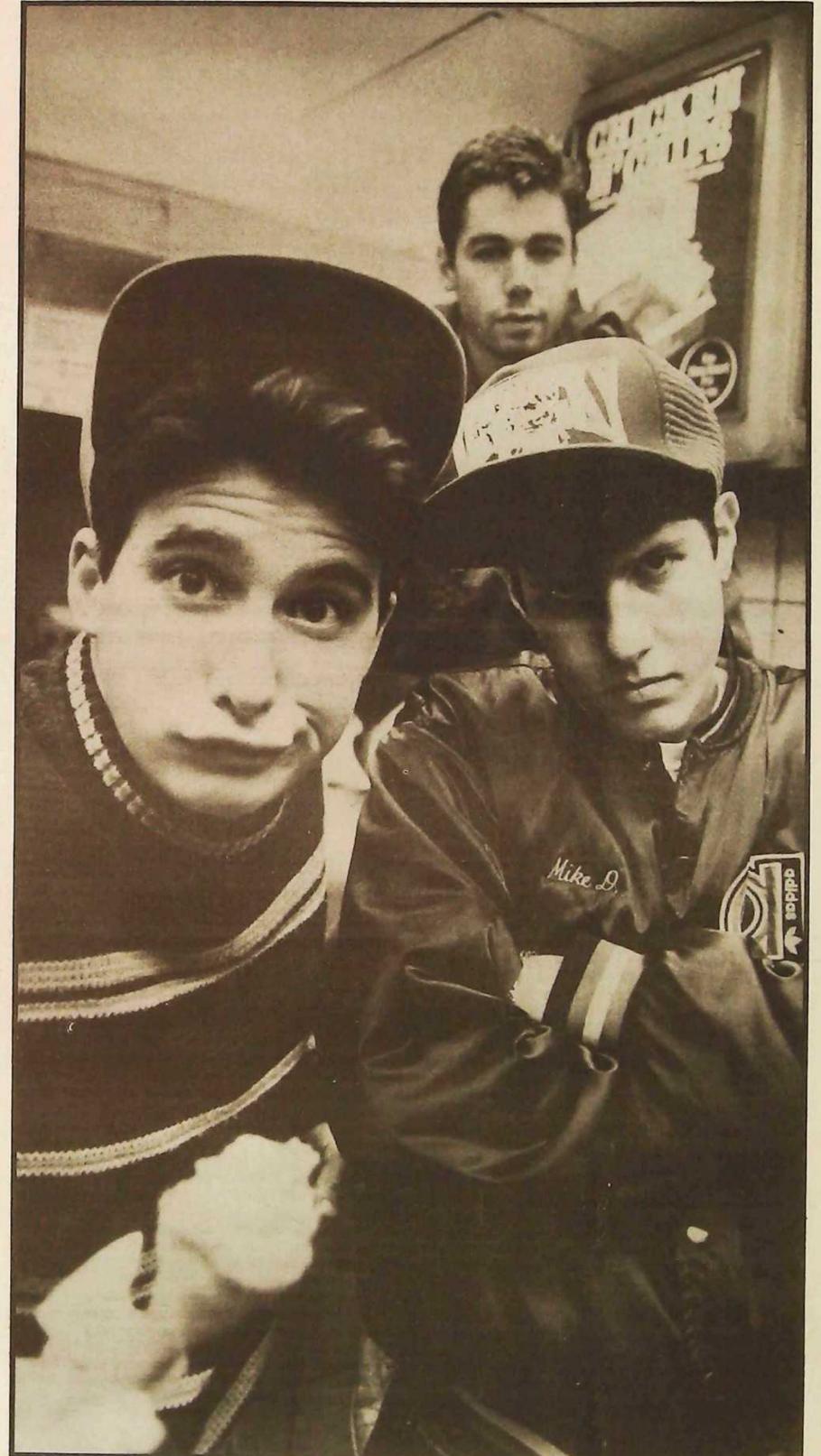
"Yeah. We were going to call it 'Double Barrel Fresh' and do it as a double album just 'cos that was a great title," claims MCA.

cool guy but we're always upsetting

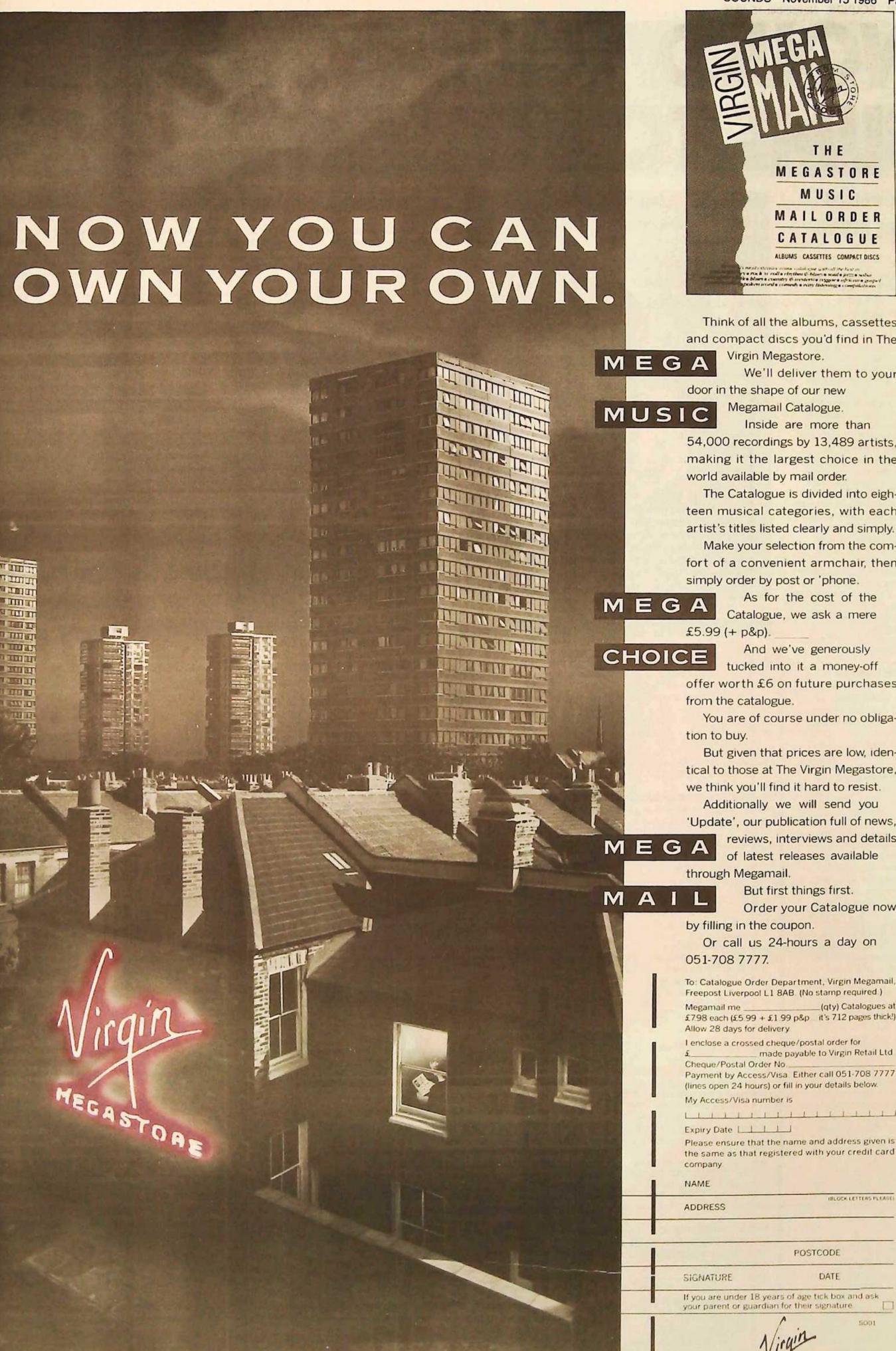

#### FRANKIE GOES TO **HOLLYWOOD 'Warriors** (Of The Wasteland)' (ZTT)

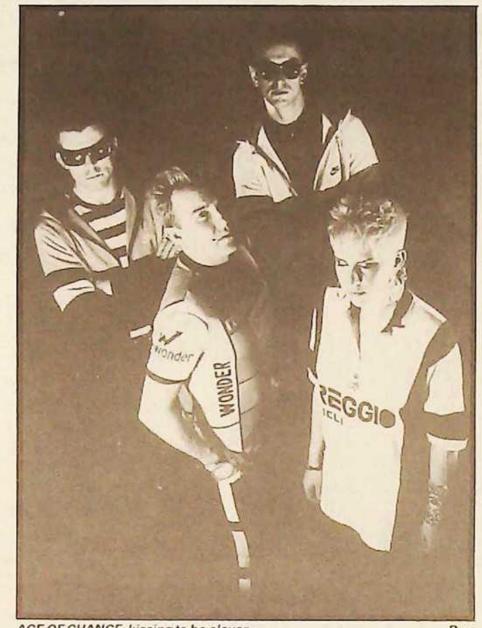

AGE OF CHANCE 'Kiss' (FON) "You don't have to be Prince if you want to dance/Just get down with the Age Of Chance..."

The first white band on an independent label to deliver a record that successfully crosses the alertness of hip hop and electro, the wit of comedian Eric Bogosian and the bullying guitars of... well, Age Of Chance. 'Kiss' is visually stunning. Chevrons and luminous exclamation marks hurtle from all corners of the sleeve, world hungry quips and logos pounce from any available space. Aurally intimidating and shocking, this is the first competent go-go report from a dangerous, ongoing sonic dance war zone. A troublepunk score for a Britain so desperately in need of some angry, alert and ambitious young sods to run along and kick it.

The vision and confidence required to produce this record, and the arrogance necessary to release it so soon after Prince brightened up our lives with it, is phenomenal. This is as good as Janet Jackson, better than Sonic Youth, and as forcefully vitriolic as a weekend detention with Alexei Sayle, Stalin and Julie Burchill. And why not? Not everyone has to be so hung up on music's past that they are condemned to repeat it until the very stench of staleness is louder than the disc itself. There is no reason why brilliant, stimulating music should not return to the decks of our record players. The only people to better this in 1986 have been Farley 'Jackmaster' Funk and Prince himself.

'Kiss' is awesome. I've painted my cream Harrington day-glo pink and glued bacon to my loafers, made skin-tight shorts out of my Trouble Funk sleeves and swopped my typewriter for twin turntables. The whiteys are tuning in. Kiss!

the very blatant New Order drum patterns and the lyrical influence of The Wedding Present, what you have here is quite simply a very capable record. Catchy, prompt and a great improvement on the gross live spectacle I saw in Leeds earlier this year.

YEAH JAZZ 'She Said' (Upright) Uncannily similar to the Dexy's single, only faster, the covers are technically identical and the singer's called Kevin. Pleasantly chewable.

#### THE HUMAN LEAGUE 'I **Need Your Loving'**

(Virgin) Sadly, The Human League's originality, which once made them so special, has long since flitted and been replaced by a competent club production. The only aspects here that resemble the old League are the catchy, repetitive hook and an almost obscured smear of the Oakey voice. A better than average club sound, but that's all.

#### EDWARD BARTON 'Me And My Mini' (Wooden)

Imagine a jack-knifed articulated truck, arse high in the air, wheels still rolling, nose ploughed deep into asphalt. The heat in the cab is. unbearable, the Formica has moulded to the chrome and there's dense black soot creeping up the windscreen. Two bright orange horns of flame billow from the cab windows and then boomph! the windscreen explodes, vomiting 200,000 deadly pieces of black glass like a breaker onto a beach into your foreground.

That is what this record sounds like. Well-packaged, well sad, well buy it.

#### IRON MAIDEN 'Stranger In A Strange Land' (EMI)

The gang of star rangers with no names and no skin crossed the heliport and entered the bar. The bartender laughed at them so they shot him. Bang, Dead. End of file. This is Iron Maiden and they are hard, the music is predictably uninteresting, bounding rock. It is neither offensive nor entertaining. Run for the hills, you silly little boys.

calculated, and tedious beyond belief. It took Mud six or seven years to lower themselves to playing freshers' balls and student Christmas parties; it has taken Doctor & The Medics just one. The only positive thing this record does is reveal the band to be the truly disastrous Gong Show of British rock that they are.

#### WOMACK AND WOMACK 'Soul Love/Soul Man'

(Manhattan) With 'Love Wars', the Womacks' talent was so vividly silhouetted onto the pale efforts of their contemporaries that you could have stepped into that darkness. The way in which they effectively wipe the floor here with the plastic disco whippersnappers is down to their ability to make it all sound so easy. They don't yelp, they don't bitch, and they don't force gallons of naked flesh into your face. They are Womack And Womack and they are cool and you should hear their records.

