Trade Mews

ANOTHER P.A. NOVELTY. An Interesting "Star" Development.

FAMILIAR sight at many of the big events of national interest, such as the Cup Final, the Derby, and similar functions, is the "Stop Press" motor van operated by the Star, the London evening newspaper. Not only does this van serve a useful purpose for rushing through red-hot news, but it also constitutes an excellent advertising medium for the newspaper itself.

Naturally, the vehicle would only be seen by those in its immediate vicinity unless some nethod of drawing attention to its presence were adopted. Once again the ubiquitous public address system proves its usefulness, for mounted on the top of the Star van are two Marconiphone P.A. speakers. Inside is a special amplifier of the same make. Gramophone music and microphone announcements are broadcast as desired, at the various events at which the van is present.

The amplifier, of a new type, utilises one of the big DA60 output valves in the last stage. Power is supplied through a rotary transformer running off 12 V accumulators specially built into the van

for the purpose.

Under such conditions that obtain in the van when the "crew" are dealing with the latest news, it is essential that he who undertakes the announcing should be permitted considerable freedom of movement, for he may be carrying out several jobs at once! Therefore one of the new breast type microphones, beloved of parachutist broadcasters, is called into service. It is suspended round the announcer's neck, and rests on his chest against a pad of sponge rubber.

Thus are the public regaled with music while awaiting the delivery of newspapers, literally "hot off the press," for the little printing machine in the automobile can work at a high rate of speed. It prints in the stop press column the latest news, received either by phone from the office, or actually "on the spot," and is driven by a Petter 2-stroke engine.

HOW THEY KEEP SMILING. Seeing the Funny Side of Things—Even a Burglary.

HAT unfailing humorist of the radio industry, Mr. R. M. Ellis, jointmanaging director of Pye Radio, has once again come forward at the appropriate moment and shown that his ready wit is equal to all demands made upon it. His latest remarks are in connection with our "Personalia" note last week in which it was mentioned that Mr. E. U. Redway, managing director of Southern Factors, Ltd., had been suffering from the attention of Bill Sykes to the extent of having lost jewellery and a sum of money—although a McMichael set was left untouched.

The cream of the joke, however, is that we remarked on the coincidence that Mr. Ellis himself had recently suffered similar depredations and lost a suitcase full of clothes and two Pye portables, and furthermore, that Mr. Ellis recently spent a week-end with Mr. Redway, since they are personal friends.



Lead Poisoning in Accumulator Works. Accident Prevention in the Wireless Industry.

THE danger of lead poisoning among employees in electric accumulator works again receives prominence in the annual report of the Chief Inspector of Factories and Workshops, just published for the year 1929. Although the number of reported cases shows the substantial decrease from 58 in 1927 to 23 in 1929, accumulator manufacturing continues to provide more instances of lead poisoning than any other industry, excluding cases occurring among painters of buildings.

Of the cases reported during 1929, two had fatal results, the men concerned being

aged 64 and 59 respectively.

Dealing with the methods by which the incidence of lead poisoning can be reduced, the senior medical inspector says that strict regulations are of little avail unless there is close supervision in the works to see that they are properly observed

This, it is added, is often neglected in the smaller works, which are especially affected by seasonal fluctuations, and one works was found to be contravening almost every regulation, although one of their workers was at the time in hospital

with lead poisoning.

Conditions in the larger factories are stated to be generally satisfactory. The periodical transference of workers to non-lead operations, and the adoption of weekly medical inspections, have given good results. One of the largest accumulator works in this country appointed a whole-time Medical Officer two years ago, and the success of this step can be gauged from the fact that no case of lead poisoning has since been notified.

With regard to the wireless industry itself, it is unfortunate that the report does not contain any readily-available

statistics.

The relevant figures are included under such headings as "Scientific Instru-ments," "Musical Instruments," and "Cabinet-making." In view of the size of the industry, and the value of the figures collected by the Factory Department, this omission should be possible of remedy in future years. There is no doubt that if the figures were given separately they would be of considerable interest and practical assistance.

An interesting section is devoted to the Home Office Industrial Museum. The museum, which is essentially practical in its suggestions for aiding efficiency in every branch of industry, is too little known to the average manufacturer. The following extract from the report

gives an idea of its scope:

" A manager from a wireless instrument firm came to see power press guards. He said he would like his foreman to see them, and on the following Saturday afternoon the young man arrived with his wife. After seeing the guards they staved all the afternoon seeing all the exhibits and discussing various safety and welfare matters. The following week the manager returned and brought with him a maker of power press guards, and during the visit gave him instructions to fit Udal guards on to most of his presses, and automatic feeds on to others. He said, with some amusement, that his foreman had given him a long lecture on safety and welfare measures after his visit to the museum. He also asked to see a particular type of seat mentioned by the foreman as being suitable for their women workers.

Crossing the Line with a "Portadyne!" A letter recently received by Whittingham, Smith & Co., manufacturers of the well-known "Portadyne" receivers, from Lt.-Comdr. D. Edwards, R.N.R., of the S.S. "Moldavia," is rather interesting.

While voyaging from Australia, Lt.-Cmdr. Edwards received several Australian broadcasting stations on a "Portadyne" S.G.4 portable at full loud-speaker strength up to a distance of nearly 1,000 miles. Sydney, in fact, was received when the ship was 1,440 miles away. Several Australian people, the letter states, were very favourably impressed with the performance of the set. At Marseilles the Daventry long wave station was heard at excellent strength, as were the Brookman's Park stations when the ship was in the Bay of Biscay.

Owing to the screening of the steel cabin an outside aerial of Electron wire, 16 feet long, was erected. The Hellesen battery stood up well to the tropical heat, when the ship was crossing the Line, and lost but 8 V in two months.

Dealer's P.A. Apparatus.

A large area in the North-East of England is covered by the P.A. activities of E. & H. Glover, the Darlington radio retailers, who run an extensive public address department in connection with their business.

The actual amplifiers used were constructed by the firm, while a Western Electric microphone is employed. Thus Messrs. Glover have the satisfaction of knowing that their success is entirely due to the efficient design of their own amplifiers. In addition to installing P.A. apparatus at numerous galas in the surrounding district, they number among their clients Imperial Chemical Industries, I.td., and the Welfare Department of the Ministry of Mines—to name but two distinguished "customers" of the firm. U.S. Magnates Visit Insulator Factory.

The American President and Vice-President of the Ohio Brass Co., when visiting the works of Taylor, Tunnicliff & Co, manufacturers of electrical porcelain, recently were interested in seeing the workshop at Hanley, where some of the first high tension insulators to be made in England were thrown. Mr. C. K. King (President), chatted with workpeople who were descendants of the original throwers.

