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

### Fine French Plays

ONE improvement devoutly to be hoped for in the New Year is that the French stations will be "slicker" with their advance information. The details of forthcoming operatic broadcasts still arrive too late to be included in our programme pages. After that complaint, I am happy to be able to hand a compliment to those in charge of the drama section on the great number of outstanding plays they are presenting, both from their own littérature and that of other countries.

Next week's programmes are a fine example of this high quality. At 9.30 p.m. on Tuesday, Radio-Paris will broadcast the Capek Brothers' great play, *Adam the Creator*; and on Friday, Ibsen's *The Doll's House*. At 8.30 on Sunday, Group B (Paris PTT, etc.) is to transmit Racine's drama, *Mithridate*. Jean Richépin's drama, *Le Chemineau*, will be broadcast by Group C (Eiffel Tower, etc.) at 8.30 on Wednesday; and finally, on Saturday, Molière's comedy, *Le Malade imaginaire*, will be Group E's (Lille PTT, etc.) contribution.

### A Louis XV Première

ON Tuesday, January 4, at 8 p.m., Brussels No. 1 is to present what it calls a "reconstitution" of a first night at the old Théâtre des Italiens, in Paris, at which Louis XV was present in his Royal Box. The piece was a comic opera, *Le Déserteur*, by Sedaine, with music by Monsigny, and, with present-day singers and players presenting it, every effort will be made to recapture the atmosphere of that first performance on March 6, 1769.

The opera is long ago forgotten: even its composer's name may well be unknown to most listeners now. But in his own day Monsigny was an idol of the Paris opera-lovers, with many successes to his credit.

# THE PICK of the PROGRAMMES

Strictly regarded, he was an amateur musician, his actual jobs being those of Steward to the Duke of Orleans and Inspector-General of Canals; but it was his comic operas which won the Legion of Honour and membership of the Institut for him, and which enriched his old age with constant tokens of affection from all sides. He died in 1817 in his eighty-eighth year.

### Max Bruch's Centenary

FOR once the German broadcasting authorities are making an exception to their ban on Jewish musicians. The centenary of Max Bruch's birth is to be marked by performances

this country, too, he is chiefly remembered by his melodious violin concertos: both those sides of his art are to be represented in the broadcast commemorations.

Bruch was a popular figure in England. For four years—from 1880 till 1883—he was conductor of the Liverpool Philharmonic; and in 1893 Cambridge made him an honorary Doctor of Music.

### Two Schiller Dramas

ADMIRERS of Schiller will be grateful to Munich for including two of his plays in this week's programmes. At 6.5 on Sunday, *Don Carlos*, one of the several Schiller dramas which Verdi has set to music, will be broadcast from the National Theatre, where it is being presented as an opera. The cast will include such well-known singers as Hans Hermann Nissen, Viorica Ursuleac, and Alexander Sved, under the direction of Clemens Krauss.

On Tuesday, at 6.10 p.m., the same station will broadcast Schiller's earliest drama, *The Robbers*, which he wrote while still a student. It was the success of this play that prompted him to discontinue his studies and devote himself to writing.

### Warsaw Church Carols

As a climax to the Christmastide festivities Warsaw has arranged a broadcast of "Kolendy" carols, from the famous Fathers Franciscan Church. The choir is noted throughout Poland, and listeners should not miss this opportunity of hearing it.

The second part of the programme will be contributed by Mlle Helena Warpeckowska, the well-known Polish soprano.

### Oriental Humour

WHEN the Hamburg station broadcasts at 8.10 p.m. on Friday a programme entitled "The Pranks of Nasreddin Hodsha" listeners will hear a little of a traditional Oriental figure. Nasreddin Hodsha is the Turkish counterpart of the German jester Till Eulenspiegel. Five centuries ago he was the laughing philosopher of his country, and by his pranks he not only served to amuse his contemporaries, but also to instruct them.

The stories told about him have been handed down by successive generations, and have amused the people of many other lands. In Friday's broadcast some of his merry pranks will be heard to the accompaniment of Oriental music.

## Canada's High-Power Stations

### GIGLI AS A SOLDIER

**L**ISTENERS who do not understand Italian missed a pleasant and interesting little speech by the famous tenor, Beniamino Gigli, when he addressed Italy's soldiers in their various barracks during the recently instituted Soldiers' Hour last Sunday morning. According to the prearranged programme, Gigli sang three Neapolitan songs for the soldiers who were listening in barrack and camp in Italy and in the Libyan colonies. But he prefaced his songs with a little address which ran something like the following:

"Fellow-comrades in arms, I too was a soldier during the Great War, though I am not going to boast of any military prowess. I fear I was a soldier in rather a rose-water fashion. I do not think I was a very good soldier, though I did my best. At any rate, when I went up for my examination to become a non-commissioned officer, they turned me down, which was a severe blow to me. Then they put me into a military telephone exchange which was connected with the ordinary public exchanges. I remember that I used to pass the time when there were no calls and nothing to do by singing songs over the telephone to the signorine at the public exchange."

Gigli said he was proud to have been a soldier in the Army, even though his military career had nothing remarkable about it.