TWANG 'Sharp' (Ron-Johnson) Like Age Of Chance, Twang realise that there's independent life beyond the miserable groove of a Stump record. Their guitars skate deep into the realms of minimalist, scratchy but tightly directed funk; they race to the end of the track like there's free food and sex on offer there. A dynamic and impulsive Walkman-sized packet of funk. Twang don't stagger, they leap.

#### THE MEKONS 'Slightly South Of The Border' (Sin)

Here, the Country & Northern Meeks stumble uncomfortably from miserable ballad to inspired dancemaster. At worst, they are glum and desperate; at best, brilliant.

The best lines on this EP are. "There is a hunchback up in the tower/I don't know his name but his face rings a bell." The Mekons are about

drinking mescal slammers, eating huge Mexican meals, and then spending the rest of the night covered in vomit in your best friend's bed.

Having escaped from their OAP punk personas, they have taken on the forces of country cajun and are faring impressively. They still see life through a film of drinkinduced tears and, as such, are sporadically astute and perceptive. 'Slightly South Of The Border' is one of the better anti-romance anthems of our time. Buy it.

#### **CARLTON B MORGAN** 'The Supernormals Sing

Carlton B Morgan' (Tim) A delicious concrete scraping of Welsh blues, Spike Milligan, groovy weirdness, Ralph Steadman, lemonade bottles and broken Letraset. As distressing as the battle scene from The Killing Fields where the Coca-Cola warehouse. goes up in flames.

Carlton B Morgan, the man who taught The Three Johns all they know about the devil and rhythm, drifts and spurts from rabid genius to gross bullshit. Here, with the help of his Supernormals, he tackles the worldly problems of religion, fire and talking to your girlfriend. Walk like a chicken and shake that tambourine.

#### SLAUGHTER JOE 'She's So Out Of Touch' (Creation)

Slaughter slipped into the studio and, before the singles reviewer could call him socially incapable and stupid, he had recorded three songs that silenced the man with the typewriter. Direct, confident, and tuneful - yes, tuneful - Slaughter Joe has produced a record worthy of much praise.

The obvious reference points are the gentler Velvets tracks, but the good thing about this single is that it isn't obvious. 'I Know You Rider' is particularly worthy of your attention, respect and money.

JESSE GARON AND THE

DESPERADOES 'Splashing Along' (Narodnik) Much as I'd prefer a full-scale attack wave after vicious wave of pop puppy dogs brutally mutilating anything and everything tiresome and dull - I guess I'll have to settle for Jesse's Desperadoes and their easy but well chosen influences.

Produced by Douglas Hart of The Jesus And Mary Chain, and featuring a frayed-at-theedges version of Blondie's '(I'm Always Touched By Your) Presence Dear' on the B-side, the Desperadoes' debut single is entertaining plastic indeed. Splashing along at 125 hungry beats per minute, this single plays host to the closet ghosts of jangly guitars, interesting lyrics and youthful enthusiasm. Good name, cute sleeve, smart songs. Anoraky in the UK.

#### THE WEDDING PRESENT 'The Peel Sessions'

(Strange Fruit) Looking over the awfully dull sleeve and its endless list of bands who have played Peel sessions is as horrifying as watching Top Of The Pops when it comes to realising just how much rubbish is produced on such a monumental scale. Fortunately, The Wedding Present keep themselves well distanced from the dross.

The most recent of BBC recordings to be released, these four tracks are undoubtedly better than The Gang Of Four and Madness sessions also released this week, and that is a surprise. Manic Northern tune-packed noiseniks, The Wedding Present hurtle through the two minute limit mark popular with many of the new popsters. This is because the band's songs stand up loud and proud, and when you're speeding your fingers across wire strings fast enough to make blood come out of them, the last thing you want to do is call it a day 120 seconds in.

#### ULTRAVOX 'All Fall Down' (Chrysalis) GENESIS 'Land Of Confusion'

(Charisma/Virgin) Ultravox have spent too many years playing out their childish fantasies in their videos to be taken seriously and gain credibility through an attempted political ballad. 'All Fall Down' is wrapped up in all the 'nasty' things in life: a penny whistle, flute and acoustic guitar give it a vaguely Gaelic feel. This is supposedly topical

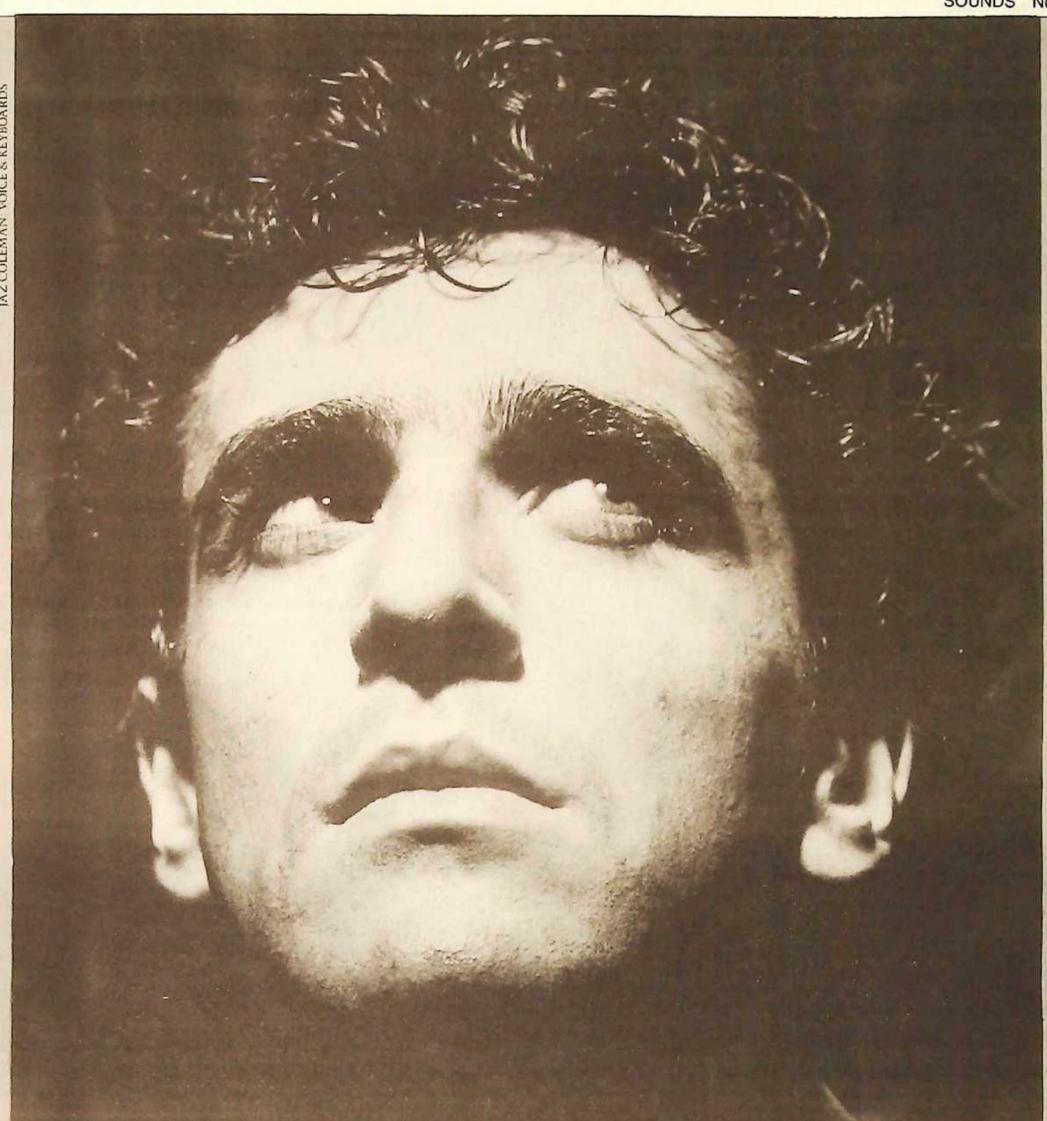

Midge, but your rich voice just smacks of insincerity. Genesis are like Ultravox only older. Both are responsible for the ad man's veiled perception of rock and pop: the Daily Mail punk band, the arm-windmilling TSB guitarist, all squeaky clean and thoroughly vile. Is there really any link betweenthe evil, fusty glint that flickered in Presley and Lydon's eyes and the wide sun spot that rests lazily on Phil Collins' receding hairline? 'Land Of Confusion' has a tap-able drum track, a Spitting Image cover and is tedious.

SHINEHEAD 'Who The Cap Fits' (Virgin) Agit-scratch, Shinehead lays a barbed and informed rap over a relaxed reggae backing track. Whereas agit-pop is usually fast and vitriolic, 'Who The Cap Fits' is noteably calm. Whether this serves to push into prominence the antiterrorist, anti-coke fiend, antiscum lyric or detract from it is probably best discovered by purchasing and listening for yourselves.

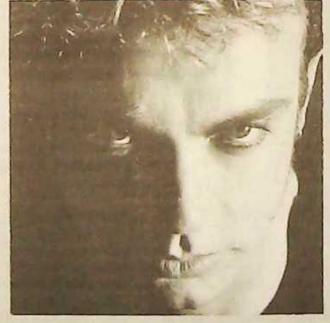

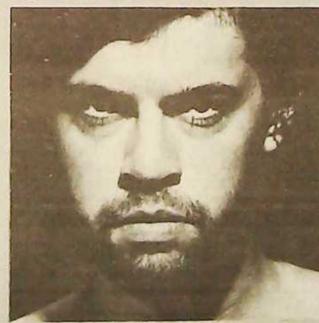

# GIVING YOU DAVE HOWARD'S HEAD ON A PLATE!



DAVE HOWARD: Butter would melt in his mouth. . .

Can one man and his electric organ terrify every audience he plays to? And why did Strangler JJ Burnell threaten DAVE HOWARD with his life when he produced his new single, 'Rock On'? JONH WILDE finds out. Photo plate by MR FREEZE

OME MORE ruptured noise, not content with ordinary speeds, and threaded with stress.

"To be rough-hewn is glamorous," he claims. "Oh yeah, the roughness is glamorous, but no spit and polish. The music's got to have an attitude you see and, if you've got attitude and you put it in there, then the music is just a vehicle, but you can't assume that it's gonna deliver itself.

"If there's a speck of that attitude in there, you taste it and realise you're playing this song and you want more, you get gluttonous and the next time you think about it, it's everywhere, right through the set. The whole set starts shaking and reaching for this flavour that was just so microscopic and starts expanding, starts brimming over, spilling over into the audience, then eveything gets mad."

What happens after that, Dave? "After that, we all go home for a shower."

Dave Howard is a Led Zep fan in love with 'Heartbreaker', a boy listening to the crack and crackle of nerves and making a beat out of it.

"Like a fantasy of sorts, especially being out on stage. Metaphor, thoughts, ideas, but not action. You can act, but only so far, which is better, but you have to keep coming back for more. Otherwise, it could be dangerous. The music's an

outlet, but it's never quite enough, so we have to come back all the time. It's almost like therapy and, fortunately, it's never that satisfying, it's just enough to let off the steam so you don't become dangerous. It's like a water-dam which always has this trickle of water coming out of it. Like your bath-tub which might always be full, but you've still got that overflow drain."

WO YEARS ago, Dave Howard and his Acetone keyboard would be splashing about in this poisoned noise, in some previously sedate Canadian town, driving people out of music venues in their droves.

He dragged his messy intentions to Britain, where reactions were similarly perplexed. Until very recently, he was teamed with ex Rent Boys Inc percussionist Nick Smash, a man whose assault on his kit could only be described as 'homicidal'. Smash has left following the band's new single, leaving Howard to battle it out alone with a sole noise, him and his Acetone still managing a skin-peeled-back nihilism, the blood-lust still pouring through the cracks.

So three singles on and The Dave Howard Singers are raping and pillaging their way to our affections. This month, they rip apart dishy David Essex's 'Rock On' rather impolitely, but rather effectively

"We wanted to make it more eventful," Dave explains.

for Essex, but I always loved that song. I always think that, if someone's done a definitive version of a song, then you shouldn't do it the same way. All we've done is brought it up to date, lyrically and musically. Back then, it was very laid-back, deliberately uneventful."

So in came JJ Burnel, livewired Strangler and sometime Howard Singers fanatic, to make some scrambled sense of it all.