Taylor, Tunnicliff & Co., in planning their new factory at Stone, have made full use of their association with the Ohio Brass Co., by a candid reciprocal exchange of ideas, which has been of the utmost value to both.

Flash!

Very seldom does it happen that a radio aerial is actually struck by lightning, and therefore the experience of Mr. P. K. Hoyle, Slaithwaite, Yorks., a dealer, is somewhat unusual.

During a recent thunderstorm the wire halyard between the top of the aerial pole in Mr. Hoyle's back garden and the aerial insulators was severed, two insulators were badly cracked, and a third disappeared entirely! The earthing switch was welded into a mass of metal, and the choke output loud-speaker extension wire running from the set near the switch was broken. The receiver itself functioned perfectly afterwards, however.

Mr. Hoyle was, without doubt, fortunate in sustaining such slight loss, but his escape is probably due to the possession of a good earth connection.

A New Aircraft Set.

Increasing use is being made nowadays of radio equipment in civil aircraft, and one of the latest aeroplane sets to be approved by the Air Ministry is the Marconi type AD6M, the latest addition to the AD6 series of aircraft sets used in many parts of the world.

The ADoM, for C.W. or telephony, utilises a 150 W transmitter, and a 3valve S.G. receiver. Working on the usual aircraft wavelengths, it can be remotely controlled by the pilot when

a wireless operator is not carried.

No "Noise" for Chatham.

Chatham Town Council, we learn, has instructed the Town Clerk to take all preliminary steps for the passing of a by-law to deal with the "nuisance" of loud-speakers and gramophones.

BELFAST TO REPLACE D.C. MAINS UNITS.

Commissioners' Concessions.

The recent discussion between the Electricity Supply Department of the Belfast Corporation, and consumers who were using D.C. mains units for wireless Sets, has had a satisfactory outcome. The following communication was recently received from Mr. Frank H. Whysall, M.I.E.E., by a listener using a D.C. H.T. unit, and who was affected by the change over to A.C. supply in Belfast.

Relative to your application concerning wireless apparatus, I have now made arrangements with the Electricity Commissioners that we can now legally make provision to alter or provide equipment for alternating current. . .

The use of a rectifier passing 30 mA was suggested, but on the consumer's replying that he preferred an "Ekco" H.T. unit without valves, this request was agreed to, on condition that the D.C. unit was given up in exchange.

Thus ends a controversy that was debated in several newspapers. Ultimately a request was made by consumers for arbitration to the Ministry of Commerce. The Electricity Department of the Belfast Corporation has generously obviated

RECENTLY spent an interesting afternoon at Kingston-on-Thames, a truly celestion urb. Mr. E. J. Marriott, the well-known Sales Director of Celestion, Ltd., was good enough to drive me down to the works and back, and though he enquired politely about the condition of my insurance policy, there was fortunately no need to make a claim.

Arriving at the offices and works, we proceeded to a nearby restaurant for lunch. Here I found what I took to be a nice little orchestra attempting to drown the miscellaneous lunch time "music" provided by the patrons. Of course, as I might have guessed, there was no orchestra at all. In its place there was a Celestion radiogramophone, reproducing the lunch-time music from Brookman's Park. Frankly, unless one is quite close to the machine, it is hardly possible to say definitely whether the orchestra or the radio-gramophone is providing the Those who doubt this should visit the Zeeta restaurant when they are next in Kingston, and hear for themselves. Only don't be too cocksure about the source of the music if you go with friends, because the real orchestra does play sometimes. It would be rather unfortunate if you were to say, on approaching the restaurant, that you could tell that it was a radio-gramophone, and then find that it was actually the orchestra!

Incidentally, the latest Celestion radio-gramophone is known as the Kingston, and I hear that it has a very

interesting circuit.

The latest Celestion products, which I saw and heard, are dealt with elsewhere in this issue, and I shall not mention them here in any detail, beyond saying that the new D.10 model, retailing at three pounds, brings a Celestion speaker within the reach of all. It is safe to

prophesy a good sale for this model.

There are, as far as I can make out, two holies of holy (if this is possible) in the Celestion works. One is the department in which the well-known reinforced diaphragms are made, and the other is the research laboratory. I managed to penetrate the latter, where two interesting new products are being designed. One is a pick-up, with several novel features, and the other is an M.C. speaker. Celestion are not quite ready yet to talk about these, but from what I have heard they are good.

A visit to the radio-gramophone assembly department revealed some excellent examples of cabinet work. Also, Celestion specialise in hotel and ship equipment, a very fine example of the former being seen. This was fitted in a special leather-covered container, making it easily transportable. The whole power was obtained from a 12 volt accumulator, the H.T. supply being from a rotary converter.

The music for testing purposes is supplied from a central twin-turntable electric gramophone, which runs all day. It is apparently the duty of a girl to operate this and change the records, and I cannot conceive a more boring task than hers!

I came away convinced that Celestion, Ltd., had some good lines in the stocks, which will be seen at the Show.

T the Coliseum, on the last day of the fortnight of Television, everything went much more smoothly than on the first day. The sound reproduction, too,

was greatly improved. Amongst other things, they put over the first "tele-talkie" ever shown to the public in any country. A "tele-talkie" (we must define some of these new terms) is a talking film reproduced at a distance by television. The film was run through at the Baird studios in Long Acre, speech and vision being transmitted and reproduced on the Television screen and loud-speaker at the Coliseum. The actual film shown was a relatively simple one of Mr. Sydney A. Moseley making a speech, but given better definition and a "screen" larger than the present one of 5 ft. by 2 ft., there is no technical reason why any "talkie" should not thus be broadcast. While the film was running Mr. Moseley appeared on the stage to show that he was not in the Baird studios. Mr. Baird was present in the Coliseum, but did not manifest himself to the public gaze. W. E. M.

PROMINENT City magnate recently described himself as a modern "Mark Tapley"—that Dickens' character who has been accepted as the prototype of those happy individuals who are never downhearted. Fortunately we have our Mark Tapleys in the radio industry—one of them being, beyond a doubt, Mr. Guy R. Fountain, managing director of the Tulsemere Manufacturing Co. When Mr. Fountain isn't cheerfully announcing a birth of a new son to the "Tannoy" family, or talking about a successful holiday on the Broads, he is even optimistic about trade.

A week or so ago—in late July, mark you!—he told me that radio-gramophones were selling well, which, according to the trade Jeremiahs, is wrong, if not actually immoral,

at this time of the year.

As a matter of fact, I have a strong idea that success in this direction is not entirely divorced from the fact that Mr. Fountain has been known to demonstrate his instrument with a rather "so-so" gramophone record which was alleged to have been withdrawn from circulation.

But I fancy the disc is worn out now.