**CANADA'S HIGH-POWER STATIONS**  
CBF, Canada's new 50 kW station at Verchères, Quebec, 35 miles east of Montreal, was officially opened on the evening of December 11 by the Hon. C. D. Howe, Minister of Transport, and the Rt. Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Minister of Justice of Canada. The station, one of six to be erected across Canada by the Canadian Broadcasting Commission is the most powerful in the Dominion, and ranks high amongst the stations of the

North American continent. It will serve exclusively the French-speaking population of the province of Quebec, with broadcasts in their own language. The Corporation's Montreal station CBM will continue to serve the English-speaking population of the province.

Mr. Howe announced that another 50 kW station situated at Hornby, Ontario, would be inaugurated on Christmas morning to serve the English-speaking people of Ontario.

New Zealand's 60 kW station still remains the most powerful in the overseas Empire.

### BBC ARABIC BROADCASTS

The first transmission from Daventry of news in foreign languages will be broadcast in Arabic on Monday, January 3, from 6.0 p.m. until 6.15 p.m. (G.M.T.) on a wavelength of 31.32 metres.

Several distinguished representatives of the Arabic-speaking countries of the Near East will take part in the opening ceremony. Four other messages of greeting will be broadcast from his Excellency the Egyptian Ambassador (read in his absence in Egypt by the Chargé d'Affaires of the Egyptian Embassy), their Excellencies the Ministers of Saudi Arabia and Iraq, and Sir Bernard Reilly, Governor of Aden.

From January 4 onwards, daily transmissions of Arabic announcements will be broadcast.

### A SALT LAKE CITY SCHEME

The Mormon Church has applied to the Federal Communications Commission of the U.S. Government for authority to construct the most powerful short-wave broadcasting station in the country. The station, to be erected near Salt Lake City, Utah, would have 50 kW power.

It was stated that the countries designed to receive the programmes comprise the continents of Europe, Australia, Africa, and South America.

## The PTT "Soirée Tournante"

### MR. ROOSEVELT'S RECORD

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT made twenty broadcast speeches during 1937, bringing his total microphone "appearances" up to one hundred and ten since he first took office in March, 1933.

The Secretary of Agriculture, Mr. Henry A. Wallace, however, held the record among American statesmen with a total of twenty-two broadcast speeches; with the Postmaster-General, Mr. James A. Farley, second with sixteen.

The most "attention-compelling" broadcast of the year (says the NBC report) was that delivered by the then newly-appointed Supreme Court Judge, Mr. Hugo L. Black, in reply to the charge that he was once a member of the Ku Klux Klan.

### AN EXCITING JOB

Two rowing-boats and five pairs of skis are vital parts of the equipment in the CBS transmitting shack at Wayne, New Jersey. In spring, the Pequannock overflows its banks, and the only way for the engineers to get to and from work is to row (see picture below). In winter, the shack becomes snowbound, and they can reach it only on skis. Several of the staff had to have ski-ing lessons in order to travel "by the quickest route."

When there are neither floods nor blizzards lightning saves things from getting dull for the men at the Wayne transmitters. Whenever a thunderstorm breaks they all know the towering aerial is going to be hit—"and hit hard" according to the supervisor. The consequent crash can be heard for miles around, although conductors keep the damage to a minimum.

### YOUNG PEOPLE'S CONCERTS

ERNEST SCHELLING, who is disabled owing to injury to an eye, has regrettably cancelled his engagement for this season as conductor of the eighth season of "Young People's Concerts" to be given by the Philharmonic Symphony Society over the WABC-Columbia network.

His place will be taken by Rudolph Ganz, the eminent Swiss pianist, composer, and conductor for the five concerts on January 15 and 29, February 12 and 26, and March 12. John Barbirolli directed the opening programme on December 18.

### SIR ERNEST MacMILLAN

SIR ERNEST MACMILLAN, conductor of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra since 1931, will be guest conductor of an important sponsored Sunday Evening Hour series over CBS, from February 27 to March 27. Sir Ernest, who was born near Toronto in 1893, happened to be visiting Bayreuth, Germany, at the outbreak of the War, and was interned at the notorious Ruhleben Camp until 1918. During his imprisonment he composed a choral-orchestral work which was subsequently to win him the degree of Bachelor of Music from Oxford. He has been guest conductor for three successive seasons for the British Broadcasting Corporation.

### WORLD-FAMOUS MUSICIANS

SIR ERNEST's name completes the 1937-38 roster of internationally-known orchestral directors for this series, which includes Jose Iturbi, Eugene Ormandy, Fritz Reiner, and John Barbirolli, of the New York Symphony Orchestra.

Guest artists who will appear while the Detroit Symphony Orchestra is under Sir Ernest's direction will include Kirsten Flagstad, the celebrated Wagnerian soprano, Lily Pons, Metropolitan Opera coloratura; Jose Iturbi, as piano soloist; and Nino Martini, the famous Italian tenor.