"It all got off to a tempestuous start," Dave recalls. "On the first day, I was so uptight and made him uptight, so he threatened me with my life. I was thinking, God, this isn't how it should be working out. Then, after the air was cleared, it all worked fine. With JJ's production, the melodic aspects of our music have come to the fore, while there's that real live feel, too."

As well as 'Rock On', there's some typical Howard excess, including the completely degenerate 'Kill The Fatted Whore Back In Labrador', the sort of song that leaves a metal taste on the roof of your mouth. Throughout, Dave's vocal swerves off the track like a soused sprinter, magnificently offkey, all part of the DHS chemistry. While his Acetone rages and the beatbox 'Max' pummels a stabbing off-beat, Nick Smash pounds every drop of naked aggression from his kit, like a man who's just been stabbed in the back of the neck.

Smash says, "My approach to playing has more to do with panic \*Basically, I never had a fondness I than anything. You've got to use

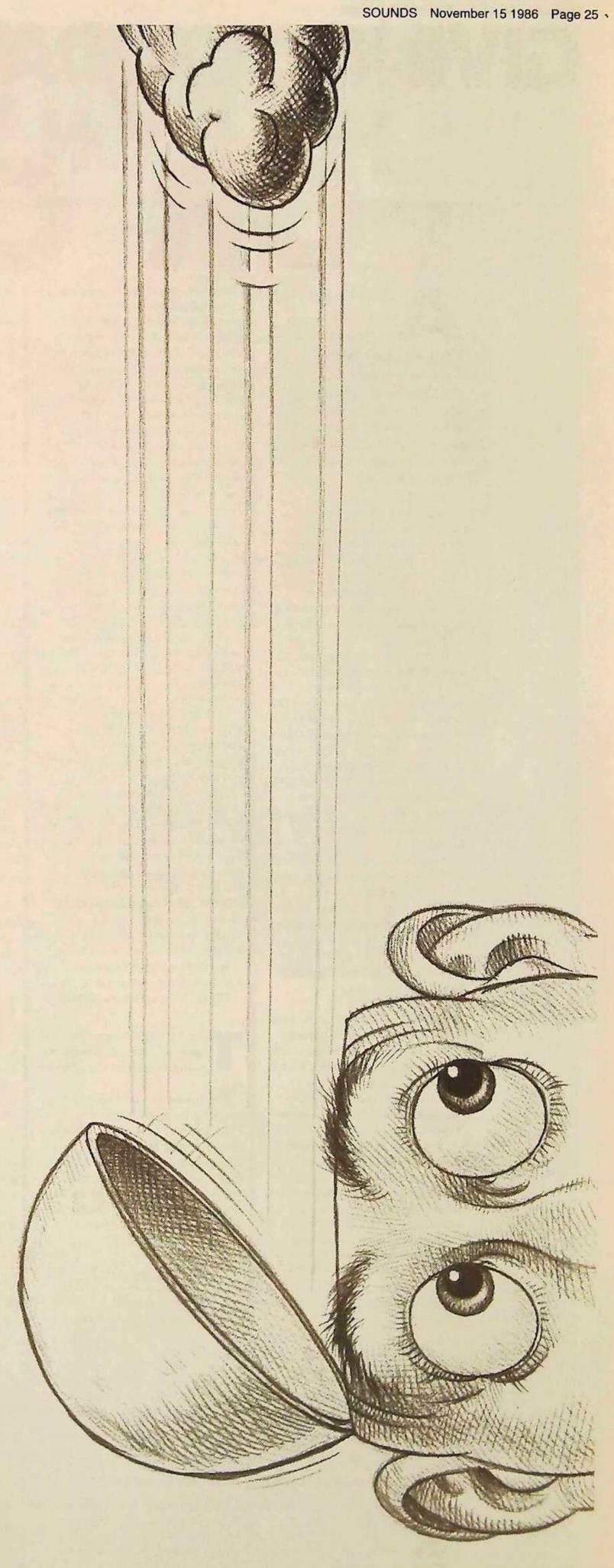
things like that. If you're going to shake with nerves on stage, then shake all over the keyboard or the guitar, use it to your advantage."

At their best, DHS are a glorious

Continues Smash, "Like, imagine a flower with a beautiful aroma sitting in a garbage dump or a swamp, that kind of contradiction, that sort of imperfection. You have to see the mistake as the entertainer's gift. A mistake is perfect, the best thing you could have in the world. It turns the train off the tracks and you've got to figure out how to put it back on, or you have to deal with the fact that it's off the tracks and it's going to stay there."

IVE, THE Dave Howard Singers are "a mix of funny songs, pretty songs, aggressive songs, cutting songs, insulting songs, just all those conflicting things". If anything, their swamp of noise gets more and more seething. Six months ago, they would quickly switch from grating blasts to tender, ethereal balladry without so much as blinking. Often, the set would start with a soft ebb - the icy pale 'Where Will It End' - just to lull the audience in . . . then, whip, like an ice-pick through the forehead they'd erupt into something so savage and inflamed, the exit door would be chock full with fleeing souls. One of the most interesting events of an

BOMB goes off in a club, somewhere in

Western Germany.

**Blood fountains** everywhere. People pour out onto the street in a state of shock. The only casualty - the guy who set it off - is taken away to be stitched back together. His name is Jim Thirlwell.

Apparently he and his accomplice, ex-Swan Roli Mosiman, have been exploding the same bomb all over Europe for some time now. A Wiseblood performance is like no other; people who wander in expecting just another rock show are in for a surprise.

First on the menu is a taste of steel, in the shape and squeal of a Mark Pauline video in which gladiators hammer each other to death from behind a wall of flame. Next up is Lydia Lunch, who stuffs venomous visual and verbal meat down her protesting audience's collective gizzard. Her 'Meat, Meat, Meat' rap/jibe and Fingered film cruelly, yet with purpose, open up old wounds and dig in pointed fingernails.

Mentally flayed, open-mouthed and weakened, the crowd are ready to take the bone that's loosely hung with the new flesh. The stage thickens with smoke, the Fairlight begins to howl, and the sinewy phantom of Clint Ruin suddenly takes shape. The blood begins to pour.

HE NEW flesh, in the guise of Jim Thirlwell, nurses a freshly gashed finger - the result of an accident with a Perrier bottle at a previous night's performance - and digs out a bloodied T-shirt with the legend 'Killer Coupe' stretched across it.

This gory rag was used to soak up the two pints of red which leaked out of Jim's slashed digit to the astonishment, disgust, and later delight of both performer and audience.

The grisly memento of that particular evening which he's proudly displaying will soon, he hopes, be duplicated across a million chests as a Wiseblood Tshirt.

Other irons in the fire include a clutch of old and new Foetus recordings and the brand new, eagerly awaited, sensitively titled 'Dirtdish' LP from Wiseblood. This six-tracker will hot-rod over the parts of your body which the previous 12 inches of 'Motorslug' might have missed.

'Motorslug/Death Rape 2000' opens and closes every performance of Wiseblood's most recent 'Yank 'Em, Crank 'Em, Don't Stick Around To Thank 'Em Tour' of '86, two white hot chunks of sheet metal rhythm which neatly sandwich the writhing contents of the 'Dirtdish' material.

A Wiseblood gig, we agree, is more like going to a drag strip meet, with its roar of machinery and stink of danger.

Whereas Jim Foetus projects often portray him as a man alone, in Wiseblood he's part of a group, an extra limb which can reach out even further.

"I found myself based in New York, I wanted to create a band of percussionists and the first percussionist that came to mind was Roli.

"I spoke to him about the concept, which was originally called Foetus Flesh until I decided that it would be a sin to associate the Foetus name with anything but my own manifestations in music, so that got thrown out of the window. I had three basic points which I wanted to espouse in the Wiseblood manifestation, which were... Sick, Violent and Macho."

Is 'Dirtdish' the Wiseblood manifesto set down in vinyl? "Yeah, it's the idea made flesh."

■HE NEW flesh rears up and splits wide open, heaving and humping its way out of dead skin.

The power shudders through its writhing, muscular form as it tears itself free and rolls clear of its old shell. It senses the smell of molten rubber and grease, familiar odours that remind it of the way things were in the beginning, before the new flesh. It wants to mouth the word Mother but instead out comes M-M-MO-MOT... **MOTORSLUG!** 

"'Motorslug' was a very precise idea of what we wanted to do at the time. If I was doing it right now it would sound slightly different,

but I think it's great, very concise in what it puts across. 'Motorslug' is one chunk of what we're doing, one finger of the monster we've created. It's a multi-faceted beast."

Is 'Motorslug' the heart of the beast?

"All we do is the heart of it because there's not one intention. I say those words, Sick, Macho, Violent... I mean, that is a very broad and flippant thing to say, there are a thousand ways that you can interpret those three words. Hopefully we are using all thousand plus another ten thousand on top of that.

"At the same time that is only this manifestation of it, and 'Motorslug' is but one part of the influence which goes to make up Wiseblood."

Have you a headful of visual images which you fuel into the Wiseblood project?

"Not so much visual as visceral imagery. I can feel the textures, I can reach out and touch them. I don't see it in terms of a deliberation of me performing live, because that is a limitation.

"The way that I write is in my head, then it is transposed onto paper and later, hopefully, translated onto magnetic tape, retaining the balance between creativity at the time of recording, and the original intention.

"A great amount of the art is retaining that balance. I've found that over the years I've done songs which have been unsuccessful because I've gotten too far away from the original intention."

■HE NEW flesh groped around its new world. Catching sight of something that moved, it shot out a claw. Nourishment was what it needed now. Something to feed on to make it stronger both in mind and body. Something pure, something slightly crazy.

What it hungered for wasn't on the surface, however. Silently and eagerly it burrowed back underground.

"I wasn't really conscious about this stuff. . . about underground comics in general. I think it was in LA earlier this year and I walked into a comics shop. The thing that really drew me in was this cover of Weirdo with a Robert Crumb drawing of this weird frog with

dribble and drool coming out of the side of its mouth, and it's just receiving this huge nipple that's coming out of an antiquated TV

"It was the greatest image, I bought it immediately and loved what was inside.

"In the same shop I was lucky enough to find a copy of Robert Williams' Cootchy Cooty comic and that, like... blew my mind. I couldn't believe the beauty of the drawings and the incredible associations.

"The whole idea of a strip like Gorilla Women Of The Third Reich is so fantastic, I love it. I carry that comic around with me always just so I can look at it now and again."

As a source for inspiration?

"Not so much inspiration, more a source for genius. If I produced that comic and died straight after, I would be happy. I love this guy's mind and where he's coming from. I love what he's started and how he is transgressing that. It's extreme and it's too hard for some people."

Was the track 'Stumbo' on the new LP inspired by your recent discovery of underground comics?

"Are you familiar with Harvey comics? They publish Caspar The Friendly Ghost and all that stuff. Stumbo's a giant from those comics, but it was really inspired by the feeling of being really high up and being in slow motion. One night I was staying in Brixton in this place on the 15th floor; I was walking down the corridor and I suddenly had this sensation that I was about 50 feet tall and walking in slow motion. My immediate reaction was that I was Stumboed, totally Stumboed.

"It's basically taking that character, or the idea of being that character, this huge giant who in the Harvey comics is benevolent, but putting him in a reverse role where he's this demented pervert who drives around the countryside in an absolutely huge '55 Chevy... like one of his tyres would crush a village. He's just driving around picking up hitchhikers and f\*\*\*\*\*\* them. It's really filthy, but it's also supposed to evoke the idea of a giant presence."

What are those pig-from-hell noises that rumble through that particular song?