And now a little spot of rumour—in advance of the full story which will be revealed in this paper next week—about the secret behind the "Red Star"

mystery.

"Red Star" is a new conception—in this country at any rate—of radio for the masses. It is coming from the Midlands—from an industrial centre where the artisan class require their radio entertainment as much as any others in the community, but require it at the lowest possible cost consistent with efficiency.

The "Red Star" organisation has set itself out to meet that demand—not only locally, but on a nation-wide basis, and in quantities not hitherto undertaken in the production

of complete receivers in this country.

The trade is undoubtedly intrigued by cryptic references to such items as "variable screening" and "dual detection." These are practical enough, but it is still more of interest to the retailer that "Red Star" means a low-priced, quick-selling line in complete sets, with a number of attractive points to commend them to his attention and that of his public.

What the Trade Thinks about the VALVE PRICE REDUCTIONS

ENLIGHTENING EXTRACTS FROM A REPRESENTATIVE POST-BAG.

UR post-bag has been unduly heavy during the past week. Already very many traders have sent us details of their valve stocks on July 18th, coupled with a note of the number of valves on which they can claim an allowance and the approximate loss in which the new B.V.A. rebate system has involved them. Even at the present time letters and postcards are still reaching us by every post, and at the end of the next few days we shall have accumulated a really representative collection of

It will be recalled that we asked last week for the three vital figures involved, suggesting that a postcard employing something on the lines of the following wording would be quite satisfactory:

VALVE REBATE. No. of valves, affected by the reduction, in stock on July 18th..... No. of valves on which rebate can be claimed...... Approximate loss involved Signed..... Address....

Even so, there are among the replies upwards of fifty letters which, in addition to giving the figures required, add some comments or suggestions that are eminently worthy of publication by virtue of their interest for the general body of our readers.

Unfortunately, we have not in this issue, of all weeks in the year, the space in which to print all our correspondents' views; but we give here extracts from a selection of the letters, which serve to show, more clearly than could a descriptive narrative, the circumstances in which some traders find themselves and the variety of the suggestions which have been put forward for improving the situation.

Big Retail Stocks.

Firstly, our correspondence shows beyond a doubt that there are many dealers whose stocks run into hundreds of valves. We print parts of five letters from the very much larger number of traders in this position who have written to us. To the Editor.

SIR,-Since opening our premises a year ago we have stocked nothing but B.V.A. valves, but we are wondering if we should not have been better off had we put ourselves in the position to supply all the requirements of our public, and at the same time to avoid running the risk of the tremendous loss which we are

likely to sustain every time there is a reduction in price.

Our stocks of valves which have been reduced amount to 214 (actually in cartons), and as we are only entitled to a rebate on 14 of them, our loss amounts to £15 16s. 11d. We are not at the moment considering whether we should stock other makes of valves, but if the B.V.A. cannot look after us better than to cause such heavy losses, we shall certainly have to reconsider that policy.

C. Magrill (Magrills, Glasgow).

SIR,—We find we have 207 valves affected by the reduction, and our nett loss is £14 5s., since the total number of valves purchased during the two months of the rebate period was 15.

This, of course, does not mean that we sold only 15 valves in the two months. As you will see from our analysis, we always maintain a good stock upon which to draw and we have not troubled to replace valves at this time of the year as regularly as we should have done during the winter.

R. J. Griffin (Griffin Bros., Leighton Buzzard).

SIR,-We quote from our day-to-day stock sheets which show 366 valves in stock on July 18th, against which we are to be allowed credit on 79, so we are badly let down. The fairest method would undoubtedly be to make reductions on January 1st, which would mean a bigger credit and one more likely to cover stocks.

While on the subject, we wish to voice a protest against the meagre discount. Goods as fragile as valves should bear a margin of at least 33\frac{1}{2} per cent., to help cover losses by filament breakage in stock and the heavy cost of packing and postage on returning "duds."

H. Hale (Hale Ltd., Farnham).

SIR,—Out of a total stock of 381 valves we had 292 affected by the reduction, of which only 31 were bought during the preceding two months, thus involving us in an approximate cash loss at purchase prices of £19 11s.

Our two months' purchases may seem very small compared with our stocks, but it must be remembered that at this time of the year we try to get stocks down to a minimum, and also that we are now buying an increasing number and proportion of mains and other types of valves not affected by the reduction. Our winter stocks are approximately 50 per cent. above the figures quoted. C. Stephenson (Radio Equipment Co., Huddersfield).

Sir,—We endorse all our fellow traders have said in your columns with regard to the valve price reduction. Our stock on July 18th was approximately 220 and the number on which we can claim rebate is less than 25, so the approximate loss to us is about £20. C. H. Dawson (Dawson & Steer, E. Grinstead).

On very different lines, but with an equal degree of interest, is the following statement, which may, perhaps, suggest a state of affairs likely to be encountered by the B.V.A. in the future. The letter is entirely bona fide, but, in view of its rather unusual nature, we have consented not to publish the name and address of the trader concerned. We merely quote the essential We merely quote the essential

paragraph:
"In the year of the big drop in price we had a stock of about
1,000 valves (quite a reasonable number as we were selling about 100 a week), and we sustained a *nett* loss of about £40. The date of the year has been forgotten, but not the amount of our loss. We immediately changed our policy, and went from grosses to quarter-dozens, at the same time pushing to our utmost ability the sale of "non-ring" makes, of which we have since sold thousands. Our policy is the same to-day; hence the significance of our present negligible stock of 'ring' valves."

The Arbitrary Date.

Quite a number of our correspondents comment on the fact that the fixing of a particular date for the commencement of the rebate period (as opposed to giving the trade suitable advance warning of the reduction) can have an important effect on the dealer's position. Four typical cases are outlined in the following letters:

SIR,—From a stock of 155 valves on July 18th I shall only obtain credit on four, so that I have been very hard hit by this reduction. If only another month had been included in the time allowed for credit, I should have been considerably better off, since my invoices for that month amounted to just over £16. A. J. Selby (Burton-on-Trent).

SIR,—Out of a stock of 62 valves on July 18th, I can claim rebate on 15, leaving me with an approximate loss of £4 10s. od. I may also add that I have a manufacturers' invoice dated July 16th for the nett cost of valves totalling £4 4s. 5d., but the firm in question have refused to give me any rebate.

L. P. Hedges (Aylesbury).

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SIR,—The number of valves affected by the reduction which I had in stock on July 18th was 78. I have claimed rebate on 31, and the loss involved is about £5. I may add that of the 31 there were 12 whereon I secured rebate by one day—for which I account myself lucky.