### "SOIRÉE TOURNANTE"

THE words "Soirée Tournante" which have been appearing lately over the programmes of the Paris State stations, generally on Saturdays, must have puzzled a good many listeners. It is the name given to the system of alternative programmes adopted by these stations about two months ago. Three programmes are arranged, one being dramatic, one musical, and one variety, and each programme is divided into two parts. Two Paris State stations then broadcast the six parts in such a way that a listener to one station will hear one part of each programme, but he can hear the dramatic or either of the other programmes in their entirety by switching over to the other station at the appropriate moment.

On New Year's Day Radio-Paris, Eiffel Tower, and Paris PTT are taking part in the "Soirée Tournante," during which many

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# BROADCASTING IN 1937

## The Year in Retrospect

DURING 1937 broadcasting made steady progress in most countries, but it has not yet reached the stage where it is accepted like gas, electric lighting, or other public services. It is still full of surprises, and is liable to become front-page news at any moment. In the year now passed it was frequently the occasion of historic and dramatic episodes.

### The Coronation Ceremony

By common consent the transmission of the Coronation ceremonies was acknowledged to be the most important and impressive broadcast ever attempted. Thanks to the co-operation of the Post Office and the various broadcasting authorities of the world, the BBC was able to give hundreds of millions of listeners the opportunity of hearing and taking part in the Crowning of the King and Queen.

For the first time in history the peoples of the British Commonwealth took part in a coronation, and listeners in the remotest parts of the Empire heard the ceremony better than the majority of those who were present in Westminster Abbey.

### The Ohio Floods

If the Coronation provided the grandest and most impressive broadcasts of the year, the disastrous floods in Ohio furnished the greatest human story in the history of broadcasting. Radio was instrumental in saving hundreds of thousands of lives, by appealing for boats, food, and medical supplies, by giving warnings, spreading information, and rendering assistance in innumerable ways.

The relatively small casualty list—a few hundred out of a potential million victims—was in large measure due to the magnificent work of broadcasting stations great and small. Amateur transmitters in the flooded areas also rendered the most conspicuous service.

### The Microphone in War

The world was cursed with two major wars during the year, and in this unwelcome sphere radio played an important part. In Spain some stations which formerly pursued their normal functions have been used by one side or the other for military purposes. In spite of this the programmes from the Madrid station have been rarely interrupted. The Barcelona station has been active on behalf of the Government, while General Franco has command of a number of stations, and has made abundant use of Salamanca as well as of Seville.

In the Sino-Japanese conflict radio has also played an important part, although, of course, Japan is better equipped in this respect. In Shanghai and other centres of British influence the news bulletins from Daventry have been eagerly awaited and, in numerous instances, have been the centre of the day's interest. Many Shanghai residents did not know what was happening in the city until they heard the BBC bulletins. Incidentally, it may be added that the Daventry news bulletins about the war in the East have been followed with the utmost interest and anxiety in India, Malaya, and the East generally. The fairness and accuracy of the bulletins are generally recognised.

record and comment on the important events in other South American countries.

Broadcasting authorities have tried in other ways to further international good will. The BBC has had an unprecedented number of relays from the United States and from Europe. The U.S.A. stations, as well as many on the Continent, have returned the compliment. Even in Europe there have been many complimentary exchanges of programme material. France, in particular, has spared no pains to let her listeners know about the cultural and musical life of Germany. In fact, broadcasting is playing an increasingly important part in letting one half of the world know how the other half lives.

### Broadcasts in Foreign Languages

During the year there was a considerable increase in the number of broadcasts from European stations in foreign languages. Occasionally, some of the news bulletins in these broadcasts have been more picturesque than accurate. Certain pronouncements have not been calculated to improve international good feeling. This country has been reluctant to enter this field and has been unwilling to meet propaganda with propaganda. It has been felt that straight, honest, reliable news was in the long run the best form of counter-propaganda.

The time has now arrived, however, when such news must be given in languages other than English. In the House of Commons, on October 30, Sir John Simon recalled that the Ullswater Committee on broadcasting made recommendations to the effect that the appropriate use of languages other than English

should be encouraged. Inquiries which had since been made by his Majesty's representatives abroad had led to the conclusion that such broadcasts from Britain would be welcomed, particularly by Spanish and Portuguese listeners in South American countries, and broadcasts in Arabic by listeners in the Near East. The first transmission of news in Arabic will take place on January 3 next.

### A Record of Steady Progress

Broadcasting depends for its success, ultimately, on the general excellence of its daily service rather than on occasional spectacular or sensational features. Judged by this standard, broadcasting in 1937 has made steady progress. In nearly every country there has been a substantial increase in the number of licences. Britain and Germany have long been competing for first place. To-day, however, Germany appears to be leading in spite of its half-a-million listeners who do not pay for their licences.

Astonishing progress has also been made in France, where there are now over 4,000,000 licensed listeners. France has taken its place definitely as one of the great broadcasting powers. Record licence figures are also reported from all the British Dominions and from India. In the United States it is calculated that there are 25,000,000 sets in homes and 4,500,000 in motor cars.

Considerable steps have been made in educational broadcasting. The pioneering methods of the BBC in this field have been adopted all over the world. Even in China, the pupils in thousands of secondary and elementary schools were receiving lessons by wireless.