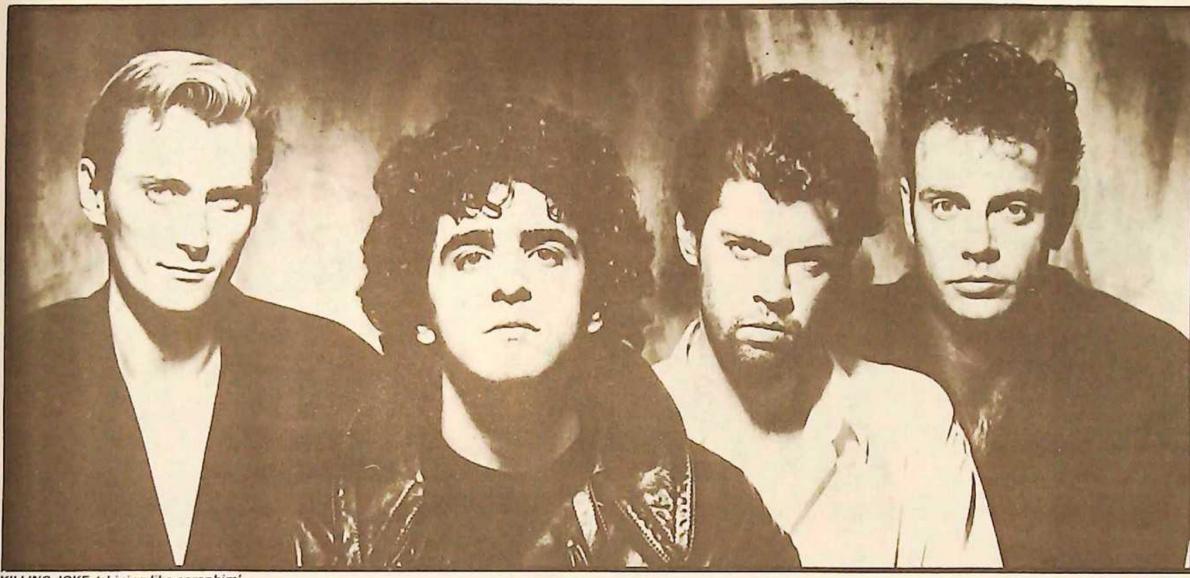

# A RELIGIOUS JOKE?



KILLING JOKE: 'shining like seraphim'

KILLING JOKE 'Brighter Than A Thousand Suns' (EG EGLP 66)\*\*\*

THEY USED to be real hard men once. Now, though, Killing Joke sound as noble and sterling as St George. The gigantic mug shots that peer sullenly out from their sleeve suggest an ugly brawl going on inside, but there's no such thing.

If they're still making their records in Germany, they've

forsworn all the Teutonic wrath that used to be Joke's redeeming weight. In records like 'Follow The Leader' or 'Tension', the heavy metal atom was split into a brutal confrontation between Jaz Coleman's voice and the churning of the instruments. It was heartless music but it had a spark of pure venom that few bands ever catch sight of. Now Joke have undergone the born-again process that has

done for so many angry young men. They shine like seraphim in this prettily titled LP.

The gospel Joke preach now is a simpler, less troubled U2 philosophy: Eden is just around the corner, if we become children and give ourselves up to tears. It outdoes almost any psychedelic record you can think of. No enemy is identified in Joke's new world — no evil bosses or working class slavery —

just a procession of heroes, skies, gardens, stars. Some of the music is perhaps accidentally beautiful: 'Adorations', 'Sanity' and the closing 'Rubicon' establish a simple and effective sense of the epic gesture, the guitars bursting out of a perfumed cloud of keyboards.

Pontificating as loudly as ever is Jaz Coleman. But this is not the Jaz of yore: in keeping with the waving wings of this Killing Joke, he

makes his voice leap into triumphal arches. There's not a trace of selfconsciousness about this Jaz, who must have forgotten the era of Zeppelin and Renaissance, the two major ancestors of 'Brighter Than A Thousand Suns'. That iron belief in this music is a little humbling. Maybe Killing Joke really are strong enough to forge their own new religion.

### BEASTIE BOYS 'Licensed To III' (CBS DEF 45002)\*\*\*\*\*

THREE NICE middle-class slobs. I've conducted two separate interviews with them, and come to one conclusion: all these kids are interested in are hamburgers, beer and girls (in that order). So what's this? The long-awaited debut album by the Beastie Boys, and here's a revelation. The main sources of inspiration behind this record are . . . burgers, booze and chicks. I love them!

At the controls is the fourth B Boy, Def Jam supremo Rick Rubin, back home after breaking down barriers, both music-wise and chart-wise, with Run DMC, a man hell-bent on turning up new metal muthas to scratch with. And the combination of scratch-anything production and hilarious yobbo interchanges makes this the best rap disc of the year – not bad for so-called talentless oafs.

It's not that I don't rate
DMC's 'Raising Hell', it's just
that this package contains
more surprises, with some
peerless lines. Dig this: "If I
played guitar I'd be Jimmy
Page/The girlies I like are
under age" ('New Style').

'Licensed To III' being very much a Noo Yawk experience, many references will be lost on a British public – plugs for White Castle burger bars crop up on five separate songs – but the excitement travels better and is ideally suited to Spinal Tap systems with the volume knob cemented on eleven.

Beastie Boys are Brat Pack rejects, obnoxious loud-mouths who would've seen off the ghoulies in The Evil Dead without breaking into a sweat. Whether it's rocking out on 'Fight For Your Right' ("to parrr-tay") and 'No Sleep To Brooklyn' (Motorhead, are you listening?) or rapping out on 'Hold It Now, Hit It' and 'New Style', this is the album for you. Just fine and dandy.

'Trilogy' (Polydor 831 073-| Y-1\*\*\*

'TRILOGY' REMINDS me of an old joke. Q: How many Yngwies does it take to change a light bulb? A: 21, one to change the bulb and the other 20 to find out how Ritchie Blackmore would've done it.

Yes, it's that kind of a record, one which had me thinking that some joker up at Polydor had slipped 'Rainbow Rising' into the sleeve for a laugh. But no, this is

apparently Yngwie's little ruse – selling the punters tenyear-old Blackmore outtakes.

I wonder whether Yngwie really knows what he's doing. Indisputably, he's a truly gifted guitar player, and 'Trilogy Suite Op: 5' exploits his virtuosity shamelessly and, yes, brilliantly.

Even so, I still feel that he's somewhat mistakenly preoccupied with his precious reputation as a guitarist. We all know he's one of the best anyway, so there's really no need for him to drop posthumous namechecks for

Hendrix, Bach, Vivaldi, Paganini and (best of all) my old mate Leonardo DaVinci into his thanks list.

Clearly, he wishes to be as synonymous with the modern rock guitar as, say, Eddie Van Halen. Yet, to be honest, most of us only listened to Ed because he wrote good tunes too. And when it comes to songwriting, Yngwie is not, as the old LA toilet wall graffiti would have you believe, 'God'.

He's not even Blackmore.

#### ANDY WHITE 'Rave On Andy White' (Decca FLP 100)\*\*\*\*

MORRISSEY USED to think that if you had an acoustic guitar, it meant you were a protest singer. Apparently he can laugh about it now, but at the time it sounded terrible. So can Andy White – laugh, that is. For here he is with his acoustic, harmonica plus Dylan fixation and, far from being seen as a joke, this literary Belfast bohemian is coasting along on a wave of reasoned critical applause. Plus Janice Long likes him.

Much of this, his debut album, deals lucidly with the violence and religious bigotry of his homeland. Standing back, on the ironic observation of 'The Soldier's Sash', he successfully mocks the historic obsessions of his countrymen over a galloping rush of guitar and accordion.

Meanwhile, the single,
'Religious Persuasion',
without lapsing into the
preaching mentality of its
targets, presents Irish
religious intransigence in all
its stupidity and finds time for
a joke or two.

Aside from the strife of Northern Ireland, he conjures up some nice imagery on the love songs, 'Vision Of You' and 'I Will Wait', and then knowingly takes his Zimmerman debt over the top on 'Tuesday Apocalypse#13'. All are delivered in a great non-singing voice.

If Janice's enthusiasm spreads, 'Rave On' could well bring beatnik erudition back into fashion.

#### **GUANA BATZ 'Loan** Sharks' (ID NOSE 10)\*\*\* ROUND UP 100 pop hacks, set the sneer-ometer on them and I'll guarantee that Guana Batz will be one of the few acts to rate anywhere near as high as the universally loathed King Kurt. So, as at least 98 per cent of penpushers would rather be eaten alive by red ants than listen to anything by these rockabillies, I guess it's down to me to suggest that 'Loan Sharks' represents a significant step up in class for Sam, Pip, Diddle and Stuart.

Their first album had all the subtlety and charm of a lesser episode of Are You Being Served?, but second time around, the tattooed ne'er-dowells have almost convinced me that they have plenty to offer. The reasons are threefold: the singing has improved, the songwriting has improved, and the choice of covers has improved.

The title track is the best number the Batz have ever written, while stabs at Costello ('Radio Sweetheart') and Springsteen ('I'm On Fire') are nothing if not enterprising.

# SUCH POLISHED POP

FURNITURE 'The Wrong People' (Stiff Records SEEZ 64)\*\*\*\*

IF SUCCESS in the pop game is partly dependent on timing, then Furniture must be one of the unluckiest groups I've come across. After years of wallowing in the margins, suddenly last summer they were primed for national recognition as 'Brilliant Mind' moved elegantly through the charts. The essential follow-through came too late, however, due to Stiff going into receivership.

Having neither a particularly strong visual image nor a gimmick that the public can easily latch onto, Furniture will have to settle for their clean-limbed, tormented-mind pop slowly seducing us. That's a state of affairs I'm sure they're happy with — above all, they're proud of their state of the art.

You can hear that much throughout the grooves of 'The Wrong People'. Furniture are not only a technically awesome group — for example, hear the near free-jazz plano on 'Pierre's Fight' — they also know the value of

a very well-turned lyric. Next to Gangway and Depeche Mode, they're probably the only people in pop able to dig past the surface glitter of relationships yet make their observations totally accessible.

'Brilliant Mind' and the current single, 'Love Your Shoes', which are both included, are pretty much accurate samples of the contents of this album. The accent is very much on hearts being broken to the sound of plucked violas and the strange strength that can be gained when relationships fail. Jim Irvin's voice is a perfect vehicle for the sentiments. He is able, without affectation, to project sorrow, mania and despair.

Having said all this, there are moments when Furniture start to creak, as with the panoramic 'Sound Of The Bell', which veers too far into Madness country for my taste. A temporary lapse on an otherwise sparkling record. Take a mortgage out on your bedsit and investigate 'The Wrong People' now.

# ATHERINE THE GREAT



KATE BUSH reaches new (wuthering) heights

KATE BUSH 'The Whole Story' (EMI Records KBTV 1)\*\*\*\*

OVER THE last nine years and five albums, Kate Bush, the most beautiful woman-child in Kent, has matured into quite the most sensual, expressive and creative artist this country can now boast. And this 12 track compilation of hits and near misses more than adequately documents her evolution, from the often clumsy and overreaching ambition which marred her early works to the stunning and immaculate conception of her more recent 'Hounds Of Love' material.

Though there were great gaping flaws within the fabric of the perhaps over-adventurous Bush albums, up to and including 'The Dreaming', she at least had the sense always to release the best and most important cuts as singles. And although I would have liked to see both 'December Will Be Magic Again' and the gloriously sweeping 'The Big Sky' included here, it's hard to argue against a selection which spans from the quite overt

sensuality of 'Hounds Of Love' to the harsh rhythms and intense delivery of 'Sat In Your Lap', and from the cautionary tale of 'Army Dreamers' to her best work to date, 'Cloudbusting'.

That she felt the need to restructure her greatest commercial success surely reveals that Kate Bush is only too well aware of her own ever-improving abilities. Though the new 'Wuthering Heights' is the same at base as the original, her new vocal soars far above the comparatively pedestrian if novel squealing of the old. So much so that to balance the added hunger and bite of her own performance, the guitar which counterpoints her at climax has been pushed forwards most emphatically in the mix.

All we can do now is hope that Kate Bush will continue to grow in the way that her past career suggests she might. And give thanks that her new single, the subtle yet insistent 'Experiment IV', also featured here, implies that she will.

ROGER HOLLAND

WANG CHUNG 'Mosaic' (Geffen WX74)\*\*\*

WANG CHUNG seem a pretty inoffensive pair, and here they have a pleasant, wellcrafted collection of songs that comprise an irritatingly accurate reflection of their moment in history. Alternating between hedonistic, teen-biased frippery and compact discoriented serious asides, 'Mosaic' drips with songwriting and production talent but in the end trips over its self-conscious understanding of just what should make up an '80s pop song.

'Fun Tonight' is Kool And The Gang choreographed by Sting and features the eponymously idiotic couplet: "Everybody have fun tonight/ Every Wang Chung tonight". 'The Flat Horizon' is a seamless, horn-punctuated longing for landscape and

absolute, world-sized love. By charts consensus it's a good song, as is the mildly haunting 'Betrayal'. In fact, 'Mosaic' contains no bad songs; it's just that they don't mean a great deal.

The best offerings are the Paul Young-ish 'A Fool And His Money' and the 'The World In Which We Live', with its slightly banal questioning of the world's iniquities. Here we have a 'Mosaic' where the sum is considerably less than its constituent pieces.