I. G. Smith (Seaton, Devon).

Not all of the letters we have received are severely critical of the B.V.A. Some, in fact, although they are in the minority, are distinctly moderate in their observations. For example:

SIR,—We would state that under the scheme of full credit for all reductions we should have been entitled to a nett credit of £2 14s. 2d., but under the new method our total credit is £1 8s. 10d. Nothing serious, we admit, but still not quite O.K.

We think that it was a little unfair of the B.V.A. to take only the two quiet months. However, it is a difficult problem, and, had traders played a straight game under the old system, all would have still been well. L. W. Chadwick (Littleborough).

SIR,—I may say that I have stocked only B.V.A. valves until now, and have suffered in consequence, as this is a working class district. But I am now thinking of stocking other valves and signing no agreement until the B.V.A. give more practical sympathy and help to their agreement-holders.

I have 74 valves in stock and shall get an allowance on 4, meaning that I shall have to sell the rest practically without profit, as well as giving the service they may entail.

A. Turner (Rotherham).

SIR,—Thanks for your leading article of August 9th. My actual stock, taken on July 18th, was 220 valves. I have only claimed rebate on 50.

The hardship caused by the existing method is rather severe. Please urge the B.V.A. for some modification. The arrangement is an inequitable one; the loss sustained is not commensurate with the advantages gained, nor is it conducive to maintaining confidence.

Arthur Brand (Plymouth).

Suggested Alternatives.

Needless to say, very many traders in writing to us on this vexed problem have put forward suggestions for improving the position. It is worth noting that even non-agreement holders, who appreciate that they are worse off than many of their fellow dealers, are included in this group, and a letter from one such retailer is among the half-dozen on these lines given below.

SIR,—We carry a large stock of valves all the year round, and during the winter this is turning over fairly rapidly; but during the months from April to July sales are practically at zero, with the result that few valves are purchased during that period. In point of fact, we find that our present stock is valued at £294 14s. but we are only entitled to credit on valves to the value of £17 18s.

We suggest that in the event of changes other than price reductions most traders are called upon by manufacturers' representatives within a day or so. Why, therefore, cannot the B.V.A. arrange for co-operation among members' representatives for taking dealers' stocks on the occasion of a price reduction?

Gibb & Watson (Kirkcaldy).

SIR,—My total loss on the reduction is £4 os. 6d.—a contingency from which I considered I was protected by my agreement, and that is the reason why I have carried good stocks for the size of this place and my business.

What ought to be done is that every valve should be taken in and re-issued at the present price, and I trust that your efforts on our behalf will prove successful.

Andrew Robertson (Newburgh, Fife).

SIR,—Since we are only in a small way of business, our loss (£3 14s.) is in comparison as serious as that involved by larger firms. No doubt the public appreciate the reduction, but they did not definitely want it, and we consider it would have been much better if the manufacturers had increased the trade

discount. If they are prepared to give anything away, surely the trade is entitled to some share in it, instead of being faced with a serious loss.

R. C. Beer (Bridgwater).

SIR,—Under the new arrangement we have lost credit on 49 valves (which is £3 12s. 3d. nett) whereas we ought to be credited with the reduction on all goods in stock. If a false return is made by a dealer, he should be prosecuted. A few checks by the B.V.A. and an action or two would frighten the dishonest ones, and the fair trader would avoid such losses as this.

R. V. Lawton (Bridgnorth).

SIR,—Traders among the B.V.A. agreement holders who carry comprehensive stocks of valves are punished every time for their enterprise, and I think the rebate system to be very unsatisfactory indeed. In my own case, out of 83 valves I can claim on only 11, leaving me with an approximate loss of £5 4s.

I suggest that a satisfactory estimate for credit purposes could be obtained if forms were issued to all factors, whose travellers could then take the stocks of retailers on the actual day the valves are reduced, and the statement could be signed both by the traveller and the dealer. Could anything be fairer or more accurate?

E. Swarbrick (Fleetwood).

SIR,—We had in stock on July 18th, 278 valves, and as we are not agreement holders we do not care to work out the actual loss incurred. We have not signed the agreement, for we object on principle to being dictated to with regard to what we stock.

Serious Points.

Among the large number of dealers affected by the reduction there are some who raise detail points which are sufficiently serious to merit individual investigation, but at the moment, of course, it is more important that the even graver general issue at stake should be disposed of.

A typical example of the statements made to us is that of a firm of traders in Bath (Maxim's). "We ourselves," they say, "have been let into the drop very badly, for early this year we decided that there was every prospect of a substantial reduction in valve prices in June and we gave orders for only skeleton stocks to be held at our three shops. However, every valve manufacturers' representative assured us that there was not the remotest chance of a change in prices this year (and this statement was even confirmed by district managers), and, therefore, we retained our usual summer stocks. We even agreed to one of the manufacturers exchanging old type valves for new ones on a three- or four-to-one replacement basis, and our stocks are even larger than usual, with the result that we have lost very considerably."

Another suggestion which calls for serious consideration is outlined in the following letter:

SIR,—I suggest that the new prices of valves represent a great advertising scheme which is being paid for by the humble trader, who looks to the B.V.A. for protection. There is a memorandum which accompanies every agreement sent out by the Association. This is signed by the Secretary and, following Clause 3, it points out that non-agreement holders do not receive any allowance in the case of price reduction.

My interpretation of this is that agreement-holders are quite

My interpretation of this is that agreement-holders are quite safe in holding adequate stocks, since they are safeguarded against loss in the event of price reductions. F. C. King (Oxford).

Many more pages could be occupied by extracts from our post-bag on these lines, but these, at any rate, will serve to show the extent and varied character of the correspondence we have already received.

Obviously the matter cannot rest where it is, and as soon as this issue has been in the hands of the trade for two or three days and the volume of daily letters begins to decrease, we propose to analyse the results very carefully and offer them to the B.V.A. for their earnest consideration and an expression of their views.

PROVINCIAL TRADE NOTES

No Cutting in Derby.

NNUAL holidays in the various local works, together with the large numbers of dismissals in the railway shops here, is tending to keep trade rather quiet. There is, however, one fortunate aspect of the situation—namely, fortunate aspect of the situation—namely, that Derby is not suffering from any price-cutting plague, but there is, from time to time, some trouble with dabblers. The most noteworthy feature of trade recently has been a falling off in the demand for H.T. accumulators. These have always sold fairly well before. No slackening off in ordinary battery charging is noted however. is noted, however.

Mr. Robinson, of Curzon Street, is stocking "Pegasus" portables. The performance of these 15 guinea instruments is reported as excellent by many listeners

Messrs. Batterby & Hefford, electrical and radio engineers, Normanton Road, Derby, have extended their business. New and well-fitted showrooms have recently been opened at 40, The Strand, Derby, and are greatly appreciated by prospective customers.

Radio-Gramophones Sell in Leicester.