### Colonial Broadcasting

A Committee, appointed by the British Colonial Office, has been considering the problems of broadcasting in the Crown Colonies, and has issued an interim report. The Committee envisages the development and justification of Colonial broadcasting as an instrument of advanced administration, the primary function of which is not merely entertainment, but the enlightenment and education of the more backward sections of the population, and for their instruction in public health and agriculture. Two systems of broadcasting, wired and wireless, were taken into account. Wire broadcasting should be confined to limited and closely populated areas. It was better to have a broadcasting system partially financed by advertising than to have no system at all.

### The Short Waves

There is no need to stress in WORLD-RADIO the importance of short-wave broadcasting. All the great broadcasting powers have turned their attention to short-wave broadcasting as the best means of "telling the world." Three new 50 kW transmitters have been installed at Daventry, which has become the greatest short-wave centre. Germany, Italy, France, Japan, and Russia have intensified their short-wave activities, and the United States is once more in this field on a large scale.

The world of radio has suffered an irreparable loss in the death last July of Marchese Marconi, without whose labours broadcasting would not have been possible.

## ROMANCES OF GREAT MUSICIANS

## The Two Wives of J. S. Bach



WHEN, as a young musician, Johann Sebastian Bach took up his first appointment as an organist at Arnstadt, he caused the disapproval of the congregation, not only by his unconventional organ playing and accompaniment, but also by the fact that he had admitted to the choir a "strange young woman," whose voice had been heard in the empty church while he was practising at the organ. She was Maria Barbara Bach, a cousin; and in 1707, when he was appointed organist at Mühlhausen, in Thuringia, she became his bride.

The wedding ceremony took place in the little village church of Dornheim, near Arnstadt, and it was followed by a short honeymoon at Erfurt. His appointment at Mühlhausen, however, did not last long. In 1708 the Duke of Weimar appointed him Court organist, and during the period that followed Bach wrote cantatas and important works for the organ. In 1717 the Prince of Anhalt appointed him Director of Music at his Court at Köthen. This appointment did not include Church work, and his writings of this period consisted predominantly of instrumental compositions; occasionally, too, he would accompany his chief on his travels. It was during one of these journeys in the summer of 1720 that Bach suffered the loss of his wife. Their marriage had lasted for thirteen years.

## New-Found Joy

For his second wife Bach married Anna Magdalena Wilcken, a native of the Thuringian town

of Zeitz. She was barely twenty years old—sixteen years her husband's junior—but she quickly adapted herself to her new surroundings. Not only did she present Bach with a number of children, but she became his zealous and apt

pupil and untiring helpmate in his creative work. He wrote two delightful music books specially for her, in one of which he inscribed a dedication ending with the words: "What wonder that my mouth and heart are brimming over with joy."

Anna Magdalena learnt to play the piano, and she transcribed her husband's music so exactly and so well that often her writing could not be distinguished from his. In 1723 the Master took up his last appointment, that of Cantor at the Thomaskirche at Leipzig, and Director of Music at the University. It was here that all his masterpieces were written. During his twenty-seven years' activity at Leipzig—years that certainly did not lack hardships and disappointments—Anna Magdalena was his faithful companion. She sang in his church choir, and in his home she was the mainstay of his musical services.

## The Poverty-Stricken Widow

In 1730, writing about his children to a friend, Bach observed: "Without exception they are born musicians. I can assure you that I can organise a vocal and instrumental concert with the members of my family, especially since my present wife possesses a pleasant soprano voice, and my eldest daughter is also able to sing quite well." Anna Magdalena survived her husband by ten years, and poverty overshadowed her widowhood. After the distribution of Bach's possessions, she was left a poor woman. Some of their children could not, and others would not, assist her, and she died an inmate of the Poor Law institution. She was buried by the side of her husband, whose name had long been forgotten in Leipzig. It has been left for posterity to recognise the genius of one of the world's greatest musicians.

## LEAVES FROM MY LOG

## THE BEAT OSCILLATOR

A GOOD many American sets which take in some of the ultra-short-wave bands are provided with what is known as a beat oscillator. This is simply a valve, which can be switched on or off at will, so arranged that it generates oscillations which are fed to the second detector of a superhet. Its purpose is to enable small incoming signals to be heterodyned and so call attention to their presence by squeals. So far, few British sets have the beat oscillator. Our designers are always rather chary of adding valves, and they may feel some reluctance to incorporate in their circuits a valve which is only occasionally brought into action by the average user of an "all-wave" set. Still, if you have done much ultra-short-wave work, you will be in no two minds about the usefulness of the beat oscillator in superhets. It is very handy, too, on the short waves when you are searching for signals on some of the crowded wave-bands. It gives you all the benefits of "tuning by the squeal," but none of the drawbacks, since it cannot cause interference with other people's reception.

## INTERFERENCE ON THE ULTRA-SHORTS

Have you come across a peculiar form of what appears to be atmospheric interference on the ultra-short waves? It has been reported from several quarters as occurring occasionally on frequencies between 28 and 31 megacycles. This interference is heard as a loud "sizzling" or "bubbling" noise, and when it is observed there is usually a marked falling off in signal strength

within a short time. One reader tells me that an explanation of the interference offered is that it is caused by an outburst of intense bombardment of the upper atmosphere by electrons from the sun. Further information about the interference and other suggestions as to its cause would be welcome.