**ROY WILKINSON** 

**BILLY SQUIER 'Enough** Is Enough' (Capitol PJ-12483)\*\*\*\*

THE BIG beat is back - beefier and better than ever before. As if you cared. Let's be realistic, not many in Britain have spared Billy Squier a second thought. He may be a Stateside superdooperstar

but so what? We know better,

right? Wrong. If you've resigned yourself to feeling that the rock mainstream is purely a stamping ground for old farts and that mean riffing begins and ends with AC/DC, then maybe this gem can go some way towards restoring your faith in the spartan thump of solid, off-the-cuff rock 'n' roll.

'Enough Is Enough' cools off once or twice, and the odd smattering of keyboards does poke through, but for the real meat of the record (his fifth) Squier's stuck to his usual strafing, stripped-down 'Stroke'-style attack.

Bill might barely have two pennies to rub together from his British album sales so far yet that has to change now. Like Journey and others before them, the only thing that's holding him back is his reluctance to tour here. When will they ever learn?

PAUL ELLIOTT

THE VOLCANOES 'Into The Psyche' (Hybrid HYBLP8)\*\*\*\*

NOW INDEPENDENT of the Static Records empire, Hybrid Records relaunches itself with a powerful album swollen almost to the point of obscenity with the curious and cosmopolitan rock rumble of The Volcanoes.

'Into The Psyche' is just the sort of album on which you'd expect to find quotes from Dylan Thomas. Part-poetic, stealthily stalking lost chords, teetering on the very verge of great brutality, The Volcanoes urge that we should fight.

"Do not gentle into that good night. . . Rage, rage against the dying of the light."

The Volcanoes know that they should give up their craving for a hedonistic death but confess that they can hardly help themselves because they worship at the feet of the 'Spider God Of Voodoo'.

A jangling pop awareness merges seamlessly with a drunken, throbbing psychopathic tendency as if it were the most natural thing on earth. Literate and brutal, articulate and unnerving, The Volcanoes straddle that line between love and hate, between darkness and light, between the known and the unknown. They intellectualise and they rock at one and the same time. The Volcanoes burn and rave at close of day.

PHIL ALVIN 'Un' Song Stories' (London SLAP 12)\*\*\*1/2

ROGER HOLLAND

SOME NEAT little points about this venture: the original silver and black London label, a really nifty sleeve, and the presence of two tracks by the inventor of Hula Hoops, Cab Calloway.

Cab Calloway? A dead giveaway. This is ex-Blaster Phil Alvin's one-man crusade to pickle and preserve hot jazz, with a dash of gospel and a soupcon of blooze for good measure. OK, Joe Jackson had a stab at it a few years

is with Ry Cooder's 'Jazz'. Like Cooder, Alvin rates himself as something of a musicologist, so it's worth mentioning that Cooder subsequently adjudged 'Jazz' to have been a failure.

Precisely what Alvin means to achieve is open to debate, but what he does he at least does with an almost tangible enthusiasm. The man's credentials are established by three pleasing solo guitar/ vocal pieces, and with Sun Ra And His Arkestra among his collaborators, a high standard of musicianship is ensured.

An enjoyable, if ultimately unconvincing, project.

**ANDY HURT** 

**VARIOUS ARTISTS** 'Conspiracy Of Hope'

(Mercury MERH 99)\* ANOTHER RECORD which begs that eternal question: why are 'good cause' records such inevitably dull concerns? It's as though all the creative energy has dissipated by the time the right charity has been settled upon, by the time words like 'justice', 'truth' and 'anger' have done a few laps of the track.

The Amnesty International organisation is laudable in its intentions and all these sullen music types are doubtless sincere, but I'm here to warn you about some of this terrible music.

The largest gaggle of creative losers to ever find themselves on one circle of plastic, they wave the flag of distress about like crazy, full of hand-me-down consciences and tired old rock riffs. Only Sting contributes a brand new track a cover of Billie Holiday's 'Strange Fruit' - the remainder digging out familiar songs that you've no doubt heard before. Meanwhile, the connection of most of these songs to any form of resistance starts looking noticeably loose.

There's Elton, Tears For Fears and Bryan Adams getting all fired up, looking for something, anything to shake a stick at. There's back, but the obvious parallel McCartney, Dire Straits and Steve Winwood wasting their breath on some extremely faint excuses for songs. There's Howard Jones and Simple Minds sounding most modern and most muledrawn. Gabriel's 'Biko' is alone here in marrying the necessary concern and conviction to the appropriate degrees of mood and depth.

The rest is just concerned and just about disenchanted enough. I hope it makes millions of pounds.

If, incidentally, you don't wish to clog up your living room with yet another dreadful 'record for a cause', send all your spare monies to Amnesty International at 5 Roberts Place, off Bowling Green Lane, London EC1R OEJ.

JONH WILDE

'TIL TUESDAY 'Welcome Home' (Epic EPC 57094)\*\*\*

IF WE must have this sort of music then 'Til Tuesday are about the best we're likely to find. Morally and spiritually, though, I should be dead set against such, um, nice music, the sort of music I would expect Heather of Brookside to enjoy. And any group which can propagate the line "we got back in the car and listened to a Dylan tape" ('Coming Up Close') clearly deserve no sympathy whatsoever.

But unfortunately for the civilised world and my personal credibility rating, I am forced to concede that 'Til Tuesday can write some despicably decent choons. And although 'Welcome Home' doesn't feature a version of the epic Peters And Lee song of the same name, it does contain two belters. 'David Denies' and 'Have Mercy' are far too good to be tainted by association with the higher echelons of the gutter charts, both exuding a vague poignancy which

gently reels in the listener. Hopefully, 'Welcome Home' will generate sufficient sales to provide a square meal for beanpole singer Aimee Mann.

# IS FOR THE HITM

THE GODFATHERS 'Hit By Hit' (Link Records 009)\*\*\*\*

WHEN THE Godfathers next brag about their "neat, hard" music, you'd do well to refrain from scoffing. Firstly because it's no shallow boast, and secondly because this is one mean looking bunch of geezers. Founded by ex-Sid Presley Experience hooligans, Chris and Peter Coyne, The Godfathers are a parade of sartorially spot-on thugs hailing variously from Kent, York and (truly!) satanic South London.

They spit and scream and snarl, beckoning forth crazy images of Hendrix engaged in furious battle with Vicious and/or Elvis The King at the helm of an early '60s bikers' run to Brighton; the 'cycles accelerating in perfect unison with The Godfathers' crisply driv-

ing drums, the engines roaring in sweet harmony with their guitars.

And what sets this lot apart from others presently involved in similar areas - besides the obvious point that these boys are naturals - is the fact that whereas cheap competitors revolve solely around image (sneers/ volume/outrage), The Godfathers' strongest selling-point is the Indisputable quality of their songs.

'Hit By Hit' is a ten track compilation of the group's first three EPs plus a cover of Lennon's 'Cold Turkey'. If nothing else, it's worth obtaining for 'I Want Everything's demented devil-rock intro and the quite hideously drugdrenched version of the aforementioned 'Cold Turkey'. Impressive.

#### BON JOVI Bradford, St George's Hall

ON THIS, the opening night of the 'Slippery When Wet' tour, Bon Jovi have just journeyed down from Newcastle and a live spot on The Tube, but still they hit the stage running. As a keyboards intro slips away into the night and Jon Bon Jovi strikes the appropriate pose, the sound of a million guitars rises to fill the hall and Bon Jovi implore their audience to 'Raise Your Hands'.

In response, St George's Hall goes crazy, suggesting that in this country's rock 'n' roll heartland, at least, Bon Jovi have got it made.

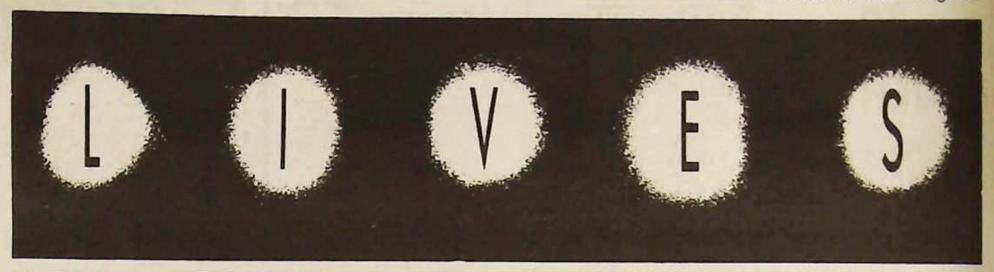
In many ways, 'Raise Your Hands' represents the concentration of the whole Bon Jovi appeal into something under four minutes. Richie Sambora's stuttering rock guitar cuts a swathe straight through the exaggerated and typecast Ozzy Osbourne method, while the blatantly anthemic rabble rousing chorus grabs the audience by the balls, or the appropriate equivalent, without ever offending.

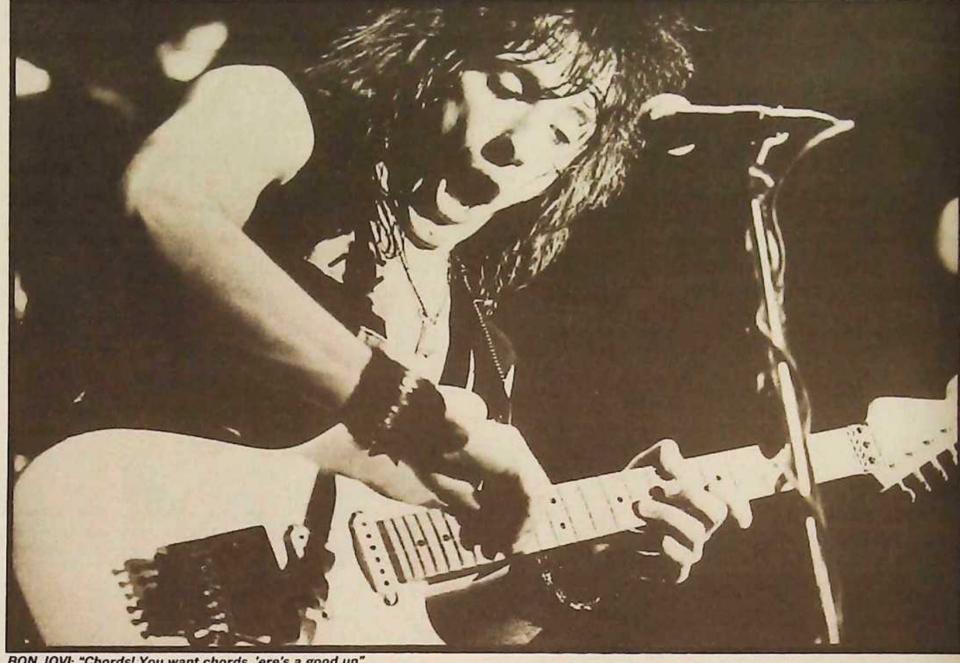
Pieces of wailing punctuation recall prime-time Queen, and Bon Jovi gets to sing the most convincing "Oh Yeah" since Robert Plant. And his band are potentially the most enormous rock act of the moment precisely because they contrive to span the yawning chasms between the likes of Ozzy and Queen, Springsteen (check out 'Wild On The Streets') and Led Zeppelin.

Of course, Bon Jovi have none of the special genius of any of these, but they have a talent all of their own: the ability to take many of the easiest, most obvious options, dance on our faces and make us like it. The little girls understand, and so do an awful lot of the boys.

It's not often someone like myself takes a train to a gig already singing along with the hit single, but 'You Give Love A Bad Name' accompanied me all the way to Bradford. On the way back I couldn't get 'Runaway' out of my head.

#### STUMP/THE BAD TUNED MEN **Central London** Polytechnic

THE SUPPORT try to prove that their brains have turned to liquid marzipan, the singer full of nervous face flushes and his group of students retards stranded somewhere between Wire on the Live At The Roxy album and last week's Marillion. "We are the badly-dressed men," the voice intones over the choking gargle which strains in search of the right note. They never seem to find it, though.

Stump make a monstrous din, riddled with off-beat Beefheart-ian delirium, ultimately as appealing as a garden rake between the ribs The name is plain and Goddamn ugly, but Stump themselves are far worse. Frontman Mick Lynch is one of nature's great cruel jokes, an unfortunate looking fella without voice or dance. exorcising his awkwardness for a bare living. Like children up way past their bedtimes, the group struggle to sound troublesome or even interested and become offensively ordinary.