R. W. C. TURNER, of T. H. Wathes & Co., Ltd., reports a very marked falling off in the demand for portable receivers. All-mains sets, he says, are now the vogue, although the public nowadays seems to prefer console models and even radic-gramophones. Mr. Turner expressed the opinion that the big advertising campaigns of Philips' had done much to direct public attention to the advantages of all-mains radio. Mr. Turner's firm continue to do good business with Pve and Burndept products, and have also just recently taken up a Marconi-

phone agency.

Another dealer to whom I spoke had a different story to tell about the portable demand. I gathered that the Detex portable at eight guineas has been well received in Leicester, and that it has

given a real fillip to business.

The two principal music houses here, Sir Herbert Marshall & Sons, Ltd., and W. H. Russell & Son, are all out for business with the H.M.V. radio - gramophone, special window displays being run in conjunction with demonstrations.

Griffins report fair business at present. This firm continue to handle Kolster-Brandes products with really gratifying results.

results.

No meetings of the Leicestershire Radio Traders' Association have been held during the summer months, but that does not signify stagnation. A large amount of work has been going on behind the scenes. The committee has now almost completed arrangements for the next winter session, which will again be made interesting by lectures and demonstrations by representatives of various manu-

The Leicester Home Life Exhibition this year is to be held from September 10th to 20th, but only four local radio firms will be represented. These are T. H. Wathes & Co., The Midland Dynamo Co., Ltd., Griffins, and another firm of which I am at the moment unaware. music houses will also be exhibiting, so that radio will again be well to the fore. The regulations have undergone some revision, and no set demonstrations will be permitted on the stands, though a common amplifier will be provided for speaker demonstrations. Special audition rooms are also being provided.

Big Demand for Batteries in Manchester.

ESPITE the alleged "hard times" in Manchester, business this summer has been much better than for the

corresponding period last year.
"Mains units are selling well and the new 66R and chassis are already quite in favour," I was told by Mr. Dunderdale, of Wellworthy's, in Withy Grove. Kolster-Brandes and Pye mains sets are strong lines, though portables have fallen off, but Wellworthy's have sold a fair number, especially the Detex at 8 guineas. Pertrix batteries are having a big run. Indeed, I was told of two orders that were accidentally doubled from the factory—fortunately for Wellworthy's, as the whole supply was soon exhausted!

Mr. Horner, proprietor of Nutts, the wholesalers, 26, Dantzic Street, Shudehill, reports continued progress. The year has seen an increase in the sales of loudspeakers and batteries. The Surealite battery especially is very popular. Among portables the Pye is predominant.

The recent bad weather has resulted in interest in radio commencing earlier in the year than is usual. One telling advertisement seen recently announced that "the most cheerful friend on a rainy day is a wireless set."

Plymouth Firm's New Short Wave Set.

STONEHOUSE Radio Supplies, of Union Street, Plymouth, have just put on their market their "Universe" ultra short wave set, about which, I understand, glowing reports are being received. This constructor's set, which costs but £1 18s. 6d. to build, incorporates the new patent S.R.S. ultra short wave unit. The vital wiring of the set is contained inside this unit, so that the set is practically foolproof. The set will tune easily below twelve metres, and, it is gathered, has a world-wide range.

After a slack period business is improving in the Plymouth area. Messrs. Geoffrey Stuart have closed down their Union Street premises and have a temporary home at 48, Bedford Street, pending the rebuilding of their new shop

in George Street.

Yorkshire Trade Anomalies.

TOW is it that if a wireless dealer allows the reproduction from a loud-speaker to be heard outside his premises he is proceeded against, while hundreds of potential wireless users are deprived of their rights owing to inter-ference from industrial concerns?" This question, which was put to me by one of the largest wireless dealers in the West Riding, is one which other traders are asking, and is of special interest to the trade in practically all other industrial districts.

In Huddersfield, for instance, owing to interference from electrical machinery in factories, reception is impossible on the broadcast wavelengths. matter has been brought to the notice of the local Member of Parliament, who has taken it up with the Postmaster-General. It is agreed that the trouble could be remedied, but this would cost money and there is, at present, nothing to compel the remedy to be applied.

Another anomaly pointed out by the same trader was that, while motor cyclists were fined for having inefficient silencers on their machines, motorists could spoil television demonstrations for wireless dealers by leaving their car magnetos running outside, and in existing circumstances the wireless dealer is helpless.

Here are two concrete instances in which effective action could be taken if the trade were united locally. This has naturally led up to the question as to the possibility of forming a local W.R.A.

The replies were not too favourable. Owing to some reason or other, there is an apathy among many radio traders, and experience in at least two large towns has proved that the organising is left to one or two of the more energetic, while the others merely receive the benefits. If this apathy can be counteracted, and proof given that the W.R.A. can remedy these various evils, there would appear to be good prospects of success in the

West Riding.

A third grievance heard during a recent tour among traders was that of unfair competition in regard to public address contracts. In one instance the proprietors of a national daily, which is having much to say about fair trade, agreed to undertake a big contract free of charge in Huddersfield if it was allowed full scope. Fortunately, in this instance, the promoters of the public event did not accept this free advertising stunt, and the contract was secured by the Venus Radio & Electrical Co., Ltd., who have had considerable experience in this class of work. Messrs. Sellers, of Leeds, carried out a similar contract on the occasion of the visit of the Prime

Minister to Kirklees Park, near Brighouse.

Dewsbury Chamber of Trade are organising another trade exhibition in the Town Hall in the autumn, and present indications point to a most successful



This week we review the Mid-August issue of Decca records.

F 1852.—Sorella and Palladium Rag, by G. R. Spindler and his Mamelok Banjo Band.

Two bright but rather nondescript pieces by a combination consisting solely of banjos. The playing is lively, and the tone of the disc is clear. It is not the type of record, however, for which a big sale is assured.

F 1853.—Grandpa's Adventure (Odell) and Merely Medley (Odell), by the West-minster Singers.

The first is a rather unusual piece, intended to imitate a country girl's description of her grandfather's attempt at a visit to London, which was frustrated by his healthy appetite. Quite amusing. The second side is a medley of popular songs, amusingly arranged. The recording is clear and natural. The singing is, of course, unaccompanied.

F 1854.—Vienna Blood (J. Strauss) and My Happiest Day in Berlin (Gung'l),

by the Underhave Octet.
Two "Viennese" waltzes, of which the first is particularly well-known. Both are most attractively played by this octet. The tone is really excellent, and there is a fine string bass. This would make a good demonstration record. Very good indeed.

F 1855.—When It's Springtime in the Rockies (Saurer) and It Happened in Monterey ("The King of Jazz"), by Lou Abelardo, with orchestra.