## WE OUGHT TO MAKE A STAND

Unless you are fortunate enough to live at some distance from a road along which there is a stream of mechanically-propelled traffic, you must have experienced the particularly obnoxious form of interference to which the ignition systems of some petrol engines give rise on both the short and the ultra-short waves. Though it is just possible that the emission of such interference might be held legally to constitute a radio transmission, and to be therefore an infringement on the prerogatives of the G.P.O., the BBC, and the licensed amateur, no decision on the point has been given, so far as I know. I believe I am right in saying that in most of the new cars the ignition systems are guaranteed to be non-radiating. Whether or not this is so, short-wave and ultra-short-wave enthusiasts have it in their power to strike a blow for the clearance of the ether by refusing to purchase any car, new or second-hand, unless it is shown to be incapable of radiating interference. The same thing applies to all kinds of domestic electrical apparatus. Don't you think it's up to us?

## THE NOT-SO-VERY-OLD DAYS

The recent correspondence in WORLD-RADIO about the reception of low-powered stations in

France, Scandinavia, and other European countries has proved very interesting, if only because it shows what a change has come over conditions during the last few years. Listeners are surprised now-a-days when they obtain pretty good reception from foreign stations rated at between 1 and 2 kilowatts. I have just looked out an old log-book containing daily records of foreign reception and a copy of WORLD-RADIO of the period, which shows the then power of the stations logged. Lyons La Doua, which in those days worked on 465.8 metres, is shown, not just occasionally, but day after day, as a first-rate signal. Its power was 1.5 kilowatts. Paris PTT, then better known as the Ecole Supérieure, was also as a rule a first-rate and consistent transmission. Its power was 0.77 kilowatt. Madrid Union Radio (2 kilowatts), Hamburg (1.5 kilowatts), Naples (1.5 kilowatts), Rennes (1.3 kilowatts), Lille (1.3 kilowatts), Barcelona (1 kilowatt), Juan-les-Pins (0.8 kilowatt)—these were amongst other small stations that are shown as coming in well more often than not. And just how old do you think those records are? Exactly four years: they relate to Christmas week of 1933!

## STILL SMALLER FRY

But that is by no means the whole tale. In those days it was not unusual to hear Freiburg-im-Breisgau strongly on 570 metres, though its power was but 0.25 kilowatt. Bremen, Trollhättan, Kalmar, Gävle, Jönköping, and Karlskrona—all rated at from 0.2 to 0.25 kilowatt—used to make quite frequent appearances in the log. Some of those stations have disappeared now, others are now on common wavelengths, others again have greatly increased their power. But Karlskrona is still rated at 0.2 kilowatt, and still has an individual wavelength on 196 metres. If your set will tune down low enough, see what you can make of it now.

## EUROPEAN MEDIUM WAVES

## TRANSATLANTIC MEDIUM WAVES

Several correspondents express surprise at reception from low-powered European stations being so good. But in view of the fact that American and Canadian medium-wave stations of 1 kW power are often heard, I don't think there is anything to marvel at in this. Yesterday morning, December 18, provided really first-class reception from the U.S.A. The high spots in the way of entertaining programmes were WBZ, WTIC, WBT, WPG, and WCAU. A surfeit of dance music and news bulletins was being served up by, amongst others, WOR, WABC, WJZ.

I tuned in to WBT at 2.30 a.m. just as they were changing over from a Hollywood relay to a real hot variety programme. Then I had a spate of drama and an interesting talk on Japanese-American relations from WTIC. Next I listened to a running commentary from WBZ on the fight between Buddy Baer and Eddie Hogan. Reception was perfect, and the supercharged high-speed delivery of the commentator, cheers of the crowd, sound of the gong, all came over well. WCAU and WPG gave us a real treat in a programme of vocal items with organ accompaniment.

"Distance lends enchantment," and those of

us who "oft in the still night" roam the ether are well advised by your contributor, R. W. Hallows, to use big sets, though mine is only a seven-valve—just one short of the eight-valve minimum recommended by R. W. H.

## DROITWICH AND STUTTGART

"Geophysic" has raised an interesting question. Droitwich, the interfering transmitter, is almost exactly in line with Co. Mayo and Stuttgart, and this fact would doubtless account for his experience. I also have some difficulty in hearing Stuttgart, the interfering transmitter in my case being Luxembourg itself. The interesting point is that Stuttgart, Luxembourg, London, Droitwich, and Co. Mayo are all in the same straight line; this would appear to suggest that where there are two intermediate transmitters the one nearer the receiver may alone be responsible for interaction. Has "Geophysic" ever detected a third signal on Stuttgart's wavelength? If not, would he listen for Luxembourg one Sunday evening after Droitwich has closed down for the day? He may be able to pass on useful information.