Music for timid, tone-deaf

indie thickheads, for people who think sexbeat comes in cartons. Stump are not what you would call lyrically deft, about as nimble as a swampforest, some forgettable mess like 'Orgasm Way' hardly a delicate ode to the open road or beyond. Stump represent the geek-end of 'Independence' where tunes are red things for sucking and joy is just yoj spelt backwards, a shockingly worthless, disharmonious grind of noise, hoping to obtain scarred, scared brilliance, but just sounding paralysed by its own frustrations.

The rise and rise of rubbish like Stump is the disheartening din of mediocrity peaking. Sad sad sad.

#### THE LEATHER NUN BOMB PARTY/GAYE BYKERS ON ACID Hammersmith Clarendon

GAYE BYKERS pelt through highly-strung quips of loaded turbulence, slothful without being remotely effective, a bass-heavy wall of teenage

delinquency, sick from all the grease, dripping with scratchy streaks of powerhouse inelegance. As ticklish and becoming as a jackhammer up the rectum.

Bomb Party were all this and less, a flat black slab of post-Cave murk, complete . with a big, bashing drumbeat. Their dowdy intentions have been set in concrete for too long now. Tonight they perished, let it be for the last time.

Even the calm, measured force of their vinyl hadn't prepared me for The Leather Nun's live impact, a svelte metal sleaze indeed. A chockful Clarendon shook to the core, scalded by an icy detachment which blows their brooding sexuality up into bitter twists and barbed fury. The Leather Nun are both cool and dissonant, a heartbeat like a drum-roll, throwing out rough, rotting scraps of scorched emotion.

In the quaintly titled 'Have Sex With Me', they can offer a grumbling spire of noise, vocalist Jonas just shredding the last trace of melancholy through the meat-grinder. On the dewy-eyed 'For The Love Of Your Eyes', he plays the slightly menacing matinee idol with a grating irony. Bathed in grey light, he makes the flow of syllables taste like your first French kiss, some epic tongue sandwich at that. When Nun then resort to harsh Stooge thunder, they undo it all with the expertise and cunning of a striptease slut, never pounding, just playing the hairs on the back of your neck like some revved-up harp sonata. Yeah, that subtle. Climax, they remind us, is no suburb of Dresden.

While everyone else was left to doodle on the corner of the jotter, The Leather Nun came on like some particularly abandoned Pollock painting. Completely nervous.

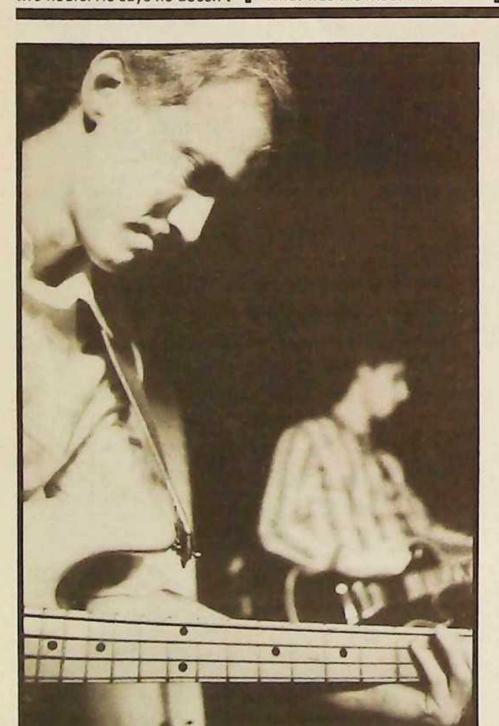

However, this Midge Ure, the merrily unrepentant reborn pomp rock star, also has his moments. Don't forget, for example, that this was the man who fought famine in Africa and still found time to shave.

Say what you will, Midge Ure - whichever Midge Ure he may be playing at the time - is very hard to hate. He's just a very nice guy with very dodgy taste.

Who else would open a set like this with a song that insists that it's all just the 'Same Old Story'? Gary Numan could never have got away with that, and neither can Midge Ure. But still you want him to.

Unfortunately, though, the Ultravox that Ure leads is mediocre, irrelevant and tired. Such movement as there is within the songs lies entirely in the vertical plane. The too regular rhythms rise and fall like leaves caught on the breeze. There's no beat as such, no tension in the loose, slack lines they adopt.

Ultravox were once everything you could hope for in a band of its sort - wild, beautiful and damned. And then John Foxx left. Once it was felt that Ultravox could have become the new Roxy Music; in fact, they have become the next Emerson, Lake And Palmer, commercially potent yet creatively bankrupt. For all their cinemascopic big sound productions, Ultravox ring hollow. They mean nothing to

MEKONS IN credibility and/or popularity shock. Read on, read on .

Having kicked around in Leeds for over a decade, and despite being adopted and eulogised by the top guns of American rock criticism (their 'The Edge Of The World' album was recently number one in the US college charts), The Mekons have long looked to be the terminal outsiders of the British music circus. But now, The Meeks are in danger of finding the world coming into line with them.

They're discovering that their marriage of an English post-punk cynicism to a jaunty mutation of country is a fine fine thing and has been for a long time.

Still, big league status is a little way off yet as their appearance at this dingy but entirely appropriate North London pub testifies. This motley crew of a crowd, all managing to look subtly dispossessed, are very fond of this unruly band of ironic troubadours.

The Mekons take their inherited stock of melancholy folk music and add their own lyrical deftness. The result is an accurate reflection of both the state of the nation and the human condition. Live, a lot of the sadness is forgotten in the drunken revelry but songs like the new single, 'Slightly South Of The Border', retain their poignancy. Plus they do

ELIZABETH FRASER: emotional warfare

#### **COCTEAU TWINS**

#### Portsmouth Guildhall

EVERYONE HAS their own theories about the Cocteau Twins. After tonight's performance. mine is this: they are close to madness in their quest for a perfect musical puzzle and, as such, they are one of the most provocative and dramatic groups you will ever see.

The Cocteaus are perceived by many as being some sort of neo-goth-cum-hippie easy listening muzak for space cadets and courting couples. I think they are the opposite. Inside their artfully constructed private world of sound, I hear a nameless terror at work. And it's this demon which lies at the source of Elizabeth Fraser's singing.

Why? The first thing is that Elizabeth's hand movements border on the insane; they claw at each other in fear. On this opening night in Portsmouth - pianist-collaborator Harold Budd isn't with them - I found myself utterly mesmerised by the petite singer's intensity. She may not roll around the boards and howl in the trad rockist manner, but those psycho hand gestures are a dead giveaway.

The sheer physical passivity of Robin Guthrie and Simon Raymonde on either side of her, as they shimmered forth the band's guitar afterburn, served to highlight the singer's inner violence. Elizabeth often seemed at war with something inside herself, and it's this friction that gives her voice its emotional depth.

No doubt you are thinking my trolley's become disconnected, but let's pause for a minute to consider the group's name. One educated guess is that Robin and Elizabeth purloined it from Jean Cocteau's Les Enfants Terribles (which roughly translates into The Holy Terrors).

In the novel, two orphans, a brother and a sister - the latter is ironically enough called Elizabeth - build themselves a private world within a shared room in which they act out their fantasies. The eventual result is the death of the brother and Elizabeth herself committing suicide. Has Ms Fraser adopted this role? Maybe not, but it's an interesting theory. It certainly puts 'She Will Destroy You' in a new light and partly accounts for the private lyrical world she has made her forte.

The almost-singing-in-tongues nature of Elizabeth's vocals has long been the Cocteaus' strongest suit, and this evening's performance of the seminal 'Sugar Hiccup' drove that home. But it isn't simply that her tonsils are titanium-plated; everything about this band is designed to stimulate your imagination and tickle your intuition. In that sense, the audience are an integral part of a very elaborate puzzle. Each person supplies their own meaning to the songs: where some hear happiness, I hear sadness, and vice versa. The Cocteaus have something to offer everyone, from courting couples to conspiring theorists like myself. In that they are unique. **JACK BARRON**

#### THE DAMNED Oxford Apollo

IS IT a joke? Is it New Faces? Is it a sham? Yes, it's all these things and more, It's The Damned on Halloween night in Oxford making a joyless row which, far from being 'neat neat neat', is just a 'bleat bleat bleat'.

The vacuous noise in question is the band's horribly histrionic cover of 'Eloise'. The audience love it, they stamp their feet and whistle their approval, yet all I hear is the hollow death rattle of imagination being lowered into its grave. This is the first time I've seen The Damned. It will be the last.

Dave Vanian and his motley crew are barely functional entertainment. In a career bid to keep on (c)rocking till they're OAPs, The Damned have dissipated any energy and inspiration they might have had by trying to be a band for all seasons. As each successive pop music style has unveiled itself since punk, these jokers have appropriated it.

This wholesale plundering of styles is clearly reflected in the audience. Mohicaned punks, neo-Alice hippies, goths and pimpled pop-picker kids rub shoulders. Each faction gets at least one song they can identify with, but I still feel cheated.

Why? Because The Damned are not even accomplished at their piracy. Their version of The Doors' 'LA Woman', for example, is both slavish and unbelievably hammy. The band make no attempt to invest it with vigour or passion. Vanian settles for mimicking Morrison while the beefcake guitarists pump their iron strings as if their minds have been disconnected from their fingers.

Even worse, not only do The Damned sound akin to a dodgy compilation album, but their stage gimmick which consists of sticking some female members of the audience into cages - is pathetically tame compared to the crass absurdity of WASP or the amusing spectacle of Iron Maiden.

Is there anything positive to be said about The Damned? Yes, Rat Scables' drumming is urgent and precise. Other than that, the answer is: no.

#### **JACK BARRON** CHEAP **Fulham Greyhound**

AS THE motivating force behind punk rock's late great Adverts, TV Smith was one of the most articulate and ambitious of the new wave lyricists. Nothing has changed.

His deliberately precise and almost upper bracket delivery is framed by a guitarist who sounds like Billy Bragg might have had he been pressed into service on an Ozzy Osbourne World tour, and a lady bassist who looks and plays like Gaye Advert might have had she washed her face, cut her hair and learnt to use more than one string.

Within Cheap's rising, repetitious, loosely metallic post-punk rock sheen, Smith weaves his tales of bitter denunciation and sporadic hope. There should be a law, he argues, against the ever increasing gap between the haves and the have-nots.

Smith's anger and inspiration is not wholly Luddite. He simply cannot understand why, when human technology has advanced to the level where we can take the all but instant transmission of a moving picture from the West Coast of the USA to a bedsit in Brixton for granted, the only pictures we want to see are those of one man beating the crap out of another. He has a point.

down. They're supposed to be dinosaurs, which is another thing I have a great affinity with. I'm heavily into dinosaurs."

NDERGROUND, THE new flesh can hear the tramp of the dinosaurs lumbering above.

It takes a lungful of the stale subterranean air and winces at the sharp pain it delivers. The pain feels somehow good, almost a reward, reminding it of the fact that it's alive...

Alive and kicking.

"I had glandular fever for about a month and I just wanted to die. My body was covered in a really itchy rash, the itch was like scorching my skin. I was just willing myself to die because I felt so bad. I sat at the top of the stairs and felt worse, so I sat in the middle of the stairs, and the closer I got to the ground floor the more pain I was in.

"I ended up on the sidewalk, doubled up, writhing around, hardly able to breathe and people were walking past me going, Disgusting, assuming I was some kind of crazed drug addict.

"I just couldn't breathe because a hole had formed in one of my lungs, the air had escaped and was trapped between my lungs and my stomach lining and I couldn't inflate my lungs. They were going to slit me between the ribs and stick a tube in. I was very squeamish about that and managed to talk them out of doing it eventually.

"After a couple of weeks the oxygen dispersed into my blood stream, it was like a really gross experience, it just knocked me

out... it was terrifying.

"That really makes me squeamish about lungs. Last year I quit smoking after smoking heavily for ten years. It was a really traumatic experience, I was a real smoker, but my paranoia about cancer and the pains in my chest made me decide to say, F\*\*\* this, I can't do this anymore, it's just too scary."

Is your work a way of getting the fear out of yourself?

"Ah yes, I mean it's an attempt to. Fear, greed and jealousy are to me very destructive emotions, ones that I would like to purge from myself. Things that I'm fearful of do crop up in my lyrics but the whole catharsis seems to be a roundabout kind of thing, whereby it starts with an attempt to purge something and then turns into something that plagues me so that, instead of getting rid of it, I end up riddled with it. After I've been so riddled with it I can come to terms with it, I can suppress it and shed it but it's not sort of cut and dried."

Do you secretly enjoy it when things get out of control?