Lou Abelardo croons his way through these two light pieces in his usual style. Both are popular at the moment, the second being from Paul Whiteman's sound film. There is an accompaniment by a dance combination. The tone is very good, and the disc should be quite popular for a time.

F 1856.—You Know What I'll Do (F.T.) and Happy Feet (F.T.), by Philip Buchel, with Spike Hughes and his Three Blind Mice.

This is a novelty among dance recordings in that both numbers include some clever tap dancing which, Decca state, was performed on the floor of the studio and did not have to be faked in any way. Apart from this the record may be treated as an ordinary dance disc. Ordinary," perhaps, is hardly the word, for the numbers are given in typical Spike Hughes style, with some good instrumental solo work, and a tip-top rhythm. Very good recording

F 1857.-Over the Garden Wall and How Does a Black Man Know When He's Dirty? by George Buck, comedian, with piano.

Both songs are of the comedy type, but the second seems likely to be the more

The first contains several popular. animal imitations, but is otherwise not outstanding. There are some good piano passages, and the tone is very clear.

F 1858.—To My Mammy (F.T.*) Let Me Sing and I'm Happy (F.T.*).

F 1860.—I Love You So Much (F.T.*) and All Alone Monday (F.T.*), by the Rhythm Maniacs.

The first two foxtrots—by Irving erlin—come from Al Jolson's latest Berlinfilm effort which bears the inspiring title of "Mammy." The titles do not do justice to the numbers, however, which are both good tuneful compositions and should become quite well known. The other foxtrots on F 1860 are better still, and all are played in excellent style, with plenty of rhythm and colour, and good vocal work. The recording, too, is quite up to standard.

F 1859.—H'lo Baby ("The Forward Pass") and My Baby's Fine and Dandy, by Max and Harry Nesbitt, duets with piano.

Two very snappy numbers, sung and played in fine style by these new Decca

artists, one of whom plays a banjulele. The second contains an amusing imitation of a baby crying, while both include numerous vocal "effects." The tone is excellent.

F 1861.—Harlem Madness (F.T.) and Blue Turning Grey Over You (F.T.*), by Spike Hughes and his dance orchestra.

Another Spike Hughes record, this time by the complete orchestra. It is really most illuminating to hear what the boys can do when they get together and go "all out" without being tied down to straightforward and conventional renderings. Decca should be congratulated on giving them the chance to make modern "hot" records comparable with those produced by widely known American combinations. "Harlem Madness" is full of original ideas and in addition to possessing a smashing rhythm throughout, is notable for some fine trumpet work, including some remarkable "high stuff" at the beginning and end. The second foxtrot is in slower tempo and has a more flowing style, without in any way destroying the thythm. A very interesting disc.

ULSTER TRADERS' ASSOCIATION AND Bucks Support W.R.A. Council.

Buckinghamshire Branch, W.R.A.

FTER a short discussion, the members of the Bucks branch of the W.R.A., at their meeting held at The Coach and Horses Hotel, High Wycombe, recently, passed a vote of satisfaction and sympathy with the principles and aims adopted at the joint meeting of the National Council and

Delegates at Headquarters on July 9th.

The secretary (Mr. Woodbridge) said he was very pleased to report real activity and live interest at headquarters. On behalf of the members Mr. Robert Scott, Chairman of the Association, in tendering a very cordial welcome to Mr. Field, said that the reputation of his firm had preceded him. He hoped that as their Northern Ireland representative he would get the full support of the

trade, and undoubtedly the presence of representatives of manufacturers gave excellent opportunity for mutual discussion with retailers on subjects of common interest. The minutes of the last general meeting and those of several meetings of the joint

council were then read and adopted.

It was stated that an important innovation in connection with the coming exhibition would be a procession of decorated cars touring the main Belfast streets on the opening day. While the Ulster Wireless Traders' Association would provide two P.A. vans for the procession, it was hoped that as many manufacturers and traders as possible would do their best in providing other vans attractively decorated. The parade would not be confined to exhibitors merely, so all firms would have a splendid chance of displaying their goods.

As a result of the committee's visit to London a couple of months ago it was reported that it had been possible to let all of the 28 stands. One example of the enthusiasm being shown was afforded by the action of Messrs. Henderson, Ltd., the wireless traders of Newtownstewart, Co. Tyrone, who were organising a special train to take people to the Ulster Radio Show. It was unanimously agreed that they would be welcomed by free admission to the Ulster Hall.

A long discussion took place on the subjects of electrical interference to radio reception and the B.B.C programmes. Members agreed that these were of great importance to the radio trade, more so than the Government Departments concerned seemed to appreciate. It was decided that the secretary should endeavour to impress these views on the departments mentioned by writing a letter of complaint to the Rt. Hon. Mr. A. Henderson, M.P. for Burnley, on the subject of broadcast programmes, particularly in regard to the reinstatement of the suspended day-time programme and the brightening of the Sunday broadcasts.

Since complaints to the P.M.G. regarding electrical interference invariably bring the reply that the Post Office has no legal power to prevent users of electrical machinery causing interference to reception, it would appear desirable that steps should be taken to obtain from Parliament necessary powers in the interests of broadcast listeners and the wireless trade generally.

The secretary was instructed to bring to the notice of Head Office the practice of a London firm, who were stated to be supplying kits of parts for cash or deferred retail payments, and that they were also supplying retailers at trade terms and factors at factors' terms. These activities suggest that these people are enjoying exceptional generous preferential discounts, which

enable them to carry out these practices.

A discussion took place on how to sustain the interest of members of the Branch. Mr. J. Herbert suggested that manufacturers be approached to send lecturers to Branch meetings. It was decided that this matter should be left in the hands of the committee to arrange a definite programme. The secretary was instructed to write informing Kolster-Brandes Ltd. that a certain K-B dealer in Burnley was a confirmed price-cutter to the knowledge of those present. At the close of the meeting satisfaction was expressed at the activities of the N.F.R.R. The meeting closed at 11 p.m. with a vote of thanks to the chairman.

Stockport Radio Retailers' Association.

N addition to the cancellation of the usual monthly meeting of the Manchester Branch, W.R.A., it should be noted that the Stockport Radio Retailers' Association cancelled its fortnightly meeting due for this week. This was owing to the fact that the present week is Stockport town's annual holiday, lasting a week and terminating to-day.





The four Mullard valves (two S4V, one 354 and 064) consume 38 W from the mains. The price is £30.

Two other mains sets, developed during the past few months, are the A.C. mains 2-valve receiver at £12 10s., and an A.C. 3-valve transportable, the price of which has not been fixed. Each covers long and medium waves, and they operate on the same voltages and periodicities as the "Band Pass Four." 