A further point of interest is that "Geophysic" seems to have heard the interfering station at greater signal strength than the original transmission. I was not aware that such a thing was possible until Sunday, November 28, at 11 p.m., when I heard Luxembourg coming through at a good R8 on 522.6 metres, Stuttgart being only just audible. The two waves from Stuttgart (reflected and direct) were

evidently almost neutralising each other (my receiver has an A.V.C.), but the Luxembourg signal, arriving on the reflected wave alone, was naturally quite unaffected.

# TELEVISION NOTES AND PROGRAMMES

## Polish Ballet at Alexandra Palace

By "THE SEER"

BALLET-LOVERS have been well served by television, but not often have they been offered two outstanding ballet programmes in one week. In both afternoon and evening programmes on January 3 the Vic-Wells Company will perform Lord Berners's *Wedding Bouquet*, and on the following afternoon members of *Les Ballets Polonais* from Covent Garden will visit Alexandra Palace to give selections from their repertoire.

The *Wedding Bouquet* is a choral ballet with words by Gertrude Stein, and here is an opportunity to extend the principle of off-stage sound and visual action which proved so successful in *Hänsel und Gretel*. Lord Berners, besides writing the music, has designed the dresses which will be seen in television.

The Polish Ballet, now visiting England for the first time, is a distinct capture for television. The Ballet won the Grand Prix de Ballet during the recent International Exhibition in Paris. Directed by Bronislava Nijinska, the celebrated choreographer, the members work in settings specially designed and executed by Polish artists, and in the television presentation every effort will be made to produce the authentic atmosphere.

\* \* \* \*

Fifty-nine people took part in *Hänsel und Gretel* when Humperdinck's fairy-tale opera was televised in a masque version on December 23 and 27. The double cast, consisting of child players and singers off-stage, numbered twenty-eight, while the augmented Television Orchestra accounted for another thirty-one—probably a record. Fortunately, No. 2 studio, now

adequately lighted, was brought into use for the witches' dance and ballet sequences, otherwise the congestion in Studio No. 1 would have been intolerable.

Another big cast will appear this evening (December 31), when more than fifty stars make a personal visit to the studios to take part in *From Alexandra Palace, 1936-37*, a review of the television service since the first transmissions to Radiolympia in 1936. Exactly 338 "shots" are included in the longest 'script' ever used in a television programme. The guest artists will include Nelson Keys, Ivy St. Helier, Hermione Baddeley, Sidonie Goossens, John Goss, Margot Fonteyn, Joan Collier, William Devlin, Esmond Knight, Irene Prador, and many others whom viewers have seen and heard during the past year.

D. H. Munro, who has prepared this ambitious feature with L. G. Barbrook, is incorporating nearly 200 film excerpts, many of them taken side by side with the television cameras at such events as the Coronation Procession, the Lord Mayor's Show, and sporting contests. Certain studio items were also filmed, notably some of the highlights in "Picture Page."

\* \* \* \*

Drama is presented in two ways at Alexandra Palace. One method is to select excerpts, or perhaps an act, from a current stage play and give a "straight" rendering in the television studio. The other method is to "start from scratch," making a television 'script' from the original drama and, in effect, creating a new version which tells the whole story in miniature.

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
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
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# AERIALS IN FLATS

The flat-dweller is inevitably confronted with all manner of problems that militate against a hundred per cent. reception, and "the aerial" is not the least of them. An outdoor aerial is generally out of the question, and in this article R. W. HALLOWS describes some of the most effective indoor types

LONDON is rapidly becoming a city of flats, and much the same thing is true of most of the big towns throughout the country. More and more of the people who want to live near the centre of social and business activities, rather than in the suburbs or the country, are forsaking the house for the flat.

The flat has certain wireless problems peculiar to itself. The man who has a house can usually erect some sort of outdoor aerial of his very own; but the flat-dweller can, as a rule, do no such thing, unless he occupies a top-floor flat and has special permission from the landlord.

An indoor aerial may seem to be the obvious solution of the difficulty, but there is the question of man-made interference to be considered. In most blocks of flats there are electric lifts, and unless they are rendered non-radiating by means of suppressor devices they can ruin wireless reception by the appalling noises that they cause the loudspeaker to produce. The indoor aerial may be, so to speak, immersed in the field of the interference.

In addition to lifts, there are sure to be all kinds of domestic electrical appliances—refrigerators, sewing-machines, vacuum cleaners, fans and so on—in use by neighbouring tenants. Each and every one of these can be a powerful radiator of interference unless designed so as to be innocuous.

But it is not only radiated interference that has to be taken into account: there is also the interference which is known as "mains-borne." This is actually brought in by the mains from which the set derives its power and it can be a great nuisance unless steps are taken to eliminate it.

## STEEL-FRAMED BUILDINGS

Apart from interference, the flat-dweller may be handicapped in his attempts to make use of an indoor aerial by the very composition of modern buildings. Many of them are built round a framework of steel, which may have a screening effect sufficient to reduce the efficiency of any kind of indoor aerial to such an extent as to preclude anything like good results.