"I welcome that stuff because the majority of my performances are based on backing tapes. You've made so many decisions in the first place and then you're carrying on from there, so a lack of control can happen. I think to see our show at this point is like having a suppository, it's like an enema because it is so pure, so forthright, so violent and demented and great. It just projects rays right through you and I feel that it does do that. It's very strong and it's got a lot to give out, it's a very tangible thing."

Sick, Violent and Macho are words that beg for a reaction of some sort. What about those people who hold their hands up in horror to what Wiseblood are trying to radiate?

"Obviously I'm horrified by their horror. I've been a victim of censorship all along and I think that it's absolutely gross that people should infringe on my right to say whatever I want.

"There was a review of 'Hole' in the New York Times where they edited out the words Scraping Foetus Off The Wheel. It was a glowing review but it didn't say that the record was by Scraping Foetus Off The Wheel. Why did they bother to print it? The only point of it was advertising — what else do I need it for, my ego? They might as well have left off the word 'Hole' as well. I'm not going to change my name for these lily-livered idiots."

Has it ever been your intention for your work to corrupt?

"To me it's the least corrupt...
it's never corrupt, it's the purest
stuff and that's the whole intention.

"Corruption doesn't come into it, it's totally pure, honest and good. I think it's morally excellent. I don't see any need to defend it because it is a pure statement from myself."

HE NEW flesh peels open a fresh white eye which watches and waits. Given time it will have all the followers it wants, supporting and adding to its strength, fuelling the power. One day everybody will be screaming, 'LONG LIVE THE NEW FLESH!' But, by the time that day comes, it will have changed into something completely different.

early Dave Howard performance was noting how many ran out of the hall when he *really* got going.

These days, there's less contrast in their shows, but the explosions get louder, lewder and less controlled. People still leave in their droves, but at different points to previous. The Dave Howard show is an unnerving, hilariously excessive affair.

"Something my brother said..."
Dave muses, "when he saw the movie Bonnie And Clyde. The thing he was really impressed with was the way they'd have this hilarious scene, the funniest thing you'd ever seen in your life. Then, two seconds later, they'd run over a man and there'd be blood everywhere. It's like a cold slap in the face, and I love using that.

"I don't think we try to antagonise

but there's a certain amount of intimidation going on. There's a great power in causing a defeat without expending a lot of energy. Antagonism is like striking blindly, but intimidation is more premeditated, striking slowly, a cloud as opposed to a bullet. The shows are saying, Let me laugh with you, let me make you depressed, let me get angry with you, let me rub the small of your back and stick my tongue in your ear.

"It's just pummelling people with different emotions and different options, sometimes different personalities. Everyone's got more than one personality or maybe different points of view of that same personality. So you expose that and, like fishing, you lure someone in with it, to be a part of it with you. You pick them up, throw them down, dust them off, punch them

out, kiss them, thump them again. It's positive intimidation."

While 'Rock On' emerges as the most funny ha-ha of the DHS singles so far, as well as their best piece of ruffian unrest, it might not get the A&R men jostling for position in the queue, or even send their public support soaring. None of these concerns troubles Dave, mind, he just grins and shrugs along.

"I've got tired of thinking that, because you know the rules of the game, you have to abide by them. It's not even as though I've made a conscious effort to break the rules or break anything down at all, that doesn't interest us. It's not as though I'm avoiding the issue of commercially viable songs, either, because I like some of that stuff and I write some of that stuff. The softer side of my set just started to look alien in the midst of the more

'manic' material, so that side was diminished.

"I never think consciously about changing anything, of course, it never happens that way. For me, being onstage is just a sum total of all the other things I do during the day . . . staring out people on the Underground, looking suspicious in the Post Office queue, just walking down the road shouting out a new line I might have made up, that kind of thing."

Are you dangerous, Dave, about to boil over, to whip out the cutlass and slice my ears off?

"There's just me and my electric organ, my boy, that's all there is."

Dave Howard never sleeps before a show.

"I just lie there thinking, God, I hope that the monitors don't work tomorrow, cos then we'll really be on the spot."

# THE BIBLE: A TRUE STORY

PHIL McNEILL in praise of a remarkable new lesson from THE BIBLE!

of 1986 is currently languishing at about number 47 on the indies chart.

You don't get much more low key than that, but then The Bible! are a pretty low key group.

Based in Thriplow,
Cambridgeshire – the sort of village
that even people in the next village
haven't heard of – they're in no
hurry to become a cog in the
industry of human happiness. But
they will, because they're very good
indeed. Their album has Collector's
Item written all over it.

'Walking The Ghost Back Home'
is a collection of intriguing songs
that offer a unique blend of English
music and American imagery. Not
the dense Hollywood dreams of
Tom Waits or Stan Ridgway, but
shimmering mirages of the
promised land as seen by an English
kid with stars and stripes in his eyes.
American icons such as Elvis
Presley, Jackie Kennedy and
Mahalia Jackson become landmarks
on singer Boo Hewerdine's personal
quest.

Take The Bible's! first single, 'Graceland', a song about wanting to visit Presley's Memphis megamansion. But it's also about love and money and desire . . . casually intertwined in a throwaway three-minute pop song.

"It's really very simple," says
Hewerdine. "It's about wanting
someone or something very, very
badly without actually knowing
why. The idea of going to see
Graceland is that, until you get
there, you don't know what to
expect. It's just about that funny,
infatuated feeling for someone."

didn't buy a record until I was 16 or 17.

At 18 I was still wearing spots and large voluminous trousers and saying all the wrong things.

"It wasn't until I met David (Larcombe, The Bible!'s drummer) and got into a group with him that I started turning into a human being."

So at 18 Hewerdine ran off back to London where he was "appallingly miserable". He returned as soon as he could to Cambridge and eventually became a singer with a funk four-piece called The Great Divide.

"I spent three years in a loud yellow suit, shouting a lot."

It wasn't him.

"The day after The Great Divide split up," Hewerdine mutters quietly, "I decided what I wanted my new group to be like. The groups that I ran at school all sounded remarkably like The Bible! It's what I've always wanted."

HE BIBLE! started out as two people: Boo Hewerdine and Tony Shepherd. Hewerdine sings, plays guitar and writes the words and much of the music. His co-writer Shepherd is an accomplished drummer who's played jazz, salsa and Texas swing as well as pop, but in The Bible! his main instrument is keyboards. Both he and Boo favour a jazz-inflected acoustic style that never strays into cabaret clichés, retaining a cutting pop edge.

The two have now added three musicians who helped out on the LP: drummer Dave Larcombe and bass player Neil MacColl (Kirsty's brother), who were both in the hyped-to-oblivion Roaring Boys, plus saxophonist Kevin Flanagan.

The Bible!'s wonderful album was recorded for next to nothing at the start of the year and released on the Norwich independent label Backs Records.

"I funded it completely by myself," says Hewerdine. "We did it in about four days – a real budget job. At the time it sounded really inadequate, but I think it's OK now."

The acclaim it has received may have

And about being too poor to give them what you want to?

"That's true actually. It's a personal one . . . "

OO HEWERDINE is an extremely tall, unkempt man with spectacles and a stupid name.

"I've always been called Boo. Stupid name. My real name's Marcus."

Marcus Hewerdine was born in Hammersmith on Valentine's Day 1961, lived in Edgware till he was ten, moved to Cambridge with his family. He was a swot.

"I got eleven O-levels then went berserk and ran away – a bit late, as I was 18. I was the sort of teenager that you see walking down the road and you cross over. I was a late developer: I something to do with that . . .

The LP quickly brought them a contract with Chrysalis, who've released the 'Graceland' single, which "got to a gut-wrenching 87". Now The Bible! are working on a new LP for Chrysalis.

Meanwhile, there's a new Bible! single on Backs. It's a new version of one of the LP's outstanding tracks, 'Mahalia'.

"It's a sort of tribute to Mahalia Jackson, the legendary gospel singer," says Hewerdine. "I find her incredibly moving, a wonderful singer. But the song's not really about her. It's about good and bad, and how gospel, blues and all that sort of split up and divided."

The Bible! are touring Britain throughout November and December. It's their first time on the road.

On record they've already arrived.

As the BIG AUDIO DYNAMITE show cranks up, churns out an LP and gets back on the road, we send MR SPENCER to Belfast for a shootout with Mick Jones. Find out how Mick's Grandma remembers zeppelins! Hear about his last visit to a dentist — 15 years ago! PETER ANDERSON takes a bite

T'S A cold and drizzly day in Belfast.

A bus is driving Big Audio
Dynamite to the Ulster Hall where
they'll later be performing to a sellout audience. Mick Jones sits by the
window, taking in the scenery, lost in
thought.

Parking close to the venue we jump out and make for the backstage entrance, at which point Mick and Don Letts are surrounded by bug-eyed well-wishers. The rest of us negotiate various routes through and around the throng and make good our escape.

Upon reaching the dressing room I consider how skilfully Jones and Letts deal with being the centre of attention, always appearing neither overtly chuffed (could seem big headed), or completely unmoved (equals reluctance).

It's like all these people are old chums they've not seen for a couple of years...

"Alright Mick? How's it goin' then, Don?"

"Oh, y'know, not so bad, thanks

Clearly the influence of punk has been such that not even the harmless art of autograph hunting has escaped its remorseless glare.

It certainly makes you think.

Take Big Audio Dynamite, for instance, with their shattering rhythm cascades and teasing gusts of movie dialogue; at least they're trying, taking plenty of chances and refusing to stand still.

Their actual tunes might largely be lacking in that final clout – the conclusive wallop that's needed to propel the songs up and away to where they want to go – but you can't ignore the spirit of exploration that shines through in nearly everything they do.

Quite simply, they're not the types to rest on their laurels, not while there's still searching to be done.

So Mick Jones, with only a leather jacket to keep him warm on this chilly afternoon, ambles backstage, pre-soundcheck, beaming all over his face after having signed several dozen Clash and Big Audio Dynamite LPs.

I sit next to him and Don and observe the whirlpool of roadies, support acts and various hangers on. Something is troubling me. Without doubt there are three further BADsters somewhere in this room, and the question is: who the bloody hell are they?

ODAY IS the first date of Big Audio
Dynamite's UK tour. It ties in with the
release of a single, 'C'mon Every
Beatbox', and an album, 'No 10, Upping St',
both of which are fair-to-good-to-middling.

The only truly extraordinary thing about this gush of fresh material is a track on the LP called 'Sightsee MC!', which hammers you into the floor with all the grace of a sledgehammer pummelling a sugar cube.

'No 10, Upping St' continues where 'This Is Big Audio Dynamite' left off, with BAD taking us on a guided tour through crumbling inner city streets, across rundown South London housing estates and past luridly coloured wall murals, where jolly groups of hip hop kids laze around listening to their ghetto blasters, cheering us along as we boogie on past.

All this, plus: hired assassins, life on the dole and plenty more – a tremulous myriad

of pulsating images.

Experiencing Big Audio Dynamite's record is rather like watching a good spy movie; The Man From UNCLE but with a social conscience, perhaps. And that's not meant as an insult.

Mick, this word 'adventure' keeps on popping into my head – is the same thing happening to you?

"Sure," the guitarist smiles, "that's a key word for us. It's like this tour is a great adventure; even making a record now is a great adventure."

Is it a matter of creating your own thrills 'n' spills against all adversity?

"Yeah. You see, I enjoy travelling to all these places, I like it here, even, and this is the exciting thing, going to new towns and checking them out, meeting the locals..."

This whole Big Audio Dynamite concept, it's very much a product of the '80s.

"It reflects our environment, which I think is something all music should do." Don't you fear that by its very nature

BAD will be redundant by 1990?

"Well, I don't know and I don't really care," Mick answers, having heard this argument before.

"I've got an urgency about doing it now, and I know that at the moment there's a real excitement both in and around the band, which is a rare thing. I've experienced it once before, but now I know what it's

worth and I'll make the best of it I can."

Do you see glamour in urban decay?

"No, I don't. I see shitholes and Nissen huts, I find nothing at all glamorous about it," he snaps, slightly narked. "I've had first hand experience of squalor, and I can tell you there's no appeal whatsoever in not talking to a neighbour you've lived alongside for eight years, not even knowing who lives there."

But this is what you're singing about.

"In a way I am, but then again it's so hard living in this modern world. You've got the Bomb, you've got Thatcher, you've got Chernobyl and AIDS — it's like a bloody checklist! It feels like all the plagues and malaises of the 20th century are going by on a conveyor belt like in The Generation Game, and at the end of it I've got four out of five. Didn't I do well, y'know?"

Mick Jones is feeling the cold, getting defensive, assuming I'm on the attack when, to be honest, I'm only teasing.