Model 312 is a 2-valve receiver incorporating a detector and a pentode, and can be used with an indoor aerial up to 25 miles from a Regional station. Tuning is controlled by a single drum dial working in an escutcheon plate at the centre of the front of the cabinet. The reaction knob, and the combined selectivity and volume control are also

In the field of mains units it is announced that the all-power units, C.1A. D.C. and C2A. D.C., will be deleted, and also the following H.T. models: 1F10 D.C., 4T60 A.C., 5T60 D.C., and 5T60 A.C. To replace the all-power unit C2A. D.C., the C2B. D.C. will be introduced. This gives a maximum output of 4 A L.T., 25 mA H.T. with four voltage tappings, and five G.B. tappings up to 12 V. The price is £6.17s. 6d.

A new H.T. unit to be introduced is the 1V.30 for D.C. and A.C. mains. This has four tappings with a total output of 30 mA, and retails at £2 19s. 6d. for D.C. and £5 15s. for A.C.

The model 4 A60 at £8 10s. replaces the 4T60 A.C., and gives an output of 60 mA with three voltage tappings.

Next comes the rectifier unit, which, up to the present, has incorporated a valve, but in its new form makes use of a Westinghouse rectifier. Known as the RA 20 instead of the R 20 it will sell at £3 10s. 6d.

All receivers and mains units are made for use with voltages from 200 to 250 D.C., and A.C. 200-250 and 100-120 V, 40 to 100 cycles.

Later in the season we understand that a radio-gramophone will be introduced. It will probably be available in two models, the first being a pedestal cabinet instrument incorporating an electric motor and M.C. speaker together with a set similar to the model 313. The second radio-gram will have a 312 set and a spring motor.





The first of the new radio-gramophones is a 2-valve all-A.C. model incorporating a detector and a power stage. An electric motor and a balanced armature speaker unit are fitted as standard, and the price, with a walnut pedestal cabinet, is £42.

As we have already announced, severalentirely new acoustic gramo-

phones, together with new radio apparatus, are included in the "Dulcetto" programme for the new season. Of the gramophones, the Nos. 870 and 790 are undoubtedly the most distinctive, and are made attractive by their modernly designed console cabinets, which are available in either oak or mahogany. Both are fitted with double-spring motors, and 12 in. turntables, which, by the way, are standardised throughout the range of "Dulcetto" pedestal and console models. The new "Dulcetto" shielded duraluminium soundbox and frictionless hermetic pivotal curved tone-arm are also fitted to both, in conjunction with a special exponential amplifier. The 870 in oak lists at 14 guineas, while the 790, also in oak, is priced as low as 8½ guineas, the corresponding models in mahogany being the 871 at 15 guineas, and the 791 at 9 guineas.

Then there is the 840, another console model in oak, which sells at 10½ guineas, and the 841, its mahogany counterpart, priced at 11½ guineas.

A cheaper gramophone is the 720, in an oak console cabinet with an open fret. This is listed at 6½ guineas, while the 721, in mahogany, retails at 7 guineas. Then comes the 680, the cheapest pedestal model gramophone in the Dulcetto range. This is priced at £5 19s. od., and the mahogany model, the 681, lists at 6 gnineas

In addition to the above mentioned gramophones, several others, with prices ranging from 61 to 12 guineas will also be on the market, and it should be noted that these, together with the last three instruments mentioned, have the same general specifications as regards motors, turntables and accoustic systems, as the models 790 and 870.

Portable gramophones are represented by the model "M" at £2 12s. od., the model "K," with an extra long internal amplifier at £3 5s., and the "Senior" machine at £3 19s. od. The latter is the same as the "K," but is equipped with a



Once again the name " Music Magnet " figures among the most important of the lines to be marketed by the General Electric Co., Ltd., but this year the "Osram Music Magnet" kit set utilises a 4-valve circuit—a departure from the practice of previous seasons. Two S.G. stages with triple ganged tuning are incorporated, with a power output valve. The price, inclusive of valves, is £11 15s. The consumption of this receiver is of the order of 17-18 mA, and, as this is a rather heavy demand for ordinary dry batteries, the G.E.C. have designed a special triple capacity battery for use with the set. An escutcheon, through which the two tuning dials are viewed, is mounted in the centre of the panel, with the two control knobs on either side. The remainder of the controls are at the sides of the cabinet. Two variable, solid-dielectric condensers are used for series aerial volume and selectivity control. This receiver, complete with valves and mains equipment, will sell at

Of the "de luxe" class, the "Geco-phone" 4-valve all-A.C. receiver next claims attention. Here, again, a distinctive style of cabinet is employed, and is carried out in solid walnut. The tuning controls are viewed through an aperture in a peculiarly shaped escutcheon

plate recessed obliquely at the top. The other controls, as in the other receivers, are mounted at the sides of the cabinet. The circuit incorporates two S.G. stages, detector, and an auto-transformer coupled super-power stage. The price is £30.

Another interesting new product is the 4-valve all-A.C. radio-gramophone, incorporating a G.E.C. M.C. speaker. The G.E.C. have taken up the manufacture of the inductor dynamic type of speaker, of which they will market two models, a cabinet instrument in oak at £5 10s., and a chassis model at £3 10s.

Amplion.

It is noteworthy that during the year Graham Amplion, Ltd., have released their various new lines as they have been developed, and, therefore, it is not probable that there will be any "surprise packets" to make their appearance at Olympia next month, all the lines we describe below constituting their programme.

Last April saw the release of most of the new Amplion instruments, outstanding among which is the Cabinet Radio, type A.C. 50, which is a combination of the senior "Lion" speaker and the metal-cased A.C. mains set. The cabinet, in many ways similar to that of the "Lion cabinet speaker, is of the pedestal type and has a hinged lid enclosing the sloping panel of the receiver on the top of the instrument. The price in oak is £05, or £66 in mahogany.

Quite a stir was created by the release, in May, of an Amplion portable-an entirely new departure for the firm. It is a suitcase set, utilising a 4-valve SGP circuit, with two H.F. stages. The panel is remarkably "clean" in appearance, and carries only the three drum dials and change-over switch. It is priced at £24 15s. More recently—in July to be exact—there was announced the introduction of the standard mains set in oak cabinet form, to meet the desires of those who prefer wood to the standard metal container of the set. In wood it costs £55.

The latest product is the Amplion 2-valve all-mains set, of very compact design. A straight detector and pentode circuit is employed, and there are two controls—reaction and tuning—with two switches, on-off and wave-change. A Westinghouse rectifier is incorporated. while there is provision for a pick-up. The set has been so designed that a walnut

AB6 cone speaker can be stood on the top of it with pleasing appearance. The inclusive price is £15 15s.