Perhaps you know the story of the dear old lady who always opened the windows of her flat "to let the wireless waves in" when she was using her portable receiver. Experts laughed when they heard her saying this, and gave elaborate explanations showing that brick walls or stone walls are as transparent to wireless waves as is crystal to light. The old lady just smiled and said that that might be so, but she, at any rate, heard the programmes far better when she opened her windows. In fact, she could hardly hear them at all when they were shut.

She was so positive about it that some of the experts went eventually to investigate. They found, to their discomfiture, that what she had said was true. The walls, you see, contained so much metal that they were almost impervious to wireless waves. But the windows? Well, the windows had many small panes set into metal casements and the panes were of lead glass! Until the windows were opened, her flat was virtually a blind spot for radio reception.


Few flats, happily, are as bad as that from the wireless point of view; but there are many in which the indoor aerial is a poor thing.

What, then, are the possibilities before the flat-dweller? If there is no serious interference and if the screening of the metal framework is not too marked, he can use an indoor aerial of the kind that is slung round three sides of the room about a foot from the walls and the same distance below the ceiling.

The accompanying sketch shows how it is put up, the materials required being four picture nails, four pieces of white cord, four miniature white porcelain insulators, and sufficient white cotton-covered wire of, say, No. 22 gauge for the length of the aerial and down-lead to the set.

## DETAILS OF AERIAL

All nails are about 12 inches below the ceiling and No. 1 is the same distance from wall B. Nails Nos. 2 and 3 are driven into the angles between the walls. No. 4 is 12 inches from wall D. Fasten each insulator to its nail with a piece of cord. Thread the end of the wire through insulator No. 1, and carry on through Nos. 2, 3, and 4. Secure to No. 4, leaving sufficient loose to reach the aerial terminal of the set. Now go back to No. 1. Pull the wire tight, which will cause the insulators to stand away from the walls as far as their cords will let them. Cut the wire and knot round insulator No. 1. Since everything is white—insulators, cords and wire—this aerial is quite inconspicuous.

There are several possible alternatives to this kind of indoor aerial. If you do not want wires, however inconspicuous, slung in the room where the set is installed, a special kind of aerial wire attached to a picture-rail may be found satisfactory. Some sets have arrangements enabling the electric mains to be used as the aerial. Very fair results are obtainable so long as the mains are not noisy. Again, you may prefer to use a portable set, or a table model, or a radiogram with a built-in aerial.

All indoor aerials, however, of whatever kind, have their failings. They are not as efficient as the outdoor collector in the matter of bringing in signals, though they may prove far too

efficient in bringing in any interference that has its source within the building.

The only solution that is completely satisfactory is a "communal aerial" of the anti-interference type, erected on the roof of the building—well above the zone of interference—and serving the sets of all tenants by means of low-impedance transmission lines.

Just a word about that expression "the zone of interference." The field of most kinds of man-made interference does not extend to more than 25 feet or so above the source, though laterally it may be pretty wide. If the horizontal portion of the communal aerial is 25 or 30 feet above the roof of a block of flats it will thus be outside the zone of interference. The transmission lines pass through the zone, but, as they are of low impedance and either screened or so designed that unwanted impulses reaching them cancel out, they pick up little or no interference on their way.

A single aerial of the kind mentioned can serve a large number of different flats. Each tenant can tune in any station he likes without in any way affecting the reception of the others. The transmission lines can be hidden away like any other electric wiring and all that need be seen is a wall-socket to which a plug from the set is connected.

There are two ways in which flat-dwellers may secure the interference-free reception that this kind of aerial provides. One is for them to club together to meet the cost—very moderate, considering the benefits that it confers—of installing the aerial, the necessary transformers, the transmission lines, and the "points." It will, of course, be necessary to obtain the landlord's permission before the work is undertaken.

The second, and probably the more satisfactory, is for a number of tenants (the more the better) to suggest to the landlord that if he will install the aerial and equip their flats with "points," they will be willing to pay a small increased quarterly rent to reimburse him for the expenditure. In most cases a few shillings a quarter would probably be sufficient to cover the cost of erecting the aerial and of fitting disturbance-suppressing devices to lifts or any other radiating appliances that are part of the building.

The landlord is likely to look more favourably upon such a proposal if it is tactfully pointed out to him that a guarantee of interference-free reception will certainly make his "desirable" flats even more desirable to prospective tenants in these days, when the wireless set is part of the normal equipment of almost every home.

## REPLACING SPEAKER TRANSFORMER

WHEN a loudspeaker transformer develops a fault, it is sometimes difficult to obtain a replacement of the precise type originally fitted. When this occurs, an alternative is to obtain a "universal" type of transformer and adapt it to the speaker. These "universal" transformers are usually provided with a sufficient number of ratios to suit almost any type of output valve and speaker employed in a receiver. Suitable connexions may be found by trial if not known.

The replace transformer may not fit the holes drilled in the speaker chassis for the original transformer, however, in which case the transformer may be screwed to the baffle beside the speaker, or to the cabinet, and the speech coil leads extended.

Incidentally, when a transformer shows an "open circuit" on test, one should make sure that there is not some easily rectified fault in the leads from the windings. There may be a "dry" joint at the soldering tags, or a lead may be broken inside the insulation, particularly near the point where it leaves the windings or is joined to the terminal board.