He vanishes for a moment and somehow I get lumbered with an undercover fan, who to my astonishment demands that I sign not only his own ticket but also those of his mates.

Even after this rascal's squeezed a

Christian name from me he fails to realise
the mistake he's made.

"Well they all look the same den't the

"Well, they all look the same, don't they?" he actually says in a real life quote.

Of course, if I knew who the three mystery BAD guys were I'd point him in the appropriate direction myself, but as things stand I haven't got a clue.

"I admit the way we do things is a bit reckless," Mick confesses upon his return, "and in a way I guess we will get caught out eventually, but I'd like to stay like this for as long as possible, instead of reaching a point where we're massively successful and developing a formula and then sticking to it."

That's how groups get messed up.
"Right. They don't change, and it's
supposed to be all about change. I mean,
perhaps we do f\*\*\* up, maybe sometimes
we succeed and other times not, but in the
end we know what we're doing is right."

OES MICK regard the past by and large as redundant?
"In a way I do," he admits, "but

you see I do love listening to old records, y'know? My own past might be redundant at this present stage in history, but the past before me, when I was just a glimmer in my Daddy's eye, to me is simply fascinating."

Do you enjoy hearing stories about your old family, way back when?

"Yeah, like my Grandmother for instance, she's still alive, God bless her. Now she was born in 1899 and remembers the zeppelins coming over in the First World War, and that is fantastic; to talk to old people about that sort of thing and get their first-hand information is so exciting."

Do you appreciate their wisdom?
"Yes, I do. I'm very respectful of my
elders, I care about them very much."

And these elders, do they return this affection by showing concern for your health?

"Um, I'm not that unhealthy; in fact, there isn't any particular healthy aspect concerning my family about me at the moment, except that I do need to go to the dentist."

I see. So when did you last pay the surgery a visit?

"I guess around 15 years ago."

Good heavens, it's supposed to be every six months!

"I know, but I've got a dental phobia. I fell into an orange crate when I was very young and mashed up all my first teeth. The doctors gave me all this gas, and they took all my teeth out. I woke up and they said, Here's a scooter. But it was one of those contraptions where you had one foot on and the other foot off, and I said, I don't want a scooter, I want my teef. But they were gone, that was it."

No more choppers.

"Yeah, it was no big deal but I was a kid, it was important. Thing was, the front two adult teeth grew out first, so I looked like Bugs Bunny for a while. At school they used to call me Goofy. In the end they all evened up, but it's left me with a mental scar."

Perhaps if you were to confront this fear of yours. . .

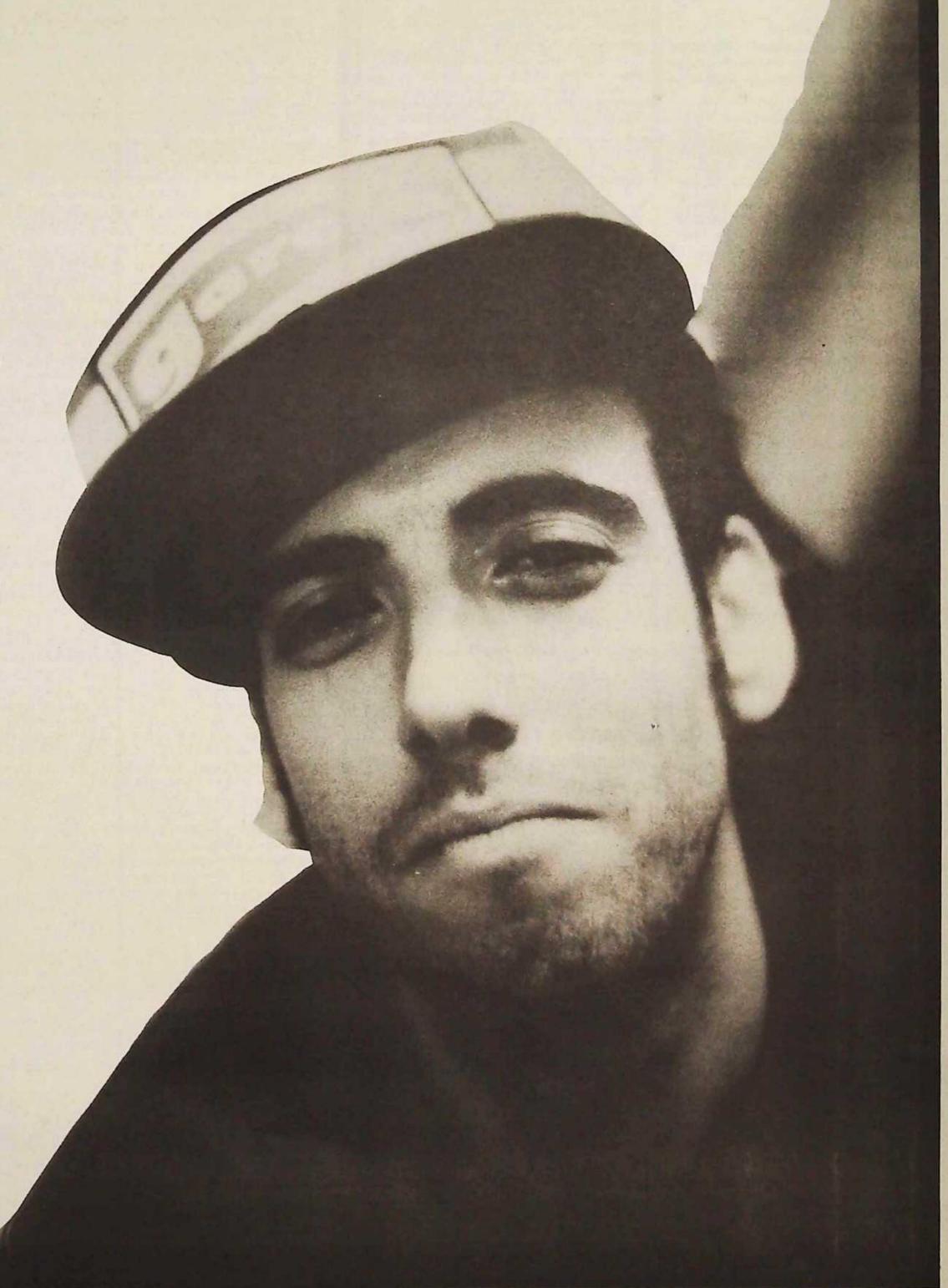
"Maybe I should. I hear that dentists are much better these days, they're not such butchers, you don't hear so many horror stories... I wish I'd brought my overcoat."

# SYNTHAXE: A VIRGIN BIRTH

FEW INSTRUMENTS could better the amount of national press coverage received by British company Synthaxe, makers of a revolutionary guitar-type synthesiser controller, a year or so

And then? Nothing. It simply never appeared outside trade show prototype form.

But now, coincidentally or not, just as the Stepp DG1 (another instrument aimed to propel the unsuspecting guitarist into the '80s and beyond) looms large on the horizon, the Synthaxe is making a comeback under the watchful eye of Richard Branson, whose newly-formed private company Voyager has funded this latest revival.

Life may be difficult for the Synthaxe in 1986. Not only has it got to contend with another (although inherently different) British designed guitar-orientated piece of technological wizardry but, seeing as the project began in 1978 and has been openly

talked about for the past two years, there is a limit to how much talk, with no product, people can remain interested in.

But product we are promised. Later this month, Steve Levine will be conducting a series of 'Synthaxe meets Fairlight' demonstrations in London, and already Voyager announce that the unlikely duo of Christopher Cross and Marty Wilde have 'snapped up this incredible instrument'.

With a price tag of £5,995 plus VAT, the Synthaxe is hardly destined to become an everyday item, and will surely face stiff competition from a number of MIDI guitar systems now on the market (Roland, of course, Shadow, IVL and so on). But so much work has obviously gone into the design, birth, and now re-birth of the instrument that it must be given the benefit of the doubt. Watch this space for further details.

THE LONDON Rock Shop, the famed Camden music store which went out of business in July, reopens this Saturday under new ownership.

The Rock Shop has been taken over by Glen Fisher and lan Harrison, who run Bootleg Music in Epsom. Under their control, it will lose some of its hi-tech emphasis in preference for a more general rock 'n' roll approach similar to Bootleg itself.

The store maintained a high profile throughout the first half of the '80s under the flamboyant direction of Ed Jones, who pioneered Sunday opening and never missed an opportunity to indulge in the kind of imagebuilding usually associated with the more glamorous end of the music business.

According to the trade magazine Music Business, however, Bootleg had been in negotiation with Jones for some time before the actual collapse of the business, but had been unable to agree

The Complete DX7 begins with a brief run through basic audio theory. This section is to the point, readable, and helpful, comprising short paragraphs headed Amplitude, Frequency, Jargon, What Is Analog, What

After a guided tour of the instrument whose basic voice structures must be

understood even if ultimately you are only interested in editing as opposed to creating sounds.

I have read countless exposés of FM synthesis (on which the DX7 is based); most remain understandable for a paragraph or two and then you're lost. But Massey, obviously aware of the dangers, keeps pace with the readers and, above all, keeps the reader interested. Key points are printed in large capital letters - ie "THERE IS NO DIFFERENCE WHATSOEVER BETWEEN A CARRIER AND A MODULATOR APART FROM WHERE THE OUTPUT IS SENT".

This is a superbidea as it's often impossible to sort out

the vital piece of information. Above all, the book is

practical. For a start, it is bound in a ring file so pages can easily remain open when you're reading it and playing your instrument; then there is the selection of audio cues on floppy disks (the analog type!) which aid and abet the text throughout. Essentially, though, it is the writing which makes this such an irresistible proposition.

Whatever your standpointbeginner, slightly confused at times, or seasoned pro-you'll find this book an object lesson in technical writing. At last someone has tackled the problem of explaining to ordinary people how a DX7 works - and they've won.

HOHNER HAS announced two additions to its range of professional amplification. The PB 250 bass amp and matching PBB 250 cabinet are designed as a package to provide the bassist with high-fidelity sound at high volume levels, and to complement the Hohner Professional range of bass guitars.

The PB 250 has a power rating of 250 watts rms, but peaks at 340 watts into 4 ohms. It comes in an integral carpet-covered flight case, although the amplifier's two component parts may be mounted in a standard 19in rack if required. Its equalisation section includes master bass, middle and treble controls, operating in conjunction with a five-band graphic EQ: this offers cut and boost of up to 12 dB at centre frequencies of 70Hz, 210Hz, 630Hz, 2kHz and 6kHz. A variable compressor and chorus are included, for a wide range of contemporary sounds without the need for outboard effects. The second of these is footswitchable and has an LED status indicator mounted on the

The PBB 250 has a similarly robust construction with corner protectors, stout handles and a grey carpet finish. The enclosure has two circular ports and four high-quality front loaded 10in speakers, easily capable of handling the full output of the amplifier, and fitted with kick-proof protective grilles. The design is claimed to provide the punch and clarity demanded by contemporary playing styles, with a tight but full bass response.

Hohner have also introduced the Blues Blaster 1490 microphone for serious blues harp players. This Jubilee Edition mic, specifically designed for use with the harmonica, features the traditional bullet shape housing which has been popular

with harp players for many years.

Secret of the Blues Blaster's sound is a high output crystal element with a frequency response of 30Hz - 10kHz. The high impedance, omni-directional design incorporates a volume control, an invaluable feature for live performance. A chrome plated grill and deep metallic blue paint finish ensure that the Blues Blaster looks distinctive. Suggested retail price is £85

## THE COMPLETE DX7 **Howard Massey** (AMSCO Publications) QQQ VVV

THE FIRST temptation here is to be bored at the prospect of yet another 'DX' book. The second is total horror at the tome's asking price of £16.95.

But cast aside any such thoughts. If you are one of the 160,000 people who have made the Yamaha DX7 the world's best selling synthesiser (ever), or one of the countless number who

have bought DX9s, DX21s, DX100s etc, then The Complete DX7 is simply essential reading.

The problem with so many technical books (and almost everyone is bursting into print these days) is that the average techno-buff who gets wheeled in to dash off a treatise on synthesis is generally illiterate. How refreshing then to discover Howard Massey: a man who not only knows his subject intimately but a man who can write - clearly, succinctly and amusingly.

Howard Massey is currently Project Director of the Public Access Synthesizer Studio in New York (an institution that I must confess ignorance of) where, basically, the contents of this book was delivered as an 18-hour series of lectures. I'd imagine students paid considerably more than this book's asking price for the privilege (and you'd certainly pay more for a DX ROM - that classic refuge for the DXconfused). So you're getting Howard Massey cheap.