Another forthcoming set is the "Two S.G. Cabinet-Radio," which is self-contained with speaker and aerial. It utilises the portable receiver circuit, but is A.C. mains driven. A trickle charger is fitted, coming into operation when the set is switched off. The self-contained aerial can be turned through 90° without moving the set, while a new type of speaker is incorporated. This instrument will be

available in cabinet form on a plinth for standing on a table or bookcase, and also as a pedestal model. The price is not yet fixed.

Among their range of speakers are to be noted various additions. A "Two-Guinea'' cabinet cone instrument has been produced, while two balanced armature speakers, incorporating power type drive units, with a 14-inch figure in the series. Known as the AB41 (oak £5 15s. and mahogany £6 6s.) and the AB45 (oak £6 15s. and mahogany £7 7s.) these speakers are contained in cabinets similar to the "Lion" instruments.

The second is a threepoint switch identical in construction to the above, and will be priced at 2s., while the third, a Q.M.B. two-point switch, has a slightly different construction and will retail at 2s. 6d.













British Homophone Accounts.

THE accounts of the British Homophone Co., covering the period from May 22nd, 1928, to May 31st, 1929, show that profits on sale of investments amounted to £15,732, while interest receipts amounted to £2,163. After meeting the trading loss for the period After (£29,097), depreciation written off investments (£15,225), and other outgoings, there was a net loss transferred to the balance-sheet of £20,577. The accounts for the period June 1st, 1929, to February 28th, 1930, show that interest receipts amounted to £3.693. The trading loss, after charging all expenses, depreciation, and so on, was £188. Miscellaneous outgoings amounted to £2,373, and with £5,625 reserved for contingent payment under agreement of March 29th, 1928, between Gramophone Records, Ltd., and Mr. A. F. Sykes, the total outgoings amounted to £8,186., leaving a loss of £4,493, which increases the deficit as at February 28th last to £34,070. The directors state that it is intended to make future accounts up to March 31st in each year. The company's subsidiary, Ebonestos Insulators, Ltd., has made a profit during the period under review, and the Sterno Manufacturing Company has made a small loss after writing off certain exceptional depreciation. A meeting was held on August 15th. Committee's Reports.

At the annual meeting of the company, held last October, a committee of shareholders was appointed to investigate the affairs of the company. This committee has now issued "majority" and "minority" reports. The "majority" report was originally signed by five members, but two have since decided to have their names deleted and have signed the "minority" report.

At the conclusion of the long "majority" report it is stated that the committee has recommended to the directors that the Shaftesbury Avenue premises should be closed down and that the policy of continuing other branches, with the exception of Liverpool and Birmingham,

should receive attention. After carefully considering the whole position the committee is satisfied that with normal growth and sound management the company could be carried on easily without further losses. With regard to the board of directors, the committee has been informed that Mr. G. R. Hall-Caine, on medical advice, intends to vacate his position as chairman. With regard to the remaining directors, the committee cannot recommend the continuance in office of any directors other than Messrs. Sternberg and Stone, who are also executive officers of the company. committee is of the opinion that the board should be effectively strengthened. It also recommends that: (a) all alterations in the book value of the company's assets due to revaluation be written back : (b) the development expenditure in connection with the long-playing record, the items of licences and trade marks and preliminary expenses be written off; (c) at the appropriate moment the capital of the company be reduced, and that the above items and any other dead assets and accumulated losses be written off if not then already dealt with; (d) the directors' fees should be reduced to £100 per annum; and (e) in view of the small profit from the manufacture of gramophones and of the space occupied by this part of the business, the advisability of continuing such manufacture, or alternatively, the reorganisation of this section be considered.

The directors of the company have also issued a circular in which it is stated that so far as the board is aware the recommendations of the committee are, generally speaking, a résumé of the board's intentions as disclosed to the committee, while the "minority" report states that the inquiry would have served the shareholders' interests more materially had it been conducted more on a constructive line than with a view to emphasizing past mistakes.

A further circular has been issued by Messrs. Sternberg and Stone.

W.C., before Mr. E. Parke, Official Receiver. The debtor states that in December, 1928, he raised £500, and began business as a wireless and gramophone dealer, at 60, Newington Green, under the style of A. G. Brown & Co. TRUPHONIC RADIO, LTD. First Meetings.

THE statutory first meetings of the creditors and shareholders of Truphonic Radio, Ltd., 121-3, Rosebery Avenue, E.C., and Truphonic House, Hanover Park, Peckham, S.E., were held on August 8th at the Board of Trade Offices, Carey Street, W.C., before Mr. E. T. A. Phillips, Official Receiver.

The chairman reported that the company was incorporated as a public company on February 4th, 1929, with a nominal capital of £75,000 divided into 750,000 shares of 2s. each, and was formed to enter into certain agreements with Truphonic, Ltd., Mr. George Ernest Spero and Mr. Joseph Henry Benjamin, and to carry on business in connection with radio and electrical apparatus and the like. The issued capital was £65,000 representing 425,000 shares issued for cash and 225,000 shares allotted in part payment of the purchase consideration.

By agreements dated February 5th, 1929, the company acquired the business of Truphonic, Ltd., together with leasehold premises, 121-3 Rosebery Avenue, and 342, Regent Street, London, with the full benefit of all subsisting policies of insurance and all trade marks. It also acquired from Mr. Spero letters patent relating to a new type of loud-speaker and the benefit of certain improvements and designs relating to receivers and loud-speakers. The purchase consideration was agreed at £22;500 in fully paid shares.

At a board meeting held on April 14th, 1930, it was reported that the sales were very unsatisfactory, and that for three months up to March 31st, 1930, only approximately 800 instruments had been sold. The trading accounts showed for the period October 1st, 1928, to February 28th, 1930, a turnover of £78,480, a gross profit of £12,242, but a net loss of £21,405. The chairman added that in May last, following pressure by creditors, Mr. E. D. Basden, C.A., was appointed Receiver on behalf of the debenture holders. That gentleman was proceeding with the realisation of the assets and it was doubtful whether any surplus would be available.

The failure of the company was attributed to shortage of working capital owing to the £10,000 liability of Mr. Spero to the company, to unprofitable contracts made by Mr. Spero when he was managing director; loss of credit and to the royalty dispute to general depression in trade owing to the Hatry collapse and general election, and to the flooding of the market with cheap "junk" sets. The chairman said adraft statement of affairs had been prepared showing assets valued at £13,498, and after satisfying the debenture claim of £11,724 there might be a balance of £1,635 to meet the costs of the liquidation and the claims of the unsecured creditors returned at £4,204. The chairman agreed that the directors had not exercised proper control. The unfortunate fact was that Dr. Spero was not available, and the department was without his explanations.

The liquidation was left in the hands of the Official Receiver.