Evidently using the Short-Wave Programme pages of WORLD-RADIO as a guide, this listener shared the Christmas broadcast fare provided by Lyndhurst (Australia), Huizen, California, Italy, and New York.

ON Christmas Day, via the short waves, I heard many interesting and enjoyable programmes. Listening began with part of Handel's *Messiah* from VLR at 12.00, and Bach's *Christmas Oratorio* from PHI at 14.00. At 15.00 came H.M. the King's message, relayed by W2XAD, followed at 16.30 by interesting interviews and Christmas greetings from a labour camp in California, also from W2XAD.

Gigli was heard at 18.00 from HVJ, singing in a programme of sacred music, while another celebrated tenor, Richard Crooks, took the part of Romeo in *Romeo and Juliet* at the Metropolitan Opera House, New York, broadcast from W2XAD at 19.00. Next, at 22.00, Lionel Barrymore played Scrooge in *A Christmas Carol*, from W2XE.

W2XAF presented an interesting dramatisation of "the ten biggest news stories of 1937" at 02.00 (26th), and lastly, from the same station, at 03.00, I listened to Toscanini conducting the NBC Symphony Orchestra in a splendid concert.

Such enjoyable listening would not, of course, have been possible without WORLD-RADIO's short-wave programmes.

## HEADLINES OF 1937

I conclude this week's selection with an item in retrospective vein—traditional on the last day of the year—and express the hope that in the Headlines of 1938 loss and disaster will have no place.

ON Sunday, December 26, the NBC brought memories of some of the great events of 1937. This programme was heard through W2XAD at 20.30.

First we were taken to the Associated Press offices, where the News Editor, Mr. Price, came

to the microphone. He described the cable department, which handled news from foreign countries. Only the other day they had received a dramatic story from a reporter in Nanking, and soon afterwards they received a cable from Tokio stating that he had been killed—an incorrect report, fortunately.

Mr. Price then referred to the great headlines of 1937, which included: The battle over the Supreme Court, the Hindenburg disaster, the sit-down strikes, the wedding of the Duke of Windsor, the loss of Miss Earhart, the Coronation of King George VI, and the great American floods.

We were then returned to the NBC studios in New York, where thrilling dramatisations of some of these headline stories were presented. The stories of the Hindenburg disaster and the Mississippi floods were particularly effective. Frinton-on-Sea.

## Below 100 Metres

By "SCOTIAN"

(December 19-24)

CONDITIONS have been mainly good during the hours of daylight and in the late listening period, but "evening" results tend to be still variable. The most consistent U.S. reception was obtained from W2XE (13.94 m.), and generally the 16 m. and 19 m. Americans have given reliable early evening signals. From around 22.00 onwards the optimum band for DX is usually 49 m.

Very quiet conditions prevailed below 13 m. on Sunday (Dec. 19), but the lower frequencies proved more interesting. In the afternoon the 19 m. "locals" were a consistent R9 and HAS3 (19.52 m.) could be heard carrying out a series of aerial tests. PMN (29.24 m.), R5, at 13.30, improved later to R7. At this time W1XK (31.35 m.) was R5, but strongly heterodyned, no doubt by KZRM. W3XAL (16.87 m.) gave good U.S. reception from 14.00 until around 17.00, as did W2XAD from 16.00. W2XAD faded out, but reappeared again by 20.00—R7 with slight "flutter." During their European zone transmission JZJ and JZI were both R7 with some "flutter."

Monday afternoon found the high frequencies much livelier, W2XFA (33.33 Mc/s), City Hall, Jersey (R7), could be heard at frequent intervals, and W3XEY (9.494 m.) was peaking to R7 at 14.45. Later W8XAI on the same wavelength gave an R6 signal, and the 10 m. amateur band provided many strong U.S. 'phone signals. HS8PJ (15.77 m.), R5-6 when giving the news in English at 13.50, apparently signed off shortly afterwards. The U.S. channels W3XAL and W2XAD gave very good reception until declining around 18.00. Later, stations on 25 m. were affected by "flutter," and W2XAF was the best U.S. broadcaster. Outstanding among the many stations heard on 49 m. after midnight were YV5RC, WIXAL, and VP3MR.

A general improvement was observed on Tuesday, the lower frequencies in particular being more lively. A news bulletin in English, given by a lady announcer, was very well heard at 14.00 from a transmitter in Formosa—most likely JIB Taiwan (28.49 m.). Other Eastern stations heard were PMN R7 and YDC (19.8 m.) R6. The 16 m. and 19 m. U.S. broadcasters gave excellent results until the usual fade-out time.

XEWW, an excellent R8, was found to be the sole occupant of the 31 m. band at 04.50 on Friday when radiating a news bulletin in which reference was made to "this morning's earthquake in Mexico City." On 49 m. the Americans W8XK (R8), W8XAL, and W3XAL (both R7) predominated, reception being very good and the prevailing noise level extremely low. Afternoon results were much the same as on previous days, and in the evening all distant transmissions had become affected by "flutter." I take this opportunity of wishing all my readers a Happy New Year.


